WARRANT

The State of New Hampshire

THE POLLS WILL BE OPEN FROM 10:00 A.M. to 6:00 P.M.

To the Inhabitants of the Town of PITTSBURG in the County of Coos in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Pittsburg on Tuesday, the Eleventh day of March, next at 10:00 of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To bring in your ballots for the election of one Selectman, for three years; one Road Agent for the Lake District; one Road Agent for the Middle District; one Road Agent for the Lower District; a Town Clerk, for three years; a Treasurer; three Auditors; one Overseer of the Welfare; a Library Trustee, for three years; one Trustee of the Trust Funds; a Moderator, for two years; and one Supervisor of the Checklists, for six years.
2. To see if the Town will vote to give the Selectmen authority to appoint all necessary Town Officers not listed under Article 1.
3. To see if the Town will vote to give the Selectmen authority to hire money in anticipation of taxes.
4. To see if the Town will vote to observe Old Home Day and elect a committee to set a date and manage the Old Home Day observance.
5. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of one thousand dollars (\$1,000) for the Upper Connecticut Valley Mental Health Service.
6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of five hundred dollars (\$500) for the new Vershire Center.
7. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of one thousand three hundred fifty-six dollars and sixty-seven cents (\$1,356.67) for the White Mountains Region Association.
8. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of six hundred dollars (\$600) and appropriate same for the operating expenses and matching funds for Northern Coos Community

Health Association.

9. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate eight hundred twenty-five dollars (\$825) as the Town share of the operation of the North Country Council, Inc.
10. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate twelve thousand five hundred dollars (\$12,500) for screened gravel or hot-top to be put on Town Roads, and authorize the withdrawal of the amount required for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.
11. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate in addition to the budget for the maintenance of highways.
12. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following resolution, as a guideline to the Selectmen in layout of a highway under RSA, Chapter 234, or the acceptance of dedicated highway under RSA 230:1.:

That such highway not be laid out or accepted unless such highway shall meet the following standards:

- [1] A minimum right-of-way of thirty (30) feet;
 - [2] an eighteen-foot traveled surface;
 - [3] a minimum of one foot of gravel or its equivalent;
 - [4] a minimum culvert size of twelve (12) inches;
 - [5] a minimum of a four-foot to one-foot slope from edge of highway to ditch-line; and
 - [6] suitable drainage approved by the Selectmen and Road Agent.
13. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the Brown Road, so-called, leading from U. S. Route #3 to the so-called Brown farm, as allowed by RSA 238:1.
 14. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the road leading from U. S. Route #3 to the Johnson hill farm, so-called, as allowed by RSA 238:1.
 15. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate one thousand dollars (\$1,000) for a Recreation Program and authorize the withdrawal of the amount required for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.
 16. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to establish a Capital Reserve Fund for the purpose of Solid

Waste Disposal and to transfer the unexpended balances of previous appropriations for that purpose into said Capital Reserve Fund, pursuant to RSA Chapter 35.

17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of five thousand dollars (\$5,000) for the Solid Waste Disposal Capital Reserve Fund and authorize the withdrawal of this sum for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.
18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of four thousand dollars (\$4,000) for a town playground and park and authorize the withdrawal of the amount required for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.
19. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to apply for, accept and expend federal Bureau of Outdoor Recreation funds (and any other funds) to be used for the construction of a town playground and park at Pittsburg.
20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate six hundred ninety dollars (\$690) for emergency dispatch services.
21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate six hundred dollars (\$600) for a Town Flag.
22. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the board of Selectmen to apply for, accept and expend money from the state, federal or another governmental unit or a private source which becomes available during the year in accordance with the procedures set forth in RSA 31:95-b.
23. To see if the Town will vote to accept the budget and raise money for same.
24. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

POLICE DEPARTMENT REPORT

During the year 1979 the Pittsburg Police Department received 374 calls through the emergency communications center in Colebrook and 198 radio calls from state police Troop F. At home, we received around 200 calls by telephone, making a total of 772 calls from the public and other law enforcement agencies. There were 29 reportable motor vehicle accidents and 37 non-reportable accidents.

A new radar was purchased, with 98 warnings and 21 speeding cases prosecuted. For the year we had a total of 39 motor vehicle court cases.

There were eleven camps reported broken into during the year. In addition to investigations and court cases we worked with the U. S. Border Patrol, U. S. Customs Patrol, N. H. State Police and Fish and Game, and with law enforcement officers in other towns.

At this time the Department would like to thank everyone in the Town of Pittsburg for their help and cooperation in 1979.

FIRE DEPARTMENT REPORT

The Pittsburg Fire Department held its usual monthly meetings during 1979, as well as training sessions and schools. Three drills were held and 20 men attended 10 hours of school. This year the men of the Department have donated over 500 hours on truck maintenance and related work around the station. I would like to point out that this is not a paid department. It does not cost the town any wages for fighting fire or maintenance of the equipment and station. And on this note, I would like to point out—if you have a chimney fire—CALL US. Even if you have a new, sound chimney we would rather you be safe than sorry.

This coming year (1980) we look forward to finishing the extension of our water line to the station, now that the paper work has been concluded. All the materials for this we have on hand. We also anticipate installing some new and/or improving some existing water sources.

PITTSBURG AMBULANCE SERVICE ANNUAL REPORT

Pittsburg Ambulance Corps started the year 1979 with eighteen active members. At present we have thirteen, as some members have moved from Pittsburg.

Madelene Judd is now teaching a Red Cross Advanced First Aid and Emergency Care Course in Pittsburg. There are 23 people attending these classes and hopefully some will join our Ambulance Corps on completion of the course.

Every member has to take the CPR course yearly and our EMT's must have a refresher course this year.

We are all very proud of the new ambulance which we got in July of 1979.

A Blood Pressure Clinic is still sponsored monthly by Pittsburg Ambulance Corps, Madelene Judd, co-ordinator, and Northern Coos Community Health, who provide an RN each time to assist with blood pressures.

We still have oxygen units available in four areas in Pittsburg. They are available at Robert Gray's (Indian Stream), Powder Horn Lodge (Back Lake), the ambulance station (village), and Martin Hewson's (First Lake). There will be a unit at Hall Stream as soon as we have someone there trained to administer oxygen. We also have extra splints and equipment at the ambulance station to use should the ambulance be out of town on a run.

During 1979 we had a total of 86 runs, 36 emergency runs and 50 transfers.

We extend our gratitude to the people of Pittsburg for their generous support and will continue to serve you in 1980.

REPORT OF DISTRICT FOREST FIRE CHIEF AND YOUR FOREST FIRE WARDEN

Prevention and control of forest fires is handled through a cooperative effort between town/city fire organizations and the State Forest Fire Service.

Since 1903, when the first forest fire laws were passed by our Legislature, the State Forester has appointed someone in each municipality as a Forest Fire Warden and charged him with the responsibility of forest fire prevention and control within his town/city. This person may ask the State Forester to appoint as many Deputy Forest Fire Wardens as may be necessary to efficiently carry out his charge.

The State Forester has divided the State into ten forest fire districts with a full time District Forest Fire Chief in each district. The State organization is charged with assisting the municipal forest fire organization in any way possible.

State personnel conduct fire training schools, assist with forest fire suppression, fire cause investigation, prosecution of fire law violators and forest fire prevention programs. Forest fire suppression equipment is purchased through State bulk purchasing ability and sold to local forest fire organizations at one-half cost. Excess military property is obtained and turned over to town/city fire departments at no cost to local departments for conversion into fire suppression units. This cooperative arrangement between State and municipality has resulted in one of the best forest fire records in the United States with less than one-half acre of woodland burned in each fire reported.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

This year's report will focus on the academic performance of pupils in School Administrative Unit No. 7.

A great deal of public concern has been expressed in past years regarding declining scores of the S.A.T. college entrance examinations in the areas of English and Mathematics and also the decline of basic fundamental academic skills in the public schools. Responding to this concern School Board members in the local school districts agreed to conduct annual formal evaluations of academic skills in grades 1-11. Tests being used to conduct this evaluation in grades 1-8 are the Metropolitan, Stanford and S.R.A. Achievement Tests, and the California Test of Basic Skills for grades 9-11.

It should be emphasized that no one single achievement test or basic skills test can accurately measure an individual pupil's true overall academic ability or potential. From a classroom teacher's viewpoint, however, what the tests can indicate over a number of years are the strengths and weaknesses that a pupil may have in the areas tested. From an administrative view, group test scores or entire grade test scores give an indication of how well local pupils at a particular level are performing in various academic areas when compared to a national standard.

The general areas tested are Reading, Mathematics, Social Studies, Language Arts, Science and Reference Skills. The general area of Reading evaluates skills of reading comprehension and vocabulary. Reading Comprehension skills are evaluated in terms of being able to restate given material, putting written material in proper sequence and summarizing, being able to draw an inference from a written passage or applying the concepts read to new situations, and also recognizing logical relationships.

The area of Language Arts evaluates skills in capitalization, internal punctuation, external and special punctuation, identifying parts of speech, and also skills in spelling.

The Mathematics area evaluates skills in math concepts which covers numeration, operations, problem solving, geometry and measurement. Math computation skills are also evaluated, and covered in this category are skills involved in adding, subtracting, multiplying and dividing whole numbers, fractions, decimals and percents.

The Social Studies area evaluates skills in map reading, interpretation of pictures and graphs, geography, history, political science, sociology, anthropology and reading.

The Science area evaluates knowledge of living things and relationships, matter and energy, earth and space, experimentation, charts and tables, and reading.

The area of Reference Skills evaluates skills in usage of the dictionary, table of contents, index, references, catalog cards, maps, charts, graphs, research and general library skills.

The following test results for the school year 1978-79 for grades 4-8-11 are submitted for the Pittsburgh School District. Group or grade performance is measured in terms of a National Stanine Score. A National Stanine Score of 1-2-3 is below average, 4-5-6 is average, and 7-8-9 above average.

GUIDANCE COUNSELOR'S REPORT

This past year Project C.H.O.I.C.E., the federally funded Career Education Program, finished writing the curriculum for grades 2, 4 and 8 and had them approved by the State Coordinator. The On-Site Visitation Committee, which reviews the program annually, was most impressed with the atmosphere of cooperation between the public and non-public facilities in the District and also the spirit of dedication radiated by the teachers involved in the project.

In the current school year the program curriculum will be implemented in grades 2, 4 and 8 on a unit basis. As recommended by the state committee, the teachers of grade 6 will design, write and try out a curriculum on Career Education for their grades.

This past summer, under the direction of Richard Bond, groups of students from grade 8 of Colebrook Elementary wrote, produced and videotaped programs dealing with careers in Forestry, Fish and Game occupations and Hotel work. All these tapes featured local people and their work.

The program, affording all parents of eighth graders an opportunity to confer with the Guidance Counselor regarding their children's subjects for high school, was expanded to include all schools in the district. The success of this program assures its continuance in future years.

SCHOOL HEALTH REPORT

Both Stewartstown and Pittsburg have health programs that strive to maintain high health standards. Combined efforts of parents and school are what makes them work.

Dr. Marjorie Parsons and Dr. William Gifford, our school physicians, once more provide their professional advice for our students.

Our health team provides the following services:

1. Height and weight checks
2. Hearing and vision testing
3. Physical exams for students in grades 4, 8 and 11 (also those participating in sports and new students)
4. Tuberculin testing as needed
5. Immunization clinics
6. Urine testing for grades 4, 8 and 11 and offered to any of diabetic history
7. Scoliosis screening for grades 5, 6 and 7
8. First aid and emergency care
9. Phone and letter contacts for follow-ups
10. Home visits
11. Encouragement and aid in promoting good mental health
12. General health instruction and supervision.

North Country Education Services provides speech therapy for students needing assistance.

Sight Conservation is still available to our students. It is a program that lends financial aid when needed for vision examinations and glasses.

Bureau of Handicapped Children provides orthopedic examinations and follow-ups.

New Hampshire Division of Public Health sponsors a pre-school vision and hearing clinic in mid-May for early detection of problems.

Students in grades 1-6 in Pittsburg and in grades 1-8 in Stewartstown participate in a Fluoride Rinse Program. This is presented by the New Hampshire Bureau of Dental Health. The purpose of the program is to develop good oral hygiene habits and eliminate plaque.

Portsmouth Rehabilitation Center provides a mobile unit for our area. They evaluate students having failed school screenings for hearing.

Upper Connecticut Valley Mental Health Services provides professional services for our students.

Parents of pre-school children should please remember that there are requirements for first grade entry. Failure to comply with the requirements could mean having your child excluded from school. Therefore, we urge you to take advantage of the various pre-school clinics held in the area. The requirements are as follows:

1. Physical examination
2. Tuberculin test
3. Diphtheria, pertussis and tetanus vaccine series (5 needed)
4. Oral polio vaccine series (5 needed)
5. Rubella (German measles) vaccine
6. Rubeola (measles) vaccine.

PITTSBURG-CLARKSVILLE TITLE I ESEA

The Pittsburg-Clarksville Title I Program is a federally funded project designed to give extra help in reading for children who need it in grades one through three. It provides a pre-school program that stresses (1) reading readiness, (2) pre-school math skills and (3) an early development of social skills.

A national standardized test, given in the fall and in the spring, determines a child's eligibility for the program.

Children who are eligible for help in grades one through three meet with the Title I teacher for special help in reading for one hour, for each grade, each school day. Phonics, vocabulary, spelling and reading comprehension are emphasized.

The Title I teacher spends each afternoon of each school day with pre-schoolers teaching pre-school skills. There are group meetings for pre-schoolers twice each week in the Title I room at the Pittsburg School. The children learn to correctly use and share school materials. A Title I library and library nook are part of the Title I room. Pre-schoolers are introduced to the school library and encouraged to choose books. Activities for the pre-school program are planned to develop confidence, improve self-discipline and to enrich social skills.

Title I sponsored a teacher-aide volunteer program. Special thanks go to Mrs. Mona Haynes and Mrs. Sharon Rodrigue who are participating in the program. Their help has been most valuable.

Title I sponsored and planned the program given by pre-schoolers and grades one through three at the Coos County Nursing Home during the Christmas season. Their Christmas songs and carols were enjoyed by many of the residents of the Home. Thanks go to Mr. Claude Wheeler who gave bus transportation for the trip.

The Title I teacher and the Project Director attended a spring workshop dealing with project evaluations which are made at the close of each year.

In December, Elizabeth vonDohrmann, John Shields and Kate Lord attended a regional workshop that dealt with parent involvement. This was held in Littleton.

December 7th, Mrs. Brenda Machos attended a RIF (Reading is Fundamental) Workshop in Manchester. She plans to report on

the workshop at the Parent Council meeting in January.

The Title I Program observes the various holidays: Halloween, Christmas and Valentines Day. During the past winter, the pre-schoolers and their mothers visited a maple sugar house and watched the sugar-making process. A field trip to the Maple Sugar Museum and the Fairbanks Museum in St. Johnsbury was enjoyed in May. Many thanks to all the mothers who helped chaperone the trip.

The "May Presentation" completes the Title I Program. An interesting activity was presented by all children in the program in May, 1979. Diplomas were awarded to pre-schoolers and Certificates of Merit to Title I pupils in grades one through three. A gratifying representation of parents, teachers and friends attended the program. A social hour followed when questions were answered and observations made.

The teachers in grades one through three have been very cooperative in coordinating a workable reading program. The Parent Council has helped greatly with suggestions, encouragement and attendance at Title I events.

The program was very fortunate in having Mrs. Elaine (Kinney) Campbell return for the third year and in having Mrs. Elizabeth vonDohrmann serve as Chairperson of the Parent Council for the second year. Both of them have worked most conscientiously for the success of the Pittsburg-Clarksville Title I ESEA Program.
