WARRANT FOR THE ANNUAL TOWN MEETING

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

(L. S.)

To the inhabitants of the Town of Boscawen in the County of Merrimack in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

-You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Boscawen on Tuesday, the fourteenth day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation of the same.
 - (a) Town Officers' Salaries.
 - (b) Town Officers' Expenses.
 - (c) Election and Registration Expenses.
 - (d) Expenses Town Hall and Other Town Bldgs.
 - (e) Police Department.
 - (f) Fire Department.
 - (g) Health Department, including District Nurse.
 - (h) Vital Statistics.
 - (i) Sewer Maintenance and Rubbish Disposal.
 - (j) Town Highway Maintenance.
 - (k) Street Lighting.
 - (1) Libraries.
 - (m) Town Poor and Old Age Assistance.
 - (n) Memorial Day and Other Celebrations.
 - (o) Cemeteries.
 - (p) Interest on Loans.
 - (q) Insurance Premiums.
 - (r) Sidewalk Maintenance.

- 3. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for Blister Rust Control.
- 4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$175.10 for Town Roads Aid, the State will contribute the sum of \$700.41.
- 5. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for payment on principal of Town debt.
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to build a Sidewalk on the west side of North Main Street beginning at Queen Street and running northerly to land of Joseph Bassett and raise and appropriate money for same.
- 7. On petition, to see if the Town will vote to provide that all money received for lots in Pine Grove Cemetery be invested so that the accrued interest may be used for the upkeep of said cemetery, and in case the amount of interest received is more than necessary, the excess is to be used for other Boscawen cemeteries only. Also, that the selectmen should endeavor to collect for the cemetery lots already acquired, but not yet paid for.
- 8. To see if the voters will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes on short term notes, an amount not exceeding \$30,000.00.
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to give the Selectmen authority to transfer money from one appropriation to another.
- 10. On petition, NOW COMES your petitioner Arthur Verge, of Boscawen in the County of Merrimack and State of New Hampshire, and hereby petitions the said Selectmen and the Town of Boscawen to accept the road leading from Queen Street to the John Weir's farm, both in said town, as a town road, to be constructed, cared for and re-

paired in the same manner as other roads and public highways in the said Town of Boscawen are constructed, cared for and repaired and vote to raise and appropriate money for same.

11. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN

Crises like the present test the quality and sincerity of everyone's patriotism and citizenship. The times make such unavoidable demands for universal cooperation in the many lines of essential regular and emergency public endeavor that the response given may well be assumed to be the real measure of one's love of country and his appreciation of the opportunities it offers. Ranking high in the list of public endeavor is the protection of our forests from fire. It calls for full and generous cooperation by each of us. Fire statistics indicate that better than 98 per cent of all fires in New Hampshire are man-caused. If human carelessness could be eliminated from the problem, the number of fires would drop to a mere minimum of less than 2 per cent of present figures and fire costs and losses would reduce in proportion. While this goal will not be achieved because of the perversity of human nature, the record can be vastly improved through individual discipline, alertness and cooperation.

Discipline calls for personal restraint from following unrestricted natural impulses to do as one pleases with regard to fire; alertness in cautioning others against imprudent and illegal burning and in promptly reporting fires to the local forest fire warden; cooperation in complying with laws, rules, and regulations governing the kindling and care of fires, smoking, safety of mechanical units using fire in and near woodlands and assisting the local warden in extinguishing such fires as may occur.

The possibilities of disastrous and expensive woods fires are constantly becoming more real. The hurricane felled an estimated one and one-half billion board feet of standing timber, much of which was never cleaned up. To this hazard has been and is being added extensive areas of slash from additional hundreds of millions cut to produce vitally needed wood for the war effort. With the stage so set,

greater caution is increasingly necessary. It will pay substantial dividends in unburned forest areas and the saving of unnecessary fire expense.

The year 1943 was an extremely fortunate one because of favorable weather conditions. Many towns had no fires, some had minor fires while a few had expensive ones. The public controls the answer to the 1944 and future years' fire records. If the public is careful and cooperative the record will be good.

Your town warden is, perhaps, more perplexed and anxious during these war years than ever before because of increased forest fire hazards and diminishing supplies of available man-power. He looks directly to you to aid him. Will you? You can aid him most effectively by always securing the required permit before attempting to burn and by complying fully with permit requirements; by being patient when he advises of departmental restrictions on permit burning or that he deems it unsafe to burn; and by giving him the needed assistance in extinguishing fires when he needs your help. To do so is to meet one real test of citizenship.

BOSCAWEN PUBLIC LIBRARY

The schedule at the library maintains these hours the year round, namely:—Tuesdays, 2:00 to 4:30 o'clock; and 6:30 to 8:00 o'clock. Saturdays, 2:00 to 4:30 o'clock.

Penacook Branch: Mondays, 3:00 to 5:00 o'clock; Wednesdays, 3:00 to 8:00 o'clock.

Sub-stations still continue at Water Street School and at the Merrimack County Farm. Students of the Plains Grammar School come to the library each Tuesday of the school year for study, reference material and general reading.

Vacation Reading Clubs were conducted at both libraries with a total registration of 34, of which 28 completed the required work and received certificates.

Book Week was observed with the awarding of the certificates and special prizes earned by members of the Vacation Reading Clubs, also by fine collections of new books made ready for first circulation during that week.

Penacook and Boscawen Congregational churches enrolled in the Congregational-Christian Reading Contest.

We are pleased to report that even with the gas rationing and the working schedule that all members of the library staff maintain, full library hours have been kept. Circulation figures have only decreased slightly over last year. Less fiction has been read but non-fiction has shown a decided increase in both Juvenile and Adult books. The following is the circulation: Adult fiction, 6,809; non-fiction, 2,512; Juvenile fiction, 2,281; Juvenile non-fiction, 1,400; magazines, 684; reference questions answered, 2,716.

146 books have been added, 3 by gift and the remainder by purchase. We wish to express our thanks to the donors —Rev. Asa M. Parker and Mrs. George Morris. With the low rate of interest paid by banks and the increased cost of books, it was necessary this year to ask for a town ap-

propriation to augment the regular book account received from trust funds. A new book case has been built at the Penacook Branch giving room for about 300 more books.

The main library has been used quite regularly for Red Cross sewing.

The librarian attended all sessions of the New Hampshire Library Association annual convention at which time she retired from office having served the State Association as President for the past two years and filling other offices for five years previous to that.

The Boscawen Public Library received for the Penacook Branch, \$50.00 from the Thornton Fund for the purchase of worthwhile books for boys and girls. These books to be known as the Thornton Bookshelf. This is the second gift of this kind from the Thornton fund.
