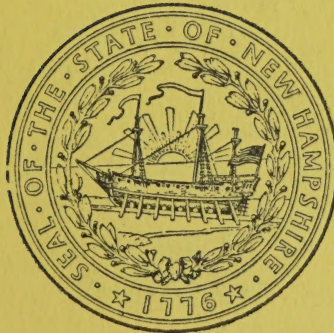


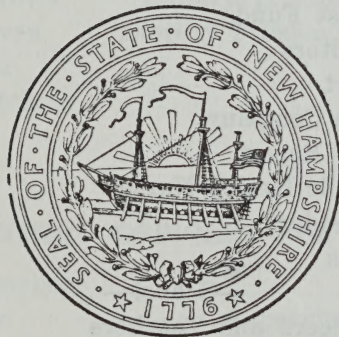

TOWN WARRANT
THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Wentworth in the County of Grafton in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Wentworth on Tuesday, the ninth day of March, next at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
3. To see if the Town will approve the 1964 Report.
4. To see how much money the Town will raise and appropriate for maintenance of blacktop roads.
5. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for town highways and bridges for the ensuing year (summer and winter).
6. To see if the Town will vote to accept T. R. A. for construction, maintenance and reconstruction of rural post roads and Class V highways and raise and appropriate or set aside for such purposes the sum of \$546.24, the State to contribute \$3,642.24.
7. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Street Lights.
8. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the maintenance of the Library.
9. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for a Fire Department.
10. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for maintenance of the Dump.
11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$125.00 for the control of White Pine Blister Rust.

12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for Dutch Elm disease control.

13. To see what action the Town will take relative to playing games of Beano.

14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for maintenance of parks and playgrounds.

15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 for hospitals.

16. To see what action the Town will take in regard to raising and appropriating a sum of money for the Mt. Moosilaukee Health Center.

17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of one one-hundredth of one per cent (or a specific amount) of the assessed valuation for the purpose of publicizing and promoting the natural advantages and resources of the town together with other towns in the Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Region Association.

18. To voice the opinion of the Town in regard to Civil Defense and raise and appropriate a sum of money for same.

19. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to sell, either at private sale or at public auction, and for such price, and to such persons as in their judgment may seem best, any real estate or interest therein to which the town shall obtain title by tax collector's deeds for the non-payment of taxes, and that until such property is sold, the Selectmen be given authority to rent the same or administer it as in their judgment may seem best; and be it further resolved that the foregoing vote shall remain in full force and effect as to future boards of Selectmen until it be rescinded or changed at some future Town Meeting.

20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for erecting and maintaining the Town Sign.

21. To see if the Town will vote to accept the following regulations pertaining to mobile homes.

1. Mobile homes shall not be allowed to locate in the town of Wentworth near the main routes (25 or 25A) or within sight of these routes.

Anyone intending to locate a trailer, camper, or mobile home in said town (unless it is to be a recognized camping area) shall contact the Selectmen regarding their water supply and sanitation facilities; providing however, that within the above described routes locations, the Board of Selectmen shall issue a permit for the location of a house trailer, camper or mobile home on private property for the occupancy thereof by the party in possession of said property as a non-paying guest, for a period not exceeding 21 days.

2. The Board of Selectmen of the Town of Wentworth shall have the authority to post reasonable regulations governing the use of public property within their custody and control. Whoever shall violate such regulations shall, upon conviction of such violations, be subject to a fine of not more than \$25.00 for each such offense.

3. The erection of a dwelling or locating of a building or other structure as a place of human habitation or occupancy, shall require a permit relating to an approved method of sewerage disposal for such dwelling or structure.

Such permit shall be issued by the Selectmen prior to construction or locating of a building and the methods of sewerage disposal shall conform in all respects to the laws of New Hampshire and regulations of the department of health.

4. To see if the town of Wentworth will appoint a building code committee to study the need for a simple building code and to report its findings before February 1, 1966. This is to govern new construction in the town of Wentworth.

21. To see what action the town will take in regard to raising and appropriating a sum of money for the Wentworth Bi-centennial Committee to use in 1966.

22. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money, if necessary, in anticipation of taxes.

23. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND YOUR DISTRICT CHIEF

The 1964 forest fire season surpassed the record year of 1963 in both length and severity. For the second successive year, we experienced a rainfall deficiency of more than ten inches and the compounding of such drought conditions, together with the many days of strong, dry winds, characterized 1964 as one of the most hazardous years in the past half century. Although our fire season was three weeks longer than that of 1963, the number of fires showed only a slight increase and more remarkable was the fact that the area burned dropped from 2280 acres in 1963 to 900 acres in 1964. Early detection and rapid response kept many potential fire disasters from becoming reality. We all owe a debt of gratitude to the men in this community who responded and fought our fires so efficiently. Our state is now 86% wooded and its economy - both industrial and recreational - is greatly dependent on this forest resource. The responsibility for adequate fire protection of this great area - 4,350,000 acres is everyone's responsibility and prevention is one of our most effective tools.

Prevention is good common sense.

1. Take your rubbish to the town dump. If you must burn, obtain a permit and watch your fire until it is dead out.
2. Instruct your children in fire safety. Keep matches from young children. Explain to them the dangers of lighting matches and making outdoor fires.
3. Be sure discarded smoking material and matches are out.

A major portion of our preventable fires this year are chargeable to three causes: (1) permit fires allowed to escape; (2) children playing with matches; and (3) smokers. Let's be mindful of the fact that all such fires endanger property and lives.

We wish to thank you for your very fine cooperation during the past fire season and with your continued cooperation we are confident we can improve our fire record in 1965.

The following is a report of activities conducted for the Town of Warren, by the N. H. Division of Public Health - Public Health Nursing, for the year 1964.

On January 16/64 Sabin Type I Polio vaccine was given to 30. This completed the series started in 1963.

Children from Wentworth have taken advantage of the monthly pediatric and immunization clinics held at Warren Medical Center the past year.

The children population, at the present, in Wentworth, has a very good immunization record. This should help cut down the incidence of communicable diseases in the town.

A Preschool Dental Fluorine Program was held at Moosilauke Medical Center for Wentworth children early in June. A total of 16 children 3-6 years of age took advantage. All children attending received dental cleaning, four fluorine treatments, literature on care of teeth and excellent dental care instruction by Mrs. Marjorie Plaisted, Dental Hygienist of the Division of Dental Public Health of New Hampshire. This excellent program was sponsored by the Wentworth Woman's Club. Much credit is due them for their excellent publicity, arranging clinic appointments, transportation and assistance at the clinics.

Assistance has been given families in the town through Crippled Children's Services, New Hampshire Sight Conservation Program, special pediatric clinics and home visits as necessary. Names were submitted to the Social Service at Hanover and to Plymouth Fireman's Operation Santa Claus for remembrances.

My sincerest thanks to the following: Mrs. Fisher R. N., School Nurse, and school personnel for assistance at the school clinics, the Wentworth Woman's Club for assisting at the Sabin Polio Clinic and for sponsoring and assisting with the Preschool Fluorine Program. My thanks also to the Trustees of Moosilauke Medical Center for letting Wentworth take advantage of the use of the Clinic Center.

ITEMS TO CONSIDER

The town should thank the Wentworth Woman's Club and the Booster Club who were sponsors for the new signs which have been installed on all the town roads, also for reimbursing the town \$50.00 towards the expense, also Mrs. Agnes Allen, whose efforts and time were freely spent in seeing that the project was carried out.

Looking forward into the coming year, problems such as road maintenance and reconstruction come into view. Mr. King, with 20.3 miles of road and four bridges, Mr. Matava, with approximately 9 miles and nine bridges and with snow removal of a mile extra, use all their own equipment with the exception of two snow plows, sand spreader, stone rake and a 1912 model four horse drawn road machine.

In order to receive T. R. A. funds from the state for reconstruction the town has to maintain what is called blacktop roads at the town's expense, making it necessary for an amount for that purpose to be raised and appropriated. In the past, the Duncan funds were allowed to be used for such purposes.

In the year 1964, it is noticed that the cost of winter maintenance was slightly more than one half of appropriation, about \$155.00 per mile, the average \$323.00 per mile for year.

The T. R. A. money was used principally on the Buffalo Road, and the State Aid plus T. R. A. balance was used on the Tarleton Road leading from Route 25A. As to T. R. A. and State Aid fund, location for operation should be accomplished within area of reconstruction to save the cost of movement of machinery.

The roads in need of work are one mile on south end of Buffalo Road, Turner Road, Ellsworth Hill Road leading out of Wentworth Village, Beech Hill Road and one mile on west end of Rowentown Road.

Town bridges are as a whole in fair condition excepting the steel bridges which need painting. The steel bridge on the Rowentown Road and the one near the Charles Dufour place have several times been beaten up by ice. Ice and heavy trucks create the most damage; however in the last few years, deterioration from lack of paint makes the situation not too good.

When bridges need reconstruction, the state will match funds as of 60 percent by the state and 40 percent by the town when applied for, with the present valuation. At the present, no bridge reconstruction has been advised.

At a glance, the Town Hall could stand a coat of paint, otherwise it is in fair condition.

As to the fire fighting equipment now owned by the town, a decision should be made in regard to its handling, if by the Volunteer Fire Department or not. At the present time, no percentage in the reduction of fire insurance premiums is allowed; in order to apply for a discount in premium rates, some plan of handling of equipment satisfactory to the State Underwriters has to be put into operation. At present it seems that the handling is somewhat unorganized.

Civil Defense, with all its red tape, should be considered. Some of the methods cannot be applied in this community, but it has some good qualities which should be considered.

In looking to the future, regulations should be put into effect pertaining to health, safety and retaining the beauty that nature provides and in respecting the rights of resident citizens.

The Wentworth Booster Club, during its last official meeting for 1964, discussed the problem of maintaining and repairing the "Town Sign", which was provided and kept in repair by our group for several years.

It was the consensus of opinion among those present that responsibility for the sign should be taken over by the town.

I have been instructed to write and request that a proposition for such be included in the Town Warrant for discussion and consideration at the next town meeting. We figure the cost would be approximately \$50. a year.

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the School district in the town of Wentworth qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said district on the 8th day of March 1965, at 8 o'clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.
6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
8. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state foundation aid fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

9. To see if the district will authorize the School Board to meet with Warren School Board to study the possibility of consolidation.

10. To see if the district will authorize the School Board to negotiate one or more tuition contracts for the education of the district children.

11. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

1964—1965

Wentworth Elementary School

In submitting my report as Principal of the Wentworth Elementary School, I would like to express my appreciation of the splendid cooperation of the other members of the teaching staff, the members of the school board, our superintendent of schools, and the parents. It is this cooperation which has helped to make our school system run smoothly and effectively.

In September forty-three pupils were enrolled, grades one and two in the primary room under Mrs. Olive Belyea, grades three, four and five under Mrs. Dorothy Jesseman, and grades seven and eight in the grammar room.

We have been fortunate in having the services of Mr. Eugene Langdoc who has conducted a well organized music program.

Mr. Douglas Robertson has introduced the Rhinehart Writing System which is proving very effective in improving the children's handwriting and has been especially beneficial for those in the primary grades as a means of forming correct writing habits.

Another supplement program this year has been the showing of films obtained from the Audio-Visual Center at the University of New Hampshire.

The Britannica Junior Encyclopedia which is especially adapted to use in the intermediate grades has proved to be a useful addition to our reference material.

An excellent hot lunch program has been carried out under the supervision of Mrs. Gertrude Wolfe with nearly all of the children taking advantage of a hot noon meal.

The new "merry-go-round" on the playground has been much enjoyed by the children.

At Christmas time the pupils presented their annual Christmas program.

It has been a pleasure to work in the Wentworth School this year, and I wish to take this opportunity to express again my appreciation of the fine cooperation of all those connected with our school system.

SCHOOL NURSE REPORT

The nurse visited the school thirty times during the past school year and visited each classroom while at school. Children were inspected for symptoms of sickness, pediculosis or skin infections. They were also weighed and measured so growth and development could be noted as well as recorded.

Hearing and vision tests were conducted on each pupil. Notices were sent home when results seemed to indicate further attention was desirable and parents were advised the family doctor should be consulted.

First aid was given when necessary and children as well as parents were advised on health problems.

During the year the school nurse cooperated with the State Nurse in holding various clinics. A Sabin Oral polio clinic was held where forty-one immunizations were given in Type I, II, III vaccine to pupils and teachers. At the Warren Clinic twenty-four immunizations, booster shots and vaccinations were conducted. The nurse made ten home visits and answered a number of telephone calls on Health problems.

Records are kept on each pupil on general health, contagious diseases and immunizations.

Children from Wentworth have the advantage of the monthly pediatric clinic at the Warren Medical Center. These services are available for physical examinations, immunizations and psychological testing.

SUPERINTENDENT'S ANNUAL REPORT

Hereby submitted is my annual report as your Superintendent of Schools.

The school year in Wentworth began with one staff change. Mrs. Myrtle Craig replaced Mrs. Brown as Principal of the school. Mrs. Craig has taught for a number of years in Campton and Rumney and in my opinion is an excellent Principal. We were not able to obtain a music supervisor for the preceding school year but this year Mr. Eugene Langdoc accepted the position. He is a graduate of Boston University College of Music and although his training and interest has been largely with older boys and girls, he has appeared to be eager and willing, and like all beginning teachers, is learning and improving as he goes along.

Mrs. Wolfe still continues to operate a successful lunch program and her cooking leaves nothing to be desired.

I am of course pleased that you still continue to see fit to staff your school with three teachers. With a school enrollment through the 8th grade of about thirty-seven pupils, students get a good deal of individual attention but it does make your per pupil cost of instruction high.

Mrs. Jesseman has already told me she does not plan to return next year and it is going to be difficult to replace her. Recent college graduates generally shy away from a multiple-grade situation because their experience in practice teaching has not included this type of situation. If you decide to continue with three teachers, I shall work as hard as I can to get you the best possible individual.

Most of you know already that Warren becomes part of this Supervisory Union July 1, 1965. They are interested in some type of consolidation between the two towns that might provide for a better education and at the same time be more economical than at present. If you are interested, I would recommend that

under the last article in the warrant, someone authorize the School Board to meet with the Board from Warren to talk over the problem and perhaps make some recommendation at the annual school meeting in March 1966.

As a result of the recommendation of the study committee on math books last winter, new modern math was installed in all the grades for this year. The series selected was the Discovery Edition of the Harcourt, Brace & World modern math series. This approach to arithmetic combines the old and the new to the middle of the road approach and meets with my approval. One of your teachers has taken courses in teaching the new mathematics and generally the students seem to like the new work and its challenge. Two other areas in which we now need to concentrate are those of Science and Language Arts. Hopefully, I will be able to do half of each area for next year and complete the entire revision in the following budget.

The Cooperative School study committee you appointed at your last meeting has been meeting regularly since September to try to find a solution to our Junior High School and High School problem. At this point, the majority of the Planning Board agrees that a solution which would take care of grades 7-12 is the best answer. The study is far enough along at this point so your committee could give you a preliminary report, if you desire one, at your annual district meeting this year. I realize full well that many of the small towns where there is presently space enough for the 7th and 8th grades are resistant to this type of program but in my opinion, this junior high school area is the one at the present time which is most neglected. Admittedly in the course subjects of Math, Science, Language Arts and Social Studies we do very well, but improvement could still be made under a system where there are enough students together to make competition keener and specialists in each area to do the teaching. This however, is only part of the problem. In preparing for high school today, it is as-

sumed that young people will have been exposed to regular classes of Home Economics for girls and Industrial Arts for the boys, a Foreign Language with Language Laboratory facilities on an elective basis, and regular classes in Physical Education, Art and Music. Along with the physical education would be included interscholastic and intramural athletic programs with adequate facilities and trained coaches. Plymouth and Ashland are the only two towns involved in the study who at the present time anywhere near meet these requirements, and although it is obvious from the way honors are distributed at high school graduation each year we are not failing from a poor academic point, we are not doing nearly as well as we could with the group that graduates who do not continue their education but are on the market for work. In a larger high school, we could not only offer a greater academic selection of courses, but could expand our program to the point where young high school graduates would be a more saleable commodity on the job market. As the Study progresses and certain facts are known, as many hearings will be held in each district as are necessary to see that the townspeople know the full story. Besides the fact that a better education will be provided, which should be of primary importance, attendance through grade 12 should be increased and made easier for all pupils where the cooperative district will furnish transportation. It is difficult to make clear without seeming to threaten or intimidate a district or a group of voters, but a great deal of thought should go into the decision every citizen makes who is interested in the education of children as to what the alternatives are if other districts go along without them.

EXPLANATION OF SUPERINTENDENT'S SALARY

Section 5, Chapter 243, Laws of 1953, of the State of New Hampshire, requires that the school district annual reports show the total amount paid to the superintendent of schools as per the following quotations: "Reports. Each superintendent of a supervisory union shall annually prepare a report showing the total salary paid to the superintendent, which report shall show in detail the amount derived from the per capita tax and the amount paid directly by each school district in the union."

One-half of the supervisory union expenses is prorated among the several school districts of the union on the basis of adjusted valuation. One-half is prorated on the basis of average daily membership in the school for the previous school year ending June 30th. The Superintendent of Supervisory Union No. 48 during 1963-64 received a salary of \$9,700.00 which was made up as follows: \$4500.00 paid from the per capita tax and \$5200.00 prorated among the several school districts. Allowances of \$1100.00 for travel within the union was also prorated as stated above. The several school districts now under five since, by State Department of Education directive, Woodstock School District is no longer a part of Supervisory Union No. 48.
