## REPORT OF BOARD OF HEALTH.

---

During the past year only one case of diphtheria and one case of scarlet fever have appeared. In both cases every precaution was taken to prevent the spread of the disease, and the houses have been thoroughly fumigated after the cases recovered. In one instance, as an extra precaution, the school room where the child attended school was also fumigated.

Measles have been very numerous during the fall and winter, probably more than a hundred cases having developed during that time.

Several cases of nuisance have been reported to the board and the parties concerned have been notified to remove same, which has been done without trouble in every instance.

Samples of water have been sent to the state laboratory of hygiene for analysis, and water which was thought to be pure was found to be polluted and unfit for use, while other water which appeared bad was found to be good.

Our water at the town hall was analyzed and found to contain nothing injurious.

## REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

### FOR THE YEAR 1905-1906.

---

To the School Board of Fitzwilliam :

I have the honor to submit my fourth report as superintendent of schools.

A recent decision of the supreme court is interpreted by the attorney-general to mean that the money paid for the tuition of high school pupils should be raised in the school meeting rather than in the town meeting; and that the school board would render themselves liable to a fine if they paid it out of "school money." Consequently a special article has been put into the warrant for this purpose. If all of this money is not needed next year, it can be allowed to accumulate as a fund for this purpose.

Two years ago the length of our school year was considerably increased. Conditions have been unfavorable for getting as good attendance as was expected. Last winter was very severe and this winter there has been an unusual amount of sickness. The report shows considerable difference in the number of weeks in the different schools. This is accounted for by the great falling off of attendance in those schools which show a shorter winter term. In the case of Bowkerville we were so unfortunate as to lose two teachers during the fall term. It seemed hardly desirable to employ a new teacher for the few weeks which remained in the winter term. This accounts for this school having so short a time relatively. By beginning earlier in the spring those schools that have had their year shortened can make up part of the time. It should be noted that part of this year's surplus in money will be needed for this purpose.

Many parents fail to realize the prime importance of regularity of attendance. The teacher cannot help the pupil unless he at least attends. By staying out, children fall behind the others, become discouraged, and fail in their studies. School work should be taken more seriously by parents and children.

## THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE.

[L. S.]

*To the inhabitants of the town of Fitzwilliam, in the county of Cheshire in said state, qualified to vote in town affairs:*

You are hereby notified to meet at the town hall in said Fitzwilliam on Tuesday, the thirteenth day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

ARTICLE 1—To hear and act upon reports of agents, auditors, committees or officers heretofore chosen.

ART. 2—To chose all necessary town officers for the year ensuing.

~~ART. 3~~—To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriations for the same.

ART. 4—To allow accounts against the town.

~~ART. 5~~—To raise money for schools and determine the amount.

ART. 6—To raise money for the repair of highways and bridges and determine the amount.

ART. 7—To see what action the town will take in regard to the appointment of a liquor agent for the ensuing year.

ART. 8—To see what number of highway districts the town will vote to have for the ensuing year.

ART. 9—To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not exceeding one hundred dollars (\$100) for Memorial Day, to be expended under the direction of the G. A. R.

ART. 10—To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of five hundred dollars (\$500) for an iron or steel bridge to be erected across Camp brook on the Royalston road.

ART. 11—To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed twelve hundred dollars (\$1,200) for the purchase of a chemical fire engine to be placed where it can render quick



and efficient service at Depot Village and Fitzwilliam village and elect or appoint a committee to purchase same or take any action in regard to the matter.

ART. 12—To see if the town will vote to instruct the selectmen to purchase or take a certain tract of land near Fitzwilliam station for a common or park, or take any action thereto. Said land is bounded as follows: On the north by land of C. B. Perry or David Cass, on the east by the road leading from the railroad station to the Libbe place (so-called), on the south on the road leading from the railroad station to W. E. Amidon's store, and on the west by the road leading from Fitzwilliam village to the rialroad station (estimated at 40 rods).

ART. 13—To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of thirty-five dollars (\$35) for the purpose of mowing the grass, repairing the walks, etc., on the village common and otherwise improving the grounds adjacent to the town house.

ART. 14—To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of fifty dollars for the purpose of further preserving some of the old town records, or take any action relating thereto.

ART. 15—To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of thirty-five dollars (\$35) for the purpose of giving better lighting facilities in the town hall, and the purchase of a suitable lamp to be placed in front of the town hall building.

ART. 16—To see if the town will vote to instruct the selectmen to confer with the selectmen of Troy in regard to designating which road shall be used by automobiles between the towns of Troy and Fitzwilliam, or take any action thereto.

ART. 17—To see if the town will vote to build a sidewalk from Fitzwilliam village to the railroad station where sidewalk is not already maintained, and raise and appropriate money for the same.

ART. 18—To see if the town will vote to instruct the selectmen to sell the Grant farm and the proceeds to be put into the treasury of the town.

ART. 19—To see if the town will vote to instruct the selectmen to lay out and build a highway to the house being erected by C. B. Perry & Sons near Fitzwilliam Depot.

ART. 20—To see if the town will vote to discontinue the highway commencing at the forks of the road at the top of the hill above the Forbush house (so-called), thence westerly to the forks of the road near the water trough, subject to gates and bars, or take any action relating thereto.

ART. 21—To see if the town will vote to instruct the selectmen, with others, to petition the Superior Court to discontinue the highway leading from the Charles Perry house, so-called, to the Taggart house, so-called, in Rindge.

ART. 22—To see if the town will vote to instruct the selectmen to build an addition on to the town tool house to store the snow rollers in and raise and appropriate a sum of money not to exceed three hundred dollars for the same.
