



TOWN WARRANT

The State of New Hampshire

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Mont Vernon in the County of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Mont Vernon on Tuesday, the tenth day of March next, at three of the clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

ACTION ON SUCCEEDING ARTICLES DEFERRED UNTIL 7:30 P. M.

- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- 3. To act on reports of all Town Officers, Agents, Auditors, Committees, etc., and raise and appropriate any money relative thereto.
- 4. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen and Treasurer to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to accept Town Road Aid for construction of Class V roads, and raise and appropriate for said purpose the sum of \$650.48 (State will add \$4336.54).
- 6. To see what action the Town will take with regard to improving the snow removal equipment and raise and appropriate the necessary money for same.
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to release any claim it may have on a certain section of former Route 13, passing through the property of Harold Stroncer.

The limits of this release to be as follows: At the South end a point of intersection with present Route 13. At the North end as far as boundary line between property of Harold Stroncer, and Rita Azzola. (By request of Harold Stroncer).

8. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

POLLS WILL BE OPEN AT 3:00 P. M. AND SHALL NOT CLOSE BEFORE 9:00 P. M.

ROAD AGENT'S REPORT

During my first term as Road Agent I submit the

following report.

Summer maintenance money has been spent to widen and gravel roads as follows: Brook road from Gavin's corner to Route 13, Beech Hill, Kendall Hill, Smith road, Morgan and Carleton road. Hazen's Hill was regraded and drained. Gravel was placed on as many other roads as money would permit. All roads were graded and raked as regular as the weather permitted.

The stone culvert on the Brook road, north of La-Palme's corner, was replaced with a 36 inch cement culvert to take care of the drainage from the pond.

Brush was cut and mowed on most roads where it was necessary. However, there is a great deal more to

be done in the next year.

T.R.A. money was spent on the Brook road from the Amherst line to Gavin's corner, approximately one mile of road. There were four culverts relaid to pass state inspection; the stone bridge was widened approximately six feet and reinforced with steel braces. This road is now ready for tarring.

Tarring money was used for patching on all roads

and the balance is to be used for tarring next year.

I thank everyone for their cooperation and support in my first term as road agent.

DALAND MEMORIAL LIBRARY

A greater effort has been made in 1958 to increase the interest and practical use of the Library and its facilities and a measure of success has rewarded our efforts as shown by the circulation record.

In the spring, the Library sponsored a contest in which the children of the three upper grades were asked to write a short statement on Why I Like to Read. The four winners, Jeanne Crosby, Cynthia Mason, Tom Swanick and Jack Cirioni each received a valuable book donated by one of the library trustees.

In the summer, a reading contest was conducted for all children in the six grades, in which those who read and reported on three books between July 10 and August 21, qualified to attend an Outing at Silver Lake in Hollis. They were given booklets to record the books read, and their names and number of books reported on were displayed on the bulletin board. Thirty-one read a total of 165 books with twenty-one reading the required three or more books. Norman Towne, Robert and Stephen Wilkins having read the largest number, received prizes, and Alice Solovei won one for the best written report. Several new books were procured for this contest and the interest and enthusiasm shown was very rewarding. On August 29, with the mothers providing transportation, and admission and refreshments paid for by Mr. Bailey, an afternoon at the Lake was greatly enjoyed.

Of the 195 books added this year, 70 were for the young people, including several loaned to the school for their use as we are glad to co-operate with the

teachers in every possible way.

Gifts of books are acknowledged from Mrs. Hartsshorn, Miss Daniel, Mrs. Orie Bailey, Mrs. Ross, Mr.

Richard Blanchard, Bobby Goffin, Kay Carleton, Mrs. von Weber and Mrs. Goodwin who gave six books, four in memory of her mother and husband, 34 from the estate of Lucia Auryansen and seven in memory of deceased members of the Wednesday Club from the proceeds of a matured War Bond owned by the Club. A book in loving memory of Lucia Auryansen was given by a friend.

Miss Mary E. Smith, before her death in June, had completed a history of the houses in Mont Vernon which her sister has typed and presented to the Library, a very valuable addition to the historical material available there. We take this opportunity to express our gratitude and to pay tribute to a gifted and appreciative long time friend of the Library.

The new Bookmobile is as always of inestimable help in augmenting our own supply of reading matter.

Gifts of money have been received from Miss Bertha Rogers, Mrs. Cecil F. Smith, Mrs. von Weber and Mrs. Orie Bailey. We also realized a sum from the sale of old books stored in the attic, and we have duplicates of good books we would be glad to sell very reasonably. Old magazines were taken to Mason to be forwarded to the Seaman's Friend Society to be used at the Sailors' Club House on Hanover street in Boston, and others to townspeople desiring them.

Library meetings have been attended at Bedford and Temple. Miss Harper, Library Consultant from the State Library, has visited with us and offered aid and suggestions.

Changes have been made in the Daland Trustees. Mr. Reagon has been appointed to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Lucia Auryansen and Mr. Ernest Gleason having resigned after long years of service, Mr. George Carleton was chosen to fill his place.

The usefulness of the Library has been greatly enhanced by the new and more effective lighting re-

cently installed by the Daland Trustees, filling a long felt want.

Daland Memorial Library was dedicated in August, 1909, and this year will observe its Golden Anniversary with a long recorl of continuous service to the community. May it function with increasing usefulness and efficiency for many years to come.

We have had one road check in town this year in co-operation with the State Police and have also had two road blocks at their request for Wanted Persons. We have had fewer complaints this year but the accident ratio has been higher and they have been more serious than previously. However, we have, for the third year, received a Certificate of Safety from the State, as we have had no fatal accidents. The bicycles in town are still being registered and we find that we have a larger number of bicycles on the road. We have continued to donate our time on weekends for traffic control and find that the numbers of speed warnings have been cut down because of this. Due to the increase in cost of operation, we respectfully suggest that the appropriation for the Police Depart-

ment be increased One Hundred Dollars for the coming

year.

We wish to thank the townspeople for their cooperation with the Police Department during the past year and also the State Police, State Conservation Officers, neighboring police departments, and all others who have rendered us aid and service.

FIRE DEPARTMENT REPORT

Due to the carefulness and the cooperation of the townspeople, the Fire Department had a good year during 1958 with very few fires being reported. Maintenance costs for the trucks was smaller than usual and therefore left a balance of funds to purchase new equipment.

This new equipment included lanterns, boots, raincoats and hose. The latter was changed to a single jacket type which will enable us to double the hose capacity on our trucks. This change was made because we have found that in the past the hose deteriorated before it got much use. The new hose costs considerably less and affords the same protection.

It has become evident that in the near future the possibility of purchasing a new truck will have to be discussed. Our "newest" truck is now about seventeen years old. In view of this the members of the department have been watching for anything that might fill our needs.

The Fire Department will continue to fill the soda acid tanks free of charge as long as the present supply lasts. Anyone wishing to have same checked, please bring them to the fire house on the first Monday evening of any month.

You Can Help Prevent Forest Fires

Twenty-five percent of all forest fires in New Hampshire are caused from careless debris burning - brush, paper, leaves, etc. Most of them are started without the required permit from the local forest fire warden. The cost of extinguishing these fires annually runs into large sums of money.

According to law, responsible parties must pay the cost of putting them out. In addition, violators may be subject to court prosecution with fines running as high

as (\$200) two-hundred dollars.

In the interest of fire prevention why not eliminate burning at home? Use your town dump. It has been set up for your personal convenience. It provides a suitable place for the disposal of dangerous inflammable waste material and other useless items which accumulate around the home and local stores; brush, etc. cut on your property. Eliminate the hazard of burning yourself. It will be easier for you - personally and financially.

If, however, you do burn on your premises:

1. Secure a permit from your local forest fire warden - the law requires it.

2. Be sure to properly supervise your burning. Don't leave it.

3. Make certain your fire is DEAD OUT before leaving it.

Save yourself much possible difficulty. Use your town dump.



WARRANT FOR ANNUAL SCHOOL MEETING The State of New Hampshire

To the Inhabitants of the School District in the Town of Mont Vernon qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said district on the third day of March 1959, at eight o'clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose by ballot, a Moderator for the coming year, a Clerk for the ensuing year, a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years, a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
- 2. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.
- 3. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 4. To choose Agents, Auditors, and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
- 5. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state foundation aid together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.
- 6. To see if the district will vote to petition the state board of education to become part of a cooperative school district of grades one through twelve, said cooperative school district to include the present school

districts of Mont Vernon and Milford, and may include also one or more of the present school districts of Amherst and/or Wilton, and/or Lyndeboro, and/or Brookline if said districts shall also vote at their 1959 school meetings to so petition the state board of education and shall be approved for inclusion by said board in accordance with Revised Statutes Annotated of New Hampshire, Chapter 195 and to elect two representatives from the School District of Mont Vernon, New Hampshire, to serve on an interim committee with like representatives from the School District of Milford and such other like representatives from the other participating district or districts as shall be chosen by said districts to prepare a financial budget for the operation of the proposed cooperative school district and to include in the organization warrant for such cooperative school district an article calling for an appropriation for the first year and to arrange for such other items of business as need to be acted upon at the organization meeting.

- 7. To see if the district will vote to authorize the school board to make application for and to accept, on behalf of the district, any or all grants or other funds for educational purposes which may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the United States Government or from the State of New Hampshire, or from any other source.
- 8. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

I herewith present my twentieth annual report, consisting of this discussion together with other reports printed herewith.

INSTRUCTION

Changes

There were no changes in the teaching staff. The same competent teachers continue for another year.

Salaries

The average salary of classroom teachers in New Hampshire follows:

The differential between our state and the two last states is rapidly closing and the differential in four of the other states is so much higher that it is almost impossible to recruit teachers from Maine or Vermont.

A comparison of teachers with labor or professions is constantly made. Labor works approximately 40 hours per week for 50 weeks or 2,000 hours per year. Some teachers testify to 48 hours for 40 weeks or 1920 hours per year. Surely the professions, teaching is con-

sidered a profession because post-secondary professional training is a pre-requisite to employment, would work as many hours as labor. Therefore, some agreement should be possible as to what percent of labor or profession yearly time the teacher is employed. The claims range from 50 to 85 percent. If we chose an arbitrary figure of 70 percent, with an average salary of \$6,000 for skilled labor and \$8,000 for professions, thus we justify an average salary of \$4,200-\$5,600. Choosing a higher percentage, and many would argue for a much higher one, the average salary of classroom teachers would increase. To my mind, these averages have not yet been reached.

The whole purpose of this discussion is to plead for proper recognition of your teacher—a basic necessity in these days of many miracles—before the levelling off of fiscal matter takes place, leaving inequities unadjusted. We need money to recruit the best candidates to go into teaching and must pay them well

to keep them as teachers.

To keep you aware of our costs as compared with others, I present the following:

These costs do not include transportation and capital outlays and are for 1956-57, the last tabulation available. Five other districts adjacent to this Union are included to show what their financial problem is as well as those of this Union. If later figures were available, the probability is that the same comparison would hold as illustrated above. The average for all pupils in N. H. in 1956-57 was \$235.04 for Elementary and \$350.32 for High School.

SOME OBSERVATIONS

"That scholars will not improve under the best of teachers unless they themselves study or are made to study. The teacher can direct, but the scholar must learn." Such is the quote from a town report of a hundred years ago. Is it none-the-less true today?

President Eisenhower in a recent statement speaks in terms of education as a critical area and needing "goals or standards." We look with interest for a development of this idea. Would it be appropriate in America or is it too Russian for our thinking? Does it mean that everyone must take the same work? Dr. Conant has just published his report of a two year study of American high schools. What he has to say concerns all of us. In the first place he would eliminate the small high school and develop larger area comprehensive schools. He would require certain basic courses of all, place pupils in subject sections according to their ability, have vocational courses for the non-college students, encourage the top 15 percent to take more challenging courses, and give special attention to the highly gifted 3 percent and to pupils of low reading ability. In brief, these are his recommendations.

I make these observations because I think the impact of these opinions will be felt throughout the educational world in the next few years at least. We need to study them carefully.

Private facilities for your teachers for rest and comfort would satisfy often mentioned needs.

OUR HELPING TEACHER

In 1954 the first Helping Teacher's report was published. The program was then in the process of develop-

ment and its main phases were discussed.

Now, after five years, the role of Helping Teacher seems to have crystalized to a considerable degree. The basic purpose will continue to be the same — to help. Since the sole aim of the school is to educate our children the role of Helping Teacher must be that of help to all concerned with this task. The following is a summary of many of the activities at present connected with this position.

Work with and for the Teachers

Class visitations whenever possible average one a week for each teacher. During these visits the teacher's needs are noted and problems considered. Conferences

are arranged if the teacher so desires.

Individual and group conferences are concerned with scheduling, daily and long-range plans, curriculum development, teaching techniques, pupil problems, grouping, promotions, special programs for retarded and gifted, educational materials, etc. Also through individual conferences, progress reports designed to keep the curriculum coordinated as to subject matter, time allotment, and materials, are made twice a year.

The Joplin Plan for better grouping and reading now in effect in four schools requires continued evalua-

tion and consideration.

The Helping Teacher's Bulletin, written each month, is intended to offer helpful suggestions, and to share ideas and useful information.

Group testing. We have a regular testing program from pre-school through Grade 12. Reading readiness tests are given in August to the in-coming first graders. The results are evaluated and the children grouped according to their needs. Other group tests are reading

and mental maturity in Grade One, reading in Grade Two, and by alternation reading, mental maturity, arithmetic and study skills in Grades Three through Nine. A yearly program of reading and language testing is conducted in Grades 10 and 12. Much time is spent in evaluating the tests, interpreting the results and making them available to the teachers. A comparison is made with the results on a Union-wide and on a National basis.

Illustrated talks on various countries and regions of the world are given whenever requested by the teachers. These serve to enrich the social studies program.

Help is given in the selection and use of educational

and professional books and materials.

Much work is done with and through the Principals who, without exception, are very cooperative.

Work With Pupils

Pupils are tested individually when it seems necessary to have additional understanding of their particular needs, or when previous records are incomplete. Upon occasion special help is given an individual or a group. This might be a group activity, remedial work, or even helping a left-handed pupil to write.

Conferences are held with pupils who might be

having problems concerning work or behavior.

Clinics and first grade registration in the several towns provide opportunities for help.

Work With Parents

Many contacts with parents are possible through the reading readiness program. Parents are present when the children take the tests and desire conferences when the results are made known.

Children having difficulty in making adjustments to any of the many phases of school life are referred to the Helping Teacher by the parent. Contact with the parent must be maintained as long as the problem exists.

Miscellaneous Activities

Planning and organizing workshops, extension courses and other in-service training.

Collecting and distributing educational and profes-

sional materials.

Serving on the Steering Commission — a local teachers organization.

Attending school board meetings — Milford regular-

ly, others upon invitation.

Speaking at P. T. A. and other meetings.

Devising tests for certain subject units, but particularly for reading readiness to suit our own needs.

Activities outside the Union would include attendance at Helping Teachers and other educational meetings, conferences at the State Department of Education for the development of a state-wide testing program, as a speaker or consultant at workshops or

study groups.

Cooperation on the part of all those directly or indirectly associated with the above program has been responsible for any measure of its success. And so to the Parents, Teachers, Principals, Members of the School Boards, and Superintendent who have helped me to help our children I am very grateful.
