

WARRANT FOR TOWN MEETING TOWN OF MADBURY

March 9, 1948

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Madbury, County of Strafford and State of New Hampshire, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Madbury on Tuesday the 9th day of March A.D., 1948 at 10 o'clock in the forenoon to choose by ballot a Delegate to the Constitutional Convention, as prescribed by law, and to act on the following articles.

- ART. 1. To choose a Town Clerk for the ensuing year.
- ART. 2. To choose a Selectman for the ensuing three years.
- ART. 3. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
- ART. 4. To choose a Collector of Taxes for the ensuing year.
- ART. 5. To choose two Auditors for the ensuing year.
- ART. 6. To choose a Trustee of Trust Funds for the ensuing three years.
- ART. 7. To choose all other necessary town officers.
- ART. 8. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

- ART. 9. To see if the town will vote to raise \$282.78 for Class V Highway to match the sum of \$1,131.10 to be contributed by the State.
- ART. 10. To see if the town will appropriate the sum of of \$42.50 in cooperation with other towns in this area, for the Seacoast Regional Association.
- ART. 11. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$300.00 for the use of the Madbury Volunteer Fire Department.
- ART. 12. To see if the town will appropriate \$200.00 for reconstruction and improvement of the town memorial parks.
- ART. 13. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to sell a certain parcel of land next to the Tibbett's field.
- ART. 14. To see what action the Town will take on the proposed budget for the current year.
- ART. 15. To transact any other business which may legally come before the meeting.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

TO THE SCHOOL BOARD AND CITIZENS OF MADBURY:

I am pleased to present my first annual report as your superintendent of schools.

Having been superintendent in this area only since September 1947, my comments will be confined to statistics for the school year 1946-47, and to the present system under which the Madbury children are being educated.

As a result of the regular school district meeting held in March 1947 and a special School District Meeting held in July 1947, your school board started sending, (September, 1947) all Madbury children to out-of-town schools. There are at the present time thirty-nine enrolled in the elementary schools of Dover, seven in Durham and one in Barrington. The total enrollment in the two Madbury schools last year was 42 with an average membership of 37.8 with 39 pupils having been promoted at the end of the school year; 6 of whom were to grade 9. Elementary tuition charges for the current year are as follows: Dover \$63.67; Durham \$75.00; Barrington \$55.81.

There has been an appreciable increase in the number of Madbury High School pupils, with twenty attending Dover High School this year as compared to fourteen who attended that school last year. The tuition rate has been increased from \$123.79 of last year to \$138.89 for the current year. (\$138.89 is the State average cost per high school pupil for last year).

From occasional conversations with Superintendent Fox of Dover and a recent visit to two of the Dover schools at which Madbury pupils are enrolled, the Superintendent learned that the Madbury children are generally up to the grade level to which they were assigned and that their work is very similar in grade to that of Dover children in the

same respective grades. Similar reports are given regarding those children who are attending the Durham Center School.

In accordance with a vote taken at the District Meeting last year, your School Board has employed the architectural firm of Hersey, Phaneuf & Snodgrass of Durham to prepare and present plans for a new two-room school building for Madbury. These plans are to be financed with funds forwarded for this purpose by the Federal Government.

In conclusion, I wish to thank the members of the School Board for their cooperation during the few months that I have had the privilege of being Superintendent of Schools in Madbury.

REPORT OF DISTRICT FIRE CHIEF AND FOREST FIRE WARDEN

To the Selectmen:

Each year many wardens request the preparation of a statement about forest fires for publication in the annual town report. These requests this year have been more numerous than usual in view of the serious fire situation which developed last October and which could occur again under similar circumstances.

We believe that the publication of the following statement will be helpful and respectfully solicit your cooperation to that end.

FOREST FIRE PROBLEM SERIOUS

The year 1947 was one of the worst periods of drouth and forest fire occurrence in eastern United States history. Lack of water ruined crops, lowered water levels and dried up brooks everywhere. Three months of deficient rainfall and abnormally high temperatures resulted in many fires which were mostly well controlled and kept within bounds. Only the high winds beginning on October 23rd caused a few fires to escape beyond immediate control. These few fires resulted in burning some 15,000 acres and the loss of 63 or more buildings in four New Hampshire towns.

All October fires were costly. They burned deeply in the ground and required day and night patrol of large crews of men until the rains came late in October. Towns which escaped from serious fires might easily have been in the midst of the most serious conflagrations we had.

Governor Dale closed the woods effective at midnight of October 15th. With the blow-up of October 23rd, a second proclamation closed all back roads and authorized towns to inaugurate patrol. The effect of this was to cut down subsequent fires for the rest of the dry period.

Local fire warden forces performed an admirable job to hold the more than 200 fires that occurred during this October period. Many men were taxed to the utmost as the emergency continued. To them and all those who did their work, the people of New Hampshire owe a debt of gratitude. The state forest fire control agency based on local town wardens and town crews wherever adequately equipped rose to the occasion and met the test in whatever town their services were needed.

It is now time to take stock everywhere of our fire fighting facilities for the season ahead and to make them adequate where necessary. To this end town fire plans and training programs for wardens, deputies and other key men in each district are being arranged or in progress. If equipment and tools are insufficient properly to equip the avail-

able man power in each community with the right tools for the job, they should be provided for at once. The yearly addition of fire tools to the town supply will generally need to be built up. The state sells tools to the towns and shares one-half their cost. Good equipment is important and can help greatly to keep both damage and fire costs at a minimum.

For many years we have requested our wardens not to issue burning permits except on rainy days. This regulation will be in effect again this year as it is one of the best means of assuring such fires from getting out of control. Nine out of every ten fires can be prevented, 98 percent of all fires being due to human carelessness. Be sure to get a permit for any fire in or near woodland when the ground is free from snow. Be sure your fires are always out before you leave them. Help us in getting the travelling public to keep from throwing out lighted matches or cigarettes. Be careful of all fires in or near woodland.
