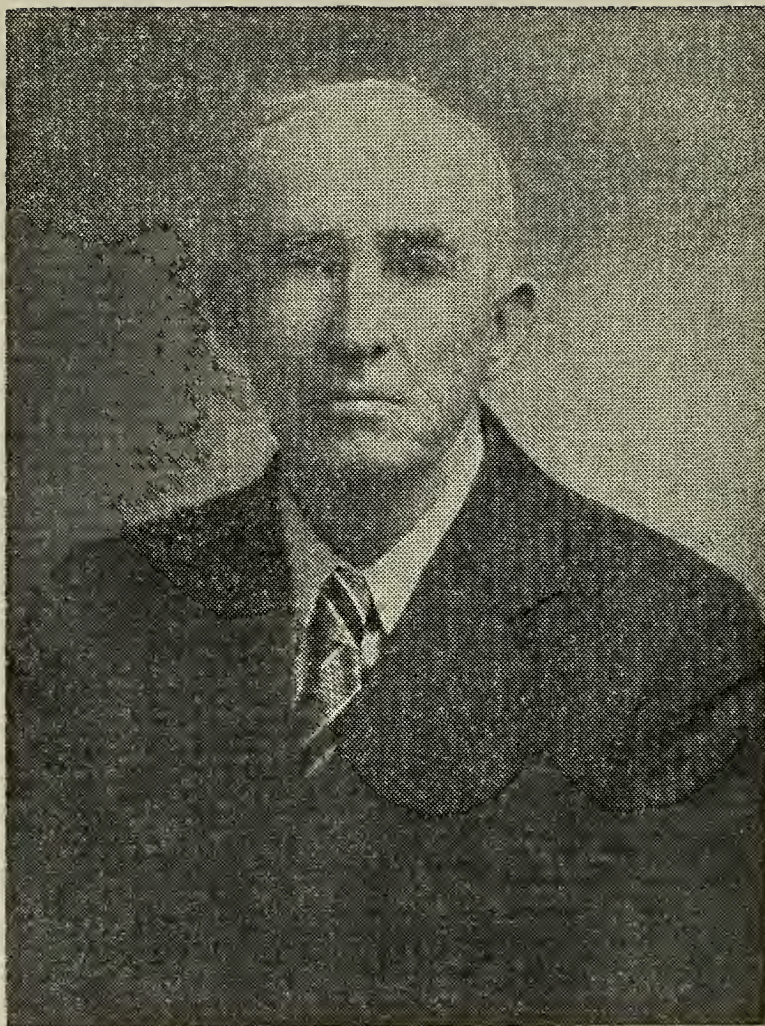

JOHN C. BROWN

The son of Robert C. and Susan A. (Babb) Brown was born in Epsom November 8, 1870. On November 2, 1895 he married May S. Knowlton of Pittsfield. They had one son Robert. Mrs. Brown died March 28, 1933. For a short time Mr. Brown was a meat cutter in Massachusetts. He was a member of The Independent Order of Odd Fellows of Dorchester, Mass. Upon his return to Epsom he bought a farm which he operated for many years. He afterwards worked as a painter. He served his town as Selectman in 1920-1921-1922 and for a number of years was Cemetery Trustee, Library Trustee and Trustee of Trust Funds.

In 1930 he was elected Representative to the General Court. Mr. Brown died in Epsom February 14, 1960.

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE
TOWN WARRANT

To the inhabitants of the Town of Epsom in the County of Merrimack in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Epsom on Tuesday, the fourteenth day of March next at two of the clock until six of the clock in the afternoon and at seven of the clock until 8:30 of the clock in the evening, to act on the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.

2. To see what action the Town will take upon the Budget submitted by the Budget Committee.

3. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$735.32 for the maintenance, construction or reconstruction of Class V Highways, the State to contribute \$4,902.12 as provided in chapter 83, Laws of 1953.

4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow such sums of money as may be necessary in anticipation of taxes.

5. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to distribute the inventory blanks at the time of taking the Annual Inventory.

6. Pursuant to the Provisions of the Laws as revised, Chapter 292, Section 7, 1949. The following Article is submitted: Shall the Provisions of Chapter 171-A of the revised Laws relative to playing games of Beano be adopted in this Town?

7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$480.00 for the Concord Hospital to

help offset the estimated operating deficit for the year 1961.

8. To see if the Town will vote to spend no more than \$100.00 in 1961 to improve the road at the Northwood Lake Development located in Epsom, funds for the project to be taken from highway appropriations.

9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 and authorize the Selectmen to borrow a sum not to exceed \$6,000.00 for the purchase of a Grader.

10. If Article 9 is adopted: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to trade or sell the Huber Grader for a sum not less than \$1,000.00. The amount realized to be applied to the purchase of the Grader.

11. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to repair the Town Truck or take any other action pertaining thereto.

12. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$250.00 to be merged with funds appropriated by the Town of Chichester, the N.H. Fish and Game Department, and the N.H. Water Resources Board for the Purpose of erecting a permanent dam at Deer Meadow Pond at an estimated cost of \$4,800.00. (This sum to be non-lapsing during the 1961-62 biennium.)

13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 to be put in a Capital Reserve Fund in anticipation of the purchase of Fire Equipment.

14. To see if the Town will vote to reopen the road beginning at George H. Stevens' and leading past the residence of John Johnson to the Deerfield Line.

15. To see if the Town will vote to accept the following Trust Funds:

\$2500.00 given by John W. Cox, the income to be used for the upkeep and maintenance of the Lawrence and Cox Memorial Water Supply Unit in McClary Cemetery.

\$500.00 given by John C. Brown to be known as the May S. Brown Fund, the interest of said fund to be used for the purchase of books for the Epsom Public Library.

\$300.00 given by John C. Brown for the perpetual care of the John C. Brown lot in McClary Cemetery.

16. To transact any other business that may legally be brought before this meeting.

PREVENTION IS YOUR BUSINESS

Carelessness, *human carelessness*, causes 9 out of 10 forest fires. Each year 200,000 fires burn over 30 million acres in the United States. This represents 5 percent of our nation's woodlands being wasted each year. Every fire takes its toll. Floods follow; stream flow is affected; timber, buildings, grazing and wildlife are destroyed—all because *many* are *careless* with fire in and near woodland. This can be remedied. *You* can put an end to this shameful waste! *Prevention* is *your* business!

You, whether *you* be a farmer, homemaker, business or professional man or woman, municipal, state or federal official, clerk or woodsman can play an important part in the continuing and vital prevention program.

First—by setting a good example *yourself*—being sensible and complying with the necessary laws and regulations governing the use of fire in and near woodlands.

Second—by using *your* individual influence in your community and valued council with others in insisting and encouraging them to do likewise.

The following simple rules may be used as a guide both for *you* and for them.

1. Before burning, secure a permit from your local forest fire warden — the law requires it.
2. Be sure to properly supervise your burning — don't leave it.
3. Make certain your fire, camp or debris, is *dead out* before leaving it.
4. Don't throw down lighted matches, cigars and cigarettes or from moving vehicles — make sure they are out — use your ash tray.

5. Don't burn at home — use your town dump and save yourself much possible difficulty, both personal and financial.

SCHOOL WARRANT

*To the Inhabitants of the School district in the town of
Epsom qualified to vote in district affairs:*

You are hereby notified to meet at the Epsom Central School in said district on the 11th day of March, 1961, at 2 o'clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.
6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
8. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state foundation aid fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

9. To see if the school district will authorize the school board chairman, the chairman of the board of selectmen, and the school district moderator jointly to appoint 4 persons to act with the school board in studying the need for additional school classrooms and associated facilities (hallways, toilets, etc.) within the school district.

10. To see if the school district will vote to establish a capital reserve fund according to the provisions of the Revised Statutes Annotated, chapter 35, sections 1-18 to be held for use only in the planning and construction of additional school classrooms and associated facilities (hallways, toilets, etc.) in the school district of Epsom, and to see if the school district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 as the first payment into this fund.

11. To see if the district will vote to adopt the provisions of R.S.A. c. 197:12a relative to the preparation and use of a check list at annual and special school district meetings. (by petition, 11 signatures)

12. To see if the district will vote to elect its school district officers by an official ballot.

13. To see if the district will vote to adopt the provisions of R.S.A. c. 59:77 relative to the election of school district officers by the non-partisan ballot system. (by petition, 11 signatures)

14. If the provisions of R.S.A. c. 59:77 relative to the election of school district officers by the non-partisan ballot system are not adopted by this meeting to see if the district will vote to require that all candidates for office shall file their declarations of candidacy with the school district clerk on or before six o'clock in the evening of the second Monday next preceding the day of the election, the school district clerk to provide a form similar to that suggested in R.S.A. c. 59:80 and

collect from each candidate at the time of said filing a fee of one dollar for the use of the school district, provided that a candidate for a school district office which carries no salary or other compensation shall be entitled to file his declaration without the payment of this filing fee.

15. To see if the school district will authorize the school board to negotiate contracts for transportation of pupils for a period not exceeding five years upon terms and conditions to be determined by the school board.

16. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

REPORT OF THE PRINCIPAL OF
EPSOM CENTRAL SCHOOL

In order to procure a good elementary school education it is necessary to have clearly defined goals at that level. We have those goals constantly in mind at our school and strive to meet them. We are not educating society, we are not using as our immediate goal the turning out of model citizens. These will come, to a large extent, with the finished product, as an end result of our immediate goals which are to instill upon the child the tools with which he may not only cope, but make a positive contribution to an ever changing society. Progress comes to a society only to the extent that

it produces members who are able to inspire that progress.

The most important tool to be obtained in the elementary school is the ability to read and comprehend the material read. To meet this end we are in the second year of conducting a special remedial reading class to aid those pupils who have progressed more slowly in reading ability than those of their respective age and grade level. This class is being conducted at no additional expense to the taxpayers, in that two of our regular staff members, Mrs. Low and Miss Papazoglou have taken this added responsibility upon themselves and are doing a commendable job with it.

Along with the academic courses and all branches stemming from them in each respective grade, we are proud to have a number of extra curricular activities for the benefit of the students who are interested in making use of their free time. One of the more successful activities of this type is the school newspaper, "The Epsom Central Monthly," a paper which has always been of interest to both students and parents. This activity is under the very capable supervision of Mrs. Omand, who spends a great deal of her own time on its layout and composition as well as its circulation problems. This activity is self-supporting and free from extreme censorship.

We are in our second year of affiliation with Channel 11 from the University of New Hampshire and are making use of the science, music, New Hampshire history, and career information courses via television. We also have a French club which uses the same facilities for part of its instruction. These programs are very well prepared and are of great value to the students in rounding out their program of studies. Some of these TV classes require upwards of thirty hours to prepare. What teacher could possibly spend that much time in the preparation of a half hour class?

The science lab is also in its second year of use and remains an invaluable aid in the teaching of scientific

principles in the Junior high department. Most of the students of these grades are able to prepare lab reports that would make many high school students envious.

The 16mm. projector, purchased new last year, is a welcome addition to our audio-visual aids equipment. The films that we are able to acquire free of charge through the courtesy of the Bell Telephone Co. have given the students a new look at the fields of literature, science, safety, courtesy and the biographies of great men. On one occasion this year the newspaper staff made available to the students a film of the life of Dr. Albert Sweitzer. This was appreciated by all who viewed it.

One of the most important projects ever undertaken by the students of Epsom Central School was started this year. That is the purchase of books for the new school library. I am proud to make public the fact that every book purchased for this library has been with money earned by the students of the school by sales of magazine subscriptions, a bean supper by the students, cookie sales, student auctions and student donations. The newspaper has also contributed books from money earned through the sales of their monthly editions.

Members of the staff at Epsom Central School have taken positive steps in the past year to improve their professional standing by taking courses at the University of New Hampshire. Taking a program of graduate study were Mrs. Low, Miss Papazoglou, Mrs. Fife and myself. We, as teachers, recognize that in order to be more effective in our profession, we must continue to grow professionally and keep abreast of the latest developments in the field of education.

In my two years as Principal at Epsom Central, I have witnessed very important steps of progress. I have great respect for the present staff and feel fortunate and proud to have worked with them.

REPORT OF THE SCHOOL NURSE

To the Superintendent of Schools:

The following is the report for the year ending December 31, 1960 for the Schools of Barrington, Epsom, Northwood, Nottingham and Strafford.

There were 856 children inspected during the year for height, weight, teeth, tonsils, and eyes. Of these 96 were done at the Pre-school Clinics in May.

41 cases of dental cavities were reported, 13 of enlarged tonsils and 16 of defective vision. The parents have been most cooperative in having these children checked by their family physicians and dentists and in correcting them according to their advice.

4 children obtained glasses through the State Sight Conservation program and there are 2 children attending Speech Correction Classes at Portsmouth Rehabilitation Center.

During the year 73 home visits were made.

May I extend my appreciation for the fine cooperation of the Superintendent, Board Members, Teachers and Parents who have all helped make the past year pleasant, and, I hope, successful.
