STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Unity in the County of Sullivan in said State, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Unity on the second Tuesday of March next — March 10, 1959 — at ten o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

To choose all necessary Officers, Agents and Trustees, for the ensuing year under the Australian Ballot System.

1. To choose a Selectman for the ensuing three years.
2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing one year.
3. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing one year.
4. To choose an Overseer of Public Welfare for the ensuing one year.
5. To choose a Tax Collector for the ensuing one year.
6. To choose an Auditor for the ensuing one year.
7. To choose a Highway Agent for the ensuing one year.
8. To choose a Library Trustee for the ensuing three years.
9. To choose a Trustee of Trust Funds for the ensuing three years.

BUSINESS MEETING CALLED TO ORDER AT 2 O'CLOCK

1. To hear the report of the Selectmen and other Town Officials and pass any vote in relation thereto.
2. To choose all other necessary Town Officers.
3. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for other Town Charges.
4. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to pay Librarian's Salary and Library Tax.
5. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for Old Age Assistance and Town Poor Charges.
6. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to pay just debts of Town.
7. To see what sums of money the Town will vote to raise for maintenance of highways and bridges, snow removal, and determine price to be paid for labor and trucks.
8. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$300.00 for the control of Blister Rust.

9. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$758.55 for Town Road Aid. If this sum is raised the State will contribute \$5,056.97.
10. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$500.00 for the benefit of the Unity Volunteer Fire Dept., Inc., the Fire Dept. to have authority to spend any part of this money for Civilian Defense equipment for the Fire Department.
11. To see if the Town will vote by ballot to authorize the Selectmen to dispose of property acquired by Tax Collector's Deeds.
12. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes
13. To see if the Town will vote to raise one-hundredth of one per cent of valuation for the benefit of the Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Association.
14. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray the Town's share of Social Security.
15. To see if the Town will vote to raise _____ to be expended in cooperation with the New Hampshire Forestry and Recreation Commission for the opening and maintaining of trails and old roads for forest fire protection. The New Hampshire Forestry and Recreation Commission to provide a matching sum not in excess of \$25.00 for this purpose.
16. To see if the Town will appropriate the sum of \$250.00 for Civil Defense.
17. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to appoint an Inspector of Buildings who shall hold office for a term of one year, and by vote fix and regulate his compensation as authorized by Section 1, Chapter 156, N. H. Revised Statutes Annotated, 1955.
18. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following Building Regulations as authorized under Sections 2-5 inclusive, Chapter 156, N. H. Revised Statutes Annotated, 1955.

BUILDING REGULATIONS FOR THE TOWN OF UNITY

1. The Inspector of Buildings shall be appointed by the Selectmen annually and shall be the administrative officer of this ordinance. He shall receive applications and fees for the erection of buildings and electric wiring thereof as provided in this ordinance; shall keep complete records of all applications and his action on the applications; promptly survey and inspect all buildings, or uses proposed, accept and deposit with the Town Treasurer all fees collected by him under this ordinance, and may issue permits for erection of all buildings, and use

of land, if in his opinion the proposal complies with the law of the State, this ordinance, and other town ordinances and by-laws, provided that in any instance where license or permit fees for uses are required his permits shall constitute only an approval on which the proper authority may issue a license on payment of required fees; any other duties prescribed by law may coincide or conflict; and shall take such action in the enforcement of this ordinance as may be directed by the Selectmen.

2. No building construction shall be started; and no building shall be put to any different use than on the day of enactment of this ordinance until a permit thereof has been issued under the terms of this ordinance.
3. No application for a permit required by this ordinance shall receive action by the Building Inspector unless made in writing. All applications for a permit to build or construct any building shall be accompanied by a sketch or plan of the proposed building and a statement of its intended use when built, or constructed. A fee of one dollar shall be paid for all permits issued. A building permit shall become void unless operations are commenced within six (6) months from date of approval, unless such time is extended by the building official.
4. Upon receiving such application the Building Inspector shall promptly take such action as may be indicated in the way of merits of the application. He may, without judging the application on its merits, refer the application to the Board of Adjustment. If, however, he finds the proposed building, or use of proposed buildings to conform with the law and this ordinance he may at once issue the permit in writing over his signature. If he finds the proposal in any conflict with the law or this ordinance he shall fix whatever restrictions or conditions on the proposed construction or use as may be in his best judgement, right and proper, or for reasonable cause refuse the permit.
5. No building or structure shall be erected, unless in compliance with the following:
 - a. **Commercial Building.** No building intended or designed to be used for industrial, commercial, or other public use shall be erected, or used for any purpose which does not provide noncombustible walls and partitions between its component parts.
 - b. **Exits.** No building intended or designed for any public use or congregation of people shall be erected, or used for

any purpose which does not provide adequate exits, as described in Chapter 156 and Chapter 155, N. H. Revised Statutes Annotated, 1955, and in the regulations of N. H. Fire Marshall's office.

- c. **Garages.** No public garage for the storage of five or more automobiles, or having any service or repair enterprises, connected therewith shall be erected, unless the building is so constructed, that it shall be of slow burning or non-combustible material, except the use of automatic sprinklers may obviate the use of such slow-burning or non-combustible materials.
- d. **Roofs.** No roof of any building shall be covered or re-covered in whole or in part save with non-combustible or fire resistant roofing materials.
- e. **Chimney Construction.** Chimneys shall be constructed of brick, stone, masonry or any other material suitable for chimney construction and accepted by national standards. Chimneys shall extend at least 3 feet above the highest point where they pass through the roof of a building and at least 2 feet higher than any portion of the building within 10 feet. No chimney shall be built, erected, or altered below the roof having wood or other combustible materials within one inch of the chimney and no chimney shall have its base resting upon any floor or beam of combustible material. Factory built chimneys that are approved as a result of tests and listing by a nationally recognized testing laboratory shall be installed in accordance with the condition of the approval.
- f. **Thimbles.** No wall paper or other combustible material shall be laid over any thimble or thimble hole in any chimney.
- g. **Smoke Pipes.** No smoke pipes shall be installed or erected so as to be within twelve inches of any combustible floor or ceiling, unless amply protected with non-combustible material. No smoke pipe shall be installed or erected which passes into or through partitions or walls of combustible material, except when guarded by a double collar of metal with air space of at least five inches, or by at least five inches of brick or other non-combustible material between the pipe and the combustible material.
- h. **Electric Wiring.** All electrical wiring shall conform with approved methods and practices for safety to life and property.

- i. **Foundations.** All structures shall be set on solid foundations of cement, brick, stone or other acceptable masonry except that in special cases where buildings are to be used for accessory use the Building Inspector may waive the requirements of this section and permit the use of wood, metal or masonry piers.
- j. **Minimum Building Area.** Every dwelling unit to be used by a single family shall have a minimum ground floor area of five hundred square feet.
- k. **Outside Walls.** Shall be constructed of material commonly used for outside construction and materials customarily painted shall be painted.
- l. **Sewerage.** All dwellings and all commercial, public or industrial buildings shall have a sewage disposal system. The type, size and construction of all septic tanks and drainage fields shall be approved by the Town Health Officer.
- m. **Exceptions.** The construction of small accessory buildings not used for living purposes, together with minor alterations, repairs and general upkeep of existing buildings shall be exempt from the provisions of this Ordinance.
6. **Board of Adjustment.** The Selectmen shall appoint a Board of Adjustment of five members, one of whom may be a member of the Planning Board, said Board of Adjustment to serve without compensation. The Board of Adjustment shall have authority to allow slight variances from the specific terms of this Ordinance, where it can be shown that unnecessary hardship would otherwise result.
7. **Amendment.** This Ordinance may be amended by a majority vote of any legal Town Meeting when such amendment is published in the Warrant calling for the meeting.
8. **Enforcement.** Upon any well-founded information that this Ordinance is being violated, the Selectmen shall, on their own initiative, take immediate steps to enforce the provisions of this Ordinance by seeking an injunction in the Superior Court or by any other appropriate legal action. Whoever violates any of the provisions of the above regulations shall be punished upon conviction by a fine not exceeding ten dollars for each day of each violation.
9. **Takes Effect.** This Ordinance shall take effect upon its passage.
10. **Conflicting Provisions.** Whenever the regulations made under the authority hereof differ from those described by any statute, ordinance, or other regulations, that provision which

imposes the greater restriction or the higher standard shall govern.

11. Validity. If any section, clause, provision, portion, or phrase of this ordinance shall be held to be invalid or unconstitutional by any court of competent authority such holding shall not affect, impair or invalidate any other section, clause, provision, portion, or phrase of this Ordinance.

19. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

You Can Help Prevent Forest Fires

Twenty-five percent of all forest fires in New Hampshire are caused from careless debris burning—brush, paper, leaves, grass, etc. Most of them are started without the required permit from the local forest fire warden. The cost of extinguishing these fires annually runs into large sums of money.

According to law, responsible parties must pay the cost of putting them out. In addition, violators may be subject to court prosecution with fines running at high as (\$200) two-hundred dollars.

In the interest of fire prevention why not eliminate burning at home? Use your town dump. It has been set up for your personal convenience. It provides a suitable place for the disposal of dangerous inflammable waste material and other useless items which accumulate around the home and local stores; brush, etc., cut on your property. Eliminate the hazard of burning yourself. It will be easier for you—personally and financially.

If, however, you do burn on your premises:

1. Secure a permit from your local forest fire warden—the law requires it.
2. Be sure to properly supervise your burning. Don't leave it.
3. Make certain your fire is DEAD OUT before leaving it. Save yourself much possible difficulty. Use your town dump.

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the School District in the Town of Unity qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Unity School in said district on the fifth day of March, 1959, at eight o'clock in the evening, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose a Moderator for the ensuing year.
2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and fix the compensation of any other officer or agent of the district.
6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
8. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization and building funds, together with other income; the School Board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.
9. To see if the district will authorize the School Board to appropriate receipts from federal lunch reimbursements, tuition, gifts and any other receipts from miscellaneous sources, in addition to the original appropriation for 1959-60, for the lunch program, general expenses, equipment and improvements.

10. To see if the district will authorize the School Board to make application for and to receive, in the name of the district, such advances, grants-in-aid or other funds for educational purposes as may now or hereinafter be forthcoming from the U. S. Government and/or state agencies.
11. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the School Board and Citizens of Unity, I herewith submit my second annual report as Superintendent of Schools.

We were fortunate this year in having to make only one new appointment to our teaching staff. Mrs. Mildred Clark, teacher in grades 3 and 4, resigned last June. She has moved to Massachusetts where her husband is now employed. Her successor is Mrs. Mary McCullough of Lempster, who brings to us many years of teaching experience in the towns of Canaan and Croydon. She is a graduate of Plymouth Teachers College. Returning to our regular staff were Mrs. Lois Cragin, our primary teacher, Mrs. Elizabeth Nelson, Principal and intermediate grade teacher, and Mr. William Hall, grades 7 and 8.

We all enjoy working in the new school building and we, as school officials, as well as teachers, appreciate the excellent work done in the maintenance of our classrooms. The physical condition of the building is excellent and provides comfortable surroundings in which to live and work. Thanks to Mr. and Mrs. Smith for their efforts and interest in the school.

Mrs .Irene Chase has been in charge of the cafeteria. The school lunch program is a very important part of our school life. All children who desired to do so, have shared in our hot lunches provided in the cafeteria.

We are fortunate in having a very fine staff of experienced teachers. With adequate salaries we should be able to retain their services. We appreciate the fine work being done in the classrooms, and we have received fine cooperation throughout the year. With a fine physical setup, and an experienced staff, we can provide good educational opportunities for our children.

The transportation system was revised a bit this year. School buses are now being operated by Mr. Floyd DeLude and Mr. James Paul. The new buses are now in use, one used on the East and the other on the West Loop. The capacity of each bus has been increased to provide more satisfactory seating arrangements. Two feeder lines complete the transportation system. Marie Clough operates the feeder service.

We expect about seven pupils to enter our first grade in September 1959. Nine children will graduate this June and continue their studies in high school, either at Claremont or Newport.

The above figures would indicate a school enrollment next fall of about 114 pupils.

Our testing program this year has been quite adequate for our purposes. We have given pre-school tests in the first grade, and reading tests in the first and second grades. I.Q. tests were given in grades one, three, and six. Each March, achievement tests are given to all pupils from the third grade through the eighth.

In closing I wish to thank the school board for their help and support. We all appreciate the interest and cooperation shown by the citizens of Unity. Working together, we can continue to maintain a high level of educational standards for the children in this community.

The teachers wish to thank the parents who have been helpful and understanding at all times. Mr. Stickney and the members of the School Board are ever alert to act on any school need, and special thanks to Miss MacIver, the guardian of the children's health.

REPORT OF SCHOOL BOARD

We should like to express our appreciation again to all who have helped us to provide a good education for the students of Unity. We particularly thank those who have worked so hard on fund-raising projects for the school.

Over four hundred dollars was voluntarily raised and used for playground equipment, and in this last year an additional sum of \$281.19 was raised by suppers and placed in the special activities fund. The benefit supper for the Hot Lunch Program netted sufficient funds to put the program on a sound financial basis, and enabled it to go back to its original schedule.

The removal of the stone wall, grading and leveling that was made possible by the fund has done much to better the appearance of the school grounds.

The new bus schedules are working satisfactorily and to the advantage of the school program.

We appreciate the cooperation we have received this past year and look forward to another fruitful year for the Unity School.

SCHOOL NURSE'S REPORT

During the past year Immunization Clinics were made available to all school children as well as the pre-school children. Salk Vaccine, Triple Toxoid (a combination of Diphtheria, Tetanus and Whooping Cough) and Small Pox Vaccinations were given. Attendance at these clinics could be better. We still have a number of children who have not had Salk Vaccine despite the large number of Salk Vaccine Clinics we have had. I do hope that our spring clinics will take care of this.

The Tuberculin Patch Testing program was carried out with the children in the odd numbered grades and newcomers who had not previously had the test. This test is given to determine whether or not a child has ever had a contact with Tuberculosis. If the test reaction is positive, then the child has a chest X-ray through the New Hampshire Tuberculosis Association Chest Clinics.

Hearing and vision testing was done in all grades. The hearing defects were very few and all of those children with a hearing problem were seen by their family physician. The number of corrections of vision problems was excellent. Where a family was unable to assume the expense of eye care and glasses the local service clubs and the State Welfare Department assisted.

Examination with the Wood's Light for the detection of Scalp Ringworm was done in the elementary grades. There were no suspicious cases found. Scalp Ringworm still seems to be a public health menace in this state, as well as in the neighboring states.

The children were weighed and measured, and a general inspection was carried out by the school nurse. By far the outstanding problem was the need for dental care. Outside of the State Matching Fund there is very little assistance available for dental care.

All of the above mentioned programs are carried out yearly. These programs serve a dual purpose. First and very important is the finding of defects and the correction of them. Second and equally as important, it is a teaching program from the standpoint of the child. We strive to help the child realize the importance of good health, as well as teach him to assume the responsibility of maintaining good health and well-being.

Success in carrying out the school health program is dependent on many people. I would like to express my appreciation to you who have helped so much—the parents, the medical advisors, the School Board, the Superintendent, the Principals, the teachers and the custodians. Thank you.
