SECOND SESSION

March 5, 1976

Mr. Riley opened the meeting, introduced the Town Officers sitting on the stage, read the Warrant and the posting of same by the Selectmen. He referred to the State Statutes governing Town Meeting and the Municipal Budget Act, and explained the procedure for voting on the YES-NO secret ballot for Warrant articles 3 - 19. Action on Article 20 (the Budget) will take place during the meeting.

Articles 1 and 2 were on the ballot for the March 2 election.

ARTICLE 3: To hire money in anticipation of taxes. Mrs. Harvey made the motion to adopt. Al Sprague seconded. Article was voted in the affirmative - 344 YES, 17 NO.

ARTICLE 4: Discount of 2% on property taxes. Paul Howe made the motion to adopt. Merle Blakeley seconded. Article was voted in the affirmative - 347 YES, 19 NO

ARTICLE 5: \$808.90 for TRA. Harold Murray made the motion to adopt. Archie Campbell seconded. Article was voted in the affirmative - 352 YES, 13 NO

ARTICLE 6: \$1947.40 for So. New Hampshire Planning Commission. Richard Marshall made the motion to adopt. William Kaufman seconded. Article was voted in the affirmative 273 YES, 92 NO

ARTICLE 7: \$30,000. from Revenue Sharing to be applied toward reassessment of the Town. Lowell Apple made the motion to adopt. Judi Hess seconded. Article was voted in the affirmative - 333 YES, 38 NO

ARTICLE 8: \$35,000. from Revenue Sharing to have tax map drawn. Lowell Apple made the motion to adopt. Richard Farrand seconded. Article was voted in the affirmative - 317 YES, 53 NO

ARTICLE 9: \$9,500. from Revenue Sharing for renovation of second floor of Municipal Building. Oscar Morin made the motion to adopt. Ray Langer seconded. Article was voted in the affirmative - 269 YES, 103 NO

ARTICLE 10: \$30,000. from Revenue Sharing to be used as setoffs against budgeted appropriations as listed: Old Age Assistance - \$5,000; Town Poor - \$4,000; Parks and Playgrounds - \$2,000; Police Department - \$6,000; Fire Departments - \$6,000; and Highway Department - \$7,000. Lowell Apple made the motion to adopt. Paul Howe seconded. Mr. Langer explained that if these Revenue Sharing funds are not used for a period of 2 years, they must be returned to the government. Article was adopted - 344 YES, 30 NO

ARTICLE 11: To establish a Capital Reserve Fund for the Sewer Department. Merle Blakeley made the motion to adopt. Everett Hardy seconded. Article was voted in the aftirmative - 228 YES, 38 NO

ARTICLE 12: Not recommended by the Budget Committee, therefore no action could be taken on this article.

ARTICLE 13: \$2877.40 for Community Action Program. Mr. Goddard made the motion to adopt. Al Sprague seconded. Article was voted in the affirmative - 315 YES, 49 NO

ARTICLE 14: \$1,000, to obtain Grant Match Funds for Crime Commission and Highway Safety. Warren Harvey made the motion to adopt. John Jacobs seconded. Article was voted in the affirmative - 275 YES, 96 No

ARTICLE 15: To discontinue that portion of Old Mammoth Road, left unused because of relocation. Oscar Morin made the motion to adopt. Lowell Apple seconded. Article was voted in the affirmative - 356 YES, 15 NO

ARTICLE 16: Petition article for sewerage on Pleasant Street. No amount of money was stipulated for the project. Oscar Morin made the motion to adopt the article and urged the people to vote "no." Lee Harvey seconded and the article was defeated - 25 YES, 342 NO

ARTICLE 17: To recind the exemption increase granted to Mt. St. Mary College, at Town Meeting March 7, 1975. Michael Lankalis made the motion to adopt and Edward Johanson seconded. After much discussion, Mr. Riley was asked to explain how the vote would

effect the article - YES will adopt the article and will defeat the exemption - NO will defeat the article and retain the exemption. Atter several other persons spoke pro and con on the article, Mr. Morin Made a motion to end the debate. Mr. Apple seconded, and it was so voted. The article went down to defeat - 158 YES, 222 NO

ARTICLE 18: Election of Planning Board members. Richard Marshall made the motion to adopt the article and urged the people to vote "no." Lowell Apple seconded. Following a good bit of discussion, the article was defeated - 100 YES, 254 NO

ARTICLE 19: To accept Federal funds which may be made available during 1976. Lowell Apple made the motion to adopt. Paul Howe seconded. The article was voted in the affirmative - 320 YES, 28 NO

ARTICLE 20: The Budget. Mr. Morin moved to adopt the budget subject to the outcome on the Warrant Articles. Motion was seconded. Mr. Hess made the motion to amend the estimated revenues for 1976, increasing the total from \$895,357. to \$905,557. because of yield taxes retained and the \$10,000 for the Sewer Department Capital Improvement Fund. Motion seconded amendment adopted. Mr. Harvey made the motion to amend the Police Department Budget by increasing the total by \$4,000, for part- time clerical help. Mr. Normandeau seconded. Mr. Hess spoke for the Budget Committee in cutting the budget "to the bone." Amendment was defeated in voice vote. Harold Murray made the motion to amend the Fire departments budgets by \$2,632.80 for the So. Hooksett Fire Department, and \$2,497.80 for the Village Department. Motion seconded, differences in salaries between the two departments was the basic reason for the increases, plus a few other items. Amendment was voted in the affirmative and the then amended Budget was adopted.

The meeting was adjourned at 9:10 P.M.

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

TO THE INHABITANTS OF THE TOWN OF HOOKSETT, NEW HAMPSHIRE IN THE COUNTY OF MERRIMACK IN SAID STATE, QUALIFIED TO VOTE IN TOWN AFFAIRS:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Hooksett Memorial School on Tuesday, the 8th day of March next at six of the clock in the forenoon to cast your ballots for Town Officers and for questions required by law to be on the ballots. Polls close at 7:00 P.M.

The remainder of the warrant will be acted upon at the Hooksett Memorial School, Friday, March 11, 1977 at 7:00 P.M.

- Art. 1 The undersigned respectfully request that the following question be submitted to the voters at Hooksett's March, 1977 town election: "Shall we adopt the provisions of RSA 72:62 for a property tax exemption on real estate equipped with a solar energy heating or cooling system which exemption shall be in an amount of one hundred percent (100%) of the cost of the solar heating collectors and storage containers?" (Inserted by Petition). (Town Ballot March 8, 1977)
- Article 2. To see if the Town will vote to amend the Zoning Ordinance of the Town of Hooksett by approving the following amendments:
- No. 1 Amend Article III GENERAL PROVISIONS by adding a new Section K as follows: (Reference Page 6)
- "A lot in the Residential District (Art. IV) and the General Residence and Agricultural District (Art. V) may contain only one structure used for dwelling purposes."
- No. 2 Amend Article **V** GENERAL RESIDENCE and AGRICULTURAL DISTRICTS, Section C Required Lot Area by adding the following sentence: (Reference Page 10)
- "Where a municipal water supply or municipal sewerage system is available, the lot area shall not be less than 22,500 square feet and the frontage of such lots shall not be less than 150 feet."

No. 3 Amend Article VI COMMERCIAL DISTRICTS by deleting the existing Section D. Parking and by inserting in place thereof the following:

D. Parking

Off-street parking shall be provided, as follows, for any new construction, enlargement, extension, or increase in density:

- 1. Dwelling, lodging house, hotel, motel or similar buildings: one space for each dwelling, LODGING, SLEEPING OR DORMITORY UNIT. A place of public accommodation, such as restaurant, hall or similar facility if provided at a hotel or motel shall, in addition, meet the requirements specified in Part 2.
- 2. For churches, theaters or other places of assembly for which the proposed number of seats can be determined, one parking space shall be provided each six seats. Each two linear feet of bench space shall be considered as one seat. For other community center, commercial recreation, entertainment facilities, private club or lodge, restaurant, cafe or night club for which the proposed number of seats cannot be determined, one parking space shall be provided for each 200 square feet of gross floor area.
- 3. Public or private school, library, day nursery, kindergarten, day-care center, trade or professional school: one space for every 600 square feet of gross floor area.
- 4. Hospitals, convalescent homes, or nursing homes providing long term custodial care for the aged or infirm shall provide not less than one space for each four beds.
- 5. Offices, retail establishments, and service businesses shall provide one space for each 200 square feet of gross floor area on the first floor of a building and one space for each 400 square feet of gross floor area thereafter for all floors used for office, retail, or service businesses.
- 6. Wholesale establishments shall provide one space for each 1,200 square feet of gross floor area.

7. Gasoline service stations shall provide a minimum of 5 parking spaces, but at least one space per gasoline pump plus two spaces per service bay exclusive of spaces provided in service areas.

Self-service stations having no service bay(s) shall only be required to have sufficient spaces for their employees, plus two (2) additional spaces.

- 8. Drive in restaurants and other similar establishments which provide goods primarily to be consumed in private vehicles on the premises shall provide a minimum of 25 parking spaces plus one additional space for each 50 square feet of gross floor area in the building.
- 9. When a principal use of a lot is not enclosed in a building, the portion so used shall be considered as the gross floor area for calculating parking requirements. Where the area so used outside of a building is not clearly determinable, the Planning Board shall determine the area equivalent to gross floor space.
- 10. For uses not listed, parking requirements shall be for the closest similar use as determined by the Planning Board.
- 11. When units or measurements determining the number of required parking spaces result in a requirement of a fractional space, any fraction over one-half shall require one parking space.
- 12. The parking spaces required for uses in this district shall be on the same lot as the use they are intended to serve or, when practical difficulties as determined by the Planning Board prevent their establishment on the same lot, they may be established, with the approval of the Planning Board, no further than 300 feet from the premises to which they are appurtenant.
- 12. Where required parking spaces are provided away from the lot on which the use, other structure or lot they are intended to serve is located, such spaces shall be in the same possession, either by deed or long-term lease, as the property occupied by the use, structure or lot to which the parking spaces are accessory in which case the owner of said lot shall be bound by a notarized letter of record in the office of the Board of Selectmen requiring the owner, his heirs and assigns to maintain the required number of parking facilities for the duration of the use served.
- 14. In the case of a mixed or joint use the total requirements for the number of parking spaces shall be the requirements of the various uses committed separately and the parking spaces for one use shall

not be considered as providing the required parking spaces for any other use.

- 15. Every parking area and access driveways thereto shall be surfaced with a durable and dustless material which shall meet the approval of the Planning Board and shall be graded and drained so as to dispose of all surface water accumulation.
- 16. All parking areas within ten (10) feet of any property line may, at the discretion of the Planning Board, be required to have a curb or substantial bumper not less than four (4) feet from lot lines for property protection.
- 17. Any tixture used to illuminate any parking area shall be so arranged as to direct the light away from the street and away from adjoining premises used for residential purposes.
- 18. Parking areas shall be so designed that backing or maneuvering can be safely and adequately accomplished on the premises.
- No. 4. Amend Article IX ENFORCEMENT, Section C Permit Required by deleting the last sentence in the first paragraph of this section. (Reference Page 15).
- No. 5. Amend Article XV. DEFINITIONS: COMMERCIAL AREAS, Section 3 to read "... and to include the area bounded by Bicentennial Drive, Arah Street, Hamel Drive and the Manchester/Hooksett Town Line."

(Recommended by Planning Board) (Town Ballot March 8, 1977)

- Article 3. To see if the Town will vote to amend the Building Permit Ordinance of the Town of Hooksett by approving the following amendments:
- No. 1. Amend Section 1. APPLICATION: by deleting all references to the "Board of Selectmen" and by inserting in place thereof "Building Inspector." (Reference Page 38):
- No. 2. Amend Section 2. PERMITS: by deleting reference to the "Board of Selectmen" and by inserting in place thereof "Building Inspector" and by making other related changes making this section grammatically correct. (Reference Page 38).
- No. 3. Amend Section 4. PERMIT FEES: by deleting parts "a" through "c" inclusive and by inserting in place thereof the following: (Reference Page 39).

- a. Permits covering construction, additions, and alterations (exclusive of normal maintenance such as painting, repair of roof, repair of appurtenances, etc.) shall be based on the estimated value of the work according to the following schedule:

b. Revenues derived from permit fees shall be used to cover administrative and inspection costs.

(Recommended by Planning Board)

(Town Ballot March 8, 1977)

Article 4. To see if the Town will vote to enact a SWIMMING POOL ORDINANCE as follows:

"Every person owning land in the Town of Hooksett on which there is situated a swimming pool which contains twenty-four inches (24") or more of water in depth at any point shall erect and maintain thereon an adequate enclosure either surrounding the property or pool area, sufficient to make such body of water inaccessible to small children. Such enclosure, including gates therein, must be not less than four feet (4') in height above the underlying ground; all gates must be self-latching with latches placed four feet (4') above the underlying ground or otherwise made inaccessible from the outside to small children.

Above-ground pools having a side wall four (4) feet or greater above the underlying ground are excluded from this regulation, with the exception that they must be provided with safety latching steps or gate.

Any in-ground pool under construction must have a temporary fence erected during the construction period.

The penalty for violation of this ordinance shall be a fine of Fifty Dollars (\$50.) for each offense. Each day during which this ordinance is not complied with shall constitute a separate offense.

This ordinance shall become effective on July 1, 1977." (Recommended by Planning Board) (Town Ballot March 8, 1977)

Article 5. To see if the Town will vote to enact a SAND AND GRAVEL ORDINANCE as tollows:

- I. Purpose. In order to protect the environment and to insure the public health, safety and welfare, this ordinance is hereby adopted as a means to make the land useful after and eliminate hazardous conditions during earth removal operations.
- II. Permit Required. No owner shall permit any removal of sod, loam, clay, sand, gravel, or other natural or inorganic material from his premises without an excavation permit unless such removal is (1) incidental to the lawful construction or alteration of a building or structure, or the lawful construction of a parking lot or way (including driveway), on a portion of the premises where removal occurs or (2) incidental to agricultural activities, normal landscaping or minor topographical adjustments. Otherwise, the removal of such materials or any of them from any premises in Hooksett is prohibited unless the owner is granted an excavation permit by the Board of Adjustment. When loam is being stripped from any area a sufficient amount must be left on the site to support vegetation at the end of the excavation period. This amount is to be determined by the Board of Adjustment.
- 11. Application For Permit. An application for an excavation permit must be signed and dated by the owner of the premises wherein any excavation is proposed and must contain at least the following information: (a) the name and address of the owner of the land to be excavated, the person who will actually do the excavating and all abutters to the premises on which the excavation is proposed; (b) a plan and description of the location and boundaries of the proposed excavation and the number of acres to be involved in the project; (c) plan and description of the access to public highways to be utilized in the proposed excavation; (d) the breadth, depth and slope (not to be greater than 3:1 except in quarry excavations or in excavation of soil types conducive to steeper slopes) of the proposed excavation and estimated duration of the project; (e) a statement that no excavation will be made below the elevation

of the lowest abutting highway; (f) a mining plan i.e. the order in which the pit will be excavated; (g) the elevation of the highest annual groundwater table within or next to the proposed excavation; (h) a plan including the final contours of the property for the restoration of the area affected by the excavation at least in compliance with Section V including a timetable therefore as to fully depleted sites within the excavation area during said project; and (i) such other information as the Board of Adjustment may reasonably require.

- IV. Prohibited Projects. The Board of Adjustment shall not issue an excavation permit: (a) when the excavation would be unduly hazardous, injurious or unsightly to the public either during or after the pit operation; (b) when the excavation is not permitted by zoning or other applicable ordinances except where the Board of Adjustment feels that a variance is warranted; (c) for excavation within 50 feet of any public way or boundary of an objecting abutter unless a suitable screen, as determined by the Board of Adjustment, is erected so that the operation is not offensive to the public; (d) where existing visual barriers in the buffer strips referred to in paragraph c would be removed, except to provide access to the excavation; (e) where the excavation would substantially damage a known water bearing stratum so designated by the United States Soil Conservation Service or United States Geological Survey; (f) when excavation is planned beneath or adjacent to inland surface water in such a manner that a permit is required from the Water Supply and Pollution Control Commission, the Water Resources Board, the special board on Dredge and Fill or other state and federal agencies with jurisdiction over the premises; but the Board of Adjustment may approve the application when all necessary permits have been obtained; or (g) where the project cannot comply with the restoration provisions of the Section V.
- V. Restoration. Within 12 months after the expiration date of the permit therefore or the completion of each section of the mining plan, whichever occurs first, the owner of the excavated land shall restore, or cause to be restored, the area affected by the excavation to meet each of the following minimum conditions; (a) restoration must be safe and sightly and must not be in conflict with the natural state of the surrounding area; (b) all slopes must be regraded to natural repose with the type of soil which they are composed (except quarry operations); (c) the site must be contoured to eliminate any standing bodies of water created by the excavation which may constitute a hazard to health or safety; (d) except for exposed ledge, said area shall be covered with vegetation suitable to prevent erosion, and covered with soil suitable to sustain such vegetation, and (e) debris resulting from the excavation, including stumps and bounders, shall be buried or removed.

- VI. Project Permit. The Board of Adjustment may grant to the applicant conditional approval subject to a public hearing being held on the proposal as provided by Section VIII. Following the public hearing, an excavation permit shall be issued if the Board of Adjustment determines that a permit is warranted. Said permit shall be valid for the duration of the project or until amended as specified in Section VII, or revoked as specified in Section X. Such permit may be issued subject to conditions established by the Board of Adjustment including the provision of visual barriers at the site. Upon disapproval of an application for an excavation permit or an application for an amendment to an excavation permit, the Board of Adjustment shall state the reasons for denial, in writing, to the applicant.
- VII. Application For Amendment. When the scope of a project for which an excavation permit has been issued, is proposed to be altered so as to affect either the size or location of the excavation, the rate of removal, or the plan for restoration, the owner shall submit an application for amendment of his excavation permit which application shall be subject to approval in the same manner as provided for an excavation permit, with the addition that an inspection of the current site must be made by the Board of Adjustment.
- VIII. Hearing. After the Board of Adjustment conditionally approves an application for an excavation permit or an application for an amended excavation permit, a public hearing shall be held on such decision, or any matter determined thereby. A notice of said hearing shall be sent to all abutters, as well as the Conservation Commission, by certified mail, return receipt requested, and shall specify the grounds for the hearing as well as the date, time and place. All costs incurred for the public hearing shall be the responsibility of the owner or agent acting on behalf of the owner and payable prior to the hearing.
- IX. Appeal. If the Board of Adjustment approves or disapproves an application for an excavation permit or an application for an amended permit, any person aggrieved by such decision may appeal to the Board of Adjustment for a re-hearing on such decision or any matter determined thereby. The motion for re-hearing shall fully specify every ground upon which it is alleged that the decision or order complained of is unlawful or unreasonable and said appeal shall be filed with 10 days of the date of the decision appealed from. The Board of Adjustment shall either grant or deny the request for re-hearing within 10 days, and if the request is granted, a re-hearing shall be scheduled within 30 days.

If the aggrieved party, in the case of a denial for re-hearing is issued, feels the reasons given are invalid, suit may be filed with the Superior Court.

No excavation will be allowed during the ten (10) day appeal period. Should a re-hearing be granted or a suit filed, no excavation will be allowed until the issue is settled.

- X. Revocation of Permit. The Board of Adjustment shall have the power to revoke a permit if the permit holder allows a change in operation of the excavation site without obtaining an amendment to his permit, pursuant to Section VII, or fails to comply with any of the conditions subject to which his permit was issued, or is found to have made a material misstatement in or has failed to comply with the terms of the application on which the granting of the permit is based, or fails to remit the annual permit fee. Such revocation shall be subject to a motion for a hearing thereon and appeal in accordance with the provisions of Section VIII and IX. When a permit is revoked, the permitee shall be required to immediately comply with the conditions of the permit regarding restoration. Failure to do so shall be considered a violation of this ordinance and Section XIII shall apply.
- XI. Permit Fee. A fee not to exceed \$50 per year shall be charged for an excavation permit or any amended permit.
- XII. Bond Required. The permitee shall post a bond or other negotiable securities with the Treasurer of the Town in an amount approved by the Board of Adjustment and sufficient to guarantee conformity with Section V of this ordinance.
- XIII. Enforcement and Penalty. Any owner of land violating any provision or provisions of this ordinance shall for each day of violation, upon condition thereof, be fined and pay a penalty of not more than fifty dollars (\$50) per day for each day of violation. In addition, the Board of Adjustment or any person aggrieved thereby may seek an order that the violator cease and desist from violation of any provision of this ordinance and take such action as may be necessary to be in compliance with his permit and this ordinance.
- XIV. **Highway Projects.** Excavation sites operated by the New Hampshire Department of Public Works and Highways, or the Highway Department of the Town of Hooksett, shall be subject to regulation by State guidelines.

- XV. Existing Operations. Any owner of an existing excavation site in use as of the effective date of this ordinance shall apply for an excavation permit as provided in Section III. The Board of Adjustment may issue a temporary permit which shall be valid for 90 days and shall be issued solely to allow the owner of an existing operation to comply with this ordinance. The Board of Adjustment may grant an extension of time up to 12 months for operations considered too large to comply within the stated 90 day period.
- XVI. Manufacturing and Processing Plants. Existing manufacturing and processing plants which use earth taken from areas continguous to such plants may be exempted from Section IV but shall submit within 60 days after the taking of earth from a new excavation site on said areas a plan for restoration thereof in compliance with Section V and shall be subject to the other requirements of this ordinance insofar as their new excavation sites are concerned.
- XVII. Review. The Board of Adjustment or its agent shall conduct a site review of all outstanding excavation permits at least once every six (6) months to verify compliance with the permit as issued or amended.
- XVIII. Effective Date. This ordinance shall take effect thirty (30) days after passage. (Recommended by Planning Board) (Town Ballot March 8, 1977).
- Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to have the Planning Board study, and at a future date, recommend a building code for the Town of Hooksett.

(Recommended by Planning Board) (Town Ballot March 8, 1977)

- Article 7. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of the 1977 taxes, to be repaid therefrom.
- Art. 8. To see if the Town will vote to give a discount of two percent (2%) on all taxes except Resident Tax and Sewer Rents paid on or before the fifteenth (15th) day of July, and to grant the Selectmen authority to extend this date if unable to get tax rate from Department of Revenue Administration as of July 1st.
- Art. 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of seven hundred twenty-five dollars and eighty one cents (\$725.81) the state to furnish four thousand eight hundred thirty-eight dollars and seventy one cents (\$4,838.71) the same to be expended under the State Highway Department for Class V Town Road assistance or take any action thereto.

Art. 10. To see if the Town will vote to establish a Town Highway Reconstruction Capital Reserve Fund, as provided by R.S.A. 35, and allocate the unexpended Federal Revenue Sharing Funds of 1976 (Approximately \$49,603.00) and the 1977 estimated Federal Revenue Sharing Funds of \$80,000. to this Capital Reserve Fund.

Expenditures from the fund will be under control of the Budget Committee, Selectmen and Road Agent. When feasible all work will be put out to competitive bid.

- Art. 11. To see if the Town will vote to construct an addition to the Hooksett Public Library, 1367 Hooksett Road, at a cost of ninety-eight thousand dollars (\$98,000.) and to authorize the allocation of twenty-five thousand dollars (\$25,000.) of this total from the Federal Revenue Sharing Funds and to accept the donation of ten thousand dollars (\$10,000.) of building materials from Duracrete Block Co., Inc., as specified in the agreement prior to the purchase of the present Library Building. (Inserted by Petition.)
- Art. 12. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,162.38 for the continuation of services to the low income and elderly residents of Hooksett through the Suncook Area Center of the Community Action Program, Belknap-Merrimack Counties, Inc. (Inserted by Petition)
- Art. 13. To see if the Town will raise and appropropriate an amount to maintain membership in the Southern New Hampshire Planning Commission (1977-1978) membership fee based on 1970 U. S. Census figures at thirty-five cents (\$0.35) per capita-two thousand three hundred ninety dollars and fifty cents (\$2,390.50) or take any action thereto.
- Art. 14. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following resolution: Be it resolved:

That the Town of Hooksett will elect to approve of the inclusion of its officers and employees in the New Hampshire Retirement System of the State of New Hampshire, which system is provided for by R.S.A. 100-A (supp), for the employees of the Town of Hooksett in accordance with Chapter 134, to be effective July 1, 1977- and to raise and appropriate two thousand dollars (\$2,000.00) for the Town's 1977 share.

Art. 15. To see it the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$1,500.00) for the purpose of providing tor matching any available funds under the following grant match funds:

25% Crime Commission Match Funds (\$2,000.00 possible

50% Highway Safety Match Funds (\$1,000.00) possible for the purpose of purchasing a moving radar unit.

(Submitted by Police Dept.)

\$1,500.00

- Art. 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 to be matched with a grant of \$1,000.00 from the Land and Water Conservation Fund Act of 1965, the Bureau of Outdoor Recreation within the Department of the Interior. To be used by the Town Conservation Commission to add landscaping to Riverside Park. (Inserted by Petition).
- Art. 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two hundred ten dollars (\$210.00) as its equal share, with Allenstown and Pembroke, to defray the office rental cost of the Children and Youth Program. This program is sponsored by the New Hampshire Division of Public Health and last year sixty-six (66) children from Hooksett participated in this health program. (Inserted by Petition.)
- Art. 18. We the undersigned are petitioning with the Town of Hooksett, N. H., to reconstruct and widen Smyth Road, so cars can meet without one riding in the gutter. Smyth Road is a major connecting road between the City of Manchester, N. H. and By-Pass 28. In view of all the new homes built in this area and public businesses on By-Pass 28, it is a heavily traveled road. As stated in the September Fall News Letter, we believe Smyth Road is one of the Roads that has badly deteriorated. No major repairs have been done in the last thirty years. One ride on this road will convince anyone. We hope help will come early in 1977. (Inserted by Petition).
- Art. 19. To see if the Town will vote to rescind Article 16 of the 1975 Town Warrant which covered the distribution of campaign materials on town property.
- Art. 20. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to appoint a committee to pursue the establishment of an area in which to deposit paper, bottles and cans for recycling and to participate in the program when such an area is established.
- Art. 21. To see if the Town will adopt the provisions of R.S.A. 55:9-A and R.S.A. 55:9-B. Said statutes allow a legal resident of Hooksett whose name does not appear on the checklist of Hooksett, to apply to the Town Clerk for the purpose of having his name added thereto.

- Art. 22. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to accept on behalf of the Town, any federal or state funds which may be made available during 1977. Further, to see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to make application for said funds and then expend the same for the purpose designated within applicable federal or state regulation.
- Art. 23. Shall the Town of Hooksett pay Town employees the difference between their military pay and regular earnings for the annual encampment required by members of various reserve units (Army, Airforce, Navy, Coast Guard and/or National Guard)? Such persons entitled to this payment shall present a copy of their orders placing them on active duty and some documentation establishing pay scale to the Town Treasurer for processing and payment. Requests for payment must be made not later than thirty days following the active duty period. (Inserted by Petition).
- Art. 24. To see, if the voters of the town will vote and direct the Selectmen and Road Agent to use the next Federal Grant of funds or State roads allocation of funds, to widen substantially the bridge connecting Martin's Ferry Road and River Road, just north of the Everett Allen's Farm. (Inserted by Petition).
- Art. 25. To see if the town will direct the Selectmen to select a commission of volunteers from all the town departments that require multiple repairs to motor vehicles to determine the feasibility and possible savings to the town of hiring its own expert mechanic and the costs involved. (Inserted by Petition).
- Art. 26. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue that portion of the old turn-around at the end of Whitehall Terrace Drive declared surplus to the needs of the Town of Hooksett.
- Art. 27. "To see if the town wishes to exclude from its Social Security plan services performed by election officials or election workers for each calendar quarter in which the remuneration paid for such services is less than \$50.00."
- Art. 28. To see if the Town will vote to accept the Budget, as submitted by the Budget Committee, or take any other action in relation thereto.

SELECTMEN'S REPORT

To the Residents of the Town of Hooksett:

For the Town of Hooksett, 1976 was a year in which our growth and programs for continuing and betterment of service were generally on target in spite of rising costs and the difficulties in obtaining sufficient funds to complete all of the programs projected by this Board.

The Board, acting with the approval of the residents of the Town, as evidenced by their vote on Article 8, of the 1976 Town Warrant, entered into an agreement with Thomas F. Moran, Inc., to prepare a tax map for the Town of Hooksett. In conjunction with the Tax Map proposal was one for preparing a computer file. The computer file was used in 1976 to record the property values of land and buildings, calculate the tax on such property, calculate and deduct any exemptions and indicate those properties subject to precinct and sewer taxes. Once the tax rates were secured from the Board of Taxation, all that was necessary was to telephone the rate to the Company and in five days, the tax bills were printed and forwarded to the Tax Collector for review and mailing. This was so successful that the Town experienced a reduction of \$4,000, from the estimated interest payments for the quick return of tax income reduced the necessity of borrowing in anticipation of taxes. This program will be one that is in a constant state of updating each year as new properties are added or values of properties increased because of additional construction to existing buildings. The Board is very enthused about the success of this operation.

We are also proud of another accomplishment that has been achieved this past year. Article 9 authorized an expenditure to expand the second floor of the Municipal Building to provide for additional meeting-rooms and office space. This project should be accomplished by the time this report is printed. We will now have additional offices for the Overseer of the Public Welfare, the Town Treasurer, the Chief of Police, a Police Squad room, an office for the Investigative Division and two large conference rooms in an area that was here-to-fore not usable. We feel that the Town, by the addition of this space, has profited far in excess of the amount spent.

In our last report we mentioned that we could see that a change was taking place in our Town. Look around you and you will see that this is readily evident. The new bridge in the Village area was opened and "Dedicated to Those Residents Of Hooksett Who Gave Their Lives In The Service of Their Country," on August 7, 1976. The twin span on the I-93 By-Pass providing access between Routes 3 and 3A without going into Manchester, was opened without any publicity in October of 1976. The area west of the Merrimack River along the Everett Turnpike has become inundated with gravel pits which are presently detrimental to the Town's appearance but which, when landscaped, will, we hope add new useable property to the Town. New construction is appearing in the Martins Corner, Route 3 area. New businesses are opening almost daily. Hooksett is beginning to grow as the Board predicted it would. How large this growth rate will become is anyone's guess. The Board feels that the growth rate can only be limited by the attitude of the residents of the Town and the services we provide.

When this growth begins, the residents of Hooksett should be ready to accept it and should plan for it now. In our 1976 report to the residents we stated that we should not be satisfied with past or present accomplishments but to strive to provide the finest service we could to the residents of the town at a price the Town could afford. Planning through citizen participation should be part of this. In some instances, planning programs are in the process of being accomplished or still under consideration.

In 1976 we proposed that a group of interested citizens of the Town, comprised of representatives of the Planning Board, Water Precincts, Sewer Commission, Men's Club, Women's Club, Selectmen, Chamber of Commerce and others analyze the effects of the newly constructed 1-93 interchange on the Town and its growth. This group would analyze the requirements of industry, the availability of resources, the problems involved in rezoning in specific areas and the methods of contacting industries and make a final report tor consideration of the residents of the Town.

This committee was organized on May 10, 1976. As of this date, it is continuing with its deliberations. A portion of the assigned duties has been completed but no final report is yet available.

The Selectmen proposed to install a bid system for items purchased in quantity. It was proposed that the tirst item for consideration was a submission of the Town's insurance program for bid. This has not been accomplished for this Board has yet to meet with the other Board involved in the package insurance concept.

The Board has before it and has been considering one item that is

being proposed as an article in the Town Warrant for 1977; that is, to establish its own facility for the repair of Town owned vehicles and other maintenance equipment. It appears that the Town departments, in aggregate, own enough vehicles to make this proposal an economical one for the Town.

Additional projects that will progress in 1977 are:

1. Reconstruction of streets and roads which are now in an unacceptable condition for travel. We feel that this is important for, although we were successful in delaying the turning back of certain roads now maintained by the Highway Department of the State of New Hampshire, in 1976, we may not be as successful in 1981 when the new census is completed.

We feel that between 1977 and 1981, Hooksett must bring it's "Town Roads" up to date and into an acceptable condition for travel by replacing the road from the "ground up" in order to be ready for the increased normal maintenance required when the additional mileage is added. Thus we intend to propose reconstruction by removing the existing road beds, replacing with gravel, and resurfacing those roads which require this action on a priority basis. It is hoped that our program can be completed by 1981.

2. The reassessment of properties in 1977, possibly continuing into and completing during 1978, which action was approved by the vote of the Town in 1976. This action will distribute the tax burden fairly upon all the property owners of Hooksett, based on the 1977 value of their properties either residential or Commercial. While it is argued that taxation, based upon property values, is not the fair way to assess taxes, it is the only way presently available under the statutes to do so. Until a new proposal is approved by our legislative bodies, we are committed to this system.

These are not the only projects we foresee but are the major ones. Every day, every week, every month, we are faced with new ones, some minor, some major. Last year we said we were looking forward to 1976 with "Enthusiasm" and through the year we approached every problem in that manner. We as your Board of Selectmen, request that you as residents of the Town of Hooksett, join with us in meeting every challenge in 1977 with this same attitude ---- "ENTHUSIASTICALLY."

REPORT OF THE BUDGET COMMITTEE

In a year when the tax rate in surrounding Towns and Cities increased as much as \$12 per \$1,000 valuation, your Budget Committee was heartened and encouraged when the Hooksett tax rate dropped \$.70 per \$1,000. The Committee would like to think that much of this reduction is attributable to the austere budget which was submitted to and approved by the people of Hooksett last year. However, most of the credit for this reduction in taxes must go to those Hooksett departments and agencies which, by their fiscal responsibility, returned unspent surpluses to the people. We wish to thank all of these people for their hard work and commitment to fiscal integrity.

The budgetary process in Hooksett is on the verge of becoming a full-year project. Last year, after several working sessions in the spring following Town Meeting, the Committee began to receive and review budget requests from various Town, School District, and other departmental and commission officials in September. The tempo of these public meetings increased through January, when the Committee was meeting as often as three times a week. The Budget Committee was encouraged by the increased public attendance at the required Public Budget Hearings, with almost one hundred people in attendance at the first Hearing. However, with the literal exceptions of one or two people, public participation at the open meetings of the Committee was literally non-existent. Under these circumstances, every effort was made to obtain the broadest news coverage with Committee meeting notices published in the area newspapers in advance of our open meetings, and with full reporting of our actions at those meetings.

Once again, the total budgetary requests submitted to the Budget Committee by various Town and School District departments would have resulted in a tax increase of approximately 9%. As in years past, much of this increase is attributable to costs beyond the control of Hooksett officials. Thus, for example, we project that the tuition assessment levied by the Manchester School District for Hooksett high school students will increase by \$29,500 this year. All of us are familiar with the constantly increasing costs of utilities, including electricity and heating oil. All of these inflationary pressures make budgetary increases in succeeding years inevitable.

In addition to these uncontrollable increases, the Budget Committee is again proposing a general 6% increase in wages for Town and School District employees. We believe that over the years, these employees have demonstrated that they are devoted public servants. In proposing this cost of living guideline, we wish to recognize this dedication and let our employees know that we too realize that they live in an inflationary world.

The explanations that follow outline the appropriations requested by the major Town departments and the action of the Budget Committee on those specific requests. As you will note, thirteen budgets increased over last year, four were reduced and one remained unchanged.

The HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT budget reflects an increase of \$22,729 over last year. Despite this substantial increase, the budget still may be inadequate to cover costs with the severity of the winter we are experiencing. This increase is occasioned solely by the six (6) percent wage increase added to the actual expenditures of the Highway Department over last year.

The POLICE DEPARTMENT appropriations reflect an increase of \$13,270 over last year, almost all of which results from increased payroll.

Of the COMMUNICATIONS COMMISSION budget increase of \$2,028, \$1,733 is included for the six (6) percent increase in wages.

The SELECTMEN'S budget request was reduced from \$465,356 to \$461,016. Among other items reflecting a reduction, the appropriation for Interest on the Town debt decreased by \$8,000. Part of these reduced appropriations were consumed in other line items, however, including the Town's contribution to the recently begun Retirement Program initiated for Town employees.

The PARKS AND RECREATION budget contains approximately a fifty (50) percent increase in appropriations over last year's budget of \$3,690. This increase reflects a decision to begin several acquisitions which have been deferred in previous years.

WATER PRECINCTS. Citizens in the Central Hooksett Water Precinct can be encouraged by the fact that the budget for that Precinct is down \$1,173 over last year, a change which should mean no change in water rates this year. Unfortunately, the Hooksett Village Precinct budget was approved as submitted at the figure of \$63,464.50. This figure represents a \$13,775 increase over last year. Of this increase, \$7,200 results from the interest and debt repayment on the bonds which were required to construct the new water main across the new bridge in the Village. An additional appropriation increase of \$3,900 was required for the purchase of a new vehicle. It should be noted at this point that neither of these budgets will be acted upon at Town Meeting as each Water Precinct, by law, has its own district meeting which is open only to persons in those districts.

The SEWER COMMISSION budget was held to almost no increase this year atter the substantial increase in appropriations last year. The budget, as recommended by the Budget Committee, contains a \$7 increase in appropriations. As is the case with the Water Precincts, the Sewer Commission budget is paid for exclusively out of revenues obtained from persons using the Hooksett sewer system.

The HOOKSETT PUBLIC LIBRARY budget was approved at \$34,508, an increase of approximately \$2,700 over last year. Again, most of this increase occurred from the increase in wages.

The HOOKSETT DISTRICT COURT, which returned a surplus to the Town of almost \$3,000, has a budgetary increase of \$2,010.

The PUBLIC WELFARE budget was approved at \$14,000, a \$2,000 increase over last year, reflecting anticipated increased appropriations for Old Age Assistance.

FIRE DEPARTMENTS. The Hooksett Village Fire Department and South Hooksett Fire Department budgets contain modest increases of approximately four (4) percent each, primarily reflecting wage increases within the Committee's six (6) percent guideline. The Forest Fire Warden submitted a budget \$300 below last year's appropriation.

The remaining budgets were recommended as proposed or modified only slightly:

Budgets for the two Water Precincts and the Sewer Commission, which are paid exclusively by the users of those systems, total \$229,043. These figures, however, do not include appropriations contained in Warrant Articles, which are reviewed below.

TOWN WARRANT ARTICLES

The Budget Committee has taken the following action on the Articles in the Warrant requiring an expenditure of money:

Article 12. \$3,162.38 Community Action Project (submitted by petition) Recommended by the Budget Committee. The Budget Committee believes the citizens of Hooksett have benefited greatly by the Community Action Program and urges the approval of this Article.

Article 14. \$2,000 New Hampshire Retirement System Recommended by the Budget Committee. The Budget Committee urges that all Town employees be given the opportunity to participate in a retirement program to be funded partially out of Town funds and partially out of the participating individual's wages.

Article 9. \$725.81 Class V Town Road Aide Assistance Recommended by Budget Committee. This is an annual Article that allows the Town to receive \$4,838.71 from the State Highway Department for Town road maintenance and improvements.

Article 13. \$2,390.50 Southern New Hampshire Planning Commission Recommended by the Budget Committee. The Budget Committee believes the benefits derived from the Southern New Hampshire Planning Commission far exceed the membership fee paid, and have recommended to the Selectmen that this appropriation be placed in a line item in future years.

Article 10. \$129,603 Highway Reconstruction Capital Reserve Fund Recommended by Budget Committee. Budget Committee concurs with the recommendation of the Town Selectmen that a Highway Reconstruction Capital Reserve Fund be created. All of the funding for this Fund in this Warrant Article is from unexpended and estimated Federal Revenue Sharings Funds from 1976 and 1977, thus requiring and involving no expenditure from local taxes.

Article 17. \$210 Children and Youth Program Recommended by the Budget Committee. (Submitted by petition). This Program is a joint project with the Towns of Allenstown and Pembroke and is sponsored by the New Hampshire Division of Public Health.

Article 15. \$1,500 Matching Grant Funds Recommended by the Budget Committee. Appropriation of these funds will permit the Town to receive a total of \$3,000 trom Crime Commission and Highway Safety matching funds.

Article 11. \$98,000 Hooksett Public Library Addition (Submitted by petition)



This project contemplates the construction of a \$5,000 square foot addition to the Public Library at a cost of \$98,000, with \$25,000 of that cost to be covered by Federal Revenue Sharing Funds. Gentlemen:

In compliance with your request dated August 27, 1975, we have examined the records and accounts of Joyce A. Emerson, Town Clerk and Tax Collector for the Town of Hooksett for the period January 1, 1974 through August 29, 1975.

The purpose of this examination was to determine the extent of any loss which may have resulted from the unexplained disappearance of cash receipts placed by the Town Clerk and Tax Collector in the town safe, which facility is situated in the quarters assigned to the said Town Clerk and Tax Collector.

Our examination was made in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards and accordingly included such tests of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as were considered necessary in the circumstances. Verification of uncollected and unredeemed taxes was made by mailing notices to delinquent taxpayers as indicated by the Tax Collector's records.

The audit disclosed that payments by the Town Clerk and Tax Collector to the Town Treasurer during the period January 1, 1974 to August 29, 1975, inclusive, resulted in a net underremittance of \$1,094.66, computed as follows:

GENERAL COMMENTS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

The Town Clerk and Tax Collector accumulates considerable amounts of monies before making remittances to the Treasurer. Although receipts are deposited in a walk-in valut, accessibility to this vault by town personnel not directly associated with the ottice makes the storage of any large sum of monies a questionable practice.

A cash count taken by our auditors on August 29, 1975 revealed that the amount of cash on hand was inconsistent with prudent business practices requiring the daily depositing of all cash receipts for both security and accountability purposes.

In this regard, we respectfully direct your attention to R.S.A. 41:35, as amended by Chapter 418:1 of the laws of the 1975 Legislature, which states in part as follows: "A tax collector shall pay all money collected to the town treasurer at least on a weekly basis, or on a daily basis at the discretion of the commissioner of revenue administration."

The Town Clerk does not maintain individual accountability records for the assorted fees collected for the Uniform Commercial Code, Vital Statistics and the copy making machine.

All fees collected by the Town Clerk should be recorded in the cashbook maintained for that purpose on the day of receipt. The total receipts should be posted and each fee recorded in its proper category. Periodic remittances to the Treasurer should be supported by the entries in this cashbook.

Conclusion:

A copy of this report has been forwarded to the Attorney General of the State of New Hampshire for his review. This is consistent with our usual practice where the results of our audits disclose a deficiency in the accounts examined.

The contents of this report may not be made public in any manner - or discussed with any unauthorized persons without the express consent of the Attorney General.

Upon proper clearance by the Attorney General, the provisions of Chapter 71-A, Section 21, of the Revised Statutes Annotated, require that the auditors' summary of findings and recommendations shall be published in the next annual report of the Town. The exhibits contained in this report may be published at the discretion of the Selectmen. This letter, however, must be published in its entirety.

One of the enclosed audit reports must be given to the Town Clerk for retention as part of the permanent town records.

We extend our thanks to the officials and employees of the Town of Hooksett for their assistance and cooperation during the course of this audit.

Gentlemen:

Submitted herewith is the report of the examination and audit of the accounts of the Town of Hooksett for the fiscal years ended December 31, 1974 and December 31, 1975, which was made by this Division in accordance with the vote of the Town. Exhibits as hereafter listed are included as part of the report.

One of the enclosed reports must be given to the Town Clerk for retention as part of the permanent records.

SCOPE OF AUDIT

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the Board of Selectmen, Treasurer, Sewer Commissioners, Public Library, District Court and Trustees of Trust Funds. The Tax Collector and town Clerk records were audited for the period August 30, 1975 to December 31, 1975.

FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

General Fund:

As of December 31, 1973 and December 31, 1974 (Exhibit 1) As of December 31, 1974 and December 31, 1975 (Exhibit 21)

Comparative balance sheets which disclose the financial condition of the general fund as of December 31, 1973 and December 31, 1974 are presented in Exhibit 1. As indicated therein, the current

surplus of the Town decreased by \$30,661, from \$74,706 to \$44,045, during the fiscal year 1974.

Comparative balance sheets which disclose the financial condition of the general fund as of December 31, 1974 and December 31, 1975 are presented in Exhibit 21. As indicated therein the current surplus of the Town increased by \$9,002, from \$44,045 to \$53,047 during the fiscal year 1975.

Analysis of Change in Current Financial Condition:

Comparative statements of general fund appropriations and expenditures, estimated and actual revenues for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1974 are presented in Exhibits 3 and 4. As indicated by the Budget Summary (Exhibit 4), a revenue surplus of \$16,838 less a net overdraft of appropriations of \$7,541 resulted in a net budget surplus of \$9,297 for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1974.

Similar statements for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1975 are presented in Exhibits 23 and 24. As indicated by the Budget Summary (Exhibit 24), a revenue surplus of \$12,566 less a net overdraft of appropriations of \$3,179 resulted in a net budget surplus of \$9,387 for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1975.

Long-Term Indebtedness:

Comparative Balance Sheets:

As of December 31, 1973 and December 31, 1974 (Exhibit 5) As of December 31, 1974 and December 31, 1975 (Exhibit 25)

The outstanding indebtedness of the Town as of December 31, 1973 and December 31, 1974 is shown in Exhibit 5. As indicated therein the long-term debt decreased by \$33,500 from \$1,288,500 to \$1,255,000 during the fiscal year ended December 31, 1974. During the year matured bonds totaling \$95,000 and matured notes totaling \$18,500 were paid and Lease/Purchase notes for Sanitary Land Fill of \$80,000 were issued.

The outstanding indebtedness of the Town as of December 31, 1974 and December 31, 1975 is shown in Exhibit 25. As indicated therein the long-term debt increased by \$420,000 from \$1,255,000 to \$1,675,000 during the fiscal year ended December 31, 1975. During the year matured bonds totaling \$95,000 and Lease/Purchase notes of \$35,000 were paid and sewer bonds of \$320,000, sewer notes of \$50,000 and bridge bonds of \$180,000 were issued.

Statements showing the financial condition of the Sewer Department, and the results of operations for the tiscal year ended December 31, 1974 are included in Exhibits 13, 14, and 15. As indicated in Exhibit 13 (Comparative Balance Sheets), the accumulated deficit of the Sewer Department increased by \$50,489 from \$201,674 to \$252,163 during 1974.

Similar statements for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1975 are included in Exhibits 37, 38, and 39. As indicated in Exhibit 37 (Comparative Balance Sheets), the accumulated deficit of the Sewer Department increased by \$76,303 from \$252,163 to \$328,466 during 1975.

AUDIT PROCEDURE

The accounts and records of all town officials charged with the custody, receipt and disbursement of public funds were examined and audited in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards, and accordingly included such tests of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as were considered necessary in the circumstances.

Verification of uncollected and unredeemed taxes were made by mailing notices to delinquent taxpayers, as indicated by the Tax Collector's records. Consequently, the amounts of uncollected and unredeemed taxes as stated in this report are subject to any changes which may be necessitated by the return of verification notices.

GENERAL COMMENTS

Overdraft of Appropriation and Application of the Municipal Budget Law:

As indicated in Exhibit 3, Comparative Statement of Appropriations and Expenditures, during 1974 budgetary expenditures exceeded total town appropriations and consequently resulted in a net appropriation overdraft of \$3,393 computed as follows:

In towns operating under the provisions of the Municipal Budget Law, R.S.A. Chapter 32, Section 10-a, when it becomes necessary to expend money in excess of an appropriation which may result in an over expenditure of the total amount appropriated for all purposes, the Selectmen, with the written approval of a majority of the budget committee, must apply to the Commissioner of Revenue Administration for authority to make such expenditure. This procedure was not followed by the Selectmen with regard to excess expenditures which contributed to the appropriation overdraft incurred in 1974.

Long-Term Notes Issued Contrary to R.S.A. 33:8:

R.S.A. 33:8 states in part, "Except as otherwise specifically provided by law, the issue of bonds or notes by any municipal corporation, except a city, shall be authorized by a vote of two-thirds..., of all the voters present and voting at an annual or special meeting of such corporation, called for the purpose, ..."

Article 20 of the 1973 Town Meeting authorized the Selectmen and Library Trustees to enter into an agreement for the lease and purchase of the Duracrete Block Company, Inc. building and land for use as a Public Library facility, at a price not to exceed the sum of \$15,000 per year for a period of five years. Said article was approved by a paper ballot vote of 302 - yes, 209 - no. This was not the necessary two-thirds vote. A promissory note was issued to the seller which was later discounted to the Merchants Savings Bank of Manchester, New Hampshire.

Similarly, Article 7 of the 1974 Town meeting authorized the Selectmen to enter into an agreement for the lease and purchase of the Schroeder property buildings and thirty-four acres of land for use as a sanitary land-fill site at a price not to exceed the sum of \$20,000.00 per year for a period of five years. Said article was approved by a printed ballot vote of 197 - yes, 141 - no. This was also not the necessary two-thirds vote as required by R.S.A. 33:8.

Conclusion:

The provisions of Chapter 71a, Section 21, require that the auditors' summary of findings and recommendations (letter of transmittal) shall be published in the next annual report of the Town. Publications of the Exhibits contained in this audit report is optional at the discretion of the Board of Selectmen. This letter, however, must be published in its entirety.

Record of the Minutes of the School District Meeting

HELD MARCH 12, 1976

The moderator, Oscar Morin, Jr., called the meeting to order at 7:00 p.m.

Mr. Morin made the following opening statement:

Ladies & Gentlemen:

Welcome to your annual school district meeting. I think it proper at this time to introduce the school district officers.

My name is Oscar Morin, Jr., your Moderator. Allan Sprague, District Clerk, James VanVliet, Robert Collins and Leo Sack School Board Members. Mrs. Pat Sack is serving as Assistant District Moderator. Douglas Mealey will take oath after meeting.

It is my duty to conduct the business of the meeting, to decide questions of order, to make a public declaration of every vote taken, to preserve order, and I may prescribe rules of procedure, but such rules may be altered by you the voters. Any action taken by me may be reversed by the voters of this meeting. Any voter not approving my ruling, may move to overrule the chair and with the proper second, the meeting will be polled. If a majority of the voters wish to overrule the chair the motion will carry.

The School District is required by law to hold an annual meeting between March first and April second for the election of officers, for the raising and appropriating of money for the support of schools, and to transact other district business, that has been legally warned. The School Board is required by law to warn the inhabitants of the district, qualified to vote in district affairs, by a warrant, stating the time and place of the meeting and the subject matter of the business to be acted upon.

A School District meeting cannot act except upon articles, distinctly stated in the warrant. The School Board can insert articles on their own initiative, but they must insert the subject matter of any petition signed by ten or more voters of the school district, presented no later than thirty days before the meeting. The purpose of the requirement is to inform the voters of the school district of the business on which they are called to act upon at the meeting. Anything else is illegal.

It is also my duty to protect the absent voters of the district, by not letting the district vote on matters not mentioned in the warrant, or on illegal articles. School districts have only such powers as are granted to them by the State and are bound by the limits imposed on them by the legislature. The Hooksett School District operates under the New Hampshire Municipal Budget Act and is governed by its regulations. No appropriation shall be made for any purpose not included in said budget. So long as the provisions of this law remain in force in this town, the total amount appropriated at any meeting shall not exceed ten percent of the total amount specified in the budget for said meeting, less fixed charges.

This year's budget as submitted by the budget committee, recommends a total appropriation of one million, eight hundred thousand, one hundred ninety-three dollars and fifty-three cents. When fixed charges of debt and supervisionary union expenses are deducted, the amount this meeting can raise the budget as submitted by the budget committee is one hundred sixty-seven thousand, five hundred ninety four dollars.

Judge King, in his land mark decision regarding the Rye School District said, I quote, "The municipal budget act evidences a clear purpose to control the appropriation and expenditures of monies in towns. It is designed to establish some uniformity in the manner of appropriating and expending public monies in the various municipalities of this State. The school district meeting, cannot substitute its opinion on the actual operation of a school for that of a school board. Its primary, if not sole function, is the preparation of a budget and not the formation of school room policy or the duties of school house personnel. The internal management of a School Board is not within the scope or authority of a budget committee." Unquote.

This year's warrant contains two articles, submitted by petition that raise many serious questions of law. I am not a lawyer, as most of you know, but I have labored long trying to decide the right and proper action to take on these articles, for I have always tried to run an open and fair meeting. When I rule on these articles please remember my decision was reached after much research and study.

It is my intention to make sure every voter desiring to be heard on the subject at hand, has the opportunity to speak their mind. All I ask is the voter to state his name, in order for the clerk to enter it upon the record, and to speak on the subject being debated. Strict adherence to parliamentary procedure is not required. This is not a court of law, but a meeting of the voters of Hooksett. This is your meeting and it is not my desire to adopt rules, like Roberts, to confuse and curtail the voter. If our type of government is to continue, you, the voters, must take an active part. I will be pleased to recognize you so your voice can be heard in this meeting. I respectfully ask everyone to honor the no smoking regulation in this auditorium.

Thank you.

Mr. Morin then read the School District Warrant.

Article I. Mr. Morin made the following statement regarding this article:

Article One, in my judgement must meet three legal tests, that is:

- 1. R.S.A. 197:6 Warrant and articles states. "Upon the written application of ten or more voters or one-sixth of the voters of the school district, presented to the school board or one of them not later than thirty days before the date prescribed for the school district meeting, the school board shall insert in the school district warrant for such meeting any subject-matter specified in such application. No article may be inserted after posting of said warrant. The right to have an article inserted in the warrant conferred by this section shall not be invalidated by the provisions of RSA 32.
- II. R.S.A. 32 is the Municipal Budget Act, states the following: "The total amount appropriated at any annual meeting shall not exceed by more than ten percent (10%) the total amount specified in the budget for said meeting, and no appropriation shall be made for any purpose not included in said budget, provided, however, that the budget committee may also submit, without approval, items which they do not wish to recommend but which they believe the voters should be allowed to consider and act upon, either favorably or unfavorably. Money may be raised and appropriated for such items, but not to an amount which would increase the total appropriations, as recommended by the budget committee by more than the ten percent (10%) allowed hereunder."
- 111. R.S.A. 33.8A Procedure for authorizing bonds or notes in excess of one hundred thousand dollars.
- 1. There shall be at least one public hearing concerning any proposed municipal bond or note issued in access of one hundred thousand dollars held before the governing board of any

municipality. Said hearing shall be held at least fifteen days, but not more than thirty days prior to the meeting, or adjourned session thereof, at which the bond or note issued is to be voted upon. Notice of the time, place and subject of such hearing shall be published in a newspaper of general circulation in the municipality at least seven days before it is held.

In my judgement and I shall rule, that R.S.A. 197.6 allows the voters only the right to have an article inserted in the warrant, not the power to override the provisions of R.S.A. 32, Municipal Budget Act. And its 10% override rule. Mr. Frederick LaPlante, Director, Division of Municipal Accounting, New Hampshire State Department of Revenue Administration in a recent telephone call concurred with my opinion regarding a petition article and the 10% override.

I hereby rule Article 1 illegal for the following reasons:

- 1. The total of \$350,000 dollars exceeds the 10% override allowed by the Municipal Budget Act.
- 2. The required legal hearing failed to mention the amount of the bond issue.
- 3. Any other vote on a lesser amount would be illegal due to the requirement that the warrant must distinctly state the subject to be voted on.

The chair in fairness will accept a motion to overrule his ruling.

Mr. VanVliet moved to override the ruling of the moderator. The motion was seconded by Mr. Sack. On a vote of 71 in favor of overruling the moderator and 100 opposed to overruling the moderator, the motion was defeated.

Article 2. By Petition "To see if the district will vote to authorize the School Board to permit the voluntary regulation of the Lords' Prayer in the Elementary Schools of the district in accordance with revised statutes annotated 194: 15-A of the State of New Hampsire"

Motion made by Mr. Joe DeLuca to approve Article 2, seconded by Mrs. Joe DeLuca.

Mr. DeLuca then spoke on his motion, urging its adoption as a method of helping a movement to overturn the Supreme Court's decision.

Mrs. Doris Riley also urged the adoption of the motion.

Question: Would approval of this motion involve the town in a legal case?

Answer: Mr. Collins reported that this motion if passed, would show that the town is in tavor of prayer in school. However, even it

passed, the School Board would not implement the Article because of current legal rulings.

Mr. Van Vliet reported the School Board is in favor of the motion.

The Article was voted in the affirmative.

Article 3 motion by Mr. VanVliet. "I move that the voters increase membership on the School Board from three (3) to five (5) members commencing with the 1977-78 school year, with three (3) members to be elected at the Annual Meeting in March, 1977, for the following terms:

- A. One member will be elected to serve a three (3) year term.
- B. One member will be elected to serve a two (2) year term.
- C. One member will be elected to serve a one (1) year term. (this motion is drafted to comply with RSA 197: 15)"

Seconded by Mr. Sack.

Speaking to the motion, Mr.Sack urged adoption of the motion to help the School Board do a better job with all the necessary meetings without being spread so thin.

Mr. Van Vliet also spoke in favor of the motion.

Question: Sister Amy Hoey: What is the size of School Boards in districts comparable to ours?

Answer: Mr. VanVliet said Raymond and Bedford both have 5 member School Boards.

The motion was voted in the affirmative.

Article 5 "To see if the district will vote to authorize the School Board to accept and to spend, in the name of and in behalf of the School District, gifts for the use of the school ..."

Motion made by Mrs. Lee Harvey to approve Article 5, seconded by Mr. Dick Marshall.

The motion was voted in the affirmative.

Article 6. "To see if the district will hold to adopt the Education Voucher Program for the School year 1976-77..."

It was ruled by the moderator, that since Article 6 was not included in the budget, that no action could be taken on this article.

Article 7 "To determine and appoint the salaries of the School board, and fix the compensation of any other officers of agents of the District . . .

This Article was ruled unnecessary by the moderator.

Article 8 "To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees or officers chosen, and to pass any vote relating thereto."

Motion made by Mr. VanVliet to approve Article 8, seconded by Mr. Hebert. The Article pertains to accepting reports as printed in this district report. The motion was voted in the affirmative.

Article 9 "To choose agents, auditors, and committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant..."

Motion made by Mr. Collins to approve this Article, seconded by Mr. Sach.

Mr. Collins spoke in favor of the motion,

The motion failed to pass.

Article 10 $^{\prime\prime}$ To see if the district will vote to accept the budget as submitted by the Budget Committee, or take any action in relation thereto . . . $^{\prime\prime}$

Mr. David Hess, moved, that the budget as submitted by the Budget Committee, seconded by Mrs. Lee Harvey.

The following amendment was made by Mr. Leo Sack and seconded by Mr. Collins:

"I move to amend the budget as submitted by the Budget Committee by increasing said budget \$6,755.00 in order to continue the Home Economics Program currently being offered by the District at Mount Saint Mary College, Hooksett, New Hampshire."

After much discussion on the amendment, the amendment was passed.

The budget as amended, was voted in the affirmative. The amount of the budget approved as amended is \$1,806,948.54.

The moderator made note that Mr. James VanVliet was retiring from the School Board after 12 years of service.

Mr. Apple moved we adjourn, seconded by Mr. Sack.

Meeting adjourned at 7:50 p.m.

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

TO THE INHABITANTS OF THE SCHOOL DISTRICT IN THE TOWN OF HOOKSETT QUALIFIED TO VOTE IN DISTRICT AFFAIRS:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Hooksett Memorial School in said District on the 18th day of March 1977 at seven o'clock in the evening, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To see if the District will vote to authorize the School Board to allow its employees to become members of the New Hampshire Retirement System of the State of New Hampshire in accordance with Chapter 134, RSA 100-A (Supp.).

This article to become effective as of July 1, 1977 and to raise and appropriate Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000.00) as part of the District's share.

- 2. BY PETITION: To see if the Citizens of Hooksett will vote in favor of the installation of a Ball Field at the southwest corner of the wooded area south of Underhill School, if such can be accomplished without the expenditure of Town funds.
- 3. To see if the District will vote to authorize the Trustees of the Trust Funds to expend the sum of Twenty-three Thousand Two Hundred and Sixty Dollars (\$23,260.00) for the specific purpose of replacing the boiler at the Hooksett Village School, repairs to the roof at the Hooksett Village School and repairs to the roof at the Fred C. Underhill School.

The above expenditure is a capital improvement and represents payment in tull of such replacement and repairs.

4. To see if the District will vote to authorize the School Board to

accept on behalf of the District any Federal or State funds designed to improve educational opportunities. Further, to see if the District will authorize the School Board to make application for said funds and then expend the same for such projects as it may designate.

- 5. To see if the District will vote to authorize the School Board to accept and to spend, in the name of and in behalf of the school district, gifts for the use of the school.
- 6. To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Hundred Seventy-eight Thousand Five Hundred Twenty-five Dollars (\$578,525.00) to fund all cost items relating to teachers' salaries and benefits for the 1977-78 school fiscal year, Thirty-seven Thousand Three Hundred Seventy- five Dollars (\$37,375.00) of such sum representing the cost of those additional salaries and benefits offered to the teachers by the School Board in the bargaining sessions which are still going on.
- 7. To see what sum of money the District will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the payment of salaries and benefits for school district officials and agents other than benefits and salaries payable to teachers, and for the payment of the statutory obligations of the district.

We feel that you, the taxpayer, have in the past appropriated adequate funds and support to allow Hooksett to have a "good" school system and should be proud, as we are, to be part of it. Recent testing has indicated that our children, both in diagnostic and intelligence results score considerably higher than national and state averages. We want this kind of a trend to continue and feel confident, with your continued support, it will!

We hear the "return to basics" cries from critics of modern education. In Hooksett, "basics" have remained and have been supplemented by additional enrichment programs. The addition of the home economics exposure at Mt. St. Mary's College has been expanded this year to include an introductory mechanical drawing course. Our music and physical education programs continue to flourish. The addition of other competitive girl's sports has been accomplished.

Compliments have been received on maintainance and the condition of our schools. This is certainly not from the "lack of use." As we are all well aware it is difficult to find a time that the buildings are not being utilized.

Our transportation system now includes three high school bus runs to Manchester, which are self sustaining by charging a small fee. The routes follow the three main arteries to the city (3-A, D.W. Highway and 28 By-Pass).

Your Board has been quite busy dealing with problems of all types and in most cases finding resolutions. One of the areas not resolved, at this writing, pertains to negotiations with our teachers over salaries and a master contract. We sincerely hope this new process will not jeopardize past relations enjoyed between faculty, administration and school board.

As you are aware this will be the last year for a three person Board. With the coming of the five person Board we hope additional time will allow a more in-depth involvement in the total education of the children of Hooksett.

Budget Committee Report

The HOOKSETT SCHOOL DISTRICT budget, excluding warrant articles, contains a substantial increase of \$104,371 over last year's appropriation of \$1,800,193. Of this increase, \$50,114 is consumed in compensation items - salaries, social security & retirement. These items were approved by the Budget Committee at the figures finally submitted by the School Board and reflect the final offer of the School Board to the District School Teachers.

In addition to these items of teacher compensation, the budget as approved by the Budget Committee for the School District reflects an increase of approximately \$53,390 over the previous year's appropriations for these items of \$1,137,901. This amounts to a 4.7% increase in these particular appropriations. Over half of this increase, \$29,500, was appropriated for anticipated increases in the tuition to be paid to the City of Manchester for our high school students attending Central High School. As last year, contracted services contains an appropriation of \$10,000 to be used as necessary to hire a professional negotiator by the School Board. The Board has again assured the Budget Committee, however, that these funds will be expended only if the negotiating Hooksett School District teachers employ a professional in their negotiations.

In addition to the projected increase in tuition, substantial changes in budgetary requests have occurred over 1976-77 in the following areas:

Including the items for teacher compensation, which are substantial, the appropriations for Town and School District budgets as approved by the Budget Committee amount to approximately \$2.855.014.

HOOKSETT SCHOOL DISTRICT WARRANT ARTICLES

Article #3. \$23,260 Capifal Reserve Fund Expenditures Recommended by the Budget Committee. This appropriation is from the School District Capital Reserve Fund for the specific purposes of replacing the boiler at the Hooksett Village School, repairing the roof at the Hooksett Village School, and repairing the roof at the Fred C. Underhill School. This Article was submitted at the suggestion of the Budget Committee and involves no direct appropriation from tax dollars as the funds are to be removed from the Capital Reserve Fund.

Article #1. \$3,000 Retirement System for School District Employees Recommended by the Budget Committee. This Article will enable non-teaching personnel to become members of the New Hampshire Retirement System if they wish with contributions to that System divided from both the School District and employee wages.

Article #6. \$578,525 Teacher Compensation. Recommended by the Budget Committee. This Article was approved as requested by the School Board & represents the final offer of the School Board to the teachers in the District salary negotiations.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

During the 1975-76 school year, the Hooksett School Board considered better than 250 agenda items. They were primarily concerned with administration, curriculum and finance.

ADMINISTRATION

The Board, realizing the need for the smooth operation of its schools, adopted a number of policies for its organization. The nature of these policies are as follows: School Board Hearings and Regulations, Student use of School Facilities and Materials, Public Right to Know Law, Line Staff Relations, Tax Deferred Annuities, Curriculum Adoptions, Class Size, etc. Job descriptions were outlined and adopted for various positions within the district.

Three areas which consumed a considerable amount of time, on the part of the administration during the year were the Voucher Project, The Collective Bargaining Act and the informal discussions with other districts relative to the future development of the school districts junior and senior high school.

CURRICULUM

In maintaining a continuity within the Hooksett Schools, we are each year reviewing the adoption of text books, materials and equipment for Math, Reading, Science, English, Spelling, Handwriting, Music, etc. In the 1975-76 school year the district adopted a Language Arts Program which included English, Composition, Grammar, Spelling and Handwriting.

The staff, which includes 2 members from each of the schools, along with an administrator, for the committee to review that subject area which will be given budgetary consideration. Working in conjunction with the State Department of Education, workshops and seminars were conducted. We also co-ordinate our Junior High Program to the High School Programs as they are being offered in Manchester.

FINANCIAL

In the number of years that I have served the district, I have tound the School Board to be very conscious of its tax dollar. This is as it should be. Needless to say, the school district is faced with spiraling inflation costs just as the homeowner experiences this.

Many areas, such as general supplies, transportation, supplies for operation of plant, furniture, equipment, etc. are sent out for bid, negotiated and re-negotiated.

The 1975-76 school year, saw the School Board transact their business within the framework of their total appropriation. A major concern of mine is the ever increasing cost of High School tuition as to our controlled cost of the elementary schools within the district.

On behalf of the students of the district, I wish to extend my thanks to the Hooksett School Board, to the capable leadership of Mr. Richard Thompson, the Assistant Superintendent of Schools, the administrators of the schools and the staff.

TOWN REPORT 1975-1976

Each year, at this time, I am asked to compose a report on the school's academic year.

I sit here at my desk listening to the sounds being made from our children as the teachers work hard to prepare them for their future years. I get up from my desk and walk through the hallways talking with your children and glancing in the different classrooms watching how hard they try to learn their lessons. A feeling of pride comes upon me knowing that there are so many dedicated teachers trying their hardest to help out the children at the Village School.

Through testing, the achievement tests, reading tests, classroom tests, I know that the children are doing their work well, however, it is the feeling of caring on the part of most parents and teachers that is the over-riding feeling I receive when walking the hallways or just sitting at my desk taking in the sounds of the school.

The Town of Hooksett has been extremely good to their children. When we go to the P.T.A. and ask for help in various endeavors, they always come through; when we call parents to assist in school activities we are always helped out and when the Town, through the school board and the superintendent, sets goals, both academic and financial, we have been very fortunate.

The one standardized measuring device I use for the progress of the school is the achievement test. Each year, during the month of April, we ask the children to take this measuring device for two basic reasons:

- 1. To determine the achievement of the child, measured against his previous year's testing.
 - 2. To measure the growth of the school as a whole.

During the school year 1974-75, the Village School placed 84% of its children above or at the national average, during this year, 1975-76, we placed 91% above or at the national average. This is done in part by the cooperation that exists between school and parents. Thus, I would like to thank the parents of the Village School area, for myself and the entire statf, for their backing. Hopefully the philosophy of hard work in the basics and a pinch of fun will produce another good year in 1976-77.

Memorial School Annual Report 1975-1976

The school year of 1975-76 proved to be a very successful one at the Junior High School. New programs in Gymnastics and Home Economics were offered to the students with excellent results. In the Standard Achievement Testing Memorial students continue to score well above the local and national norms in the academic areas of Mathematics, English, Social Studies, Science and Reading.

Our students have performed very well at the High School level with 38% of last year's graduating class attaining academic honors. Memorial students contribute greatly to the success of Manchester High Schools and that of Pembroke Academy in all areas of the school's operation. We at Memorial feel the program of studies and the training they received at the Jr. High level will make them very competitive and successful in future years.

The Special Education program, now in its fourth year will continue to provide individualized instruction for students with learning problems.

Mechanical Drawing and Drafting, new programs, will be offered during the school year of 1976-77, providing a more diversified curriculum for the students.

I feel the staff and faculty at Memorial School is talented and dedicated to the idea that the students best interest is most important. With this goal in mind, the educational process at Memorial School will continue to be a successful one.

Underhill School Report

The Fred C. Underhill School is an establishment of traditional education. Letter grades, periodic examinations, detention for misbehavior, and suitable dress code make for a conservative school program.

The curriculum is basic (i.e., the old math), reading drill in standard phonics, and a great deal of homework.

At recess times, there are two teachers watching over the children. At lunchtime, teachers circulate among the tables to check so that the students use good table manners.

Many schools during the past decade have returned to the basics of education -- reading, writing, arithmetic and good behavior.

We have an unwritten policy of not allowing promotions to students who have not met standards of achievement.

Too many innovations and experiments in the last decade have lowered the standards of schools across the nation. Huge sums of government money have been poured into nonsensical programs that were of little value to the children. Not so at Underhill!

We, of Underhill, are proud to report that for the past several years the results of the Stanford Achievement Tests in each grade have been above the National Norm.

Kenneth Clark, the respected social psychologist who heads the Metropolitan Applied Research Center, an educational think tank in New York City, is caustic in his remarks of what has happened to school during the past decade. Says Clark, "I see no substitute for the public school's teaching reading, writing and arithmetic as the base upon which all other forms of education must rest. I don't believe a child can play any constructive role in this society if he is unable to spell or to read, or if he does not have an elementary sense of grammatical structure. Children who have not mastered basic skills are always aware and humiliated by that fact. Any theory that a child shouldn't be 'frustrated,' imposes on the child the most horrible form of self-depreciation. The essential ingredient in teaching children is to respect the child by insisting that he does learn."

A word about good behavior and satisfactory discipline. Underhill has both. The few children who are disciplinary problems at school are made that way because of their parents. These parents have no control of their children at home, and fail to understand the problem by not visiting the teachers. The parents instill within the children disrespect for authority by making derogatory remarks about the school and teachers. These remarks are made with the children present. Of course the child is going to be a problem. Who is at fault? The parents -- not the child! The vast majority of the students at Underhill are well behaved and well mannered.

Keep the basics, keep local control of your schools, visit your schools, know the teachers; success for your children will be assured.

SUNCOOK CHILD & YOUTH PROGRAM



REPORT OF THE LIBRARY TRUSTEES

Over this past year we have again experienced a rapid increase in the use of the Library and its facilities. Mrs. Hebert's Annual Report will demonstrate this; book circulation has increased from 17,990 in 1975 to 20,900 in 1976 and patron visits to the Library have increased by more than a thousand during this same period.

With this constant rise in traffic and circulation, and mindful of that part of the Town's purchase agreement which included an offer of ten thousand dollars' worth of building material, the Trustees have made vigorous efforts to secure Federal Grant money to support a building expansion program.

Mrs. Johnson and Mrs. Barrett spent countless hours putting together a building proposal to two different agencies during this last year. The Department of Housing and Urban Development failed to accept the proposal for the Community Development Block report in our last Annual Report. Undaunted by this set-back, Mrs. Johnson and Mrs. Barrett went to work on another possibility, a Federal Public Works Grant under the Federal Department of Commerce.

In spite of a most strenuous effort to meet all of the tight deadlines imposed by that Department, a proposal was sent to the appropriate officials before the end of the year. Once again, we failed to qualify for this grant, not because there were not enough funds as was the case with the HUD Grant, but because Hooksett did not have a high enough percentage of unemployed workers to qualify us for serious consideration. At this writing, the Trustees are considering the advisability of offering a reduced building plan to the citizens of the Town in the year's Warrant.

We wish to commend Mrs. Hebert and the Library Staff for the many fine programs which have been offered to our patrons; these include our regular Summer Reading Program, Story Hours on Saturday mornings, our Christmas Party, and monthly movies but they embraced some special programs like the visit of the Little Red Wagon, a Halloween Pumpkin Contest and wood-carving

(Charles Foster) and bread-douth demonstration (Cherill Reid). The Library supported a Book-mending Workshop for local and surrounding school librarians and our mid-summer Book and Bake Sale, both very successful ventures.

As the repository for Tri-Town Audio-Visual Cooperative materials and equipment, we have been encouraged by our patrons' frequent use of these valuable slides and films. We do invite all Townspeople to become acquainted with our wide selection for a much greater distribution of this material would take place if only people knew what we had to share with them in this program.

The Trustees wish to express their gratitude to the many interested citizens who have contributed to our regular and special events: Bob Channing (Santa Claus), John Jacobs (floral), the Hooksett Chamber of Commerce (Christmas Decorations), the Village P.T.A. (Cookbook), the Local D.A.R. (Magazine), and to George Soule, Architect, who has given us so many hours of professional advice. Also, Patricia Morrison (Quilting program), Friends of the Library (Donation.

Hooksett Police Dept.

It is my pleasure to report to you, the citizens of Hooksett, the activities of your police Department tor the year 1976.

This is my 8th and final report as Chief of Police. Your police department at the present time consists of seven permanent men, one Chief, one Lieutenant, one Detective Sgt. and four patrolmen supplemented by 16 part time officers. These people give the town protection 24 hours a day, seven days a week. One officer is on duty at all times, and at certain times there are two officers on duty. A supervisor is either on duty or on call at all times. In the past year two men have left the department and two new members were added to replace them. One man attended the police academy during the year.

It is my great pleasure to report that throughout the year 1976, not one single highway fatality was recorded in Hooksett, we like to believe that we had a part in this accomplishment. The statistics for traffic deaths in the past years are as follows:

1975-5 deaths were recorded, 1974-3, 1973-2, 1972-5, 1971-1, 1970-5. Other activities of the department were as follows:

Auto thefts 28, assaults on persons 19, larcenies 188, DWI 34 Complaints 802, burglaries 86, criminal arrests 61, missing persons 21.

In this final report I wish to express my appreciation and thanks to the many men and women of this town who have supported me while I was Chief of Police.

HOOKSETT PLANNING BOARD REPORT

The Hooksett Planning Board held 22 regular meetings during 1976. During this period 25 hearings were conducted and 11 subdivision plans approved.

The Board participated as a member of the Hooksett Task Force, a Committee whose original purpose was to aid the Town in determining the proper growth pattern desired by the voters. Hopefully this Committee or a similar one, representing a cross section of the voters, will be re-activated in 1977 so that public input will be received by the Board as it attempts to accomplish its goal of a balanced growth between residential, commercial and industrial development in Hooksett.

The Town continued its membership in the Southern New Hampshire Planning Commission during 1976. This Organization has proved to be invaluable to the Board since the technical assistance offered by SNHPC is made available at a very reasonable cost.

The Board has worked and is offering to the voters of Hooksett at the 1977 Town Meeting, several amendments to the zoning ordinance.

In 1978, the Board will attempt to begin work on a Building Code tor the Town provided the voters indicate an interest as a result of the non-binding referendum being presented at the Town Meeting.

Southern New Hampshire Planning Commission


Through the Commission's Local Planning Assistance, Regional Planning, and Transportation Planning programs we have been able to respond to various planning needs of the Town of Hooksett. Your support of our programs and activities has been of benefit to your officials, the Commission and the entire planning area. We look forward to your continued interest and to continuing the excellent working relationship that exists between our staff and the Town's officials.

One of our main objectives this year is to take our programs directly to the residents of Hooksett during the initial development stage in order to improve upon the citizen participation process. We want to know what the townspeople perceive to be the current and future problems associated with local growth and development and what their suggestions are concerning the character of future development patterns and the Town's need.

We are asking the Board of Selectmen and the Planning Board to establish a Hooksett Citizen Advisory Committee consisting of representatives of Town boards and interested citizens to work with our staff. Hopefully, this body will be a representative cross section of community interests, ideas, and perceptions. Initially, the Committee will be asked to provide local input regarding the development of the regional land use plan. We hope to further involve the Committee with aspects of the regional housing plan and perhaps some elements of the transportation program.

Under our Local Planning Assistance program, Jim Tethers, Assistant Director, has been working with the Hooksett Planning Board and Board of Selectmen on a variety of technical and administrative matters.

Hooksett's interests are well-represented in policy decisions, program development, and the administrative affairs of the Southern New Hampshire Planning Commission. Mr. Ray Langer and Mr. William Kaufman are the Town's representatives on the SNHPC Board with Mr. Richard Marshall and Mr. Douglas Mealey as alternates. Mr. Langer was elected the Commission's Treasurer in September and is also a member of our Executive Committee. Mr. Alonzo Houle is Hooksett's representative on the Metropolitan Manchester Transportation Planning Policy Committee.



HOOKSETT SEWER COMMISSION

The Board of Sewer Commissioners would once again like to use this opportunity to report to the taxpayers on the activities of the Department during 1976.

The engineering study is complete and has been approved by the State. We are now awaiting final approval from the United States Environmental Protection Agency. This study is to be paid for by 75% Federal funds and 20% State funds. The remaining 5% was paid by the Town of Hooksett.

Once the town receives Federal approval the Sewer Commissioners will send application to the Environmental Protection Agency and State asking if there are funds available to extend main intercepters to areas most in need.

The plant is currently being operated by Superintendent Ralph Page, Assistant Superintendent Bruce Kudrick and Jeffrey Lodge.

The new billing system went into effect for the October billing. In an effort to make this system as equitable as possible, the Board has approved deductions of water not released into the system. This can be measured by an additional meter on outside lines (to be installed at owner's expense). Water used in swimming pools may be deducted based on pool dimensions.

Sewer Commission meetings are held on the first and third Wednesday of each month and are open to the public.

The Sewer Commissioners would like to encourage town residents to visit the treatment plant on Egawes Street. It is requested that visitors first call Superintendent Page at 485-7000.

Visiting Nurse Association

Nursing

Skilled Nursing is available in the home by Registered Nurses and Licensed Practical Nurses which includes dressings, injections, special treatments, baths and rehabilitative nursing under the direction of the patient's physician. Homemaker-home Health Aides assist under the direction of the nurses and therapists.

Therapy

Registered physical, occupational and speech therapists are available for therapy at home. Social worker and nutritionist consultants have been added to the staff this year.

Pre and Post Natal Advice

The nurse is prepared to give advice and guidance to expectant mothers as well as instructions after the baby is born.

Immunization clinics are held periodically during the year and nurses are available daily between 1:30 - 3 P.M. at the Visiting Nurse Association office and at monthly drop in centers to take blood pressure readings.

Policy

This agency is voluntary and non profit and is certified to care for Medicare patients. Although many of the services are paid for through Medicaid, Medicare and other health insurances, there is a fee which is discussed on the initial visit. Adjustments can be made. There is no charge for maternal and child health visits made by the nurses. Anyone may request the service by calling the Visiting Nurse office at 622-3781, Monday thru Friday from 7:30 A.M. to 4 P.M. Necessary services are provided on weekends and holidays.

HOOKSETT VILLAGE FIRE DEPARTMENT

REPORT FOR THE YEAR 1976

During 1976 there was an increase of 5 alarms from 1975. Total call for 1976 was 86. The two permanent men did their usual duties and general work in and around the fire station. We have done a lot of work on the building, inside and out. We are keeping the building and our equipment in A-1 condition.

I have inspected Kindergardens and Foster Homes. During the year 2 restaurants and meeting places were inspected. Some of them with the help of the State Fire Marshall's Office.

We purchased 500 feet of 4" hose in order to be more effective. This hose was purchased from the Capital Area Mutual Aid Compact to keep our cost down. They put in a bid for the purchased for all surrounding Towns. This makes a large amount to be purchased. This way we save approximately \$500.00. We are planning to purchase 500 more feet this year the same way.

One of our permanent men, Capt. Leonard Lafleur, does all the oil burner inspections according to regulations.

We are going to purchase under our new Equipment and replacement program, a new Resuscitator, as the one we have is about 20 years old. In 1975 we had 15 Resuscitator calls, and in 1976 25 calls. This will give us an additional Resuscitator to work with. That way we can serve the people much better.

There are a lot of people burning wood because the cost of oilhas gone sky high. Remember when you set up a wood stove make sure chimney's are sound and cleaned. Have fireplaces checked by qualified men.

SOUTH HOOKSETT FIRE DEPARTMENT

ANNUAL REPORT

1976 was again a very busy year for the Department. A recap of the log indicates that another record was set with a total of 157 alarms which is an increase of six calls over the previous year.

In breaking down these calls we see that 16 were for structural fires, seven of which resulted in substantial loss to the structure and with losses to the others being minor in nature. Other calls includes 42 for Medical Emergencies; 28 for automobile fire or accident; 16 Forest or Brush fires; plus numerous other miscellaneous calls. There were 11 calls for mutual aid assistance, six to the City of Manchester, 4 to Hooksett Village and one to the Town of Allenstown. There were 20 false alarms at New Hampshire College, of these, 8 were accidental alarms and 12 were considered malicious false alarms.

In answering these alarms our records show that in addition to the manhours of the two permanent fire fighters it required a total of 1,622 manhours of the Call Men. The value of the property involved was estimated at \$633,000.00 and the estimated loss was set at \$26,300.00. Seventy-Seven alarms occurred during the daytime hours and 80 during the night.

As of now the Department has a total of five qualified EMT'S (Emergency Medical Technician). They are: Lt. Robert J. Silkman, Lt. Kenneth A. Silkman, Fireman Stephen W. Mandeville, Fireman Kerry J. Pomeroy and Captain Robert C. Labonville one of the permanent firemen who has recently completed the 81 hour course with the last group from the Manchester Fire Department.

Through the efforts of Chief Lydon and Deputy Chief Durand of the Manchester Fire Department an arrangement was arrived at whereby any of our members may do on the job training at any time that they desire and with any of the Engine, Ladder of Ambulance companies of the City Department. There is no charge to us for this training and many of our members have been giving up their weekends or days off to take advantage of this opportunity. We wish at this time to express our gratifude to Chief Lydon and his Department for extending to us this very worthwhile program.

Six members resigned during the year. Leaving the Department were; Patrick E. Larocque, Paul E. Larocque, Gary R. Robinson, Michael J. Jacobs, Gilbert M. Robinson and David F. Albin.

On August 9, 1976, Raymond J. O'Brien was appointed a regular call member. Fireman O'Brien is a native of Hooksett and has recently returned here to reside after being away for some years.

On October 1, 1976 the Department with reluctance accepted the request for retirement of Captain Enver J. Silkman. At the time of his retirement Captain Silkman had more years of service with the Department than any other active member. He first became a member in 1938 and although there were some breaks in his service from time to time for a number of reasons and whenever he was able to return he did so and continued to serve with distinction up to this year. On behalf of the Town of Hooksett and the members of the Department we wish to express our sincere appreciation for his long years of service and also to wish him the best of luck in the years ahead.

In September of this year the Ladies Auxiliary authorized and purchased an EMT Medical Kit and a Hudson Demand Type Ressuscitator at a cost of \$448.00 and donated the purchase to the Department. We take this opportunity to express our thanks to the Ladies for this very important medical equipment which will be most helpful to us in times of medical emergencies.

On November 1, 1976, Lieutenant Robert C. Labonville a permanent fire fighter was promoted to the rank of Captain and appointed Assistant Training Officer. During the past year, Capt. Labonville did, mostly on his own time, complete an 81 hour EMT course with the Manchester Fire Department and also a 76 hour course for Fire Instructors with the Capital Area Mutual System. This new assignment shall be in addition to his present position as Department Maintenance Officer.

On December 1, 1976, Lieutenant Norman Morrissette was promoted to the rank of Captain and was assigned to head Engine #2 to replace Captain Enver J. Silkman.

To fill the vacancy of Lieutenant an officer test was given in November and was made available to all members. Of those taking the test Fireman Kenneth A. Silkman achieved the highest score and on December 1, 1976 was appointed to fill the position and assigned to Engine #3.

Due to the request of the 1975 Fire Study Committee an ISO Town Survey was done during 1976. We are still awaiting the results and recommendations of this report before looking into additionallong range plans. We had expected that the report would be available to us before the end of the year, however, this was not the case and thereby do not wish to mention any proposed changes or additions until we have read the report.

This report would not be complete without commending Asst. Chief Boisvert for a job well done in writing the history of the Department. Many hours were put into this project plus his personal funds to have it printed. The book makes very interested reading and the few copies that are still available may be purchased at the fire station.

In accordance with the New Hampshire Statutes, Chapter 251; Laws of 1947 a total of 13 permits were issued for the installation of power oil burner equipment. Of these, 1 required re-inspection before an operating permit could be issued.

FOREST FIRE WARDEN'S REPORT

During 1976 we had 7 Forest Fires in the Town of Hooksett and 1 assisting the City of Concord. We have issued 204 Burning Permits. These permits can be obtained in the Village area from Capt. Leonard Lafleur, one of our permanent men. He is at the Village Fire Station during the day, and from myself, Warden Alfred Collerette at 18 Dundee Ave. In the South Hooksett area, from Chief Alfred Law or Deputy Leon Boisvert. When you have a permit please watch your fire very carefully so it will not get away from you. A tire that gets away from any person can be expensive to be put out at your expense.

Once again I will mention that you can burn without a permit when there is snow on the ground. But place notify the Communication Center Tel. 485-5177 and tell them the address, street number, and type of fire that is to be burned so they will know what is going on, so any person calling for a fire or smoke at that location the dispatcher will not dispatch the Fire Dept. This has happened 3 times during 1976, if you need help call the dept. and we will notify the dispatcher for you.

We had a good year during 1976, it got very dry at times, danger Class 5, which is extremely dry spreading index 40-100, color code red, then it would rain 2 - 3 days sometimes 4 days and brought it back to Class 1 which is low spreading index 1-4, color code green.

I would like to thank all Hooksett residence and others for being very careful when it was dry so that we did not have any major Forest Fires.

We all had our Forest Fire Spring Training, myself and our Deputy Warden at Bear Brook State Park,. This was an all day training by the State Forest Fire Service.

BALANCE

Since its beginning in 1893, the State Forestry Department has recognized the fact that forest fire prevention and suppression is a joint state and town or city responsibility. Local authorities recommend names of persons to the State Forester, who appoints one person as town or city fire warden and several other persons as town or city deputy fire wardens to a three year term.

The local forest fire warden controls the kindling of all outside fires, when the ground is not covered with snow, by issuing a written permit for kindling a fire. Permits are only issued at such time and in such places as the fire warden deems as safe.

The State Forest Fire Service trains the local forest fire organization in modern forest fire prevention and suppression tactics. The State also provides backup personnel and equipment for suppression and prevention activities.

The combination of State and local forces has resulted in one of the smallest acreage loss Due to forest fires in the United States for the past 20 years.

The dugouts at Donati Field have also been rebuilt so there is no danger of anyone being harmed.


We are also planning a ball field at Underhill School. The land has been surveyed and there is plenty of land for a ball field.



COMMISSIONERS' REPORT

1976 was, in many ways, a good year for the Village Water Precinct. The relocation of the water main from the old bridge to the new Hooksett Memorial Bridge was completed and is in operation. General expenses were as estimated and service to our customers was, except for a few breaks in some of the older mains, without operational problems.

Water consumption again increased to the extent that 59,904,000 gallons of water was pumped during the year as compared to 57,058,000 gallons in 1975.

The 1977 Village Water Precinct Budget will increase considerably over past years because of the bond issue for the water main relocation project. This will cause an increase in the precinct tax for 1977 and the water rates will also be increased, for the first time in tive years, to create sufficient funds to pay for the bond issue. Atter 1977 it is hoped that the increase in the water rate will be enough to pay for the bond issue for the remaining nine years. The Commissioners are happy to report that the total cost of the water main relocation was \$83,000.00 which was \$10,000.00 less than the proposed figure. The Commissioners regret the necessity for increasing both the precinct tax and the water rates in 1977 but the relocation of the water main was necessary because of the construction of the new bridge and the condition of the old water main.

The Commissioners meet at the Precinct Building, 2 Main Street, on the last Monday of each month. Anyone interested in meeting with the Board may do so by contacting the Chairman, Albert Beauchesne, and scheduling an appointment.




