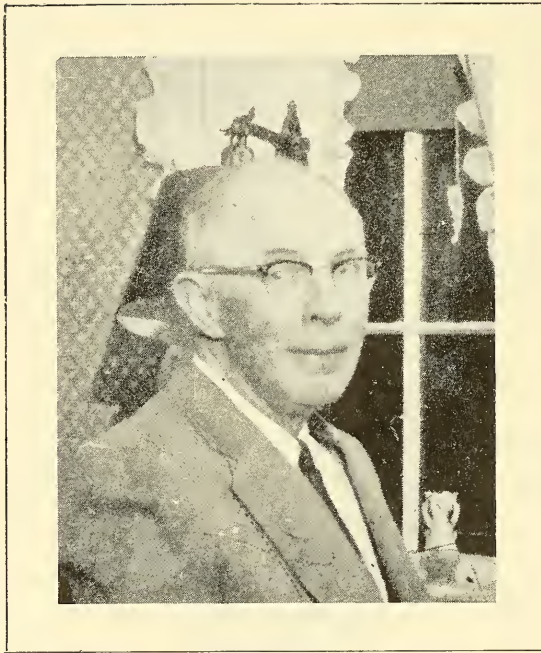

NOTICES

INVENTORIES are mandatory. They must be filed with the Selectmen on or before April 1st. Forms are distributed by mail. Please note that a description of the property which will enable the assessing officials to locate and identify each parcel is necessary. A phrase such as "Same as last year" or "no change" is not sufficient.

VETERANS should understand that it is their responsibility to request forms for tax exemption, and that these must be in the hands of the Selectmen by April 15th, if they are to receive consideration.

THE SELECTMEN will meet in their office in the Old High School on the first Saturday of each month at 7:30 P.M. and also on the third Wednesday of each month at 7:30 P.M.

THE PLANNING BOARD — Regular meeting is the third Monday of every month at 8 P.M.

TOWN WARRANT
THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Hampstead in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the gymnasium in said Hampstead on Tuesday, the tenth day of March, next at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To choose all necessary School District Officers for the year ensuing.
3. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

4. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money for the use of the town in anticipation of taxes.
5. To hear reports of Auditors and Committees and to act thereon.

6. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any Real Estate by public sale acquired by the town through Tax Collector's deeds.

7. To see if the town will vote to accept an ordinance that would require a permit from the chief of police for any on-the-street concessions.

By the Executive Board — Fire Department.

8. To see if the town will vote to request the assistance of the State Tax Commission in appraising all lands and buildings in Hampstead and appropriate the sum of Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000.00) for payment thereof; fifty percent of this sum to be raised in 1970 and the balance of such appraisal expense to be raised after completion of the work.

By petition.

9. To see if the town will vote to elect three assessors at the 1971 Town Meeting — one to serve until 1972, one to serve until 1973 and one to serve until 1974. This article to require the election of one assessor each year from 1972 on. The salary will not exceed \$600.00 per person per year.

10. To see if the town will vote to reimburse Miss Jean Goyetch, of Emerson Avenue for the cost of replacement of a well and piping occasioned by damage resulting from the maintenance of Emerson Avenue by the Town Highway Department. (Cost to be between \$1,500 and \$4,000)

By petition.

11. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to dissolve the Committee known as the Business Improvement Committee as established by a vote of the Town Meeting in 1964, and to appoint a committee known as the Industrial Development Commission in its place.

12. To see if the town will allow the construction of a building containing seven apartments on land owned by Lewis Builders in East Hampstead.

13. To see if the town will vote to accept State Aid Construction of Class V roads and raise and appropriate or set aside for said purpose the sum of \$399.81. State's Share — \$2,665.37

14. To see if the town will vote to establish a capital reserve fund as provided in Chapter 35 of Revised Statutes Annotated and vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Thousand Dollars. (\$5,000.00) for the future purchase of a fire truck for the town of Hampstead.

15. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Tax Collector to appoint a deputy Tax Collector, with the approval of the Selectmen, who shall be sworn, have the powers of Collector, may be removed at the pleasure of the Collector, and before entering upon the duties of his office, give bond, as provided in RSA 41.38.

16. To see if the town will vote to withdraw the sum of \$2,000.00 plus interest to date, from the Capital Reserve Fund No. 5573 in the Concord Savings Bank and apply the same to the Town general fund.

17. To see if the town will vote to construct a salt shed on town property, near the Town Dump, under the direction of the Road Agent, at a cost not to exceed \$3500.00

18. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Thirteen Hundred Dollars (\$1300.00) for repairs and equipment at the library.

19. To see if the town will vote to accept the donation of Twelve Hundred Dollars (\$1200.00) made to the town by Cohen Foundation Camps, Inc.

REPORT OF THE POLICE DEPARTMENT

As Chief of the Police Department, I am pleased to submit my annual report to the people of the Town of Hampstead.

The police department investigated a total of 81 auto accidents during 1969 and only a limited number of serious injuries occurred requiring hospitalization.

Three autos were reported stolen during the year and have not been recovered. The citizens are urged to take whatever action necessary to protect their property from Theft. During this time of life when the national average of recovered stolen property averages only a scant 10-15 percent, one doesn't have to look far to see the ever present advantage of protecting their property.

Our combination cruiser/ambulance has very successfully fulfilled its purposes. It has relieved a serious burden on the use of privately owned motor vehicles and on numerous occasions has been used as an ambulance. It is again reiterated that the facilities of the cruiser both as a police vehicle and as an ambulance are ready for immediate use.

It is with sadness that because of ever increasing business commitments, I am forced to refrain from seeking reelection for the Position of Chief of Police. After twelve years as the chief, it will certainly take time to return to the role of an ordinary citizen. I have appreciated the cooperation between this office and a majority of the towns residents. To the other small percentage it is with regret that our relations couldn't have been better. In this time of a permissive society where "The Sky is the Limit", I feel this department has had a better than average standing. To this small percentage to whom I refer, I'd advise them to search their minds and ask themselves what they are doing to make this great country of ours a better place in which to live.

To the officers who have worked for me and with me during the past period of time, you have fulfilled a role that is

extremely difficult. Sincerely thanks is extended to the Selectmen and other town officers for their cooperation.

To my family whom have maintained that status during a period of time that my role of a father was questioned because of my absence nights, days and week-ends I cannot relive this period but I can attempt to improve their future.

REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND DISTRICT CHIEF

Less fortunate than our northern towns, we had too many fires. Carelessness in burning trash and discarding smoking material and children playing with fire caused most of the fires. Your Forest Fire Warden's job would be easier if everyone understood the State laws that govern the kindling of outdoor fires. A synopsis of these laws follow:

FIRE PERMIT

A fire permit is needed for all outdoor fires in or near woodland anytime the ground is not covered with snow. This includes household waste burning, even if in an incinerator, grass burning, garden trash as well as brush burning. Such burning is restricted by regulation to be prior to 9:00 a.m. and after 5:00 p.m.

EXCEPTIONS

Commercial or Industrial burning is allowed anytime under normal conditions with permission of the District Chief and a permit from the Fire Warden.

Camp or cooking fires are allowed on your own property with permission of the Fire Warden. On another's property with written permission of the landowner and permission of the Fire Warden. The Warden can forbid such fires if in a hazardous area. Permits for cooking fires in the White Mountain National Forest can be obtained from the Laconia Office or at the Ranger Stations. Permits are not required in public camp or picnic grounds where fireplaces have been built for this purpose.

PENALTIES

1. For kindling a fire without a permit. Maximum of \$200.00 fine; or imprisonment for not more than 60 days.
2. For kindling a fire by any means wilfully or recklessly that shall endanger woodlands the maximum fine is \$500.00 or one year's imprisonment.
3. For failure to totally extinguish a camp or cooking fire before leaving it the same penalties as in (1) above.
4. For dropping inflammable material in or near woodland, maximum fine is \$25.00.

Fire prevention is a personal matter and a good habit. Keep our town free from smokes in 1970.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

The school year 1969-70 will be listed as a significant one in the history of the School District of Hampstead, New Hampshire.

It has been a year thus far of serious "stock-taking" as evidenced by the reams of statistics particularly concerning growth and the effect that it has and will continue to have on this school system.

Communities in the southeast section of our state are quickly coming to the realization that there is a growth phenomenon in the northeast United States and its effect is becoming more personally felt in each individual community. Hampstead is no exception, though the growth here has by no means achieved explosive proportions. But because the growth is there and it just won't go away in the foreseeable future, plans must be undertaken to cope with it.

For school men, population growth means more children and the corresponding need for more classrooms, teachers, supplies and equipment. All of this means more dollars. Hopefully, the need for added dollars would be balanced by an increase in tax base and economic capability. Where growth has been anticipated and properly provided for, a community is able to sustain itself quite nicely as it expands. Part of planned growth, of course, is providing good schools, and this is what the stock-taking has been all about.

Looking back to milestones, one notes that a lack of members meant the closing of a high school to this community, a source of disappointment to many. Looking ahead, new hope is felt when increased numbers may well mean a return to "owning-our-own-high school".

Current stock taking has recognized this and in making provisions for future school housing, has considered the very real

possibility of a high school for Hampstead, possibly in the late 70's. Whatever may develop, Hampstead must find a means of educating its high school youth by 1978, at which time it has been forewarned, Pinkerton Academy will no longer accept Hampstead pupils.

An early step to problem solving will be taken by the community when it is asked at the 1970 annual meeting to provide a so-called "middle school" for the community. A middle school is not a new concept. It merely separates a group of grades of middle-school aged children at the elementary level and from their older counterparts at the senior high school level. More often than not, a middle school acts as a "buffer" to solve local school housing problems. The middle school often houses children as low as the grade 5 level and as high as the grade 9 level, as conditions may demand. (In larger grade 7-12 schools, a form of physical separation is necessary so that different approaches may be used in the teaching of early adolescents as compared to the teaching of the older senior high school pupils.) Such separation would be necessary if Hampstead were to eventually have a grade 7-12 school.

It is logical therefore that the approach in beginning a middle school to be followed, hopefully, with an extension of a high school, would best meet the growth needs of Hampstead.

At the lower age end of the education spectrum we note that the Central School offers a highly acceptable elementary program with reasonable class loads for a professionally competent faculty. It is also interesting to note that recent requirements for elementary schools as approved by the State Board of Education and which must be in effect in all New Hampshire elementary schools by 1972, should be no particular problem for Hampstead. This is an indication that here is a community which has recognized and demanded good programs in the past and in the best traditions of "local-control" does not need to be legislated into action. This is not to say that our elementary programs do not face problems. They do! We are already using rooms in an inadequate building, the old high school. Part of the over-all

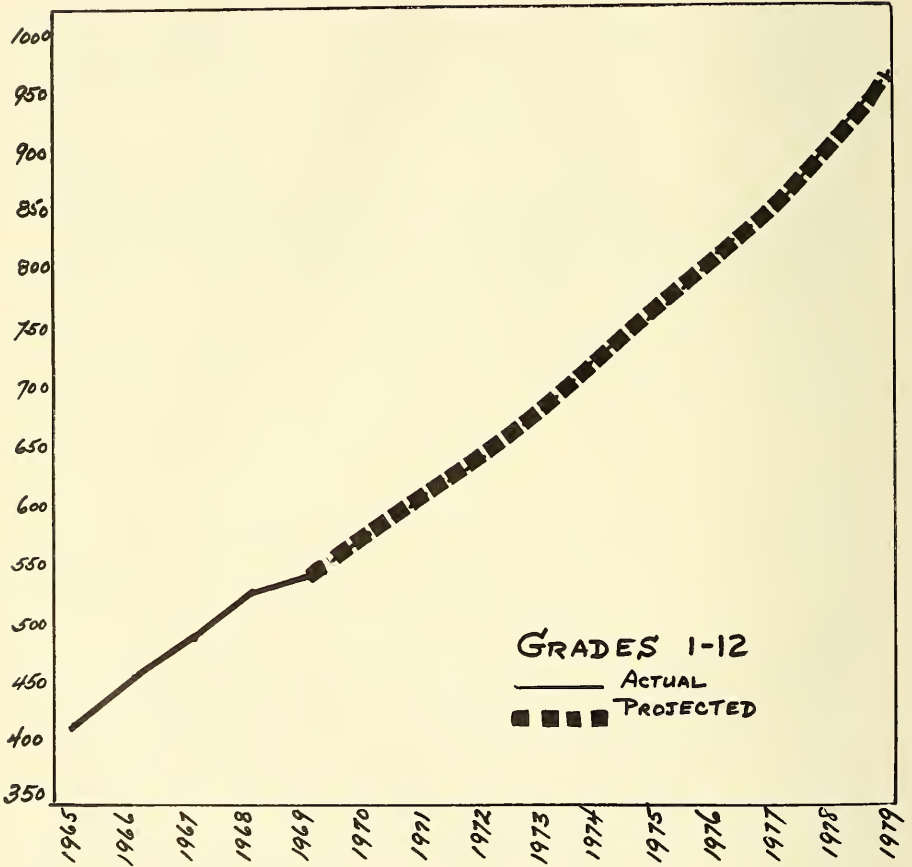
problem facing the community is the way the growth is centered in the elementary school. Many don't recognize, with all of the discussions concerning the provision of a middle school program, that several elementary problems will be solved by such construction.

It is significant that more than 40 Hampstead citizens participated in some area of planning of the proposed middle school. From the committees, the board received several recommendations offering many "pluses"; decisions, tempered by the reality of borrowing limitation, were made.

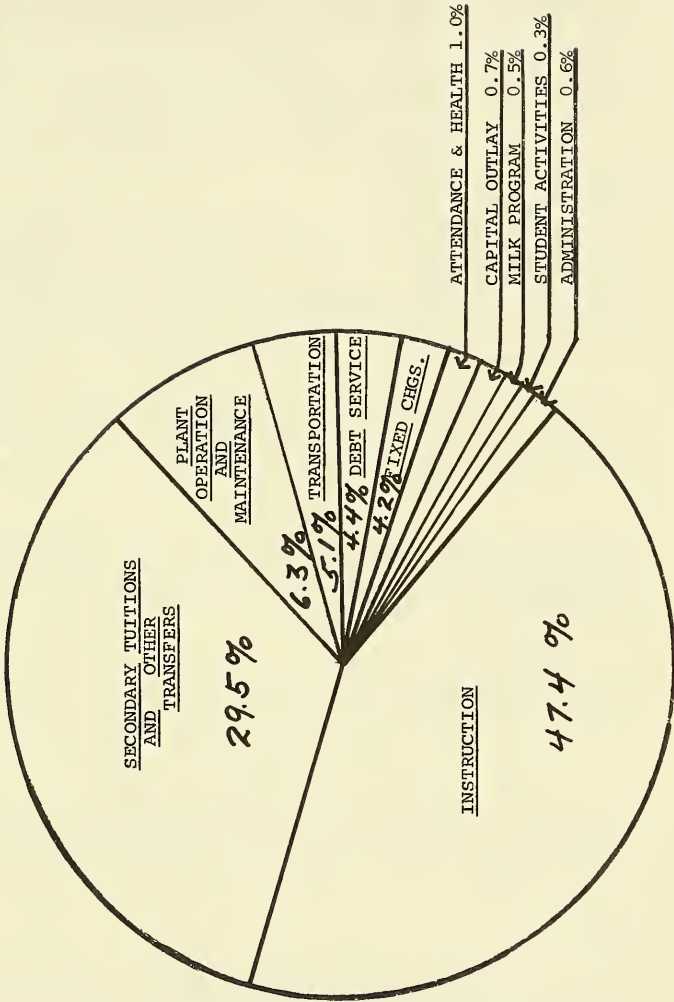

REPORT OF THE PRINCIPAL

To the School Board, Superintendent of Schools, and citizens of Hampstead:

As in the past this annual report will contain reports of the following special service personnel: Nurse-Teacher, Music Supervisors, Reading Coordinator, Guidance Counselor, and Speech Therapist.

School opened on September 3, 1969, with a total enrollment of 410 pupils, an increase of 19 pupils over last year's opening day figure.

Continued growth in enrollment figures necessitated additional housing. As a result, the former high school building was renovated to accommodate two primary classes.

Curriculum committees continued to function in the areas of Mathematics and English-Language Arts. A new mathematics program was introduced in some of the primary grade classes.

A new program was developed in the junior high. On one morning each week, the regular schedule was replaced by an expanded program of activities. The junior high teaching staff, other teachers, and volunteers from the community served as instructors.

The program was completely elective for the pupils. They could select courses which were in their areas of interest.

Among the courses offered were: Art, basic woodworking, home economics (sewing), dramatics, science research and experimentation, school newspaper - journalism, Greek-Roman culture, liquid embroidery, conversational French, radio-TV production, child-care, and nutrition and meal planning.

I would like to extend a word of thanks to members of the school staff for their planning and participation in the program, including Miss Frances Hoyt, Mrs. Sandra Emerson, Mrs. Dorothy Scott, Miss Linda Grimard, Mrs. Dorothy Monahan, Mr. Robert Wilmot, Mr. Bernard Bartnicki, and Mr. Robert Cortese.

In addition, special appreciation is extended to the following citizens for their generous donation of time and effort and without whom the program could not have materialized: Mrs. Victoria Piehl, Mrs. Arlene White, Mrs. Cynthia Diffin, Mrs. Mary Vail, Miss Selma Bedore, Mrs. Ruth Seely, Mrs. Betty Haggett, Mrs. Danna White, Mr. Walter Clark, and Mr. Arthur Bushway.

A full-time guidance counselor was added to the staff. A detailed report from the counselor is included in this report.

Graduation exercises for the class of 1969 were held at the Congregational Church on June 19. Mr. Stanley W. Ross, Jr., School Board Chairman, presented diplomas to thirty-five graduates. Mr. Gordon B. Allan, Superintendent of Schools, was the featured speaker.

Open house was held during the week of November 10-14 in observance of American Education Week.

The school athletic program was comprised of soccer, baseball, and basketball for boys, and basketball and softball for girls.

The annual Book Fair was held under the sponsorship and supervision of the PTA. Mrs. Lorraine Ellis and Mrs. Marilyn Seckendorf organized and conducted the program. Sincere appreciation is extended to these parents for a job well done.

The following standardized tests were administered during the year: Stanford Achievement Tests, grades 2-8; Murphy-Durrell Readiness Test, grade one; Otis-Lennon Mental Ability Test, grades 2-4-6. In addition, basal reading tests and a variety of individual diagnostic and grade placement tests were administered.

The annual New England Reading Conference was held in Manchester, New Hampshire. Mrs. Carolyn Currier, Mrs. Nancy Taylor, and Mr. Richard Grey attended from the Central School.

Transportation was provided by the Timberlane Transportation Company. Milk was purchased from Turner's Dairy, Salem, New Hampshire, and the Whiting Milk Company, Portsmouth, New Hampshire.

Physical examinations were administered by Dr. Raymond E. Moore and Dr. William R. Hart; assisted by Mrs. Dorothy Scott, R.N., school nurse-teacher and several volunteers.

Educational field trips were held for all grades. These trips were coordinated to relate to an area of study being conducted within the classrooms.

The staff of the Central School included the following positions: eighteen classroom teachers, two reading supervisors, nurse-teacher, three music supervisors, guidance counselor, speech therapist, librarian, supervising principal, secretary, three teacher aides, and two custodians.

Funds for two of the teacher aide positions were provided by a federal grant under Title I of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965.

Reports of special service personnel follow:

READING COORDINATOR

Mrs. Charlotte T. Zimmer

During the past year, the remedial reading program has functioned on a part-time basis, with just one teacher, until September when a second staff member was added. With such a tight schedule, it seemed wise to concentrate most of the remedial effort in the lower grades; the second semester of grade one; grade two and grade three. In this way we hoped to give preventative maintenance in these grades before the real remedial

problems, later, became too overwhelming. Our reading experts, today, tell us that these younger children "have not had time to become psychologically crippled, bored, or antagonistic to the reading task." They are eager to learn and can be helped within a short span of time. It is like repairing the dike before it leaks.

For the greater part of the year, I have taught six remedial reading groups every morning, every day. I was able to confer, frequently, with homeroom teachers of grades 4-6 to give them help for children in need of various reading skills. These helps included Readers Digest Skill Builders, Merrill Skilltexts, and Conquests in Reading. Additional skills lessons were planned for these teachers, who saw to it that they were taught, reviewed, and learned. This cooperation was greatly appreciated. The majority of the pupils in these grades who were from six months to one year behind, were brought up to grade level.

Visits were made to every classroom about every six weeks. This helped me to see how the remedial pupils reacted in a classroom situation.

In the regular remedial classes in the remedial reading room, the same vocabulary was used as that of the child's reading group. This coordination prevented his being in the awkward position of straddling two basal series at the same time.

Since the children come to the remedial reading room for specific instruction, an informal test is given when the teaching lessons are completed. The children who pass are released, to make way for more needy ones.

During the year I administer formal reading tests for grade placement; for diagnostic help; and for measuring intelligence levels. The tests that were given are:

All of the children in the two third grades took part in an Individualized Reading Program. The results were excellent and the program created a desire to read in many of them. The same program was initiated in both fourth grades. We hope to do more with it, next year.

Grades 1-6 had "SRA Reading for Understanding" kits. They were in use constantly and helped to raise the reading standards. The sixth grades used the SRA Pilot Library, for greater comprehension.

Every morning in every room, the homeroom teacher presents a ten minute phonics lesson to the group as a whole.

At the end of the school year there was a notable rise in the Basal Reading Tests results. We feel as though we have had a very successful year.

I am very grateful to Mr. Grey for his help and understanding; and to all of the teachers for their splendid cooperation.

NURSE-TEACHER,
Mrs. Dorothy Scott, R.N.

I am presenting herewith my fourth annual report as school nurse in Hampstead.

The goal of health now . . . calls for more than the cure or alleviation of disease. It calls for even more than the prevention of disease. Rather, it looks beyond, to strive for the maximum physical, mental and social efficiency for the individual, for his family and for the community.

The school health program occupies an important place in the total educational effort of schools. The school meets this responsibility by making available to all students, experiences that will result in their having sound health knowledge, attitudes and skills.

The following school health services were provided in the past year:

- 1) Medical examinations on all pupils in grades 1-4-7, pupils new to the school, and any pupil participating in inter-scholastic sports, were done by the school physicians, Drs. Moore and Hart.
- 2) Screening tests for vision and hearing were done on all pupils in grades 1-2-4-6-8, pupils new to the school, and any pupil referred by parent, physician, or classroom teacher.
- 3) For an appraisal of physical growth, all pupils were weighed and measured.
- 4) Pupils of grade five and all new students above that grade were tested for color perception.
- 5) All first grade pupils were offered, and with permission, received a Heaf skin test for tuberculosis.
- 6) A clinic to administer vaccine against German measles will be held for all first graders and kindergarten children this year.
- 7) Pre-school registration was held in May. The guidance counselor, speech therapist, and dental hygienist were in attendance to see the children and discuss any problems with the parents.
- 8) Referrals to clinics and the Mental Health Association for students requiring this service.

The following Health Education Programs were held: Safety, Dental Care, Nutrition, Personal Hygiene, Menstruation, Smoking, Alcohol and Drugs, First Aid, and Baby Sitting Guides.

I wish to thank all the parents and friends of the Hampstead Central School for the cooperation and assistance they gave me this past year.

MUSIC SUPERVISOR
Mrs. Alexandra Pearson

The music program for grades 1-2-3 and junior high chorus has proceeded as follows:

Grade One — These children have become acquainted with several aspects of rhythm, singing, and harmony. They have also begun to learn the elements of basic notation.

Grade Two — The program here has been to further develop the musical skills learned in the first grade and increase their knowledge of musical notation.

Grade Three — Again further development of previous skills is the aim here. Also, these children have begun work with flutophones to develop sight reading, music reading, and develop the discipline necessary for instrumental practice many of them will need in the year following when they take up an instrument.

Junior High Chorus — It has been my sole aim here to develop the choral singing skills that these children should have received previously. We have worked with two and three part music. As of now, their ability to sing three part music is in the developmental stage of learning. It is my aim by the end of the year to have these children comfortably singing in three parts so that when most of them reach high school, they may take greater pleasure, have a better understanding of, and feel real accomplishment in the four part choral music they will encounter.

I have also tried to instill in the minds of the children that music is something that must be learned and worked at, as is necessary with their other subjects.

MUSIC SUPERVISOR

Mr. Julius Kostick

The music program was expanded to two and one-half days per week. The fourth and fifth grades began this year with the bottle band which included notation, composing music for the bottle band, and the selection of various children to conduct the group. This gave the pupils a chance not only to perform, but an opportunity to create their own compositions.

The sixth grades studied the string family in its entirety, not only from recordings but from actual demonstration of instruments brought in by myself and pupils.

Special attention was given to the violin since this paved the way to an understanding of string music, which was followed by the life and works of famous composers.

All children were given music aptitude tests from grades four through six. Results were sent home for parents to use as a basis of deciding whether or not the child should be encouraged to participate in the instrumental program. A very substantial increase in the number of children in grades four through eight participating in the band program followed.

The band program increased to 72 pupils this year. With the large number of trumpets and clarinets, it became necessary to balance the sound by introducing some of the bass clef instruments. Two trombones were purchased in order to create an interest on the part of the other children to study these bass instruments. The band will participate in the school activities with a Spring Concert and Memorial Day program.

The fifth and sixth grades have participated in the Christmas program and will be heard again before the close of the school year.

All pupils from grades four through six will also study and review the structure of music, musical pitch and rhythms, and

their relationship to vocal and instrumental music. This will be done by following theory with actual performance through singing and instrumental groups.

COUNSELOR

Mr. Raymond N. Gradual

Elementary school counseling was introduced for the first time to Hampstead Central School in the fall of 1969. Counseling at this level is a special service that the State Department of Education hopes to have in all schools in the near future. In this respect, Hampstead's program illustrates its progressiveness.

In general, the objective of counseling is to provide an opportunity for children to discuss themselves. The hope is that when a child verbalizes his feelings he may be better able to understand himself and thus be better able to make decisions relating to his environment. It is also the objective of the counseling service to provide assistance to teachers and parents so that they may better understand young children and adolescents.

The counseling process itself is a dynamic one. Each child is different and thus a variety of approaches must be used in order to relate to each one. The counseling program at Hampstead is primarily a volunteer one, with varied sessions. With some children, one or two sessions may be sufficient, but with others, it may be of indefinite duration.

Statistically, the counseling program has interviewed the following number of students: Grade 1 - 17; Grade 2 - 6; Grade 3 - 18; Grade 4 - 10; Grade 5 - 12; Grade 6 - 10; Grade 7 - 8; Grade 8 - 28; a total of 109 students.

The high number of eighth graders is due to the interest in high school programs and the counseling involved in preparation for course selection. There have also been several inquiries about preparatory school for eighth grade boys. The counseling program has been fortunate to have the Director of Admissions from Kimball Union Academy, Meriden, New Hampshire, and the

Headmaster from Brewster Academy, Wolfboro, New Hampshire at Hampstead to discuss prep schools with these interested boys.

It is also the objective of the counseling program to make the older students aware of the world of work. Movies have been obtained dealing with occupations. The counseling program has been in contact with Haverhill Trade School about future admissions. At this writing, the chances of new admissions from Hampstead are slight because of Haverhill's own needs.

The counseling program has benefitted from involvement in a series of discussions instituted by the Salem Mental Health Clinic called Dialogue. This program is valuable because it gives Hampstead an awareness of what the surrounding areas are doing to cope with problems.

It is hoped that the year's experience will provide an impetus for a more fruitful program in the years to come.

SPEECH THERAPIST

Mr. Vincent Marchand

This is my third annual report as speech therapist at Hampstead Central School. A speech screening test was given this fall to the children new to the Central School and all children enrolled in the second grade. The results of the screening were mailed to the parents.

The basic aim of the speech program is to help all children with speech defects to correct their speech through individual or group speech sessions. Currently, the total enrollment is fifteen. Various speech problems are classified as articulation, stuttering, delayed speech, and emotional problems.

The program is only helpful to the child provided that he regularly attends the classes, and he does the speech assignments nightly. Parent conferences are needed at times to reinforce the goals of the program for the child.

The therapist uses the nurse's office for speech classes as was done last year.

The equipment used in the program includes: tape recorder, record player, workbooks, and various arts and crafts materials. The students obtain pictures for notebooks from discarded magazines.

I would like to thank the Superintendent, Mr. Grey, the school nurse, and teaching staff here at the Central School for their continued support of the speech program.
