TOWN WARRANT

The State of New Hampshire

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Francestown in the County of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in Francestown on Tuesday, the fourth day of March, next at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year coming.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

3. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow a sufficient sum of money to pay current expenses in anticipation of taxes, or take any action relating thereto.

4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000) to be placed in the Capital Reserve Fund for future replacement of fire trucks, or take any other action relating thereto.

5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00) to be placed in the Capital Reserve Fund for future replacement of Fire Department Radio Equipment, or take any other action relating thereto.

6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Hundred Eighty-eight Dollars and Fifty Cents (\$288.50) to reimburse the Volunteer Fire Company for the purchase of the new Encoder which had to be installed in 1974, or take any other action relating thereto.

7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Hundred and Sixty Dollars (\$360.00) to be spent for protective clothing for volunteer firemen, or take any other action relating thereto.

8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate Five Thousand Four Hundred Dollars (\$5,400.00) for removal of trash to the Bennington Landfill Site, or take any other action relating thereto.

9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate Four Hundred Dollars (\$400.00) to defray expenses for maintenance of the present Town Dump site and trash collection area, or take any other action relating thereto.

10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00) to defray cost of exterminating rodents and pests and to provide suitable fill cover at the Town Dump, or take any other action relating thereto.

11. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to pay the Town's proportion of the operating cost of the Bennington dump as specified in the Bennington-Antrim-Francestown dump contract, or take any other action relating thereto.

12. To see if the Town will vote to re-open and maintain the so-called Campbell Hill Road commencing at one hundred feet beyond the property of Donald and Linda Abbott and extending to one hundred feet beyond the property of Arthur Buzzell, or take any other action relating thereto.

13. To see if the Town will vote to apply any remaining funds appropriated and unexpended to the repairs of the Bixby Dam to the removal of brush and trees below the dam and the improvement and increased safety of Town property immediately surrounding the dam site, or take any other action relating thereto.

14. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the withdrawal of One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) plus interest from July 1973 to date from Capital Reserve Fund, New Cemetery Sales. Said sum to be used to establish Lawrence Kullgren Cemetery Fund, or take any other action relating thereto.

15. To see if the Town will vote to accept the following individual Trust Funds:

A. For perpetual care of cemetery lots in the respective names of: Everett D. Phillips, Archibald Cullens, The Lord Family and Esther Whittemore.

B. Charles and Marion Vose Library Fund, or take any other action relating thereto.

16. To see if the Town will vote to allocate a sum not to exceed \$3,500.00 of funds already received or expected to be received from Revenue Sharing to effect repairs to the exterior of the George Holmes Bixby Memorial Library as recommended by a recent engineering survey, or take any other action relating thereto.

17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Eight Hundred and Two Dollars (\$802.00) to support the services of the Monadnock Community Visiting Nurses Association, Inc., or take any other action relating thereto.

18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Hundred and Sixty-five Dollars (\$365.00) to support the services of the Monadnock Family Mental Health Services, or take any other action relating thereto.

19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00) to be placed in the Capital Reserve Fund to establish a Trust Fund for the future erection or purchase of a Town Library building, or take any other action relating thereto.

20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Hundred Dollars (\$300.00) to be placed in the Capital Reserve Fund for the future replacement of the Police Department cruiser, or take any other action relating thereto.

21. To see if the Town will vote that there will be no fees charged a resident or non-resident taxpayer of Frances-town for any purpose unless such a fee has been established and approved by a legal Town Meeting or such fee is specifically allowed by New Hampshire General Statutes, this article to remain in effect until rescinded by vote of the Town, or take any other action relating thereto.

22. To see if the Town will vote to reimburse all who have paid the fee charged by the Selectmen for the Town permit for dump and beach use and that said permits will be furnished at no charge to all resident and non-resident taxpayers of the Town of Frances-town until this article is rescinded by vote of the Town, or take any other action relating thereto.

23. To see if the Town will vote to grant site plan review authority to the Planning Board in accordance with RSA 36:19a. This will provide the Town with an opportunity to review and approve or disapprove plans for non-residential development, or take any other action relating thereto.

24. To see if the Town agrees to participate in the National Flood Insurance Program by directing the Board of Selectmen to complete the eligibility application and submit the required information to the Federal Insurance Administration, or take any other action relating thereto. Such information includes the following resolutions (summarized):

Resolution A.

The community recognizes that there are flood areas in the community; that federally subsidized flood insurance is available; that Town Meeting intends to evaluate land use in these areas; and that Town Meeting has the authority to enact appropriate land use control measures.

The Town Meeting resolves that assurances be given to the Federal Insurance Administration that the community will enact and enforce necessary land use control measures; that municipal officials and boards will be authorized to deal with the appropriate governmental agencies and private firms; and that elevations of buildings will be recorded when required.

Resolution B-1.

The community recognizes that regulations governing building construction in flood hazard areas have been enacted and are enforced.

The Town Meeting recommends that the Planning Board require all proposals for their approval that are in flood hazard areas be designed to minimize or eliminate flood damage and that the Planning Board require new or replacement water supply/sewage disposal systems be designed to eliminate or minimize flood damage.

To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

Article 3. Voted to authorize the Selectmen to borrow a sufficient sum of money to pay current expenses in anticipation of taxes.

Article 4. Voted to accept Federal matching funds in the amount of \$3,850.00 to be applied to repairs to the Bixby Pond Dam and approve the withdrawal of \$4,413.78 plus accumulated interest from Trust Funds for the same purpose.

Article 5. Voted to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$3,000.00 and allocate a minimum of \$2,000.00 of Revenue Sharing Funds if they become available up to a maximum of \$5,000.00 in Revenue Sharing Funds. The surplus of over \$2,000.00 of Revenue Sharing Funds to be applied to repairs to the outside of the Bixby Memorial Library building and grounds.

Article 6. Voted to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$1,500.00 for the remodeling of the Library basement rooms.

Article 7. Voted to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$3,000.00 for the purchase of a police cruiser, this sum to be supplemented by funds from the State of New Hampshire.

Article 8. (a) Voted to raise and appropriate by means of long term notes total sum of \$9,000.00 to purchase a vested interest in the Antrim-Bennington dump and provide a compacting location, and that a location for a compacting unit be decided by the Selectmen after holding a public hearing thereon.

Article 8. (b) Not carried.

Article 9. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 for the purchase by the Town of Frankestown 28 acres of the William Lord property for use as a permanent Town Forest under the supervision of the Conservation Commission.

Article 10. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Hundred and Sixty-three Dollars (\$263.00) to support

the services of the Monadnock Family and Mental Health Services.

Article 11. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of Six Hundred and Sixty-seven Dollars (\$667.00) to support the services of the Monadnock Community Visiting Nurse Association, Inc.

Article 12. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 to be placed in the Capital Reserve Fund for future replacement of fire trucks.

Article 13. Voted to authorize the Selectmen to draw the sum of Six Hundred Dollars (\$600.00) from Capital Reserve Fund, Replacement of Fire Dept. Radios, for the purchase of a new mobile fire radio for the Fire Chief's car.

Article 14. Voted to indefinitely postpone.

Article 15. Voted to re-open and maintain the so-called Campbell Hill Road, commencing at Route 47 to one hundred feet beyond the property of Donald and Linda Abbott.

Article 16. Voted to relinquish all right, title and interest, if any, in the old road leading from the Old County Road, so-called, to the residence of John L. Arnold, in accordance with RSA 238:1.

Article 17. Voted to reimburse the Town Tax Collector for expenses during the fiscal year 1973 and that the Town pay the Tax Collector \$500.00 plus expenses each year effective on passage.

Article 18. Voted to indefinitely postpone.

Article 19. Voted to create a Town Recycling Commission of three persons appointed by the Board of Selectmen.

Article 20. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred and Fifty Dollars (\$150.00) toward the operating expenses of the Conservation Commission.

Article 21. Voted to adopt the amendments to the Town Ordinances as proposed by the Planning Board.

Article 22. Voted to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$3,000.00 to provide adequate fire protection for the George Holmes Bixby Memorial Library as required by the Department of Safety and the Office of the Fire Marshal.

SUMMARY OF FINDINGS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

Board of Selectmen

Francestown, New Hampshire 03043

Gentlemen:

Submitted herewith is the report of an examination and audit of the accounts of the Town of Francestown for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1974, which was made by the Division in accordance with the vote of the Town. Exhibits as hereafter listed are included as part of the report.

One of the enclosed audit reports must be given to the Town Clerk to be retained as part of the permanent Town records.

SCOPE OF AUDIT

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the Board of Selectmen, Treasurer, Tax Collector, Town Clerk, Library Treasurer, Cemetery Treasurer, Fire Department, Conservation Commission and Trustees of Trust Funds.

FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

General Fund:

Comparative Balance Sheets — December 31, 1973 and December 31, 1974: (Exhibit A-1)

Comparative Balance Sheets — General Fund — as of December 31, 1973 and December 31, 1974, are presented in Exhibit A-1. As indicated therein, the Current Surplus of the Town increased by \$4,786, from \$9,939 to \$14,725, during the fiscal year ended December 31, 1974.

*Analysis of Change in Current Financial Condition:
(Exhibit A-2)*

An analysis of the change in current financial condition of the Town during the year is made in Exhibit A-2, with the factor which caused the change indicated therein. It was as follows:

Comparative Statements of Appropriations and Expenditures — Estimated and Actual Revenues: (Exhibit A-3 and A-4)

Comparative statements of general fund appropriations and expenditures, estimated and actual revenues for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1974, are presented in Exhibits A-3 and A-4. As indicated by the Budget Summary (Exhibit A-4), a revenue surplus of \$10,777, less a net overdraft of appropriations of \$5,991, resulted in a net budget surplus of \$4,786.

Long Term Indebtedness:

Comparative Balance Sheets — December 31, 1973 and December 31, 1974: (Exhibit A-5)

Comparative Balance Sheets of the outstanding long term indebtedness of the Town as of December 31, 1973 and December 31, 1974, are contained in Exhibit A-5. As indicated therein, because the amount of long term notes issued in 1974 offset the amount of matured notes paid during the year, the long term debt remained at \$28,000 as of December 31, 1974.

Statement of Debt Service Requirements: (Exhibit A-6)

A statement showing annual debt service requirements of principal and interest as of December 31, 1974, is presented in Exhibit A-6.

TREASURER

General Fund:

Classified Statement of Receipts and Expenditures:
(Exhibit B-1)

A summary statement of general fund receipts and expenditures for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1974, made up in accordance with the uniform classification of accounts, is included in Exhibit B-1.

Revenue Sharing Funds: (Exhibit J)

A statement of Revenue Sharing Fund receipts, expenditures, encumbrances and fund balance is contained in Exhibit J. As stated therein, there is an unappropriated fund balance of \$845 as of December 31, 1974.

AUDIT PROCEDURE

The accounts and records of all town officials charged with the custody, receipt and disbursement of public funds were examined and audited in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards and accordingly included such tests of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as were considered necessary in the circumstances.

Verification of uncollected and unredeemed taxes was made by mailing notices to delinquent taxpayers as indicated by the Tax Collector's records. Consequently, the amounts of uncollected and unredeemed taxes as indicated in this report are subject to any changes which may be necessitated by the return of verification notices.

GENERAL COMMENTS

Long Term Notes Authorized — Unissued — \$3,000: (Exhibit A-1)

Article 8-a of the annual Town Meeting approved an appropriation of \$9,000 for the purchase of a vested interest in the Antrim-Bennington disposal site; said appropriation to be funded by the issuance of long term notes. Accordingly, long term notes totaling \$6,000 were issued against the above authorization in 1974 and expenditures of like amount were expended for this purpose.

If the remainder of this appropriation (\$3,000) is not required, an article to rescind the unused authorization should be adopted at the next Town Meeting.

Classification of Expenditures:

Our examination of the Selectmen's cash payment book revealed a number of instances wherein expenditures were incorrectly classified. This was more prevalent, particularly in connection with capital outlay disbursements. It is recommended that greater care be exercised in preparing vouchers for subsequent entry in the cash payment book.

Conclusion:

The provisions of Chapter 71-a, Section 21, require that the auditors' summary of findings and recommendations

(letter of transmittal) shall be published in the next annual report of the Town. Publication of the Exhibits contained in this audit report is optional at the discretion of the Board of Selectmen. This letter, however, must be published in its entirety.

We extend our thanks to the officials of the Town of Francestown for their assistance during the course of the audit.

GEORGE HOLMES BIXBY MEMORIAL LIBRARY

REPORT OF LIBRARY TRUSTEES

Further remodeling of the Basement rooms began soon after the Town voted to appropriate \$1,500 toward the cost.

Alterations were made to the three fireplace supports; two were converted into carrells for study, and one to accommodate storage of chairs and work tables. The floors were carpeted, and the soapstone sink was removed to make space for an Audio-Visual cabinet to contain the AV hard- and soft-ware. Diane Schott and Betsy Wiederhold selected gay colors, and Lois MacAdam organized a double team of volunteers to paint the entire area.

The Library officials and Robert Burns of Educational Installations, Nashua, met frequently to discuss floor plans and equipment. In April, final decisions were made and mobile bookcase units, librarian's desk, and other movable pieces were ordered.

When the units arrived, another team of volunteers was called upon to relocate the many books. It was a monumental task accomplished only by the determination and willingness of so many friends of the Library giving unselfishly of their time.

Gifts received in Memory of Scott Marsden for the establishment of an Audio-Visual Center were used for a Twin Study AV Carrell and a large AV Storage Cabinet. Paul Fraser of N.H. Audio-View, and Joseph Lessard, Principal of the Elementary School, gave expert advice in the selection of the Audio-Visual materials which include a large projector screen, film strip projector, cassette player, four stereo headsets, and two stereo jack sets. Each piece of equipment is interchangeable and applicable to individual or group study.

In September, the rooms were ready for the children, and the many programs planned in conjunction with the grade School began with great enthusiasm.

The transformation of the basement into the Children's Library took a great deal of time and work on the part of so many people that it is impossible to thank them individually. So with warm thanks to all, we look forward to its

continual and growing use, and the development of many enjoyable programs.

During National Library Week, April 21-27, there was a fine display of new books. Doris Bassett arranged an exhibit showing how a book is produced with materials from the Golden Quill Press. Included were illustrations by Jeanne Thompson, now living in California. On the last day, the 27th, the Library had a reception for its own Carrie Lord! Mrs. Lord was moving to Ashland, Mass., and many friends came to say goodbye and wish her all the best for the future. (Mrs. Lord was librarian for 17 years and is the author of *Diary of a Village Library*.)

In May, the Librarian, accompanied by the trustees, attended the N.H. Library Council Annual Conference. One of the speakers was the author and illustrator of children's books, N. M. Bodecker.

During the Winter there were reading programs for the school children. Fran Hall read to the 5th and 6th graders, while the 1st and 2nd graders were read to in the school, using Library books. Also, for the children, there were three weekly movie programs.

In the Summer our Librarian planned several delightful programs for the children. The Reading Program was a great success, many adults wished they could participate, too! A charming map of Francestown was drawn by Eleanor Kiblin, and each child had a replica of the Francestown Coach which he "drove" from one illustrated historic area to another as each book was read. At the end, there was a fine party outside the Library, and children "traveling" the most "miles" received certificates good for the paperback of their choice at a bookstore. There were close to 50 participants, and there have been eager requests for a similar event next Summer!

In addition, there were weekly story-hours for the pre-schoolers and for the young children, as well as weekly movies for all ages. A great many thanks to the kind Library friends who helped so much with these vacation events.

This Fall, several activities have been going on. One group made all kinds of Christmas decorations under the guidance of Barbara Thulander; another group made terrariums, and still another group meets regularly to learn

the art of needlepoint – all urged on by Librarian and trustees.

David Barr volunteered to act as Librarian one evening a week during November and December, and we thank him very much.

The Reading Program continued with Libby Hubbell reading to the 5th and 6th graders. Movies, too, continued to be shown three times a week.

One of the highlights of the Fall was a visit from the enchanting author and illustrator, Elizabeth Orton Jones, of Mason. The children's exciting Halloween decorations were all about, and it was the day that the young ones come from the School to choose their books. She delighted in meeting them and having a chance to talk to them. She also enjoyed watching the movie and discussing it with them. We hope she'll come back soon!

Another exhibit at this time was the show of drawings and essays done for the S. W. Recycling Fair in Keene; many of them were winners in the Fair contest.

Wonderful, imaginative creations by the children have decorated the Library at Thanksgiving and Christmas, too. And, in fact, throughout the year, there have been exhibits of the School children's work.

That marvelous party and fund-raising event: the Library Bridge-Tea and Silent Auction took place on August 15th at the Ski Lodge. It is an annual success with those annual co-chairmen, Doris Bassett and Lois MacAdam, and Connie Dodge "doing" her auction! We thank them very much for their continued generosity; and we thank them and all their committee members for being so successful in producing the magnificent sum of \$477.75. Our thanks go to Tim Gannett for making the Lodge available to us, we do appreciate that so much; and we do appreciate all who come to enjoy that special afternoon!

Special gifts have been received in memory of good friends to the Library. Memorial Gifts have been acknowledged with deep appreciation for Charline Bailey, and for Dorothy Freese, and for Ruth Whittemore. A variety of books relating to their interests are being selected.

We received from the State, one hundred dollars for Ref-

erence Books, primarily, because we are an affiliated Library of the Library Development Program (since 1965).

Twenty copies of the Town History, "Frances' Town," have been sold during the year, and there are still copies available.

We appreciate and thank the Improvement and Historical Society for the Labor Day gift of one hundred dollars (1973).

We received many generous gifts for the Basement, some of which were specifically designated for an assistant Librarian for one year. Ann Geisel of Greenfield came in July and has been a great help to our Librarian, for there has been a tremendous amount of reorganization going on with the books.

Among the many books given to the Library, we should like to point out one given by the author, Constance Leonard, and its title is "Steps to Nowhere."

I would also like to thank Esther Whittemore who worked when school children came for books, etc., Lois and her gals, and my faithful trustees, who come at my beck and call. I am so fortunate to have the capable services of Ann Geisel, who is a real gem!

Forest Fire Warden

All open burning when the ground is not covered with snow is controlled by the Town Forest Fire Warden in co-operation with the New Hampshire Forest Fire Service. Anyone wishing to kindle a fire out-of-doors when the ground is not covered with snow must have a written permit signed by the Town Forest Fire Warden. If the fire is to be kindled on land not owned by the person kindling the fire then he must have the permission of the landowner. No outdoor fires can be kindled between 9 A.M. and 5 P.M. unless it is raining, without the additional approval of the District Forest Fire Chief.

The 1974 forest fire season was one of the worst in the past two decades. Woodlands in central and southern New Hampshire became so dry in mid August that the Governor and Council, upon the recommendation of the State Forester, enacted a partial woodlands closure in Sullivan, Cheshire, Hillsborough, Merrimack and Belknap Counties and a complete woodlands closure in Strafford and Rockingham Counties plus the Towns of Barnstead, Gilmanton and Alton in Belknap County. Through the excellent cooperation of the citizens of our State no major forest fire occurred at any time during the year.

REPORT OF THE HISTORIAN

Restoration work on the Bixby Pond Dam was completed this year, and the project has been approved by the State of New Hampshire Engineers. This is the property once owned by the Francestown Improvement and Historical Society and deeded to the Town in 1971.

Improving the basement rooms of the George Holmes Bixby Memorial Library was undertaken this year. Floor covering, gay furniture, much needed shelving for better display of books, provided a children's area which is being enjoyed immensely by the younger readers. Also included in the arrangement is an audio-visual center, a very vital addition to meet the needs of our school children. All of this work has made it possible to consolidate adult books and magazines on the first floor. A more detailed account is given in the report of the Library Trustees.

Additional work on the building was necessary to provide proper exits by changing the opening of exterior doors of the building, installing proper exit signs within the building, and a smoke alarm for the heater, to conform with regulations of the State Fire Marshal.

The work of erecting an outside fire escape to the second floor was postponed pending further checking of the brick work at the rear of the building. For this reason the four rooms on the second floor housing historical articles were not opened to the public this past summer. However the Curator is happy to announce that several new items have been given to the Society and hopefully the rooms will be re-opened soon.

As voted at last year's Town Meeting, twenty-eight acres of the William Lord property was purchased by the Town for a sum of \$2,000.00 for use as a permanent Town Forest under the supervision of the Conservation Commission. This land was offered to the town by the widow of William Lord (Carrie) who has long been interested in the Conservation Program. She was the Town's Librarian for many years and recently wrote a book of her experiences during her years in the Library.

The Francestown Academy, once housed on the second floor of the Town Hall, closed its doors in 1921. There is

still a Board of Trustees in existence which is in control of endowment funds earning a yearly income to be used as a financial aid fund for Francestown school children. A change in dispersing these funds was voted this year by the Board. Students now eligible for such funds must have completed one year and enrolled in the second year of college or any higher education. Any Francestown student who is eligible should apply for this aid not later than October 1st of each year to Mrs. Nellie Abbott, Clerk of the Francestown Academy Corporation.

The Ladies Auxiliary of the Volunteer Fire Department has now been in existence three years and is proving its usefulness. The members think of themselves as the "Arm" of our Volunteer Fire Department, rendering assistance in times of fire or other disasters. They have all received first aid training, are knowledgeable in manning the radio in the Fire House, and in answering the call to duty when ambulance service has been called, by reporting to the fire station to aid in any way needed. They also find time to furnish hot coffee and sandwiches at times of disaster.

Though not strictly historical, but noteworthy from the point of view of recreational and club activities, it is interesting to note that there are those who care to help to organize a Cub Scout unit and revitalize interest in a Boy Scout Troop. Interest in a regulation 4-H group resulted in its organization with continuing interest of the 4-H "Hill Riders" for those interested in horses only. There is a Francestown Hockey Association as well as the "regulars" such as Little Leaguers and Tennis Tournaments. Also this past winter there were several groups of "Sharing" craft activities in progress at the Library.

The Improvement and Historical Society sponsored its 58th Labor Day Carnival this year. Even though the events started during a heavy morning downpour that stopped in time for the big parade, the results were most successful, increasing the financial resources of the organization by \$3,000. At its Fall meeting the Society was generous in giving financial assistance to the support of the Boy Scouts, the Francestown Hockey Association, the Conservation Camp Program, the George Holmes Bixby Memorial Library and the Community Christmas Party. It also sponsored square

dance lessons for the young children and aided in the general care and upkeep of the Town Tennis Court, the Little League Baseball Field and the Town's Horse Sheds and Beach. It now has a membership of 80. Any Frances-town property owner is eligible for membership.

The Selectmen made the following appointments during 1974: Charles Brien as Director of Civil Defense; Philip W. Ireland re-appointed to the Planning Board for five years; Robert Cloutier replaced Dr. George A. Bourgeois on the Planning Board; Mrs. Constance Bicknell was appointed Chairman of the Commission on Recycling; and Clifton Foote was re-appointed to the Board of Adjustment. Mrs. Nellie Abbott replaced William Lord (deceased) as Supervisor of the Check List, and Mrs. Doris Bassett replaced Mrs. Eula Hardwick (deceased) as Supervisor of the Check List. Ashley Prest was appointed to the Conservation Commission; Donald Pettee to the Board of Adjustment, replacing James Crawford who moved away; and John Thomas was appointed Acting Police Chief.

Additional improvements were made to the Poor Farm Road, and a portion of the Pleasant Pond Road, which was rebuilt, was surfaced with black top.

The Recycling Commission comprising Mrs. Connie Bicknell, Chairman; Mrs. Lucille Paige, and Mr. James Gibbons, planned and presented a Variety Show in May with all local talent and raised money to support a recycling program in our Town. There was standing room only to watch an all male chorus line, dancers, singers, and instrumentalists, netting a goodly sum from donations given at the door, which made it possible to build and erect a new collection center on the old site at the Town Dump, the original buildings having been destroyed by fire.

As a result of a well planned recycling program more than 12 tons of collected glass was trucked to Dayville, Connecticut; 70 barrels (approximately 3 tons) of washed and squashed cans were delivered to Continental Can Co. in Malden, Mass.; over a ton of rags was salvaged and cleaned; and several truck loads of good, usable household articles, furniture, and clothes were delivered to Project Help in Milford, N. H.

Response to a call for old newspapers has resulted in

more than a half ton collected weekly – the money received from the sale going toward the purchase of a jungle gym for the school yard.

The resignation in November of Police Chief Robert Stack was accepted with regret. The new Acting Chief appointed by the Selectmen is John Thomas, once a State Trooper in Massachusetts with a great deal of police experience. Three additional men have been added to the police force, and the Town is now tied in with the communications network called the Hillsborough County Communications Center, based at the Goffstown police headquarters, to aid the Francestown police at any time should its assistance be requested.

As voted at the 1974 Town Meeting, a police cruiser completely equipped was purchased, the cost being shared by funds from the State of New Hampshire.

During the year 34 building permits were issued:

- 25 for additions
- 2 for year round residence
- 7 miscellaneous

The State Department of Resources and Economic Development reports the 1974 estimated population of Frances-town as 729 legal residents.

The voters check list as of December 31, 1974 showed 450 qualified voters.

REPORT OF FRANCESTOWN CONSERVATION COMMISSION

The recycling program which we sponsored had a set-back in January when the sheds were burned to the ground. At the Town Meeting it was voted to appoint a Town Recycling Commission, and so we should like to thank Connie Bicknell again for all she has done for recycling from the very beginning. What a tremendous job!

The Roadside clean-up took place on April 27th. It was very successful, and we thank all the children and adults who helped so much.

The soil survey along the corridor of the Piscataquog River was finished in June 1973; and the interpretive maps and reports were officially turned over to the Commission and the Town on April 9th at the public meeting at the Firehouse. Mr. Edward Hutchinson and Mr. Richard Bond of the Soil Conservation Service, Milford, made the presentation with an explanatory talk and slides. The maps have been dry-mounted and are in the Library, as are the Reports which may be circulated.

The field work for the soil survey of the remainder of the Town was done during the past Summer, the maps and reports will be completed in 1975. We had applied for a second grant from the Ford Foundation for matching funds, but unfortunately it could not furnish them, so the Commission is raising the total amount of approximately \$4,000.

Fund-raising projects have been a series of eight Square Dances with Dudley Laufman, and the preparation of a Frankestown Telephone Directory. We plan another series of dances for 1975, and the publication of the Directory. We would like to thank Carol Prest and Zoe Richardson for their constant help at the dances, and Lois MacAdam and Jeanne Prince for their zeal in helping us sell listings in the "yellow pages" of the Directory. While the book will have all the local names, numbers and addresses, the advertisements are not only local, but from surrounding towns as well.

The Commission looked into securing BOR funds for the purchase of about 28 acres of land of the William Lord property, offered by Mrs. Lord at extremely low cost to the Town,

to be used as a Town Forest under the supervision of the Commission. It was voted at Town Meeting to purchase the land outright. With the advice of Mr. Robert Breck, County Forester, and under the direction of Frank Mace, two acres have been enrolled in a USDA program whereby trees are weeded and pruned. The funds received for this are paid to the Boy Scouts who are doing the work with their Scoutmaster, Harlow Richardson. A sign for the Forest has been designed by Ashley Prest.

A Commission Newsletter was made available to all, before Town Meeting, describing our activities and explaining about the proposed Forest.

As part of involving youth in conservation, we are sponsoring the Francestown Cub Scouts.

The Commission was represented at the S. W. Regional Recycling Fair at Keene, October 19-20. Many of the Francestown school children won awards for their posters and essays which were on exhibit there.

Conservation Commission displays were set up at the Citizen's Workshop on Guiding Growth, sponsored by SPNHF at Con Val, March 30th; and at the 3rd Annual Conservation Show at the Nashua Mall, April 25th.

Commission members attended the Annual Meeting of the Association of the N.H. Conservation Commission at Keene, November 2nd, taking part in some of the workshops. Members also attended the Land-Use meeting in Peterborough, November 13th, one of several held throughout the State by the Legislative Land-Use Study Committee. Other meetings and programs have been attended in the hope of further educating ourselves about the problems which confront us all.

At the Library there are many books and pamphlets pertinent to Francestown, as a copy of the Zoning Regulations; and to Conservation in general, as Guiding Growth, a recent SPNHF publication.

REPORT OF THE PLANNING BOARD

The Planning Board met regularly twice a month during the course of this past year, approving a total of eight new subdivisions in town. Two public hearings were also held prior to final approval of improvements on Poor Farm Road, legally designated a Scenic Road.

New Subdivision Regulations designed to close loopholes in the previous Regulations were approved by the Board on January 4, 1974. The Board also recommended to the town six amendments to the Zoning Ordinance, most particularly pertaining to the requirements for hotels, motels, inns, and condominiums. Following the required public hearings, the proposed amendments were accepted by vote of the town in March.

The Board considered the urgings of some townspeople to recommend further refinements in the present Zoning Ordinance to the Annual Town Meeting in 1975. The Board, however, met on January 3, 1975, with the Board of Selectmen and the Conservation Commission to consider ways of gathering together needed information about the town's anticipated future growth so that appropriate planning can be done by the town's elected and appointed officials, and so that townspeople may better understand the problems Francestown may face in future years. To help accomplish this purpose, it is expected that a questionnaire will be sent out to townspeople sometime this year to determine their hopes and expectations for Francestown.

Cold patch hasn't gone down any, as with any other road material, and I don't expect any of it to go down this year.

We spent about \$2,000.00 on patching last year. We sealed around 3 miles of tar road, slightly below 1973, reason is we had to cut back in a few places.

We spent \$1,400.00 on the Denison Pd. Rd. again this year for gravel. \$1,800.00 on County Rd. north and \$1,200 on Campbell Hill Rd. that was opened this year. It's not an all out good job, but we had to fix it at least a little so we could plow it.

We put in quite a few culverts around town this year and more are needed.

T.R.A. went on Pleasant Pd. Rd. last year and most of the money was spent on tar.

Duncan Fund was spent on Poor Farm Rd. We hope one more year will finish this Rd.

We would like to take this time to thank the people of Francestown and the Selectmen for their cooperation.

**REPORT OF
WASTE DISPOSAL STUDY COMMITTEE**

Dear Sirs:

Now that the Town has contracted with Bennington to participate in their landfill site this committee has re-examined the methods by which this town can remove its refuse to Bennington in a compacted state by an authorized carrier.

This committee's original recommendation of a central site with a leased compactor has been reconsidered in light of more recent cost estimates. Included and made part of this report is the latest proposal from Community Sanitation Service of Peterborough; they propose to lease a 42 yard compactor and empty it whenever required, presumably every 7-10 days, since it would compact approximately 160 yds. of loose trash.

The above proposal along with other related costs would amount to approximately \$8,500 yrly., not including this town's share of the maintenance expense for the Bennington Landfill site.

Lease of compactor	\$7,500.00
Minimum electric charge based on P.S. Co. extending lines to site	650.00
Maintenance of site, keeping area clean, etc.	350.00

The leasing of a compactor would also necessitate the initial expenditure of \$1,000 for the building of a concrete slab, 10'x40'x8" thick.

Community Sanitation Service also estimated, although not in the form of a proposal, that if the town were to underwrite the cost of a house to house pick-up their charge would be in the \$15,000 to \$20,000 range.

Also included and made part of this report is a proposal

from W. L. Bourassa, a Keene rubbish contractor, that we rent 5 ten yd. containers at \$5.00 weekly, each, which they would empty twice weekly for \$12.00 each (\$6.00 ea. per empty), chemically wash them and remove the trash, compacted in their truck, to the Bennington Landfill. It has been estimated that this town produces approximately 100 loose cubic yards of refuse weekly. The above proposal does not take into account the extra waste produced during the summer months when our population increases; it would be necessary to adjust the number of containers rented during that period. If we were to assume that, at most, the population doubled during those weeks, the yearly cost of this program (not including this town's share of maintenance expenses at the Bennington Landfill) would be approximately \$5,800.00.

Rent, 5 containers at \$5.00 wkly.	\$1,300.00

Estimated yearly expense \$5,790.00

The committee is recommending that the Town adopt the above method of trash removal, i.e., rent an adequate number of containers, currently estimated at five, and that the selectmen effect the most efficient and least costly arrangement with the Keene contractor or anyone willing to bid the same amount or lower. We feel that the lower yearly cost, about \$3,000 less than a compactor, and not having to spend funds for concrete slabs and bring electricity to the site are strong reasons for recommending the above plan. Moreover, utilization of the present dump site for this purpose, without great amounts spent on capital improvements, leaves the door open to future options if this method should not prove satisfactory.

The following are recommendations made necessary if this plan, or any plan involving a collection area, is adopted:

- (1) That commercial establishments. apartment com-

plexes and similar producers of large amounts of trash be instructed to make private arrangements to deliver their refuse, compacted, to the landfill site and that the selectmen authorize those carriers in accordance with the provisions of our contract with Bennington.

(2) That certain areas at our present dump site be set aside for the depositing of tree stumps, appliances or any items that could not reasonably be put into a container or compactor. That arrangements be made for the periodic removal of these items with salvage firms or interests.

(3) That provisions for recyclable materials be maintained, thus minimizing removal expenses for the Town.

(4) That the dump be properly covered with suitable fill and that provision be made for exterminating rats or pests.

We are submitting, herewith, suggested articles, for inclusion in the town warrant, which we feel are appropriate if these recommendations are adopted.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$5,400.00 (Five Thousand Four Hundred Dollars) for removal of trash to the Bennington Landfill Site. Said amount to defray the cost of:

A. Rental of suitable number of ten yard containers to be placed at the present Town dump site.

B. Emptying and chemically washing containers on regular weekly or twice weekly schedule.

C. Removal and compacting of trash including delivery to the Bennington Landfill Site.

or take any other action relating thereto.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$400.00 (Four Hundred Dollars) to defray expenses for maintenance of the present Town Dump site and trash collection area, or take any other action relating thereto.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$1,000.00 (One Thousand Dollars) to defray cost of exter-

minating rodents and pests and to provide suitable fill cover at the Town dump, or take any other action relating thereto.
°NOTE — We are not suggesting an article for the warrant which would provide funds for Francestown's share of the maintenance at the Bennington facility; we presume that will be provided for elsewhere in the Town budget.
