TOWN WARRANT

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Orford, in the County of Grafton, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs;

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Orford, on Tuesday, the tenth (10) of March next, at ten of the Clock in the forenoon, to Act on the following subjects:

Article 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year; Also to choose one Selectman for three years, one Trustee of Trust Funds for three years, one Library Trustee for 2 years and one Library Trustee for three years.

Article 2. To hear the budget of the Town and raise and appropriate any money recommended therein or pass any vote relative thereto.

Article 3. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town Charges for the ensuing year.

Article 4. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for maintenance of Town Highways and Bridges for the ensuing year.

Article 5. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the removal of snow and care of Town Winter Roads for the ensuing year.

Article 6. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for insurance purposes.

Article 7. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the use of electric lights.

Article 8. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Orford Free Library and Orford Social Library.

Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes.

Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to dispense with the distribution of Inventory blanks until the Selectmen appraise the property.

Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to sell and administer property acquired by Tax Deed or otherwise.

TOWN WARRANT — (Continued)

Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for the use of the Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Region.

Article 13. To see if the Town will vote to accept the State Aid for the construction of Class V roads and raise and appropriate the sum of \$553.40 for that purpose.

Article 14. To see what action the Town will take concerning the Orford Common and to raise and appropriate any money made necessary by such action.

Article 15. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for care of Common.

Article 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 to cover the expenses of Memorial Day.

Article 17. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the use of the Fire Department.

Article 18. To see what action the Town will take concerning the purchase of a new truck and a one-way snow plow, and raise and appropriate any money made necessary by such action.

Article 19. To see what sum the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to be turned over to the Trustees of Trust Funds for purchase of road equipment.

Article 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for the control of Pine Blister Rust and \$150.00 for care of trees.

Article 21. To see what action the Town will take concerning the purchase of something to mow all of the Common with and how much money they will vote to raise and appropriate for such action.

Article 22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for the Bicentennial Fund of the Town of Orford.

Article 23. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to be turned over to the Trustees of Trust Funds or spent for fencing and smoothing of the extension to West Cemetery.

TOWN WARRANT — (Continued)

Article 24. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 to erect a granite historical marker on the Orford East Common, opposite the present marker standing on the West Common, stating the extent and purposes of the Common as deeded with the dates when the land was deeded and by whom.

Article 25. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$100.00 to be paid over to the Federal Airport Project.

Article 26. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for increased police protection.

Article 27. To see if the Town will vote to make the old road leading from Route 25A near the Mt. Cube House, going by the Indian Pond School House, and coming out near William Preston's a fire lane to be kept brushed out.

Article 28. To choose Delegates to the Constitutional Convention.

Article 29. To vote on the question "Shall Sweepstakes Tickets be sold in this town."

Article 30. To hear reports of Agents, Auditors and Committees heretofore chosen and to pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 31. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

In June 1963 the Trustees of the Orford Social Library received the resignation of Mrs. Lillian Anderson as Librarian. This we accepted with many regrets. Mrs. Anderson had served the Library for several years efficiently and devotedly and we were very sorry that she felt that she had to give it up. We were fortunate in interesting Mrs. Elizabeth Prickett in the Library and she took over as Librarian in July with Miss Patricia Hammond and Mrs. Ann Harrauld as Volunteers. Mrs. Hazel Donnelly resigned as Trustee as she felt that she could not give time to it and Mrs. Alice Hodgson took her place. The Library was closed during July and August for a complete renovation and we recommend that the Townspeople pay us a visit and note the changes.

Report of the Public Health Nurse

The following is a report of activities conducted in Orford by the New Hampshire Division of Public Health-Public Health Nursing, for the year 1963.

In the spring of 1963 a Sterneedle Tuberculin Testing program was conducted at Orford Schools. The tests were given by Dr. William Prince, Director of Communicable Disease Program of New Hampshire Division of Public Health, assisted by State Public Health Nurse and Orford School Nurse. A total of 176 were given the test. This was followed through with home visits by the nurses to the reactors and families and arrangements made to have Chest X-rays either at clinics or private physicians.

Several from Orford have attended the Chest X-ray clinics held at Lebanon and Plymouth twice yearly, by the New Hampshire Tuberculosis & Health Association in cooperation with the New Hampshire Division of Public Health. All attending receive a report of findings of x-rays, and home follow-up visits are made if indicated.

September 30, 1963 and November 11, 1963 Sabin Oral Polio Vaccine clinics were held at the Orford Congregational Church Vestry. The following number received Sabin Type 3 — 25, Type 2 — 36. This will be completed early in 1964. Orford had an extensive Sabin Clinic program in 1962 — thus the smaller attendance.

My sincerest thanks to all who have assisted in our program.

Home visits have been made on babies, preschool children and others. Arrangements have been made for clinic care as indicated.

Report of the Forest Fire Warden and District Chief

During the past year New Hampshire faced the greatest forest fire threat to its woodlands in more than sixty years. The continued drought brought home to our citizens, as never before, the potential threat of destructive fires to their beautiful and valuable forests, homes and livelihood. In true American tradition of meeting a common threat by volunteer effort, this fire danger was minimized by active prevention, patrol and a relinquishing of personal rights for the common good. It was the greatest demonstration of public cooperation ever experienced by those responsible for local and state fire control. The ready forces of volunteer fire services kept the losses low. For their effort and public response the general fire service expresses its heartfelt thanks for a job well done.

Prevention, however, is not just an activity for the bad fire years. It must be practiced until it becomes a part of our public conscience — a habit. Just plain carelessness with fire causes too many of our fires.

The following practices and suggestions will help:

1. Always have a permit for outdoor burning and burn within the terms of the permit and in a safe place. Burn late in the afternoon when the wind is down or on rainy or damp days. Check your fire and if winds develop extinguish it promptly.
2. Carry your rubbish to the public dump — it's safer. A neglected backyard incinerator causes many fires.
3. Never discard lighted cigarette or match. Make this a year round habit regardless of the safety of your surroundings.
4. Children caused fires are now a major concern. Keep matches away from them and teach them to respect fire and not make it a subject of play.

Let's all join with "Smokey the Bear" and "Keep New Hampshire Green" and growing in 1964.

To the inhabitants of the School District of Orford qualified to vote in District affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Memorial Hall in said District, on Tuesday, March 3, 1964, at 8:00 P.M., to act on the following subjects:

Article 1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.

Article 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.

Article 3. To choose a member of the School Board for three years, and to fill any vacancies which may occur on the School Board.

Article 4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.

Article 5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board, and Truant Officer and fix the compensation of any other officers or agents of the District.

Article 6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relative thereto.

Article 7. To choose Agents, Auditors, and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this Warrant.

Article 8. To see what sum of money the District will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the District, and to authorize application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization fund together with other income; the School Board to certify to the Selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the Town.

(This will include \$800.00 for the National Defense Education Act.)

Article 9. To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000.00) to pay for the emergency repairs and improvements to the School Boiler and Heating System; and to meet said appropriation to borrow the sum of Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000.00) by the issuance of general obligation notes of the School District of Orford under the Municipal Finance Act and any other enabling authority, and to take any action incidental to or in connection with the foregoing matters.

SCHOOL DISTRICT WARRANT — (Continued)

Article 10. To see if the District will authorize continuation of a planning committee of six to study the educational problems of this District in conjunction with such surrounding Districts as may be interested to determine the feasibility of forming a regional school district.

Article 11. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

I present herein my report for 1963, my tenth annual report as Superintendent of Schools in Orford. The report of the Principal, Mr. Richard C. Hamilton, follows my report.

I am confident that the year has been one of accomplishment and improvement. Just as in any school, there is, and always will be, room for further improvement. Mr. Hamilton and the faculty are working toward this end.

I am glad to report that the number of tuition pupils has again increased. At the time of the writing of this report, it looks as though we would have about \$4,000.00 more in tuition than was budgeted. Mr. Hamilton has played a large part in bringing this about, as has the improved program in the High School.

The State Department of Education approved Orford High School as a Comprehensive High School. To get this approval, it became necessary to make changes in certain class sizes and certain other teacher assignments. It was required, as in previous years, that the Principal be full-time for administrative and supervisory duties. By having added clerical help and other members of the faculty help with some of the administrative duties he has been freed, however, to do more work on guidance and counseling. This is highly important and there has been a marked improvement in that aspect of the work. I sincerely hope that it will lead to more Orford High School graduates going on to post-secondary education and will lead to a decrease in the drop-out rate.

It must be recognized that with the internal administration of the schools, the supervision of instruction and curriculum improvement as well as the guidance that the principal has a very full-time job.

There is being instituted in the school a much more comprehensive program of standard tests. These tests will enable the teachers and the principal to know much more about the individual pupil and will be of great help in improving the work for that pupil. They will also give us a better idea as to how successful our work is as compared with national standards, and thus help to buttress our strength and work toward the improvement of any weakness that may appear.

I should like to reinforce and emphasize what Mr. Hamilton says in his report about the need for an added elementary teacher. I have spoken of this in previous reports and have discussed it with the School Board. The costs for the High School, however, have in the past been so high that I am afraid that we have neglected the elementary grades. Yet, they are the foundation and formative grades. Another problem in connection with adding to the elementary staff has been that of not having enough classrooms. I sincerely hope that in 1964-65 a teacher can be employed and the means can be found of providing a classroom.

For many years we have discussed the need for improvement in the facilities for the shop and vocational agriculture program. Mr. Hamilton also mentions this in his report and certainly something must be done in the not too distant future if we are to continue and improve the program and if we are to continue to be approved as an Area Vocational Agricultural School.

I am very glad, indeed, that studies are being pushed forward on the question of forming a cooperative school district in the Orford area. It now seems that more communities are becoming interested in

such a project and most certainly the Orford Board and Orford Study Committee are doing their part.

CONCLUSION

This is my final report as Superintendent of Schools in Orford. I want to express sincere appreciation to the members of the School Boards, both past and present, to the people of the community and to the faculty for the support, help, and cooperation that they have given. I am sure that the same spirit will be shown to my successor and that under his leadership the Orford Schools will go forward to an even brighter future and to even greater service to the community and its boys and girls.

ACCOMPLISHMENTS

The addition of a part-time secretary has been a much-appreciated improvement.

Perhaps in the future the part-time secretarial position will be combined with a part-time librarianship. This would relieve teachers of a function that is not commensurate with their training.

It was unfortunate that we had to replace the boiler in the high school before planned. On the other hand, only two days of school were lost and a long-needed replacement has been made.

Additional tarring has been done at the Street and more should be done in the future. A new drive should be completed at the Ville School this spring.

Use has been made of NDEA funds by the purchase of an additional opaque projector, a tape recorder with sixteen listening posts, and the beginning of a tape collection for French classes.

We will emphasize Modern Mathematics to a greater extent in the near future. This will mean additional preparation for teachers of math at all levels.

Work is progressing on a student handbook. It is hoped that this will be available for the 1964-1965 school year.

The revitalization of our home economics department under Miss Myra Thomas has added to a vital need for our students.

Also, thanks to Miss Thomas, all of our eighth grade students will have personal typing for the rest of the school year.

NEED FOR ADDITIONAL ELEMENTARY TEACHER

The largest single need in the Orford School District is an additional elementary teacher.

The most important of the twelve grades are the first, second, third and fourth. To expect any teacher to carry two grades and be able to provide the necessary fundamentals is asking the impossible. An adequate job can be done, perhaps, but not a good one.

One teacher can prepare only so much for any given day. When we ask for preparation for two classes, we are asking a lot.

The biggest element involved is actual school time.

With two classes it stands to reason that at least one class will be without the direct essential assistance of the teacher at any given time.

To break it down further, let us assume that the two classes represent six reading groups. Now we have the situation where the teacher may theoretically be working directly with only one-sixth of the group.

What do we do with the "academically talented" and the slow learner?

We can say on paper that while the teacher is not directly involved she should have assigned work to keep a particular student busy. This is true and is being done, but think of attention spans, independent study, and six, seven, eight, and nine year olds. The whole situation just does not jibe.

I have never agreed with the state in emphasizing the high schools before the elementary and Junior high schools. There is no doubt that Orford High School has been improved, but I am afraid that due to money and time involved, our elementary school has only held its own.

We have some good elementary teachers and, considering every-

thing, they are doing a fine job. I hesitate to ask more of them, but we must improve to meet greater demands.

All school districts seem to have a constant problem of housing. Orford is no different. If the high school continues to grow, additional room will be needed.

Although we are classified as an area Vocational Agricultural School, our shop appearance and equipment do not in my mind warrant such a designation.

Following are the reasons why I have hesitated to attempt to remedy the situation:

- (1) Possibility of a cooperative school district that would eliminate the need of a shop in Orford.
- (2) Need for additional regular classroom space that would necessitate the use of the present shop.
- (3) Possibility of a new shop added onto Memorial Hall.
- (4) Conviction that VoAg will give way to more diversified program.

The acoustical problem remains in Memorial Hall. In my opinion, the expense and lack of a guarantee do not warrant an attempted remedy at this time.

COORDINATION OF INSTRUCTION

A major problem in any school system is coordination of instruction.

This coordination is necessary for the following reasons:

- (1) To insure proper coverage of subject matter.
- (2) To insure the subject matter is presented at the proper time.
- (3) To avoid unnecessary repetition.
- (4) To insure both horizontal and vertical correlation between courses when applicable.
- (5) To better allow for utilization of different teaching methods such as team teaching.
- (6) To allow replacement of a member of the faculty without losing the instructional continuum.

In some manner of outline form every subject covered should be on paper.

Unfortunately in New Hampshire most of this work has to be done on the local level.

Our plan in Orford is to outline as briefly as possible and eventually expand to a form that will be sufficient but not to the degree that individual teacher initiative and method will be controlled or stifled.

The designation of Mrs. Hazel Donnelly as elementary curriculum coordinator to assist on the elementary level and bridging the large gap between the eighth and ninth grades is an invaluable aid.

Obviously such syllabi are valuable only in so far as they undergo constant and extensive reevaluation.

Chapter 15, Laws of 1959 amends RSA 76 by inserting after section 11 the following new section: 76:11a *Information Required*. The tax bill which is sent to every person taxed, or his agent, if known, as provided in section 11, shall show the rate for municipal, school and county taxes separately. Any town, through its selectmen, may request that the tax commission compute the rates which will appear on the tax bills as provided hereunder and upon said request the tax commission shall furnish the required information.

A combined or total rate is shown above for those towns with a single school district and with no precincts or village districts. It is recommended that the combined rate be shown on each tax bill in addition to the separate rates. Precinct and multiple school district towns and cities should also arrange their tax bills so that each taxpayer will know his total rate as well as the rate breakdown.
