THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Epping in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Town of Epping on Tuesday, the fourteenth day of March, next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and to make appropriations of the same.
- 3. To see what sums of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for roads and bridges.
- 4. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for contract with New Hampshire Gas & Electric Company for street lighting.
- 5. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for support of the Public Library.
- 6. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate to defray Memorial Day expenses.
- 7. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for winding and care of the Church Tower Clock.
- 8. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to have "The members at large" of the Budget Committee, appointed by the Moderator, in accordance with Ch. 52 s-2 Revised Laws, amended of the Municipal Budget Law.
- 10. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of five hundred dollars for the purpose of grading, improving, and tarring the town highway leading from West Epping Village to Fremont, beginning at

the Advent Christian Church and continuing easterly towards the Fremont Town Line.

- 11. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell the Meade-Morrison Tractor and Plow.
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell any property taken by tax title or otherwise.
- 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3550.00 to pay Layne-New York Company, Inc. for exploration work finding a new supply of water for Town of Epping Water Department. Work already performed June 1949 to October 21, 1949.
- 14. To see if the Town will vote to extend the eight inch water main of the Town of Epping Water Department, from the junction of road on route 125 with Railroad Avenue to a distance of 3530 feet more or less, westerly along Railroad Avenue and Fremont Road to a water supply located on south side of road near the house of Alfred Jean, also to construct a pump house and well with a deep well water pump on this location and for this total work to appropriate the sum of \$31,000.00 said amount to be raised by the sale of the Town notes or Bonds, matters of form, rates of interest, sale and dates of payments to be left to the discretion of the Selectmen.
- 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 to continue the White Pine Blister Control work as called for by Sec. 9 Chapter 238 Revised Laws.
- 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for the construction of a cement sidewalk from the Fire House down by the Town Hall as far as it can be done. The hydrant to be moved back and the curb in front of Town Hall is to be moved back to give a five foot walk.
- 17. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate a sufficient amount of money to have installed and main-

tained, a street light on the electric light pole near Joseph A. Proulx's oil tanks.

- 18. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate a sufficient amount of money to have installed and maintained, a street light on Church Street at the curve near Nichols' Garage.
- 19. To see if the Town will vote to create a board of Water Commissioners, under the provisions of Chapter 56 of the Revised Laws as amended, for the convenient management of the present and future water works system of the Town, and take such action relative to the Board (appointment or election, any compensation, powers, duties, etc.) as is appropriate under the said chapter.
- 20. To see if the Town will vote to install meters before 1953 for the use of water from its water works system, and authorize such water rates as may be approved by the proper State authorities, such meters to be paid for by sale of notes or bonds, matters of form, rates of interest, sale and dates of payments to be left to the discretion of the Selectmen.
- 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Class V highways the sum of \$614.21 upon condition that the State contributes \$2456.85.
- 22. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF HEALTH OFFICER

I herewith submit my report as Health Officer for the year ending Dec. 31, 1949.

I have had very few communicable diseases reported me indicating that the town as a whole, has been fortunate in this respect.

I would like to call the attention to a new chapter (297), of the laws of 1949 which is to be inserted as Section 33-36, Chapter 165, of the Revised Laws of 1942. This is in regards to open wells or holes in the earth which are more than four feet (4 ft.) deep and over eight inches (8 in.) in diameter. These open wells and holes have been the cause of many deaths among children in the past year.

Please cover these wells with covers that are heavy enough so our children cannot lift them up and fall in as they are often alone and would be unable to get out. Penalty of this law is a fine not more than \$500.00.

The State of New Hampshire

To the Inhabitants of the School District in the town of Epping qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Epping Town Hall in said district on the 11th day of March, 1950, at two o'clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
- 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
- 3. To choose a member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
 - 4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
- 5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.
- 6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
- 8. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen

the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

- 9. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate \$550.00 to be used for the transportation of West Epping High School pupils.
- 10. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate \$200.00 to be used for the transportation of other High School pupils who live more than two miles from school.
- 11. To transact any other business which may legally come before this meeting.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the School Board and Citizens of Epping:

It is with pleasure that I submit my third annual report as Superintendent of your schools.

This past year was indeed an unsettled one for education. The legislature cut state aid to schools from \$2,000,000 back to \$400,000. This fact seems unbelievable when it is generally understood that education is the basis of our democracy. The school children of today will be the citizens of tomorrow.

As a part of this report, there will be a page devoted to Return of District Revenue, which shows the actual budget that the School District is using for the current year (1949-50).

The expenses for the Supervisory Union have also been changed. Formerly all towns in this union paid their share of expense according to their number of teachers. Now it must be divided equally between equalized valuation (1949) and average daily membership. Epping's share of Union expenses is approximately 24%.

Teachers

Arthur T. Nelson of Kenyon, R. I. was elected to replace Gardiner Gregory as Headmaster of Epping High School. Mr. Nelson is a graduate of R. I. State and advanced study at Brown University and the University of Michigan. The new Headmaster teaches Math. and Science, coaches boys' basketball, is Scout Master, and through his efforts many improvements have been made to the High School.

Arthur Enman resigned to become principal of the Pollard School in Plaistow. He was replaced by Clayton F. Gray, a graduate of Keene Teachers' College. Mr.

Gray teaches Social Studies and is active in extracurricular program of school.

Maurice Boulanger, a graduate of the University of New Hampshire was elected to replace Mrs. Gladys Chick. Mr. Boulanger teaches English, French, and Manual Training. He also coaches baseball.

All of the new men teachers are veterans with enviable records while in the service.

Mrs. Marion Gorman Sullivan resigned in December, moving to Washington, D. C., and accepting a teaching position there. She has been replaced by Genevieve Cloutier who is a graduate of University of New Hampshire with teaching experience at Concord, N. H.

Epping has been fortunate in retaining its elementary teachers. It is hoped that some way will be made possible to keep them with us another year; especially when there is still a country-wide shortage.

Bond Issue

At the last annual School District meeting the Building Committee was dissolved and the School Board was empowered to complete work started and settle claims against district through counsel. Since last March the carpenter work and painting on the high school has been completed, painting at West Epping School, the roof and masonry at the Central School. Some painting was also refinished as a result of Mr. Baker's inefficiency. All work was completed on the advice of Russell McGuirk of Newmarket, counsel for the Epping School Board. The \$10,000 bond issue money has been spent and in spite of many difficulties, Epping received excellent returns on this investment.

New Equipment

At the high school a new electric refrigerator was purchased to replace one that was in poor condition. A new singer sewing machine was also added to the

Home Ec. Dept. To gain continued approval for Federal Funds, these pieces of equipment had to be purchased.

A new liquid duplicating machine was also purchased for the Commercial Dept.

At West Epping an excellent stove was obtained to replace the worn out one in Mrs. Walton's room.

It is hoped that several of the teachers' desks can be replaced in the future. Some new desks are also needed badly in the high school.

In closing, I wish to express my thanks and appreciation to the School Board, citizens, teachers, and pupils of Epping who have been so cooperative and helpful during the past year.

REPORT OF HEADMASTER OF EPPING HIGH SCHOOL

To the School Board, Superintendent of Schools, and Citizens of Epping:

Every High School has certain obligations to its local community, which are fulfilled through the cooperative acts of all children, faculty, school administration, and townspeople. Epping High School is, in many respects, meeting these obligations to the community and is preparing its future graduates to perform a major part in helping Epping to understand its needs and to fulfill these needs.

Two of the important needs appear to be self discipline and wise use of leisure time. If either one of these characteristics is lacking in the individual, he will have a difficult time becoming adjusted to the routine of earning a happy living. To meet these needs, the entire High School curriculum is based on the belief that if the student is required to do a certain amount of school work at home, he will tend to discipline himself and to build up habits necessary for later life.

All the High School activities also tend to give the students an opportunity to make wise use of their leisure time as well as training them to discipline themselves. The students organize and supervise all their own activities and in doing so they acquire qualities of leadership and responsibility which are so necessary if they are to assume their rightful place in the community.

Many may wonder why it is necessary to spend the tax dollar for the teachers if the students can capably handle themselves. One has only to see the unseen hours and effort expended by these teachers in the organization and preparation of each school day and school activity to realize that Epping is obtaining its dollar plus value for every dollar invested in its teachers. Miss Virginia Brown, Mr. Maurice Boulanger, Miss Mary Jane Connor, and Mr. Clayton Gray deserve not only your "Well Done" but also your full support. They are not afraid to work.

The school activities have been many and frequent but primarily for the purpose of teaching worthwhile leisure habits. Our boys and girls have participated in volley ball, cheerleading, cross country, and basketball with other high schools and at all times have appeared willing to forgive the other fellow's faults and to rectify their own. The newly organized Student Council has provided dances and refreshments after many contests for all teams to improve relations with the competing schools. This policy appears to give the students training in social ease as well as making the events produce a desire for fun instead of a desire to win at any costs.

Another need in the community is worthwhile recreation for Epping's boys and girls. The High School attempts to meet this need by providing motion pictures; assembly programs; a Senior Play; clubs; shop work; intramural volley ball, basketball, soccer, and football games; ping pong and horse shoe tournaments; dart games; tumbling, boxing and wrestling. The students recognized the fact that a busy person is one who causes no trouble and consequently arranged a Halloween Fair for over 350 youngsters which meant 350 less youngsters roaming the streets with little to do.

The school physical plant, though highly inadequate, has been improved by the students. A new game room has been made; volley ball and basketball court and office have been improved; school grounds and garbage dump have been cleaned; and the students have plans for major future improvements.

One primary and urgent need suggested by the University of New Hampshire testing program, is

improvement of reading skills. Although much work has been done by Mrs. Cooper, Mrs. Nelson, and the faculty, on remedial reading, the problem must be met in all grades as all school work and communication is dependent on the written word. The school has been inspected by the State Board of Education and has received a very favorable report as to Epping's educational standards and methods of teaching. The report on the school's physical facilities was not entirely satisfactory.

Much of the success of the High School is due to the guidance and sincere interest of Superintendent Arthur Danielson, Mrs. Beatrice Marcotte, Mrs. Leona Beaucher, and Mrs. Helen Dearborn. All are attempting to have the townspeople and students realize that the school does not exist solely for the townspeople and students; and the students and people do not exist solely for the school. Instead each has obligations to the other and is dependent on the other. May we have your continued support for your school?

This year the high school is fortunate to have Mrs. Witty give them a piano to replace the old one which was beyond use. Two additional pianos were purchased; one for the second grade room and one for the seventh grade room.

The P. T. A. voted to give the High School Dancing Club five dollars to buy records.

Upon request the John Hancock Life Insurance Company sent the Epping schools two hundred Christmas Carol books. The children enjoyed using these books at their Christmas programs in the various rooms.

Two selections, "Tea For Two" and "April Showers" have been purchased for the high school Girls' Glee Club. Irene Gauthier and Claire Bernier have been chosen to attend the All-State Music Festival which will be held at Manchester March 17th and 18th. A larger group will take part in the Regional Concert Festival held at Rochester some time in May.

Tentative plans have been made for a Folk Song and Dance Festival which will include the entire union. A festival of this sort enables the students to associate with many children their own age.

In addition to the above, the usual program has been

carried out. Each child has been given instruction in music theory, music appreciation and folk dancing appropriate to his grade.

I wish to express my appreciation to the School Board, superintendent, teachers, parents, and pupils for their cooperation.

The school year from September 1948 to June 1949 was a very busy one and much progress has been made in the health education of our school children.

The yearly health examination which includes all but heart and lungs was carried out, and there has constantly been close contact with each pupil for periodic examinations of head, skin, and contagious diseases.

Every parent wants his child to have good health. We know that the first essential to good health is a sound, sturdy body.

A public service is being rendered by everyone who in cooperation with the school nurse and teachers is seeking to make adequate diet, physical well-being, and health education available to every child in your community.

We must continue and further all health activities striving to improve the teeth, eyes, posture and nutrition in our school children.

The purchase of the new audiometer equipment by the Union for use in all towns is a valuable addition. This instrument detects any hearing loss.

The Epping P. T. A. has done excellent work in sponsoring the Hot Lunches served in the Epping schools. The Community Club has sponsored a fine Hot Lunch Program in West Epping. Much credit is also due the Community Club in conducting the Dental Clinic. An especially fine effort was made to transport 43 pupils to Exeter for dental correction.

because of the fine cooperation of the P. T. A., the Community Club, Red Cross, and the parents in all our health work.

To all school officials, teachers, and citizen assistants who by their individual and collective services are helping to maintain the health efficiency of your schools, there is here expressed the deep appreciation and thanks of your school nurse.
