Commissioners' Report.

To the Citizens of Belknap County:

In compliance with the laws of the State of New Hampshire your commissioners present for your consideration their report for the fiscal year ending December 31st, 1905, together with a statement of the financial condition of the County at the end of the year which is accompanied with the other reports required by law, being those of the Superintendent of the County Farm, Jailer, Clerk of the Superior Court, Solicitor, Sheriff, Treasurer, Auditors, also the reports of the County Farm Physician and Chaplain, to which is added a copy of the proceedings of the County Convention.

The Alms House, House of Correction and Jail have been under the continued management of Mr. and Mrs. Weymouth as Superintendent and Matron. They are well known to the citizens of the county and the ability and fidelity which they have displayed in the discharge of their duties have received favorable comment from different boards of Commissioners during all the years of their service to which no word of ours need be added. We congratulate the county and especially the people under their immediate care upon their engagement for another year.

As will be seen by a reference to the report of the Superintendent the amount directly chargeable to the County Farm is largely reduced by payments by him to the Treasurer on account of merchandise sold and board furnished. The statement of the cost of board per week at the Farm has been made upon a slightly different basis from that of the last few years owing to the change in the law made by the last legislature which places the burden of caring for all persons sent to the House of Correction for drunkenness upon the county,

thus relieving the cities and towns from paying board for this class of minor offenders against the laws relating to the police of towns. In consequence of this change a list of the prisoners boarded is published in this report, showing the number of weeks for each, and the total is added to the total number of weeks' board furnished paupers, to get the proper number upon which to make the computation required by law. Although these House of Correction prisoners have been employed as much as possible about farm and other work, especially in the line of improvements to the county's real estate, by removing stone from its fields, and otherwise, yet the character, habits and state of health of the majority of the persons who are sent to the Farm in this way necessarily make the maintenance of them quite an expense in the aggregate.

The amount of orders drawn during the year for poor off the Farm, \$8,917.24, should be reduced by the subtraction of \$415.11, the amount received from other counties and towns for aid rendered parties chargeable to them, leaving \$8,502.13, which represents the actual cost to this county for caring for this class of dependents. This amount, while considerably less than the average for the last few years, is slightly in excess of last year owing to an unusual amount of sickness among the old soldiers partly dependent upon your bounty, some of whom have answered to their last roll-call during the past year.

Acting under the authority granted us by the county delegation in the legislature and in line with the unanimously expressed wish of that body and aided by a special act of the legislature granting us the authority to take the land contemplated by right of eminent domain if it could not be otherwise acquired at a reasonable price, we purchased a lot of land on the northerly side of the old court house lot from the owner, Mr. Byron W. Brown, having a frontage on Court street of 60 feet and a depth of 172 feet, the depth of the old lot being 132 feet. The buildings standing on this lot, which were a constant menace to the Court House and county records in case of fire, besides being unsightly and otherwise objection-

able, have been removed. We also purchased of Mr. Arthur M. Wakeman, for county purposes, an additional piece of land on the north, three feet in width, together with a right of way over a strip of land 14 feet wide, adjoining the above. The purchase price for both lots, as will be seen by reference to the financial part of the report, was \$3,925.

A new departure in Belknap County affairs to which attention is called is the establishment of a sinking fund. The debt of the county consists of \$50,000 in four per cent. bonds, \$30,000 of which are due in 1913 and the balance two years later. It is evident that some provision must be made in advance for taking care of the bonds when they mature, if the debt is not refunded, unless the taxpayers wish to see the county tax nearly doubled during these two years. It may be interesting in this connection to note what the county tax has been for the past few years. In 1892, owing to a change in the law, the date of ending of the fiscal year of the county was changed from May 1st to December 31st, so that the tax of \$60,000 made at that time was for twenty months' expenditures. Since that time the county tax for each year has been as follows:

Some of the larger taxes in this list were granted in anticipation of unusual expenses such as the purchase of additional land at the County Farm, the erection of new buildings, buying additional steel furniture for the Court House vaults, etc. On account of the low tax in 1897 the cash in the treasury was reduced nearly \$6000 that year.

An examination of the county's finances shows that while there has been quite a variation from one year to another, yet when the unusual expenditures of some years and the cash

balances at the end of different years are taken into account, the actual cost to the taxpayers for current expenses for a term of years has been something over \$30,000 per year.

For the past three years the county has received quite an income from liquor licenses in addition to the county tax, so that besides making some permanent improvements without a special tax for that purpose, the cash in the treasury has increased so that the amount on hand January 1st has been sufficient to carry the county through to the middle of July, when the first settlement of the county tax with towns is made, without borrowing money as had previously been necessary since the cut in the tax in 1897. In view of these facts your county delegation in the legislature, as may be seen by a reference to the record of proceedings which is published with this report, fixed the county tax for two years at \$30,000 for each year, and unanimously passed a vote authorizing the establishment of a sinking fund, as has already been noted, if it could be done by the use of funds not otherwise needed. After paying the current expenses of the county for the year and \$3,925 for the land to enlarge the Court House lot we have deposited \$6000 in savings banks within the county where it is expected that the dividends upon the original sum and upon the accumulation of interest will very nearly equal the rate of interest on the same amount of the county debt. Whether this policy shall be continued is a problem for future legislators and commissioners.

The cash in the treasury, \$17,633.84, is thought to be sufficient under ordinary conditions to meet the wants of the county until the first payment of the coming year's taxes is due.

We desire publicly to express our appreciation of the kindness of county, city and town officers who have aided us in many ways in bringing about what we consider a fairly successful year in county affairs. And we especially desire to thank the various clergymen and others who have freely given of their time and energy to elevate the moral and religious condition of the inmates of the Farm, and who have brought good cheer to many saddened lives.

To the Supreme Court:

We herewith submit our seventeenth semi-annual report of the auditing of the several accounts of the county officers for the year ending June 30, 1905, as required by law.

We have examined the bills rendered by the county commissioners for their services and expenses from January 1, 1905, to June 30, 1905, and are of the opinion that the sums charged for services are for time actually spent in the business of the county, and that the sums charged for expenses are reasonable.

We have also examined the treasurer's account and find it correct, with proper vouchers for all payments made by him. We have compared the orders drawn by the treasurer with the record of orders drawn by the county commissioners and find that they agree and that the treasurer has paid all orders drawn by them.

The Treasurer had on hand January 1, 1905, \$18,953.49. He has received from all sources, \$2,030.14, making a total of \$20,083.63. He has paid out on orders drawn by the County Commissioners, \$11,278.33: coupons on bonds, \$380.00; on orders drawn by the court, \$4,647.08; leaving a balance in his hands of \$4,678.22.

We have also examined the account of the Superintendent of the County Farm, and find that he has received since Jan. 1, 1905, for board of inmates, prisoners in jail and all other sources, \$1,129.26; he has paid the Treasurer, \$605.96, and has cash on hand, \$523.30.

We have examined the books of the County Commissioners, and find that they have drawn orders on the Treasurer, as

above stated, of which \$4,962.27 was for the support of the external poor as follows :
