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TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Stark in the County of Coos in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Stark Town Hall in said Town on Tuesday, the fourth day of March, next at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To see if the Town will vote to elect a Road Agent by ballot in accordance with RSA 245:6. (Voting on this article to be by written ballot throughout the period when the polls are open to receive such ballots.) (This article inserted on petition of 17 voters.)
- 3. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations for the same.
- 4. To see what Rate of Commission the Town will vote to pay the Tax Collector for the collection of taxes.
- 5. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for expenses to the highway department.

A. General Expenses	\$ 6,000
B. Winter Maintenance	10,500
C. Summer Maintenance	5.500

- 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$900 for the police department.
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$1,500 for an addition of land on the West side of the Emerson Cemetery.
- 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$3,000 additional dump facilities.
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the withdrawal from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 for use as set-offs against budgeted appropriations for the following priority purposes and in amounts indicated or take any other action hereon:

- 10. To see if the Town will vote to establish a Capital Reserve Fund for improvements to the Town Hall, and to raise and appropriate the sum of (\$5,271.70) five thousand two hundred seventy-one dollars and seventy cents to be placed in said funds.
- 11. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Stark Bicentennial workers to use the Bicentennial profits for improvements to the Town Hall and a portion to be set aside for recreational facilities for youth. (This article inserted by petition of 12 voters).
- To see if the Town will vote to participate in the National Bicentennial Celebration (1976) and to raise the sum of \$500 such purposes. (This article inserted under petition of 12 voters.)
- 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$200 for community recreation and beautification.
- 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$100 for a donation to the Weeks Memorial Hospital.
- 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$200 for ambulance services from the Town of Northumberland.
- 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$50 for the Health Officer.
- 17. To see if the Town will vote to give a discount of 2% for payment of taxes if paid within 10 days after tax bill has been presented.
- To see if the Town wishes to reconstruct the so-called Goodwin Road or have the owners maintain the road for a payment equal to each year's taxes.
- To see if the Town will vote to accept aid for Class V highways and appropriate the sum of \$469.73 and set this amount aside for this purpose. (The State will match with \$3,130.)

20. To see if the Town will vote to raise for:

- 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$2,000 for Old Age Assistance.
- 22. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$2,000 for current expenses.
- 23. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$700 for election and registration.
- 24. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$350 for expenses for the Town Hall and other Town Buildings.
- 25. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$250 for legal expenses.
- 26. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$75 for the Register of Deeds for transfer cards.
- 27. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$1,200 for insurance.
- 28. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$1000 for the maintenance of the Town Dump.
- 29. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$300 for fire expenses of the Town.
- 30. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$900 for street lights for the ensuing year.
- 31. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$300 for public library services.
- 32. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$600, in addition to the interest on the Cemetery Trust Funds, for the upkeep of the cemeteries.
- 33. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$450 for the Upper Connecticut Valley Mental Health Services.
- 34. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$217.96 for the White Mountains Region Association.
- 35. To see if the Town will vote to become a member of the

North Country Council, organized in July, 1973. The Council has been designated by the State Office of Comprehensive Planning to be the official planning commission for New Hampshire Region One. The objectives of the Council are to prepare a comprehensive plan for the region, work for consensus on major problems of regional concern, encourage and assist in cooperative projects to solve problems involving more than one town, and help member communities in their planning problems.

- To see if the Town will vote to raise \$218 as the Town's share for operation of the North Country Council for one year, beginning July 1, 1975.
- 37. To see if the Town agrees to participate in the National Flood Insurance Program by directing the Board of Selectmen to complete the eligibility application and submit the required information to the Federal Insurance Administration.
- 38. To see if the Town will vote to establish a Planning Board of five members with duties as set forth in Chapter 36, N.H. Revised Statutes Annotated, to make a study of the Town's development and report to the Town appropriate recommendations for the promotion and maintenance of the Town's best development. The Board shall consist of one Selectman and four other citizens appointed by the Selectmen, as provided in Chapter 36, N.H. Revised Statutes Annotated.
- 39. To see if the Town will vote to authorize and empower the Town Planning Board to approve or disapprove in its discretion new subdivisions and plats thereof as provided in N.H. RSA Chapter 36: Section 19 - 29 inclusive and Section 34.
- 40. Resolution A.

Whereas, certain areas of Stark are subject to periodic flooding from Phillips Brook, Ammonoosuc River, Nash Stream, Molly Brook and their tributaries, causing serious damage to properties within these areas; and

Whereas, relief is available in the form of Federally subsidized flood insurance as authorized by the National Flood Insurance Act of 1968; and

Whereas, it is the intent of this Town Meeting to require the recognition and evaluation of flood and/or mudslide hazards in all official actions relating to land use in the flood plain areas having special flood (and/or mudslide) hazards; and

Whereas, this body has the legal authority to adopt land use and control measures to reduce future flood losses pursuant to N.H. RSA Chapter 31, 36, 156, 156A.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that this Town Meeting hereby:

- 1. Assures the Federal Insurance Administration that it intends to enact and maintain in force for those areas having defined flood hazards, adequate land use and control measures with effective enforcement provisions consistent with the criteria set forth in Section 1910 of the National Flood Insurance Program Regulations; and
- Vests the Selectmen (or Planning Board should the Town vote to establish one) with the responsibility, authority, and means to:
 - a. Delineate or assist the Administrator, at his request, in delineating the limits of the areas having special flood hazards on available local maps of sufficient scale to identify the location of building sites.
 - b. Provide such information as the Administrator may request concerning uses and present occupancy of the flood plain.
 - c. Cooperate with Federal, State, and Local agencies and private firms which undertake to study, survey, map, and identify flood plain or mudslide areas, and to cooperate with neighboring communities with respect to management of adjoining flood plain in order to prevent aggravation of existing hazards.
 - d. Submit on the anniversary date of the community's initial eligibility an annual report to the Administrator on the progress made during the past year within the community in the development and implementation of flood plain management measures.

- 3. Appoints the Chairman of the Board of Selectmen (or Chairman of the Planning Board should the Town vote to establish a Planning Board) to maintain for public inspection and to furnish upon request a record of elevations (in relation to mean sea level) of the lowest floor (including basement) of all new or substantially improved structures located in the special flood hazard areas. If the lowest floor is below grade on one or more sides, the elevation of the floor immediately above must also be recorded.
- 4. Intends to take such other official action within its powers as may be reasonably necessary to carry out the objectives of the program.

REPORT OF SERVICE TO THE TOWN OF STARK – 1974

Over the past four years, Upper Connecticut Valley Mental Health Service, Inc. has provided a wide range of services to the people of our valley towns. Overall community response to the agency has increased and we have an average of 16 new admissions each month. This year, counseling and treatment programs were of benefit to 266 individuals and their families in the area we serve,

Mental health staff members work with school personnel in developing flexible programs for assisting students with problems. Working jointly with parents, teachers and other helping people, such as the school nurses, students are offered counseling as well as other psychological services. We have recently hired the area's first full-time psychologist and will be better able to handle the schools' requests for testing and evaluation.

Again this year, admissions of area residents to New Hampshire Hospital have been minimal since we have been able to treat most potential inpatients at area hospitals or in their own homes.

Upper Connecticut Valley Mental Health Service is near the people it is meant to serve. Our Colebrook Office is open 9 to 5, with evening appointments available if that is the only time a client can be seen. Our Groveton office is open every Friday, with patients being seen at St. Francis Hall. Staff will meet with Stark residents by appointment at any time, and are available for psychiatric emergencies. Since the agency is locally based, people can get help quickly, with the result that very few residents need leave the area for assistance.

Stark's contribution to Upper Connecticut Valley Mental Health Service is important to our continued service. Contributions help in obtaining matching funds from State and other sources, and it helps us provide staff for help when it is needed. Costs are kept low as possible without impairing the quality of care. Per capita costs for our area are far below those of other rural mental health programs.

Upper Connecticut Valley Mental Health Service meets all State and professional standards for such programs, and is a full member of the New Hampshire Association of Community Mental Health Agencies.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

There have been several significant developments at the Supervisory Union level since my last report.

The Union is now, for the first time, receiving some state support for the position of assistant superintendent.

A Union staff development committee has been working very effectively, under the leadership of Richard Merrill, to have the Union #58 plan completed and approved well before the July 1, 1975 deadline set by the State Board of Education.

The activities and progress of the Experimental Schools Program will be reviewed in a separate section by its director, Dr. Peters.

Our Union Board at its spring meeting last May adopted a resolution covering three specific areas of concern which in brief are as follows:

- The education program should include a recognition of the values inherent in our American heritage. Students should become actively involved in patriotic exercises, the discussion and clarification of American values, and expressions of national sentiment through the use of the arts and humanities.
- 2. The perpetuation of moral standards commensurate with the highest ideals prevailing in our communities. We recognize the need for our youth to develop a respect for themselves and others and that it is important that these values and ideals find expression in our curriculum and school activities.
- 3. The establishment and maintenance of standards of behavior which provide direction and order for our young people as they grow from childhood and assume their place in the adult society.

This school year began, in many respects, during the summer months. During this time many hours were spent by your teachers in the development of a level approach to mathematics and an orientation to the new reading system which was implemented in all six grades of your school. Both programs will make it possible for your children to progress at their own rate of speed and on a level which is the most appropriate for your child. In this way, we will be working to teach that goal through which each child will be offered the most relevant program to meet his individual educational needs. In addition to these improvements, your child will also derive benefits from a career education program and an environmental education program both of which have been developed through the joint efforts of the Experimental Schools Staff and your teachers.

As many of you have noticed, there have been many improvements made to your school. In addition to the new furniture and carpeting which was added last spring, the front of the building was painted, the fence was repaired, and tile was installed in the two basements and corridor. It is our desire to continue to make improvements in the building during the coming spring and summer. These should include: repairs to the walls of the basements, re-grading of a portion of the playground and driveway, and minor painting and repair.

In addition to the regular program of instruction, your children receive the services of several specialists. They include: art, music, and the special education team. This team provides instruction for those who have speech problems, learning disabilities or are intellectually impaired in some way. Each of these programs provide, in part, the special services needed to give balance to your overall program and to allow your teachers to provide for the individual needs of your children.

Once again I extend sincere thanks to the staff, the students, and the citizens of Stark for the excellent cooperation and support which we have received throughout the year.

Summary of ESP Activities for the Fall of 1974

Adult Education:

Courses were offered in Union 58 communities:

- 1. Typing
- 2. Upholstering
- 3. Oil Painting
- 4. Ceramics
- 5. Crocheting

Career/Vocational Education:

In grades K-6, a career awareness program has been developed. This student program includes the "Bread and Butterflies" film series.

Union 58 students in grades 7-8 have been involved in career guidance sessions. High school students have been placed at area work sites.

Mini courses have been offered to students in Union 58 schools:

- 1. Arts and crafts
- 2. Crocheting
- 3. Fly tying
- 4. Surveying
- 5. Architectural drawing
- 6. Making outdoor education equipment

Language Arts:

Teachers are currently involved in writing a skills-oriented curriculum guide for grades 1 - 12.

Remedial and functional reading programs are currently being developed for students in grades 7 - 9.

This past fall, the Scott Foresman reading program was introduced into the Stratford School.

Students in grades 1 - 6 have been tested - to identify reading deficiencies.

The Sony Video Rover II VTR equipment is being used in Union 58 schools.

Outdoor Education:

An environmental education program has been developed for grades K-6.

As part of this program, students have been involved in field trips, have had guest speakers visit their classrooms, and have conducted nature studies.

Last fall nearly eighty students in grades 7 - 12 went on weekend day trip hikes to places such as Unknown Pond, Percy Peaks, and Zealand Falls.
