### TOWN OF FREEDOM WETLANDS CONSERVATION ORDINANCE

### A. Purpose and Intent

The purpose of this ordinance is to protect the public health, safety and general welfare by controlling and guiding the use of land areas which have been found to be subjected to high water tables for extended periods of time.

It is intended that this ordinance shall:

1. Prevent the development of structures and land uses on naturally occurring wetlands which will contribute to pollution of surface and ground water by sewage or toxic substances.

2. Prevent the destruction of, or significant changes to natural wetlands which provide flood protection.

3. Protect unique and unusual natural areas.

4. Protect wildlife habitats and maintain ecological balances.

5. Protect potential water supplies and existing aquifers (water-bearing stratum) and aquifer recharge areas.

6. Prevent expenditure of municipal funds for the purposes of providing and/or maintaining essential services and utilities which might be required as a result of misuse or abuse of wetlands.

7. Encourage those low-intensity uses that can be harmoniously, appropriately and safely located in wetlands.

### **B. Wetlands Defined**

Wetlands are areas where a significant part of the vegetational community, and soil and land types consist of, but do not necessarily include all, of the following:

1. Swamps are areas where the water table is at or near the ground surface for a significant part of the year. The vegetational community consists mostly of trees and woody shrubs, such as: Alders Arrow-wood Atlantic White Cedar Black Ash Black Gum Black Spruce Buttonbush Common Elder High-bush Blueberry Marsh Rose

Poison Sumac Red Maple Rhodora Sphagnum Moss Spicebush Sweet Pepperbush Tamarack (Larch) Willows Winterberry

2. Marshes are treeless wetlands dominated by softstemmed herbaceous plants. The surface of the marsh is covered with water year around, though seasonal fluctuations in water depth are expected. Marshes range from the wet meadows variety to deep marshes which can be covered with several feet of water. The vegetational community is made up of some or all of the following:

Arums	Leatherleaf
Bladderworts	Pickerel Weeds
Bur-reeds	Rushes
Cat-tails	Sedges, including Bulrushes,
Duckweeds	Cotton-grasses and Wool-grasses
Eelgrass	Smartweeds
Frog's-bits	Sweet Gale
Horsetails	Water-lillies
Hydrophylus Grasses	Water Milfoil

3. **Bogs** consist of peat or muck deposits of significant depths and are characterized by a distinct group of trees and plants which are adapted to the bog's highly acidic conditions. The water in a bog is practically devoid of oxygen and nutrients. Bogs usually develop in undrained glacial depressions. Typical plants are: Atlantic White Cedar Black Spruce Bladderworts Bog or Buckbean Bog-laurel Bog-rosemary Cotton Grass High-bush Blueberry Leatherleaf

Pale Laurel Pitcher-plants Rhodora Sedges Sheep Laurel Sphagnum Moss Sundews Sweet Gale

4. Soil series and land types commonly associated with wetlands, as described by the Soil Survey of Carroll County, New Hampshire, dated December, 1977, include the following "very poorly drained" and "poorly drained soils":

### "Very Poorly Drained" soils included:

Alluvial land, wet (AW) Muck and Peat (MU) Chocorua mucky peat (CM) Ossipee mucky peat (OT) Fresh water marsh (FA) Whitman very stony Greenwood mucky peat loam (Wc) (GW)

"Poorly Drained" soils include:

Limerick silt loam (Lk) Limerick variant (Lm) Naumburg loamy sand (Na) Raynham variant (Ra) Ridgebury series (Rg) (Rl)

### **C. District Boundaries**

### 1. Wetlands Conservation District Defined

The Wetlands Conservation District is defined as those areas delineated as very poorly and poorly drained soils by the U.S. Department of Agriculture, Soil Conservation Service, in the Soil Survey of Carroll County, New Hampshire, dated December, 1977. The Wetlands Conservation District also includes those areas such as swamps, marshes and bogs that are inundated or saturated by surface or ground water at a frequency and duration sufficient to support a prevalance of vegetation adapted for life in saturated soil conditions.

### 2. Establishment of a District

The limits of the Wetlands Conservation District are hereby determined to be areas of one acre or more in size, or of any size if contiguous to surface waters such as lakes, ponds and streams, subjected to high water tables for extended periods of time and includes, but are not necessarily limited to, all such areas delineated as wetlands on the current Freedom Wetlands Map, which is on file at the Town Hall.

### 3. Wetlands Incorrectly Delineated

In the event an area is alleged to be incorrectly designated as being poorly drained or very poorly drained soils in the Town of Freedom Wetlands Conservation Map, or that an area not so designated meets the criteria for wetlands designation, and evidence to that effect is satisfactorily presented to the Planning Board, the Planning Board may determine that the restrictions contained in this ordinance shall or shall not apply. Such evidence may be obtained either by revision by the Soil Conservation Service of its soil maps or by adequate on-site soils investigation and analysis conducted by a Soils Scientist qualified in field analysis with such investigation and analysis to be reviewed by the Soil Conservation Service and presented in writing to the Planning Board along with the findings of the Soil Conservation Service.

### **D. Permitted Uses**

1. Permitted uses are those which will not require the erection or construction of any structures or buildings, will not alter the natural surface configuration by the addition of fill or by dredging and uses that otherwise are permitted. Such uses may include the following:

a. forestry-tree farming, using best management practices in order to protect streams from damage and to prevent sedimentation;

b. cultivation, harvesting and fertilization of crops according to recognized soil conservation standards as established by the Soil Conservation Service. The protection of wetlands from pollution caused by fertilizer, pesticides and herbicides shall be of prime importance.

c. wildlife refugees;

d. parks and recreation uses consistent with the purpose and intent of this ordinance;

e. conservation areas and nature trails;

f. open spaces as permitted or required by the subdivision regulations.

### **E. Special Exceptions**

Special exceptions may be granted by the Board of Selectmen, after proper public notice and public hearing, for undertaking the following uses in the Wetlands Conservation District when the application has been referred to the Planning Board, the Conservation Commission, and to the Health Officer for review and comment at least twenty (20) days prior to the hearing.

1. Streets, roads and other access ways and utility right-of-way easements, including power lines and pipe lines, if essential to the productive use of land and if so located and constructed as to minimize any detrimental impact of such uses upon the wetlands.

2. Water impoundments.

3. The undertaking of a use not otherwise permitted in the Wetlands Conservation District, if it can be shown that such proposed use is not in conflict with any and all of the purposes and intentions listed in Section A of this ordinance.

### **F. Special Provisions**

1. No septic tank or leach field may be constructed or enlarged closer than one hundred twenty-five (125) feet to any wetland, unless a variance is granted by the Planning Board.

2. No part of a wetland may be considered as part of the minimum size requirement of any lot.

### G. Separability

If any section, provision, portion, clause or phrase of this ordinance shall be held to be invalid or unconstitutional by any court or competent authority, such holding shall not affect, impair or invalidate any other section, provision, portion, clause or phrase of this ordinance.

### **H.** Conflict With Other Regulations

Where any provision of this ordinance is in conflict with State law or other local ordinance, the more stringent provision shall apply.

#### **REPORT OF FOREST FIRE WARDEN** AND STATE FOREST FIRE SERVICE

Prevention and control of forest fires is handled through a cooperative effort between town/city fire organizations and the State Forest Fire Service.

Since 1903, when the first forest fire laws were passed by our Legislature, the State Forester has appointed someone in each municipality as a Forest Fire Warden and charged him with the responsibility of forest fire prevention and control within his town/city. This person may ask the State Forester to appoint as many Deputy Forest Fire Wardens as may be necessary to efficiently carry out his charge.

The State Forester has divided the State into ten forest fire districts with a full time District Forest Fire Chief in each district. The State organization is charged with assisting the municipal forest fire organization in any way possible.

State personnel conduct fire training schools, assist with forest fire suppression, fire-cause investigation, prosecution of fire law violators and forest fire prevention programs. Forest fire suppression equipment is purchased through State bulk purchasing ability and sold to local forest fire organizations at one-half cost. Excess military property is obtained and turned over to town/city fire departments at no cost to local departments for conversion into fire suppression units. This cooperative arrangement between State and municipality has resulted in one of the best forest fire records in the United States with less than one-half acre of woodland burned in each fire reported.

### MARCH 10, 1979

Freedom's annual school district meeting was opened at 7 p.m. by the Moderator, Richard Phillips. He read the school warrant in entirety.

Brenda Presby reported for the committee appointed to study the needs of the Freedom School. Their recommendation was to replace the two small oil tanks with a larger tank (2,000 gallon capacity) and have it put underground, thus leaving the room presently being used for the oil tanks, to be renovated for extra storage space or small area for small classes. Estimated cost of these recommendations would be \$2,500.00. Motion was made by Brenda Presby to raise the budgeted amount for maintenance of plant from \$1,000.00 to \$3,500.00 which would take care of the recommendations of the Committee. Motion seconded by Leslie Babb. Voted YES.

Under ARTICLE No. 3 by Barbara Welch - I would like to make the Townspeople aware of a law that states when there is a meeting of a majority of the School Board and the Superintendent or his designee, to discuss School business then such meeting becomes open to the public, and a notice shall be posted twenty-four hours in advance. And that, according to RSA 91, cannot circumvent the law by saying it's a social gathering or a private meeting.

### SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT by Robert B. Kautz and David Stickney

It is with great pleasure that we provide this report of the past year's activities. Again, as in past years, the chief endeavor of your school personnel has been serving children better, educationally.

Providing adequate facilities for the educational program continued to be one of the major undertakings. The construction at the A. Crosby Kennett High School, which provided new junior high classrooms, gymnasium and music facilities, is essentially completed. Some problems dealing with heating and hardware are still being corrected as are small details that have not been completed. The vocational addition is progressing and has an anticipated completion date of June, 1980. With all this construction completed, the high school facility should be adequate enough to meet the varied needs of today's students and also be of benefit to the entire community.

Construction to provide additions to the Madison Elementary School and the Josiah Bartlett Elementary School has begun. In Madison a two-room addition will be provided. The Bartlett addition involves renovations to the existing structure to make it accessible for the handicapped, meet public safety requirements, and provide improved facilities. Also, a major addition for a multi-purpose room, health office and two classrooms will be built. Madison voters will consider a proposal for another addition, a multi-purpose room, at the annual school district meeting. As well as these larger projects, building and renovations occurred in other schools to provide adequate facilities for current educational programs as well as those being developed.

The Language Arts and Mathematics Curriculum Committees are continuing their review and the implementation of new curriculum guides. Curriculum committees in the areas of science and social studies have been formed. These committees, comprised of teachers from throughout the School Administrative Unit, are a fine example of the dedication and care that the professional teachers have for the continuing improvement of educational opportunities for our children.

In addition to the curriculum committees, the Accountability Committee continues its important task. Essential Student Outcomes and Performance Indicators have been developed and accepted. This committee of teachers, school board members and community members is now working on testing procedures and is developing the plan by which the information gathered can be best used to cause improvements in our school program.

The administration, with the approval of the Conway School Board, has just launched a year-long effort to develop long-range plans. These plans will be for the purpose of changing our school system into one that is a child-centered service delivery system rather than one which is institutional-centered. This planning will necessitate a great deal of involvement on the part of the community as well as the staff and administration to arrive at a program that will more fully meet the needs of the school and community. It is anticipated that our effort will create the goals we want education to achieve rather than have them mandated to us.

As our fourth year of working in the communities of School Administrative Unit No. 9 draws to a close, we would like to thank everyone for the cooperation and support our schools have received. We will continue to do all we can to carry out the wishes of the community in providing its educational program to all children. We need your interest and viewpoints because for each child to get the maximum benefit from his/her education the assistance and cooperation of the home and community is necessary.

We are now happy to provide a more detailed report from the Director of Special Education and the Principal of your school.

### SPECIAL EDUCATION DIRECTOR'S REPORT

### by Lawrence L. Spencer

The 1979-80 school year has been one of much activity in the area of special education. There are presently 215 identified educationally handicapped students within SAU No. 9 being served through a variety of special education programs. The great majority of these children are in resource room programs which offer special individualized learning experiences, as well as provide the opportunity to participate in the educational "mainstream" - the regular classroom. In addition to the resource rooms, each school also offers speech and language therapy and individual evaluation and consultation services with the school psychologist.

Project Mainstream, a regional program for moderately mentally handicapped children, which is hosted by the Conway School District, has been moved to the John Fuller School. The children participating in this program come from all over the region; and thanks to the fine efforts of all involved, the children have become an integral part of the school. Several handicapped pre-school children have also been identified and are being provided with appropriate special education services under the supervision of the pre-school teacher/coordinator.

The parents of special needs children are encouraged to and have actively been involved in planning the individual special education programs for their child. The school boards and communities continue to be very responsive to the needs of handicapped children. This support at both levels should be commended, for the state and federal regulations regarding the special education identification and placement process can be quite confusing.

### FREEDOM ELEMENTARY SCHOOL PRINCIPAL'S REPORT by Dorothy S. Grubbs

After the tragic, untimely death of Mr. Ranco last February, Dorothy Grubbs was asked to fill the vacancy. It was a difficult half year for the children losing a loved teacher and friend and having to cope with a new and strange adult. However, both children and staff worked with a will to overcome this traumatic time, and the school year ended with positive feelings and a sense of a difficult job well done. Mr. Ranco was sorely missed, but his students honored his memory through their scholarship and effort.

September brought the start of a new year with 45 children in the school. Mrs. Behr's room welcomed 6 new first graders for a total of 20 students downstairs. Upstairs Mrs. Grubbs' class started off with 25 students. However, between September and Christmas we welcomed 2 additional students upstairs, while one third grader left us. There were also some staff changes. Mrs. Cynthia Gibson, our new tutor / aide, aside from her educational abilities, brought us musical talents that all of us welcome. We also have new speech, physical education and art teachers as well as a new school nurse.

With the change of teachers our soccer team got off to a slow start but finished the season with great spirit and we look forward to a better season next year. The Parent-Teacher Club will help us once again this year with the ski program for surely the ground will not remain bare the whole season.

Special education, tutoring and speech screening and tests were done for those who need that extra edge along with parental conferencing and permissions and the programs are working well. Several mothers are also graciously donating time each week to assist both teachers during reading periods in giving individual attention to our youngsters. With the help of staff and our itinerant specialists, the school program is running smoothly and it is possible to work closely with each child. For the first six weeks of school, one of our students was unable to attend classes. A home-tutor program was set up for him and when he returned to the classroom, he was "right on target" with the rest of his classmates.

Not in the school program but as an extra-curricular activity, Mrs. Fickett and Mrs. Gibson are offering music lessons after school to our children if their parents wish it. The program has been well received and we are pleased with it.

The physical plant has received a new large oil storage tank buried outside, allowing more space in our storeroom. This area has been rebuilt with a floor and insulated outer wall, a space much needed. We are working hard to maintain fuel economy in accordance with regulations, and the children themselves are actively involved in the process, keeping daily room temperature charts and even monitoring our electrical meter consumption. The warm fall and early winter have helped.

The staff, school board and school district are working hard to bring good solid programs to the children of Freedom and take pride in the students' accomplishments both here and when they go on to the next levels of education.
