

LITTLETON WARRANT

The State of New Hampshire

To the inhabitants of the Town of Littleton, in said State, qualified to vote in Town and State affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall and Police Court Room in the Town Building on the 12th day of March, next, being the second Tuesday of March, at eight o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following:

Article 1. To choose a Town Clerk, one Selectman for the term of three (3) years, one Park Commissioner for three (3) years, a Town Treasurer, three members of the Board of Trustees of the Public Library for three (3) years, one member of the Board of Trustees of the Public Library for two (2) years, one member of the Board of Trustees of the Public Library for one (1) year, and one Trustee of Trust Funds for three (3) years.

Article 2. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the provisions of Chapter 287 of the Revised Statutes Annotated, 1955, relative to playing Beano in the Town of Littleton, and that the following question be placed upon the ballot to be used at said meeting—"Shall the provisions of Chapter 287 of the Revised Statutes Annotated, 1955, relative to playing the game of Beano be adopted in this Town?"

Article 3. To see if the Town will vote to permit dog racing and wagering on said dog races under the pari-mutuel system, if this should be permitted by the laws of The State of New Hampshire, which have been or may hereafter be enacted by the General Court; and that the following question be placed upon the printed ballot—"Shall the Town permit dog racing and wagering on said dog races under the pari-mutuel system, if this should be permitted by the laws of The State of New Hampshire, which have been or may be enacted by the General Court?" (This Article inserted upon written application of voters.)

Article 4. To see if the Australian ballot system for election of Town Officers be rescinded and the non-partisan ballot system legally adopted; and that the following question be placed upon the printed ballot—"Shall the Australian ballot system for election of Town Officers be rescinded and the non-partisan ballot system be legally adopted?" (This Article inserted upon written application of voters.)

Article 5. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for Town Officers' salaries, general expense, elections,

Municipal Court, Town Building, Civil Defense, Dredging River, Social Security, Police Department, Forest Fire, Blister Rust, Planning Board, Fire Department, Damage by Dogs, Employees' Retirement, Garbage Collection, Health Officer, Hospital, District Nurse Association, Special Highway Account, Town Garage, Dump, Sewers, Town Road Aid IV, Town Road Aid V, Street & Highway, Street Lights, Sidewalks, Superintendent of Public Works, Vital Statistics, Welfare, Old Age Assistance, National Holidays, Advertising, Region Association, Community Center, Recreation, Dutch Elm, Cemeteries, Public Library, Parks & Playground, Hydrants, Interest on Indebtedness, Debt Retirement and other necessary expenses.

Article 6. To see if the Town will authorize the Board of Selectmen to borrow monies, from time to time, for current indebtness of the Town for the ensuing year, in anticipation of taxes to be collected for the year 1963 and to be paid therefrom.

Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to file in behalf of the Town an application (in form and manner required by the United States and in conformity with Public Law 560, Eighty-third Congress) and do whatever else may be required for an advance in the amount of Sixty-one Thousand Seven Hundred and Seventy-five Dollars (\$61,775.00) to be made by the United States to the Town of Littleton to aid in defraying the cost of preparation of final construction plans and specifications for sewage disposal and treatment facilities for the Town of Littleton.

Article 8. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to reconstruct Richmond Street at a cost not to exceed Sixteen Thousand One Hundred Dollars (\$16,100.00) to be paid by transfer of funds from surplus as approved by the State Tax Commission.

Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000.00) to fill and hottop the present Skating Rink at Remich Park, and to construct a Combination Tennis, Volley Ball, Badminton and Basketball Court and Skating Rink, and to build a link wire fence around the same; the sum raised and appropriated to be expended under the direction of the Park Commissioners and the completed project turned over to the Park Commission for operation and supervision; equipment, finishing and landscaping to be paid out of income of the Daniel Remich Trust Fund now available for that purpose.

Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to authorize and direct the Selectmen to publish and print in their next annual report a list of the owners, together with the assessed value of all taxable proper-

ties in Town, as the same appear upon their invoice book; and a separate listing be made of stock-in-trade assessed values.

Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to reconstruct Pine Street, and install a storm sewer, at a cost not to exceed Thirty-three Thousand One Hundred Dollars (\$33,100.00) to be paid as follows: by a transfer of the sum of Eighteen Thousand Two Hundred and Fifty Dollars (\$18,250.00) from surplus as approved by the State Tax Commission, and by the transfer of the balance of Fourteen Thousand Eight Hundred and Fifty Dollars (\$14,850.00) from the Parking Meter Fund.

Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to lease a parcel of land four hundred (400) feet square situate on Pine Hill to John Bowman, of Berlin, New Hampshire, (or to a corporation formed by him) to be used for radio station purposes, for a term of five (5) years beginning November 23, 1963 at a monthly rental of Twenty Dollars (\$20.00) payable in advance, being the same parcel of land and upon the same terms and conditions as set forth in a one (1) year lease from the Town to said Bowman dated November 23, 1962, and with an option to renew said lease for an additional term of five (5) years upon the same terms and conditions.

Article 13. To see if the Town will vote to sell and convey to Henschel Shoe, Co., Inc. for the sum of One Dollar (\$1.00), or other consideration, the land and buildings formerly known as the Apthorp School Property and situate at No. 27 Redington Street, and being the same premises now leased by the Town to said Henschel Shoe Co., Inc.; said sale to be subject to the express condition that said Henschel Shoe Co., Inc. shall construct at its own expense an addition containing a minimum of seventy-five hundred (7,500) square feet of floor space to the present building, said construction to commence within six (6) months from date and the deed to be delivered upon the commencement of said construction; said Henschel Shoe Co., Inc. to agree with the Town at the time of delivery of the deed to construct an addition as above provided.

Article 14. To choose any other necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year, and to choose and elect any agents for Committees which may be necessary to carry into effect any vote that may be passed under the warrant.

Article 15. To hear the report of Agents, Auditors, Committees, including the Planning Board, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

SUMMARY OF FINDINGS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

Gentlemen:

Submitted herewith is the report of the annual examination and audit of the accounts of the Town of Littleton for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1962, which was made by this Division in accordance with the vote of the Town. Exhibits as hereafter listed are included as part of the report.

SCOPE OF AUDIT

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the Board of Selectmen, Treasurer, Tax Collector, Town Clerk, Trustees of Trust Funds, Library and Planning Board.

FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Comparative Balance Sheets: December 31, 1961 - December 31, 1962: (Exhibit A-1)

Comparative Balance Sheets as of December 31, 1961 and December 31, 1962, are presented in Exhibit A-1. As indicated therein, the Net Debt decreased by \$49,985.72 in 1962.

Analysis of Change in Financial Condition: (Exhibit A-2)

An analysis of the change in financial condition of the Town during the year is made in Exhibit A-2, with the factors which caused the change indicated therein. These were as follows:

Comparative Statements of Appropriations and Expenditures—Estimated and Actual Revenues: (Exhibits A-3 & A-4)

Comparative statements of appropriations and expenditures, estimated and actual revenues for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1962, are presented in Exhibits A-3 and A-4. As indicated by the budget summary (Exhibit A-4), a net unexpended balance of appropriations of \$32,773.69, plus a revenue surplus of \$1,522.93, resulted in a net budget surplus of \$34,296.62.

Summary Statement of Receipts and Expenditures: (Exhibit B-1)

A summary statement of receipts and expenditures for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1962, made up in accordance with the uniform classification of accounts, is included in Exhibit B-1. Proof of the Treasurer's balance as of December 31, 1962, is indicated in Exhibit B-2.

Parking Meter Reserve Fund: (Exhibit B-4)

A summarized statement of the activity in the Parking Meter Account during 1962 is presented in Exhibit B-4.

Statement of Long Term Indebtedness: (Exhibit H)

A statement of outstanding Long Term Indebtedness as of December 31, 1962, showing annual debt service requirements, is contained in Exhibit H.

AUDIT PROCEDURE

The accounts and records of all town officials charged with the custody, receipt and disbursement of public funds were examined and audited. Vouchers and cancelled checks were compared with supporting invoices and payrolls as well as entries in the books of record. Receipts were checked by source insofar as possible and totals of receipts and expenditures verified. Book balances were verified by comparison with reconciled bank balances made from statements obtained from depository banks. Verification of uncollected taxes was made by mailing notices to delinquent taxpayers as indicated by the Collector's records. The amounts of uncollected and unredeemed taxes as indicated in this report, are therefore subject to any changes which may be necessitated by the return of verification notices.

GENERAL COMMENTS

Current Surplus:

The current surplus (excess of total assets over current liabilities) increased by \$6,485.72, from \$53,041.86 to \$59,527.58 during 1962, as shown herewith:

LIBRARIAN'S REPORT

1962

Book displays in store windows, Open House, new books, a film, and flowers all made the library an active spot for National Library Week in April, 1962. Mrs. Elizabeth Lanchester was our National Library Week chairman. The librarian attended the National Library Week luncheon at the Highway Hotel in Concord.

In May the librarian attended a two day meeting in Manchester of the New Hampshire Library Association where relations of school and public libraries were discussed; also censorship in mass media. Several neighborhood meetings were attended including one in October when the librarian served on a panel where pamphlets were presented concerning various aspects of library service and what we can do to improve library service.

Librarians seem to find themselves involved with time-consuming statistics. We have a new electric adding machine for which we are most grateful.

Since more money for more worthwhile books is the life blood of any library and more books increase the work load of all staff members, work hours of the assistant librarians have been increased and the salaries of all librarians have been raised.

The Church of the Latter Day Saints, the N.H. State Employment Security Department staff, various library meetings and occasionally other groups have convened at the library during the year.

We continued book buying emphasis on the adult non-fiction as planned. The section from the 300's through the 700's was weeded and standard, up-to-date replacements were purchased along with the current book orders. The literature books and biographies have had attention rather recently so we plan to skip to travel and history for our next stint. This project is on beyond the normal wearing out and replacing of books which takes place all the time.

Our stepped up non-fiction purchasing in recent years is making us much more able to get the right book to the right person at the right time. There are fewer times when we depend absolutely on interlibrary loan. Usually we can get a person started on his quest for information and then send for more.

A certificate of merit was awarded to the Littleton Public Library on October 24, 1962, by the New Hampshire Library Trustees Association specifically for following through effectively on a 5-year plan outlined after a survey was made of library service of this library. Redecorating, changes in arrangement of children's and young people's books, hours, salaries and much more were suggested. We have

not done all, but have done much and are still planning to improve library service in these basic ways. For this award credit goes to Mary Ames Lorenz more than the present librarian, and may I say to George Richardson, Frances Holly, Norman Kinne, and Theodora Tilton who were on the board at the height of this movement, as well as the present board members.

Also, may I call your attention to the fact that Alexander J. Corey, president of our library board, and a senior member of the board (1944), was named second vice president of the N. H. Library Trustees Association last October. It is much more than pride we feel about Alex and his library work in Littleton and with the N. H. Library Trustees Association. He reads, studies, listens, asks questions and has the ability to visualize and study plans of the future. Library service will improve with such understanding.

According to the statistics Littleton does not seem to have read quite as much as last year. Now that the elementary school has more books and a part-time librarian, books are not changed at that school as often, which makes some difference in our juvenile circulation figures. Magazines were not borrowed quite as much. Both adult fiction and non-fiction as well as phonograph records showed increases which seems a most healthy condition for a public library.

Last October a junior assistant, Patricia C. Richards, came to help us evenings. We consider Patricia excellent help and wish to thank Principal Arthur Kenney and Miss Morrison of the Littleton High School Business Education department for finding Patricia for us.

For another exciting year, I wish to thank the library trustees, Mrs. Howard, Mrs. Gardner, Mr. Kinne, and the Littleton Library borrowers whom I know so much better than a year ago.

Just six days after this year ended we were all shocked and saddened by the loss of a trustee, Winfred E. Stoddard.

T.R.A. Work

Town Road Aid V money was spent this year on Farr Hill between the Girouard place and the Tilton place. The work in this area is not complete at this time. The major items left to complete the job are: Moving electric lines, placing crushed gravel, and blade asphaltic mix. This job shall be completed this year and another T.R.A. job started.

Sidewalks

Last summer the Dept. and crew laid more asphaltic concrete surface on sidewalks in the village. It is hoped that during this coming season we can complete the sidewalks that are in need of resurfacing at this time.

Streets and Highways

During the past season your Town Highway Dept. laid approximately 6,000 tons of blade mix on town roads and streets. There was very little seal coating done as the blade mix with a seal seems to work out much better and gives a better surface. The Dept. has a large asphalt program planned for this coming year.

The only street rebuilding work was done on Maple Street—from Main Street to Knight Ave. There was a new 18" R.C.P. storm sewer

installed, the street widened, and a new surface placed.

Sewers

Very little new sewer work was done with the major job being a new 6" transit line on a portion of Mountain Road. This was in conjunction with the Water and Light Dept. installing a new water line in this area.

There are other clinics held in Littleton, which are staffed directly from the Out Patient Dcpt. of the Concord State hospital and Child Guidance Clinics, and I am sometimes called upon to assist at them.

There were four Blood Banks assisted at and four Civil Defense meetings as well as two conferences. Attended—Gov.'s Conference on Aging, and the New England Health Institute both held in the Spring of the year.

The Pediatric Diagnostic Clinics are held at the Littleton hospital and there are about 65 children of all ages seen. These youngsters come from the northern area of Grafton county and the southern area of Coos county. Both school and pre-schoolers are seen at the clinics held monthly except during the summer, under the direction of the N. H. Dept. of Health and Welfare, Division of Maternal and Child Health, Crippled Children's Services.

The Orthopedic Clinic, held at the hospital twice a year in May and November, also sponsored by the same department, had 50 children seen at the two clinics. Arrangements to be seen at any of the clinics are made through the recommendation of the family physician, school nurse, community nurse, or at the request of any responsible person interested in the well-being of the child.

There are two Chest Diagnostic Clinics held every year under the auspices of the N. H. Tuberculosis and Health association. These are held at the Community House and are conducted under the direction of the state public health nurse for Grafton county. Our Littleton Community Nurse association supplies the clerical workers for the clinics.

This year we had a Mobile Chest Clinic sponsored by the State

Dept. of Health, Bureau of Communicable Diseases, and 714 people had chest X-rays. The unit was at the three Industrial plants in town on one day, and the next day was in front of the Chamber of Commerce booth for five hours and the response, to the members of the Chest Clinic, was most gratifying. Again, the members of the LCNA board manned the clinic.

The Cardiac Clinics are held in Lancaster and an infant from Littleton who had heart surgery last winter has been followed up at those clinics, as well as going to Boston to be checked.

It is important that health defects of any type be recognized and treated early in life, for a better chance of recovery. We of Littleton certainly have many opportunities, through the numerous State Dept. of Health services provided to us, for maintaining good health in preventing diseases and crippling defects. Such cases should be referred to the community nurse immediately upon discovery.

In the spring, a series of three Immunization Clinics were held at the town building, with a total of 130 pre-school children and infants receiving their immunization shots against diphtheria, tetanus and whooping cough as well as some being vaccinated against smallpox. The vaccines were received through the State Dept. of Health and our local pediatrician was in attendence.

In June, plans were initiated and teams organized for the Oral Sabin Polio Vaccine to be given over a three-month period. The first clinic was held on July 12, the second August 9 and the final one September 6.

At these three clinics, held at Teen Town, 8,958 persons from the towns of Littleton and Bethlehem received their immunization against polio.

In addition to the professional personnel involved, these clinics could not have been successful without the assistance of the volunteer workers who gave unstintingly of their time before, as well as after the clinics. Everyone who received the vaccine, whether one dose or the three recommended, has a card on file and the Doctors in Town have been provided a master sheet with names of all persons, as well as the number of doses each received. This was a statistical work of monumental proportion for which I am, and the community should be, most grateful.

There are some communities in other states which have not yet had the oral vaccine, and we can be thankful that we were afforded the opportunity of receiving this service at the low cost provided.

Thirty-five patients have had the use of our beds, wheelchairs, walkers, and other sick room supplies. Until this year, no charge has been made for the use of anything loaned out regardless of the time it has been in use. We now find that a token charge of \$1 per

month will have to be made in order to replace some of our worn equipment. This rule does not apply to any item out before December 31, 1962. We will be glad to accept more or less than the stated amount, but no one will have to go without because he cannot afford the fee, and there is no time limit set on use of the equipment. The only stipulation is that your physician give his approval of its use.

In November I spoke to one of the women's organizations with regard to the work of a community nurse, and now might be a good time to remind others that the work of a community nurse is for all the people in the community.

The objects of our L.C.N.A. are to promote health—individual, family and community, to prevent disease by teaching the principles of health, hygiene and sanitation, and to apply these principles effectively, in cooperation with our local health department, and medical and dental professions. In all family visiting, consideration is given to each member in the family.

At Christmastime, 45 families receive food, and some receive clothing, too, through the generosity of local clubs, individuals and the Student Council of the high school. Our thanks to all who helped with the Christmas program.

I wish to express my sincere appreciation for the interest and loyalty of the president of the LCNA, Mrs. Vonley Ruggles; to the board members of the association for their help at the many clinics, and to the volunteers at the Polio clinics.

My appreciation is also extended to all those individuals, professional and non-professional, who have participated in our program for better health.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION

To the Citizens of Littleton:

The school board of Littleton School District presents herewith its annual report. Included in this report will be found the audit of finances for the year 1961-1962 by the Division of Municipal Accounting of the State Tax Commission; budgets and estimated receipts and expenditures for this year and next year; and written reports by the superintendent of schools, the principal of the high school and the school nurse.

The budget for this coming year is of necessity higher than that of the present year. Major increase is in teachers' salaries. An additional teacher is needed in the junior high school and two additional teachers in the senior high school. Salary adjustments and these three additional teachers account for \$30,000.00 increase in the budget. The first principal payment on the bonds on the new addition at the high school accounts for another \$10,000.00. Other increases are spread throughout the budget and figures are not significantly higher than those of the present year.

We recommend the appropriation of \$535,135.88 for the support of schools for the ensuing year.

Submitted herewith is the report of the annual examination and audit of the accounts of the Littleton Union School District for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1962, which was made by this Division in accordance with the vote of the District. Exhibits as hereafter listed are included as part of the report.

SCOPE OF AUDIT

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the School Board and the School District Treasurer.

FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Comparative Balance Sheets: (Exhibit A-1)

Comparative Balance Sheets as of June 30, 1961 and June 30, 1962, are presented in Exhibit A-1. As indicated therein, the Net Debt decreased by \$67,092.06 during the fiscal year ended June 30, 1962.

Analysis of Change in Financial Condition: (Exhibit A-2)

An analysis of change in financial condition of the School District during the fiscal year is made in Exhibit A-2, with the factors which caused the change indicated therein.

Comparative Statements of Appropriations and Expenditures—Estimated and Actual Revenues: (Exhibits A-3 and A-4)

Comparative statements of appropriations and expenditures estimated and actual revenues for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1962, are presented in Exhibits A-3 and A-4. As indicated by the Budget Summary (Exhibit A-4), a net unexpended balance of appropriations of \$14,428.24, plus a revenue surplus of \$3,582.03, resulted in a net budget surplus of \$18,010.27.

Statement of Receipts and Expenditures: (Exhibit B-1)

A summary statement of receipts and expenditures for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1962, made up in accordance with the uniform

classification of accounts, is included in Exhibit B-1. Proof of the Treasurer's balance as of June 30, 1962, is indicated in Exhibit B-2.

Building Fund Account: (Exhibit B-3)

A summarized statement showing the activity in the Building Fund account during the fiscal year ended June 30, 1962, is presented in Exhibit B-3.

Statement of Bonded Debt: (Exhibit C)

A statement of the outstanding bonded indebtedness of the School District as of June 30, 1962, showing annual debt service requirements, is contained in Exhibit C.

GENERAL COMMENTS

Current Surplus:

The current surplus (excess of total assets over current liabilities) increased from \$2,808.21 to \$17,900.27, during the fiscal year as shown by the following statement:

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the School Board and Citizens of Littleton:

It is with pleasure that I submit to you my annual report relative to your schools.

Since my last report there have been nine changes in the teaching staff and one addition to the staff. This compares with eight changes and two additions for the previous year.

Mr. Bruce L. Smith of Deerfield, a graduate of Boston University, with a master's degree from the same school, was elected to replace Mr. Walter G. Phillips who resigned to accept a position in another state. Mr. Smith had previous experience in Gloucester, Mass., and as principal in Deerfield.

Mrs. Marguerite Ayling, a graduate of Salem Teachers College, with fifteen years' previous experience in Carroll and Jefferson, was elected to teach Grade six, replacing Miss Barbara Burroughs who resigned to accept a position in Vermont.

Mrs. Helen Placey, a graduate of Plymouth Teachers College, with six years' previous experience in Whitefield and Lancaster, was elected to teach Grade 5, replacing Miss Winifred Trask who retired from teaching.

Mrs. Lillian Frazer of Monroe, a graduate of Framingham State College, with five years' experience in Monroe, was elected to teach Grade four, replacing Mrs. Mildred C. Lakeway who retired from teaching.

Miss Martha Jane Holmes of Gorham, a graduate of Plymouth Teachers College, was elected to teach kindergarten, replacing Miss Helen D. Tibbetts who resigned to get married.

Mrs. Marion E. S. Childs of Penacook, a graduate of the University of New Hampshire, and with a master's degree from Boston University, with experience in Andover and Penacook, was elected guidance counselor, replacing Mr. Louis G. Bougie who resigned to accept a similar position in Connecticut.

Mr. Quentin Boyle of Lincoln, a graduate of Plymouth Teachers College, with experience in Gorham and Lebanon, was elected to teach junior high English, replacing Mr. Gerald A. Davis who resigned to accept a position in the southern part of the state.

Mrs. Mary Watkins of Whitefield, a graduate of Plymouth Teachers College, with twelve years' experience in Whitefield, Bethlehem and Windsor, Vermont, was elected to teach Business Education,

replacing Miss Isabel A. Hunt who resigned to accept a position in Lincoln.

Mr. Roger S. Farquharson of Littleton, a graduate of Plymouth Teachers College, was elected an additional teacher to teach mathematics in the high school.

Mrs. Jacqueline G. Armstrong of Littleton, a graduate of William Smith College, with advance training in Plymouth Teachers College and the University of Vermont, was elected high school librarian, replacing Mr. Basil Walker who resigned to accept a similar position in New York.

The major improvement in the physical plant this past year was the six room junior high school wing that was added to the high school building. This has made for a better junior high school program and has made possible much needed space in the high school.

Minor repairs and replacements in the schools during the summer included the following:

Elementary School

Painting walls and ceilings in four rooms
Painting gymnasium walls and doors
Painting both sides of all exterior doors.
Installation of new dishwasher in kitchen
Gymnasium floor refinished with gym floor finish

High School

Additional shelving built into the library Painting walls and trim in four classrooms Painting wainscoting in two corridors Painting stairwell on east side of building Gymnasium floor refinished with gym floor finish Varnishing wooden doors to classrooms

Since the summer vacation a new stainless steel sink has been installed in the elementary school kitchen and new counters installed and covered.

Since my last report three extension courses for teachers have been offered by Plymouth Teachers College and the University of New Hampshire. A large number of teachers have availed themselves of these opportunities for further study.

An elementary teachers workshop was held prior to the opening of school in September to acquaint teachers with the presentation of the so-called Greater Cleveland Mathematics Program for primary grades.

The school band has been provided with 52 new jackets and belts to replace the original capes that were beginning to show much

wear. A number of new caps were also purchased to replace those that were worn out and could not be used.

Five new electric typewriters were purchased for the business education department to replace an equal number of standard type machines. This purchase has helped to modernize this department.

The school lunch continues to be an integral part of the school program. Close to 800 pupils each day participate in the program in both schools. A new Market Forge steam cooker was installed in the high school kitchen to facilitate the preparing of over 450 meals served each day in that program. The lunch workers in both schools are to be commended for the manner in which the programs operate.

Your school department is providing classroom-to-home telephone service for two bedridden pupils so that they may continue their school work while confined to bed in almost complete body casts.

A recent appraisal of the high school properties revealed that a replacement value of approximately \$900,000 was placed on the building. As a result of this report insurance was increased to \$810,000.00 under a 90% coinsurance program. The elementary school is due for a similar appraisal in the near future and if replacement value has increased, coverage will be increased accordingly.

On other pages of this report will be found a list of teachers, statistical report, school calendar for the school year 1963-1964, high school principal's report and a report of the school nurse.

In closing I wish to thank the school board, principals, teaching staff and all other personnel, as well as the citizens of Littleton for their continued cooperation and support.

The total registration for the senior high school (grades 9-12) is 384. The junior high school registration is 176. This represents an increase of 14 in the high school and an increase of 7 in the junior high school. Sixteen have withdrawn from the high school to date and 3 from the junior high school.

Grade 7—SCAT—School and College Ability Test measuring verbal and quantitative ability.

Grade 8—STEP—Sequential Tests of Educational Progress measuring achievement in mathematics, science, social studies, reading. Grade 9—SCAT—STEP—Diagnostic Reading Test

Grade 10—SCAT—Cooperative Reading Test Grade 11—STEP—Diagnostic Reading Test

Grades 7 and 8 were given the S.R.A. Primary Mental Abilities Test in the fall to check correlation of ability and achievement.

Juniors were given the opportunity to take the National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test in the spring and both juniors and seniors the PSAT (Preliminary Scholastic Aptitude Test) of the College Entrance Examination Board.

When it is thought that the results obtainable would be helpful in counseling the student Wechsler Intelligence Scale for Children, Wechsler Adult Intelligence Scale, Kuder Preference (personal and vocational), Minnesota Counseling Inventory, Sentence Completion and other specialized tests were given.

Other Services

An attempt to provide better school-community relationship and more information for the non-college student has been made this year. To accomplish this group conferences have been held with parents as well as individual conferences as the situation indicated. We are indebted to the citizens of the community who have provided personnel for assemblies to present Littleton At Work to give in sight for the students whom we hope will be the citizens of tomorrow. This has already proven mutually beneficial with four of our students having obtained work in areas where they hope to follow a career. It is hoped that the program can be expanded as time goes on.

THE SCHOOL LIBRARY

The Littleton High School librarian is pleased to report a continued and growing interest and use of the school library. It is open during the entire school day and for half an hour before classes begin, and for half an hour after classes end. Students are free to come to the library during their study hall periods, the only restriction being that turns must be taken due to limited capacity. The average weekly attendance is 550 students, average weekly circulation of books, 150 volumes. Total number of volumes in the library at the present time, 2,471.

A new maple finish magazine rack has been added to the library to replace the racks removed for additional shelving. All reference books have been moved onto the new shelves in the alcove section of the library, and a table reserved in that area for students using reference books only. This provides a more secluded place for study and assures the student of a place near the material needed for reference work. Reserve shelves have been so labeled and set aside for teachers desiring books on reserve for their classes. Bibliographies have been compiled by the librarian for teachers requesting them for special projects. A vertical file has been started and cata-

logued. Materials in this file, pictures, pamphlets, clippings, are available to the students and teachers, and may be borrowed for classroom use. The librarian is grateful to the Parent-Teachers Association for magazines donated for this purpose.

A new book truck is now in use in the library. This piece of equipment has several purposes—it may be used in processing books, returning books to shelves, for display of new books, and to hold the librarian's reference books.

An original painting, "The Tree," by Mrs. George H. Tilton, Jr., has been donated to the library by the Neighborhood Art Association and is hung in the main part of the reading room. Several planters have been added to the room for decoration.

In the fall Mr. Bouley's 7th grade social studies classes exhibited models of The Seven Wonders of the World, in the library. These were of interest to both students and parents. Paintings and drawings by the students in Mr. MacEwan's art classes have been on display also.

Although the Littleton High School library is growing, and the present usefulness of its service is obvious, we are still at the stage where we must say our goal is "that we work toward excellence in providing a school library for the youth of our community." As our resources of learning continue to grow we are most grateful for the cooperation and larger resources of the Littleton Public Library, and the librarians there who encourage continuing education and supplement many areas in research and reference work for the students.

CURRICULUM

The program of studies meets the requirements of the minimum standards for a comprehensive high school. However, we are continuing to study the curriculum and make improvements where it is desirable. Although we have additional space as a result of the junior high school addition, additional faculty will be necessary to take full advantage of it.

ACCREDITATION

Littleton High School is accredited by the State Department of Education as a comprehensive high school and by the New England Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools. At the annual meeting of the New England Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools Littleton High School was voted continued membership and accreditation by the association as a result of the visiting committee report on the evaluation of the high school. Copies of the written report of the visiting committee are on file at the public library and the school library.

NATIONAL HONOR SOCIETY

The purpose of the Littleton Chapter of the National Honor Society of Secondary Schools is to create enthusiasm for scholarship, to stimulate a desire to render service, and to promote worthy leadership and character. Members include: Linnea Poulsen, Rodney Jesseman, Everett St. Francis.

Preventing Forest Fires Is Our Responsibility

Costs of suppressing carelessly set outdoor fires in New Hampshire in 1962 cost the persons responsible \$5,545. In the same period, the cost to the cities and towns for control of such fires for which no responsibility could be placed cost another \$24,634. What utter waste of tax money and what shameful and needless loss of timber and esthetic values in the 2,200 acres burned. Residences, farms, and other business places were threatened with possible total destruction.

Carelessly set man caused fires can be prevented if every citizen remembers his responsibility in regard to any source of fires in the open. We can help to keep our fire loss low by remembering these simple rules.

- 1. Dispose of burnable waste at the town dump.
- If waste or brush is to be burned on the premises, obtain a permit from the forest fire warden. Seasonal permits may be issued for approved incinerators and sites.
- 3. Burn safely by picking a clean site, avoiding dry windy weather and preferably burning late in the day.
- Have something to keep the fire under control—pails of water, garden hose, sprinkling can, broom for grass fires or shovel will help.
- 5. Be sure your fire is dead out before you leave it.
- 6. If the fire gets out of control or if you see a fire out of control, report promptly to your warden or fire department. Continue to fight it until help arrives.

There is potential danger when matches fall into the hands of children. It is never too early for parents to install in the child's mind a respect for fire.

Keep our town safe from fire.

In 1962 we had 3 fires; we burned 6 acres; permits issued—494.

SEVENTH ANNUAL REPORT OF THE LITTLETON PLANNING BOARD

February 20, 1963

Citizens of Littleton:

This was your Planning Board's seventh year. During the year the selectmen appointed two new members, James M. Alt and Hugh J. Gallen, who were most welcome. The Board had need of and quickly made use of their talents.

The Board consisted of the following members and elected its officers as follows:

During the last year your Planning Board has continued studies and research into several of our community problems, searching for the best ways to help. This required numbers of regular meetings, meetings without quorum and many informal discussions.

In the first part of the year the Board reviewed and discussed means of implementing the Board's previous recommendations and took a look at some additional problems. Included were stream pollution elimination, industrial waste disposal, the ever present problem of parking, a parking authority, traffic flow, Mill St. specifically, town building, fire station and facilities, town dump, swimming, zoning, sub-division, building codes, urban renewal.

Your Board continues very optimistic as to Littleton's future. Littleton has many assets. Its present status is excellent. It has a central location geographically, a diversified industry, unusual commercial facilities in relation to the number of citizens, an unusual number of central service facilities, a very favorable tax structure, excellent school plant and good public facilities.

However, like all communities, we are faced with the challenge of rapidly changing times. The changes seem to magnify the effects of the mistakes and inadequacies of the past. Good planning tends to become more valuable.

Cognizant of this, the Board had planned to request a citizen's group to work with it toward solving as much as reasonably possible the prime problem created by inadequate parking facilities. But our course was determined for us by unanticipated events.

As previously reported in detail, several years ago the Planning Board studied the stream pollution elimination problem. As recommended by the Board the town engaged the services of the engineering firm of Camp, Dresser and McKee, specialists in the field, to make a preliminary survey and suggest long range plans. The survey was conducted under the regular federal aid program under which the federal government paid the \$19,000 with Littleton's share held interest free for payment if and when the full project is completed.

When permission, after considerable negotiating, was granted by the N. H. Water Pollution Commission to build the Auburn St. sewer a couple years ago, it was suggested by the Commission that the next phase in engineering details be undertaken soon so as to be ready to undertake the full project at the most favorable time. An article for this purpose was turned down at the March 1962 town meeting, because of interest in special issues and lack of understanding of need for hurry. From the information previously considered the Board members had assumed Littleton had taken all action reasonably necessary and that we should wait until the N. H. Water Pollution Commission, after future legislative classification of the Ammonoosuc, might notify us that Littleton's turn to clean up had come.

A prospective purchaser of the idle Saranac name and tannery and several Littleton citizens and officials met with the N. H. Water Pollution Commission in regard to permission for discharge of the tannery waste into the river. Permission was granted until the March town meeting, further permission being dependent on Littleton in the meantime taking favorable steps toward pollution clean up. At this time the Commission informed the Littleton group that in accord with their rules and regulations they have no intention of allowing increases in residential, commercial or industrial sewage discharge or waste disposal from then on. Also, that Littleton, being in excellent condition, was being looked to for leadership in the anti-pollution program. Questions also brought out that in the development of the full state program, it is expected that Littleton will be required to clean up within the next two to five years anyway.

Thus to pave the way for the prospective tannery operation and to avoid restriction of the community growth, it had become imperative to study means and costs of obtaining a sewage treatment plant and facilities.

On investigation it was found that the Littleton project could be eligible under the terms of the Accelerated Public Works Act passed by Congress in September 1962 for funds available on a first-come-first-served basis. This Act provides for increases over the normal federal aid which, if Littleton could qualify, would mean an estimated saving to Littleton of over \$400,000 on the cost of the project.

Your Planning Board held several informational discussions, then acted as the guide for a large citizens group enlisted to consider action. Much individual work was done. Many group meetings were held. Public meetings, newspaper accounts and literature of various types carried the information to the citizens. Legal action was taken.

On the recommendation of the citizen groups the necessary steps were taken and an act passed into law by the N. H. Legislature amending the Littleton charter so that the cost of the project will be spread over the whole town. This was because of a question of interpretation of the existing charter. Application was made to the federal agencies involved and both the amendment and the project were favorably voted at the two special town meetings held Jan. 16, 1963.

We extend our sincere respects to the many who so willingly worked with us for the success of the program. Community approval of the project is a tribute to the wonderful and unselfish cooperation of many citizens. The eventual consummation of the project should be a boon to Littleton's economic progress and make Littleton a leader in achieving better recreational, health and water conservation conditions.

The Board now will continue work on some of the many other community problems with the emphasis in the year ahead expected to be pointed to traffic and parking aid and to the possibilities in urban renewal.

Again we thank those who have helped in so many ways. We repeat that we are eager for and appreciative of help, information and suggestions from anyone.
