ANNUAL TOWN REPORT

STONE MEMORIAL BUILDING

100th Year

The Stone Memorial Building in Weare Center is in the process of being restored because of deterioration over its 100 years of existence. Before we get into that, lets check our history to see how the building came to be and who is Mr. Stone.

Phineas Stone, the son of Isaac Stone, was born in Harvard, Massachusetts. He moved to South Weare about the year 1803. There he built an "oil mill" for the purpose of pressing oil out of flax and pumpkin seeds in the manufacture of linseed oil for which there was great demand. The area around the mill became known as "Oil Mill Village".

Phineas Stone married and became the father of eight children. His eldest son was Phineas Jones Stone. His son Joseph left a legacy in his father's name to the Town of Weare.

The following paragraph was taken from a paper in the Weare Town Archives headlined:

*JOSEPH STONES GIFT TO THE TOWN OF WEARE
IN MEMORY OF HIS FATHER PHINEAS J. STONE*

The sum of five thousand dollars in cash to be expended in the purchase of a lot of land and the erection of a memorial building by said Town of Weare Centre to be known as the Phineas J. Stone Memorial Building, the same to be provided with a suitable room for a public town library, and a room or place for tablets, portraits, or other memorials for the soldiers in the late "*War of the Rebellion*", so-called, between the North and the South, and such room or rooms as the town shall see fit for its records and for town officers. And the deed of the lot of land on which the said building is to be erected shall contain some suitable words expressive of the object to which said lot shall be devoted. And the said building to contain a tablet stating "*Erected to the memory of Phineas J. Stone, son of Phineas Stone, Born in Oil Mill Village, in the Town of Weare, May 23, 1810. Died in Boston, August 21, 1891. By his son Joseph Stone, 1896.*"

TO THE INHABITANTS OF THE TOWN OF WEARE, IN THE COUNTY OF HILLSBOROUGH, IN SAID STATE, QUALIFIED TO VOTE IN TOWN AFFAIRS:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Weare Town Hall in said Town of Weare on Tuesday, the twelfth day of March next, at seven of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

ARTICLE 1

To choose all necessary town officers for the ensuing year. (By Official Ballot)

ARTICLE 2

Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 1, as proposed by the Planning Board, for the Town's Zoning Ordinance, as follows: To adopt a new definition of accessory apartments in Article 4 and to add accessory apartments to the list of permitted uses under Article 17.2.3 (residential) and Article 17.3.5. These amendments will permit accessory apartments, incidental to the use of single family residences, subject to certain limitations and conditions? (Vote by Official Ballot.)

ARTICLE 3

Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 2, as proposed by the Planning Board, for the Town's Building and Permit Ordinance, as follows: To adopt, by reference, pursuant to RSA 674:52, a certain nationally recognized Building Code, CABO One and Two-Family Dwelling Code, 1995 Edition, along with currently adopted additions, insertions, deletions and changes to said Code. In addition, certain new additions, insertions, deletions and changes to this Code have been made in order to conform the CABO One and Two-Family Dwelling Code, 1995 Edition, with State laws, rules and regulations? (Vote by Official Ballot.)

ARTICLE 4

Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No.3, as proposed for the Town's Building and Permit Ordinance, as follows: To adopt a new Street Numbering Ordinance as Article 5 of the Building Code. This Ordinance will delegate, to the Board of Selectmen and the Building Inspector, the ability to assign street numbers for properties in the Town, after hearing, and to require the display of street numbers as a condition of issuing building permits and certificates of occupancy? (Vote by Official Ballot.)

ARTICLE 5

Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 4, as proposed by petition, for the Town's Zoning Ordinance, as follows: To amend the Weare Zoning Map by modifying the zoning for a certain parcel known as Weare Tax Map 411, Lot 150, said parcel being located on South Stark Highway. The zoning for Map 411, Lot 150, would be changed from residential (R) to commercial (C)? (Vote by Official Ballot.) (Approved by the Planning Board.)

ARTICLE 6

Shall we modify the optional adjusted elderly exemptions from property taxes? The optional exemptions, based on assessed value, for qualified property taxpayers shall be as follows: for a person 65 years of age up to 75 years, \$30,000; for a person 75 years of age up to 80 years, \$40,000; for a person 80 years of age or older, \$50,000. To qualify, the person(s) must have been a New Hampshire resident for at least 5 years; own and occupy the real estate individually or jointly, or if the real estate is owned by his spouse, they must have been married for at least 5 years. In addition, the tax payer must have a net income of less than \$12,000.00 or, if married, a combined net income of less than \$15,000.00; and own net assets not in excess of \$50,000.00 excluding the value of the person's residence. (Vote by Official Ballot.)

ARTICLE 7

"Shall we adopt the provisions of RSA 40:13 to allow official ballot voting on all issues before the town?" (referred to as Senate Bill 2). (By Petition.) (Vote by Official Ballot.)

NOTE: IN ACCORDANCE WITH THE VOTE OF THE TOWN MEETING OF MARCH 6, 1973, ARTICLE 8 THROUGH 30 WILL BE TAKEN UP AT AN ADJOURNED SESSION OF THIS MEETING ON MARCH 16, 1996 AT 10:00 A.M. IN THE MULTI-PURPOSE ROOM OF THE CENTER WOODS ELEMENTARY SCHOOL.

(Recommended by the Board of Selectmen)

ARTICLE 11

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$157,079.00 for reconstruction and resurfacing of roads, including \$73,975.00 for principal and interest payments on the Road Improvement Bond approved by the 1990 Town Meeting. Of the sum of \$157,079.00, the sum of \$145,428.00 would be received from Highway Block Grant Funds from the State of New Hampshire (pursuant to RSA 235); \$216.87 will be withdrawn from the Colby Road Capital Reserve Fund previously established, including all interest accrued through the date of withdrawal to discontinue the fund; with the balance of \$11,434.13 to be raised by taxation, or to take any other action in relation thereto. (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen)

Said Funds, with accumulated interest to date of withdrawal, are to be transferred to the Town's general fund, or to take any other action in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 16

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$33,394.00 for the purchase and equipping of one new Police Cruiser and reconditioning a second existing Police Cruiser, or to take any other action in relation thereto. (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen.)

ARTICLE 17

To see if the Town will vote to accept the gift of a 21.07-acre parcel of land off Route 149 in South Weare (Tax Map #411, Parcel #014) from Rawson and Janice Jenkins of Belmont, New Hampshire, or to take any other action in relation thereto. Said parcel includes 21.07 acres of raw land and a 682-foot private (paved) road which currently accesses three homes. Said private road to be accepted by the Town upon the condition that it be classified as a Class VI highway and that the acceptance of this property shall not obligate the Town to maintain, repair or upgrade the road.

ARTICLE 18

The zoning for Lot 412-195 would be changed from Rural Agricultural to Commercial? (By Official Ballot). (Approved by the Planning Board).

The polls closed at 7:00 P.M.. The Moderator announced the results of the vote at 10:00 P.M.. The Meeting was recessed by the Moderator to resume on Saturday, April 01, 1995 at 10:00 A.M. at the Center Woods Elementary school to take up Articles 6 through 36.

**RECESSED SESSION OF TOWN MEETING
APRIL 01, 1995**

The recessed Town Meeting of Weare was called to order at 10:10 A.M.

The Pledge of Allegiance was led by Bonnie and Daniel McDowel. The meeting was asked to rise and remain standing to hear the reading of the Town residents who have died during the past year. The reading was followed by a moment of silence in their memory.

The Moderator read the results of the Town, Weare School District and John Stark Regional School District elections held Tuesday, March 14, 1995, and the result of the votes on Article 2 through 5 of the Town Warrant. He announced that those who were elected may come forward at the close of Town Meeting to be given the Oath of Office.

The Moderator stated the rules for today's meeting would be Garfield Jones' Parliamentary Procedures at the Glance as interpreted by the Chair. There are eleven additional rules that are appropriate for this meeting.

1. All remarks should be addressed to the Chair or through the Chair to another person - no running debate.
2. If you wish to be heard, please approach the microphone, wait to be recognized, give your name and proceed with your remarks. It is important to use the microphone and give your name for two reasons: first, it allows everyone to hear what you have to say; second, it allows your remarks to be recorded through the public address system.
3. If you proposed an article, you will be recognized first. If you make a motion, you may claim the floor to speak to that motion in preference to others.
4. You are not entitled to the floor a second time in debate on any motion as long as someone who has not spoken wishes to speak. You may not speak a third time unless you get permission from the group.
5. A vote or warrant article is not subject to statutory protection against reconsideration. This is a new law. If, after an ordinary warrant article vote is taken, a motion to restrict reconsideration is passed, a subsequent motion to reconsider, if it is passed, will only actually result in reconsideration at an adjourned meeting at least seven (7) days in the future.
6. Lengthy or technical motions or amendments must be presented in writing.

7. If you have doubts about the Chair's decision on which side prevailed, please ask for a standing vote. If you wish a written ballot on any questions, you must put the request in writing and you must have five signatures.
8. In addressing the meeting, please keep your remarks focused on the motion before the meeting. If it is an amendment, focus your remarks on the amendment, not the main article. Remarks which are not germane to the motion or which involve personalities will be ruled out of order.
9. Legally registered voters only shall be recognized to speak. They would be displaying voter identification badges passed out at the door by the Supervisors of the Checklist. Those who are not legally registered voters may not address the meeting without its consent.
10. After each article dealing with the raising and/or appropriating of monies has been moved and spoken to, the Chair will recognize the Finance Committee so it may present its recommendation to the meeting.
11. There is no smoking allowed anywhere in this building. If you wish to smoke, you must go outside.

The Moderator introduced the people at the front of the room starting with Evelyn M. Connor, Town Clerk: Joseph Kelley, Town Administrator: Merrill Shepard, Chairman of the Board of Selectmen: William Herman, Selectman: Douglas Hatch, Selectman: Stephen Buckley, Town Counsel.

The Moderator recognized Douglas Cook, Chairman of the Finance Committee. Mr. Cook explained the responsibilities of the Finance Committee and thanked them for their service this past year as he introduced each board member.

The Moderator requested any individual that would be interested in serving on the Finance Committee to please make themselves known to him at the end of the meeting.

At this time, in accordance with the sense of Article 38, 1994 Meeting, the Chair offers the privilege of addressing the meeting when called upon to do so to two non-residents - Stephen Buckley, Town Counsel and Arthur Bastian, Acting Chief of Police. Unless there is a motion to deny those two the privilege.

Steve Gilbert moved that Mr. Buckley and Mr. Bastian be denied the right to address the meeting when requested. The motion was seconded. There was no discussion on this motion and it was defeated.

The privilege of addressing the meeting was granted to those two individuals.

The moderator informed the meeting that they would not be breaking for lunch and that the Women's Fire Auxiliary had food and beverage at the back of the room.

Merrill Shepard, Chairman of the Board of Selectmen, was recognized to give the State of the Town Address.

The Moderator asked if no objection that the reading of the Warrant in its entirety, at this time, be waived and that each Article be read as it is taken up. There being no objection, the chair ruled if affirmative.

William Herman presented Merrill (Ike) Shepard with an Award of Service for the Town of Weare.

ARTICLE 6: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of ONE MILLION (\$1,000,000.00) DOLLARS for the replacement and reconstruction and all necessary improvement to town bridges, and to authorize the issuance of ONE MILLION (\$1,000,000.00) DOLLARS of bonds or notes in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act (RSA Chapter 33), and to authorize the Board of Selectmen to fix the date, maturities, denominations, the interest rate or discount rate in the case of notes, the place of payment, the form and other details of said bonds or notes and of providing for the sale of such bonds or notes; or to take any other action in relation thereto. (By Ballot) (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen)

Merrill Shepard moved the adoption of Article 6 as read. The motion was seconded. The Finance Committee recognized the need and recommended Article 6 as read.

This was a paper ballot vote and the polls remained open for one hour. The Polls opened at 10:55 A.M. and closed at 12:05 P.M.

Ballot count YES.... 152 NO.... 19
The vote was in the affirmative by the necessary 2/3 majority.

The Moderator made a request to hold on Articles 7 and 8 and move on to 9 as both 7 and 8 are ballot votes.

ARTICLE 9: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate funds to accommodate a ten percent increase for current part-time and full-time Police Officers and the Administrative Secretary, or to take any other action in relation thereto. (By Petition) (Not Recommended by the Board of Selectmen)

Janice O'Connell motioned to dismiss Article 9. The motion was seconded. A unanimous vote to dismiss Article 9.

ARTICLE 10: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,403,337.00 to defray general government charges for the ensuing year, or to take any other action in relation thereto. (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen)

William Herman Motion that the town vote to raise and appropriate \$2,405,337.00 to defray general government charges for the ensuing year. The motion was seconded. The Finance Committee felt this was sound budget and recommended Article 10 as read. Lloyd Bailey made a motion to amend Article 10 to read \$2,427,170.00 to include a 5% raise for town employees. The amendment was seconded. The amendment passed. After much discussion on this article the Moderator called for a vote on Article 10 as amended.

The vote was in the affirmative. Reconsideration of Article 10 was restricted.

ARTICLE 7: To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following: "Shall we adopt an exemption for the totally and permanently disabled? The exemption, based on assessed value, for qualified taxpayers shall be \$30,000.00. To qualify, the person must have been a New Hampshire resident for at least 5 years and own and occupy the real estate individually or jointly, or if the real estate is owned by a spouse, they must have been married for at least 5 years. In addition, the taxpayer must have a net income of not more than \$10,000.00 or, if married, a combined net income of not more than \$12,000.00; and own net assets not in excess of \$30,000.00 excluding the value of the person's residence." (By Ballot)

Douglas Hatch moved the Adoption of Article 7 as read. The motion was seconded. The Finance Committee has no recommendation. A paper ballot vote was taken.

Ballot count YES.... 82 No.... 67
The vote was in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 8: To see if the Town will vote to have the Board of Firewards appoint the Fire Chief for a term of one year. The Board of Firewards shall be a committee consisting of seven persons, six of whom shall be residents of the Town of Weare, who shall be elected for staggered three year terms at the Annual Meetings on the official ballot for the Town of Weare. The seventh member shall be the Fire Chief then in office. Of the elected members, three members shall be representatives of the Fire Department. The Fire Chief shall appoint the necessary officers, and any other members of the Weare Fire Department, or to take any other action in relation thereto.

William Herman moved the adoption of Article 8 as read. The motion was seconded. The Finance Committee has no recommendation.

Steve Gilbert made a motion to amend article 8 and requested a secret ballot vote. The ballot vote was taken and his amendment was defeated. The Moderator then called for a voice vote on the original motion. The vote was in the affirmative. Reconsideration of Article 8 was restricted.

ARTICLE 11: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,972.00 for the purpose of subsidizing the cost of services provided by the Contoocook Valley Counseling Center to Weare residents needing financial assistance, or to take any other action in relation thereto. (By Petition) (Not recommended by the Board of Selectmen)

ARTICLE 13: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$184,872.00 for reconstruction and resurfacing of roads, including \$77,770.00 for principal and interest payments on the Road Improvement Bond approved by the 1990 Town Meeting. Of the sum of \$184,872.00, the sum of \$145,759.00 would be received from Highway Block Grant Funds from the State of New Hampshire (pursuant to RSA 235), with the balance of \$39,113.00 to be raised by taxation, or to take any other action in relation thereto. (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen)

Lloyd Bailey moved the adoption of Article 13 as read. The motion was seconded. The Finance Committee recommended Article 13 as written. The Vote was in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 14: To see if the Town will vote to establish an expendable General Maintenance Trust Fund under the provision of RSA 31:19-a for the purpose of maintaining the Town of Weare gasoline system; to designate the Board of Selectmen as agents to expend; and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,500.00 for that purpose, or to take any other action in relation thereto. (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen)

LLOYD Bailey motioned to amend the dollar amount in Article 15 to be \$75,000. The amendment was seconded. The amendment passed. The moderator called for a vote on Article 15 as amended. (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen)

Article 34 was defeated.

ARTICLE 35: To see if the Town will vote to urge the Planning Board to devise a Growth Management Plan for the Town of Weare, to be submitted to the 1996 Town Meeting, or to take any other action in relation thereto. (By Petition)

Frank Bolton moved the adoption of Article 35 as read. The motion was seconded. The Finance Committee had no recommendation. The vote in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 36: To transact any other business which may legally come before this meeting.

Jack Dearborn thanked Douglas Cook and his committee for a fine job done. A motion was made to adjourn. The motion was seconded. The Weare Town Meeting of 1995 adjourned at 5:02 P.M.

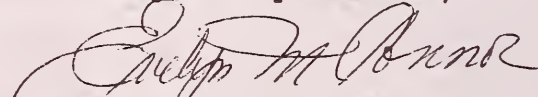

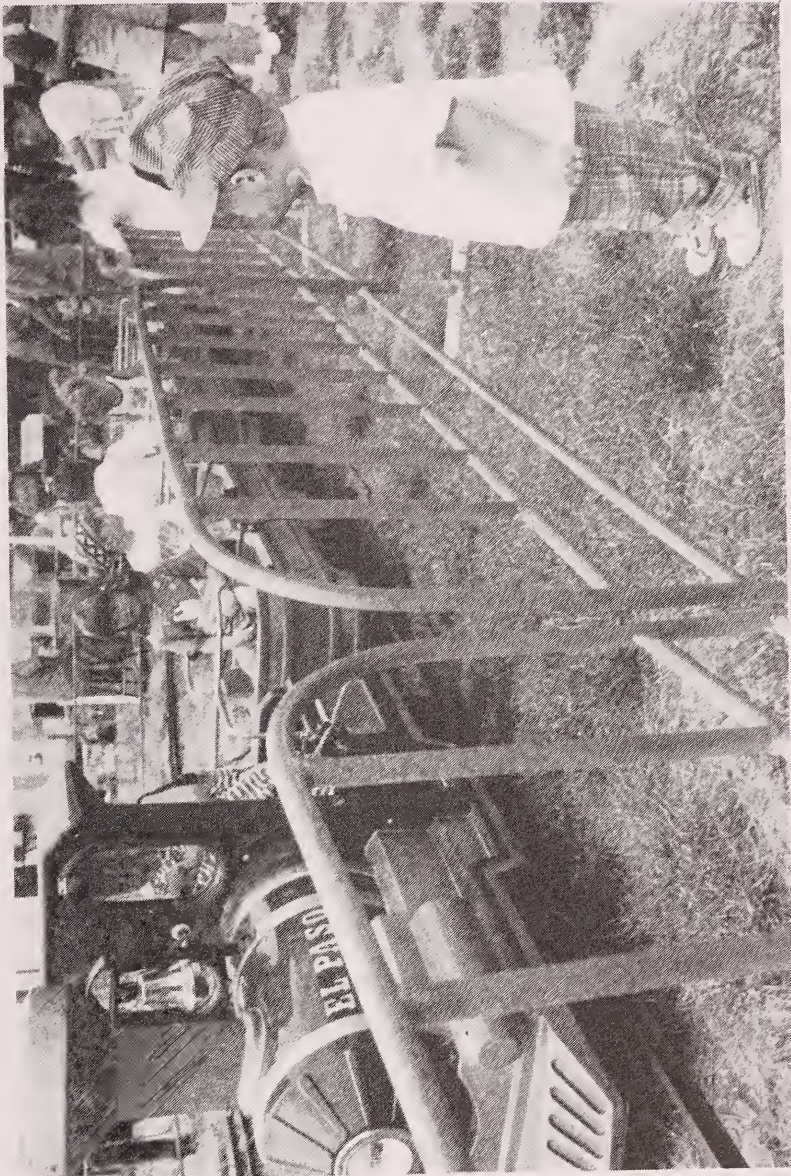

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF SELECTMEN

As 1995 comes to a close, we would like to reflect on the efforts of the past 12 months and to look forward to the challenges that face Weare in the years ahead.

These pages are filled with the specific reports and information which outline the activity and accomplishments of all our Town departments, boards, commissions and officers during the past year. Yet, we'd like to specifically note the following items:

* **Police Department Reorganization:** In a process begun last year, the reorganization of the Weare Police Department became a reality in 1995 with the appointment of Edward D. Tuthill, Jr., as Chief of Police and the naming of James J. Carney as the first full-time Sergeant of the department. With a solid foundation laid by Interim Police Chief Arthur G. Bastian of Claremont, Chief Tuthill has been able to hit the ground running in his efforts to restore the community's confidence and expectations by bringing a professional image to the Weare department which will benefit our community for years to come.

* **Bridges Infrastructure:** Under the watchful eye of Road Agent Lloyd Bailey, the Town has successfully undertaken a restoration program which will result in the replacement or refurbishing of all 16 Town-owned and maintained bridges. With seed funding of \$1,000,000 from the 1994 Town Meeting, engineering plans were designed and N.H. Department of Transportation approval received for the inclusion of Weare's three worst bridges into the State's Bridge Aid Construction program -- which will result in two-thirds of the engineering and construction costs of the Twin Bridge, River Road and Riverdale Bridges being paid for by the State of New Hampshire.

* **Legal Issues:** A number of outstanding legal issues which had plagued our community for the past few years were satisfactorily concluded in the favor of the Town of Weare during 1995.

As the Town's chief executive and financial officers, the Board of Selectmen has continued the support and guidance necessary to meet Weare's present and new challenges. With the full cooperation and assistance of all our Town department heads, we were able to conclude the 1995 budget year with a budget surplus of approximately \$10,000 and an actual cash surplus greater than that. Our residents expect sound management of all of our community's resources, and we are working to meet those challenges in a business-like manner.

We'd be remiss if we failed to acknowledge the tremendous dedication and service which has been provided to our community for the past 34 years by Red Network Dispatcher Florence Wheldon. Florence has provided service

above and beyond the call of duty to our community. Earlier this year, she relinquished her 24-hour-a-day, seven-day-a-week dispatching duties to a professional service when Weare went on line with the Enhanced 9-1-1 coverage. However, Florence continues to be the voice of the Weare Fire Department's business telephone.

In March, 1995, incumbent Selectman Merrill "Ike" Shepard left the Board at the conclusion of the 1995 Town Meeting, and newly elected Selectman A. Craig Slattum came aboard. As we head into 1996, the Board of Selectmen will be actively working to fill the currently vacant Town Administrator's position with an individual who will be able to assist our volunteer government leaders face the next century in a sound, prepared and intelligent manner.

To all of the Town officers, members of committees and boards, and all employees, we express our sincere appreciation for your continued dedicated service to the citizens of Weare.

BUILDING DEPARTMENT

The Building Department had an active 1995 with building permits, inspections, code enforcement, fire inspections, violations, and court cases. With the implementation of the Statewide E-911 Telephone System, this office was given the assignment to coordinate the project with the State and Granite State Telephone. Street names and numbers had to assigned, changed, and verified. Notifications were sent to owners, renters, Granite State Telephone, Public Service Company, Fire & Police Departments, and the Weare Post Office. This is an on-going project.

Fire inspections were made at places of assembly, daycare, schools, commercial buildings, and foster homes. The office handles daily questions on building codes, zoning, fire codes, tax maps, street numbers, planning, etc.

I went to training seminars and received certification in the Life Safety Code 101-94 and passed tests in one and two family dwelling code, building, mechanical, plumbing, and electrical. I will be continuing training and certification to better serve the Town. During 1996 Insurance Services Office (ISO) will be rating all town building departments in New Hampshire for their office, inspections, and training. ISO rates the towns for homeowners insurance. They have been rating fire departments for years and started rating building departments in 1995.

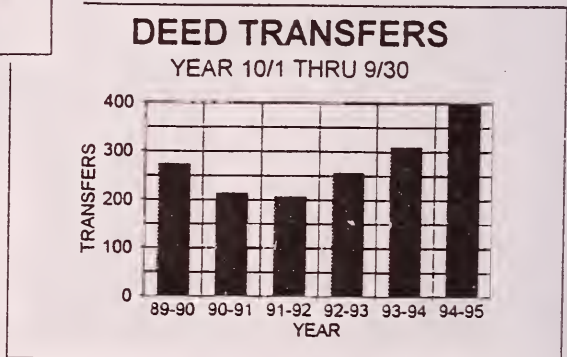
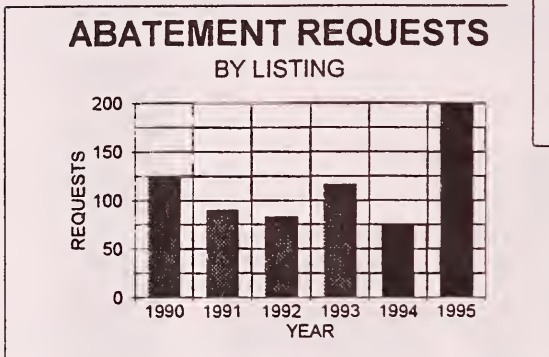
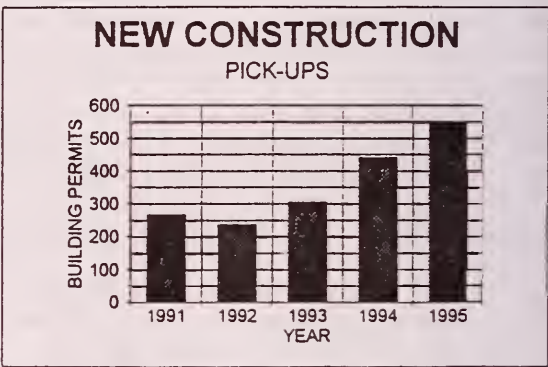

WEARE CONSERVATION COMMISSION***STATISTICAL REPORT***

In 1995 the Weare Conservation Commission has been mildly active. Nevertheless, several notable achievements have been made. With kudos to the Office of State Planning, and in particular to Pete Helms of the O.S.P., all major waterbody shorelines, Mt. William Pond, Lake Horace, and Daniel's Lake, have been aerially photographed. These photos will be useful to monitor the Town's waterbodies, particularly shoreline transgressions. As an addendum to the above, a video documentation of the Lake Horace shoreline, taken from a watercraft, has been produced and is now a part of the Town's archives. The construction this year of a gate across the entrance to Ferrin Pond public access has now made the Ferrin Pond road a formal footpath. The installation of this gate finalized many years of letter writings, meetings, indecisions and other delays. This gate installation has positively directed the Ferrin Pond area to increased environmental protection of this treasured pristine wilderness.

Heart felt appreciation, on behalf of the Town of Weare, is extended to the Piscataquog Watershed Association for their achievement of acquiring a vital and important parcel of land abutting Ferrin Pond. This acquirement now confirms that the entire shoreline of Ferrin Pond is under the aegis of conservation protection. Because of the work of the P.W.A., the Ferrin Pond area is now, more than ever, an environmental asset, to be enjoyed and savored by those seeking to appreciate quiet, intrinsic and unparrelled beauty.

Deepest thanks to Mr. Robert Todd, land use consultant, for his tireless and in-depth endeavor in producing the Forest Stewardship Plan for Felch Farm Forest. This stewardship plan will serve the Town for the next ten years.

Currently under review are a number of Town tax lien holdings that are being evaluated to determine their conservation value. A written report on this matter has been sent to the Board of Selectmen. Several on-going wetland and shoreline violations continue to challenge the commission. We are working in conjunction with several state agencies to try and resolve some of the more recalcitrant violation issues.

Assistance was given for the great fireworks display put on by Bill Tiffany. The Fire Department received further assistance for these festivities from the Goffstown, New Boston, Dunbarton and Deering Fire Departments. Our thanks to all for their continued support.

BUILDING MAINTENANCE: Building maintenance once again consisted of annual cleaning of all furnaces in each station. There were further required repairs to the furnace in the South Station. During the year, an inspection was conducted on each station by the Municipal Trust. Center Station was found to have numerous problems. The recommendations for repairs to each station will be reviewed and a request for bids will be published in 1996 for these repairs and upgrades.

VEHICLE MAINTENANCE: Vehicle maintenance again this year exceeded the allotted budgeted amount due to the numerous and serious operational problems with our ambulance and our tanker. All vehicles received biyearly inspections and oil changes.

TRAINING: Training was held this year for fire personnel for training in Hazmat which consisted of Operations, Incident Command and Decon. This training was taught by Chief Richard Ritter of the Hillsboro Fire Department. Souhgean Mutual Aid Association also sponsored a joint Hazmat training session, which proved to be a valuable asset the day after the session was completed, when an oil tanker overturned on South Stark Highway. A basic forty hour course is provided to each new member of the Department. Mark Haynes is the Training Coordinator for the Weare Fire Department and schedules monthly courses for personnel.

NEW EMT'S: Weare Rescue sponsored an Emergency Medical Technician course in the latter part of 1995. Our response team now has six new members. Congratulations to the following new member for their efforts towards certification: Ann Mary Dinsmore, Mary "Pat" Karpen, Donna Merrill, Debra Collins, Catherine Sweeney and Marc Vachon.

BACKUP AMBULANCE SERVICE: Approximately 2 1/2 years ago, the Town of Weare Fire Department, keeping the continued safety of the Town of Weare in mind, made arrangements with Tri-State Ambulance Service of Concord, to provide backup ambulance service to areas within the Town when Weare Fire/Rescue personnel were unavailable to respond. The decision to locate a backup service was not difficult, as Mutual Aid was not always available, due to a shortage of personnel in other Departments. Tri-State was selected, offering a reasonable response time. However, the public should be aware that Tri-State Ambulance Service is a private service and does charge for their responses. The majority of persons involved in this decision felt it was better for patients to be charged than to receive no assistance from any service. In the event of a true emergency, committee members could not in good conscience, allow patients to go without an available source of emergency response and transportation. This service is an automatic dispatch when Weare personnel are not available, alleviating the need for patients or families to search and contact a private service in a difficult time of need.

BUSINESS HOURS: Non-emergency business is handled daily at the Central Fire Station between the hours of 8:00 a.m. and 1:00 p.m., Tuesday through Friday and on Monday evenings between the hours of 5:30 p.m. and 9:00 p.m. The telephone number for the business line is 529-2352. A department secretary is on hand during these hours to answer questions and receive information. The Weare Fire Department would like to take this opportunity to thank all persons, committees, organizations and departments for your continued support. ✓

REPORT OF TOWN FOREST WARDEN AND STATE FOREST RANGER

In calendar year 1995, our three (3) leading causes of fires were Children, Non-Permit fires not properly extinguished and Smoking Materials.

Violations of RSA 224:27 II, the fire permit law, and the other burning laws of the State of New Hampshire are misdemeanors punishable by a fine of up to \$2,000 and/or a year in jail. Violators are also liable for all fire suppression costs.

To aid your Forest Fire Warden, Fire Department and State Forest Fire Officials, contact your local Warden or Fire Department to find out if a permit is required. This also helps to prevent unnecessary response to a controlled burn.

TOWN FOREST REPORT

The markets for medium and lower grade pine dropped to levels that discouraged us from our final timber stand improvement harvest in the Felch Farm Forest. Natural seeding has set many young white pines and red oaks growing into the stands that we selectively cut during 1993 and 1994. This summer's drought will make for noticeably smaller growth rings when the trees are ultimately harvested. There was virtually no acorn or pine seed crop this year and reinforces our good fortune from 1993.

The Ferrin Pond land acquisition project was completed. This added 44 acres along Ferrin Pond to the Ferrin Pond Forest. Now, all of Ferrin Pond is enclosed by conservation land. The Piscataquog Watershed Association (PWA) owns the remaining frontage. We are developing a trail system in conjunction with the PWA and students from John Stark Regional High School. The trails will wander along Ferrin Brook and Ferrin Pond. Eventually, the trails will scale Boar's Head summit and join through to Bartlett Brook Forest. This resource is a town treasure.

The Poor Farm Forest trail system was maintained during the summer. Don't forget to enjoy this beautiful 2-mile walk through the forest. Maps are available from the Weare Conservation Commission.

Our Town Forest is a spectacular resource. It is our aim to manage the forest and make its beauty available to those who seek it out.

GENERAL SERVICES DEPARTMENT

The Transfer Station and Recycling Center have continued to receive more materials. Rubbish and recyclables both are up 5% over last year. Tipping fees for rubbish for the 1996 year have decreased \$1 per ton; in 1995 we shipped 2896 tons. A new contract which is a financial improvement has been signed with BFI for processing recyclables. The dry summer necessitated not accepting wood and brush for a period of time until sufficient rains were received to allow burning. The understanding and cooperation of residents and the assistance of the Fire Department were appreciated in this situation.

Animal control functions continue to be active. We have had over 800 calls so far. Dog issues account for about 60% of calls, cats 14% and a variety of other animals 27%. There are over 1400 dogs licensed in Weare; licensing with the Town Clerk is required. Tags on dogs' collars help greatly in locating owners in case of strays. State statutes require that rabies tags be worn. The officers assisted with the annual rabies clinic in March. Appreciated assistance has been received from the Police Department, the State Veterinarian, the NH Equine Humane Association, Weare Animal Hospital, Kitty Angels and residents.

The sewer system in Weare Center handled 2,954,825 gallons in the past year. In June one of the two pumps failed; it was replaced with a new one. In conjunction with this some electrical work was done and the other pump, the receiving wet well and its inflow pipe were cleaned. The leachfield areas were mowed to control vegetative growth.

HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT

Thanks to the continued support of the citizens of Weare, our Highway Department had another successful year. Although all of our goals and projects were not realized, the following is a brief synopsis of the achievements realized by our department as well as anticipated projects for 1996...

ACHIEVEMENTS OF 1995:

- The Colby Road (Route 114 end) upgrade is close to complete, other than the pavement and seeding of the slopes, that will be done in the spring of 1996.
- Chevey Hill Road was upgraded with the base coat of pavement and the finish pavement will be done in 1996.
- Hemlock Drive (f/k/a Hodgdon Drive) is starting to be upgraded, it is presently at the gravel-grade stage. Construction was stopped due to weather conditions, but will resume as soon as the weather is better and will be finished in 1996.
- Carl Knapp and Jason Williams competed against 23 other teams in Swanzey, New Hampshire, at the regional level of the annual plow rally sponsored by the New Hampshire Municipal Association/Property Liability Trust Insurance. They finished first runner up in Swanzey to earn them the chance to compete at the State level in Hopkinton. In Hopkinton they also finished first runner up. Congratulations Carl and Jason!
- Snowfall in November and December has dropped a record snowfall of 34 inches. The storms have kept the department busy, continuously plowing or sanding.

ANTICIPATED PROJECTS FOR 1996:

- We are planning to completely upgrade and pave Walker Hill Road between the two tar sections.
- Reconstruction of Reservoir Drive between the two bridges is another project for 1996.
- Since 1988 we have accepted 17 miles of new road to maintain.
- As of January 1, 1996, the Federal Highway Administration mandates that all Commercial Drivers License (CDL) holders, have a mandatory drug and alcohol test. The Town of Weare has entered into a consortium for Town employees.

- The Town has State and Federal grant approval for three bridges to be reconstructed:
 - Riverdale Bridge

WEARE PUBLIC LIBRARY

Library resources are being utilized by many more people in many different ways. Through economical purchases and donations, our collection of books on tape and videos has increased considerably. Materials of non-fiction as well as fiction are in great demand. Circulation figures for 1995 are 34,456.

Questions being asked and answered are on many topics. Even though we are adding more books to our collection, there are still areas in which we need to make additional purchases. Books need to be upgraded continuously because patrons are seeking current information. All libraries must borrow from each other in order to fulfill the needs of their readers. And that is what we are doing on a larger scale. We are now able to order books electronically so that it is not necessary to write or call the library from which we are requesting the book. It is all done through our computer via the New Hampshire Automated Information System based at the New Hampshire State Library. The State Library provides delivery service to Weare and almost all the other cities and towns in the state. The Hillstown Cooperative also offers a once a week stop at Weare. These various components make the time between the reader's request and the receipt of the book about one to two weeks generally. Magazine article request are filled faster with the use of our fax machine.

Our newest acquisition enhancing our service to the public is a new computer and CD Rom player purchased with the funds from the Emma Sawyer Trust Fund. Training sessions will be scheduled for staff and patrons to learn the new technology. Another goal is to provide access to the Internet for searching out information. Training will be offered for that also. The library is participating in exploring the possibility of a home page on the WorldWide Web accessed through the internet.

Story times, crafts and the summer reading program are enjoyed by youngsters in the children's room. The Friends of the Library sponsor book talks and events open to the public. They raised a record amount of money through a book sale and quilt raffle for the library's benefit.

Our thanks and appreciation are extended to our patrons and all those who donated their time, books and money for the betterment of the library.

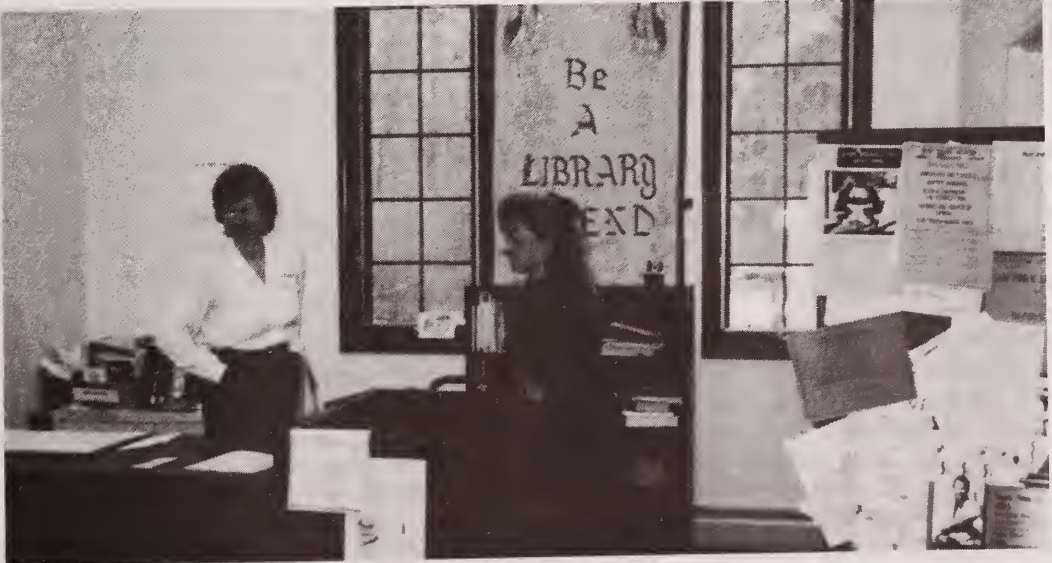

PARKS AND RECREATION COMMISSION

Due to the extensive heat wave and the lasting drought, Chase Park experienced record attendance and an all-time high revenue income. As the momentum of the Town's growth increases, so does the upgrading and improvements to provide facilities for these purposes. The boat ramp apron and right-of-way was completed in time for use, before the season's opening. Shoreline terrace work was started in erosion areas and hopefully, to be continued. The State of New Hampshire announced its 1995 fall drawdown at Lake Horace will be 25 feet for the purpose of reconstruction and repairs to the dam.

From Memorial Day to Labor Day weekend, the average weather temperature was 82.1 degrees. There were 3 days below 70 degrees, 20 days of 90 degrees and above, 10 days of misty to showery and 3 rained-out days.

Requests to use the facilities by person(s), groups and organizations included a bass fishing tournament, Red Cross swimming program for levels 1 through 7 and Basic Water Safety and Emergency Instructional Aid were offered, in addition to private swimming lessons. The number of participants of 173 were slightly down from last year's figure of 192. Two pre-registration dates were held at the Park in May to determine the numbers for the program, hours needed for instruction and the desire to provide a manageable program. A \$5.00 fee per student, with a \$20.00 cap per family, was charged and will remain in effect.

There were five minor accidents that caused some concern. The swim water testing in July for E-Coli were well below the required safety count units of 88ML, factors being 9-10-9.

Anticipated revenues surpassed due to the complete sell-out of 1400 vehicle and boat stickers. Statistics from the daily sales slips reveal the following:

- 1077 Residential family vehicles, includes second vehicles
- 46 Residential senior citizens
- 1005 non-residential adults and children
- 109 Residential boat, multi-launchings
- 189 non-residential paid boat launchings
- 25 non-residential paid jet ski launchings
- 9 canoes

GAZEBO AND CENTER PARK

The Weare Garden Club continues to beautify the grounds around the gazebo and hold spring and fall plant sales to make additional and replacements of floral displays, as a non-profit group. Three additional maple trees were purchased and planted for future shade, placed in a semi-circle design on the second lower terrace. Adjacent to East Street parking, curbing was installed, backfilled with loam and seeded. The curbing will help to keep vehicles off the grassy areas. Both additions were funded by the Emma Sawyer Trust. Vandalism and destruction have continued to be present on the gazebo, to the point of replacement for sections of the railings, as well as missing fixtures.

HOOD MEMORIAL TENNIS COURT

The courts are being used extensively by local patrons as well as John Stark Regional High School. The lack of support and interest in the instructional program fell through and did not materialize.

PURINGTON MEMORIAL FIELD

Located on Salmen Road off Concord Stage Road, the field is still used extensively by Little League and the soccer program, as well as other groups. Approximately 450 children, boys and girls, are still engaged in the Weare Athletic Club Sponsorship, Little League, soccer and basketball. Other playing facilities for accommodations is the Middle School property. Romanos site field development hopefully will eliminate much of the present day congestion.

ROMANOS PROPERTY

Recreational Field Development is requested under the Capital Improvement Program (CIP) and appropriations raised to establish a Capital Reserve Fund (CRF), to cover the funding for such a purpose. Having completed the feasibility study lead to an engineering design and a conceptual plan, divided into three phases over a three to five year program. A site plan review of Phase I, was presented to the Planning Board on April 27, 1995. Due to site area and resident concerns, this delayed their actions until July 27, 1995. At this time a final approval for Phase I, with some stipulations, was given. The major concern was the area being too close to Quaker Street entrance and to ascertain the possibility of having a roadway from Route 114. A study and design will be acted upon, ready for a site plan review presentation in early spring 1996. The earliest date was September 7th for equipment to become available. By November 11th, the soccer field had been compacted and shimmed to grade, ready for loaming. The ballfield diamond is incomplete, in need of more fill and grading. Being this time of the season, we came to a halt. Weather permitting, an early spring start is hopeful. Town Officials, on October 20, 1995 had applied for a Federal Bureau of Outdoor Recreation Matching Grant up to \$25,000 for the project. The Commission was notified that no funds were available for the year 1995.

The Commission wishes to thank each and every one for their interest, support and effort to make this project a reality.

POLICE DEPARTMENT

To start, I would like to say "Thank You" to everyone for giving me the opportunity to be your Police Chief. The overwhelming support on my behalf was a humbling experience. One of my long standing goals will be to never let anyone of you down. 1995 was an extremely trying time for the Weare Police Department. Even through all the turmoil, I am pleased to report that there were several positive things that we can focus on.

First, the Town was extremely fortunate to find Arthur Bastian, a retired Police Chief from Newport, NH, who was able to shepherd the department back in the right direction. Through his years of experience, he was able to pick up the faltering pieces and reestablish a functioning service that people could rely on. Secondly, Arthur was exceptionally instrumental in making the transition from one police chief to another so smooth. I will forever be in Arthur's debt.

1995 also saw the promotion of Weare's first full-time Patrol Sergeant. James Carney has been employed by the Police Department since December of 1992. Congratulations go out to "Jim" and I look forward to a long and prosperous relationship.

They have now completed the department's Field Training program and are out there on their own.

To that end, we will be concentrating our early efforts on training and education to meet this task. Looking into the future, we plan on instituting 24-hour patrols, with overlapping supervisor shifts. Our ultimate achievement will come when the department reaches the level at which we can become Accredited by the State of New Hampshire, using the National Accreditation Standards. Doing this will bring our department to a level of professionalism that will be recognized around the country. As a Department, we plan on working very hard to make everyone of our citizens proud of what they are paying for. We are looking forward to working as partners with the Town in bringing quality law enforcement back to the Town of Weare.

II. 1995 marked our sixth complete year of successful operations. Some items which may be of interest follow:

The tonnage delivered to the plant by the Cooperative this year was 115,935. This was a decrease of 575 tons over 1994, or a 0.5% decrease. 1995 marked the third straight year that the Cooperative went over GAT. Our GAT for 1995 was 112,869 tons and 115,935 tons were actually delivered. A total of 65,299 tons of ash were delivered to the landfill for disposal. The landfill continues to operate well.

The 1996 budget reflects a decrease in the tipping fee of \$1.00 per ton. This is the second time that the Co-op has been able to reduce the tipping fee for the communities.

The ash paving demonstration project in Laconia continues to be monitored by UNH. The final report and permitting are to be completed early this spring. All is going well with the project.

Phase III-A of the ash landfill was completed in December of 1995. Phase III-B construction will begin in the early spring of 1996. The completion of Phase III construction will provide approximately 9 years of disposal capacity.

SOUTHERN NH PLANNING COMMISSION

The Southern New Hampshire Planning Commission has a wide range of services and resources available to help dues-paying members deal with a variety of municipal issues. Technical assistance is provided by a professional staff whose expertise is, when necessary, supplemented by consultants who are selected for their specialized skills or services. Each year, with the approval of your appointed representatives, the Commission staff designs and carries out programs of area-wide significance that are mandated under New Hampshire and federal laws or regulations, as well as local or site-specific projects which would pertain more exclusively to your community.

Technical assistance is provided in a professional and timely manner by staff at the request of your Planning Board, Board of Selectmen, and various municipal department heads. The Commission conducts planning studies and carries out projects that are of common interest and benefit to all member communities, keeps your officials apprised of changes in planning and land use regulation, and offers training workshops for Planning and Zoning Board members on an annual basis.

Services that were performed for the Town of Weare during the past year are as follows:

1. Co-sponsored the Municipal Law Lecture meetings. These meetings were attended by Weare officials.
2. Conducted a six-hour training workshop for the Planning Board members. The Weare Planning and Zoning Boards were invited to that workshop.
3. At the request of the Town Administrator, traffic counts were taken on Craney Hill, Perkins Pond and River Road.
4. Conducted traffic counts on several locations in the Town of Weare.
5. At the request of the Chairman of the Planning Board, traffic counts were taken on Quaker Street.
6. A "Housing Needs Assessment" for the SNHPC region, which includes information for the Town of Weare, was forwarded to the Planning Board, Board of Selectmen, and the Public Library.
7. Updated the town road base map with corrections to the road index.
8. The Town was furnished with the "Suggested Schedule" for the March 1996 Annual Town Meeting.

9. Provided two videos for the use of the Planning Board.
10. Provided necessary staff support in the "closeout" of the South Weare Mobile Home Park project.

WEARE CABLE COMMITTEE

Weare CATV Channel 46 has just completed its fourth full year of operation. Its town television message board is a familiar sight in many Weare homes, the subscribers to cable TV in Weare. It has become a regular mean for transmitting community announcements and news, so vital in fact that a modest upgrade to the graphic system was done. We are hoping to be able to make a major upgrade of the system sometime in the future.

The portable cameras and their dedicated crew of volunteer camera people are a regular sight at many town and school functions. A number of these productions have been edited for rebroadcast and shown on Channel 46 throughout the year. The Cable Committee would like to have more productions and to see more towns people involved with cable access and hope that the inclusion of a paid part-time position to help run this end of things will make that happen.

The television studio construction at John Stark was completed with the installation of a permanent set background during this past year. The studio cameras and their control panels were rewired to accommodate these changes and to make them easier to operate and assemble.

The broadcast system, purchased with funds from the Trustees of the Trust Funds, was installed in the Town Office meeting room. Any group which holds a meeting in this facility now has the capability to broadcast their proceedings to any home in Weare which receives Channel 46 through their cable service.

CONCORD REGIONAL VISITING NURSE ASSOCIATION

The Concord Regional Visiting Nurse Association (CRVNA) continues to offer three major health services to the residents of Weare: Home Care, Hospice and Primary Care.

Home Care services respond to the health care needs of those patients with acute or chronic illnesses that require skilled professional and para-professional care so they may return to or remain in their homes. Emphasis is on promoting independence and maximum functioning of the patient within the least restrictive setting.

Hospice services provide professional and para-professional services to the terminally ill patient with a limited life expectancy. The goal is to enhance the quality of the patient's remaining life by helping him/her remain at home in comfort and dignity. Emphasis is on pain and symptom management and skilled intervention to meet the patient's special physical, emotional and spiritual needs.

In April of 1994 Hospice expanded its services to provide residential care with the opening of New Hampshire's first Hospice House. To date, this house has provided a home to approximately 101 terminally ill residents.

Primary Care and Preventive services expanded from a health promotion and prevention focus to Family Health Center focus. The focus provides healthcare in a whole-life approach that means treating the individual from birth to senior adulthood. The Family Health Center services include family-centered medical care, preventive care, adult and senior health, child health, Baby's First Homecoming, immunizations for all ages, school linked clinics, parent education and support. Family Planning and Women's Health, obstetrical care, health education, nutritional counseling, HIV/AIDS counseling and testing, Mental Health Services and Sexually Transmitted Disease testing and treatment.

The Family Health Center offers 24 hours a day, 7 days a week service including physician care, hospital admitting privileges, and other care generally offered through a medical office setting. It is a joint initiative between Concord Hospital and Concord Regional Visiting Nurse Association and it is an educational site for the NH Dartmouth Family Practice Residency Program. Primary care physicians (from Concord Hospital's new Family Practice residency Program), graduate education medical students (residents), registered nurse practitioners, registered nurses, social workers and other staff provided primary care to more than 7,800 clients in FY 95.

Health Promotion services focus on the low and marginal income families and individuals to prevent illness by professional assessment and screening for health risks and needs, by early intervention to prevent, eliminate, or minimize the impact of illness and/or disability, and by anticipatory guidance and health teaching. Emphasis is on promoting healthy children, families and individuals through early intervention and health teaching. Services rendered in the clinic setting are: child health, prenatal, family planning, sexually transmitted disease, adult screening, immunizations, and HIV (AIDS) testing and counseling.

Home visits are made in crisis situations or when needed health care cannot be given in the clinic. Senior health services are provided at congregate housing sites. Professional and para-professional hourly home services are provided on a private fee-for-service basis. Health education and instruction are part of each home visit or clinic visit.

Anyone in Weare may request service: patient, doctor, health facility, pastor, friend or neighbor. All requests are answered, but continuing home care will only be provided with a physician's order.

A call to Concord Regional Visiting Nurse Association (224-4093) is all that is necessary to start services or make inquiries. The CRVNA office is open Monday through Friday from 7:30 a.m. to 5:00 p.m.. A nurse is on call for hospice and home care patients: (224-4093) 4:30 p.m. - 7:30 a.m. daily.

Federal regulations specify a charge is applicable to all visits. Fees are scaled for the individual without health insurance and/or who is unable to pay the full charge. However, to fee scale, federal regulations require a financial statement be completed by the patient or responsible person. Town monies subsidize those visits that are scaled or for which no fee is collectible.

This agency is certified as a Medicare/Medicaid Provider, licensed by the State of New Hampshire, accredited by the Joint Commission on Accreditation of Healthcare Organizations (JCAHO) and is a member agency of the United Way of Merrimack County.

ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE

The Weare Economic Development Committee is optimistic that 1996 will be a pivotal year in focusing its efforts on some activities that will help move the town forward on various economic development initiatives. Economic development means different things to different people, so one of the Committee's key activities in the first half of the year will be to get better organized to assist in Weare's economic development by constructing a strategic plan complete with mission statement, strategies, objectives and action plans.
