





## TOWN WARRANT STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

[L. S.] To the Inhabitants of the Town of Surry in the County of Cheshire in said State, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Surry on Tuesday, the tenth day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary town officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To hear the report of the Budget Committee and take any action in relation thereto.
- 3. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- 4. To see if the town will vote to accept state aid construction on highways and raise the sum of \$543.00 for the same, or will accept state aid for construction on class five road and raise the sum of \$165.57.
- 5. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for repairs on highways and bridges.
- 6. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$100.00 for the purchase of snow fence.
- 7. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$75.00 for a stairway and repairs on settees in the town hall.
- 8. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$130.00 to renew the insurance on the town hall for three years.

- 9. To see how much money the town will vote to raise for Old Home Day.
- 10. To see what action the town will take in regard to the rent of the town hall and janitor's salary.
- 11. To see what action the town will take in regard to the West Hill schoolhouses, or take any action in relation thereto.
- 12. To see how much money the town will appropriate for Memorial Day.
- 13. To see how much money the town will raise for aid of poor.
- 14. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen and treasurer to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
  - 15. To hear the reports of the town officers.
  - 16. To allow accounts.
- 17. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

## REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Surry:

I herewith submit my second report as Superintendent of Schools.

#### ORGANIZATION AND ENROLLMENT

No changes were made in the teaching positions this year. The advantage of retaining qualified teachers has been apparent.

Standard achievement tests in all the fundamental subjects were given to the pupils in grades five to eight inclusive. Standard graduation tests were administered to the eighth grade pupils previous to graduation. The results of the tests were tabulated for purposes of comparison and indicated that the pupils generally were doing satisfactory work for their grades.

The testing program this year is principally diagnostic in nature. The purpose is to diagnose difficulties and weaknesses which may occur in the fundamentals. The results are to be used as a guide to instruction and as a basis for remedial work. In each school a program for remedial work will be developed in accordance with the needs of the pupils as indicated by the results of the tests. Attention will be given to individual as well as to group needs.

Both teachers attended the sessions at the State Teachers' Convention and at the Institute for Rural Teachers held at Sullivan. General letters containing specific suggestions in class and school management have been issued. A professional library of fifty-eight volumes is being circulated from the superintendent's office. The library consists of books dealing with class management and teaching problems.

The interest of the Grange in furnishing candy and oranges for the children at Christmas, is appreciated.
