TOWN WARRANT

The State of New Hampshire

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Warren in the County of Grafton in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Warren on Tuesday, the fourteenth day of March, next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

3. To raise and appropriate money to maintain highways and bridges.

4. To raise and appropriate money for snow removal and sanding roads.

5. To see if the town will accept State Aid for construction on Class 2A road, known as the Lake Tarleton road, and raise and appropriate for said purpose the sum of \$831.00; or will accept State Aid for the construction of Class V roads and raise and appropriate for said purpose the sum of \$238.03.

6. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for White Pine Blister Rust Control in cooperation with the State Forestry Department.

7. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate money for forest fire fighting equipment.

8. To raise and appropriate money for the support of town poor, Old Age Assistance and Soldier's Aid.

9. To raise and appropriate money for town library.

10. To see what action the town will take in regard to the clock Mr. James H. Gale has given to the town in memory of his wife Lizzie J. Gale.

11. To raise and appropriate money to maintain street lights.

12. To raise and appropriate money for Memorial day.

13. To raise and appropriate money for cemeteries.

14. To raise and appropriate money for support of fire department.

15. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate as a bonus for Dr. F. J. Kasheta.

16. To appropriate \$56.00, based on 1-100 of 1% of the assessed valuation, for town share of cooperative participation in the White Mountains Region Association.

17. To see if the town will raise and appropriate a sum sufficient to pay part or all of the notes held by Frank B. Little.

18. To see if the town will vote to grant a discount on taxes on real estate and personal property if paid in full, and determine date and percentage of same.

19. To see if the town will declare the vote passed March 8, 1938, (whereby "It was voted that \$1,267. be raised and appropriated for a WPA project provided the available WPA funds are provided"), void so far as said WPA project is concerned, and that the money so raised be applied for the support of highways and

bridges, or used to repair of sidewalks in Warren Village, in said town.

20. To see if the town will vote to declare nul and void the vote passed at a special town meeting, holden Sept. 30, 1938, whereby it was voted to raise \$1,200.00 for a WPA project; the said sum of \$1,200.00 not yet having been assessed and collected.

21. To authorize the selectmen to distribute inventory blanks at the time they examine and assess taxable property.

22. To authorize the selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes.

23. To raise and appropriate money for other town charges.

24. To see if the voters will vote to hire the tax payers of Warren to work on the Town Road and State Aid road according to their taxes if they care to work out the taxes.

25. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

The above figures show that the enrollment this year is smaller than it was in 1937-38. The transfer to another school of a number of pupils has relieved the congestion experienced at Glencliff for the past two or three years. As the eighth grades in this school and in the village are both larger than usual, there is little prospect of over-crowded conditions next year.

The electric lights installed in the Glencliff building last summer have proved a great benefit. Available current made it possible the other day to use the mo-

tion picture machine sent out by the State Department and show several reels of geographical pictures. As a further addition to the electrical equipment I would recommend the purchase of a small grill on which to heat the lunches. Such a grill would cost only a little, but would be more convenient and safer than the oil stove.

No extensive repairs appear urgent at the present time. The Glencliff school will need repainting inside, a yearly necessity caused by unavoidable smoke from the stove. At the village I would like to recommend another book cupboard for the upstairs hall and an enclosure for the supply shelves in the basement.

Parents are urged to visit the schools and talk over with the teachers problems affecting the work and general welfare of the children. I feel that often times such conferences enable teachers to understand the pupils better and make the schools more efficient in their service to the community.
