TOWN WARRANT

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

*To the inhabitants of Bedford, in the County of Hillsborough,
in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:*

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Town on Tuesday, the fourteenth day of March next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

ARTICLE I. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.

ART. II. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation for the same.

ART. III. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for the support of the poor, for Memorial day, highways and bridges, and for any other necessary expense to the Town.

ART. IV. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money, up to the sum of \$10,000, if needed.

ART. V. To see if the Town will vote to allow a discount on early payment of taxes, and if so, to fix the time and rate.

ART. VI. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of money necessary to maintain street lights for the ensuing year.

ART. VII. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3000 to pay up on notes.

ART. VIII. To see if the Town will vote to paint the Town Hall and raise and appropriate money for the same.

ART. IX. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the Town through Tax Collector's Deeds.

ART. X. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$125 for the Town Library.

ART. XI. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$15 for the care of the clock on the Church.

ART. XII. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100 for the care of the New Cemetery.

ART. XIII. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10 for the care of the Old Cemetery on the Back River Road.

ART. XIV. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$7 for the care of the Old Cemetery on the Beals Road.

ART. XV. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$15 for the care of Joppa Cemetery.

ART. XVI. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,628.00 for State Aid Construction, the state to furnish \$2,628.00.

ART. XVII. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 to buy additional seats for the Town Hall, if the Grange will give to the Town an equal amount of money.

ART. XVIII. To see if the Town will vote to buy additional road equipment and raise and appropriate money for the same.

ART. XIX. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 to gravel the sandy road from No. 6 School past Bursiel's corner.

ART. XX. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following ordinance: It shall be lawful for motion pictures, lectures, concerts, dramatic or vaudeville performances to be held upon the Lord's Day in the Town of Bedford, but not before six o'clock in the afternoon; but in the case of any such entertainment in connection with which admission is charged or donations are made or accepted, a license shall be obtained therefor from the Board of Selectmen upon such terms and conditions as the Board of Selectmen may determine.

ART. XXI. To see what action the Town will take with regard to paying Fire Departments from adjoining Towns for services rendered at fires.

ART. XXII. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, and all other officers heretofore chosen, and to transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

ANNUAL REPORT OF SCHOOL BOARD

ANNUAL MEETING 1932

The annual meeting of the Bedford School District was held at the Town hall on Thursday, March 3, 1932, at 2 P. M. The following officers were elected for the ensuing year:

Moderator—William Melendy.

Clerk of School District—Frank Manning.

Treasurer—Henry Blood.

Mr. Geo. A. Warren was elected a member of the school board for three years.

The town auditors were elected school auditors for the ensuing year.

The district voted to reduce the School Board's budget by Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00), making the assessment \$16,491.07.

The Medical Inspection Act was dismissed.

The district voted to authorize the School Board to sell the land and building of the No. 11 school and give a deed relinquishing all property rights the district may have in said land and building.

The district voted to raised and appropriate the sum of Two Hundred Dollars (\$200.00) to build a fence at the Peter P. Woodbury school under the supervision of the School Board.

THE SCHOOL YEAR

A meeting of the School Board was held after the district meeting. The Board organized for the year 1932-1933, with

Mr. A. J. McKelvie as chairman and Mrs. Nettie B. Tarr as clerk.

A meeting of the supervisory union was held at New Boston on Tuesday evening May 10, 1932.

Mr. J. Byron Tarney was again unanimously re-elected superintendent of schools at a salary of \$3,000.00. Each district pays one quarter or \$250.00 of the excess salary of \$1000.00.

Miss Edith G. Walker was unanimously re-elected as school nurse at a salary of \$1,620.00, a ten per cent reduction from the previous year. Bedford's quota is \$339.75.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Bedford:

There have been no changes this year in the teaching staff. The present enrollment is about 200.

The school census of last September showed 280 persons between the age of 5 and 16 years of age, a larger number than in preceding years. This indicates that the demands upon the public schools have not lightened in any way. Rather the contrary is true and will continue. About forty pupils attend parochial schools in Manchester.

A substantial item in the School Budget is that for High School tuition. This amount has increased during the past several years, due principally to the increase in the number of pupils involved. For the first half of the current year, the tuition rate was at the rate of about \$89 per year per pupil. A ruling by the Manchester School Board, effective February 1, 1933, raises the rate to \$100, an increase of about \$11 per pupil per year. With thirty or one or two more pupils—this total increase amounts to approximately \$300 per year. Not only has the rate been increased, but no longer is any credit allowed for pupils who may leave school after the tuition has been paid for a full half year. Up to this time these credits have been allowed, pro-rated according to the number of weeks lost from school. But from February 1 of this year a full half year's charge of \$50 will be made—even if the pupil remains but a few days or weeks.

The Stevens-Buswell Parent Teacher Association gave a Primary work table and a dozen chairs for use in the Primary room. This adds excellent equipment. They have also sup-

plied some play equipment and provided "treats" for the Children's Christmas party.

The Donald Street Parent Teachers supplied material and the men made swings and see-saws. They have also given games, song books and Christmas presents. The trip to the White Mountains given by this association to the graduates of the Grammar School each June has become a habit. The men offered to paint the Donald Street building if the School Board would supply the paint. The Board did. The building not only presents a most improved appearance but is also in excellent condition.
