The line has been extended under the PWA project started last year to several cottages at Lake Nubanusit and also a new line has been run from the Peterborough Road to the residence of A. L. Dodge.

We have received income from the Public Service Co. of New

Hampshire of \$4,331.70 during the year.

The sum of \$100.50 is due the town from the New England Telephone & Telegraph Co., for their share of the cost of replacing

poles on joint line.

As brought out at the special town meeting, there is at times a low voltage condition on the town's distribution system which may prove to be serious and may possibly cost the town a considerable amount of money before it can be remedied. We have engaged the services of a consulting engineer and have made a number of tests but due to the fact that the load during the winter months is much less than during the summer, it is difficult to get the exact conditions on the line during peak loads. We expect to continue these tests during the coming summer season and try to determine whether or not the line is overloaded.

The work of the several grades has been constantly checked and the necessary drill is being given where it is needed. The schools have all made substantial progress and much credit is due to the conscientious work of the teachers.

The primary and intermediate schools have been fortunate in having hot water installed with the opportunity for serving a hot lunch. Where so many pupils are transported this is a matter of importance where pupils are away from home at the noon hour.

The Hancock High School has been outstanding as an excellent high school for a number of years. Under the skillful guidance of Miss Manchester, the pupils have received excellent training from the cadet teachers sent from Keene and Plymouth Normal Schools.

There has been a remarkable spirit of cooperation in this town which has done much to make the work of our teachers pleasant and profitable.

The finances of the district have been very carefully handled and with the appropriation asked by the school board in their budget substantial progress in improving the text books used in the grades can be made.

I desire at this time to thank the school board, teachers, parents, and pupils for their cooperation.

REPORT OF SCHOOL NURSE HANCOCK

The routine inspection of each pupil's scalp, vision, teeth, skin, posture and general hygiene began with the opening of the school year.

The following defects were found when Dr. N. F. Cheever made the annual examination in October:

Since the last report 75 school visits were made. 48 home visits were made to investigate pupils who were absent, to explain care and treatment of communicable diseases, to follow up defects and encourage parents to avail themselves of opportunities offered through the clinics for treatment and correction of their children's defects.

The tuberculosis association now conducts a limited number of skin testing clinics in high schools each year, for diagnostic purposes. As it requires a number of days to complete a clinic a large group is desired; however, if a sufficient number of pupils request the test we may have a clinic in Hancock this spring.

"The serving of hot lunch at school has always justified itself in all cases where it has been given a fair trial. In rural schools where, without this service, cold noon lunches must be depended upon five days in the week throughout the school year, the serving of one hot dish transforms the lunch into a meal and adds zest to the work of the afternoon. More far-reaching still is the generally improved health of the children, which is seen to follow."

During childhood the growth, development and health of the teeth is dependent more upon proper nutrition than any other factor. A balanced diet which includes adequate amounts of vitamins A, D, and C, must be given if we expect to obtain best results. Cod Liver Oil now being given in the homes and through the school is the best source of A and D vitamins. Oranges, tomatoes, and raw cabbage are rich in vitamin C.

In addition to good nutrition the teeth must be kept clean. When several baby teeth appear a little cotton on a toothpick should be used to cleanse between and around them. If through

carelessness or oversight a cavity appears it should be filled immediately. The old myth that baby teeth are unimportant has been the cause of more suffering to the human body than any other one thing during infancy and childhood. The baby teeth are the natural guides for the permanent teeth when they come. The so-called "six year molars," upon which mental and physical welfare of the child depend, are often lost. Parents think them temporary teeth and do not trouble about them.

The first teeth neglected or removed too soon will spoil the permanent set and should never be removed without the advice of your dentist. Much suffering, both mental and physical, would be prevented if the teeth were properly cared for from early childhood.

I thank the school officials, teachers, organizations, parents and pupils for their co-operation in the health world.
