# **INAUGURAL ADDRESS**

OF

# HON. GEORGE E. STEVENS

March 23, 1926

Members of the Council, ladies and gentlemen:

I feel extremely proud to deliver my second inaugural address in our own home.

I felt bad to leave our first one, with its comfortable arrangements and generous treatment after so many years of pleasant associations. But the feeling of owning our own home seems to have worked on us all, and as we view the inside of the building, with its spacious offices, fine finish and furnishings, about everyone seems to think the City made no mistake in buying the property.

It is also very gratifying to the Council to be returned for another year without the loss of a single member. Let us this year keep step with the tax payers, and show by deeds that we appreciate the confidence they have placed in us by planning a budget that will meet the approval of those that taxes hit the hardest.

I do not make any recommendations for costly improvements, but leave it to the heads of departments, public opinion and the Councilmen.

I think perhaps you would like to know how the Mayor and Council arrive at the conclusions they do, to spend so much money; and how the City is ever going to get out of debt.

I will answer the first by saying that in this city, it is largely the pressure of public opinion on the Mayor and Council, who respond to this pressure as wisely as they are able. It seems to be an instinctive trait of our people to want the best of everything, and that costs money.

The things bought the last four years by bond issue, are permanent improvements and if proper care is taken of them, they will outlast the life of anyone present. The city has something to show for the money spent, and the rising generation will help pay for them, bearing their part of the burden, as they should.

## STREET DEPARTMENT

The street department is in good shape for summer or winter work. Everyone is familiar with the work done with our snow plows, which have given us streets we never dreamed of. They have changed Laconia from a dened up, isolated feeling community, into a great outdoor playground. Our parks, graced with unrivalled skating and hockey rinks, toboggan slides, ski jumps, horse racing on the ice, ice fishing, all in great roomy places that will accommodate thousands. The snow plows have put on the finishing touches by opening our streets in every direction, to the town lines, making it easy for people in surrounding places, to visit our city in winter as well as in summer time.

I would recommend that the beach at The

Weirs, extending from the Boston & Maine station to Endicott Rock, be celaned up, made suitable and sanitary for bathing, if feasible, early in the spring, and that all sewerage be connected with the sewer now being constructed and that any sewerage stopped from flowing into the lake at any point that would contaminate this beach.

This department needs a garage large enough to house all of its trucks, and a repair shop to care for them, where they can be kept warm in cold weather. However, I do not recommend building one this year, but let the people know the conditions that call for such a building

#### FIRE DEPARTMENT

The cost of the Fire Department this year will be very much less. The new ladder truck has proven a great addition to the equipment being especially adapted to handle chimney fires. The fire loss has been extremely small. The snow plow has proven its worth by keeping the streets in such condition that the fire apparatus has been able to get to the fire about as quick as in summer. Our department is in Class A. Insurance rates have been reduced 10 per cent on houses. A careful reading of its doings in the City Report will show you what has been done the past year.

#### POLICE DEPARTMENT

The Police Department has moved to the new City Hall, where they have ample quarters for many years to come. The one day off in eight, has proven to have been a great relief to the men, from a steady grind every day in the week.

That our city is free from crime is proof that it is guarded faithfully, and a compliment is due our Police Commission for maintaining so efficient a force.

I would recommend that the Police Commission be paid something for their services, the same as other city officials are paid.

## ELECTRIC LIGHT CONTRACT

A new electric light contract was made September 28th, 1925, with the Laconia Gas & Electric Co. for ten years.

Owing to the fact that there was no appropriation to meet any higher rates, the City has continued to use the same candle power lamps, at the same price, as under the old contract.

The bulk of lamps—used has been 40 candle power, at \$18.00 per year. We can use, under the new contract, loop lights at \$28.00 per year for the principal streets.

Side streets 60 candle power at \$22.00 per year.

Main, Pleasant, Casino Square, Union Ave., and Elm Street at Lakeport and Lakeside Avenue at The Weirs can use 250 candle power lamps as desired, at \$48.50 per year. It is optional with the city to use the old lighting system or the new. The full contract is printed in the City Report. Everyone interested should read it, and advise your Councilman your opinion of it, and if the city should change from 40 candle power at \$18.00 per year to 100 candle power lamps at \$28.00 per year, such streets as Court, Academy, Union Ave., Church, upper ends of Pleasant and Main, above the track and Main

Street below Court, would probably be among the ones most desirable to so light.

I would recommend that a hosiery department be started at the new high school building, hosiery being one of our principal industries and likely to be for years to come, unless the advantages offered in other sections of the country drives it out. As many of the scholars apply for positions in the shops and mills during vacations, it would fit them to commence to earn good pay at the start, whereas, now, it takes so long to learn that they are of no use to the mills. They just get so they can do a little of the work when vacation ends and they have to leave. The expense of such a department would be very small, and would help the scholars to earn a little money in vacation, as many want to, and at the same time help the manufacturer in the summer when help is most always scarce, if business is good.

Our wealth comes largely from manufacturing. Our manufacturers need every adantage they can get, here, to offset what other sections of the country are doing to get them away from us, such as perpetual exemption, free mill sites, very low power rates, lower labor costs and everything else you can think of. It behooves us to take good care of what we have and make our attractions here so alluring that the question will be, where can we put them?

I would further recommend the attention of the Council and the public generally, to the needs of our Board of Health, and advise the appointment of a competent committee to work with the present Board, with a view of bringing it up to the same state

of efficiency that our other departments are. As I understand it, it would not call for much expense, if made to conform to modern methods.

I would also recommend that the Laconia Shoe Company be exempt from taxation for a term of five years. Being the only concern of the kind, in the city, it would not conflict with anything here, but would show that the city welcomes its new industry, in a substantial manner, without having asked for it.

# RESOLUTIONS

In the Year of our Lord one thousand nine hundred and twenty-six.

A RESOLUTION authorizing temporary loans to an amount not exceeding One Hundred Eighty Thousand Dollars in anticipation of the taxes of the present municipal year.

Resolved by the City Council of the City of Laconia, as follows:

That for the purpose of meeting current expenses of the city, the City Treasurer be and hereby is authorized and empowered to make temporary loans from time to time for the use of said City of sums not exceeding the aggregate amount of \$180,-000,00, said loans being in the anticipation of the taxes of the present municipal year and hereby expressly made payable therefrom, and to give for such loans subject to the written approval of the Committee on Finance, notes of the City, each note to become due and payable within one year from its date and no such note shall be valid unless authenticated by the certificate of the National Shawmut Bank of Boston, Massachusetts, Said notes shall be signed by the Mayor and City Treasurer and countersigned by the City Clerk, shall be registered in the books kept for that purpose in the offices of the City Treasurer and City Clerk respectively.

This resolution shall take effect upon its passage.

In the Year of our Lord one thousand nine hundred and twenty-six.

A RESOLUTION authorizing the issue of \$50,000.00 Bonds of the City of Laconia for the acquisition of the land and buildings known as the John C. Huckins place, for City Hall purposes, and improvements thereon of a permanent nature, and for the purchase of departmental equipment of a lasting character.

Resolved by the City Council of the City of Laconia, as follows:

That bonds of the city of Laconia are hereby authorized to be issued, to be signed by the Mayor and City Treasurer and countersigned by the City Clerk for a sum not exceeding fifty thousand dollars pursuant to the Municipal Bond Act under chapter 59 of the Public Laws of New Hampshire for the acquisition of the land and buildings known as the John C. Huckins place for City Hall purposes and improvements thereon of a permanent nature and for the purchase of departmental equipment of a lasting character. Said Bonds shall be in such form and bear such rate of interest not exceeding four and one half per cent as the Mayor and finance committee of the city council shall determine and shall mature at the rate of one-twentieth of the amount thereof each year until paid beginning one year from the date of the bonds. The Mayor and the said finance committee are hereby authorized and empowered to advertise and receive bids for the purchase of the said bonds which bids shall be submitted to the city council for action thereon. The expense incident to the issuing of said bonds shall be a charge upon the city and shall be paid out of the city treasury upon order of the mayor.

This resolution shall take effect and be in force

from and after its passage.

Whereas the New England Freight Association has under consideration a proposal to cancel all commodity rates, car loads or less than car loads, on partially or wholly manufactured textile articles including yarns and knit goods, between points in New England and Trunk Line territories, and whereas

It is believed to be the intent of the railroad to remove articles made wholly of cotton or wholly of wool and partly of wool and partly of cotton from the classifications that have prevailed in the past and to place said finished commodities in new classification involving a large increase in rates between Laconia, New Hampshire, and New York City, and whereas

These increases in rates will have a disastrous

effect upon the cotton and woolen manufacturing industries that are manufacturing articles that are considered as finished products, ,within our city and state.

The Mayor and City Council of Laconia in special session convened, hereby remonstrate against the proposed increases on the ground that they are exhorbitant and apply a higher rate basis to Laconia products shipped into New York City than are applied to competing manufacturers in the south, and that these increases will be detrimental to New Hampshire industries and put them at serious disadvantage in their competition with southern mills, which is now keenly felt.

Therefore, be it resolved by the City Council of the City of Laconia, N. H., as follows:

That we enter our protest against such action as contemplated by the New England Carriers as outlined by the New England Freight Ass'n believing that the commodity rates that exist are as high as the commodity can stand and meet the required competitive conditions, and that the City of Laconia, N. H., by its Mayor and Council hereby seriously protests against the proposed increase of rates by the carriers.

No team drawn by any horse or other animal, and no automobile, motor truck or other vehicle operating for hire shall stand or remain on Main Street between the crossing of the Boston & Maine Railroad and a point 500 feet southerly from the junction of said street with Union Avenue and Court Street; on Pleasant Street between the crossing of said railroad and the junction of said street and Main Street; On Water Street between the junction of said street and Pleasant Street and a point 300 feet Westerly therefrom; On Court Street between the junction of said Street and Main Street and a point 500 feet westerly therefrom; On Union Avenue

between the junction of said Street and Main Street and a point 500 feet easterly therefrom; On Mill Street, on Hanover Street or on Canal Street, over ten minutes between the hours of six o'clock in the forenoon and six o'clock in the afternoon, except when loading or unloading such team, automobile, motor truck or other vehicle.

Section 2. Any person violating this ordinance shall be subject to a fine of not exceeding twenty dollars.

Section 3. All Ordinances or parts of Ordinances inconsistent with this Ordinance are hereby repealed and this Ordinance shall take effect upon its passage.

Section 3. Any person violating the provisions of this ordinance shall be fined not more than twenty dollars for each offense.

AN ORDINANCE regulating the sale of milk, cream, and ice cream in the city of Laconia. Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Laconia, as follows:

#### MILK AND CREAM

Section 1. All milk or cream sold or offered for sale in the city of Laconia shall be only such milk as is drawn from cows that have passed an official tuberculin test, under State and Federal supervision, subject to the following sections. Such milk shall bear one of the following designations only, "Tuberculin tested and pasteurized" or "Tuberculin tested raw."

Tuberculin Tested and Pasteurized: Shall be milk which has been uniformly heated to a temperature of not less than 142° nor more than 147° Fahrenheit for not less than thirty minutes, then cooled immediately to a temperature of 50 degrees Fahrenheit or lower and maintained at that temperature until sold. The temperature and time of heating and holding and the temperature of cooling shall invari-

ably be recorded by an automatic recording device and a duplicate of such device shall be on hand and in good repair at all times. The charts shall be numbered and dated, shall be retained in a locked case while being recorded, and shall be conveniently filed and preserved for a period of not less than three months, to be available for inspection at all times by the Board of Health. Milk intended for pasteurization shall not be more than forty-eight hours old, shall contain not more than 500,000 bacteria per cubic centimeter nor more than 50 organisms of the colon group per hundreth cubic centimeter at the time of pasteurization, and shall have been produced in conformity with the conditions hereafter specified. At the time of sale of such milk shall contain not more than 25,000 bacteria per cubic centimeter nor more than 5 organisms of the colon group per hundredth cubic centimeter. Milk shall not be repasteurized, nor shall any milk be sold which has been subject to pasteurization in a plant so located as not to be reasonably accessible to control and inspection by the Board of Health of this city.

Tuberculin Tested, Raw: Shall be raw milk drawn from tuberculin tested and non-reacting cows. and shall contain not more than 100,000 bacteria per cubic centimeter nor more than 10 organisms of the colon group per hundredth cubic centimeter when plated upon Endo's or similar approved medium. At the time of applying for a license the dealer shall file a certificate or statement signed by the State Veterinarian, stating that all cows in the herd or herds from which the milk is produced have been tuberculin tested under supervision within one year and found to be free from tuberculosis.

Pasteurization: All pasteurizing plants shall be so equipped and operated that the milk and cream after pasteurization shall conform to the requirements of this ordinance, and no milk and cream shall be sold or offered for sale as pasteurized unless it has been subjected to a minimum temperature of 142° F. for not less than thirty minutes, in such pasteurizing apparatus and under such sanitary conditions as may be prescribed by the local Board of Health. After pasteurization the milk or cream shall be immediately cooled to a temperature of 50° F. or lower and placed in clean, sterilized containers and the containers shall be immediaetely sealed. No milk or cream that has been pastuerized in one plant shall be transferred to and bottled in another plant or place and labeled, sold or disposed of, as pasteurized milk or cream, except that cream may with the approval of the Board of Health be bottled at a plant other than place of pasteurization, provided the cream is bottled under clean and sanitary conditions, and adequate facilities provided for the washing and sterilizing of apparatus utensils and containers used in the handling, bottling and storage of the cream. No milk or cream shall be pasteurized more than once.

Section 2. Permit Required For Sale of Milk or Cream in the City of Laconia. Every corporation, association, firm or individual selling or offering for sale, milk or cream, or operating a bottling or pastuerizing plant in the city of Laconia shall have first obtained a permit from the local Board of Health. Permits will be granted to only those who conform to the requirements of this ordinance. Such permit shall expire on the thirty-first day of May, and shall be renewable on or before such date in each year,

and may be revoked at any time for cause by the said Board of Health or their agent after a hearing on due notice.

Section 3. Application for Permit Required. Every corporation, association, firm or individual seeking to obtain a permit to sell milk or cream to operate a bottling or pasteurizing plant in the city of Laconia, shall make out and submit a written application therefor on a form prescribed by the local Board of Health. Every such application shall contain the name of each producer, distributor, bottler, pasteurizer, or shipper from whom the applicant receives or expects to receive milk or cream for sale, together with the approximate amount of milk or cream to be furnished by each, and upon any change in the source or amount of such supply, notice thereof shall be given local Board of Health within twenty-four hours.

Section 4. Public Display of Permit. The person to whom any license is granted shall cause his name, place of business and the number of his license to be legibly placed on the outer side of all carriages and vehicles used in the business, and in the case of a merchant selling or offering for sale in a store, booth or market place, in a city or town in which said licenses are granted, the license shall be posted in a conspicuous place in his place of business. (Chapter 163, Section 7, Session Laws 1925).

Section 5. Right of Inspection. The Board of Health of the city of Laconia and its agents, under authority given them Chapter 163, Section 9, Session Laws 1925, may enter places where milk, skim milk or cream are stored or kept for sale, and into and upon carriages used for the conveyance thereof, may examine the product there found, may take such

samples thereof as they may deem necessary, upon payment of the current price therefor, and, if requested, shall leave a sample of the same product, securely sealed, with the person from whom said sample was taken. If they have reason to believe that any such product is adulterated they shall cause specimens thereof to be analyized or otherwise satisfactorily tested, and shall make a record of the result of the analysis or test.

### PRODUCTION

Section 6. Dairy Farms to Bc Inspected. The local Board of Health or their representative shall make a sanitary inspection, the results of which shall be recorded upon a form prescribed by the local Board of Health, of every dairy farm producing milk or cream to be sold within the city of Laconia at least once in every twelve months, or as often as necessary.

Section 7. Dairy Farms. Barns or stables in which milk-producing cows are housed shall be kept clean. The floors and cow beds shall be sound and tight. The gutters shall be properly drained. The ceiling shall be dust proof if there is a loft above. The walls and ceilings shall be kept free from dust and cobwebs. Windows shall be provided, kept clean, and so arranged as to insure proper distribution of light. Adequate ventilation shall be maintained. Manure shall be removed twice daily. The manure shall not be removed from the stable during milking. Liquid matter shall at no time be allowed to accumulate around the stable. The cow yard shall be properly graded and drained.

Section 8 Physical Condition of Cows. Every cow from which milk is to be sold shall be ex-

amined physically at least once in every twelve months by a licensed graduate veterinarian. Milk from healthy cows only shall be sold.

Section 9. Cows Must Be Clean. All above cows from which milk or cream is obtained for sale, shall be kept clean at all times and the flanks and udders of such cows shall be clean at time of milking.

Section 10. Construction of Utensils. All pails, cans, strainers and coolers used for the collection, treatment, or storage of milk or cream shall be so constructed as to be readily cleaned, with all inside seams soldered flush, and shall be free from pronounced dents and rust spots.

Section 11. Containers and Utensils To Be Cleaned and Sterilized. Adequate facilities for the sterilization of all pails, cans, covers, strainers, coolers, bottles and other containers and equipment used in the handling, transportation or storage of milk or cream to be sold or offered for sale shall be provided by producers and distributors of milk and cream. All such containers and utensils, after each use, shall be thoroughly washed, cleaned and sterilized by live steam or by submersion in, or by spraying with hot water at a temperature of not less than 180 degrees Fahrenheit, or by other method approved by the local Board of Health. Washed and sterilized containers if stored shall be inverted until about to be filled and so protected as to prevent contamination. Milking shall be done with clean dry hands or with a milking machine which shall be properly cleansed and sterilized before each use.

Section 12. Water Supply. An adequate and pure water supply shall be provided for the washing

and cleaning of bottles, cans, utensils and apparatus used in the handling of milk.

Section 13. Milk House or Milk Room. A properly constructed, lighted, and ventilated milk room or house shall be provided and used for the handling of all milk and cream and shall be maintained at all times in a clean condition. The milk house or room used for the handling of all milk or cream shall not open directly into any stable or toilet and shall be kept free from flies at all times. No fowl, cats, dogs or other animals shall be permitted in any room or house where milk is handled or stored.

Section 14. Care of Milk. The milk shall be removed from the stable as soon as the milking pail is filled and shall be strained in the milk room, or house, and unless the milk is to be separated shall be cooled within one hour after milking to a temperature of 50° F. The milk shall be stored in cans that have been sterilized and kept free from dust.

Milk shall not be sold or delivered in other than tightly closed or capped bottles or receptacles which have been filled exclusively at the dairy or receiving station.

Milk served at hotels, restaurants and lunchrooms in bottles, shall be in the original capped containers as filled only at the dairy or pasteurizing plant.

#### BOTTLING AND DISTRIBUTING PLANTS

Section 15. Buildings. Rooms or building in which bottling or mixing or distributing milk is done shall be suitable for such purposes. They shall be well lighted and ventilated and kept free from flies. The floors shall be water-tight and impervious,

well-drained, and proper disposal of drainage shall be provided.

Section 16. Equipment of Bottling and Distribuing Plants. All bottling and distributing plants shall be provided with adequate steam or hot water boiler for furnishing necessary washing and sterilizing facilities.

Section 17. Refrigeration. All bottling and distributing plants shall be provided with adequate refrigeration, so arranged and controlled that after bottling and before distribution all milk passing through the plant shall be cooled to a temperature of 50° F. or lower. Bottled milk shall not be completely submerged under water.

Section 18. Bottling and Capping Machines. All plants bottling and distributing milk shall be provided with and use mechanical bottle fillers and cappers for the filling and capping of milk bottles. Caps for bottles must be purchased or procured in sterilized containers and must remain protected from contamination until used.

Section 19. Receptacles to be Kept in Sanitary Condition: When to be Condemned and Seized. Every can and other vessel, which is used to contain milk or cream or ice cream intended for sale, shall be kept constantly in a clean and sanitary condition. When emptied and before being returned by the person to whom it was last delivered full or partly full, every such can or other vessel shall be effectively cleansed. The board of health shall condemn any such can or vessel found by them to be in such condition that it cannot by washing be rendered clean and sanitary as a receptacle for milk or cream, or ice cream and such can or vessel shall not be used

in the handling, distribution or storage of milk. When so condemned such can or other vessel shall not be used again to contain milk, cream or ice cream for sale. The Board of Health may seize and hold as evidence any can or other vessel returned or otherwise used in violation of this ordinance.

Section 20. Handling of Milk by Sick Persons or Those in Contact with Sick Persons. No person affected with any disease, presumably communicable, or who is a carrier of such disease, shall act as milker, bottler, washer, or in any other similar capacity, and this prohibition shall also apply to any person who acts as nurse, cook, laundress, or in any way comes in contact with a person affected with a disease presumably communicable.

Section 21. Reporting Diseases. Any owner or person in charge of any farm or dairy producing milk or cream, or any bottling, pasteurizing or receiving plant shall report immediately to the local board of health the name and address, and all of the facts relating to the illness and physical condition of any person who is affected with any illness or disease, presumably communicable, and who is employed or resides on or in any such farm, dairy or plant, or comes in contact in any way therein.

Section 22. Physical Examination Permitted. Every corporation, association, firm or individual holding a permit for the sale of milk or cream, or to operate a bottling or distributing plant, shall at any time allow the board of health or representative to make such physical examination of persons in any way involved in handling the milk, cream, or ice cream, or containers for milk, cream or ice cream, and to take such samples of body excreta as they may require and shall not employ any person refus-

ing to undergo such examination or to submit such samples.

Section 23. Removing of Bottles and Other Containers. No bottles or other containers to be used for the delivery of milk shall be removed from a house in which there exists, or has recently existed, a case of communicable disease until permission has been granted by the Board of Health.

Section 24. Bacterial Counts. The bacterial counts referred to in this ordinance shall be made only in laboratories approved for the purpose by the State Board of Health.

Section 25. Ice Cream. No ice cream shall be sold or offered for sale unless the milk and cream used in the manufacture thereof has either been drawn from officially tuberculin tested cows, or has been properly pasteurized.

Section 26. Powers to Make Rules. In order to facilitate the enforcement of this ordinance, the Board of Health is hereby empowered to make such rules as may be necessary, consistent with the provisions herein contained.

Section 27. Penalty for Violations. Any person, firm, company, or corporation, violating any of the provisions of this ordinance, or any rule lawfully made hereunder, or whoever hinders or obstructs any inspector in the pursuit of his lawful duty, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction shall be punished by a fine not exceeding ten dollars.

This ordinance shall take effect the first day of April 1927.

AN ORDINANCE In Amendment of Sections 1, 2 and 3 of Chapter 24 of the Revised Ordinances passed and approved March 26, 1916 as amended by an Ordinance passed and approved Sept. 9, 1916, entitled Building Limits and Regulations

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Laconia, as follows:

Strike out all of said Sections 1, 2 and 3 of said Chapter 24 entitled Building Limits and Regulations and instead thereof enact the following

Chapter 21, Building Limits and Regulations

Section 1. Fire Limits. The fire limits of the City of Laconia shall be that portion of the City included within the following limits, to-wit;

Beginning on the shore of Lake Winnisguam at the mouth of Durkee Brook; thence southeasterly to the easterly end of Mathews Court; thence easterly to the intersection of the center lines of Grant and Lincoln Streets; thence along the center line of Lincoln Street to its intersection with the center line of Garfield Street; thence to the intersection of the center lines of Province Street and Dolloff Street; thence along the center line of Dolloff Street to its intersection with the center line of Baldwin Street; thence along the center line of Baldwin Street to its intersection with the center line of Pine Street: thence along the center line of Pine Street to its intersection with the center line of Highland Street; thence along the center line of Highland Street to its intersection with the center line of Gilford Avenue; thence along the center line of Gilford Avenue to the center line of Dewey Street; thence along the center line of Dewey Street, and across land owned by the City of Laconia, to the intersection of the center lines of Woodland Avenue and Butler Street: thence along the center line of Butler Street to its intersection with the center line of Walker Street: thence northerly, parallel with and three hundred fifty (350) feet easterly of the easterly line of Union Avenue, to a point opposite the junction of Union Avenue and Messer Street; thence northerly to the center line of Mechanic Street at a point opposite the southerly line of Hillside Cemetery; thence northerly along the center line of Mechanic Street to its intersection with the center line of Pear Street; thence along the center line of Pear Street to its intersection with the center line of Hill Street; thence along the center line of Hill Street to its intersection with the center line of Clinton Street; thence along the center line of Clinton Street to its intersection with the center line of Willow Street; thence along the center line of Willow Street to its intersection with the center line of Manchester Street; thence along the center line of Manchester Street to its intersection with the center line of Valley Street; thence along the center line of Valley Street to its intersection with the center line of Stark Street; thence northeaserly to a point on the center line of Union Avenue, described as being three hundred-seventy-five (375) feet southerly from the intersection of the center lines of Clark Avenue and Union Avenue; thence westerly to the easterly end of School Street; thence westerly along the center line of School Street and on the prolongation of said center line of School Street to the shore of Lake Opechee; thence, following the shore of Lake Opechee, to the intersection of the center line of Busiel Street with the shore of said lake; thence along the center line of Busiel Street and on the prolongation of the center line of said Busiel Street to a point three hundred (300) feet westerly of the center line of Pleasant Street; thence southerly three hundred (300) feet distant from and parallel with the center line of Pleasant Street to a point one hundred thirty (130) feet easterly from the northerly end of Orchard Street; thence westerly to the northerly end of Orchard Street; thence westerly to the northerly end of Holman Street; thence westerly to the northerly end of Winnicooash Street; thence on the same course to the shore of Lake Winnisquam; thence southerly by the shore of Lake Winnisquam to the point begun at.

Section 2. No person, firm, or corporation shall build or construct, enlarge, elevate, alter or otherwise change any building or structure or any part of a building or structure within the fire limits as the said fire limits are now or may hereafter be established, or erect, set up, or cause to be erected or set up any steam boiler, engine, or storage fuel tank within said fire limits of said City without the consent of the City Council, granted after hearing all parties interested upon a petition duly filed by the owners or interested party. Said petition shall set forth the location of such building or structure or the location of any steam boiler, engine, or storage fuel tank which is proposed to be erected or set up, together with the names of the owners and occupants of all adjoining lands. Notice of the hearing shall be given to owners and occupants of land adjoining the premises in question and to all others interested in like manner as of hearing on petitions for laying out highways, except that seven days notice shall be sufficient, if so ordered. Excepting, however, that in case of a minor enlargement, elevation, alteration, or other change in any building within said fire limits, if it shall become of immediate necessity to the petitioner, in the event of there being no regular session of the City Council in which a petition can be presented within one week of the time that said petitioner finds it necessary to enlarge, elevate, alter, or otherwise change any building or part of a building, then the Mayor, the Chief of the Fire Department and the chairman of the Committee on Land and Buildings, upon a proper petition as aforesaid, shall be and are hereby empowered to grant a written permission allowing the owner or the petitioner to make minor enlargements, elevation, alteration, or minor change of any building or part of a building within said fire limits as set forth in said petition under and upon such restrictions and regulations as may be imposed in said written permission.

Section 3. Any person, firm ,or corporation violating any of the provisions of this chapter shall be punished by a fine of not exceeding twenty dollars.

## **AGREEMENT**

Memorandum of agreement made and entered into this day of November, 1926 by and between Edward R. Hamilton, party of the first part and the City of Laconia, party of the second part, WITNESSETH;—

That whereas the City of Laconia is desirous of furnishing its citizens with a skating rink in that part of Laconia known as the Pearl Street Fairgrounds on Pearl Street in said Laconia, and whereas the said Edward R. Hamilton is desirous of maintaining and operating said skating rink for and in behalf of said City of Laconia, the said Hamilton, party of the first part does hereby agree with said City of Laconia as follows;—That for the sum of seven hundred dollars, said sum to be paid in installments of \$53.84 each week commencing on Saturday November 27, 1926 and thereafter for thirteen weeks, he will do the following acts for the maintenance and operation of said rink for said city;—That he will prepare all necessary ground on said Fair Grounds in the usual place occupied by former skating rinks, said plot of ground to be prepared to be 175 by 300 feet in its dimensions; will also prepare the ground on said Fair Grounds for the maintenance of a hockey rink of the same dimensions as in former years and adjoining the main skating rink on the side of the main skating rink toward the Union Cemetery; that said skating rink and hockey rinks after their proper preparation shall be flooded by the said Hamilton as soon as the weather shall permit and after said rinks are flooded he the said Hamilton shall keep both of said rinks scraped, shoveled and in good shape for skating uses, meaning hereby to keep both of said rinks in good condition, weather permitting from November 22, 1926 until March 1, 1927.

That the said City of Laconia in consideration of the promises and agreements on the part of the said Hamilton does hereby agree with the said Hamilton that it will pay the said Hamilton the sum of seven hundred dollars in installments of \$53.84 each Saturday commencing with Saturday. November 27, 1926 for the period of thirteen weeks, the said Hamilton's contract covering a period from November 22, 1926 until March 1, 1927; that it will furnish all necessary electric lights for both of said rinks; also all water for the flooding of said rinks: that it will also allow the said Hamilton to maintain and operate such store or stores or rest rooms for the benefit of the public during the term of this contract as he may deem fit, said stores if erected by the said Hamilton to be removed at the termination of this contract; that the said Hamilton may use and occupy the building at the end of the present grandstand for store or rest room purposes free of charge; that said City shall furnish for the use of the said Hamilton all necessary shovels, scrapers, brooms for the proper maintenance of both rinks during the period of this contract.

The work of remodeling the Washington Street School so that we now have a six room instead of a four room school was most satisfactory. The new rooms are in many respects better than the original ones. This same change can be made in the Mechanic and Batchelder Street Schools when needed, and this additional number of rooms together with a two room addition to the Harvard Street School will give to Laconia ample school space for many years.

This change in buildings from four to six rooms will also permit one teacher to a grade, a change which will add to the efficiency of the school work.

This year has been marked by unsual cooperation of all those connected with our schools, and a greater interest in school affairs on the part of our citizens.

It is our earnest endeavor to give to Laconia high grade schools without being extravagant and a comparison of costs and results with other cities seem to indicate that we are doing this.

# SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the School Board of Laconia:

I present for your consideration my tenth annual report.

On January 7, 1927, the membership in the elementary schools, grades one to eight inclusive, was 1126; in the high school, 323; a total of 1449, distributed as follows:

One year ago the membership was 1423, with 1095 in the elementary schools and 328 in the high school. At the beginning of the winter term five years ago, January, 1922, the elementary schools had 962, the high school 283; a total of 1245.

Thus it will be seen that the membership this month is 26 more than it was a year ago and 204 more than in January, 1922. The growth in the schools during the last few years has been steady and is due to two causes: boys and girls are staying in school longer because of business conditions; moving in of new families with children to replace the families that are leaving Laconia.

For the school year 1915-1916 the average membership in all of the schools was 1160.

These figures also show that the growth has been constant during the last few years. On the other hand the attendance at the evening school has fallen off during the five-year period due to business conditions and removal of compulsory attendants from Laconia. The enrollment in 1922 was 286; in 1923, 194; in 1924, 275; in 1925, 191; in 1926, 109. This year the enrollment to date has been 145, the greater part whom are taking the technical courses.

No change in the teaching staff occurred during last year. At the end of the year three elementary teachers resigned, one to be married and the others to accept positions elsewhere. Another teacher was added at the Washington Street School this year. The supervisors of music and of art also resigned at the end of the year and accepted positions in a neighboring state at salaries much larger than they were receiving in Laconia.

Six teachers of the high school resigned to accept positions with larger salaries. Another teacher was added to the high school staff in the fall.

Due to eleven resignations, one teacher on leave of absence, and two additional teachers, fourteen new teachers began work in the fall.

Laconia is extremely fortunate in its teaching staff, as it is made up of men and women who are well prepared for their work and who are faithful and conscientious in the fulfillment of their tasks.

The extra-curricular activities have been carried on for the past year very successfully. In the elementary schools considerable attention was

given to American Education Week. A very pleasing operetta was given at Lakeport and a successful concert was given at Academy Street during the fall term. Parents are urged to visit the schools and not wait for special invitations. Considerable play ground apparatus has been purchased by the two schools at Lakeport from funds provided by the Playground Association and by the Academy Street school from the receipts of its entertainment.

In the high school the school paper, THE LAKONIAN, has maintained a high standard. Interest in debating has increased and the debating teams have made a good record.

Last May the state interscholastic typewriting contest was held at the high school.

In the fall the glee club presented a very pleasing program and is at work now on an operetta to be given in the spring.

Very attractive calendars were designed by members of the art class and printed at the high school print shop.

The annual exhibits of the Home Economics and Mechanic Arts departments attracted a large number of visitors who commended the work done by the pupils.

A recent visitor, a resident of Laconia, said, "I had no idea that such opportunities were offered the pupils of our schools and that such good work was being done by them."

Much interest has been aroused in athletics this year among the pupils, also much enthusiasm and genuine support among the townspeople. At the present time our athletic teams are being well coached and well cared for. The football season was a success in every way and the basketball season for both the boys and girls has made a good

start. At the close of the football season there was a balance of \$1210.19 in the treasury of the athletic council. The new bleachers in the gymnasium have already been paid for with the receipts of the basketball games.

The athletic council appreciates the interest and support of all those who have in any way helped to bring about the success of this year.

Interest in athletics has by no means detracted from the other interests of the school. Debating, music and dramatics have maintained a high standard and have received good support.

At the beginning of the school year a school savings system was started in the schools. There are now operating 1114 accounts. Many boys and girls use this system for a permanent deposit, while others use it for saving for some special purpose like class dues, graduation expenses, etc. The Mechanic Street school has had a record of 100 per cent depositors for fifteen consecutive weeks.

Another branch that is receiving more cooperation and in which good results are being obtained is the correction of physical defects. Parents are appreciating more and more the importance of caring for the teeth and the eyes and for seeking expert advice and corrections for defects among their children.

Interest in the schools and support of them have been much in evidence this year, and is fully appreciated by all who are connected with the schools.

# REPORT OF CHIEF ENGINEER

Laconia, N. H., Jan. 1, 1927

To His Honor the Mayor and City Council of the City of Laconia.

I have the honor to submit for your consideration the report of the Fire Department for the year 1926.

During the past year the department responded to 48 box alarms, to 192 chimney fires, and to three fires in Gilford.

During the past year the department was completely motorized.

The Seagrave Ladder Truck at the Lakeport Station was overhauled and equipped with a motor chassis.

Also a Packard chassis was purchased and built over into a chemical hose wagon at the Central Station.

The equipment is in good condition and new apparatus will not be required for 1927.

The equipment consists of the following:

One 750 gallon pumper, chemical, and hose wagon, Lafrance type 75.

One 600 gallon pumper, chemical, and hose wagon, Lafrance type 35.

One city service ladder truck Lafrance type.

One Packard hose wagon and chemical, rebuilt.

One city service ladder truck, Garford chassis.

One Ford ton truck with hose body and chemical, at Weirs.

9000 feet of  $2\frac{1}{2}$  inch good hose

2000 feet of  $2\frac{1}{2}$  inch poor hose used for sewers.

## GENERAL REPORT

For the Year Ending December 31st 1926

The report of the year given on the following pages, show a continued growth in the amount of service rendered, and number of patients admitted, 138 more than previous year, and during the month of August averaged 41 and a fraction per day.

Our hospital like other hospitals of the State has been greatly taxed during the year 1926 in the care of well-deserving, and needy sick, scarcity of work through many months and sickness prevailing in these families, has been the cause of many coming to our hospital to seek aid and care who have not been able to pay for same, but we anticipate the appreciation and co-operation of these people who have been restored to health will be manifested in the payment of these accounts in the near future.

While the appropriation of the city to the hospital is \$2500, our accounts show at present that we have rendered service credited to city fund of \$1,015.

In May we received our certificates of acceptance as an approved hospital by the College of Surgeons, and we hope to merit this standard the present year.

The outstanding achievement of the past year has been the building of the new heating plant and laundry. We moved into the new laundry, last of November and are finding it a great improvement. The basement of the Nurses Home previously occupied by the laundry is being restored to be used for a class room for training school, thus making the present class room in the hospital available for a four bed ward. One room in the basement has been

fitted with tubs and ironing board for a laundry for the nurses.

We have had some changes in the Institutional workers, but the Nursing staff has had but one change that of Night Supervisor.

At the beginning of the new year graduates employed are as follows:—

# MARION L. GARLAND

What is public health business? Public health means less sickness of the kind which can be avoided if one knows how; fewer babies dying; less money spent for doctor's bills, less unemployment, because of less disability; more efficient work; more comfortable life; a more livable life and the possibility of a longer life. Its aim is to lessen the waste in health, and this is practicable. It is being achieved in proportion as individual persons and city officials become conscious of the possibilities of health preservation.

Public health is purchasable. How much shall we buy? Laconia has no sanitary inspector, health officer, milk inspector, nor school doctor. The board of health is supposed to look after it all. Laconia pays less than one-half for its board of health salary than any other place of similar size in the state of New Hampshire, and probably in the United States, \$600. Dover, with a population around fifteen thousand, pays yearly salaries of \$7000; Berlin \$2200; Keene \$1600.

There is abundant evidence that the work of public health authorities to prevent illness and conserve health, considered from a purely economic viewpoint, pays large dividends.

For the past fifteen years the Metropolitan Life Insurance Company, with which I am associated, has spent an average of more than a million dollars a year in its public health campaign for its policy holders. This vast investment has reaped a return of 200 per cent. The money saving resulting from the lowered death rate, which the company attributes to the campaign, totals almost twice its cost.

The work of the board of health is not getting simpler. In fact, it is hourly getting more difficult, because of the extraordinary expansion of the field of public health work. A few years ago, when the board of health work consisted of quarantining communicable diseases, investigating pig pens, cess pools, and chicken coops, \$600 would have seemed sufficient, but now public health work has so broadened out that it deals with the most intimate concerns of our daily lives. It touches the very center of our personality. It has to do with everybody from the cradle, yes, from conception, to the grave.

Laconians are proud of our public schools, our well kept streets, our efficient fire and police departments. A fire breaks out on Main Street; hundreds of people are attracted; and Chief Spring and his fire fighters are praised, and justly so, for making a good stop and saving perhaps thousands of dollars in property. The board of health has made many as sensational stops in controlling the spread of contagious diseases, where not only money was at stake, but health and life, with but few, if any, knowing or appreciating the work. It is surprising how little interest the general public, and especially the city council, takes in public health work, the most important of any city's departments. Until within the last two years it was practically ignored by the city council.

This year sufficient interest has been created to buy land for a city dump, approve and pass a milk ordinance, and lay on the table indefinitely a request for an increase in the salary of the board of health, that all knew was justly earned. If Laconia wishes to keep this department in comparison with the other departments, it surely will have to appropriate more money.

## LIBRARY REPORT

### REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES

To the Honorable Mayor and City Council:

The undersigned, trustees of the Laconia Public Libary, herewith transmit to you the annual report of Arthur W. Dinsmoor, Treasurer, showing the financial condition of the library for the year ending February 15th, 1927, and a statistical report prepared by Miss Hazel J. Clark, Librarian, showing the circulation and registration during the same period.

The combined circulation of the Laconia Public Library and the Goss Reading Room for the year 1926 was 58,773, an increase of 9,839 over the year 1925

As the universally acknowledged value of a Public Library in a community is directly in proportion to the extent of its use by the inhabitants, an increase in circulation of nearly ten thousand for a period of twelve months, without any corresponding increase in our population, cannot fail to be a source of gratification to our citizens.

The circulation has shown a steady increase each year since 1922, reaching a total gain of 22,930 with the end of 1925. The circulation at the Goss Reading Room alone has increased 2,551 during this period. During January, 1927, the daily cir-

culation at the Laconia Public Library has been as high as 354, and in February 441.

The library building is now in need of general repairs and the time is near at hand when additional stacks must be provided, and the latter will probably require the expenditure of between ten and twenty thousand dollars.

It is not possible to pay for more than minor repairs from the general funds available without seriously restricting the purchase of new books and the library's service to the public in proportion.

The city of Laconia cannot afford to neglect the proper preservation of the beautiful library building presented to it through the generosity of the late Napoleon B. Gale and additional funds should be provided when needed for this purpose or for needed additions.

# REPORT of PARK COMMISSION

Laconia, N. H., February 1, 1927.

To the Mayor and Council of the City of Laconia: Gentlemen:

For your consideration the Park Commission are pleased to submit to you their twelfth annual report.

We call to your attention some recommendations that seem to us necessary to keep the grounds in good condition and provide for as much pleasure and recreation as possible not only for the children but for our citizens and the public who may visit us during the summer season.

The playground season for the summer of 1926 opened at Opechee Park, Monday, June 21, with E. L. Warren, Jr., as director and Frances O'Shea assistant director. It proved to be a normal season with the average attendance.

Much interest was shown as usual in the swimming classes and many advances were made by the children along aquatic lines.

The Life Saving Lessons proved to be an incentive to many and certainly this phase of the playground activities alone is worth the amount expended.

After surfacing one of the tennis courts and putting same in first class condition, this game seemed to grow exceedingly popular. The court was not only enjoyed by the children during play hours

but furnished an excellent opportunity for older folks to enjoy a game of tennis at the end of a day's work. The coming season it is hoped that the other court may be put in similar condition and thus furnish further chance for developing some championship tennis players.

An instructor was on duty at the playground at South Main Street during afternoons. This experiment proved very successful and Edna Smith gained the interest of the children in that locality. The lack of apparatus and equipment was a decided drawback but those attending made the best of the material provided and an excellent baseball team was organized. Games were played with the teams at Opechee and Leavitt Parks.

Once a week Miss Smith arranged to take all who desired to go up to Opechee Park for swimming and life saving lessons. Altogether this playground served as an excellent place for the children in this part of the town to meet.

The coming season will see new apparatus and equipment and with the cooperation of children and parents a thriving center of playground activities will soon develop in this section.

The playground season closed Aug. 28, 1926.

The work at the Leavitt Playground has been very successful under the direction of Mr. Ivor Olson, assisted by Miss Elva Ortolf.

More interest was shown in baseball than in any other sport. Several over-night camping trips were enjoyed and well attended.

Through the courtesy of Mr. Byse and Mr. Tetley, transportation was furnished for all children from the playground to Lake Shore Park for an all day picnic. Miss Ortolf and the smaller children presented a very pleasing Pageant at one of the Carnivals. The average daily attendance was 86 and the total attendance was 5,184.

Perhaps the greatest improvement that has been accomplished during any single year was the completion of the baseball diamond at Leavitt Park.

This was made possible by an appropriation by the Mayor and City Council. We appreciate this cooperation as well as the services given by R. M. Barton who superintended the construction of the field.

Beginning July 23rd, three games a week were played, after five in the afternoon, with an average attendance of two hundred twenty-eight.

During the winter the Ward Six skating rink 133 feet by 163 feet, proved to be a mecca for both young and old.

Your commission appreciates the interest of the Mayor and Council and the public in the recreation work and playgrounds of our city.

We would suggest that the sum of two thousand dollars (\$2,000.00) be appropriated to be expended at the rate of five hundred dollars (\$500.00) each year to complete the grading at Opechee Park.

We ask that the appropriation for playground purposes be made the same as last year, which we hope will enable us to purchase some needed equipment for the playground at the south end of the city.

We wish to thank all who contributed to make the season of 1926 a success.

To the Honorable Mayor and City Council:

We would respectfully submit the twenty-six annual report of the Department of Public Works, and transmit herewith copies of the detailed report and recommendations of the City Engineer, Street Commissioner and Superintendent of Sewers.

With the appropriations furnished and the cooperation and assistance given by your honorable body, this Department has been enabled to build a substantial addition to our area of Bituminous Macadam Pavement, and to make important extensions to our surface and sanitary sewer system, including the completion of The Weirs sewag system.

The bridge situation, at the present time calls for special consideration. While this City has made wonderful progress in the past few years in replacing its old bridges with permanent structures, more remains to be done, as the Fair street and the Mill street structures are in such condition as to require some action this year according to the Commissioners report, with the need for a new bridge at Church Street only a year away.

Snow removal from the streets of the city and

roads in the outlying districts, has continued in a manner generally satisfactory, and there is no doubt of the demand for its continuance. The benefits of a winter road kept open for motor traffic, by the use of tractors and plows, have been quickly realized through out this part of the country, and the town that does not keep its roads open in winter will apparently soon be an exception.

To complete the improvement of the Rocky Pond Road, within the limits of the City, thirty four hundred and sixty-seven lineal feet remains to be built. There is available from the State this year, three thousand dollars for the continuance of construction from the end of last year's work toward Belmont, provided the city appropriates an equal amount. In order to benefit by the State's contribution and forward this important work, we recommend the aforesaid appropriation.

House Joint Resolution No. 71, providing for an extension of macadam road in the vicinity of the Laconia State School, is now pending in the Legislature, and if enacted into law, it would of course be desirable for the city to cooperate on a fifty-lifty basis.

A summary of all the construction and a detail of the maintenance work under appropriate headings is contained in the reports of Mr. French, herewith attached, together with his recommendations for the year ensuing which recommendations are approved by us and we ask your careful consideration of the same.

The wooden bridge on Church Street partially failed early last summer and it was found necessary

to place some new stringers and a new deck on same at an expense of \$1,720.93.

This bridge is not adequate for the traffic it is called upon to carry and should be replaced in 1928 by a more permanent structure.

The Mill Street bridge is exceedingly poor and will probably have to be closed to heavy traffic, rebuilt or abandoned during 1927.

The Fair Street bridge is in a similar condition and I recommend that it be replaced by a steel bridge with a concrete floor during the season 1927.

#### DRAINS

Much progress was made in the construction of surface drains owing to generous appropriations for that purpose. Drains were built on Baldwin St. from Pine St. northerly, Elm St. at R. R. yard, Endicott St. from Daniel Webster Road to White Oaks Road, Gilford Ave. from the brook to Sanborn St., Parker Place, Dolloff and Province Streets to Cool Broth Hill, Spring St., and Winter Street.

I recommend the construction of drains on Baldwin and Avery Sts., Union Ave. and Laurel Sts. Franklin-School-Washington and Bell Sts., Mechanic St. from Harrison St. northerly.

Repair and maintenance was carefully attended to and all drains are in good condition.

#### BITUMINOUS MACADAM PAVEMENTS

Bituminous macadam pavements were laid as follows:

In addition much patching of water works trenches and where the rails of street car track was removed, was done.

The cost of maintaining 117,658 sq. yds. of bituminous macadam built previous to 1926, exclusive of state roads, was \$5,437.15 or 1 6-10 cents per square yard.

I recommend the laying of bituminous macadam pavement on Pine St. from Main to Baldwin; on Messer St. from the bridge to Irving St. and on Union Ave. where the rails of the car track were removed from Casino Square to Messer St. and from Clinton Street to near the pumping station.

#### IMPROVEMENT TO COUNTRY ROADS

\$4,608.21 was expended in the improvement of the Meredith Center and Trojano Road, so called.

This work consisted of the blasting and removal of a great deal of ledge, widening, straightening and grading the road beds.

More of this work should be done and I recommend an appropriation of \$4,000 to continue this work on Meredith Center Road at Cork Hill and on

the Roller Coaster Road, so called, and the White Oak Road.

#### PURCHASE OF EQUIPMENT

This appropriation covered the purchase of a gasoline motor roller to supplement the 10 ton steam roller we now have. The purchase and installation of a 25 h. p. motor for one stone crusher. A truck snowplow and about two miles of snow fence.

The two one ton trucks and the four ton truck now in use by the department are so worn that the cost of their upkeep is excessive and I recommend that they be exchanged for new equipment of a similar capacity. The purchase of 5,000 feet more of snow fence would be economy.

Some new kettles for melting tar and asphalt should be purchased.

There was built on the Camp Ground at The Weirs a collecting tank of 2,500 gallons capacity, equipped with an electrically driven, automatically controlled pump which lifts the sewerage from tank into the gravity sewer on Weeks St.

This pump lifts at the rate of 120 gallons per minute a height of 30 feet.

All the sewerage from the Camp Ground section flows into the septic tank at Endicott Park where it is chlorinated before discharge into The Weirs Channel.

A collecting and septic tank of 5,200 gallons capacity was constructed at the foot of Appleton St. to treat the sewerage from this locality.

The sewerage sysem at The Weris is now complete and the total cost was \$27,912.07 or \$2,087.93 less than the estimate.

Sewers should be built on Sheridan St. from Belvidere to the top of the hill north of School St., Gilford Ave. and Morrill St., and on Walker St. from Union Ave. easterly for a distance of 230 feet.

The estimated cost of this work is \$12,888.

Maintenance of the present system was carefully attended to and it is in good condition.

#### SIDEWALKS

Sidewalks surfaced with asphalt were constructed on Belknap St., Pleasant St., Court St., Highland St., Lakeside Ave. at The Weirs, New Salem St., Oak St., Strafford St., Union Ave.

3,903 sq. yds. of new asphalt was laid and 2,961 sq. yds. of old sidewalk was recovered.

#### STATE ROADS

The bituminous macadam pavement on North Main St. was continued toward the School for Feeble Minded to the extent of the joint appropriation made by the State and the City. 2,350 ft. of pavement 18 feet wide and in addition about 500 feet of gravel base was laid.

The joint appropriation of \$5,000 made by the State and the City for the year 1925, for the Rocky Pond Road, was expended in laying 1,144 feet of bituminous macadam pavement 18 feet wide.

Maintenance consisted of repairs and patching of bituminous surface, erection of guard rails and some widening of curves.

The section of water bound macadam on the Daniel Webster highway from The Weirs to Meredith town line is badly in need of resurfacing and it is recommended that the following sum be appropriated for maintenance of State Road, one half of which will be furnished by the State of N. H. Patching and care of shoulders \$3,000. Widening curves, \$3,000. Resurfacing above Winnicoette house \$8,000. Total \$14,000.

#### SNOW REMOVAL

By the use of one ten ton, one five ton, and one truck plow all the roads and streets within the limits of Laconia, with small exception, are kept open for automobile traffic.

There are about 80 miles of roads and streets to cover and with the doubling back necessary, I estimate that from 130 to 140 miles of road must be covered by the plows.

Under the most favorable conditions it takes from 24 to 36 hours to cover the routes so manifestly some of the least important roads will not be broken out the first day of a storm but so far the Street Railway busses have not lost a trip due to snow.

The two miles of snow fence, now erected, prevent much drifting and speed up the rate of breaking. About one more mile of fence should be erected.

In only one instance has a property owner refused cooperation by objecting to the erection of snow fences on his land.

#### PLUMBING

This department issued permits for and inspected 155 plumbing jobs during the year.

#### ENGINEERING

Survey and estimates were made for the numerous projects examined during the year and lines and grades given for all construction work.

#### GENERAL

All work provided for by appropriations was

completed except the surface for a short sidewalk on Rowell St. and some sewer work on Appleton St.

The rails and poles of the Street Railway were all removed and the adjacent road surfacing repaired.

On Main and Pleasant Streets through the business section, the ties were removed and a pavement consisting of a cement concrete base and asphalt top was built to accord with the existing pavement on these streets.

I would especially recommend for praise the faithful foremen and men of the department, who, night and day through the snow season, plow sidewalks and roads. The street plows go all night for many nights in the winter and the men who run the sidewalk plows are up and out at from two to three o'clock in the morning to have sidewalks plowed for people going to the shops and mills by 6 o'clock.

There are no holidays for this department when storms arrive.

The need of a building for storing and overhauling the motor vehicles of the department is imperative. It is absolutely essential to store trucks and tractors used in cold weather in a heated garage so that they may be ready without delay for emergency day or night. We are now renting space in a private garage which is expensive and unsatisfactory and does not afford the department the space or appliances necessary for overhauling and repairs.

Due to a small fire on the roof, it was necessary to place a new roof-covering on a portion of the building at a cost of \$422.54.
