TOWN WARRANT

The State of New Hampshire

To the Inhabitants of the Town of FRANCESTOWN in the County of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in Francestown on the second day of March, next at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year coming.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations for the same.

3. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow a sufficient sum of money to pay current expenses in anticipation of taxes, or take any action relating thereto.

4. To see if the Town will vote to apply \$8,210.00 from Revenue Sharing to repair the Woodward Hill Bridge and to raise and appropriate the additional sum of \$2,090.00 for the same purpose, or take any other action thereto.

5. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the withdrawal of \$5,167.18 plus accrued interest from the Town Hall Capital Reserve Fund for repairs to the Town Hall roof or take any other action thereto. 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,854.00 as the balance due on repairs to the Town Hall roof, or take any other action thereto.

7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00) to be placed in the Capital Reserve Fund for future replacement of fire trucks, or take any other action relating thereto.

8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00) to be placed in the Capital Reserve Fund for future replacement of Fire Department Radio Equipment, or take any other action relating thereto.

9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00) to be placed in the Capital Reserve Fund to establish a Trust Fund for the purchase of land for a future library building or for the construction of an extension to the present Town Library Building, or take any action relating thereto.

10. To see if the Town will allocate the sum of Four Hundred Dollars (\$400.00) from the unexpended funds voted in Article No. 16 of the 1974 Town Warrant to repair and improve the exterior roof drainage along the main entrance to the George Holmes Bixby Memorial Library, or take any action relating thereto.

11. To see if the Town will vote to have the Town reappraised by Department of Revenue Administration. Financing of the program to be decided at the March 1977 Town Meeting, or take any other action thereto. 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$937.00 to support the services of the Monadnock Community Visiting Nurse Association, Inc., or take any action relating thereto.

13. To see if the Town will vote to approve improvement to the facade of the Fire House, all costs to be borne by the Francestown Improvement Society and the Francestown Bicentennial Committee, or take any other action thereto.

14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$365.00 to support the services of the Monadnock Family Mental Health Services, or take any other action relating thereto.

15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 to make repairs to the sidewalk on Main Street, or take any action relating thereto.

16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 to be placed in the Capital Reserve Fund for future replacement of the Police Department cruiser, or take any action relating thereto.

17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$477.00 for membership in The Monadnock Region Association, or take any other action relating thereto.

18. To see if the Town will vote to sell the surplus benches and old school desks in the Town Hall, the sum received to be placed in a Capital Reserve Fund to purchase furniture and furnishings for the Town Hall, or take any other action relating thereto. 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,700.00 for dust control on dirt roads in the summer, or take any other action thereto.

20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum not to exceed Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000.00) to install a drainage system in the annex of Cemetery No. 3 to alleviate the water problem or take any other action relating thereto.

21. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

Articles to be voted by ballot:

Amendment to Zoning Ordinance adopted March, 1951. Add new sub-paragraph No. 10 to Article 5A, Chapter II, Paragraph B Special Exemptions.

22 - 10. Before commercial mining, excavation, or removal of soil, rock, sand, gravel, loam or similar earth materials, in excess of 500 cubic yards per calendar year, a Special exception must be received from the Board of Adjustment subject to the usual fee permit. Removal and processing operations shall not be conducted closer than two hundred (200') feet to the centerline of a State Road, a Town Road, a road right of way, or a road right of way in an approved subdivision or to any property line or lot line. Delineation of the proposed removal area(s) and other pertinent information shall be noted on a site plan filed with the Board of Adjustment and the Selectmen at the time of application. If required by the Board of Adjustment as a condition of the issuance of a Special Exception, sufficient grading, covering with top soil, seeding with suitable cover crop (except when ledge rock is exposed) will be performed when removal of material is completed. The Board of Adjustment may require the posting of a bond with the Town Treasurer to insure compliance.

23 - RSA 72:62 Shall we adopt the provisions of RSA 72:62 for a property tax exemption on real property equipped with a solar energy heating or cooling system, which exemption shall be in an amount of \$50.00?

Article 3. Voted to authorize the Selectmen to borrow a sufficient sum of money to pay current expenses in anticipation of taxes.

Article 4. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00) to be placed in the Capital Reserve Fund for future replacement of fire trucks.

Article 5. Voted that this article be indefinitely postponed.

Article 6. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Hundred Eighty-eight Dollars and Fifty Cents (\$288.50) to reimburse the Volunteer Fire Company for the purchase of the new Encoder which had to be installed in 1974.

Article 7. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Hundred and Sixty Dollars (\$360.00) to be spent for protective clothing for volunteer firemen.

Article 8. Voted that this article be indefinitely postponed.

Article 9. Voted that this article be indefinitely postponed.

Article 10. Voted that this article be indefinitely postponed.

Article 11. Voted to raise and appropriate \$1,500.00 to pay the Town's portion of the operating cost of the Bennington Dump as specified in the Bennington-Antrim-Francestown dump contract and authorize the Selectmen to instruct owners and operators of commercial establishments, apartment complexes and other similar producers of large amounts of trash and commercial carriers of trash to deliver the refuse only to the Bennington Landfill site in accordance with the provisions of the Town's contract with Bennington and Antrim. Article 12. Voted to re-open and maintain the so-called Campbell Hill Road commencing at one hundred feet beyond the property of Donald and Linda Abbott and extending to one hundred feet beyond the property of Arthur Buzzell.

Article 13. Voted to apply any remaining funds appropriated and unexpended to the repairs of the Bixby Dam to the removal of brush and trees below the dam and the improvement and increased safety of Town property immediately surrounding the dam site, any remaining balance to be turned over to the Conservation Committee for use at the Town Forest.

Article 14. Voted to authorize the withdrawal of One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) plus interest from Capital Reserve Fund, New Cemetery Sales. Said sum to be used to establish Lawrence Kullgren Cemetery Fund.

Article 15. Voted to accept the following individual Trust Funds:

A. For perpetual care of cemetery lots in the respective names of Everett D. Phillips, Archibald Cullens, The Lord Family and Esther Whittemore.

B. Charles and Marion Vose Library Fund.

Article 16. Voted to appropriate \$10,000.00 by allocating a sum not to exceed \$3,500.00 of funds already received or expected to be received from Revenue Sharing; \$2,000.00 from unexpended 1974 appropriation; \$4,500.00 to be raised and appropriated to effect repairs to the exterior of the George Holmes Bixby Memorial Library as recommended by a recent engineering survey and to erect a fire escape.

Artice 17. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of Eight Hundred and Two Dollars (\$802.00) to support the services of the Monadnock Community Visiting Nurses Association, Inc.

Article 18. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Hundred and Sixty-five Dollars (\$365.00) to support the services of the Monadnock Family Mental Health Services.

Article 19. Voted to indefinitely postpone this article. Article 20. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Hundred Dollars (\$300.00) to be placed in the Capital Reserve Fund for the future replacement of the Police Department cruiser.

Article 21. Voted that there will be no fees charged a resident or non-resident taxpayer of Francestown for any purpose other than rental of Town Buildings or Town Equipment unless such a fee has been established and approved by a legal Town Meeting, or such fee is specifically allowed by New Hampshire General Statutes, this article to remain in effect until rescinded by a vote of the Town.

Article 22. Voted that the Town reimburse all who have paid the fee charged by the selectmen for the Town permit for dump and beach use. When they request such reimbursement from the Town Treasurer, and that said permits will be furnished at no charge to all resident and nonresident taxpayers of the Town of Francestown until this article is rescinded by vote of the Town.

Article 23. Voted to grant site plan review authority to the Planning Board in accordance with RSA 36:19a. This will provide the Town with an opportunity to review and approve or disapprove plans for non-residential development.

Article 24. Voted that the Town agrees to participate in the National Flood Insurance Program by directing the Board of Selectmen to complete the eligibility applications and submit the required information to the Federal Insurance Administration, such information includes the following resolutions (summarized):

Resolution A:

The Community recognizes that there are flood areas in the community; that federally subsidized flood insurance is available; that Town Meeting intends to evaluate land use in these areas; and that Town Meeting has the authority to enact appropriate land use control measures.

The Town Meeting resolves that assurances be given to the Federal Insurance Administration that the community will enact and enforce necessary land use control measures; that municipal officials and boards will be authorized to deal with the appropriate governmental agencies and private firms; and that elevations of buildings will be recorded when required.

Resolution B.-1:

The community recognizes that regulations governing building construction in flood hazard areas have been enacted and are enforced.

The Town Meeting recommends that the Planning Board require all proposals for their approval that are in flood hazard areas be designed to minimize or eliminate flood damage and that the Planning Board require new or replacement water supply-sewage disposal systems to be designed to eliminate or minimize flood damage.

Summary of Findings and Recommendations

Board of Selectmen Town Office Francestown, New Hampshire 03043

Gentlemen:

Submitted herewith is the report of an examination and audit of the accounts of the Town of Francestown for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1975, which was made by the Division in accordance with the vote of the Town. Exhibits as hereafter listed are included as part of the report.

One of the enclosed audit reports must be given to the Town Clerk to be retained as part of the permanent Town records.

SCOPE OF AUDIT

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the Board of Selectmen, Treasurer, Elizabeth M. Behrsing, Tax Collector for the period from March 5, 1975 to December 31, 1975, Town Clerk, Library Treasurer, Cemetery Treasurer, Fire Department, Conservation Commission and Trustees of Trust Funds. The accounts of Catherine H. Abbott, Tax Collector for the period January 1, 1975 to March 4, 1975 were examined earlier and a report submitted to your Board under date of March 10, 1975.

FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

General Fund:

Comparative Balance Sheets – December 31, 1974 and December 31, 1975: (Exhibit A-1)

Comparative balance sheets – general fund – as of December 31, 1974 and December 31, 1975, are presented in Exhibit A-1. As indicated therein, the Current Surplus of the

Town decreased by \$3,409, from \$14,725 to \$11,316, during the fiscal year ended December 31, 1975.

Analysis of Change in Current Financial Condition: (Exhibit A-2)

An analysis of the change in current financial condition of the Town during the year is made in Exhibih A-2, with the factors which caused the change indicated therein. These were as follows:

Comparative Statements of Appropriations and Expenditures – Estimated and Actual Revenues: (Exhibit A-3 and A-4)

Comparative statements of general fund appropriations and expenditures, estimated and actual revenues for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1975, are presented in Exhibits A-3 and A-4. As indicated by the Budget Summary (Exhibit A-4), a net overdraft of appropriations of \$5,336, less a revenue surplus of \$2,341, resulted in a net budget deficit of \$2,995.

Long-Term Indebtedness:

Comparative Balance Sheets – December 31, 1974 and December 31, 1975: (Exhibit A-5)

Comparative Balance Sheets of the outstanding long-term indebtedness of the Town as of December 31, 1974 and December 31, 1975, are contained in Exhibit A-5. As indicated therein, matured long-term notes of \$7,000 were paid during the year. Long-term notes outstanding at the close of the year amounted to \$21,000.

Statement of Debt Service Requirements: (Exhibit A-6) A statement showing annual debt service requirements of principal and interest as of December 31, 1975, is presented in Exhibit A-6.

TREASURER

General Fund:

Classified Statement of Receipts and Expenditures: (Exhibit B-1)

A summary statement of general fund receipts and expenditures for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1975, made up in accordance with the uniform classification of accounts, is included in Exhibit B-1.

Revenue Sharing Funds: (Exhibit B-2)

A statement of Revenue Sharing Fund receipts, expenditures, encumbrances and fund balance is contained in Exhibit B-2. As stated therein, there is an unappropriated fund balance of \$3,720 as of December 31, 1975.

AUDIT PROCEDURE

The accounts and records of all town officials charged with the custody, receipt and disbursement of public funds were examined and audited in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards and accordingly included such tests of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as were considered necessary in the circumstances.

Verification of uncollected and unredeemed taxes was made by mailing notices to delinquent taxpayers as indicated by the Tax Collector's records. Consequently, the amounts of uncollected and unredeemed taxes as indicated in this report are subject to any changes which may be necessitated by the return of verification notices.

Conclusion:

The provisions of Chapter 71-A, Section 21, require that the auditors' summary of findings and recommendations (letter of transmittal) shall be published in the next annual report of the Town. Publication of the Exhibits contained in this audit report is optional at the discretion of the Board of Selectmen. This letter, however, must be published in its entirety.

We extend our thanks to the officials of the Town of Francestown for their assistance during the course of the audit.

REPORT OF LIBRARY TRUSTEES – 1975

The Trustees held their business meetings the first Thursday of each month, and met for the Budget Report on a quarterly schedule. A delegate was represented at each meeting of the State Southwest District Advisory Council and the Nubanusit Libraries Co-op. This Co-op was formed in March by our Service Center, the Peterborough Town Library. Meetings were held every six weeks with twelve delegates attending representing the regional libraries affiliated with Peterborough.

The Trustees appointed Priscilla Kunhardt to the Board as an Honorary Trustee in recognition of the many years of dedication, hard work and constructive projects accomplished while she was a Trustee.

A Memorial Fund Account has been opened at the Peterborough Savings Bank. Unless otherwise specified, all memorial contributions will now be deposited in this account, and recorded in the Memorial Book listing all books and/or items purchased with the specific memorial.

The library received a total of \$338.00 from the Village Improvement Society from the Labor Day Raffle money received over the past two years. The Society also turned over to the library \$1,400.00 from an account they held which was specified for library use. A Certificate of Deposit was purchased in March with this account.

In February, the Library was awarded a certificate of Outstanding Library Achievement from the New Hampshire State Library. We were very honored to receive this commendation, as it was presented to less than one-third of the libraries throughout New Hampshire for exceeding the necessary requirements of State affiliated libraries. Inge Anderson and Betsy Weiderhold attended the ceremonies in Concord.

In March, two classes in the Arts & Crafts were held. Priscilla Davis taught chair caning and rushing, and Betsy Wiederhold conducted classes in various techniques of needlepoint. The classes ran for a period of ten weeks and were free. Following the final lesson in needlepoint, Elizabeth Thompson joined the group to show slides and talk on the needlepoint designs in the Washington Cathedral.

Ann Geisel, Assistant Librarian, left her position in the middle of May. Consequently, we were faced with the problem of help to fill in for a period of six weeks, when Libby Wiederhold was arriving to work for two months. Lois MacAdam, Volunteers Chairperson, quickly called forth a good team of workers and the situation was once more under control.

On July 1, Libby started to work with Inge by helping her run the summer program outlined for children. She conducted a very busy schedule of story hours, showing movies and taking the children on nature walks. When she was not busy with Kiddy Korner, she was a great help to Inge with the general library chores. Though several of the nature walks turned out to be called "The Ivy Itch" and "Hornets Havoc," the general program was a great success. It was Labor Day before we knew it, and many sad little faces said goodbye for another summer.

On September 1, Connie Varnum was employed to fill the position as Assistant Librarian. She works a total of eleven hours a week. In the fall, Connie attended a course in Library Cataloguing offered by the State at Keene, New Hampshire. This is a tuition-free program, and the Library paid the cost of mileage expenses.

The Trustees sent a contribution of \$25.00 to the Library Foundation of New Hampshire in memory of Emil Allen, a hard working and loyal State Librarian for many years.

In memory of Donald Born, a former Trustee, the Library continued his gift subscription to the Mystery Book Guild. Many patrons have enjoyed these books over the years.

The grade school participated in another year of reading and movie programs, which were held weekly throughout the school year. The school's art program kept the children's rooms brightly decorated for many of the holidays and various occasions.

During National Library Week the Boy Scout Troop of Francestown, under the leadership of David Carney, had an excellent display of their badges, books and equipment, some of which they made themselves. On the final day, the Troop presented a talk and slide show and served refreshments. They were a very impressive group of young citizens, and we were pleased to be of service to them.

The 4-H Club, under the leadership of Priscilla Kunhardt, held several successful bake sales on the Library premises. This was to help raise money for a Livestock building.

The organizations which met at the Library on a regular schedule were the Town Water Commission, the Village Improvement Society and the Conservation Commission.

The annual Library Bridge and Tea was held on August 17, 1975, at the Crotched Mountain Ski Lodge, through the generous support of Tim Gannett. An important part of the day was the Silent Auction, directed by Connie Dodge and supported by donations from the many friends of the Library, to whom we extend our thanks. A new feature was the raffle of items donated by Mrs. Dorothy McLeod, Mrs. Louis Wiederhold, Jr., Mrs. Lucius Gilman and Mr. and Mrs. Tim Gannett. We wish to extend a very special thanks to these generous donators. Doris Basset and Lois MacAdam did a superlative job directing this fund-raising event.

The net proceeds from the Library Bridge came to \$616.50, and with this amount the Trustees were able to purchase a 16 mm Bell and Howell movie and sound projector to replace the old and irrepairable machine. The cost of the new projector was \$654.00, less \$75.00 trade-in.

The Trustees assigned Don Hoyt to build two large and one small bookcase for the growing amount of books the Library has acquired. The cost of these cases, plus the paint and supplies, was paid for from the Special Account, and volunteers generously donated much time and labor sanding and painting them. They are an attractive asset to the rooms.

A second-hand electric typewriter was purchased from the Jones Typewriter Company in Manchester, as it became necessary to have a machine for each floor.

The exceptionally wet and hot summer introduced another expense and a major problem for the Library. Mildew was discovered amongst the books, so a second de-humidifier was purchased immediately. At the same time, ten removable screens were bought so that on the warm and sunny days they could be placed in various windows for cross ventilation . . . without bugs.

The Library received \$253.00 from "Frances' Town" Town History sold during the year.

On Tuesday evenings, from September 15 to December 16, the Library was opened for two hours. This procedure was tried in order to accommodate the working person and high school students. It turned out to be very satisfactory, and we plan to try this schedule for the coming year, unless the weather puts too great a strain on the fuel budget.

The Town installed a drainage junction and pipeline on the southwest corner of the building. The State cleaned and replaced new pipeline from the curbing into the required distance for run-off, and the Town constructed a drainage line running northwest of the building in order to prevent water from seeping into the lower floor of the Library. When this work was completed, a new sidewalk was constructed along the front of the building.

The installation of a fire escape on the north side of the building was started late in the fall, along with major repairs to the brick wall and chimneys. It has been under the direction of the Selectmen. As yet, this project has not been completed.

It has been an exciting and busy year in our Library, and though the following remarks may have been included in other parts of the Library report, I would like to add a few thoughts as I finish my seventh and last year as a Trustee. I have been ever aware that the Library is the center of many of the activities in town, is used by many, including the school children for whom special programs are planned, is the first place a newcomer visits to ask questions and to get acquainted. We are indeed lucky to have so many interested and generous supporters, as indicated by the cash gifts, gifts of books and magazines, and support of our once a year money-raising event. Monies have been received in memory of friends, relatives or former users of the Library this year, to such an extent that it was voted by the Trustees to start a Memorial Fund Bank Account and to record such gifts in a Memorial Book. Finally, a special tribute should be given to those women who have given so many volunteer hours in answer to an appeal from Lois MacAdam for an extra pair of hands. We have had approximately twelve volunteers working an average of ten hours total each week. Also, we are extremely fortunate to have Ingeborg Anderson as our Librarian running such an efficient facility for the pleasures and needs of the community.

Her latest Poster, "READ A CORD OF BOOKS," is on the front door. Betsy never seems to tire or lack creative ideas which promotes more and better reading for our patrons.

Eleanor Kiblin again showed her talent in her beautiful map of Francestown used in conjunction with "LET'S TAKE A WALK," a Special Reading Program this summer. Carol Prest, our artist, designed the Hiking Boots and Back Pack Tags to identify each reader, which delighted the children as they moved along the Trail according to the number of books read. This summer program was under the capable direction of Libby Wiederhold, who recommended and suggested books, showed movies to various age groups, read stories, and all in all the children just love Libby — it was a very successful summer program! Libby and Diane Schott took groups of children on walks from the actual nature trail map.

In August we had our party back of the Library, and a grand time was had by all. Paperback books were prizes again this year for children who were the "top readers."

Connie Dodge and Lois MacAdam had several moneymaking projects in order to purchase a new movie projector and new bookcases to accommodate the overflow of nonfiction in the reading room. The Library Tea was, as usual, a huge success — thanks to Connie, Lois and many workers.

I visited several libraries this summer — and always felt that our Bixby Memorial Library was the nicest of all, thanks to the endless efforts of your trustees who go beyond all the requirements that make a library successful. Our library is an attractive building, housing an excellent collection of books. We did receive from Mr. Allen, Librarian of Concord State Library, an outstanding achievement award for excelling in State Library requirements. Have attended Children's book displays at Keene Library. Connie Varnum participated in a 10-week course in Cataloguing under the supervision of N.H. State Library.

My appreciation and thanks to Libby Wiederhold for the excellent job she did with the children. Connie Varnum is a great asset to the library staff, and we welcome her aboard. Again my appreciation to all the Volunteers and my super Trustees.

FRANCESTOWN VOLUNTEER FIRE DEPARTMENT ANNUAL REPORT

The officers and members of the Volunteer Fire Company would like to thank everyone for their support at our annual Labor Day Supper, and for all other donations made to us throughout the year, which makes possible the purchasing of more equipment for the Dept. For the year 1974-75, the Fire Co. has spent from their treasury the sum of \$3,363.95 for new equipment, which includes 8 monitors, an air chisel for rescue work, smoke ejector, safety alarm for Scott Air Pac, an Ambu resuscitator, a Robert Shaw resuscitator, and half the cost of the new Base Radio station. We added to the truck fund, the mount of \$1,000. The fund now amounts to \$3,627.33; and is in addition to the Capital Reserve Fund voted by the town. A throat vac was donated to the Dept. by Mr. and Mrs. Robert Cutter, and oxygen breathing equipment was the gift of Mr. and Mrs. Ernest Poor. The Fire Dept. has formed a rescue squad, headed by Ray Plante. It will handle emergency calls and assist the ambulance crew when it comes to Francestown. Most of the tools we have for the rescue squad have been donated.

If anyone has items which they would care to donate to the rescue squad, please contact Ray Plante, or any Dept. member. We wish to thank the people in the South County Rd. (Ball Park Road) for their generous donations, which made it possible in install a dry fire hydrant at Paul Ellis' pond, which provides better fire protection for that area, and for the town. In our training program we have held drills in various parts of town which will be of help in fire pre-planning. As in the past, several men attended the Fire Training School at Meadowwood Training Area in Fitzwilliam. This helps to train men in all types of fire fighting and rescue work. The Women's Auxiliary of the V.F. Dept. is always ready to assist the Dept. They serve food and coffee and man the radio whenever they are requested to do so. We wish to thank them again for five pairs of boots, they purchased and presented to the Co. Our slogan is, "Don't Gamble with Fire, the Odds Are Against You." Even though you feel that you can put your fire out yourself, please call the Fire Dept. We would rather come and find that the fire is out, than to come and find that we were called too late.

Fire Warden's Report

Upon the recommendation of town selectmen and city councils, the Division of Forests and Lands appoints a forest fire warden and several deputy forest fire wardens in each town and city every three years. The town or city warden is responsible for maintaining a force of men and adequate equipment to suppress any wildfire that occurs in his town or city during his term of appointment. The fire warden must authorize all open burning when the ground is not covered with snow. No open fires can be authorized between 9 a.m. and 5 p.m., unless it is raining, without the additional permission of the state district fire chief.

Any person wishing to kindle an open fire when the ground is not covered with snow must first obtain the written permission of the forest fire warden. Camp and cooking fires also require the warden's permission.

The Division of Forest and Lands, through its Forest Fire Service, assists all cities and towns in meeting these requirements by training the warden and deputy forces in wildfire suppression tactics, making hand tool suppression equipment available at fifty percent of cost, supplying pieces of Federal excess property for use as fire attack vehicles and sharing up to fifty percent of the cost of wildfire suppression costs.

Wildfire prevention is also a joint state, city or town program. Smokey Bear is available from the Forest Fire Service for local fire prevention programs. Posters and Junior Ranger kits are available for distribution by local fire departments upon request to the Forest Fire Service. Each forest fire warden is expected to carry on a continuous wildfire prevention program within his town or city.

To the People of Francestown:

A few words to let you know where some of the money went last year, what we did last year and a few culverts this year.

T.R.A. went on the Turnpike last year, \$9,000.00, most of it went into excavation and gravel. We rebuilt the stone wall in front of Mrs. Ellis'. We plan to continue this year on that road, we hope to have that section tarred in early summer.

Duncan Fund went on Poor Farm Rd. this year, \$8,000.00. This should finish this road for the time being.

I understand State Funds may be cut down this year, so we may not get as for on the next project, we can only hope for the best.

We had a lot of rain last year and old stone culverts took a beating. We had to replace three footer on Potash Rd. last fall at a cost of about \$600.00. We have three more like it that need to be replaced this year (Wilson Hill Rd.), (County Rd.), and at the foot of Pond Hill on the back side of Scobie Pd. We need a few more small ones on County Rd. This is one of the reasons the General Funds will be up this year. Everything in the material line or parts have either doubled or tripled in price over the last two years, Grader and Plow blades have done worse than that.

We spent \$3,000.00 on Campbell Hill last year, it needs some more gravel but at least we could plow it this year.

We installed the new culvert at Prichards last year on Juniper Hill Rd. at a cost of \$6,500.00, the culvert cost \$3,575.00. We want to replace the bridge at Bewley's with the same thing this year to go along with the State's recommendations. The culvert this year is going to cost around \$4,000.00. I strongly urge the people to replace this bridge this year. I strongly urge the looking into the replacement of the Poor Farm Bridge below Vadney's as the State has recommended.

Due to the rise in cost of materials and supplies, and the storms we have been having this year, we have requested an increase in the Highway budget.

Also the Highway crew have asked for a small increase in wages to keep with the times. Our wages now are \$3.50, \$3.00, \$2.76 respectively. We are asking for 25 cents across the board.

There were many complaints last year about dust control. An article will appear in the warrant so the people can decide to have this done in the future.

Again we in the Highway Department want to thank all the people for their support and understanding.

At the close of the 1975 Town meeting, the townspeople voted a resolution of appreciation to Mrs. George Kunhardt for her many years of devoted service as a Trustee of the George Holmes Bixby Library.

In February the George Holmes Bixby Memorial Library was awarded a Certificate of Merit by the Chairman of the State Library Commission. This award was given for the Library's participation in the Statewide Library Development Program, and for its efforts in providing good library services to the community.

The Board of Selectmen made the following appointments: To the Planning Board – Robert H. Cloutier reappointed and H. Bartlett Hardwick for five years. John L. Arnold was appointed to the Board of Adjustment for five years and James B. O'Mahoney reappointed and Eleanor Kiblin appointed to the Conservation Commission for five years. Mrs. David N. Settele was appointed as Town Health Officer. John A. Thomas who had been serving as Acting Police Chief was appointed as Police Chief in April. However he found it necessary to resign for personal reasons effective December 31st. His resignation was received with regrets. Peter Flood was appointed as Acting Police Chief for a period of six months commencing January 1, 1976.

The articles pertaining to the Town Dump in the 1975 Town Warrant were indefinitely postponed. However \$1,500 was voted for maintaining the present dump and another \$1,500 to carry out the Town's agreement with Bennington for use of their dump. Commencing July 1st all commercial carriers picking up and hauling refuse from Francestown were required to unload at the Bennington-Antrim-Francestown dump site in Bennington. All refuse is to be compacted or covered to prevent littering of highways, and a Francestown sticker applied to the windshield of the vehicle or on the trash driver's person, to be shown to the dump attendant if requested. Any violations of these stipulations would automatically cancel the privilege of dump collection in town.

The Recycling Committee is still in existence and reports that 10 tons of glass were taken to the reclamation center in Dayville, Conn., and 2 tons of cans to Salem, Mass., to be recycled and used in reinforcement bars. The price of paper dropped considerably, but now is bringing fifty cents a 100 lbs. Paper is being collected and sold, the proceeds being applied toward the fund for additional playground equipment at the Elementary School. It is also interesting to note that all "white elephants" left over from the Labor Day Celebration were taken to "Project Help" in Milford, and all clothing taken to the Salvation Army in Manchester.

The land along the Piscataquog River from the Deering line to the New Boston line has been declared a flood prone area. This affects Francestown residents along the river edge. In order to participate in the National Flood Insurance Program, it is necessary to comply with regulations governing building construction in flood hazard areas. The Planning Board has adopted a building code which has been approved by the Town. Any proposals for new buildings, substantial alterations of existing structures, or new or replacement of water supply or sewerage systems must meet the requirements of this new building code to eliminate or minimize flood damage.

Repairs to Town property include the work of re-roofing the Town Hall, which has been completed, and necessary repainting of the interior, now in progress. To comply with Fire Safety Regulations, work of installing an exterior fire escape on the George Holmes Bixby Memorial Library was started in November after necessary brick work was completed. Further work on window exit, doors, etc. is now in progress and hopefully the Historical Rooms located on the second floor of this building will be reopened this summer. Repairs to the sidewalks in front of the library were made, and necessary work done on the run-off drain to correct the condition of rain water and melting snow from collecting in front of this building. Road work included the necessary repairs at the foot of the Mountain Road, partial work on the Second New Hampshire Turnpike beginning at the Third Town Cemetery and going as far as the bridge, completing the work on the Poor Farm Road and installing a so-called 25 year culvert at the Juniper Hill Bridge.

In May Postmaster Robert C. Cutter announced the appointment of Carol C. Gibbons as clerk and of Elizabeth Hubbell as substitute rural carrier.

On September 12th Bob Cutter retired after nearly 40 years, first serving as rural mail carrier and more recently as Postmaster. On Sunday, October 12th, more than 300 guests gathered in the Town Hall to honor Bob for his many years of service to the people of the Town.

In time for Labor Day events, the Community Church was repainted with red doors and sash, and the muchmissed weathervane replaced.

The 59th Annual Labor Day Celebration, under the auspices of the Francestown Improvement and Historical Society, had as its parade theme, "Bicentennial Reflections." With the entire town working, the proceeds realized were even greater than last year. At the Annual Meeting of the Society in October, the following expenditures were voted: \$2,000 toward the first phase of work suggested to be done to the Town Fire Station, namely wood clapboards in front and two sides, additional cornices over the doors, and removing antenna from roof to a tower behind the building. Realizing this work will cost more than the initial amount voted, it is hoped by the Society to get matching funds.

Also voted was to set aside \$1,000 toward the construction of a Skating Rink. Voted, too, to provide additional lights at the newer tennis courts to make it possible to use them in the evenings.

The Library Trustees were the recipients of \$138 realized from the Labor Day Raffle.

During the year 32 building permits were issued: 12 for additions, 20 for new residences.

The State Department of Resources and Economic De-

velopment reports the 1975 estimated population of Francestown as 721 legal residents.

The voters check list as of December 21, 1975 showed 485 qualified voters.

REPORT OF THE FRANCESTOWN CONSERVATION COMMISSION 1975

A series of eight square dances, with Dudley Laufman, was held to continue our fund-raising activities, and we plan a series of five dances for next year. We thank Carol Prest, Zoe Richardson, and Avery Richardson very much for helping with the dances, and we are also grateful to all who contributed to the refreshment table.

As a note of interest, one dance was filmed for a segment of a documentary film which will probably be shown on one of the educational television stations — watch for it!

The Francestown Directory was published in the late Spring. This successful money-raising venture was the brain-child of Pat Place, and we owe her much for all the work she did on it; we have appreciated her as a member of the commission a very great deal.

We are grateful to Frances Prest for her help in collating the directories, and to the following people for helping to sell them: Shirley Davis, Clifford Lougee, Lois MacAdam, Connie Varnum, Dottie Miller, June O'Mahoney, and Ingeborg Anderson at the Library — where they continue to be available for purchase at the cost of one dollar.

With the proceeds from the Dances and the Directory, we reached our goal of \$4,000 to cover the cost of the Soil Survey of the Town. The field work has already been completed and the interpretive maps and reports will be forthcoming. The survey will be of value in planning the wise use of the land and preserving the natural resources of Francestown.

Our next project is to start a land acquisition fund.

Early in the year, we met with the Planning Board to discuss the possible development of a plan relative to the Town's resources and future growth.

Carol Prest was in charge of a program at the Firehouse on April 3rd, at which John Arnold, our Representative to the General Court, discussed current legislation and answered questions from his Francestown constituents. We provided informational material such as "How a Bill Becomes Law," published by the League of Women Voters.

We made available at the Library the Friday Letter, the weekly information sheet on current environmental legislation put out by the Society for the Protection of N.H. Forests; and the Legislative Status Sheet from the Environmental Coalition of which the Commission is a supporting member.

The Commission was represented at a two-day exhibition, April 18-19, sponsored by the Nashua Conservation Commission at the Nashua Mall.

April 26th was the date of the Annual Roadside Cleanup. Again, many people of all ages turned out to help and our "thank-yous" go to all. Perhaps if we all worked for RE-CYCLING, we could travel the roads without having to clean them up.

The Boy Scouts completed their project in the Town Forest of pruning and weeding. A first trail has been laid out for all to enjoy, and a temporary sign has been erected at the entrance.

We continue to sponsor the Cub Scouts of Francestown. In March, we welcomed Eleanor Kiblin as the newly appointed member of the Commission.

The Conservation Commission meets on the third Monday of each month at the Library at 7:30 p.m., and the meetings are open to all.

Public hearings were held and approvals were given for eleven sub-divisions — the dividing of a plot of land into segments of two acres or more.

The Planning Board took the initiative in holding hearings on an ordinance relating to building within the special flood hazard area designated by the Federal Ins. Admin. The ordinance was adopted in due course at the 1975 Town Meeting when the P.B. was also charged with site planning review of non-residential construction.

H. B. Hardwick was appointed a new member to replace John Schott, who was elected Selectman. In its reorganization meeting Robert Cloutier was unanimously elected Chairman to replace Phillip Ireland, who had served in that capacity for three years.

Public hearings were held on two scenic roads scheduled for improvement: Second N.H. Turnpike and a segment of Poor Farm Road. Both involved removal of trees and stones.

In its watchdog function, the Board concerned itself with violations of ordinances; these involved recreational areas and farm animals in the Village Zone.

At the close of 1975 the P.B. proposed an ordinance governing the quarrying of gravel, etc., which will be voted on by ballot at the 1976 Town Meeting.

REPORT OF WASTE DISPOSAL STUDY COMMITTEE

The 1975 Town Meeting did not take any action on several articles relative to closing the Town dump, converting the dump to a collection area and contracting to have the trash removed to the Bennington-Antrim-Francestown landfill site because the State had extended the "no burning edict" to July 1st, 1976.

At present, commercial establishments and carriers are authorized and instructed to use the Bennington facility for which the Town is already contractually obligated to pay its portion of the yearly maintenance cost; however, the Town is saving the annual cost of hauling household trash to the landfill site.

The State has again provided towns having a population of less than 2500 with an extension to July 1st, 1977 upon approval by the N.H. Air Pollution Control Commission. Indications are that the Town will qualify for the extension, thus saving as much as \$6,000 yearly. If permission from the Air Control Commission is not forthcoming, we recommend that Articles No. 8, No. 9 and No. 10 in 1975 Town Warrant be re-inserted in the 1976 warrant pursuant to the recommendations contained in our report. (See report of the Waste Disposal Study Committee, 1974 Town Reports.)

Several bids from waste removal contractors and exterminators should have been received by your office by Town Meeting time.

The aforementioned Articles No. 8 and No. 9 represent the estimated yearly cost; if funding is required from July 1st, 1976 through Dec. 31st, 1976, the amounts should be halved.

In the absence of an extension being granted the recommendations to be found in our 1975 report remain unchanged.
