# TOWN WARRANT

-----  
THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Jackson in the County of Carroll in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town House in said Jackson on Tuesday, the tenth day of March, next at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

3. To raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,664.81 to rehabilitate Town Treasury for over-expenditures in 1952.

To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the following purposes:

4. Maintenance of summer highways and bridges.

5. Snow removal from highways and dooryards and sanding highways.

6. Street lighting.

7. Old Age Assistance, J. H. Hodge account and poor relief.

8. Maintenance of cemetery.

9. Memorial Day exercises.

10. Maintenance of parsonage.

11. Town library.

12. Fire protection.

13. Police protection.

14. Memorial Hospital.

15. Sidewalk construction.

16. Jackson Ski and Outing Club.

17. Skating rink.

18. Social Security.

To see if the town will raise and appropriate sums of money as follows:

19. The sum of \$2,800 for State Aid Reconstruction, State contributing the sum of \$5,600.

20. The sum of \$212.87 to secure Town Road Aid, State contributing the sum of \$1,419.13.

21. The sum of \$200 to extend Tin Mt. Road.

22. The sum of \$92.16 for support of White Mountains Region.

23. The sum of \$1,500 for Thorn Hill Road, above turn-off to Thorn Mt. Ski Lift, to straighten and prepare same for black top.

24. The sum of \$1,000 for Cross Road at Fairview Bridge, to reconstruct and prepare same for black top.

25. The sum of \$300 to re-coat black top Class V roads.

26. To see if the town will vote to allow the collector of taxes additional compensation for his services in collecting the State Head tax and to fix the amount thereof.

**To see if the town will vote as follows:**

27. To impose summons of \$.20 on poll taxes uncollected after October 15th, 1953.

28. To authorize Selectmen to borrow in anticipation of taxes.

29. To authorize Selectmen to sell real estate acquired by tax deeds.

30. To act upon any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

# REPORT OF FOREST FIRE WARDENS

Once again we are about to enter another forest fire season and once again your town forest fire warden is asking you to be careful of fires in our woodlands and along our roadsides. There is nothing more displeasing to the eye than an area of blackened waste. Nine out of ten of these blackened areas are

caused by You and You. It is only with your cooperation that we can prevent such an area in our town. A great part of the men and women of this area depend on timber for their weekly paycheck, and by you and you being careless, these people are being deprived of a living. We can't even try to prevent fires caused by lightning, but the number of fires caused by this agent is very small. It is you as a smoker, as a debris burner, — you as a careless person, who can do a great deal in preventing this most shameful waste of our natural resources.

You can help by making sure your smoking material is out —DEAD OUT, your incinerator is airtight, the area around it is cleaned of all burnable material, that you have had it inspected by your forest fire warden, that you have asked for and received a permit to burn from your forest fire warden. By doing these things the number of fires are going to be fewer and you will have woodlands to hunt in, to have picnics in, to be able to fish the stream. You will also be proud of your green mountainsides. By not doing this you will not enjoy yourself at all. It is not too long ago that most of us can still remember the fall of 1947, and we all know that most of us can still remember those fires during that period could have been prevented if everyone was careful. So, it is only You and You that can prevent this most shameful waste of our woodland by this common enemy — FIRE.

Please remember it is a proud record for you to say that your town had no woods fires this past year and it is only through you and you that this goal can be reached. So, please help us to prevent forest fires.

To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

8. To act upon any other business that may legally come before this meeting.
