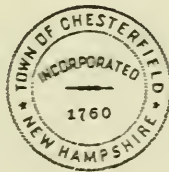

TOWN WARRANT

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Chesterfield in the County of Cheshire in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Chesterfield on Tuesday, the tenth day of March, next at 6:30 o'clock in the evening to act upon the following subjects. (Polls will open at 11:00 A.M.)

Article 1. To vote by Australian Ballot for all necessary Town Officers.

Article 2. To determine the method of collecting taxes for the ensuing year.

Article 3. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

Article 4. To hear the report of the Budget Committee and act thereon.

Article 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the following sums, as approved by the Budget Committee for:

Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,250.00 for street lighting. (Approved by the Budget Committee.)

Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$650.00 (six cents per \$1,000.00 of the Town's 1966 equalized valuation) to the Monadnock Regional Association, an agency to advertise, promote and preserve the natural advantages and resources of the Town in cooperation with the other 37 Towns of the Monadnock Region. (Approved by the Budget Committee.)

Article 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$954.00 in support of the Elliot Community Hospital for the year 1970. (Approved by the Budget Committee.)

Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,569.96 for Town Road Aid, thereby receiving an additional \$10,466.38 from the State. (Approved by the Budget Committee.)

Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$17,000.00 for Winter Maintenance of roads. (Approved by the Budget Committee.)

Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$29,000.00 for summer maintenance of roads. (Approved by the Budget Committee.)

Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,000.00 for the repair and upkeep of Highway Equipment. (Approved by the Budget Committee.)

Article 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000.00 for the continuation of Road Improvement of our Town Highways. The location of the work to be under the supervision of the Selectmen in cooperation with the Road Committee. (Approved by the Budget Committee.)

Article 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 each year for a new Town Truck, so that the Town can purchase a new truck every four years. Submitted by the Road Committee. (Approved by the Budget Committee.)

Article 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and ap-

propriate the sum of \$5,000.00 each year to build a fund for a new road grader (\$3,000.00) and a new loader (2,000.00) thereby the Town would be able to buy new equipment each 10 years, approximately. Submitted by the Road Committee. (Approved by the Budget Committee.)

Article 16. To see if the Town will vote to buy a new dump truck to cost not over \$9,500.00, to be paid for by turning in the old truck for an allowance of \$3,500.00, the balance of \$6,000.00 to be raised from 1970 taxes. (\$2,000.00 approved by the Budget Committee.)

Article 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$2,500.00 to insulate the ceiling and build an addition on the Town barn, and install a heating system therein to heat the barn. (\$2,500.00 approved by the Budget Committee.)

Article 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$800.00 to buy and erect an entrance gate, and fence where there are no existing walls, in the Morris Friedsam Cemetery. (Approved by the Budget Committee.)

Article 19. To see what action the Town wishes to take on the following: Because of the serious problems encountered by the cottage owners around Spofford Lake to obtain pure drinking water, that the following be provided by the Town of Chesterfield. A deep well to be drilled on land given to the Town by Mrs. Morris Friedsam (or on another suitable piece of land), a submersible pump provided, a pit made and a 42 gal. tank installed in it; from this tank a pipe to a manifold on which there would be attached four faucets suitable to fill water jugs from; the area around the well to be graded and graveled sufficient to park several cars off the main highway. Total cost of this project not to exceed \$3,000.00. Submitted by petition. (\$1,500.00 approved by the Budget Committee.)

Article 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$650.00 to install a dry hydrant at the pond next to the Doll Museum on Route 9. Submitted by petition. (Approved by the Budget Committee.)

Article 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$560.00 to purchase one mobile radio for use by the West Chesterfield Fire Chief. Submitted by Fire Wards. (Approved by the Budget Committee.)

Article 22. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to sell the Model "A" fire truck and to allow the West Chesterfield Fire Department to use said funds towards the purchase of a utility vehicle. The remaining funds needed for this unit to be furnished by the West Chesterfield Fire Department.

Article 23. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$440.00 to be used by the Chesterfield police department to buy three police monitors, for use by the Chesterfield police department to initiate a police alert system for Chesterfield on the Cheshire County police communications network. Submitted by petition. (Approved by the Budget Committee.)

Article 24. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$230.00 to be used by the Chesterfield police department, to buy one electronic siren for use by the Chesterfield police department on the Spofford constables vehicle in time of emergency. Submitted by petition. (Approved by the Budget Committee.)

Article 25. To see if the Town wishes to exclude from Social Security deductions all classes of positions of election officials or election workers for any calendar quarter in which the remuneration paid for their services is less than \$50.00 and have the agreement with the State made under Article 25 of the Town Warrant of 1952 so amended.

Article 26. To see if the Townspeople will vote to rescind the action taken under Article 27 of the 1951 Town Warrant, and have the Selectmen appoint the road agent to serve each year after Town Meeting 1971, rather than that the position be filled by electing the Road Agent. Submitted by petition.

Article 27. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$150.00 from the Chesterfield Cemetery Commission to be added to the Ernest Scharles Trust Fund.

Article 28. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$50.00 from the Chesterfield Cemetery Commission, to be known as the Halsey Flora Trust Fund, the income to be paid to said Commission for perpetual care in Spofford Village Cemetery Annex.

Article 29. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$50.00 from the Chesterfield Cemetery Commission, to be known as the Robert J. Bahr Trust Fund, the income to be paid to said Commission for perpetual care in Spofford Village Cemetery Annex.

Article 30. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$50.00 from the Chesterfield Cemetery Commission, to be known as the Hans Kienle Trust Fund, the income to be paid to said Commission for perpetual care in Spofford Village Cemetery Annex.

Article 31. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$100.00 from Chesterfield Cemetery Commission, to be known as the August Schiewe Trust Fund, the income to

be paid to said Commission for perpetual care in Spofford Village Cemetery Annex.

Article 32. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$500.00 from Dr. N. H. Robertson, the income to be used for perpetual care of the T. N. Robertson Cemetery.

Article 33. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$200.00 from Mrs. Henry C. Chickering, Sr. and Clifford E. Chickering, the income to be paid to the C.W.C.A. for perpetual care of Henry C. Chickering, Sr. and Clifford E. Chickering lot in the Chesterfield West Cemetery, and to be known as the Henry C. Chickering, Sr. and Clifford E. Chickering Trust Fund.

Article 34. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$200.00 from Frank A. Hubner, the income from same to be paid to C.W.C.A. for the perpetual care and upkeep of the Anna C. and Frank A. Hubner lot in the Chesterfield West Cemetery and to be known as the Anna C. and Frank A. Hubner Trust Fund.

Article 35. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$200.00 from Jane P. Nichols and Sylvia P. Scranton income from same to be paid to C.W.C.A. for perpetual care of the Henry I. Putnam lot No. 127 in Chesterfield West Cemetery Annex and to be known as the Henry I. Putnam Trust Fund.

Article 36. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$100.00 from Maverette R. Herrick and family, income from same to be paid to C.W.C.A. for perpetual care of the Fred R. Randall lot No. 139-140 in Chesterfield West Cemetery to be known as the Fred R. Randall Trust Fund.

Article 37. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

TOWN MEETING 1969

Proceedings of the Annual Meeting of the voters of the Town of Chesterfield, New Hampshire called at the Town Hall in said Town on Tuesday, March 11, 1969.

The meeting was called to order at 1:00 o'clock in the afternoon by the Moderator, James E. O'Neil, who read the Warrant through Articles 1 and 1-A and then declared the Polls open for voting by Ballot for all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year and by ballot for amendments to the Zoning Ordinances.

Harold Greenwood and Mildred Gauthier were sworn in by the Moderator as Assistant Moderator and Assistant Clerk.

At 6:30 P. M. the Moderator called the meeting to order again to act upon the remaining Articles of the Warrant.

Voted by voice vote on motion made by Arvid Pearson and supported by Harry E. Winn to pass over the reading of the remainder of the Warrant. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 2. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Harry E. Winn and supported by Robert Callahan that the same method of collecting taxes be used for the ensuing year as was used for last year. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 3. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Arvid Pearson and supported by H. Claude Mowry to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 4. Gerald Knickerbocker gave a report for the Budget Committee, stating that they had met twice besides the public meeting, and that their report can be found on pages 21, 22 and 23 of the Annual Report. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Harry E. Winn and supported by Arvid W. Pearson to accept the report as given. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

William Mitchell read a report of the Road Committee.

Article 5. Voted by voice vote on motion made by H. Claude Mowry and supported by Arvid W. Pearson to raise and appropriate the following sums, as approved by the Budget Committee for:

Article 6. Voted by voice vote on motion made by George Joslin and supported by Robert Callahan to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,150.00 for street lighting. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 7. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Robert Callahan and supported by George Joslin to raise and appropriate the sum of \$650.00 (six cents per \$1,000.00 of the Town's equalized valuation) to the Monadnock Regional Association, an agency to advertise, promote and preserve the natural advantages and resources of the Town in cooperation with the other 37 Towns of the Monadnock Region. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 8. Voted by voice vote on motion made by George E. Joslin and supported by Robert Woodman to raise and appropriate the sum of \$836.00 in support of the Elliot Community Hospital for the year 1969. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 9. Voted by voice vote on motion made by H. Claude Mowry and supported by Leonard Laskowski to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,379.92 for Town Road

Aid, thereby receiving an additional \$9,199.48 from the State. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 10. Voted by voice vote on motion made by William Mitchell and supported by H. Claude Mowry to raise and appropriate the sum of \$16,500.00 for winter maintenance of roads. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 11. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Arvid Pearson and supported by H. Claude Mowry to amend the Article and raise \$26,000.00 instead of \$22,500.00 as approved by the Budget Committee. This vote was declared in favor of the negative and did not pass.

Voted by voice vote on motion made by H. Claude Mowry and supported by Robert Woodman to amend the Article and raise the sum of \$24,000.00 for summer maintenance of roads. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

A voice vote on the Article as amended was carried in the affirmative as declared by the Moderator.

Article 12. Voted by voice vote on motion made by H. Claude Mowry and supported by Arvid Pearson to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,500.00 for the repair and upkeep of Highway Equipment. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 13. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Robert Callahan and supported by William Mitchell to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000.00 for the continuation of Road Improvement of our Town Highways. The location of the work to be under the supervision of the Selectmen in cooperation with the Road Committee. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 14. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Leonard Laskowski and supported by Robert Woodman to pass over this Article concerning the raising and appropriating the sum of \$2,500.00 for repairs and improvement of the road which connects Atherton Hill Road to the Old Swanzy Road. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative and the Article Passed over.

Article 15. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Alfred Schiewe and supported by George E. Joslin to amend this Article by deleting the last part, namely: "to raise and appropriate the sum of \$700.00 to blacktop this road." Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative. Voted by voice vote on the Article as amended so that it read "To accept a deed from Alfred H. Schiewe and Ray-

mond E. Butler, deeding a 900 foot gravel road leading off from Route 9, presently known as Wilde Road, and providing access to 4 residences. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 16. Voted by voice vote on motion made by George E. Joslin and supported by Leonard A. Laskowski to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,764.00 as approved by the Budget Committee to buy a plate pipe arch bridge (culvert) to replace the old wooden structure over Hubbard Brook near Howard Kaiser's residence. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 17. Voted by voice vote on motion made by William Mitchell and supported by H. Claude Mowry to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 each year for a new Town Truck, so that the Town can purchase a new truck every four years. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 18. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Leonard Laskowski and supported by William Mitchell to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000.00 each year to build a fund for a new road grader (\$3,000.00) and a new loader (\$2,000.00). Thereby the Town would be able to buy new equipment each 10 years, approximately, as submitted by the Road Committee. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 19. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Robert Callahan and supported by Harry E. Winn to pass over this Article concerning raising the sum of \$33,000.00 for a new grader, turning in the old grader toward the cost, and the balance to be borrowed on long term notes of \$5,000.00 each and payable in 1970-1974 inc. The Moderator declared the vote carried in the affirmative and the Article passed over.

Article 20. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Arvid Pearson and supported by Robert Callahan to pass over this Article concerning raising the sum of \$500.00 to repair the culvert at the corner of Church and Cross Streets in Spoford Village. The Moderator declared the vote carried in the affirmative and the Article passed over.

Article 21. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Arvid Pearson and supported by Robert Woodman to pass over this Article concerning raising and appropriating the sum of \$500.00 to lower the road and replace the culvert in front of the shop of Arvid W. Pearson on Spring Street in Spoford Village. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative and the Article passed over.

Article 22. Voted by voice vote on motion made by

George E. Joslin and supported by Henry C. Chickering, Jr to raise and appropriate the sum of \$42.00 to install a light at the western end of Route 9 & 9-A on Spofford Lake. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 23. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Leonard Laskowski and supported by Winston H. Cray to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for the purpose of erecting a suitable memorial for the veterans of the veterans of the Korean War. This sum to be placed where it will draw the most interest. A committee to be composed of veterans, the chairman of the Board of Selectmen and three citizens will be selected. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the negative and the motion lost.

Article 24. Voted by voice vote on motion made by George E. Joslin and supported by William M. Mitchell to accept as a gift from Sallie S. Friedsam, widow of Morris Friedsam, the balance of the so-called Wetherbee Hill Lot and the so-called B. C. Thatcher Lot to be used by the Town as a Park, except that the Town may use such portion of the above premises as may be needed to enlarge the Town Cemetery. The Park shall be known as the Morris Friedsam Memorial Park. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 26. Voted by voice vote on motion made by H. Claude Mowry and supported by Henry C. Chickering, Jr. to authorize the Trustees of Trust Funds to establish a single Trust Fund for the Morris Friedsam Cemetery and all income from this fund be allocated to the Morris Friedsam Cemetery for care and upkeep of the Cemetery. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Voted by voice vote on motion made by George E. Joslin and supported by Robert Callahan to accept Article 27, 28, 29, 30, 31 and 32. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative. These Articles are as follows:

Article 27. Voted to accept the sum of \$150.00 from the Chesterfield Cemetery Commission, income from same to be paid annually to said Commissioners for perpetual care in the new annex to Spofford Village Cemetery and to be known as Lawrence O'Kelly Trust Fund.

Article 28. Voted to accept the sum of \$50.00 from Chesterfield Cemetery Commission, income from same to be paid annually to said Commission for perpetual care in Spofford Village Cemetery Annex, and to be known as the Richard Goodell Trust Fund.

Article 29. Voted to accept the sum of \$100.00 from the Chesterfield Cemetery Commission, income from same to be

paid annually to said Commission for perpetual care in Spofford Village Cemetery Annex and to be known as the Thomas Doyle Trust Fund.

Article 30. Voted to accept the sum of \$100.00 from Paul Penning, income from same to be paid to C.W.C.A. for perpetual care of the Penning-Cutler lot in Chesterfield West Cemetery and to be known as the Penning-Cutler Fund.

Article 31. Voted to accept the sum of \$100.00 from Ruth Estler, income from same to be paid to C.W.C.A. for perpetual care of Estler Vault and lot in Chesterfield West Cemetery.

Article 32. Voted to accept the sum of \$150.00 from Viola V. Tuttle, income from same to be paid as billed annually to Chesterfield West Cemetery Association for care and upkeep of the York-Yeager burial lot in Chesterfield West Cemetery. Said fund to be known as the York-Yeager Fund.

Article 33. Voted by voice vote on motion made by George Marrow and supported by Carl A. Johnson that the Trustees of Public Funds be authorized to consolidate the investments of Trust Funds in one or more Common Trust Funds as the Trustees see fit, the identification of each Trust to be preserved in a book for that purpose. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Voted by voice vote on motion made by Robert Woodman and supported by Winston H. Cray to request our Representative to be instructed to investigate all possibilities of introducing legislation to permit all amendments to Zoning Laws and any new Zoning Laws to be in the Town Warrant and be discussed and voted on at Town Meetings. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

The Meeting was Recessed at 8:52 P. M. and the Ballot Box closed at 9:00 P. M.

For Road Agent: Bruce N. Richardson had 160 votes, Donald J. Underwood had 99 votes, George L. Fuller had 22 votes, Lawrence M. Chickering had 8 votes and there were 11 scattered votes. Bruce N. Richardson was declared elected.

For Fireward: Wayne H. Winn had 345 votes and there were 6 scattered votes. Wayne H. Winn was declared elected.

For Auditors: Ann M. Knickerbocker had 299 votes, Prudence S. Mitchell had 315 votes, and there were 8 scattered votes. Ann M. Knickerbocker and Prudence S. Mitchell were declared elected.

For Budget Committee: Gerald C. Knickerbocker had 301 votes, Alfred H. Schiewe had 250 votes, Donald C. Emery had 34 votes, Robert C. Callahan had 31 votes, William M. Mitchell had 8 votes, Arvid Pearson had 8 votes, Warren Allen, Robert Woodman and Carl Johnson each had 4 votes, Paul M. Penning and Herman Finkenstadt each had 3 votes, Henry Chickering, Jr., Winford Chickering and Shirley G. Bevis each had 2 votes and there were 26 others with 1 vote each. Gerald C. Knickerbocker, Alfred H. Schiewe and Donald Emery were declared elected.

For Trustee of Trust Funds: Mary R. Webb had 343 votes and Carl A. Johnson had 2 votes. Mary R. Webb was declared elected.

For Sexton: Raymond B. Chickering had 335 votes, and Marilyn Hoag, Carl Johnson, Alvin Davis and Albert Bradstreet each had 1 vote. Raymond B. Chickering was declared elected.

For Spofford Constable: Peter Petschik had 341 votes, John McKeon had 2 votes and Albert Bradstreet had 1 vote. Peter Petschik was declared elected.

For Center Constable: Robert T. Mills, Jr. had 350 votes and was declared elected.

For West Chesterfield Constable: Lester M. Chickering had 255 votes and James E. Leahy had 97 votes. Lester M. Chickering was declared elected.

Beano: Shall the provisions of Chapter 171-A of the Revised Laws relative to playing games of Beano be adopted in this Town? "Yes" had 135 votes and "No" had 56 votes. Therefore "BEANO" was adopted.

The vote on the following Amendments to the Zoning and Building Ordinances for the Town of Chesterfield as proposed by the Planning Board and by Petition for submission to the voters at Town Meeting resulted as follows:

1. Are you in favor of adding to Article 3 Section A, as amended, of the Zoning Ordinances the following: Exception: Upon application, approval may be granted by the Board of Adjustment to its owner for use of a piece of land, containing not less than 20,000 square feet and having a frontage of not less than 100 feet on a public right of way, as the site for construction of a dwelling provided such owner is the same person who owned such land at the time of the adoption of this amendment. Any building lot contained in a subdivision, the plat of which had been approved by the Planning Board prior to the adoption of this Amendment, may also be approved by the Board of Adjustment as the site for the construction of a dwelling. "Yes" had 201 and "No" had 76 votes.

2. Are you in favor of amending Article 4 Section A2 of the Zoning Ordinances by substituting the words 60 x 100 feet for the words 40 x 60 feet. "Yes" had 189 votes and "No" had 93 votes.

3. Are you in favor of Amending Article IV, Section B, of the Zoning Ordinances so that in its amended form it shall read as follows:

B. A single Trailer or Mobile Home may be located anywhere in the Town except in the area specified in Article III, Section D, provided it meets the minimum standards as follows:

1. It shall be located on a lot with a minimum of 20,000 square feet, with 120 foot frontage.

2. It must be placed on a permanent foundation or continuous supporting wall of masonry, masonry units, concrete or other similar materials, extending at least 3 feet below normal ground level.

3. It shall conform to the minimum standards of sanitation as set forth by the New Hampshire State Department of Health.

4. Such Trailers and Homes shall be considered buildings or dwellings within the terms of this ordinance. "Yes" had 199 votes and "No" had 101.

4. Are you in favor of amending Article 1, Section 1 of the Zoning Ordinances, so that in its amended form it shall read as follows:

1. Residential District No. 1, namely all lands to a depth of two hundred fifty feet on each side from the center line of all Paved Public Roads and Highways within the Town of Chesterfield. "Yes" had 164 votes and "No" had 121 votes.

SCHOOL DISTRICT MEETING

Chesterfield Central School
Chesterfield, New Hampshire

March 8, 1969

The Moderator called the meeting to order at 3:04 p.m. and the Clerk read the Warrant through Article I. The Moderator, Harry E. Winn, then declared the polls open for balloting for the necessary District officers.

Prior to the meeting, the following were appointed Ballot Clerks by the School Board: Jean Hubner, Dorothy C. Mowry and Mildred E. Gauthier. They took the oath of office from the Moderator. A count of the ballots showed 497 ballots

The Moderator appointed Gordon Decato assistant Clerk and William Mitchell assistant Moderator. They took the oath of office from the Moderator.

At 8:02 p.m. the Moderator again called the meeting to order, and the Clerk read the remainder of the Warrant.

The Articles were then disposed of as follows:

Article 2. James E. O'Neil moved that the Article be passed over. Seconded by Carl Johnson. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 3. Wayne Winn moved that the reports of agents, auditors, committees, or officers chosen, be accepted as printed in the Annual Report. Seconded by Russell Johnson. Vote on the motion declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 4. Leonard Laskowski moved that the district vote to accept the provisions of Public Law 89-10 (Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965), and appropriate such funds as may be made available to the district under said Federal Act for such particular projects as may be determined by the school board. Further, that the district authorize the school board to make application for such funds and to expend the same for such projects as it may designate. Seconded by Clara B. Wellington. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative

Article 5. George E. Joslin moved that the district vote to authorize the school board to make application for and to accept and use in the name of the district such advances, grants in aid or other funds for educational purposes as may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the United States Government, the State of New Hampshire,

or any other department or agency thereof, or any federal, state, or private agency. Seconded by James E. O'Neil. Vote on the motion declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 6. Lillian L. Lane moved that the district vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$314,726.73 for support of schools, for payment of salaries for the district officials and agents, and for the payment of the statutory obligations of the district. Seconded by James E. O'Neil.

Alfred Schiewe moved that the motion be amended to read \$315,726.73, to provide funds for additional bus service on Route No. 9 to make it possible to pick up all children on the side of the road on which they reside. Seconded by Linda Schlichting. The vote on the amendment declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

The voice vote on the motion, as amended, was declared by the Moderator to be lost.

James E. O'Neil moved that the Article be amended to read that the district vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$307,357.73 for the support of schools, for the payment of salaries for school district officials and agents, and for payment of the statutory obligations of the district. Seconded by Lillian L. Lane.

Alfred Schiewe moved that the motion be amended to read \$308,357.73 to provide funds for additional bus service on Route No. 9 to make it possible to pick up all children on the side of the road on which they reside. Seconded by Lillian L. Lane. The voice vote on the amendment was declared by the Moderator to be carried in affirmative.

Article 7. No business was brought up under this Article to transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

At 9:55 the Moderator declared the polls closed.

For Auditors (2) for the ensuing year: Prudence S. Mitchell had 67 votes; Ann M. Knickerbocker had 67 votes; Merle Chickering had 1 vote, and Ann Bevis had 1 vote. The Moderator declared Prudence S. Mitchell and Ann M. Knickerbocker elected Auditors for the ensuing year.

REPORT OF THE SCHOOL LUNCH PROGRAM

July 1, 1968 to June 30, 1969

The National School Lunch Program helps to safeguard the health and well being of our nation's children. Wholesome, appetizing lunches are served and are planned to supply a great part of a student's nutritional requirements daily.

The school lunch program helps in promoting nutritional education. The children learn to know and like foods they have never seen or eaten before.

The Hot Lunch Program opened September 9, 1968 with Mrs. Louise Charles as manager and Mrs. Marion Berry as her assistant.

The reimbursement rate from Federal Funds remained at four cents for each Type A meal served to children. Surplus commodities received from the U.S. Government made it possible to maintain the old price of thirty cents for children. Adult meals were raised to forty cents. Under the Special Milk Program our lunch program received a four cent reimbursement for each half-pint of milk served. The children were able to purchase milk at three cents a half-pint.

The hot Lunch Program served between 150 and 210 meals daily. Two hundred and forty-five turkey dinners with all the trimmings were served prior to the Thanksgiving vacation.

Menus continued to be prepared a month in advance and sent home to parents.

PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

The 1969-1970 school year began with an enrollment of 302 children. This represents an increase of 14 children over September 1968's enrollment of 288 children. The greatest concentration of pupils, however, is in the lower grades. Should the incoming first grade classes continue to number in the forties, a space problem will definitely occur within the next two or three years. This year's fourth grade is the only grade in the school with fewer than thirty children.

We presently have forty-two children in grade one, forty-seven in grade two, thirty-three in grade three, twenty-eight in grade four, forty-three in grade five, thirty-three in grade six, thirty-five in grade seven, and thirty-nine in grade eight.

We have five new teachers on the staff: Social Studies, grade six, seven, and eight, Mr. Robert Duhaime; grade two, Mrs. Carolyn O'Neill and Miss Priscilla Reardon; grade three, Mrs. Brenda Zarnowski; grade four and five, Mrs. Ruth Hatt; and Mrs. Suh Ling Lee Chang, Music, grade one through eight. Also new to the staff, Mrs. DiAnne Anderson, school nurse; Mrs. Sylvia Thompson, head cook; and Mrs. Patricia Decato, teacher aide.

Our school is a well equipped up to date school. In the past few years we have made every effort to keep pace with educational changes. The curriculum is under constant study and we have attempted to offer the children a modern program. It is due to the constant efforts of the teachers and other educational personnel that we have been able to

offer a balanced, modern program to the children. We are still receiving money from Title I of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act. This money is used to continue to provide a program of individualized instruction in reading for those children in grades two through five who are having difficulty. This program is under the direction of Mrs. Doris Parker.

School maintenance is a very important part of our program. This year, as in the past, we have continued a program to keep the school in good operating condition. Thanks to the able efforts of Mr. Merton Davis, the citizens of Chesterfield can be proud of their school. This year two classrooms were retiled and a new roof was put on the old section of the school. We also added a new table in the cafeteria.

In the last few years the school has been on a program whereby our curriculum has been brought up to date. We have been very successful, but there are still many serious considerations to be faced. We do not have room or facilities to run an adequate physical education program. The library has been adequate, but is rapidly becoming overcrowded. An art program should be a future consideration, as well as a full time remedial reading teacher. A balanced program is being offered to grades seven and eight, but there are several areas that are not being offered. We cannot offer industrial arts, home economics, developmental reading, physical education, or guidance. In the area of extracurricular activities we are limited. We cannot offer the children an expanded music program, which would include chorus and band. It is also difficult to provide club activities for the upper grades.

The school library has over 4,000 volumes. Many thanks to the parents who volunteer their time to give the school an effective library program.

I would like to thank the citizens, teachers, and the Board of Education, for their cooperation this year.

ADMINISTRATIVE REPORT

To the School Board and the Citizens of Chesterfield

Chesterfield is a member of a successful A.R.E.A. high school program. The 1970 warrant contains an article that gives Chesterfield citizens an opportunity to vote to participate with several other districts in a study of the advantages and disadvantages of having a grade 7-12 A.R.-

E.A. We recommend that Chesterfield become a member of this study group.

There are several reasons why a study of a 7 - 12 A.R.E.A. is worthwhile for Chesterfield: One of them is that Chesterfield's participation in a 7 - 12 A.R.E.A. study could solve the perennial question of whether or not there will be a sufficient number of classrooms to take care of the enrollment as of September each year. There is a definite possibility that there will be a need of more than twelve rooms in September, 1971 as is pointed out in the principal's report.

Another article in the warrant gives Chesterfield citizens the opportunity to support the action of th Supervisory Union 29 meeting in voting to have a Supervisory Union Educational Consultant. An organization chart is included in this annual report. The administrators recommend your support of the Supervisory Union action. This is not an additional position, but a realignment of assignments.

Classroom visit reports by the principal and assistant superintendent indicate that we have a good staff who are working hard to give your sons and daughters a good education. We are continually striving to improve by utilizing new educational procedures, materials and acknowledge within the limits of available building facilities.

Textbook additions have included science for grades one and two, books for grades four, five, six, seven, and eight to complete the change in the English program, and Junior High School literature texts and Social Studies texts for grades seven and eight have also been purchased.

A number of minor repairs were accomplished this past year among them was installation of new opaque window shades in the classrooms on the west side of the building, cabinet doors for kitchen cabinets, and window screens for the cafeteria. Major repairs included a new roof on the older part of the building, plus extensive roof repairs on the first building addition. Extensive repairs were found to be necessary on the older boiler. This repair allowed the school to continue in operation. However, a new boiler will have to be installed during the summer months.

New equipment purchased included materials for the science class, a filmstrip projector, a cafeteria table, and a commercial refrigerator for the lunch program. The last two items were the major equipment expnse.

The overall budget increase is approximately eight percent. Major increases occur in the areas of salaries, contracted services and tuition. We feel that the recommended salary increases will enable us to remain competitive and

help us to retain our competent teaching staff. We observe that there is only one member of the present faculty who was teaching in Chesterfield three years ago.

Instructional contracted service increase is necessary if we are to continue to be a member of the Monadnock Children's Special Services Center. We consider the "Center" to be of considerable assistance in solving the problems of a number of our pupils. School board members who serve on the board of directors of the "Center" are high in their praise of the services rendered by this organization.

Tuition increase represents the actual cost in terms of the pupils that are now attending Keene High School and are expected to return and the number of eighth grade pupils planning to go on to high school.

It is interesting to note that tuition would be considerably more if Chesterfield was still following the 1965-66 procedure.

The lunch program personnel provide excellent lunches and should be complimented in this respect and for the speed with which they serve during the lunch period.

An important contribution is made by our custodian, Mr. Davis. Visitors to the building are impressed by the excellent care that is evident. Pupils are also indirectly influenced to better conduct and habits of cleanliness.

The people in the Supervisory Union office wish to express their appreciation and thanks to the citizens, school board, and staff for their cooperation and support during the past year. We look forward to working with you in the future in our mutual endeavor to maintain a good educational process.

SCHOOL WARRANT

To the inhabitants of the School District of the Town of Chesterfield qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet in Chesterfield Central Elementary School in said district on th 7th day of March, 1970, at 10:00 o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

Article 1. To choose all necessary school district officers for the ensuing year. The polls will be open from 10:00 a. m. to 9:00 p. m.

Action on Articles 2 through 8 will begin at 8:00 p. m. o'clock in the afternoon to act upon the following:

Article 2. To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees, or officers chosen, and pass any votes relating thereto.

Article 3. To see if the district will vote to accept the provisions of Public Law 89-10 (Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965), and to appropriate such funds as may be made available to the district under said Federal Act for such particular projects as may be determined by the school board. Further, to see if the district will authorize the school board to make application for such funds and to expend the same for such projects as it may designate.

Article 4. To see if the district will vote to authorize the school board to make application for and to accept and use in the name of the district such advances, grants in aid or other funds for educational purposes as may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the United States Government, the State of New Hampshire, or any department or agency thereof, or any federal, state, or private agency.

Article 5. To see if the district will vote to establish an Authorized Regional Enrollment Area (AREA) School Planning Committee, said committee to consist of three qualified voters of whom at least one shall be a member of the school board, or take any other action relating thereto. *Note:* This District is currently in an AREA arrangement with Keene for grades 9-12. For planning purposes this District should continue discussions with other Districts as to the mutual problems of education, particularly grades 7-8. Approval of this article makes no commitments for this District except to form a committee that will consider the future, meet with such committees from other districts, and report its findings at a future meeting of this District. Appropriate discussion and planning for the future seems essential with pupil enrollment increases

and the evolution of educational change.

Article 6. To see if the District will vote to authorize the employment of a Teacher Consultant for New Hampshire Supervisory Union No. 29 as provided in RSA 186:11 XII and XXIV as amended or take any other action related thereto.

Note: The School Board of New Hampshire Supervisory Union No. 29 (which includes the board members of this district) have voted to reorganize the administrative structure of the Supervisory Union. This reorganization includes the elimination of one Assistant Superintendent of Schools and in place of this position the creation of the position of Consultant. The change is a matter of a reassignment of responsibilities and functions with no change in the actual number of people and with no direct increase in the budget. The item appears in this warrant as dictated by law since official titles and functions will be changing. It is anticipated that the overall reorganization will result in increased efficiency while providing more services to this District, its school board, instructional staff, and students.

Article 7. To see what sum of money the district will vote to raise and appropriate for support of schools, for the payment of salaries for school district officials and agents, and for payment of the statutory obligations of the district.

Article 8. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

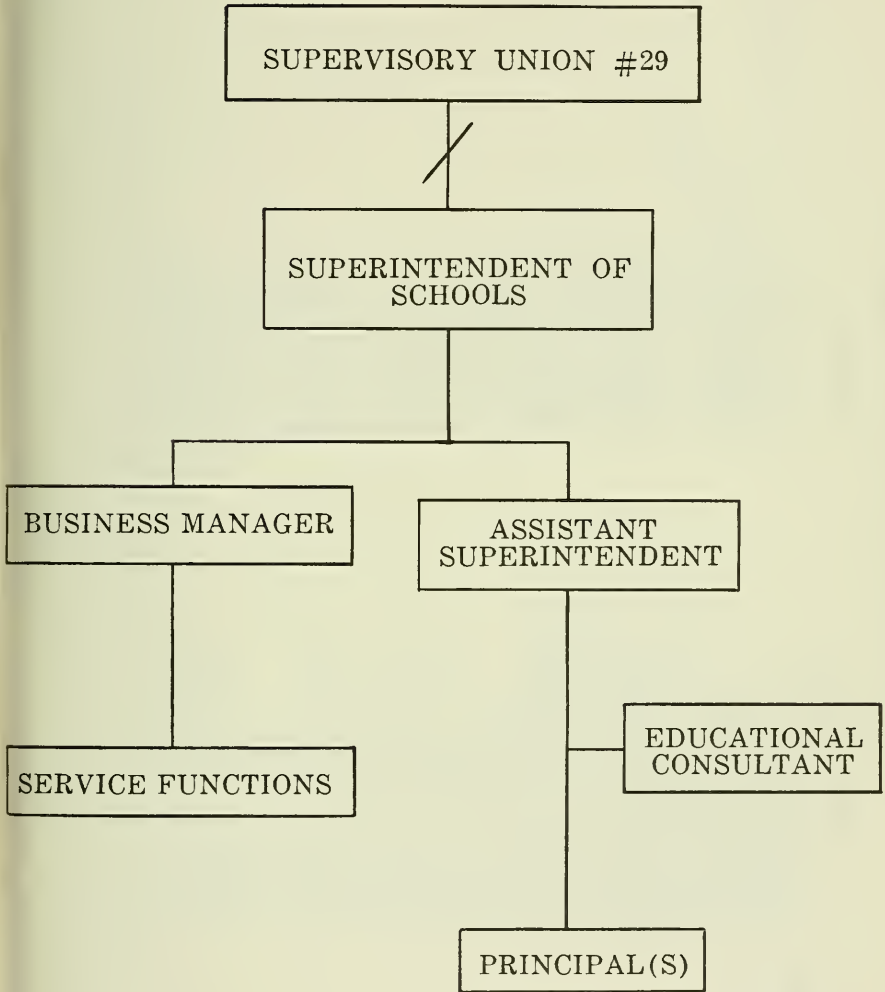

Report of Forest Fire Warden and District Chief

Less fortunate than our northern towns, we had too many fires. Carelessness in burning trash and discarding smoking material and children playing with fire caused most of the fires. Your Forest Fire Warden's job would be easier if everyone understood the State laws that govern the kindling of outdoor fires. A synopsis of these laws follow:

FIRE PERMIT

A *fire permit* is needed for all outdoor fires in or near woodland anytime the ground is not covered with snow. This includes household waste burning, even if in an incinerator, grass burning, garden trash as well as brush burning. Such burning is restricted by regulation to be *prior to 9:00 a m. and after 5:00 p. m.*

EXCEPTIONS

Commercial or Industrial burning is allowed anytime under normal conditions with permission of the District Chief and a permit from the Fire Warden.

Camp or cooking fires are allowed on your own property with permission of the Fire Warden. On another's property with written permission of the landowner and permission of the Fire Warden. The Warden can forbid such fires if in a hazardous area. Permits for cooking fires in the White Mountain National Forest can be obtained from the Laconia Office or at the Ranger Stations. Permits are not required in public camp or picnic grounds when fireplaces have been built for this purpose.

PENALTIES

1. For kindling a fire without a permit. Maximum of \$200.00 fine; or imprisonment for not more than 60 days.
2. For kindling a fire by any means wilfully or recklessly that shall endanger woodlands the maximum fine is \$500.00 or one year's imprisonment.
3. For failure to totally extinguish a camp or cooking fire before leaving it the same penalties as in (1) above.
4. For dropping inflammable material in or near woodland, maximum fine is \$25.00.

Fire prevention is a personal matter and a good habit. Keep our town free from smokes in 1970.
