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TOWN WARRANT

The State of New Hampshire

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Brookline in the County of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Daniels Academy Hall in said Town of Brookline on Tuesday, the tenth day of March, next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

3. To hear reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees and all other officers heretofore chosen, and pass any vote relative to same.

4. To see what sum the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for highways and bridges.

5. To see what sum the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Memorial Day.

6. To see what sum the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Public Library.

7. To see what sum the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Cemeteries.

8. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to distribute inventory blanks when assessing, instead of mailing. 9. To see if the Town will vote to allow any discount on taxes.

10. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

11. To see if the Town will vote to charge a twenty cent penalty on each Poll Tax remaining unpaid after September first, or take any action relative thereto.

12. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to enter into contract for janitor service at Daniels Academy or take any action relative thereto.

13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for the control of the White Pine Blister Rust, in cooperation with the State Forestry and Recreation Department.

14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$669.12 to defray the cost of the additional work done on the heating system at Daniels Academy at the time the new boiler was installed or take any action relative thereto.

15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1600.00 for repairs and painting of Daniels Academy and the Fire House or take any action relative thereto.

16. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to contract for delivery of fuel oil at the Daniels Academy Building for a period not to exceed five years or take any action relative thereto. 17. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to take the \$297.19 overdraft of the Road Department from the 1953 road appropriation or take any action relative thereto.

18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$47.77 to reimburse the Police Department for purchase of bicycle number plates and registrations or take any action relative thereto.

19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 to pay for the telephone at the home of the Chief of Police or take any action relative thereto.

20. To see if the Town will vote to require operators of Trailer Parks in the Town of Brookline to obtain a license from the Building Inspector, such license to be without fee. A Trailer Park to be defined as land used for parking trailers that are being used for living quarters for more than one week. Or take any action relative to this article.

21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$404.77 to secure State Aid for permanent improvement of highways or take any action relative thereto.

22. To see if the Town will vote to petition the State Tax Commission to have an audit made by the Division of Municipal Accounting, and make an appropriation to cover the expense of such audit.

23. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to enter into a contract with the Grange for rental of the Town Hall for three years establishing in such authorization the rental price to be charged or take any action relative thereto.

24. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150.00 for cutting and removing trees, or take any action relative thereto.

25. To see if the Town will prohibit any person from building structures or altering existing structures for the housing of animals and poultry within 200 feet of a residence owned by another person except buildings designed for the occupancy of less than 50 poultry or animals for personal use, or take any action relative thereto.

26. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$1500.00 for the purchase of fire hose and equipment and the installation of a new heating system at the Fire House or take any action relative thereto.

27. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$101.54 for the overdraft of the 1952 TRA Fund or take any action relative thereto.

28. To see if the Town will vote to accept the following sums, the income on said sums to be used for perpetual care in Pine Grove Cemetery:

\$200 from Sawtelle Heirs—Isaac Sawtelle Lot.\$200 from Miriam Holcombe—Dr. Holcombe Lot.

29. To see what sum the Town will raise and appropriate for the tarring of Canal Street or take any action relative thereto.

30. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

GENERAL REPORT OF SELECTMEN

With the hope of adding to the meaning of the various reports, the selectmen offer the following explanations:

1. TAXES. A general 10% increase in all assessments resulted in a reduced tax rate although the tax bills remained nearly the same unless some change had been made in the property. The publication of the Assessed Valuations for 1952 has been completed and the books distributed. We anticipate that this publication will raise numerous questions and we will welcome the opportunity to discuss these questions with you at any of our regular meetings. It might be well at this time to explain our policy in regard to requests for tax abatements, and avoid the expense and time wasted in a recent case where the petition was taken to court. First of all the taxpayer must apply for an abatement before paying the tax in question or pay the tax under protest by accompanying the payment with a written protest stating his grievance. The Board will discuss the assessment in question with the taxpayer and if an agreeable solution cannot be reached the taxpayer may take his case directly to the State Tax Commission. The Commission will investigate the matter and hand down a decision which the Board will abide by. The ideal time to discuss your assessment with the Selectmen would be at one of the special meetings the Selectmen hold about the middle of April to receive inventory blanks and discuss assessments.

2. ROADS. In order to complete the re-surfacing of Springvale Road, Cleveland Hill Road and the Powers-Corey Road it was necessary to draw in part from the regular road maintenance fund. The total expense of this project was \$2950.14. \$1800.00 was appropriated expressly for this purpose and the remainder was drawn from the maintenance fund. The proposed work was completed on the Old Milford Road under the TRA Program. It is planned in the coming year to widen and tar part of the Russell Hill Road under the TRA Program and gravel the Oak Hill Road in addition to the routine maintenance of all Town roads. 3. HEATING SYSTEM. The new boiler was installed in the Fall in time to provide heat for school. In addition to the actual boiler installation we felt it was necessary to make additional changes to take advantage of the new boiler system and to protect it from the same pit-falls that spoiled the old boiler. The total cost of boiler, oil burner and necessary changes was \$2169.12. The sum of \$1500.00 was appropriated at the last Town Meeting. You will find an article in the warrant asking for the appropriation of the balance of \$669.12. The new system has met all our expectations to date and we hope you will enjoy it at Town Meeting.

4. TOWN HALL. We recommend that the Town Hall be painted this year. In addition to the poor appearance the exterior woodwork is beginning to suffer from lack of protection.

Selectmen meet at Town Hall the 1st and 3rd Wednesdays of every month at 8 P. M.

The Municipal Court of Brookline, during the calendar year 1952, handled a total of 50 cases, which represents an increase of 5 cases over the corresponding period for the preceding year. Of the remaining Two Hundred Five Dollars fifty cents (\$205.50), Forty Five Dollars (\$45.00) was expended for supplies and stenographic assistance in connection with a trial at which a written record was kept and Forty Five Dollars (\$45.00) represents fines that were suspended by the Court. The balance of One Hundrey Twenty Dollars fifty cents was expended in payment of the necessary witness fees, court attndants and the salary of the Justice and Associate Justice.

The amount remaining for the payment of the justices' salaries after payment of the other fixed obligations of the Court, was not sufficient to pay the Judge the One Hundred Dollar (\$100.00) salary authorized by the town. For that reason the Justice and Associate Justice have taken a corresponding reduction in their salaries for the current year so that there is no charge against the town for these services. The reduction in the net balance in the hands of the Court is attributable in part to the redistribution of fines affected by a recent legislature and the elimination of costs in criminal matters. It is anticipated however, that for the coming year some of the fixed charges of the Court would be reduced due to the purchase of an ample supply of Court forms during the year 1952 which should last for another year or more. Therefore, barring the unforeseen, there should be a small positive balance in the hands of the Court at the end of the 1953 calendar year.

During the year 1952, the Brookline Municipal Court handled a majority of traffic cases, several criminal cases other than traffic cases, 4 juvenile cases, and two matters involving violation of the building code of Brookline. Of the more serious matters disposed of by the Court, there was one involving reckless operation of an automobile resulting in death. This matter exceeded the jurisdiction of the Brookline Court and it was bound over to the Superior Court for trial by jury upon finding of probable cause by the Brookline Municipal Court. Your Justices are pleased to report that no cases appealed from the Brookline Municipal Court have been reversed by the Superior Court of Hillsborough County.

REPORT OF MELENDY POND AUTHORITY

During the past year the Authority has spent considerable of its money received from rents to improve the road around Melendy Pond. This road is now quite passable and it is believed that with one more year's work that section which has been opened will be satisfactory. The Authority also hopes that the road can be extended so that it will be passable for motor cars all the way around.

In addition to road work, the Authority has rented one lot during the past year. It will also be noted that two additional camps have been started and it is hoped that by the end of the summer of 1953 four camps will be complete. Many inquiries have been received from interested people during the past year and it is believed that with the completion of the camps already started and the improved road program, that several more lots will be leased during the 1953-54 year.

Although the progress of this development has been slow, it now appears that its success from a Town point of view is certain since additional taxes are already being received and in the very near future the total assessment for camps should exceed \$5000.00.

This map will not be to scale but it will be fairly accurate in giving locations of properties. It is hoped that future years will permit developing this map to a higher degree of accuracy.

In addition to the above, discussions have been held with the Chief of Police relative to police regulation. However, no new regulations are recommended for this year.

We would like to see the Planning Board continued, and through it, long range plans for the future development of the Town be laid out.

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ADMINISTRATION

I present my 14th report under the three headings which follow. Elsewhere statistics comprise our report.

A. Instruction

It is indeed unusual and fortunate to report no changes in the teaching personnel for a number of years. Mrs. Varney, Mrs. Fisher and Mrs. Pickering, together with Miss Wheeler in Music, continue in the work of the first six grades.

Last year I mentioned the value of workshops. Again I report the one held this last November in Mental Hygiene. After Dr. Philbrook of Concord opened the sessions as the Keynoter, four groups in alternating sessions explored Child Growth and Development, Guidance, The Arts, and Physical Education. On the final day a summary was given from these groups and material of value presented for use in each home room. An evaluation was made by all the teachers assembled, indicating that the results were very worthwhile. The majority said it was "the best workshop we have held." I echo the values in these larger teachers' meetings, where more and differing ideas can be presented.

A 1951 pamphlet, "Good Schools for Children," states among other items that "The good elementary teacher

knows, understands, and likes children and their parents

is an educated person with wide interests and a stimulating personality

is professionally qualified for teaching has a deep and abiding faith in democratic values knows the community and takes part in its activities continues to grow personally and professionally cooperates with and is loyal to the school authorities is a happy, well-adjusted person really wants to teach."

Since the above might apply to any teacher, elementary or high school, I ask you to consider these points in judging those who teach in your schools.

B. Finance

Below I give you the figures to illustrate Per Pupil Costs, exclusive of Capital Outlay, Debt, Transportation and Tuition. These results are for 1951-52.

State Aid was received by all towns in this Union as follows: Amherst \$3,936.13, Brookline \$4,120.74, Hollis \$3,405.02, Milford \$5,245.16, Mont Vernon \$176.42. Next year's aid will be determined by the General Court now in session. Therefore, estimates used in this report may be exceeded or entirely eliminated before next June.

C. Needs

The radiation changes at the Daniels Academy Building are showing their worth now. The heat is uniform and pleasant in comparison to last year's overheating in one room and lack of heat in the other. This need I trust is now over.

I have consistently recommended redecorating and new lighting for the 5th and 6th room. I hope you will go through with this work.

I have an Art teacher in three school districts now. This most fundamental program should be a part of your curriculum. I wish we could extend his services to include Brookline.

Teachers and parents need to understand each other and mutual problems. I believe citizens should visit schools more, as interested in their child's education, for adjustment of children's difficulties, and to inquire into school problems. You may do all three intelligently, or offensively. My advice is to not criticize on one's first visit and then later "with fasting and prayer." Open minds lead to cooperative endeavors. This is only good taste in making our contacts with the school. I am extremely grateful to the teachers, the Board and to you citizens for the opportunity to serve. I appreciate all the cooperation we have had in "bringing to pass" a successful school program.
