#### TOWN WARRANT

#### State of New Hampshire

To the inhabitants of the Town of Orford, in the County of Grafton, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs;

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Orford, on Tuesday, the 9th day of March next, at ten of the Clock in the forenoon, to Act on the following subjects:

- Article 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year; Also to choose one Selectman for three years; one Trustee of Trust Funds for three years, one Library Trustee for three years.
- Article 2. To hear the budget of the Town and raise and appropriate any money recommended therein or pass any vote relative thereto.
- Article 3. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to defray Town Charges for the ensuing year.
- Article 4. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for maintenance of Town Highways and Bridges for the ensuing year.
- Article 5. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the removal of snow and care of Town Winter Roads for the ensuing year.
- Article 6. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for insurance purposes.
- Article 7. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the use of electric lights.
- Article 8. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Orford Free Library and Orford Social Library.
- Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes.
- Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to dispense with the distribution of Inventory blanks until the Selectmen appraise the property.

#### TOWN WARRANT - Continued

- Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to sell and administer property acquired by Tax Deed or otherwise.
- Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for the use of the Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Region.
- Article 13. To see if the Town will vote to accept the State Aid for the construction of Class V roads and raise and appropriate the sum of \$549.30 for that purpose.
- Article 14. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for care of Common.
- Article 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$75.00 to cover the expenses of Memorial Day.
- Article 16. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the use of the Fire Department.
- Article 17. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for control of Pine Blister Rust and care of trees.
- Article 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for the Bicentennial Fund of the Town of Orford.
- Article 19. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to be turned over to the Trustees of Trust Funds or spent for fencing the extension to West Cemetery.
- Article 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$200.00 to be paid over to the Federal Airport Project.
- Article 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 to erect a granite historical marker on the northern end of the Orford East Common, stating the extent and purposes of the Common as deeded with the date when the land was deeded and by whom.

#### TOWN WARRANT - Continued

Article 22. To see if the Town will vote to establish a Planning Board of five members with duties as set forth in Sections 1-15 Chapter 36, N. H. Revised Statutes Annotated, 1955, to make a study of the Town's development and report to the Town appropriate recommendations for the promotion and maintenance of the Town's best development.

The Board shall consist of one Selectman and four other citizens appointed by the Selectmen, as provided in Chapter 36, N. H. Revised Statutes Annotated, 1955.

Article 23. To see what action the Town will take concerning the election of a Cemetery Commission of three members, one for three years, one for two years and one for one year; this Commission to formulate rules and regulations for the governing and care of the Orford Cemeteries.

Article 24. To see what action the Town will take in regard to the purchase of Road Equipment, and how much money they will vote to raise and appropriate made necessary by such action.

Article 25. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$1,500.00 to be turned over to the Trustees of Trust Funds to buy Road Equipment.

Article 26. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for increased Police Protection.

Article 28. To hear reports of Agents, Auditors and Committees heretofore chosen and to pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 29. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

The following is a report of the Health Activities conducted in Orford, by the N. H. Division of Public Health — Public Health Nursing for the year 1964.

Child Health Conferences were held at the Congregational Church Vestry on the following dates: 1-16, 5-28, 7-20, and 8-25.

These clinics were serviced by Dr. Jeane Henderson and Dr. Ruth Gosselin, Local Physicians and by Dr. Abbott Winegrad from Concord.

Report of Clinics:

Physical examinations by a physician — 26 children Sabin Oral Polio Vaccine, Types I, II & III —

Number of doses — 67

Diphtheria, Tetanus & Whooping Cough series —

2, Boosters 12

Diphtheria & Tetanus — boosters 23 Tetanus Toxoid — series and boosters 12 Smallpox Vaccinations — 30

At the request of, and with the cooperation of the school physician, immunization clinics were held at the school on the following dates: 5/11, 6/8, 10/5.

Immunizations given:

Sabin Oral Polio Vaccine Types I, II & III — 47 Diphtheria & Tetanus Boosters — 34

Tetanus Toxoid series and boosters — 45

Smallpox Vaccination — 36

It is a satisfaction to know that parents realize the importance of keeping their children's immunizations up to date.

Notifications of the Chest X-ray Mobil Unit at Hanover, and of the N. H. Tuberculosis Clinics held at Lebanon semi-annually, were sent to school tuberculin reactors of previous years and to arrested tuberculosis cases needing annual X-rays. A good number attended for annual X-rays. Reports of findings were sent to all attending for X-rays.

Home visits have been made in the town on babies, preschools, mothers, communicable diseases and other cases as needed. The Nurse cooperated with Department of Public Welfare Case workers assisting families. Visits have been made to Foster Homes caring for Handicapped children.

My sincerest thanks to the school nurse, physicians, school personnel, Mrs. Hebb and her volunteer committee for assistance given on the various health activities. With the assistance of local people and the cooperation of the parents, we are able to make Orford a healthier place to

live and cut down on incidence of communicable diseases.

I appreciate the use of the Congregational Church Vestry throughout the year for clinics. It is central and makes an ideal place to carry out an activity. Thanks to the Trustees for permitting it to be used for this several times in the past year.

### FOREST FIRES

The 1964 forest fire season surpassed the record year of 1963 in both length and severity. For the second successive year, we experienced a rainfall deficiency of more than ten inches and the compounding of such drought conditions, together with the many days of strong, dry winds, characterized 1964 as one of the most hazardous years in the past half century. Although our fire season was three weeks longer than that of 1963, the number of fires showed only a slight increase and more remarkable was the fact that the area burned dropped from 2280 acres in 1963 to 900 acres in 1964. Early dettection and rapid response kept many potential fire disasters from becoming reality. We all owe a debt of gratitude to the men in this community who responded and fought our fires so efficiently. Our state is now 86% wooded and its economy - both industrial and recreational — is greatly dependent on this forest resource. The responsibility for adequate fire protection of this great area—4,350,000 acres—is everyone's responsibility and prevention is one of our most effective tools.

Prevention is good common sense.

- 1. Take your rubbish to the town dump. If you must burn, obtain a permit and watch your fire until it is dead out.
- 2. Instruct your children in fire safety. Keep matches from young children. Explain to them the dangers of lighting matches and making outdoor fires.
- 3. Be sure discarded smoking material and matches are out.

A major portion of our preventable fires this year are chargeable to three causes: (1) permit fires allowed to escape; (2) children playing with matches; and (3) smokers. Let's be mindful of the fact that all such fires endanger property and lives.

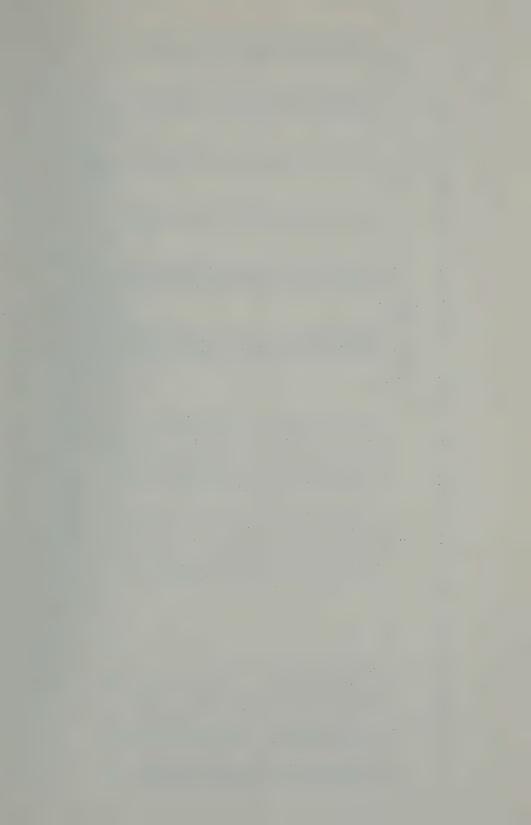
We wish to thank you for your fine cooperation during the past fire season and with your continued cooperation we are confident that we can improve our fire record in 1965.

- Article 7. To choose Agents, Auditors, and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this Warrant.
- Article 8. To see if the District will favor the discontinuance of the Orford High School, consisting of Grades 9 through 12, and authorize the School Board, or a majority of the School Board, to join with twenty or more legal voters of the town or district in a petition to the Grafton County Superior Court under the provisions of New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated Chapter 194:35 requesting the discontinuance of the Orford High School; or to take any action incidental to or in connection with the foregoing matter.
- Article 9. To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate, in addition to the original appropriation for 1964-65, a sum of money in the amount of One Thous-

and Five Hundred Thirty-three Dollars and Two Cents (\$1,533.02) to be made available to the School District prior to July 1, 1965, in order to meet obligations due primarily to an unanticipated reduction in tuition receipts.

Article 10. To see what sum of money the District will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the payment of salaries for school district officials and agents and for the payment of the statutory obligations of the District.

(This will include \$500.00 for the National Defense Education Act.)

Article 11. To see if the District will vote to sell the land and buildings known as the Orfordville School, together with the contents of said School, upon such terms and conditions and at such a price as may be determined by the School Board, and authorize the School Board or a majority of the School Board to execute and deliver on behalf of the District deeds, and bills of sale to said property and take any other action that may be necessary to carry this vote into effect; or to take any action incidental to or in connection with the foregoing matter.

Article 12. To see if the District will vote to authorize the School Board to pay tuition of high school students attending other high schools or academies, approved by the School Board, not to exceed Five Hundred Ten Dollars (\$510.00) per pupil.

Article 13. To see if the District will vote to authorize the School Board to use a part of the proceeds from the sale of the Orfordville School and contents, not to exceed the amount of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000.00), to renovate and improve Memorial Hall, or to take any action incidental to or in connection with the foregoing matter.

Article 14. To see if the District will authorize continuation of a planning committee of six to study the educational problems of the District in conjunction with such surrounding Districts as may be interested to determine the feasibility of forming a regional school district.

Article 15. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

### ANNUAL REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Orford:

I hereby present my annual report for 1964.

Several staff changes in the system during the past year are worthy of note. Mr. Stewart G. Davis assumed his duties July 1 as Assistant Superintendent of Schools for Business Management and he has been an invaluable aid in the Superintendent's office. We were fortunate, indeed, to have secured the services of an extremely able new Principal, Mr. John F. Kenny, succeeding Mr. Richard C. Hamilton who resigned in order to continue his graduate studies at Boston University. The untimely resignation of Mrs. Ramona Flanagan for health reasons shortly after the beginning of school presented a very serious staffing problem and it was very fortunate that we were able to secure the services of Mrs. Lois Marcet as grade one teacher in the Orfordville School. I wish to take this opportunity to express my gratitude for the cooperation, assistance and educational interest of the School Board, staff, custodians, Cooperative Planning Committee and many other townspeople of Orford.

During the summer the School Board, the elementary teachers, Mr. Hamilton, Mr. Kenny and I made a very strong effort to initiate curriculum organization changes in the elementary grades. With little time and with little to work with in the way of test data, materials, and equipment, we started a non-graded primary program for grades one through four and a departmentalized intermediate program for grades five through eight. This means that in the primary grades students are allowed to progress at their own rate of speed without having to consider grade levels in the traditional sense. In grades five through eight the students change classes for each subject and this allows the teachers in those grade levels to concentrate in one or two teaching fields as opposed to having to teach all of the subjects every day. It is too early to assess the results of these two program changes at this date. However, early observations would indicate a fairly high degree of success with the primary program which has been concerned mainly with reading and which we hope to expand next year to include both language arts and mathematics. The departmentalized intermediate program (grades five through eight) has been hampered somewhat by lack of both sufficient classroom space and an additional teacher. It is hoped that both of these conditions can be remedied in the near future and that the program in grades five through eight can be materially strengthened.

I will now direct attention to the most immediate problem in the Orford educational system, namely the problem which has been under discussion for the past few weeks relative to the adoption of the School Board's plan to operate an eight-grade elementary school with the high school students going to other high schools on a tuition basis. By the time you read this, many discussions will have been held relative to this topic and it is my hope that the people of Orford will consider the matter with as little emotion as possible, will consider the facts very carefully, and will act with but one goal in mind — the best educational advantage and opportunity for the children of Orford.

The most pressing and the most urgent consideration in this respect must be the educational program for the children. The High School has been, according to all records and reports, a constant drain, both financially and educationally, on the entire school program for a good number of years. As a case in point, the present operating budget for the school is approximately \$5,000.00 in the red at this writing (January 15) and it has been in this status since the middle of last fall. We are attempting to reduce this deficiency by cutting back on expenditures in the operating budget. There were many books, tests, supplies, and equipment budgeted a year ago which cannot now be purchased because of this current deficit. The reason for the deficit is twofold: (1) a drop in tuition students which could have been even more disasterous were it not for increased sweepstakes revenue, and (2) emergency but temporary repairs to heating systems, roofs, and other parts of the buildings just to open the schools.

The operation of the High School for one hundred students is an uneconomic and educationally unsound pro-

position. Many studies conducted by experts throughout the country have demonstrated that in order to offer an adequate educational program there must be at least one hundred students in the graduating class and this assumes a total school population of somewhere between four hundred fifty and five hundred students in grades nine through twelve (to take care of drop-outs, etc.). Financial experts have pointed out repeatedly that a functional high school program cannot operate on a financially sound basis unless the enrollments are somewhere between five and six hundred students. One fact which must be considered and which is undeniable is the fact that Orford's per pupil cost at the high school level are among the highest in the state of New Hampshire. Because of the high cost of having to operate a high school program and the tremendous amount of attention which the high school program has to have and still there is no guidance counselor, no librarian, and other important instructional staff members — the elementary program, the formative and extremely important early years in a child's education, has had to take a back seat. I repeat that by concentrating on a one through eight (grades) elementary school this town, with its avid interest in education has the potential to develop one of the finest elementary schools in the state of New Hampshire, I urge that this be your course of action.

We are engaged in a cooperative school district planning study. It has been stated that perhaps we should wait until this study has been completed and a cooperative district has been formed. I point out to you that this, by all of the estimates that we have been able to get at this time, looks to be between three and five years away. There seems to be no possible way financially to keep this high school operating for another three to five years. I would like to point out, moreover, that these high school students will go this way but once and it is extremely important that they are not forced to spend four years in what, at best, may be only a marginal educational program. I do wish to emphasize, however, that it is apparent that many of our teachers have done an excellent job through the years under conditions which were not ideal. I am quite sure, also, that some of our high school students have been well trained in the past. I wish to point out, however, that our immediate concern is not with the past; it is with the present and with the future. Modern curriculum developments and both collegiate and skilled-labor requirements and standards have risen at an extremely rapid rate during the past few years. Standards in all fields of endeavor will continue to rise rapidly. It is extremely important that we provide these students with the best possible educational background to meet these demands. It is my considered professional opinion that these students would be much better off for the next few years in some of the surrounding high schools which will be in a better position to offer a better program than what we can offer here. I hope that you think very seriously about this and that you consider these students and their future before you consider the emotional side of "losing the high school". I urge you to weigh very carefully the future of these students as opposed to the possible social value to the town of the high school.

This is certainly one of the most difficult and one of the most unpleasant tasks that any school administrator could possibly be called upon to perform. I feel, however, that I can approach you as a completely objective professional educational administrator. I have absolutely no obligation and absolutely no vested interest in the town of Orford, My only interest, and I can come to you openly and sincerely with this attitude, is in the best possible educational future for the boys and girls of Orford. I know you can readily understand how much easier it would have been for me not to have become involved with this proposal at this time. It would have been far more easy to nod my head, state that everything is just fine, and continue to try to keep things going. If I had to answer to an adult population, I would not hesitate to do this as it would be a far easier road for me to travel. I could not take this road knowing that I would be derelict in my duty and guilty of perpetrating a complete injustice upon many children in the town of Orford — children who certainly deserve the very best possible educational opportunity.

I sincerely urge that this town give its overwhelming support to the School Board and its present proposal. It has taken far more courage on the part of the Board than I have had to exhibit to face these problems squarely and come to the present conclusions. This is not an altogether pleasant task. The Board has approached the problem in the most commendable manner after nearly several full

months of very diligent study and consideration and many long extra meetings. I urge that you follow this proposal and I caution you that if an attempt is made to operate the high school, there is every possibility that not only will costs in taxes be approximately \$15,000.00 more than under the School Board's proposal, but that there is every likelihood that we may lose our federal aid for the vocational program due to drops in enrollment in the vocational subjects and that there will have to be additional monies spent for the mere operation of the Orfordville School. There is also the possibility that, as more and more schools join Cooperative School Districts or cooperative planning boards, there will be even further decreases in the tuition enrollments. The total picture in the financial field is very dismal, indeed. It would look as though the most conservative estimate in costs for continuing to operate a high school program of a doubtful and minimal nature would be from \$15,000.00 to very close to \$25,000.00 in tax money over and above what it would cost to adopt the School Board's proposal. I would also like to point out that it is entirely possible that in another year we may not receive approval as an approved area vocational school or as an approved high school in the state of New Hampshire. As a matter of fact, continued approval is somewhat questionable for the present school year.

This has not been an easy report to write. I hope that future reports will be more pleasant. I sincerely hope that this community will rally behind its School Board and support the Board in what is an extremely difficult and trying decision.

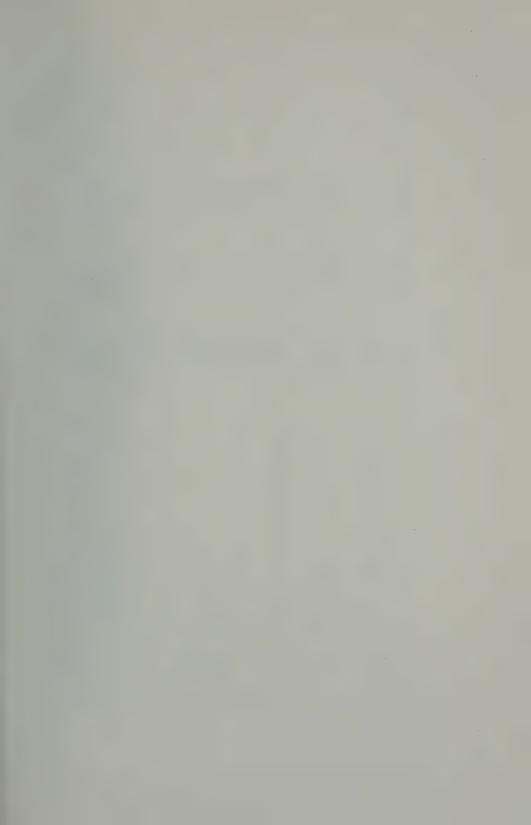
