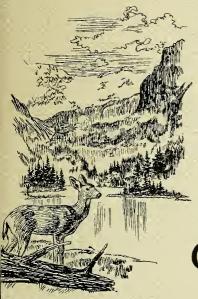

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

The Polls will be open from 10:00 A.M. to 6:00 P.M.

To the inhabitants of the Town of Clarksville in the county of Coos in said state, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet in the Town Hall in said Clarksville on Tuesday, the 8th day of March, next at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary town officers for the ensuing year.
- To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and to make appropriations of the same.
- 3. To see if the Town will authorize the selectmen to hire such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year.
- 4. To bring in your ballots on the following articles:

Art. I To see if the town will vote to discontinue Bressette Road, subject to gates and bars, because of the poor condition of the road and the vast expense involved in repairing and in winter maintenance of same.

Art. II. To see if the town will vote to discontinue plowing door yards. This will save the town approximately \$6,000.00 to \$7,000.00.

REPORT OF DISTRICT FIRE CHIEF AND

TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN

Since its beginning in 1893, the State Forestry Department has recognized the fact that forest fire prevention and suppression is a joint state and town or city responsibility. Local authorities recommend names of persons to the State Forester, who appoints one person as town or city fire warden and several other persons as town or city deputy fire wardens to a three year term.

The local forest fire warden controls the kindling of all outside fires, when the ground is not covered with snow, by issuing a written permit for kindling a fire. Permits are only issued at such times and in such places as the fire warden deems as safe.

The State Forest Fire Service trains the local forest fire organization in modern forest fire prevention and suppression tactics. The State also provides backup personnel and equipment for suppression and prevention activities.

The combination of State and local forces has resulted in one of the smallest acreage loss due to forest fires in the United States for the past 20 years.

GUIDANCE COUNSELOR'S REPORT

This year 1976 was a transitional one for the guidance services of Supervisory Union #7. John M. Shields, guidance counselor for the past five years, retired and I came on board in September. My initial objective was to carry out those programs which had already been established by my predecessor.

All scheduled testing both on the elementary and secondary level for all schools was carried out. The major emphasis since my arrival was in administering reading and individual tests in an attempt to find those students with special needs.

The registration, placement and scheduling of students was carried out during the Spring. Re-evaluation of this procedure has been undertaken the results of which we hope will make this service even more valuable in the coming years.

The necessary graduate follow-up survey required by the State Department of Education has been completed in both high schools and the results forwarded to Concord.

The greater utilization of School placement committees has resulted in having all those students presently in special programs re-evaluated. Where it was deemed necessary, class schedule changes were carried out so that greater assistance to those students needing help could be given. Through the use of these committees we have established a clean line of communications between the school, the parents, and the necessary referral agencies.

A program of Career Education has been established or is in the planning stages in the eighth grade in all the schools. A workshop designed to inform teachers about career education was held in January of this year.

I believe a much greater use of the guidance services was done by former graduates of our schools. They have asked us for assistance in finding information, obtaining necessary forms and in actually helping them return to school for further training and education. I am happy to say that some of those seeking assistance have been out of school for at least twenty years.

It is hoped that through cooperative efforts between the faculty, the parents and the students we can continue to improve the guidance services of Supervisory Union #7; and remember, I am only as far away as your telephone.

SCHOOL HEALTH REPORT

The health programs in the Stewartstown and Pittsburg Schools are planned to maintain the highest of health standards. Our success is dependent upon the cooperation of the home with the school and requires the active interest of all parents.

Dr. William Gifford and Dr. Marjorie Parsons again provided their professional medical advice and care for all our students.

Each year the following services are performed:

- 1. Checking heights, weights, and teeth.
- 2. Testing hearing and vision.
- 3. Physical examinations for those participating in athletics as well as students in grades 4, 8, and 11.
- 4. T. B. skin tests as needed for students and for all personnel.
- 5. Immunizations as needed.
- 6. Urine tests for students in grades 4, 8, and 11.
- 7. Home visits.
- 8. Phone calls and letters contacts for follow through health care as deemed necessary.
- 9. Promotion of good mental health.
- 10. First aid and emergency care.
- 11. Health teaching and counseling as well as continuous supervision of general health and well being.
- 12. Scoliosis screening clinic for grades 5, 6, and 7.

The Matching Dental Program sponsored by the State of New Hampshire and the local towns was utilized this year with both the local dentists, Dr. Brault and Dr. Bartlett.

The New Hampshire Bureau of Dental Health has presented the dental prevention program to the fourth grade, with daily brushing and flossing of teeth and weekly food coloring tablets used to detect plaque under the supervision of classroom teachers. The objective is to eliminate dental plaque and help the student develop daily habits necessary for effective oral hygiene and thereby reduce dental diseases.

A pre-school hearing and vision clinic will be sponsored in May by the New Hampshire Division of Public Health for early detection of any defects, and the Sight Conservation Program presented by the State of New Hampshire is still being used by those needing their services. The Portsmouth Rehabilitation Center is available to our area by mobile unit for evaluation of students failing hearing tests.

Crippled Children's Service provides orthopedic examinations and and treatments at clinics held in either Littleton or Berlin.

North Country Education Services provides speech therapy for all students in the Union requiring help.

Upper Connecticut Valley Mental Health Services provide their professional services for students requiring their help as well as psychological testing by The Pupil Placement Team.

Once again, a reminder to all parents of children entering the first grade that the State Department of Education requires each youngster to meet the following requirements prior to school entry:

- 1. Physical examination.
- 2. T. B. test within one year.
- 3. Complete diphtheria, pertussis and tetanus vaccine series (5 in all).
- 4. Complete oral polio vaccine series (5 in all).
- 5. Rubella vaccine (German measles).
- 6. Rubeola vaccine (measles).

We like to urge all parents to take advantage of the pre-school clinics available in their area to prepare their children for meeting the above requirements for entering school. If your child does not meet the requirements of law, he or she will be omitted from school until the necessary preparations are fulfilled.

Every year everyone involved in our schools strives to improve the health program for all students. Hopefully, with everyone working together, we are maintaining and achieving high standards.

PITTSBURG - CLARKSVILLE TITLE I PROGRAM

Each year the Pittsburg/Clarksville School District receives a certain amount of money through Title I ESEA. The money allotted to the district is presently used to fund a remedial program and a pre-school program.

The remedial reading program focuses on grades 1 - 3, where fundamental reading skills are learned. The program gives reinforcement to children who do not receive enough individual instruction in the classroom to acquire these skills. Children meet every day with the teacher-aide in small groups or individually. They work on the same skills being taught in their reading classes; skills they have not yet acquired.

Title I uses a variety of learning methods. Since most work in reading classes involves books and paperwork, Title I stresses the multi-media approach. Records, filmstrips, manipulatives, and teacher-made games comprise most of our materials.

Eligibility for the program is decided in part by tests given each spring. However, teachers and parents also refer students throughout the school year.

The Pittsburg/Clarksville School District presents a unique situation to first graders and their teachers. No public kindergarten is available so many students do not acquire basic skills such as using pencils, crayons, or scissors; listening and acting as a group; pre-reading skills; and a basic speaking vocabularly (a small proportion of each class does not speak English). In addition to this, a large proportion of each class fails to acquire the social skills necessary for school. This situation is due to the fact that the children live in a rural community. Many times they do not associate with other children until the first grade for the first month or two of school. It also forces the class one or two months behind schedule. It is unrealistic to expect such a class to achieve all first grade skills.

Pittsburg is fortunate, however, to have received enough money from Title I to institute a year-long pre-school program. All children are screened in the fall. Eligible children receive instruction in their homes and in the classrooms each week. Home visitations are less threatening to students and offer parents a chance to be directly involved. Classroom instruction offers children a chance to develop social skills crucial to a successful first year. In conclusion, I wish to thank those involved in the program parents, teachers, and staff - for making the program a success.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

Included in this school report is a copy of the proposed Authorized Regional Enrollment Area plan. The plan, if accepted by the voters of Clarksville and Pittsburg, would provide a basis through which Clarksville would be assured a school to which it would tuition its pupils as well as a formula for determing tuition rates for the next five years.

A joint planning committee of members from the Clarksville and Pittsburg School Boards considered the advantages and disadvantages of such a plan. It was the decision of the planning committee that advantages do outweigh disadvantages; for example, under the plan Clarksville would be assured that it has a school to which it can send pupils for five years at a tuition rate based upon a formula agreed upon in advance. In addition, Clarksville would receive \$45 state aid for every elementary pupil under the plan and \$75 state aid for every high school pupil. The plan also allows for the representation of the Clarksville School Board in school affairs. The greatest advantage to the Pittsburg School District would be the receipt of an additional 10% in school building aid.

The disadvantage to Clarksville would be that the town would be obligated for five years to tuition its pupils to Pittsburg. The disadvantage to Pittsburg would be that should Clarksville increase drastically in pupil population in the next few years, Pittsburg would be obligated to receive all pupils for the five year term.

Considering both these advantages and disadvantages, it is strongly recommended that the plan be adopted by both towns.

Of interest to Clarksville should be the proposed building addition to the Pittsburg School. This addition incorporates a town-school library as well as a town-school auditorium and 4 additional classrooms for the elementary program.

My appreciation is extended to the members of the Clarksville School Board for their efforts in planning and proposing the Authorized Regional Enrollment Area Tuition Plan and their sincere interest in school affairs.

THE CLARKSVILLE AND PITTSBURG AUTHORIZED REGIONAL ENROLLMENT AREA PLAN BETWEEN THE SCHOOL DISTRICTS OF CLARKSVILLE AND PITTSBURG

This agreement is entered into pursuant to Chapter 195-A of the New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated, as amended, between the School Districts of Pittsburg and Clarksville.

- A. The name of the Authorized Regional Enrollment Area School shall be the Pittsburg School located in Pittsburg. The Pittsburg School District shall be the receiving district, and the Clarksville School District shall be the sending district and together they shall form the region which will be served by the A.R.E.A. school. The receiving district shall be responsible for Grades 1-12.
- B. The rate of tuition shall be the local cost of current expenses per pupil in grades 1-8 and 9-12, or the state average cost per pupil grades 1-8 and 9-12 respectively, whichever is less, for the school year immediately preceeding that for which the charge is made. Local costs shall be computed by the Superintendent of Schools and approved by the State Department of Education prior to December 15.

The tuition rates shall be made available to the sending district at the time they are published by the State Department of Education.

- C. State Incentive Aid shall be designated to the sending district.
- D. The receiving district shall bill the sending district on a semi-annual basis and the sending district shall pay said tuition on a semi-annual basis not later than January 15 and June 15 in each year.
- E. The estimated initial enrollment in the A.R.E.A. school for September, 1977, will be as follows:

- F. The date of operating responsibility shall be July 1, 1977. No district comprising the Authorized Regional Enrollment Area may withdraw from the plan before July 1, 1982.
- G. All students living within the sending district shall attend the A.R.E.A. school if assigned to one of the grades listed in Article A, with the following exceptions:
 - 1. Students who are enrolled in Grades 10, 11, and 12 in another school for the year 1977-78 shall be permitted to continue their education in that school until graduation, and the sending district shall pay the tuition charges as established by law.
 - 2. The sending district may pay tuition to any other district for pupils requiring special education or desiring vocational education not provided by the receiving district.
 - 3. The sending district upon written notification to the receiving district and acceptance upon by the receiving district, may in exceptional cases tuition to a neighboring school district.
- H. The receiving district, will provide facilities to accomodate all students in Grades 1-12 from the sending district in accordance with Article F.
- There will be at least two joint school board meetings of the Clarksville and Pittsburg School Boards annually for the purpose of consulting and advising about any and all matters of joint interest. The sending district will be advised of any improvements or changes in policies, curriculum, and other school programs and services.
- J. A member of the Clarksville School Board may attend any or all meetings conducted by the Pittsburg School Board in an advisory capacity and will receive agendas and copies of the minutes of meetings so called and conducted.
- K. The Pittsburg A.R.E.A. Schools shall give the sending district progress reports and attendance reports for all pupils enrolled under the provisions of the written plan.

The same pupil regulations will apply to pupils from the sending district as to those of the receiving district.

The written plan may be amended by the two districts comprising the region, consistent with the provisions of RSA 195-A, except that no amendment shall be effective unless the question of adopting such amendment is submitted at an annual or special school district meeting to the voters of the districts voting by ballot with the use of a checklist, if requested by any registered voter of the district, after reasonable opportunity for debate in open meeting and unless a majority of the voters of each district who are present and voting shall vote in favor of adopting such amendment. Furthermore, no amendment to the written plan shall be considered except at an annual or special school meeting of the two districts and unless the text of such amendment is included in an appropriate article in the warrant of such meeting. It shall be the duty of the school board of each district to hold a public hearing concerning the adoption of any amendment to the written plan at least ten days before such meeting and to cause notice of such hearing and the text of the proposed amendment to be published in a newspaper having a general circulation in the area before such hearing.
