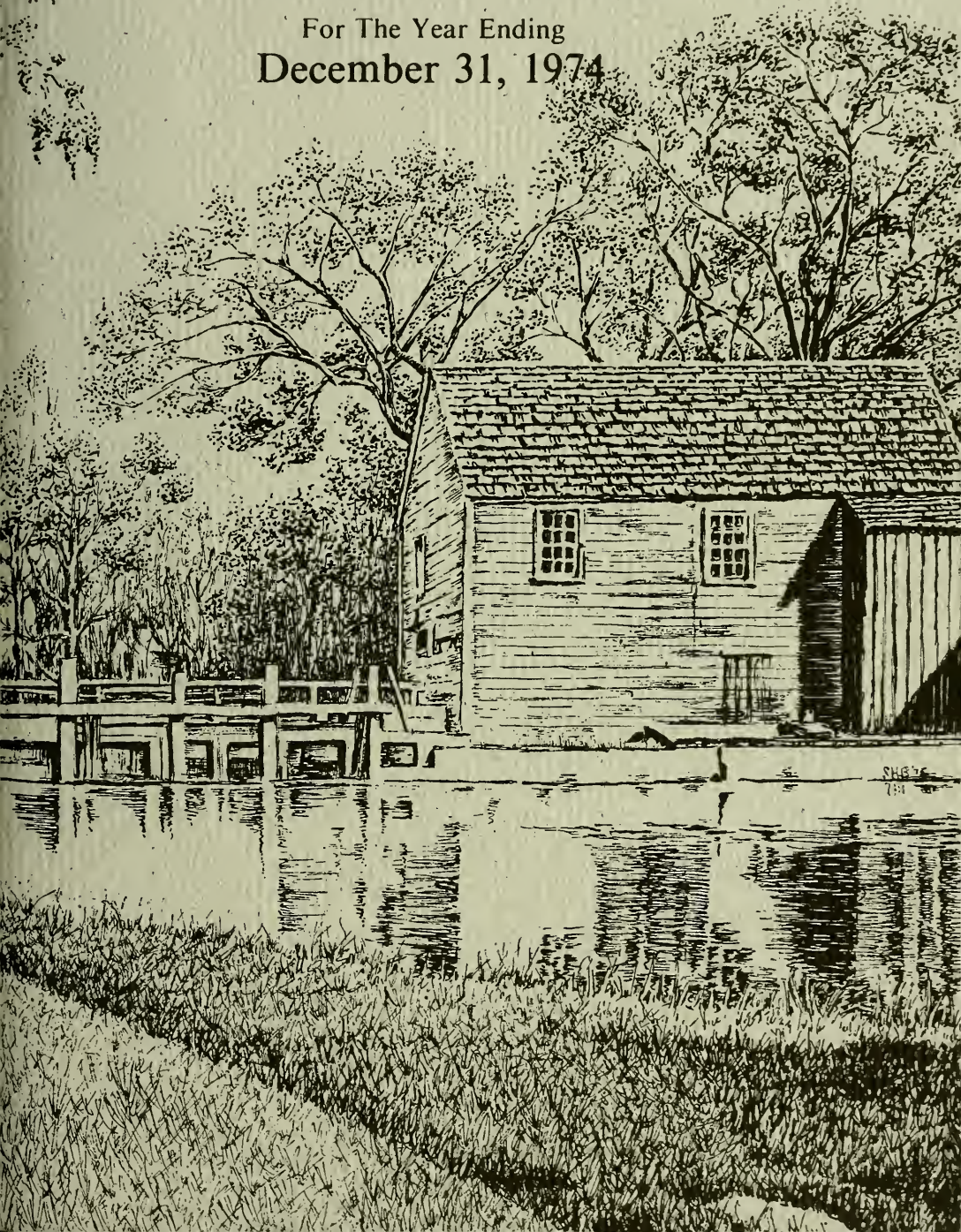

SAWMILL and GRIST MILL TRICKLING FALLS

Ralph Blaisdell of Salisbury was given the Falls and the land on both sides of the Falls with the understanding that he would build a saw mill. A mill grant of one hundred acres below the falls was laid out by the Kingstown lot-layers on March 15, 1710. His saw mill was running in 1712 or 1713 and was used until about 1910. The last owner was Thomas J. Heath who lived near the mill.

The Blaisdell family built the grist-grinding mill a few years after the saw mill was built and operated both mills during that period. This mill was used until about 1890 and the building razed about 1900.

REPORT OF TOWN MEETING
East Kingston, N.H.
March 5, 1974

The Annual Town Meeting was called to order at 10:25 a.m. by the Moderator, Robert B. Donovan. A motion was entertained by the Moderator and seconded by Arthur Haley and voted affirmatively that the reading of the Warrant be waived. The voters were then ordered to bring in Ballots for Town Officers

ARTICLE II To see if the Town will vote to adopt the changes and/or Amendments to the Zoning Ordinance as proposed by the Planning Board.

ARTICLE III Motion by Daniel Bodwell and seconded by David Conti that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$37,978.00, less estimated revenues to defray Town charges for the ensuing year.

(VOTED YES)

ARTICLE IV Motion by David Andrzejewski and seconded by Archie Osmond that the Town authorize the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of Taxes.

(VOTED YES)

ARTICLE V Motion by Daniel Bodwell and seconded by Wilma Young that the Town authorize the Selectmen to apply for, contract for, accept and expend aid from the Federal and State Governments in the event a declared disaster occurs within the Town, the authority herein granted to remain in effect until changed by future Town Vote.

(VOTED YES)

ARTICLE VI Motion by David Andrzejewski and seconded by David Conti that the Town vote to spend Revenue Sharing Funds, estimated to be in the amount of \$11,700.00, including \$386.35 Interest on the Revenue Sharing Account and \$1,347.44 unappropriated funds for 1973; said funds to be allocated for the following

project or projects at the discretion of the Selectmen.

ARTICLE VII Motion by Robert Belcher and seconded by Norman Freeman that the Town vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,-500.00 for the Fire Department and the unused portion be put in the Truck Fund.

ARTICLE VIII Motion by Robert Belcher and seconded by Archie Osmond that the Town vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,-800.00 to pay the Firemen for Fire Calls and Training and the unused portion be put in the Truck Fund.

(VOTED YES)

ARTICLE IX Motion by Daniel Bodwell and seconded by Richard Driggs that the Town vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$206.24 against the State Appropriation of \$1,374.93 for Class V. Road Assistance.

(VOTED YES)

ARTICLE X Motion by David Andrzejewski and seconded by Adam Mazur that the Town vote to appropriate a sum not exceeding \$13,000.00 for the purpose of making improvements to the following Class V roads within the Town; Inv. #66 Willow Road. 54 + 50 to 84 + 25, 0.56 mi. gravel and surface, such sum to be raised through the issuance of bonds or

notes under and in compliance with the provisions of Chapter 33 and 241, New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated, as amended and as applicable and to authorize the Selectmen to determine the date and place of payment of such bonds or notes and to determine the rate of interest thereon, and to take such other steps as may be necessary to negotiate such bonds or notes as shall be to the best interest of the Town of East Kingston.

(VOTED YES)

ARTICLE XI Motion by Daniel Bodwell and seconded by Wilma Young that the Town vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for the Seacoast Regional Counseling Center.

(VOTED YES)

ARTICLE XII Motion by David Andrzejewski and seconded by Richard Brailsford that the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$880.00 for the Exeter Visiting Nurses Association.

(VOTED YES)

ARTICLE XIII Motion by Daniel Bodwell and seconded by Richard Driggs that the Town vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 to defray the expenses of the Historical Committee.

(VOTED YES)

ARTICLE XIV Motion by Francis Smith and seconded by Richard Pelley that the Town vote to rescind and declare null and void all prior Town votes establishing fees for Cemeteries and Burial Lots and/or

Grave Sites relating to Hillside Cemetery, so-called, and to vest in the Board of Selectmen the authority to establish said fees in the future, the monies so derived from Burial Lots to be held in trust and the income therefrom used towards the general upkeep of said Cemetery.

ARTICLE XV Motion by David Andrzejewski and seconded by Wilma Young that the Town accept the reports of the Town officers and Auditors as printed in the Town Reports after bringing the errors and corrections to the attention of the voters.

Motion by Richard Driggs and seconded by Richard Brailsford that the discussion be closed and that the matter be put to a vote.

Motion by Richard Pelley and seconded by William Rosenburg that the Original Oil Refinery Motion be amended to read:

Whether or not the Town favors the construction of an oil Refinery in New

Hampshire so long as it meets all environmental requirements; and provided further, that it receives the approval from the Town or City in which it is to be situated.

Motion by William Rosenburg and seconded by Richard Brailsford to cease discussion and the Motion be put to a vote.

SELECTMEN'S REPORT

Town of East Kingston, N.H.

The following is a brief outline of the procedures enacted, decisions made and problems considered during the past year.

A new procedure has been adopted in reference to the Building Permit. Due to the Controlled Growth Article and changes in regards to the Building Permit passed at the March (1974) Town Meeting, Building Permits which have not been acted upon within ninety (90) days shall terminate and become void in accordance with the new zoning ordinance. The original applicant shall have one option to renew his Building Permit. A new fee will be assessed for the permit; and if at the end of ninety days, work still has not been started, the renewal will terminate and the permit will be made available to a new applicant seeking a permit. This procedure shall apply only with the construction of new residences or the installation of new mobile homes as defined in the Controlled Growth Article of the East Kingston Zoning Ordinance.

A comprehensive review of all Town insurance was made. As a result, it was resolved to have all Town insurance supplied by one agency. It is the opinion of this Board that due to the cost and importance of adequate coverage, the changes incorporated this year will best serve the Town's future needs.

Included in this year's Warrant, you will note an article dealing with the appropriation of funds for a Tax Map. The Tax Map Committee is presently finalizing bids and specifications for the work. Under present Planning Enabling Legislation, all towns will be required to have such a map in 1980. Since the overall cost of town expenditures are covered by property taxes, one can readily see the importance of accurate descriptions as to land areas and frontage since they are directly involved in the assessing of property.

In reviewing the future needs of East Kingston, one area in particular seems to have been overlooked. Presently, the Town has no formal recreation area for the townspeople. East Kingston, like many towns in the area, is destined to come under heavy development pressure in the future. The present economic situation may well lend itself in giving us time to get our house in order. It appears the first order of business is to establish a Recreational Committee to review areas presently available and suggest areas to be purchased for future recreational use. It should be noted also that at the present time the Town does not have access of its own to the Pow Wow River, probably East Kingston's single greatest recreational resource.

To the inhabitants of the Town of East Kingston in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at The East Kingston Town Hall in said East Kingston on Tuesday, the fourth day of March, next at 10:00 of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$66,630.00 less estimated revenues to defray Town charges for the ensuing year.

3. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes.

4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for the Seacoast Regional Counseling Center.

5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$880.00 for the Exeter Visiting Nurse Association.

6. To see if the Town will vote to spend Revenue Sharing Funds, estimated to be in the amount of \$5,500.00 including interest of \$368.57 on the Revenue Sharing Account; said funds to be allocated for the following project at the discretion of the Selectmen.

TAX MAP - \$5,868.57

7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for the purchase of Town Office Equipment.

8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$205.38 against the State appropriation \$1,369.22 for Class V Road Assistance.

9. To see if the Town will vote to establish a Capital Reserve fund under the provision of R.S.A. Chapter 35 as amended for the purpose of the acquisition of a fire truck and related equipment and to transfer to said Fund all monies in the existing "Fire Truck Fund" and to receive further appropriations for said purpose.

10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 to Defray the expenses of the Bicentennial Committee.

11. To see if the Town will vote to accept the donation of Charles Monahan, of a strip of land 50 feet in width bordering on the south side and the east side of the Union Cemetery, South Road. This additional area will provide 30 new full sized burial lots.

All expenses of a legal nature and survey costs and other expenses such as clearing, grading and fencing, in connection with this donation shall be borne by the Town.

12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,233.72 for the Town's participation in the expenses of The Greater Exeter Area Youth Group Home.

13. To see if the Town of East Kingston will vote, by a yes or no ballot, to create, establish, and maintain a Town Mosquito Control District under the provisions of R.S.A. 437-A of New Hampshire State Laws. The boundary of the District shall be the boundaries of the Town. The goal is to try to eliminate breeding conditions for mosquitoes. Joint efforts with neighboring towns will be necessary. N.H. Law R.S.A. 437-A provides a maximum of 5 cents per \$100.00 of property valuation. This levy shall be a separate item on a tax bill.

14. To see if the Town will vote to accept Terrace Lane as a public road.

15. To see if the Town of East Kingston will raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,500.00 for the purpose of paving or grading, filling and oiling Rowell Road, so called, from the portion of the road already paved to the driveway of Roy V. Cook which is approximately one quarter mile in length.

16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150.00 for the Seacoast Regional Office of Child and Family Services of New Hampshire, a private charitable organization. Said sum to be used for current operating expenses to enable the Seacoast Regional Office to continue providing services to residents of the Town of East Kingston whether or not said residents are able to pay.

17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,500.00 for the Fire Department and the unused portion be put in the Truck Fund.

18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,800.00 to pay the Firemen for Fire Calls and Training and the unused portion to be put in the Truck Fund.

19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$31,000.00 for a Class "A" Fire Truck. The above sum to be put with the present balance of the Truck Fund. The Truck Fund balance is \$14,160.00

REPORTS OF FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND DISTRICT CHIEF

All open burning when the ground is not covered with snow is controlled by the Town Forest Fire Warden in cooperation with the New Hampshire Forest Fire Service. Anyone wishing to kindle a fire out-of-doors when the ground is not covered with snow must have a written permit signed by the Town Forest Fire Warden. If the fire is to be kindled on land not owned by the person kindling the fire then he must have the permission of the landowner. No outdoors fires can be kindled between 9 a.m. and 5 p.m. unless it is raining, without the additional approval of the District Forest Fire Chief.

The 1974 forest fire season was one of the worst in the past two decades. Woodlands in central and southern New Hampshire became so dry in mid August that the Governor and Council, upon the recommendation of the State Forester, enacted a partial woodlands closure in Sullivan, Cheshire, Hillsborough, Merrimack and Belknap Counties and a complete woodlands closure in Strafford and Rockingham Counties plus the Towns of Barnstead, Gilmanton and Alton in Belknap County. Through the excellent cooperation of the citizens of our State no major forest fire occurred at any time during the year.

Exeter Area Visiting Nurse Association Annual Report 1974

The Exeter Area Visiting Nurse Association, Inc. is a Community Health Service providing health care (skilled nursing and physical therapy) to individuals and families in their place of residence or in ambulatory care settings for purposes of preventing disease and promoting, maintaining or restoring health or minimizing the effects of illness and disability.

The Nurse gives care and treatments as ordered by each person's physician; assists with the rehabilitation of persons (of all ages) handicapped by arthritis, heart trouble, diabetes, cancer, stroke, mental illness, accidents and similar conditions. The Nurse instructs designated persons to give needed care between nursing visits; teaches families and individuals good nutrition and understanding of special diets, sickness and accident prevention; advises new and expectant mothers in the care of themselves and their babies; provides Tuberculosis and psychiatric follow-up; refers when appropriate to other agencies.

The Physical Therapist establishes and supervises a program to return each person to his maximum potential.

The Association provides the service of a Home Health Coordinator to the Exeter Hospital for the purpose of discharge planning of patients to their homes. It sponsors a Well Child Clinic monthly providing physicals to children of eligible families and immunizations to children in this area.

This year a Homemaker/Home Health Aide Program has been added. A H/HHA provides personal and unskilled care to patients, does light housekeeping, laundry, meal planning and preparation under the supervision of a Registered Nurse.

The Agency in cooperation with the N.H. Department of Health sponsors various screening programs.

As of October 31, 1974 a total of 95 visits (nursing, physical therapy and H/HAAA) were made to 16 individuals in East Kingston.

We will continue to hold monthly meetings, usually the last Monday morning of each month, at the committee members' homes.

Your committee appreciates the cooperation received from the townspeople who have furnished us considerable historical details and pictures. We also wish to thank Mr. Reginald Webster for reproducing early records at no cost to the Town.

Report of the East Kingston Planning Board

The following is a monthly account of the business conducted by the Planning Board for calendar year 1974:

January A second hearing was held for the subdivision of the Louis Quiental property. It created a building lot that met all zoning requirements. This subdivision was approved.

A public hearing was held to discuss the proposed planning and zoning ordinance changes. Each article was gone over thoroughly, with questions and answers by those in attendance.

February—Second hearing on the proposed planning and zoning changes. Chairman Kelly will send letters to all Town residents to explain all the changes in the zoning ordinances.

March—Subdivision of the Francis Davis property was approved. Subdivision proposal submitted by Harold Young was denied. David Boudreau gave his brother additional land, which created a 2-acre lot.

The Board elected George Brinkerhoff Chairman and Henry Lewandowski, Jr. will be a member of the Planning Board representing the selectmen.

April—No business was conducted.

May—Edna Jordan submitted her plans for subdivision of her property, which would create two additional lots.

June—No formal business was conducted, but Jim Hayden from the Rockingham County Soil Conservation Commission met with members of the Planning Board, Board of Adjustors and Selectmen and discussed and explained some of the problems and solutions that the Town could expect to experience.

July—No new business.

August—Mr. and Mrs. Ciampa questioned the Board in relation to their possibly purchasing the Seelianis property on Rowell Road. W.A. Davis submitted a proposal for subdivision of his property.

September—Board approved W.A. Davis subdivision.

Edna Jordan's plans for subdivision were submitted and the Board suggested changes she would have to make in her proposed new lots.

October—Edna Jordan did not have the necessary changes because her surveyor died and she needed additional time to find a new surveyor.

Mr. LaPlante submitted plans for subdivision of his property. No action was taken.

November—Edna Jordan was told that she had to make changes on the lot line between Lot #2 and #3.

December—Edna Jordan subdivision was approved. The Board also approved the new lot created by Mr. LaPlant for his son, and advised Mr. LaPlant that the Board of Adjustors would have to approve his lot, as it is now substandard.

REPORT OF THE EAST KINGSTON TAX MAP COMMITTEE

REPORT OF TOWN ROAD AGENT

Along with the general maintenance on the town roads, the fall of 1974 brought the completion of rebuilding a portion of Willow Road. Beginning in July (1974) the surface of the old road was broken up and graded off. A two to three foot base of gravel was then hauled in and it graded and left to pack by nature. The shoulders were shaped and road regraded before three inches of asphalt and sand were mixed and rolled. Soon a seal coat was placed over the mix completing the surface and the project.

This project was financed by an accelerated program of town and rural assistance (T.R.A.) State appropriations. Each year a total of about \$1580. is raised between town and state for Class V Road Assistance. Whereas this yearly sum is inadequate to start and complete a betterment job, the Selectmen and State decided a loan of \$13,000. would be enough to start and complete the project on Willow Road. The State agreed to pay the principal of the loan if the town pays the interest. The agreement was made and work was planned for the summer of 1974.

The T.R.A. itemization shows money available and money spent. The balance of \$5,337.95 is now being planned for work to be done on the gravel portion of Sanborn Road in the summer of 1975.

EAST KINGSTON SCHOOL DISTRICT MEETING

The annual meeting of the East Kingston School District was called to order at 7:40 p.m. on March 12, 1974 by Moderator Robert Donovan in the Town Hall. It was moved, seconded and voted to waive the reading of the warrant in its entirety at this time as each article would be read before being acted upon.

Article I. To choose a moderator for the ensuing year..

Since no one had filed for the office, it was moved, seconded and voted that the clerk cast one ballot for Robert Donovan. When this had been done he was declared elected.

Article II. To choose a clerk for the ensuing year.

No one having filed for the office, it was moved, seconded and voted that the moderator cast one ballot for Richard Kelley. When this had been done he was declared elected.

Article III. To choose a member of the school board for the ensuing three years.

The moderator stated that E. Melvin Bowley was the only person who had filed. It was moved, seconded and voted that the clerk cast one ballot for E. Melvin Bowley. When this one ballot had been cast, the moderator declared him elected.

Article IV. To choose a treasurer for the ensuing year.

Moderator Donovan announced that Mrs. Catherine Gallagher was the only one who had filed for the office. The motion was made, seconded and voted that the clerk cast one ballot for Mrs. Gallagher. When this had been done, she was declared elected.

Article V. To choose two auditors.

The moderator stated that Mrs. Mary F. Kelley was the only one who had filed. It was moved, seconded and voted that the clerk cast one ballot for Mrs. Kelley. When this one ballot had been cast, she was declared elected.

The moderator then asked for nominations for the second auditor. The name of Mrs. Virginia Corton was nominated and seconded. There being no other

nominations it was moved seconded and voted that the nominations cease and that the clerk cast one ballot for Mrs. Corton. When this ballot had been cast, the moderator declared her elected.

Article VI. To see if the District will vote pursuant to RSA 31:105 to provide indemnification for district employees, school administrators, school board members, district officers or agents from personal loss or expense, including reasonable legal fees and costs, if any, arising out of any claim, demand, suit or judgment by reason of negligence or other act resulting in accidental injury to a person or accidental damage to property providing the indemnified person was at the time of the accident acting within the scope of his employment or office.

The article was moved, seconded and after explanation and discussion, the motion was voted negatively.

Article VII. To see if the District will vote to authorize the employment of an assistant teacher consultant for Supervisory Union 16 as provided in RSA 186:11, XXII and XXIII, effective July 1, 1974, and raise and appropriate the sum of \$885.00 as East Kingston's share of the salary, travel, retirement, F.I.C.A. and Blue Cross - Blue Shield.

It was moved, seconded and voted to pass over.

Article VIII. To see if the District will vote to approve a shared transitional class with Brentwood and Kensington at a total cost of \$11,160.00 and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3485.00 as East Kingston's share of this class.

The motion was made and seconded that East Kingston vote to participate in a shared transitional class at a cost not to exceed \$3,485.00. The voice vote was uncertain so the moderator asked for a show of hands. Eleven having voted in support and ten against, the moderator declared the motion adopted.

Article IX. To see if the District will vote to approve transportation for the students attending the shared transitional class and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1500.00 for such transportation.

The article was moved and seconded. There ensued a lengthy discussion which was terminated by a vote to vote on the question. The article was then approved by an affirmative vote.

Article X. To see what sum of money the District will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the payment of the salaries for school district officials and agents and for the payment of the statutory obligations of the District.

It was moved, seconded and voted that the School District raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the payment of salaries for school district officials and agents and for the payment of the statutory obligations of the district the sum of \$228,975.00 and that there be applied against said appropriation such sums as are estimated revenues and that the School Board be authorized to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated income and the appropriation as an assessment to be raised by the town by taxes.

Article XI. To hear reports of agents, auditors and committees or officers heretofore chosen and to pass any vote relating thereto.

It was moved, seconded and voted to pass over.

Article XII. To transact any other business that may come before this meeting.

It was moved, seconded and voted that the school board appoint a committee to look into the feasibility of conducting our own transitional class.

It was moved, seconded and voted to adjourn at 8:45 p.m.

To the Inhabitants of the School District of East Kingston, in the County of Rockingham and said State, qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said East Kingston on the Eleventh day of March, 1975, at 7:30 o'clock in the evening, to act upon the following subjects:

3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
5. To choose two Auditors.
6. To see if the District will vote to authorize the employment of an Assistant Superintendent for the schools of Supervisory Union #16 as provided in RSA 186:11, XXII and XXIII, effective July 1, 1975 and to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Three Hundred Thirty-One Dollars (\$1,331.00) as East Kingston's share of the salary, travel, retirement, FICA, health insurance, clerical assistance and office equipment.
7. To see if the School District of East Kingston will vote to adopt a plan for extending to employees of the School District of East Kingston the benefits of Title II of the Federal Social Security Act (Old Age and Survivor's Insurance) as authorized by Chapter 101 of the Revised Statutes Annotated Amended by Chapters 301 and 332 of the Laws of 1955, such plan to be effective July 1, 1975.
8. To see if the School District of East Kingston wishes to exclude from the plan services in any class or classes of positions filled by popular election.
9. To see if the School District of East Kingston wishes to exclude from the plan services in any class or classes of positions the compensation for which is on a fee basis.

10. To see if the School District of East Kingston wishes to exclude from the plan service in any class or classes of positions of election officials or election workers for a calendar quarter in which the remuneration for each service is less than fifty dollars (\$50.00).

11. If a plan for Social Security coverage is adopted, to see if the School District of East Kingston will authorize the School Board of East Kingston to execute on behalf of the School District of East Kingston the necessary agreement with the State of New Hampshire to carry into effect the plan and to see if the School District of East Kingston will designate the Superintendent of Schools of Supervisory Union No. #16 as the officer to be responsible for the administration of the plan.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS
Frederick B. King

The East Kingston School has continued to show growth in the development of the recent move toward continuous progress. This movement recognizes the importance of learning as an individual matter. Both reading and mathematics have been re-structured to be taught in "levels." Mr. Quinn, new principal of the school speaks of it in his report.

"The philosophy of continuous progress is being further realized in a program of individualized mathematics. The belief that each child must function at his own level is put into practice. Although this program is in its adjustment stages, we feel the child's progress is greatly benefited and enhanced by this approach."

Mr. Jeffrey Quinn has been teaching grade six and is developing well as a young administrator with many fine ideas. Other staff changes were Mrs. Janelle Parrish to replace Mrs. Blanche Loch, who served this community long and well. She is greatly missed. Her guidance of young children produced a student of quality. Mrs. Parrish appears to be following well in her place. Miss Marcia Zeamer joined the staff as a teacher aide and is doing a fine job working with some of our fourth grade youngsters. A competent staff is essential to a good elementary school. I believe we have such a group. By grades, they are as follows:

You will note the addition of Mrs. Sally Wool as a part-time music teacher. She brings a wealth of ideas and experience to the position. We are pleased to have her serving the youngsters of the community.

Mr. Quinn speaks of a number of school plans in his report. I quote him here as follows:

"The curriculum at East Kingston is on a steady growth pattern through the continued efforts of an excellent staff and the generosity of the East Kingston community. The implementation of the adopted Reading Program is in its final stage. With the purchase of new materials and continued planning our goal will be realized in the coming school year. A more comprehensive center approach in Language Arts has been attempted this year with success. Rather than a separation of language skills and reading; through additional time allotments most of the child's language experience takes place within their center during these blocks of time.

Through the annual budgeting procedure and the Federal Title II Program, the East Kingston Elementary School library is continually expanding. With the indispensable efforts of Mrs. Jane Bowley and others, the library has been newly organized. Many long hours of work were needed to bring the library to a workable facility. The library is now a regular part of each student's curriculum. This is further evidence of community effort and involvement with the school and is invaluable.

In the areas of Science and Social Studies, each is taught weekly by the classroom teacher, as are the special areas of Physical Education and Art.

The staff of East Kingston is looking forward to continued improvement of the curriculum and services with which we can provide our students. Essential to this growth is the continued support by the community. Improvements that the staff would ask be considered in the

future are: continued assistance of Learning Disabilities Personnel, counseling services for the students on a part-time basis, part-time physical education instruction by certified personnel, and a part-time art teacher.

In conclusion, I would again reiterate that the staff of East Kingston Elementary School are dedicated to the philosophy it has proposed: that of continuous progress and optimum growth for each child. We are looking forward to another successful year."

The lack of state financial support for local schools in New Hampshire is a difficult one to overcome. With rising costs the burden becomes more critical. Local taxes are indeed stretched to the limits just to maintain the "status quo" of the school. Mr. Durgin speaks of this in his report which I hope you will read carefully.

I have a strong belief that the citizens of East Kingston recognize that the public school is a primary force by which the future of each individual child, and indeed the community will depend. I will continue to work closely with the school board to provide quality education at a price consistently reasonable with today's economic market. I ask for the support necessary in order that we do not "short change" the youth currently proceeding through our schools. I will strive to see that we utilize the resources, time, money, space, personnel and material in such a way as to get all the "mileage" possible to serve the youngsters of East Kingston.

REPORT OF THE BUSINESS ADMINISTRATOR Daniel C. Durgin

Perhaps it can be fairly stated that modern education has never undergone greater financial pressure than is currently the case. Economic realities demand that every facet of our educational operation be subjected to the closest scrutiny as to cost, cost-benefit and possible alternatives. Because measuring educational output is far from a pure science assessing the end product (the "educated" student) versus the cost of producing that student is most difficult.

Most School Business Officials feel that, in many ways, our schools can and should be operated like a business. I subscribe to this view. However, there is a point where the analogy breaks down since our product is not material in the true sense nor is our main goal profits. Somehow, we must relate our educational goals to the community's ability to support those goals. This is a matter with which school boards and administrators must constantly wrestle. The demands of modern society make new and expanded programs and updated facilities more important than ever while the negative forces in our economy create a perplexing dicotomy.

In addition, the collective demands which society trusts upon the educational system magnify the problem to the extreme. I cite the very valid doctrine of equal education for all and the relatively recent emphasis on greater attention to the slow learner and the handicapped. Many of these societal demands are being translated into legal mandates all too often without broad based funding to support them. The cost, necessarily, has to be borne by the local property owner.

In New Hampshire, the property tax supports 80%-95% of local educational costs compared to a national average of 52%. With a limited base for funds, each successive year of inflation creates additional erosion of the state's ability to adequately fund services such as education. Thus, the property owner is forced to

shoulder a greater burden while the property tax, by its very nature, bears no relationship to his ability to meet that obligation.

As a Business Administrator, I realize that one of my prime responsibilities is to see that your tax dollars are spent prudently. With the help and support of our School Boards and staff, we are constantly searching for practical ways to reduce our cost of operation while maintaining our high standard of educational offering.

The advent of the "energy crisis" brought an all out effort on the part of Union #16 to reduce the consumption of energy to the lowest possible level. With the approval of the School Boards, staff members were asked to follow certain guidelines such as reducing lighting in non-instructional areas and turning off the row of lighting nearest the windows in classrooms. Also, thermostats were set at 68° during the day and 55° or 60° at night. As an example of what can be accomplished, fuel consumption was reduced on an average of 25% for the 1973-74 winter season over the previous year. Obviously, we are continuing these conservation measures in an effort to blunt the effect of rapidly escalating energy costs.

Last January, I was successful in negotiating a bulk purchase of our 1974-75 duplicator and mimeograph paper requirements far in advance of our normal procurement time of April or May. This was done in the belief that paper prices were set to undergo another increase in the Spring. This arrangement resulted in a savings of approximately 20¢ per ream. Considering Union-wide useage of approximately 4500 reams annually, this translated into a savings of \$900.

Our supply and equipment requirements are carefully screened to assure a true need before approval. Except in the case of specialty items, all supply and equipment purchases are either bid or negotiated.

Every districts' insurance program is constantly undergoing close scrutiny to establish adequate coverages in light of inflation, while attempting to keep the premiums at as low a level as possible. Package policies and the sensible use of deductibles are two methods

which are in use in an attempt to get the most from our insurance dollar.

All of us are well aware of the continuing rise in food prices. Contrary to the national trend, in school lunch programs, I am pleased to say that as of this writing all three of our lunch programs in Union #16 are growing in participation and all are operating successfully with little or no financial support from school district funds. Exeter's program, which is by far the largest in the Union (approximately 1800 lunches per day) has the lowest per meal charge to students in the state and is totally self-sufficient financially. As one might suspect, all three lunch programs are staffed with extremely dedicated people with enthusiasm and much imagination.

Last year we began a program of instructional workshops for custodians. These workshops are held three times annually and are designed to bring new more economical methods of building care to the attention of our custodians. They have been well received and very successful and they will become a regular fixture in our maintenance program.

In conclusion, I need not emphasize that difficult and trying times face all of us. With your support, we shall continue to see that your tax dollars are carefully and wisely spent.

REPORT OF SCHOOL HEALTH SERVICES EAST KINGSTON ELEMENTARY SCHOOL

To the Superintendent of Schools:

Routine health screenings have been provided with the addition of special height and weight graphs to be done annually on all children starting with this year's first grade. The Health Education program initiated last January has been incorporated smoothly into the curriculum, and the students seem to be enjoying this area of study.

A voluntary dental program was offered to students in the fourth grade last spring and this fall. It involved thorough instruction by the state dental hygienist in proper brushing and flossing techniques. The children then brush and floss their teeth daily at school after lunch. The program continued for eight weeks to allow time for the children to master the technique. At the end of the program children were encouraged to continue on their own at home.

A Red Cross First Aid certificate program is being planned for Grade 6 students in the spring.

Courses are being taken to fulfill state requirements for school nurse certification, and workshops pertinent to school nursing have been attended.

I would like to express thanks to the volunteers who have helped with the School Health Program. I would also like to express my appreciation to the School Board, Superintendent of Schools, Principal Jeffrey Quinn, members of the staff, and Dr. John Tuthill, school pediatrician, for their continued help and cooperation.
