You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Newfields on Tuesday, the 13th day of March, next, at two of the clock in the afternoon to eight of the clock in the evening, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- 3. To see if the Town will vote to grant a discount on taxes paid in full on or before August 15th, discount to be three per cent.
- 4. To see if the voters will authorize the Selectmen and Town Treasurer to borrow a sum or sums not exceeding in the aggregate \$6,000.00 in anticipation of the collection of taxes for the current municipal year, and to issue in the name and on the credit of the Town negotiable notes therefore, said notes to be repaid during the current municipal year from taxes collected within the current municipal year.
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to pay the Tax Collector the usual two per cent for collecting taxes.
- 6. To see what action the Town will take relative to the authorization of the sale of real estate held or acquired by the Town on account of purchases at tax sales.

- 7. To see what action the Town will take toward the acceptance of rebate by Town Officers, as printed in Town Reports.
- 8. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

To the School Board of Newfields, New Hampshire:

I take pleasure in submitting my third annual report as Superintendent of Schools.

The school year, 1950-1951 started with the following personnel:

Mrs. Elisabeth Mudgett, teacher of Grades 4-6

Mrs. Gladys Clements, teacher of Grades 1-3

Mrs. Eleanor Henry, teacher of music

Miss Nancy Carnegie, school nurse

The fact that there has been no change in the teaching personnel this year results in stability. These teachers all take an unusual amount of interest in the progress and welfare of the boys and girls. I believe that the School District is fortunate to have such experienced and well-trained teachers in charge of the children.

The new boiler and well which were installed this past summer are greatly appreciated by all those who are connected with the school. These improvements result in improved sanitation and more comfortable working conditions for the students and teachers.

Improvements which should now be given consideration are the painting of the exterior of the building and the re-decoration of the classrooms. Both are needed and should probably be done in the order listed.

The Parent-Teacher Association continues its good work for the welfare of the school. The sponsoring of the dental clinic conducted by the State Department of Health is ample proof of this.

The future appears to be uncertain because of conditions both at home and abroad. As more and more of our citizens are mobilized for the armed services and defense plants, it is very probable that the shortage of

qualified teachers will become more and more acute. Also, supplies and materials will become scarce and expensive. I believe this is a challenge for each citizen to make every effort to see that our schools do not suffer any more than is absolutely necessary and that our boys and girls are given the best possible training and instruction during these trying times.

I call your attention to the reports and tables which follow and trust that they will prove of interest to you.

I wish to thank the citizens, the members of the School Board, and the teachers for their continued cooperation and support.

REPORT OF SCHOOL NURSE

To the Superintendent of Schools:

Following is a report of the school nurse from January 1, 1950, to January 1, 1951.

In the spring the school nurse and state health department nurse held a joint pre-school clinic in the Stratham Town Hall.

This fall the state dental trailer arrived and the children received the fluorine treatment. The report of the dental hygienist impressed us with the need for individual dental care.

The same program of health supervision in the schools has been carried out — examinations of skin, hair, vision, hearing, posture, teeth and tonsils; follow-up of defects with home visits if necessary; brief health discussions in the classroom as time permitted.

Following is a report of the physical examination: Number of children examined 37 Defective vision 6 Corrected 3 Defective teeth 31 Defective tonsils 0 Defective hearing 0 Orthopedic defects 0 All children have been vaccinated.

Plans have been made for the children to receive the patch test for tuberculosis in the spring.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank the parents, teachers, school board, and superintendent for their co-operation in our health program.
