# TOWN WARRANT

## STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Lempster, in the County of Sullivan, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Union Hall, said Lempster, on Tuesday, the 8th day of March, at ten of the clock, in the forenoon, to open the polls for voting for candidates, and at one o'clock in the afternoon for the discussion of the Articles of Warrant.

Article 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing; and to vote on the following question: "Shall the provisions of Chapter 171A of the Revised Laws relative to playing Beano be adopted in the Town."

Article 2. To receive all reports and act thereon.

Article 3. To see what sums of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the following purposes for the ensuing year.

Article 4. To see if the Town will vote to allow the Selectmen to deliver blank inventories at the time they appraise property for taxation.

Article 5. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money for the Town in anticipation of taxes.

Article 6. To see if the Town wishes to continue plowing driveways as in the past.

Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$500.00 for the Highway Capital Reserve Fund.

Article 8. To see if the Town wishes to adopt the Ordinance passed in 1964 per instructions of 1964 Town Meeting. Said Ordinance printed on page 7 of this report.

Article 9. To see what action the Town will vote to continue the Town Forest Committee and to take any necessary action thereon.

Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$756.36 for T.R.A.; the State will contribute \$5,042.41.

Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$1,100.00 to pay on note for the truck.

Article 12. To see if the Town will vote \$200.00 to keep the Information Booth open from June 26th to Sept. 30th.

Article 13. To see if the Town will vote a sum of money to continue the Town History Fund established in 1955.

Article 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$800.00 for the Fire Department's annual expenses.

Article 15. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to purchase Liability Insurance for the Town and raise \$950.00 to cover expense thereof.

Article 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$450.00 for the Town's share of Social Security for its employes.

Article 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$500.00 for the Library.

Article 18. To see if the Town will vote to accept the name of Miner Memorial Library for the new Library.

Article 19. To see if the Town wishes to repair the present loader or to purchase a new or used loader and to appropriate the necessary funds.

Article 20. To see if the Town will vote a sum of money for the Bi-centennial, said money to be repaid in proportion to receipts.

Article 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise a sum of money to paint and repair Town Hall.

Article 22. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$32.00 for the D. L. S. R. Association.

Article 23. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$77.00 for the control of White Pine Blister Rust.

Article 24. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$700.00 for interest on notes.

Article 25. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate \$200.00 to help maintain and support the Newport Hospital.

Article 26. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to allow 3% discount on taxes, if paid on or before Sept. 1 based on 80% of last year's taxes, and 2% discount on taxes if paid on or before Oct. 1 using the same base.

Article 27. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

## TOWN OF LEMPSTER

In the Year of Our Lord One Thousand and Nine Hundred and Sixty-Four:

### AN ORDINANCE

#### “Building Permit and Regulations”

BE IT ORDAINED by the Board of Selectmen of the Town of Lempster, in order to promote safety, health, comfort and general welfare of the Town of Lempster:

**Section 1.** The Inspector of Buildings shall be appointed by the Selectmen annually and shall be the administrative officer of this ordinance. He shall receive applications for all new habitable buildings and the fees as provided in this ordinance; shall deposit with the Town Clerk a record of all applications and his action thereon; and may issue permits for erection if, in his opinion, the proposal complies with the law of the State, this ordinance and other town ordinances and by-laws; shall act in coordination with the fire warden and/or health officer in any matter in which their duties as prescribed by law may coincide or conflict; and shall take such action in the enforcement of this ordinance as may be directed by the Selectmen.

**Section 2.** No dwelling shall be erected until a permit thereof has been issued under the terms of this ordinance. The remodelling into habitable dwellings of existant structures or conversion of existing homes, attached ells and/or accessory buildings into apartment units shall place them within the scope of this ordinance. Ordinary maintenance on real estate will not require a permit.

**Section 3.** No application for a permit required by this ordinance shall receive action by the Building Inspector unless made in writing. All applications for a permit to build or reconstruct any building shall be accompanied by a sketch or plan of the proposed building. A fee of Three Dollars (\$3.00) shall be paid for all permits issued, except as hereinafter provided. A building permit shall become void unless operations are commenced within six (6) months from date of approval, unless such time is extended by the Building Inspector.

**Section 4.** Upon receiving such application the Building Inspector shall promptly take such action as may be indicated in the way of investigation to acquaint himself with the merits of the application. If he finds the proposed building to conform with the law and this ordinance, he may at once issue the permit in writing over his signature. If he finds the proposal in any conflict with the law or this ordinance, he shall fix whatever restrictions or conditions on the proposed construction as may be, in his best judgment, right and proper, or for reasonable cause he may refuse the permit.

**Section 5.** No building or structure shall be erected or rebuilt for habitation unless in compliance with the following:

a) Roofs. No roof or any building shall be covered or recovered in whole or in part save with any non-combustible or fire-resistant roofing materials.

b) Chimney Construction. Chimneys shall extend at least 3 feet above the highest point where they pass through the roof of a building and at least 2 feet higher than any portion of the building within 10 feet. No chimney shall be built having wood or other combustible materials within one inch of the chimney and no chimney shall have its base resting upon any floor or beam of combustible material. Factory-built chimneys that are approved as a result of tests and listing by a nationally recognized testing laboratory shall be installed in accordance with the conditions of the approval.

c) Thimbles. No wall paper or other combustible material shall be laid over any thimble or thimble hole in any chimney.

d) Smoke Pipes. No smoke pipes shall be installed or erected so as to be within twelve inches of any combustible floor or ceiling, unless amply protected with non-combustible material. No smoke pipe shall be installed or erected which passes into or through partitions or walls of combustible material except when guarded by a double collar of metal with air space of at least five inches, or by at least five inches of brick or other non-combustible material between the pipe and the combustible material.

e) Electric Wiring. All electrical wiring shall conform with approved methods and practices for safety to life and property. Compliance with the National Electrical Code, as published by the National Board of Underwriters, shall be prima facie evidence of such approved methods and practices.

f) Foundations. All structures shall be set on solid foundations or piers of cement, brick, stone or other acceptable masonry.

g) Minimum building area. Every dwelling unit to be used by a single family shall have a minimum ground floor area of four hundred square feet.

h) Outside Walls. Shall be constructed of material commonly used for construction and materials customarily painted shall be painted. Protective building paper is not acceptable within the scope of this paragraph.

i) Sewerage. When a public system is not available, a private sewerage disposal system is required. Septic tanks and drainage fields are required with flush bowls and size, type and construction must be approved. All septic tanks and drainage fields shall be in ac-

cordance with state law (Chapter 147-8), (Revised Statutes Annotated). A sewerage disposal system shall be required for all new construction of permanent dwelling.

**Section 6. Trailers.** Trailers shall not be permitted unless approval is given by the Selectmen or Building Inspector. Such trailers shall be placed on a permanent foundation and shall install the required sewerage system.

**Section 7. Garages and other outbuildings** shall require a permit and shall conform to standard building requirements, regarding roofing, siding and electrical work, but there shall be no cost for said permit.

**Section 8. Right of Appeal.** The Board of Selectmen shall have authority to allow slight variances from the specific terms of this ordinance where it can be shown that unnecessary hardship would otherwise result.

**Section 9. Amendment.** This ordinance may be amended by a majority vote of any legal Town Meeting when such amendment is published in the Warrant calling for the meeting.

**Section 10. Enforcement.** Upon any well-founded information that this ordinance is being violated, the Selectmen shall on their own initiative take immediate steps to enforce the provisions of the ordinance by seeking an injunction in the Superior Court or by other appropriate legal action. Whoever violates any of the provisions of the above regulations shall be punished upon conviction by a fine not exceeding ten dollars for each day of violation.

**Section 11. Takes effect.** This ordinance shall take effect on June 15, 1964.

**Section 12. Conflicting provisions.** Whenever the regulations made under the authority hereof differ from those described by any statute, ordinance or other regulations, that provision which imposes the greater restriction or the higher standard shall govern.

**Section 13. Validity.** If any section, clause, provision, portion, or phrase of this ordinance shall be held invalid or unconstitutional by any Court of competent authority, such holding shall not affect, impair or invalidate any other section, clause, provisions, portion or phrase of this ordinance.

## THE SELECTMEN SPEAK TO THE VOTERS

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### ON THE NEW JUNK LAW OF THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

The following is taken from the Keene Sentinel. It explains the new law pertaining to junk yards.

Since this is a law of the State we, the Selectmen, have no choice but to see that it is enforced.

If selectmen in New Hampshire decide to strictly enforce a new motor vehicle junk yard law, enacted by the 1965 Legislature, it could work something of a hardship on a great many people living in rural sections, many of whom obviously are not aware of the new law.

A junk yard is now defined as any place where two or more unregistered, or old motor vehicles exist. Everyone who owns such vehicles — and many farmers and rural dwellers do — must now pay an annual \$25 junk yard license fee.

Anyone who owns this kind of “junk yard” and doesn’t have a license is subject to a fine of up to \$10 a day for each day of violation — and the law became effective on October 8.

The new law says:

“Junk yard means any place of storage or deposit, whether in connection with another business or not, where two or more unregistered, or old motor vehicles, no longer intended or in condition for legal use on the highways, are held, whether for the purpose of resale of used parts, for the purpose of reclaiming for use some or all of the materials, whether metal, glass, fabric, or otherwise, or to dispose of them, or any other purpose. The term includes any place of storage, or deposit for any purposes, of used parts or materials from motor vehicles which, taken together include in bulk two or more vehicles. The term includes anyone registered as a motor vehicle junk dealer . . . but does not include an establishment operated by a firm or individual registered . . . as a new or used motor vehicle dealer.”

For a penalty, the law says:

“After ninety days from the passage of this chapter, a maximum fine of ten dollars shall be imposed upon a person for each twenty-four hours or fraction thereof in which he is in violation of this chapter.”

The law, unfortunately makes no exception for farmers who have unregistered, homemade tractors and other rebuilt vehicles for use around the farm — vehicles that would not pass an inspection to be registered, but which are workable for use other than on the highways.

Since the legislation was passed last July 8 and became effective October 8, a few selectmen in the area have sent out courtesy reminders

to people who might be affected by it and who may be unaware of the law, or may have forgotten the date it went into effect. But very few selectmen have done so.

A drive along any rural road in Cheshire County, or elsewhere in the state, is all that's necessary to realize the large number of citizens who are affected and who must now pay a \$25 license fee on the unregistered vehicles and collections of parts they have in their dooryards.

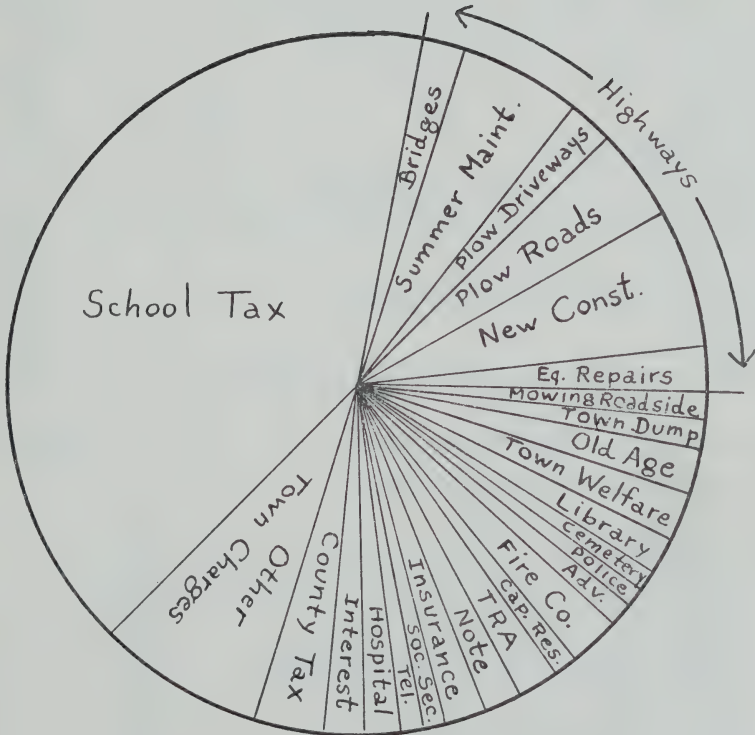

## REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND DISTRICT CHIEF

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Most of us who live in New Hampshire and the thousands of vacationists that visit us every year love the State for the variegated woodlands that encircle our clean lakes and clothe the hills and mountains. Most of us appreciate these values, but still there were enough careless people among us to cause over 880 grass and woodland fires to start in 1965. True this was a much dryer than normal year but this should have meant the use of extra care. Fortunately the fire fighting forces have held the line against such careless acts. It is up to each one of us to be ever mindful that a spark or flame is a potential fire.

### WE MUST ALL BE CAREFUL:

1. To teach our children the danger in lighting matches.
2. To never discard lighted smoking material from a car or while walking through fields or woods.
3. To safely dispose of rubbish preferably at the town dump. If you must burn rubbish or brush;
  - a. Always get a permit to burn from the warden.
  - b. Start your fire late in the day after 5:00 P.M.
  - c. If burning a field or brush have equipment and adequate help on hand. The heat from your fire creates its own draft to spread fire.

Our carelessness with fire is costing our State and Towns thousands of wasted dollars in suppression and hundreds of acres of destroyed woodlands. Yours never to enjoy.

# GOSHEN-LEMPSTER SCHOOL DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

---

To the School Board and Citizens of the Goshen-Lempster Co-operative School District;

## ENROLLMENT

The records indicate that the enrollment in September totaled 135 as follows:

Grade 1	19 pupils
Grade 2	20 pupils
Grade 3	19 pupils
Grade 4	15 pupils
Grade 5	14 pupils
Grade 6	17 pupils
Grade 7	14 pupils
Grade 8	17 pupils

## STAFF

Although a fifth teacher was employed, the fifth classroom was not available since the building project did not get underway until late in the fall. Consequently, it was necessary to place the eighth grade students in the Utility Room. Both the students and the teacher are to be commended for their patience and understanding in this temporary situation.

Three of the five teachers were new to the Goshen-Lempster School. Although they have made a good adjustment to a new teaching situation, every effort should be made to reduce the teacher turnover. Buildings and materials are essential parts of a learning situation. However, the teacher remains the most important factor in providing a satisfactory education for your children. If you are to keep and recruit successful teachers, salaries must be at least on a competitive basis with those paid in surrounding communities.

## BUILDING PLANS

Prices for the building addition, voted last year, came in higher than the estimates on the funds available (\$20,000.). Consequently, it was necessary to make some changes in the original proposal in order to get the needed additional space.

An article is included in the Warrant calling for \$3,000. to complete the building and provide some needed equipment. Since this additional amount should qualify for State School Building Aid of 40%, the net cost would be \$1,800. for completion of the building project.

## FEDERAL FUNDS

You are eligible for funds on a matching basis under the National Defense Education Act of 1958 for reference materials and equipment in the fields of Science and Mathematics. We are recommending that the District take advantage of its share of these funds to provide some much needed equipment.

Goshen-Lempster qualifies under Title I and II of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965.

Title II is handled on a Supervisory Union basis. Consequently, this District is eligible to receive \$234. of library and instructional items under this Title.

Your allotment under Title I for this school year (1965-66) is \$2,495.28. We hope to get approval to use these funds toward a reading improvement project. This would involve employing a teacher assistant to work with small groups needing added drill and extra attention. The bulk of the funds would go to equip the present Utility Room into a Library-Learning Center. If funds permit, it may be possible to convert the present Kitchen into a Health area. Expenditure of these funds before June 30 of this year is called for in an article in the Warrant.

## CONCLUSION

We officially became connected with the Goshen-Lempster School District on October 1, 1965.

The Teacher Consultant, A. J. Soucy, has spent a generous amount of time in working with the teachers and reviewing the present pro-

grams to determine both strengths and weaknesses, in order to be in a better position to make intelligent recommendations for future improvements.

If the entire school community — citizens, parents, School Board, staff, and administration — continue to work together toward an improved educational program for Goshen-Lempster students, I am certain that some real progress will result.

## PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

---

This has been an unusual year for all concerned with your school due to several factors: inclusion into Union #43, departmentalization of the three upper grades, three teachers new to this school, and the building program.

At the retirement of Mr. Noyes Stickney on October 1, 1965, School District #5 was discontinued and the Goshen-Lempster Co-operative School came under the jurisdiction of Mr. Gordon B. Flint in Union #43. He and Mr. Alphonse J. Soucy have been most helpful in assisting us to make this transition.

Before his retirement Mr. Stickney and your School Board set up departmentalized teaching in the 6th, 7th, and 8th grades. Two teachers share the responsibility for these three grades, with Mr. David Callum teaching Social Studies and Science, and Mrs. Irene Cain teaching English and Mathematics. These pupils have had to become accustomed to changing rooms for classes, and also become acquainted with both of these new teachers. The other teacher new to your school this year is Mrs. Martha Motes who has the 2nd and 3rd grades. We have been fortunate to retain the able services of Mrs. Hester Morrissey for the 4th and 5th grades, and Mrs. Myrtle Starkey for the crucial first grade spot.

In spite of crowded conditions and the use of the former cafeteria room as a classroom, the Hot Lunch Program is being successfully carried out under the able direction of Mrs. Francese Newton, assisted by Mrs. Faulkner. Mrs. Newton has received a letter of commendation from the State Department for her efforts this year.

Each Friday afternoon Mrs. Bruno offers music to the children of each room in the school. She directed a Christmas program which was presented at the Lempster Town Hall and enjoyed by a capacity audience.

Grades 5 through 8 were invited to attend the lecture and demonstration conducted at the Newport Junior High School when the N. A. S. A. Spacemobile came in December. This proved to be a most enjoyable and informative program.

Our School Nurse, Miss MacIver, is conducting an active health program with a series of immunization clinics. She had the Heaf tests

for tuberculosis given, and is now conducting eye tests.

A successful Dental Clinic was carried out under the sponsorship of The Parents' Club and Miss MacIver. Mrs. Myrtie Starkey was the teacher-coordinator working with the Parents' Club Committee, Mrs. Ralph Wright and Mrs. Francese Newton. All children were examined by Dr. Houlihan at the school. There were nine visits made to his office where 22 children were treated. Interested parents furnished transportation.

Our school was the recipient of some funds under the National Education Act which will provide a new set of encyclopedia for the upper grades, some library books for the primary grades, and an S. R. A. Reading Laboratory on a higher level than the one currently being used by the 4th and 5th grades.

Mr. and Mrs. Campbell are doing a most efficient job in getting the pupils to school safely and punctually, and Mr. and Mrs. Henry Hoyt have been keeping the school beautifully clean and comfortable. Both couples have been most cooperative and pleasant to work with.

All of us teachers wish to express our appreciation of the efforts and interest of the School Board, the Parents' Club, Miss MacIver, Mr. Flint, Mr. Soucy, the Building Committee, and the others who have worked so tirelessly for the school. Meanwhile, we are all watching the construction of the addition with interest and anticipation of another fine classroom and an activity room which will be available not only for school events, but community ones as well.

## GOSHEN-LEMPSTER COOPERATIVE SCHOOL NURSE'S REPORT

---

To the School Board and Citizens of Goshen and Lempster I here-with submit my annual report as school nurse.

During this past school year our usual testing programs were carried out and any problems found were reported to parents for follow-up.

One hundred and thirty-one vision tests were done, followed by 12 re-checks. Nine defects were found and all corrected.

One hundred and twenty-nine hearing tests were done followed by six audiograms (full-scale hearing tests). Three children with im-paired hearing were detected and medical treatment was instituted. General inspections, heights and weights were done on 128 children.

Thirty-two children attended the Dental Clinic which is sponsored by the Parents' Club with the assistance of the New Hampshire State Department of Health. Dr. Houlihan in Claremont conducted the Clinics.

Tuberculin testing with the Heaf Test being used was carried out in grades one, four and eight as well as the adult members of the school staff. One adult reacted to the test and a chest x-ray was done. The result was negative.

A series of three Immunization Clinics was started in September and will be continued during the winter. These Clinics were sponsored by the New Hampshire State Department of Health and made available to children and adults in the area. Sabin Polio Vaccine, Triple Toxoid (Diphtheria, Tetanus and Whooping Cough Vaccine) and Small Pox Vaccinations were provided at no cost to those attending the Clinics. A group of Peace Corps workers from the Experiment in International Living in Putney, Vermont, and wanting the experience of setting up clinics took care of the publicity and made a great many pre-school contacts. The Clinics have been well attended. Several volunteer workers in the communities gave of their time for which I am grate-ful. Without volunteer help clinics of this type could not be managed.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank you all for your interest in the School Health Program.

2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
3. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
4. To choose one Member of the School Board for the ensuing five years.
5. To choose Auditors, Agents, and Committees in relation to any subjects embraced in this Warrant.
6. To hear the reports of Auditors, Agents, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
7. To see what sum of money the District will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of School District Officials and Agents, and for the payment of the statutory obligations of the District.
8. To see if the District will vote to accept the provisions of Public Law 89-10, designed to improve educational opportunities with particular reference to children of low-income families, and to appropriate such funds as may be made available to the District under said federal act for such particular projects as may be determined by the School Board. Further, to see if the District will authorize the School Board to make application for such funds and to expend the same for such projects as it may designate.

9. To see if the District will authorize the School Board to appropriate receipts from federal lunch reimbursements, tuition, gifts, and other receipts from miscellaneous sources, in addition to the original appropriation for 1966-67, for the school lunch program, general expense, equipment and improvements.

10. To see if the District will authorize the School Board to make application for and to receive, in the name of the District, such advances, grants-in-aid, or other funds for educational purposes as may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the United States Government and/or State agencies.

11. To see if the District will vote to complete and equip the addition to the Goshen-Lempster School and to appropriate a sum of money not to exceed \$3,000. therefor to be raised by borrowing in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act RSA Chapter 33 and any amendments relating thereto.

12. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.
