## REPORT OF THE SELECTMEN AND TOWN MANAGER

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The financial position of the town for the fiscal year 1959 is very sound. There was a net budget surplus of \$33,062.51, but this surplus includes accounts receivable. As of December 31, 1959 there was no cash surplus.

This year the budget is about 3% more than in 1959. Increased costs of operation and the demand for more services do not seem to cease. Serious consideration is being given to the developing of two budgets for 1961. One would be an economy budget which would maintain the physical property of the town in first class condition, but cut services. The other would be a budget based on retaining present services.

It is the Manager's opinion that the responsibility for the cost of town government must rest directly upon the shoulders of the public at town meeting. The Selectmen, Manager, and department heads are available to present technical data and estimates of costs, but the voters should make the final decision as to whether the services are worth the increased taxes.

PROCEEDINGS OF THE ANNUAL TOWN MEETING  
MARCH 10, 1959

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The Annual Town Meeting, March 10, 1959 was held at the Hampton Academy Junior High School Auditorium. The meeting was opened by Moderator Edward S. Seavey Jr. at 10:00 A. M.

Selectman Donald A. Ring moved that the Polls be closed at 6 P. M. Following objection by Wilfred Cunningham the motion was withdrawn, and Mr. Ring made the motion that the Polls remain open until 8 P. M.

Seconded, and So Voted.

Rev. Dwight Blakeslee, Vicar of Trinity Episcopal Church, offered Prayer.

The Moderator requested that visitors sit at the side of the Auditorium in seats designated, and also asked that no demonstrations be made during the meeting.

A "motion to reconsider" will be accepted only immediately after a vote, and **before** any other business has been transacted.

Selectman Lawrence C. Hackett moved that the reading of the entire warrant be waived as it had been published according to law. Seconded. So Voted.

Town Manager John P. Batchelder said that if the

Recommended Budget was voted the increase in Tax Rate would be approximately \$4.40.

Permission was granted for Mr. Herman Cohen, Attorney working with the Marsh Reclamation Committee to speak at this time, as he could not remain at Town Meeting. Mr. Cohen has been drafting legislation to make possible the "Town of Hampton Marsh Reclamation Authority." This would consist of five members chosen by the Selectmen. They would supervise and direct the reclamation of the Marsh Area within specified boundaries, with the aid of engineers. The Planning Board will be consulted, and the Selectmen will approve or disapprove the final plan submitted.

The Selectmen, Planning Board and Authority will then work to acquire property, do necessary work to plan streets, water-ways, parking and recreational areas.

Owners of property in this section will have the opportunity to re-acquire land before anyone else. The Function of the Authority will be to Aid Private Enterprise.

1. Land must be acquired.
2. Land disposed of under restrictions of Zoning and sound development practise.

Formula :

1. Fairness will be insured by giving preference for acquisition of land to former owners after facilities have been installed. This would be in a proportionately equal amount to that previously owned.
2. Preference will next be given to Hampton Town's people at a suitable price.  
(Residential property not to be leased or rented)

3. Residents of the State of New Hampshire.
4. General Public.

Provision: An owner may develop his own property under the terms of the Authority, but it must be in accordance with the over-all plan.

5. The Authority makes provision for the mechanics of development such as utilities, streets, water, and acquisition of land. Bonds would be issued to finance the project and the Authority would be self-sustaining.

Mr. Robert Bridle asked if these bonds would affect the borrowing power of the Town of Hampton and was assured that they would not.

Miss Ruth Stimson asked if any portion of the proposed area was to be used as a Wild Life Preserve, and thought that the Town should go on record as favoring such a plan.

Mr. Hubbard stated that the proposed plans were only a beginning and it should not be assumed that this could not be a part of the Authority plan.

Mr. Joiner asked if there is any plan to present provisions to the Town for approval. Answer: Public hearing required.

## ARTICLES 1 AND 2 ON AUSTRALIAN BALLOT

### ARTICLE 3

#### BUDGET

Mr. Carl Lougee, Chairman of the Municipal Budget Committee gave the following report:

To The Hampton Town Meeting:

The gross budget recommended by the Municipal Budget Committee for the ensuing year is \$501,572.00. This is \$18,942.00 more than the 1958 approved budget. This results in a figure of \$391,917.79 to be raised by property taxes.

The Budget Committee held three Executive Sessions and two Public Hearings in preparing its recommendations for this Town Budget. The completed budget has been published in the Hampton Union as well as the Hampton Town Report, and posted as required by law.

Articles No. 16 and No. 17 concern an appropriation of money and these two articles have been recommended by the Budget Committee and the amounts are included in the gross budget total mentioned above.

If you will kindly turn to page 36 of the Town Report I shall briefly explain each item in the third column as recommended by the Budget Committee.

We would like to express at this time our appreciation for the complete cooperation that we have had from the Board of Selectmen, Town Manager and Department Heads during the preparation of this budget.

In reply to a question from Mrs. Margaret Wingate as to location of Sewer systems, Town Mgr. John Batchelder said that the Proposed installation of Sewer systems were Leavitt Road, Ann's Lane across to Blake Lane, and Philbrook Terrace. The amount of money requested of the Budget Committee is to cover these three projects. He also said there was to be an increase in prices at the Comfort Station.

Mr. Douglass Hunter made the motion that the sum of \$487,572.00 be raised and appropriated for Town purposes. Seconded. So Voted.

(Note: This amount is recommended budget less \$2500. for Article 16, and \$11,500. for Article 17 which will be voted upon later)

## ARTICLE 4

## BORROWING MONEY IN ANTICIPATION OF TAXES

Mr. Robert Bridle moved that Article 4 be accepted as read. Seconded. So voted.

## ARTICLE 5

## DISPOSAL OF REAL ESTATE BY TAX DEED

Mr. Franklin Brittan asked where lists of property to be sold for taxes were posted. Selectman Donald A. Ring replied — The Post Office, and the Town Offices.

Mr. Wilfred Cunningham made the motion that Article 5 be accepted as read. Seconded. So Voted.

## ARTICLE 6

## STORM DRAIN FOR ASHWORTH AVENUE

No money for purposes of this Article recommended by Budget Committee. Article indefinitely postponed.

## ARTICLE 7

## SANITARY SEWER SYSTEM FOR HOBSON AVE.

Money for this article not recommended by Budget Committee. Moved and seconded that this article be indefinitely postponed. So Voted.

Much discussion on the subject of Sewer extension. Mr. Bridle felt that the North Shore area should receive consideration as the sewage situation there has been very bad since 1946.

Town Manager Batchelder said that there were definite plans for public sewer extension to that locality. The line being built from the Main Plant to Winnacunnet Road is the beginning of the line to the North Shore area.

Mr. Douglass Hunter (Rep.) said that there is at present a Bill before the legislature to make available State funds for 'aid to pollution.' It may be possible in the near future to obtain as high as 20% of the cost of a Sanitary Sewer System to the North Shore. The Federal Government will aid to the amount of 30%.

It was explained that the sum of \$45,000.00 had been recommended by the Budget Committee for Sewer Projects but no special articles recommended.

Question was asked "If the meeting voted for an article with no money recommended, — could the money be found to carry on the project?"

Moderator stated that an indefinitely postponed article cannot be voted upon again whether the money could be found or not.

Mr. Kenneth Langley asked how an article should be handled if the money for the project is included in the Budget. Reply: Article should or could be adopted without any specific sum of money.

Representative Douglass Hunter explained the drainage problem on Ashworth Ave., particularly near the parking area, and made the motion that Article 6 be reconsidered. No second to motion.

Question: Why were the proposals contained in Articles that were indefinitely postponed—carried out in opposition to vote of Town Meeting.

Chairman Hackett said that the work on Ann's Lane did not cost as much as anticipated. Due to the low water table at lower end of Leavitt Road (which would make work there less expensive) the remainder of money was used in that section which badly needed sewer and drainage. The Selectmen do not do things arbitrarily but try to use money where it is most needed.

Mr. Raymond Garland said that he thought that money appropriated for a specific project should be used for that purpose or returned to lower the tax rate the following year.

Mr. Roland Paige inquired about the responsibility of the State in regard to drains and culverts at the side of State Roads. He said that either the State should

be forced to fix the drains or the Town should do the work.

Selectman Hackett said that the State took over the responsibility of hot-topping the road but not the drainage.

Town Manager Batchelder stated that there was \$3,000. in the Budget for drainage. \$2,000. for Tuck Field area and \$1,000. for Philbrook Terrace. Of the \$45,000.00 appropriated for Sewers it is planned to use \$16,000.00 for Leavitt Road, \$9,000.00 for Blake Lane, and \$5,000.00 for Philbrook Terrace.

Mr. Willard Emery expressed the opinion that the people who develop housing areas should build their own streets.

Mr. Raymond Garland asked why the new developments in Hampton received all the attention when the older streets needed storm drains.

Selectman Hackett said that the Town had recently obtained a street sweeper which was government surplus, and all Town equipment is stored in one place and properly cared for. The Town Manager and Selectmen should receive credit for trying to serve the town.

Moderator Seavey announced that refreshments were on sale in the lobby for the noon recess.

Motion was made and seconded to recess the meeting until 1:15 P. M. Seconded. So Voted.

The Meeting re-convened at 1:15 P. M.

#### ARTICLE 8 PARKING SPACE

Money for this article not recommended by Budget Committee.

Mrs. M. Wingate moved indefinite postponement of Article 8. Seconded. So Voted.

ARTICLE 9  
PUBLIC WORKS GARAGE

Mr. Donald Ring moved that Article 9 be indefinitely postponed. Seconded. So Voted.

ARTICLE X  
LAMSON LANE DRAINAGE

Money for this article not recommended by Budget Committee. Mrs. M. Wingate moved indefinite postponement of this article. Seconded. Voted.

ARTICLE 11  
FIRE ALARM BOX, ISLAND PATH

It was stated that the Fire Alarm Box asked for in this article could be installed under Fire Dept. appropriation, with no additional funds voted.

Mr. Kenneth Langley asked how this article should be treated, and then amended the Article to read: To see if the Town will vote to install a fire alarm box on Island Path at a centrally located position on Leavitt Island. Seconded. So voted. (This gave approval, but appropriated no additional money.)

ARTICLE 12  
SANITARY SEWER SYSTEM,  
PHILBROOK TERRACE

The money for this installation having been included in the \$45,000.00 for Sewers, Mr. Lawrence M. Douglas made the following motion:

On Petition of Lawrence M. Douglas and eighteen other legal voters of the Town of Hampton, to see if the town will install a sanitary sewer system on Philbrook Terrace. Seconded. So Voted.

ARTICLE 13  
STORM DRAIN  
PHILBROOK TERRACE

Mr. Lawrence Douglass made the following motion:



On petition of Lawrence M. Douglas and 17 other legal voters of the Town of Hampton to see if the town will vote for installation of a storm drainage system at Philbrook Terrace.

Mrs. Margaret Wingate made an amendment to limit the expenditure of money on this project to \$1,000.00.

(Note) \$3,000.00 allowed in Budget for drainage. \$1,000.00 Philbrook Terr. \$2,000.00 Tuck Field.

There was discussion about transferring funds from one Dept. to another when need arises.

Mr. W. Cunningham expressed the opinion that the Selectmen should have the confidence of the people and that they should be allowed a little latitude in handling the town money.

Judge Perkins stated that funds may be transferred from one department or project to another, if the amount does not exceed the total appropriation, but funds may not be used for a new purpose that has not been voted.

Mrs. Wingate's amendment was voted down.

Mr. Douglas' motion on Article 13 was seconded, and So Voted.

#### ARTICLE 14 EXTENSION OF SEWER SYSTEM ON LEAVITT ROAD

This article was recommended by the Budget Committee and money needed included in Budget Sewer figure of \$45,000.00.

Mr. K. Langley moved: To see if the Town will vote for extension of Leavitt Road Sewer system from the end of the street to High St. Seconded. So Voted.

ARTICLE 15  
ZONING

This article was read by Moderator Seavey.

Mr. Ray Goding, Chairman of the Planning Board said that the proposed changes in Zoning had been recommended by Anderson & Nichols and the Planning Board, and would have much to do with orderly development of Hampton. Hampton is a highly residential area of Beauty, with good schools and fine beaches, and its development should be carefully planned.

Judge Perkins made the motion that the Zoning Article be voted upon section by section.

Seconded. So Voted.

Mr. R. Bridle asked if any place was being reserved for business. Mr. Goding replied: Business Areas, or Industrial Areas.

Section A. Mr. R. Goding moved that Section A. of Article 15 be adopted as read. Seconded. So Voted.

Section B. (This merely to clarify meaning.)

Mr. Goding moved that Section B. be adopted as read. Seconded. So Voted.

Section C. (Sec. 4)

Mr. R. Goding moved adoption of Section C. (Sec. 4) as read.

Mr. John Perkins made the following amendment:

In Article 15, Section C. (Sec. 4) second paragraph, following the words "prior to adoption of this section" that the words "Or where a plan of development has been filed with and tentatively approved by the Planning Board prior to the adoption of this section," be added.

Seconded. Voted as amended..

Section D. (merely to remove unnecessary paragraph)

Mr. Goding moved that Section D. be adopted as read. Seconded. So Voted.

Section E. Mr. Goding moved that Section E. be adopted as read. Seconded. So Voted.

Section F. (Sec. 7&8)

Mr. Goding moved adoption of Section F. Sec. 7 & 8 as read. Seconded. So Voted.

Section G. Mr. Goding moved the adoption of Section G. as read. Seconded. So Voted.

Section H. Mr. Goding proposed the following amendment to Section H. Section 4D. In A Residence AA District in cases where a lot smaller than the required minimum is on record in the Rockingham County Registry of Deeds prior to the adoption of this Section, (Or where a Plan of a Development has been filed with and tentatively approved by the Planning Board prior to the adoption of this Section), the requirements of Sections 4A, 4B, and 4C, shall not apply. Voted as amended.

Section I. Mr. Goding moved acceptance of (Article 15) Section I as read. Seconded. So voted.

Section J. Nudd's Canal-Tide Mill Creek Area

Mr. Goding Moved that Section J. be approved as read. Seconded. So Voted.

Section K. Mr. Goding moved that Section K. be accepted as read. Seconded. So Voted.

Note: A section of land from center of Bragg Ave. (near end of N. St.) to the Bridge should have been included in Res. C. was left out of Zoning Article.

The assembly **approved** including this area in Sec. C.

#### ARTICLE 16

#### FORMATION OF WATER DISTRICT AND PURCHASE OF HAMPTON WATER WORKS CO.

Budget Committee recommended \$2,500.00 for purposes of Article 16.

Mrs. M. Wingate asked if there was any record of the condition of Water mains now existing.

Mr. Hackett replied that the purpose of appropriating money in this Article was to investigate the advisability of Purchasing the Water Company.

Mr. James Tucker, Sr. spoke in favor of passing Article 16.

Mr. Wilfred Cunningham made the motion that Article 16 be adopted as read. Seconded. So Voted.

#### ARTICLE 17

##### MARSH RECLAMATION

Mr. Douglass Hunter moved that we raise and appropriate the sum of \$11,500.00 for Article 17.

Seconded. So Voted.

#### ARTICLE 18

##### LAND AT GRAVEL PIT

Mr. Herbert Casassa moved that Article 18 be indefinitely postponed. Seconded. So Voted.

#### ARTICLE 19

##### POLICE BUILDING AT HAMPTON CENTER

(The money for this Article was not approved by the Budget Committee)

Mr. Kenneth Langley moved indefinite postponement of this article. Seconded. So Voted.

#### ARTICE 20

##### PURCHASE OF SWAIN LAND FOR PARKING

Money not approved by Budget Committee. Mr. Donald Ring moved indefinite postponement of Article 20.

Seconded. So Voted.

#### ARTICLE 21

##### RESERVING LAND FOR MEMORIAL DAY EXERCISES

Mr. Everett Mann, Commander of the American Le-

gion stated that the Town already owns the land in question and this was merely a request to have the space reserved.

Mrs. M. Wingate moved adoption of the Article as read. Seconded. So Voted.

#### ARTICLE 22

##### MOORING DRIVE ACCEPTANCE

Mooring Drive is located just off Ashworth Avenue going toward the Hampton River.

Mr. James Tucker Sr. said that this was the first of five articles regarding acceptance of streets and asked what "with the approval of the Board of Selectmen" meant.

Selectmen replied: Up to required grade level and drainage specifications.

Mrs. M. Wingate moved the adoption of Article 22, as read. Seconded. So Voted.

#### ARTICLE 23

##### ACCEPTANCE OF HOBSON AVENUE

Mr. D. Ring moved adoption of Article 23 as read. Seconded. So Voted.

#### ARTICLE 24

##### ACCEPTANCE OF NAVES ROAD

Mr. Herbert Casassa moved that Article 24 be accepted as read. Seconded. So Voted.

#### ARTICLE 25

##### ACCEPTANCE OF RED COAT LANE

Red Coat Lane is a 'dead end street' question arose of accepting it under these conditions.

There is a turnaround and the street can be plowed in winter. 9 houses located there. Selectman Hackett said that the street was well constructed.

Mrs. Wingate asked if the Planning Board approved streets like Red Coat Lane.

Mr. Goding replied that the owner complied with requirements in every detail, and it would be unfair not to accept the street. He also said that the Planning Board did not approve 'dead end streets' unless there was a suitable turnaround provided.

Mrs. Harriet Harris moved that Article 25 be passed as read. Seconded. So Voted.

#### ARTICLE 26

##### ACCEPTANCE OF QUINLAN LANE

Mr. Seth Junkins moved that Article 26 be adopted as read. Seconded. So Voted.

#### ARTICLE 27

##### REPORTS OF COMMITTEES

Mr. Roland W. Paige gave the report of the Korean War Honor Roll Committee which was authorized by the Town Meetings of 1955, 1956, 1957, and 1958.

This report is in official record.

Korean War Memorial set at Corner of Hampton Academy Junior High School Lot.

Mr. Paige expressed gratitude to other members of this committee for their work on this project.

Mrs. M. Wingate moved that the Report of the Korean War Honor Roll Committee be accepted with appreciation, and placed on file. Seconded. So Voted.

Work of the Marsh Reclamation Committee had already been submitted at the beginning of the meeting.

Mr. William Elliot made the motion that the Report of the Marsh Reclamation Committee be accepted with thanks. Seconded. So Voted.

ARTICLE 28  
OTHER BUSINESS

(Mr. William Elliott)

A Resolution was offered suggesting that the Selectman who was serving the second year of his three year term be the member to act as a representative to the Budget Committee instead of the member whose term was expiring. Approved by meeting.

Mr. Robert Bridle offered the Resolution that the Town Clerk's records of Town Meetings be included in the Town Report so that an intelligent appraisal can be made of Town Business and the Budget can be more easily understood. Approved by meeting.

Mr. William Elliot submitted the following resolution:

That it is the sense of this meeting that the 1960 town meeting should be adjourned immediately after opening to 10 A. M. of the Saturday next following the Town Meeting Day as specified in the Statutes, for the purpose of transacting all business of the Town Meeting other than the election of town officers, said officers to be elected by ballot on the regular Town Meeting Day.

The purpose of this resolution being that it will give more citizens an opportunity to express their opinion and vote upon issues vital to themselves and the welfare of the town. It is recommended that upon passage of this resolution the Selectmen be requested before the 1960 Town Meeting to give sufficient notice and publicity of the adoption of this resolution.

Mrs. M. Wingate suggested that the Town Meeting be held in the evening of Town Meeting Day (Tuesday).

Judge Perkins stated that if Town Meeting were to be changed there should be an article in the Warrant and it should be voted before being changed.

Estimated sense of assembly here present—approval.  
Note: Votes of approval not legally binding.

Mr. Wilfred Cunningham moved that the appreciation of the voters be extended to the **Budget Committee**, **Planning Board**, and **Marsh Reclamation Committee** for their faithful work in the interest of the **Town**.

So Voted.

Representative Douglass Hunter offered the following resolution which the meeting approved.

WHEREAS the basic economy in the Town of Hampton is dependent upon the recreation industry, and

WHEREAS it is in our best interest to do everything possible to promote the boating industry and the commercial fishing industry in Hampton, and

WHEREAS the Corp of Engineers has conducted an extensive engineering study of Hampton and Seabrook harbors, and

WHEREAS this study has been made public at a public hearing held on October 9, 1958, and

WHEREAS the total cost of the project to improve the harbor is estimated at \$320,000.00 with a local and State participation of 37%, and

WHEREAS the basic purpose of his project is deemed to be in the best interests of the Town of Hampton

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Annual Meeting of the Town of Hampton go on record as favoring the completion of this harbor improvement project. Resolution favored.

A discussion of Septic Tanks at the beach was ruled an administrative problem and not subject for discussion at Town Meeting.



Mrs. M. Wingate asked the status of the "Fish House Case." Reply: It has been appealed to Supreme Court and will probably be argued at Supreme Court this spring.

She also asked the status of the Case determining the legality of the "99 Year Lease."

Selectman Hackett replied that it was still in the hands of the Court and Attorneys.

Mrs. Harriet Harris offered a resolution that: A moment of Meditation in memory of Mr. Leroy Hamilton be observed because of his interest and activity at former Town Meetings. This was done.

Motion was made to adjourn at 4:25 P. M.

# Town Warrant for 1960

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## TOWN OF HAMPTON STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Hampton, in the County of Rockingham, in said State, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Junior High School Auditorium in said Hampton on Tuesday, the eighth day of March, 1960, at ten o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

ARTICLE 1. To choose by Australian Ballot one Selectman for Three years, one Town Clerk, one Town Treasurer, one Collector of Taxes, four members of the Budget Committee for three years.

ARTICLE 2. To choose all other necessary officers for the ensuing year.

(The polls for the election of officers and to vote on any other articles which may appear on the ballot, will be open at ten o'clock in the forenoon and will not be closed earlier than six o'clock in the afternoon of the same day.)

ARTICLE 3. To choose Delegates at Large, Alternate Delegates at Large, Delegates and Alternate Delegates to the National Conventions of the various political parties to be held to nominate party candidates for President and Vice-President of the United States.

ARTICLE 4. To see if the town will vote to accept the Budget as submitted by the Budget Committee and

to raise and appropriate the sum of \$498,172.00 for Town purposes.

ARTICLE 5. To see if the town will vote to give the Selectmen power to administer, sell, or otherwise dispose of any real estate acquired through tax deeds.

ARTICLE 6. To see if the town will vote to give the Selectmen and Town Treasurer power to borrow money in anticipation of Taxes.

ARTICLE 7. (The terms referred to in the following articles numbered 1, 2, 3, and 4, shall be the terms as defined in Section 2, Chapter 412 Laws of 1959, that is: "area" is such marsh areas as are in the Town of Hampton: "authority" is the Hampton Marsh Reclamation Authority: and the other terms hereinafter used are as defined therein.)

On petition of Donald A. Ring and twelve other legal voters of the Town of Hampton to see if the Town will vote to reappropriate and to transfer the unexpended funds in the sum of \$11,500.00 raised and appropriated at the Annual Town Meeting held on March 10, 1959 for the expenses of the Marsh Reclamation Commission to the Hampton Marsh Reclamation Authority to be used by said Authority for any purposes for which it is authorized to use money in accordance with the terms of Chapter 412 of the Laws of 1959, which act created the Authority.

2. In order to provide for uniformity and adequacy of grades in the area to be developed under the jurisdiction of the Hampton Marsh Reclamation Authority, to see if the town will vote to authorize the Authority to establish minimum grades of fill with which any person, firm or corporation must comply when filling any land in said area, and no permit shall

be issued by the Building Inspector in the said area unless and until the grades to be established are in conformity with the minimum prescribed by the Authority.

3. To see if the Town will vote to convey for the sum of \$1.00 to the Hampton Marsh Reclamation Authority any and all marsh land owned by the Town of Hampton and located within the area, such conveyances to be made by the selectmen for, and in behalf of the Town, upon the approval of each final plan as described in Sections 12-14 of Chapter 412 of the Laws of 1959.

4. To see if the town will vote to amend the Zoning Ordinances of the Town of Hampton adopted at the Annual Town Meeting on March 8, 1949 and amended at subsequent Town Meetings, as follows:

A. By adding at the end of sub-section 3, section 7 Article IV the words "except as otherwise set forth in Section 8."

B. By revising Section 8 to read: "No lot shall be established in the areas under the jurisdiction of the Hampton Marsh Reclamation Authority having a minimum lot size of less than 7,500 square feet and of less than 75 feet in frontage and of less than 75 feet in width for a depth of not less than 75 feet."

ARTICLE 8. On petition of Ralph T. Harris and ten (10) other legal voters of the Town of Hampton, to see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,800.00 to install a sewer on Tuttle Avenue, Hampton Beach, N. H.

ARTICLE 9. On petition of Ralph T. Harris and ten (10) other legal voters of the Town of Hampton, to see if the Town will vote to accept the Street known

as Hobson Avenue, running West from Ashworth Avenue to the River, subject to the approval of the Selectmen.

ARTICLE 10. On petition of Ralph T. Harris and ten (10) other legal voters of the Town of Hampton, to see if the Town will vote to accept the Street known as Mooring Drive, running West from Ashworth Avenue to the River, subject to the approval of the Selectmen.

ARTICLE 11. On petition of Ralph T. Harris and ten (10) other legal voters of the Town of Hampton, to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,350.00 to install a sewer on Hobson Avenue, Hampton Beach, N. H.

ARTICLE 12. On petition of Ralph T. Harris and ten (10) other legal voters of the Town of Hampton, to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,770.00 to install a sewer on Mooring Drive, Hampton Beach, N. H.

ARTICLE 13. On petition of William H. Little, Jr. and 32 other legal voters of the Town of Hampton, to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000.00 for Storm Drainage and Sewer work on Locke Road area.

ARTICLE 14. On petition of Albert J. Miller and 19 other legal voters of the Town of Hampton, to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for the study, by qualified engineers, of the flood conditions that exist on Hackett's Lane and Moore Ave., and eventual elimination of said condition.

ARTICLE 15. On petition of Russell H. McGuirk and 28 other legal voters of the Town of Hampton, to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the

sum of seventeen thousand dollars (\$17,000.00) to construct a sewer on Winnacunnet Road from Landing Road to the high point east of Locke Road, and to and including residence of David Baker on Locke Road.

ARTICLE 16. On petition of Thomas E. Clay, Jr. and nineteen other legal voters of the Town of Hampton, to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twelve Hundred Dollars (\$1,200.00) for the installation of storm drainage and fixtures on Norton Road.

ARTICLE 17. On petition of Kenneth W. Langley and ten other legal voters of the Town of Hampton to see:

A. If the Town will vote to construct a system of sewerage disposal including a main pumping station at Winnacunnet Road, together with sewers in Winnacunnet Road from Ocean Boulevard to or near Locke Road, and including, if necessary, a gravity interceptor from the treatment plant to Winnacunnet Road, and including a force main from the pumping station to the end of the gravity sewer in Winnacunnet Road, and providing sewers on Ocean Boulevard from Boar's Head to Winnacunnet Road and in King's Highway from Winnacunnet Road to High Street, and including street sewers in all of the short streets between King's Highway and Ocean Boulevard from the 1st to and including 19th streets, together with a lift station, as is necessary, at or near 10th Street at a cost not to exceed (\$260,000.00) Two Hundred Sixty Thousand Dollars.

B. To see if the Town will vote to construct a system of sewerage, including sewer lines, force mains and lift station, or such portions or parts thereof as the Selectmen shall determine to be to the best interests

of the Town, in the vicinities of High Street, North Beach Road, Plaice Cove, Arcadia Avenue, Bonair Avenue, Dumas Avenue, Cliff Avenue, and in the areas at or near North Beach Road, North Shore Road, Ocean Boulevard from the Coast Guard Station to the North Hampton Town Line, Woodland Road, Little River Road, Mace Road, and Locke Road at a cost not to exceed (\$600,000.00) Six Hundred Thousand Dollars.

C. To see if the Town will vote to re-construct and repair, as the Selectmen shall determine to be to the best interests of the Town, the present sewerage lines, the sewerage treatment plant, and such other parts or portions of the sewerage system as, in the opinion of the Selectmen, constitute an undue infiltration problem, at a cost not to exceed Three Hundred Thousand Dollars. (\$300,000.00)

D. To see if the Town, for the purposes above mentioned in Sections A, B, and C, of this Article, will authorize the Selectmen to borrow upon the notes of the Town a sum not in excess of One Million One Hundred Sixty Thousand Dollars, (\$1,160,000.00), at such rate of interest and payable at such times and places as are provided for and in accordance with Chapter 33 of the 1955 Revised Statutes Annotated and amendments thereto entitled, "Municipal Finance Act," as the Selectmen shall decide.

E. To see if the Town will vote to authorize and instruct the Selectmen to proceed to acquire either by purchase or eminent domain proceedings such land or lands or easements therein as they shall deem necessary for the construction of any or all of said sewer system.

F. To see if the Town will vote to authorize and empower the Selectmen to take such steps as are necessary to obtain such Federal and State funds as



are available to aid in the construction of any or all of said sewer systems.

ARTICLE 18. On petition of Robert O. Brown and 21 other legal voters of the Town of Hampton, to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of forty-six thousand two hundred and fifteen dollars (\$46,215.00) which includes the pumping station and engineer's fee, for a sanitary sewer system on Mill Road starting at Ann's Lane and going north for 4,745 feet of sewer pipe.

ARTICLE 19. On petition of Roger S. Shepard and ten other legal voters of the Town of Hampton, to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one thousand dollars (\$1,000.00) for the installation of storm drainage and fixtures on Biery Road.

ARTICLE 20. On petition of Ruth C. Stimson and one hundred other legal voters of the Town of Hampton to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of eight hundred dollars (\$800.00) to erect a wooden fence with iron chain links, (Similar to U. S. Coast Guard fence), on the west boundary of the "Fish House Area" by May 30, 1960. Such fence, approximately 440 feet in length, would start even with the boundary of the Coast Guard property and run north to the boundary of the Alfred K. Nason estate, with provision for a ten foot opening adjacent to the north-west corner of the Coast Guard property. This opening would provide access to the beach.

The purpose of the fence would be to identify and "to maintain as free public property forever that area known as "The Fish House Area," according to Article 11 passed at the 1950 Town Meeting. Be it resolved that this scenic and historic area become a recreational, non-commercial, non-parking part of the Hampton

Town Park System, and be maintained in a clean condition, and eventually beautified.

ARTICLE 21. On petition of Roland W. Paige and forty-two other legal voters of the Town of Hampton to see if the Town will vote to establish a Committee of Three to Five members which shall be known as the Shade Tree Commission, the purpose of said committee will be to recommend plans to Coordinate all phases of Town expenses in regard to Trees, and to set up a Long Range Program for Planting, Removal, and Professional Protection of Trees on Town Property, and for an Annual Appropriation Committed to this program.

ARTICLE 22. On petition of Donald A. Ring and eleven other legal voters of the Town of Hampton, to see if the Town will vote to authorize the selectmen to negotiate for the purchase of land and buildings known as the Old Deacon Tuck Grist Mill at the foot of High Street, and to raise sixteen hundred and sixty-six (\$1,666.00) each year for three years: the sum not to exceed five thousand dollars, (\$5,000.00).

ARTICLE 23. On petition of Donald A. Ring and thirteen other legal voters of the Town of Hampton, to see if the Town will vote to sell a piece of land located in the High Street Parking Lot, starting at the north-easterly boundary and running westerly a distance of 85 feet along High Street, thence turning and running in a southerly direction a distance of 175 feet, for the sum of \$8,000.00 for the location of a first class post office, and to authorize the selectmen to use said \$8,000.00 or any part thereof to negotiate for the purchase of land adjoining the parking lot known as Swain land, this land to be used for parking only.

ARTICLE 24. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

Submitted herewith is the report of the annual examination and audit of the accounts of the Town of Hampton for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1959, which was made by this Division in accordance with the vote of the Town. Exhibits as hereafter listed are included as part of the report.

**SCOPE OF AUDIT**

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the Board of Selectmen, Treasurer, Tax Collector, Town Clerk, Municipal Court, Library, Cemetery Association and Trustees of Trust Funds.

**FINANCIAL STATEMENTS**

**Comparative Balance Sheets: — Dec. 31, 1958 — Dec. 31, 1959**

**(Exhibit A-1)**

Comparative Balance Sheets as of December 31, 1958 and December 31, 1959, are presented in Exhibit A-1. As indicated therein the Net Debt decreased by \$31,595.67 in the year 1959.

**Analysis of Change in Financial Condition: (Exhibit A-2)**

An analysis of the change in financial condition of the Town during the year is made in Exhibit A-2, with the factors which caused the change indicated therein. These were as follows:

**Comparative Statements of Appropriations and Expenditures****Estimated and Actual Revenues: (Exhibits A-3 & A-4)**

Comparative statements of appropriations and expenditures, estimated and actual revenues for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1959, are presented in Exhibits A-3 and A-4. As indicated by the budget summary, (Exhibit A-4), a revenue surplus of \$31,515-.83, plus a net unexpended balance of appropriations of \$1,546.68, resulted in a net budget surplus of \$33,062.51.

**Summary of Receipts and Expenditures: (Exhibit B-1)**

A summary statement of receipts and expenditures for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1959, made up in accordance with the uniform classification of accounts, is included in Exhibit B-1. Proof of the Treasurer's balance as of December 31, 1959, is indicated in Exhibit B-2.

**Statement of Bonded Indebtedness: (Exhibit I)**

A statement of bonded indebtedness as of December 31, 1959, showing annual debt service requirements, is contained in Exhibit I.

**AUDIT PROCEDURE**

The accounts and records of all town officials charged with the custody, receipt and disbursement of public funds were examined and audited. Vouchers and cancelled checks were compared with supporting invoices and payrolls as well as entries in the books of record. Receipts were checked by source insofar as possible and totals of receipts and expenditures verified. Book balances were verified by comparison with reconciled bank balances made from statements obtained from depository banks. Verification of uncollected taxes was made by mailing notices to delinquent taxpayers as indicated by the Collector's records.

**Current Surplus:**

The current surplus (excess of total assets over current liabilities) increased by \$17,595.67, from \$110,549.12 to \$128,144-.79 during 1959, as indicated herewith:

In this vicinity two area meetings have been held, one in the spring and one in the fall. The spring meeting was held in our Library on the evening of March 26, with Librarians and Trustees from the fifteen libraries in this area in attendance. Many books were on exhibit, the talk being on "Books In General". At the close of the meeting refreshments were served by the Trustees and Library Staff.

The fall meeting, which my assistant and I attended, was held at the North Hampton Library with a display of outstanding reference books. The subject for discussion, "Reference Books For Your Library", was

ably presented by Miss Margery Stroud, of the State Library. Refreshments were served by the Trustees and Library Staff of the North Hampton Library.

After the close of the fall series of neighborhood meetings, reference books were distributed by the State Library to those librarians who attended the meetings. The book we received is entitled, "Standard Book For Secretaries" by Lois Hutchinson, a useful addition to our collection. Our own addition to reference books is the Americana Encyclopedia, placed in the study room.

National Library Week was observed in March with the display of the poster, "Wake Up and Read", exhibition of Adult books and bookmarks distributed to the children.

#### STATE FIRE REGULATION

Penalty for kindling a fire without a permit, \$200 or imprisonment not more than 60 days.
