

WARRANT.

To the inhabitants of the Town of Northumberland qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at The Grange Hall in said Town on the second Tuesday of March next, to act upon the subjects hereinafter mentioned. The polls will be open at said place and date from 9:00 o'clock in the forenoon until 6:00 o'clock in the afternoon for the reception of your ballots upon the election of Town officers under the Australian Ballot Law; furthermore, you are hereby warned that on said date and place, at 11:00 o'clock in the forenoon, the matters of appropriations and such other business properly coming before said meeting will be taken up for your consideration and action.

- 1. To choose by ballot the following Town Officers for the ensuing year: a Town Clerk, a Town Treasurer, a Tax Collector, two Auditors and one or more Road Agents.
- 2. To choose by ballot the following Town Officers for the ensuing three years: one Selectman, one Library Trustee and one Trustee of the Trust Funds.
- 3. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise to pay TownOfficers and for the support of Town Poor.
- 4. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for the support of the Police Department.
- 5. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for building and repairing highways and bridges, including money for state aid construction.
- 6. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for sewer maintenance.
- 7. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for lighting streets for the ensuing year.
- 8. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for the support of the Public Library.
- 9. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for the observance of Memorial Day.
- 10. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for the employment of a district nurse.

- 11. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for Miscellaneous Expenses.
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to incur debts for temporary loans in anticipapation of the taxes of the ensuing municipal year and to pay such debts out of the tax money when it is received.
- 13. To see if the Town will vote to have a Budget Committee of three members, one elected for one year, one for two years and one for three years, as recommended by the State Tax Commission, for the purpose of budgeting town expenses, etc. Its compensation, if any, shall be fixed by the Selectmen of the Town.
- 14. To see what action the voters will take to consolidate under one head, the town tax, dog tax and water rents and let to the lowest bidder for collection.
- 15. To see what action the voters will take in regard to reducing the salaries of all Town officers, elective and appointive.
- 16. To see what action the voters will take in regard to the salary of the Police Court Judge.
- 17. To see what action the voters will take in regard to the rental of the Lockup and the Selectmen's rooms (so called).
- 18. To see if the Town will vote to establish a lower scale of rates for those using town water.
- 19. To see if the Town will vote to approve an ordinance relating to the observance of the Lord's Day as adopted by the Board of Selectmen February 25, 1933, a copy of which is annexed to this Warrant and made a part hereof.
- 20. To see if the Town will vote for a scale of discounts for the prepayment of real estate and personal property taxes on the basis of three (3) percent if paid by June 1, 1933, two (2) percent if paid by August 1, 1933, and one (1) percent if paid by October 1, 1933, or any other scale of discounts that the town may vote and determine.
- 21. To see what sum of money the Town will raise to construct and maintain a suitable skating rink.

- 22. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the present and past Tax Collectors to execute tax collector's deeds by Sept. 1, 1933, to all real estate to which the town may be entitled to demand deeds.
- 23. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the Town through tax collector's deeds.
- 24. To see if the Town will vote to exercise the power and authority conferred by New Hampshire House Bill No. 203, being an act authorizing the Town of Northumberland to issue refunding bonds, a copy of which is annexed to this Warrant and made a part hereof.
- 25. To see what action the Town will take in regard to purchasing a water pumper for the Fire Department, and raise money for same.
- 26. To transact any other business that may legally be brought before said meeting.

TOWN OF NORTHUMBERLAND

In the Year of Our Lord, One Thousand Nine Hundred and Thirtythree.

AN ORDINANCE RELATING TO OBSERVANCE OF THE LORD'S DAY.

BE IT ENACTED, By the Board of Selectmen of the Town of Northumberland as follows:

- Sect. 1. SPORTS: It shall be lawful to engage in play or in any sport or game involving physical skill on the Lord's Day in the Town of Northumberland, but it shall be unlawful to engage in public dancing, horse racing, boxing, prize fighting, wrestling, pool, billiards, or bowling, and no sport or game in connection with which an admission is charged or at which a donation is made or accepted shall be carried on before one o'clock in the afternoon. The Board of Selectmen may regulate the time, manner, and areas of such play, games or sports.
- Sect. 2. MOTION PICTURES AND THEATRICALS. It shall be lawful for motion pictures, lectures, concerts, and theatrical or vaudeville performances to be held on the Lord's Day in the Town of Northumberland, but not earlier than six o'clock in the afternoon.
- Sect. 3. PENALTY. Any person violating any of the provisions of this ordinance or any rule or regulation made by the Board of Selectmen pursuant thereto shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof, shall be liable to a penalty of not more than ten dollars for each offense.
- Sect. 4. TAKES EFFECT. This ordinance shall take effect upon its approval by a majority of the legal voters of the Town of Northumberland present and voting at the next regular town meeting.

HOUSE BILL No. 203

Introduced by Mr. Cole of Northumberland (Referred to the Committe on Judiciary)

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

In the year of our Lord one thousand nine hundred and thirty-three

AN ACT

Authorizing the Town of Northumberland to Issue Refunding Bonds. Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court convened:

- 1. REFUNDING. The town of Northumberland is hereby authorized and empowered to issue its bonds to the amount of thirty-three thousand (\$33,000) dollars for the purpose of refunding an equal amount of floating debt incurred for the purpose of enlarging its water works.
- 2. MANNER OF ISSUING BONDS. Said issue of bonds shall be payable serially, at the rate of thirty-five hundred (\$3,500) dollars per year for the first six years and at the rate of three thousand (\$3000) dollars per year for the next four years, the first payment to be payable on February 1, 1936, with interest on the whole payable semi-annually.
- 3. APPLICATION OF GENERAL LAW. Except as otherwise provided in this act, the provisions of the Municipal Bonds Act shall apply to the bonds herein authorized.
- 4. EXERCISE OF POWER. Said town may exercise the power and authority herein conferred by a majority of those present and voting at the regular or any special meeting of the legal voters of the town during the year 1933, the warrant for which meeting shall contain an article calling for the consideration of such approval.
 - 5. TAKES EFFECT. This act shall take effect upon its passage.

Can the cost of running our schools be reduced? This is the question which seems to be foremost in the minds of many people this year.

Your School Board has, during the last three years, figured costs very carefully and has cut down expenses just as fast as it has seemed possible to cut them without lowering the standard of our schools. We hope that the voters appreciate the fact that, during the last eight years, your Committee has been able to present a definite budget of expenses to the voters each March and, in every case, has been able to live within the income, after the appropriation has been made.

Last spring our appropriation was \$40,000, or \$5,700 less than it had been during the two previous years. Your Committee adjusted its expenses to fit the smaller income and expects to finish the school year (June 30th, 1933) with a balance of cash on hand as has been done in previous years.

There has been some criticism during the last few months, because teachers' salaries were not reduced last summer. We feel sure that some voters do not fully understand the condition which has existed during the past year.

A part of our money for elementary schools comes from the state. The state law works as follows:—If we raise five dollars for each one thousand dollars of the equalized valuation of the District, and that is not enough to run our elementary schools in accordance with the state standards, the state will give us the extra money needed to bring our schools up to the state standard.

At the present time the five dollar tax in Northumberland furnishes enough money to pay each teacher about \$800. The state standard allows teachers with normal training and four or more years of experience to be paid \$1000. The State Board of Education, therefore, notify us that we may engage trained teachers and agree to pay them up to \$1000 per year. We are to pay them the \$800 which we have raised and the State is to furnish the other \$200.

Now it can be readily seen that, if we reduce salaries from \$1000 to \$900, we will save money for the state but will not save one cent for the District of Northumberland. We would still have to pay our \$800 but the state would have to pay only \$100. If we reduce salaries to \$800, the state would save \$200 on each teacher but we would save nothing. If we should reduce salaries below \$800, we would not be meeting the state's requirements in raising and expending the five dollar tax and would, therefore, lose all our state aid, not only on teachers but on janitors' salaries, fuel, text books, supplies, etc.

Some have been of the opinion that, since a cut in our teachers' salaries would benefit the state, this would reduce our state tax. This is not true. The State Board of Education is given a definite amount of money for aiding Districts which can meet the requirements. If Northumberland refuses to accept all that is due her, that amount will go to some other district. Our state tax would not be affected in the least since we must pay our proportionate part of the lump sum no matter where it is used.

After considering the situation carefully, last spring, your Committee did not think that it would be good business to reduce the salaries of our elementary teachers, thereby giving them less money to spend in town, while the town could not profit one cent by their loss.

We do not receive state aid for high school teachers. Any cut in wages there would save money for the District. But when we come to examine the situation we find that all but three of our high school teachers have been hired since the depression began and hired at a very material reduction from what we paid a few years ago. We are now paying college graduates without experience, \$200 less than we paid three years ago. In other words, seven of our ten teachers at the high school building, have already had a reduction in salary.

Now we are confronted with the question of what is to be done during the coming year. Your Committee is just as anxious as any taxpayers to reduce costs, provided it can be done without injuring our schools.

It is very possible that our equalized valuation will be reduced this year so that the conditions which we have mentioned regarding state aid will be changed. If a change is made, so that a reduction in the salaries of elementary teachers will save money for the town, salaries will be reduced next year. All salaries not affected by the state aid law, will be reduced, provided it seems profitable and advisable.

The costs of supplies have been reduced somewhat during the last year and we expect to save a little on these items. Text books have not been reduced at all. The cost of lights has not been reduced. We are buying our coal at as low a rate as any town between Woodsville and the Canadian line.

One of our fairly large expenditures in past years has been the repairs on school buildings. If we were sure that conditions will be much better in 1934 than they are now, we could lower our appropriation this year by postponing some of our regular repair work. The

high school building needs to be painted on the outside but that could probably be put off for a year or two.

For several years we have made a practice of exchanging our typewriters for new machines as soon as they are three years old. The exchange cost, at the end of three years, is \$30 per machine. This price, of course, increases as the machine grows older. It is possible to save a little for the present by using these machines for more than three years before exchanging them. The difficulty with this idea of postponing payments is that there is sure to come a time when we shall have to make up all that we save this year.

The rest of our items, such as insurance, debt and interest, etc. cannot be changed.

Your committee has gone over every item very carefully and believe that, by cutting wages wherever profitable and by postponing some expenditures which we would make in normal times, we can run the schools next year on an appropriation of \$37,000. This is \$8,700 less than was raised two years ago.
