





TENTATIVE WARRANT

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the town of Madison qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the town hall in said Madison, on Tuesday, the 8th day of March next, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary town officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations for same,

As follows:

Town Officers' salaries. Town Officers' expenses. Election expenses. Town Hall expenses. Forest fires. Fire Department. Health Department. Summer Highways and Bridges. Winter Highways. Street Lights. General expense Highway Dept. Libraries. Town Poor. Old Age Assistance. Patriotic Purposes. Soldiers' Aid. Parks and Playgrounds. Legal Expenses and Damage. Taxes bought by Town. Interest. New Equipment. Indebtedness.

State Tax. County Tax.

3. To see what action the town will take in regard to discounts on taxes.

4. To see what sums of money the town will authorize the selectmen to hire in anticipation of taxes.

5. To see what sums of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to build a new road at the foot of Silver Lake and take any other action thereon.

6. To see what sums of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Lakes Region Association of New Hampshire in cooperation with other towns in the Lakes Region.

7. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100 for the celebration of the anniversary of the ratification of the Federal Constitution by the State, June 21, 1938, said sum to be expended under the direction of the selectmen.

8. To see what action the town will take in regard to Real Estate taken over by the town for non-payment of taxes.

9. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100 for repairs on ball field and new equipment for ball team.

Since no regular set up for a yearly dental clinic had been routive it seemed best to concentrate on dentistry. The children's teeth seemed fairly well cared for.

Arrangements were made to hold group appointments at the office of Dr. C. L. Reynolds in Conway. Dr. Reynolds much preferred to work in his own office where all his equipment was at hand and where he could carry on his own practice should road or weather conditions cancel our time. We truly had a clinic price, it being practically half the fee paid to dentists for relief work by the state commissioner of relief.

Under this arrangement the following work was done. Transportation was given by the nurse in almost every instance.

- 73 Pupils examined
- 13 Pupils required extractions of temporary teeth
- 9 Pupils required extractions of permanent teeth
- 2 Pupils required filling of cavities in temporary teeth
- 29 Pupils required filling of cavities in permanent teeth
- 29 Pupils required prophylaxis

- 70 Pupils were treated
- 59 Pupils had the work completed
- 29 Pupils received prophylactic treatment
- 29 Temporary teeth were extracted
- 22 Permanent teeth were extracted
- 2 Cement fillings were used
- 78 Amalgam fillings were used
- 17 Porcelain fillings
- **177** Total operations
- 2 Received free care
- 44 Paid for all work done
- 24 Paid for part of the work done

The above piece of work was possible only by the cooperation of the dentist and the assistance rendered by the Men's Club and the Red Cross. Those benefitted by these kindnesses were very grateful and appreciative.

Silver Lake Woman's Club has done an outstanding piece of preventive work in a new field by providing transportation, surgery and medical treatment over a period of time for two boys who were becoming deaf. The team work and cooperation displayed by this group should be an inspiration and challenge to future welfare committees. The boys now hear as normal children should. Our thanks are also due to Doctor Remick for his painstaking care in administering vaccine as desired by Dr. R. A. Hermandez. Madison citizens may well be proud of the fine interest centered in the school.

Adjustable, single seats are greatly needed. It is hoped economic conditions may permit their installation in the near future.

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SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

I hereby submit my seventeenth annual report as superintendent of schools, it being the twenty-fifth in the series of such reports.

The Educational Policies Commission representing the National Education Association has reached several conclusions relating to the structure and administration of public education. Some of these are as follows:

1. "American public education should be made effectively free." Madison furnishes free schools with books and supplies. Attention is given to health, recreation and community activities with good citizenship.

2. "American public education is concerned with every individual from early childhood through adult life." Madison provides for boys and girls from Grade I through high school. The United States enrolls all children between 7 and 13, and more than 60% of those 14 to 17. Madison enrolls all of the first group and a very large percentage of those in the second group. It would be a fine thing if we could have evening classes for older youth and adults.

3. "Local units of school administration should provide professional leadership." Madison provides supervision under the district plan and good teachers under the care of a school board chosen by the citizens.

4. "Education should be independent from other government functions." Madison, as a town, and New Hampshire, as a state, keep school management out of politics, to a commendable degree.

5. "Schools must cooperate with other agencies in serving human needs." This suggests that the home, church and school should cooperate. The schools have a heavy burden for the development and welfare of the boys and girls, but homes and churches should not avoid the primary responsibility.

6. "State responsibility in education involves professional leadership." It is desirable that the Commissioner of Education be appointed by the State Board of Education. It is so done in New Hampshire.

7. "State responsibility in education involves the equalization of the burden of school support." New Hampshire, by a very wise provision furnishes state aid for smaller towns and Madison profits this year by more than \$2300.

The schools in Madison are going well this year. A loyal group of teachers is working hard for the school welfare. Schools need more active support from the homes in securing regular and punctual attendance.

By a wise plan the school property has been kept in good condition. It should be our aim to beautify school grounds and lawns. Provision should be made for a sanitary at Nickerson School. We also need ventilating heaters and adjustable furniture.

The health work is still under the care of Miss Nelson, our school nurse. Inspections have been made and special attention given to correction of defects. Some splendid results have been accomplished.

Visual education, prize-speaking, editorial and community work have been appreciated as usual.

The high school, though a bit smaller this year, has been doing good work under the careful management of the new headmaster, Hammond A. Young. Last June we graduated the largest class in the history of the school. A goodly number of these went on to higher institutions of learning.

Recent graduates from the high school now in post-secondary schools include Carlyle Chick in Pratt Institute, Brooklyn, N. Y., Millie Pearson in Muskingum College, New Concord, Ohio, Ruth Van Dusen in Teachers' College, Framingham, Mass., Edgar Tyler in Concord Business College, Minerva Pearson in Muskingum College, Ruth Tyler in Nasson Institute at Springvale, Me. Eleanor Whiting is in training for a nurse in the Massachusetts General Hospital.

The following were graduated from Madison High School last June: June Chick, Robert Chick, Lawrence Drew, Janet Gerry, Helen Giles, Walter Kennett, Forrest Leavitt, Robert Leavitt, Thelma Leavitt, Henry Meader, Lincoln Pearson, Philip Thompson, Margaret Tyler. June Chick is attending Chandler Secretarial School in Boston. Robert Chick is attending Wentworth Institute in Boston. Janet Gerry is taking a post-graduate course at Fryeburg Academy in Maine, preparatory to entering a hospital for training. Helen Giles is attending Northeastern Business College, Portland, Me. Walter Kennett is attending University of New Hampshire at Durham. Forrest Leavitt is attending Concord Business College. Several others in this class are working this year in order to study later.

Statistics

For the year ending June 30, 1937, our schools had an average attendance of 128, an average membership of 134 and a percent of 95. If all pupils were as regular as the majority, we might easily have 97%. Let's go!
