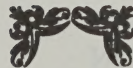

TOWN WARRANT

The State of New Hampshire

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Warren in the County of Grafton in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Warren on Tuesday, the twelfth day of March, next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
3. To hear the reports of selectmen and other town officers and pass any vote relating thereto.
4. To bring forward your ballots for the election of Delegates at Large, Alternate Delegates at Large, Delegate and Alternate Delegates to the National Convention of the various political parties to be held to nominate party candidates for President and Vice President of the United States.
5. To raise and appropriate money to maintain highways and bridges.
6. To raise and appropriate money for snow removal and sanding roads.
7. To see if the town will accept State Aid for construction on Class 2A road, known as the Lake Tarleton road, and raise and appropriate for said purpose the sum of \$789.00; or will accept State Aid for the construction of Class V roads, and raise and appropriate for said purpose the sum of \$231.22.
8. To raise and appropriate \$1,000.00 toward the purchase of the plow and tractor now rented by the

town, and to authorize the selectmen to borrow a sum of money sufficient to complete the purchase.

9. To raise and appropriate money to maintain street lights, and to authorize the installation of a light east of and near the Bixby bridge.

10. To raise and appropriate money for support of fire department.

11. To raise and appropriate money for town library purposes.

12. To raise and appropriate money for support of town poor, Old Age Assistance and Soldiers' Aid.

13. To raise and appropriate money for Memorial Day.

14. To raise and appropriate money for cemeteries.

15. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate as a bonus for Dr. F. J. Kasheta.

16. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate 1-100 of 1% of its assessed valuation, for the town share of cooperative participation in the White Mountains Region Association.

17. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 to pay the note held by Frank B. Little.

18. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for White Pine Blister Rust Control in cooperation with the State Forestry Department.

19. To see if the town will vote to grant a discount on taxes on real estate and personal property and determine date and percentage of same.

20. To authorize the selectmen to distribute inventory blanks at the time of property appraisal.

21. To see if the town will vote to adopt either plan 1 or 2 as proposed by the auditors, for the future payment of all Highways and Bridges accounts.

22. To authorize the selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes.

23. To see if the town will vote to petition the State Tax Commission to have an audit made by the Municipal Accounting Division and raise and appropriate a sum of money to cover the expense of such audit.

24. To raise and appropriate money for other town charges.

25. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

AUDITOR'S REPORT

We have examined and found correct, the accounts of the Selectmen, Town Treasurer, Trustees of Trust Funds, Library Trustees, Town Clerk, Cemetery Trustees, Road Agents, Town Hall Agent, Overseer of the Poor and Tax Collectors' books for the year of 1930, 1931, 1932, 1933, 1934, 1935, 1936, 1937, 1938 and 1939.

Your auditors after having examined the accounts of the Road Agent, recommend that the voters at the next annual meeting, adopt one of the following methods of paying bills for highway maintenance.

1. When the Road Agent submits his weekly time sheet, the Selectmen shall draw an order on the Treas-

urer for each individual. These checks can be delivered to th Road Agent and distributed by him to each employee. This is the method of payment now in use by the State Highway Department and seems to work very satisfactorily. The cancelled check bearing the endorsement of the employee would constitute a receipt acceptable to the Tax Commission.

2. As a substitute for the present haphazard method of payment—sometimes in cash, sometimes by check and sometimes by order on the Selectmen by the Road Agent, with the result that the individual rarely receipts the time sheet at the time of payment—it is suggested that the amount of each weekly time sheet when paid by the Selectmen, be deposited to a separate account all accounts paid by check by Road Agent against this account, and the cancelled checks submitted to the auditors.

To the Inhabitants of the School District in the Town of Warren qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said district on the 12th day of March 1940, at two o'clock in the afternoon to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agents of the District.
6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or officers heretofore chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
8. To see if the District will vote to make any alteration in the amount of money required to be assessed for the ensuing year for the support of public schools and the payment of the statutory obligations of the District, as determined by the School Board in its annual report.
9. To see if the District will vote to petition the State Tax Commission to have an audit made by the municipal accounting division and to make an appropriation to cover the expense of such audit.
- 10 To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

There are some pleasant things to which I would like to call your attention at this time. The per cent of attendance last year was very good and the lowering the tardy marks to about half the number of the previous year was very commendable. Some instruction in cooking and manual training is being given this year in the village school. This is in accord with the modern educational principle of letting children do some exploring in different fields to discover possible interests and abilities.

On behalf of the children who cannot go home during the noon hour, I want to thank the ladies of both Warren and Glenclyff for the hot lunches which they are furnishing. I also want to express my thanks to Mr. Isaac Fleischmann of the East Warren CCC camp for his gift of dishes to be used in serving these lunches.

For the most part the buildings are in good shape. The basement in the village school has been thoroughly cleaned and the supply shelves completely enclosed for the better protection of the paper stored down stairs. The fact that water has leaked through the ceiling in the upper hall and beside the chimney in the

grammar room would indicate that the roof needs some attention.

It may not be amiss in this report to mention some of the objectives toward which the schools are striving. The most obvious of these aims is the imparting of such knowledge as seems needed for participation in modern day activities. In addition to this the cultivating of certain habits and attitudes is vitally important. In order to be successful in school and in later life a child must learn to be prompt, industrious, orderly, responsible and honest. He must learn to cooperate and get along with his mates. To reach these objectives the schools need the help of the homes. The physical well-being of the children depends largely upon the parents. As we all know not all children learn with equal readiness. Here too the parents can help by encouraging the slower learners to work a little harder and a little longer if need be to attain the desired success. Parents are cordially invited to visit the schools and offer any suggestions which will make the work more effective.
