## STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE.

To the inhabitants of the town of Durham, in the County of Strafford, in said State, qualified by law to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the town hall in said Durham, on Tuesday, the fourteenth day of March next, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects, viz:

- 1. To choose three selectmen for the ensuing year.
- 2. To choose auditors, town treasurer, collector of taxes, and all other necessary town officers for the ensuing year.
  - 3. To choose a town clerk for the ensuing year.
- 4. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to pay necessary town charges.
- 5. To see what action the town will take relative to the Pillsbury highway bill, so called.
- 6. To choose one or more road agents for the ensuing year.
- 7. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for repair of highways.
- 8. To see if the town will vote to allow a discount on taxes paid on or before July 1st, and how much.
- 9. To see if the town will vote to set apart that part of the public landing between the roads leading from the highway to residence of Margaret and Anna P. Ffrost for a park.
- ro. To see if the town will vote to reduce the grade and straighten and widen the hill known as Cutts or Burnham hill, on road known as Point road,

leading from Durham village to Point, and appropriate a sum of money not less than five hundred or more than eight hundred dollars to complete the same, agreeable to a petition signed by Lucien Thompson, Jeremiah Langley & Son, and eight others.

- 11. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to pay incidental library charges for the ensuing year.
- 12. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

# Trust Funds Held by the Town of Durham.

The Anna M. Woodman and the Sarah E. Griffiths legacies are both invested in the Savings Bank for the County of Strafford, Dover, N. H., and are each of \$300.00 as per book No. 22,499. The interest of three per cent has accrued on each since Jan. 1, 1897. The Lydia Simpson trust fund is of \$100 co, and is invested in the same bank, as per book A. 6,088. This fund is to be kept separate from all other trust funds, and a separate account to be made of the same in a suitable book procured for that purpose. This fund was deposited Feb, 24, 1897. The George Ffrost legacy fund consists of 13 shares of the capital stock of the Boston & Albany railroad, par value \$1,300 co; the dividends are received by the treasurer each quarter, and are placed to the credit of the George Ffrost Temperance Association, subject to their order.

#### SEVENTH ANNUAL REPORT

OF THE

## DURHAM PUBLIC LIBRARY.

The trustees of the Durham Public Library submit the following annual report for the year ending Feb. 15, 1899.

At the meeting of the trustees held March 19, 1898, the same officers were elected as in the past four years.

During the year two hundred and three books and volumes of magazines have been presented to the library, one has been purchased by the Durham Library Association, and two hundred and fifteen purchased with the town appropriation, making the total number of books now in the library six thousand and thirty-nine, and an increase during the year of four hundred and nineteen books (not including pamphlets.) The average circulation is about two hundred per week.

Miss Mary E. Smith continues to give annually generous donations of books, the past year seventy-four, while her nephew, Mr. Hamilton Smith, has given one hundred dollars in books, carefully selected by the librarian; and again the trustees acknowledge and appreciate their liberality and friendship.

Two hundred and twenty-five dollars are required for books for the ensuing year. (This is a fixed sum, as per contract.) It is estimated that one hundred and twenty-five dollars will be a sufficient sum to pay all miscellaneous expenses except insurance.

The present insurance of \$3000.00 expires during the ensuing year, and if renewed for a term of three years, (as was done in 1896), one hundred and five dollars will be needed for this purpose.

In the month of June a complimentary reception was given by the citizens of Durham to Miss Mary E. Smith, who has been librarian of the Durham Public Library for many years.

Miss Smith has freely given time and money to promote the welfare of the library, and the public took this manner of showing their high appreciation of her services. An elegant souvinier, appropriately inscribed, was presented to Miss Smith as a reminder of their esteem.

#### ANNUAL REPORT

OF THE

### Board of Education.

FOR THE YEAR ENDING MARCH 1, 1899.

The following are a few statements about our schools, what they have accomplished this past year etc. The teachers have worked earnestly and willingly trying in every way to accomplish best results, considering the amount of sickness the past year—whooping cough during the summer term, measles and grip during the fall and winter terms. No teacher however active and energetic can do as satisfactory work with such an irregular attendance. As the village schools needed another teacher a recitation room was made by taking a part of the entry and making the stairway smaller.

It was thought perhaps the children at Mast Road could be brought down there closing their school and save hiring another teacher. This was tried one term, but there being so much complaint from that district, the inconvenience of bringing children so far, that it was thought during the winter term this would be still greater, so a teacher was hired for Mast Road and school reopened for the winter term.

The children all over town deserve particular mention, as they have taken an interest in their work and obeyed the laws of the schools and their teachers.

The children could do still better in many ways if the parents would take as much interest in the work of their children as they should. What hinders many of the parents in the town from paying a visit now and then to the school room? If this was done parents could see for themselves what is being done and not depend wholly on what they hear, or perphas wait until a town report is printed before they know many facts that they should know, before the year closes. Visits from parents and friends to the school not only encourage children in their studies but are a help to the teacher.

Give this more than a passing notice and turn over a new leaf and go to the school room. Make it a pleasure to do so rather than a painful duty.
