To the inhabitants of the Town of Alstead in the County of Cheshire in said state, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at The Municipal Building in said Alstead on Tuesday, the 4th day of March, next at ten of the clock in the forenoon. Polls will be open until 7:30 P.M. The Business Meeting to be holden at 7:30 P.M. to act on the following:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.
- 2. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$9,600.00 for Town Officers salaries and expenses and elections and registration.
- 3. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000.00 for Old Age Assistance and Town Poor.
- 4. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$42,000.00 for highways and bridges and oiling of Town roads and general maintenance.
- 5. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$921.00 Town Road Construction (T R A), the State to contribute \$6,139.99.
- 6. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to sell real estate acquired by tax sales.
- 7. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes, if necessary.
- 8. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for support of the Library.
- 9. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for the Town Planning Board.
- 10. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$901.00 as the Town's share for studies and operation of the Southwestern New Hampshire Regional Planning Commission.
- 11. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000.00 for operation of the Police Department.
- 12. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for the expenses of the Dog Officer.

- 13. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,500.00 for maintenance and upkeep of the Municipal Building.
- 14. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,200.00 for maintenance of the Town Dump.
- 15. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for Parks and Playgrounds including the Skating Rink.
- 16. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the following sums for items and purposes as listed:

a. Bonds for Town Officers, liability and property insurance	\$5,500.00
b. For interest on temporary and long term notes.	\$1,500.00
c. For Social Security expenses.	2,000.00
d. For street lights including flashing lights	2,700.00
e. For damage and legal expenses.	300.00
f. Civil defense	150.00

- 17. To see if the Town will authorize a discount of two (2)% on real estate taxes paid on or before September 30 next, on current year assessments. Further to authorize the Selectmen to extend this date up to thirty days as may be necessary to allow at least ten days before payment is due after mailing of tax bills.
- 18. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$600.00 for payment on the long term note on the Municipal Building.
- 19. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 for payment on the long term note on the Universalist Church.
- 20. To see if the Town will rescind borrowing authority granted under Article 46 at the Town Meeting of March 7, 1972. This authorized borrowing up to \$7,000.00 for the Vilas Pool gates.
- 21. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to issue permits for playing Bingo as prescribed by law.
- 22. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for Memorial Day observance.
- 23. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for 4th of July observance.

- 24. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to apply for, and accept any Federal Disaster Aid that may become available and expend these sums upon receipt of same.
- 25. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for Forest Fire Protection.
- 26. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$6,000.00 for fire protection, equipment, and maintenance of the Alstead Fire Department.
- 27. To see if the Town will authorize the withdrawal of the interest on the \$3,500.00 Fire Truck Capital Reserve Fund and apply same toward the new fire truck.
- 28. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000.00 for payment on the new fire truck authorized in 1974 and reduce the borrowing authority for same item to \$16,500.00.
- 29. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$414.00 for support of the Cheshire Hospital for the year 1975.
- 30. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$282.00 for the Monadnock Regional Association.
- 31. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 as a contribution to the Monadnock Region Humane Society.
- 32. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,650.00 for support of the Fall Mountain Visiting Nurse Association.
- 33. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate to comply with the State Law regarding solid waste disposal, that becomes effective July 1, 1975, and to see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to contract with other communities and individuals in order to carry out whatever course is chosen.
- 34. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 for maintenance and renovation of the Universalist Church.
- 35. To see if the Town will adopt the proposed Ordinance Relating to Building Within the Special Flood Hazard Area. (Copy in Town Report)
- 36. To see if the Town agrees to participate in the National Flood Insurance Program by directing the Board of Selectmen to complete the eligibility application and submit the required information to the Federal Insurance Administration. Such information includes the following resolutions; (Summarized here and printed in full in the Town Report)

Resolution A - The Community recognizes that there are flood areas in the community; that federally subsidized flood insurance is available; that the Town meeting has the authority to enact appropriate land use control measures.

The Town Meeting resolves that assurances be given to the Federal Insurance Administration that the Community will enact and enforce necessary land use control measures; that municipal officials and boards will be authorized to deal with the appropriate governmental agencies and private firms; and that elevations of buildings will be recorded when required.

Resolution B-1 The community recognizes that regulations governing building construction in the flood hazard areas have been enacted and are enforced.

The Town Meeting recommends that the Planning Board require all proposals for their approval that are in the flood hazard areas be designed to minimize or eliminate flood damage and that the Planning Board require new or replacement water supply/sewage disposal systems be designed to eliminate or minimize flood damage.

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the withdrawal from the Revenue Sharing Funds established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 for use as set-offs against budget appropriations in the amount indicated; and, further to authorize the Selectmen to make pro-rate reductions in the amount if estimated entitlements are reduced or take any other action hereon:

SELECTMEN'S REPORT

This report covers certain projects that have been completed, some still underway and problems that must be considered now.

First, a couple of projects that have been around two or three years: the gates for the Vilas Pool dam have been installed, at a total cost of \$9,270.00, the town paying one half or \$4,635.00. The Bell Hill bridge has been completed and certainly must be appreciated by all that use this road.

The final half of the Flood Disaster Aid for July 1973 flood in the amount of \$1,240.00 has not been received as yet. \$8,605.00 or 50% of the approved funds for the December 1973 flood have been received. It is hoped these funds will become available this year.

Federal Revenue Sharing Funds have been reduced from \$13,000.00 last year to \$4,985.00 this year. The amount is determined by a formula# that involves the number of residents, per capita income and the amount of taxes raised to operate the town. School costs are not included.

The new fire truck has been ordered at a total contracted cost of \$29,600.00.

A new federal law entitled, "The Flood Disaster Protection Act of 1973:: has made community participation in the Flood Insurance Program a mandatory requirement for all communities having been notified by the Federal Insurance Administration that they are subject to flooding. Alstead has been so notified and provided with a Flood Hazard Boundary Map which is included in this Town Report. The affected area is from the foot of Hatch Hill along Warren brook and Cold River to the Langdon line on River Street.

In order that persons in the flood prone area may be eligible for flood hazard insurance, it is essential that the town comply with certain requirements. Several articles in the Town Warrant pertain to this matter: A proposed ordinance that will require building permits only in the flood prone area, other realted articles and resolutions authorizing the Selectmen to make application to participate in the National Flood Insurance Program. The point of this program is to make flood insurance available to people in the flood prone area at a reasonable cost. In order to exert pressure in this direction, the federal law further makes it unlawful for a bank to make a mortgage loan or other loan on property in such an area if the community has not joined this program. This will make it nearly impossible to sell a house in a designated flood area if Alstead does not join the program. In addition the town would not be eilgible for any future flood disaster aid. For the immediate future only the people in the flood prone area are affected, however, in the long run all tax payers will be affected. The state law requires that Alstead stop open burning in the dump as of July 1, 1975 and institute some other method of solid waste disposal. At the request of the Selectmen, Mr. Daniel Curll of East Alstead has devoted much time and energy in investigating various solutions to this problem. One possibility is to use the present dump site as a collection point and then haul it to some other disposal area. A proposal will be presented at Town Meeting. It appears that any solution is going to increase the per capita cost of solid waste disposal from about \$1.00 to over \$10.00. This would appear to be a needless expense at this time but there is not much choice.

The Selectmen together with the Planning Board are investigating the Tax Map problem. This is required by 1980.

SUMMARY OF FINDINGS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

Submitted herewith is the report of the annual examination and audit of the accounts of the Town of Alstead for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1974, which was made by this Division in accordance with the vote of the Town. Exhibits as hereafter listed are included as part of the report.

One of the audit reports must be given the Town Clerk as part of the permanent records.

SCOPE OF AUDIT

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the Board of Selectmen, Treasurer, Tax Collector, Town Clerk, Road Agent, Trustees of Trust Funds and Vilas Pool Fund.

FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

General Fund:

Comparative Balance Sheets - December 31, 1973 and December 31, 1974: (Exhibit A-1)

Comparative Balance Sheets - General Fund - as of December 31, 1973 and December 31, 1974, are presented in Exhibit A-1. As indicated therein, the Current Surplus of the Town increased by \$4,550, from \$12,212 to \$16,762, during the year ended December 31, 1974.

Analysis of Change in Financial Condition: (Exhibit A-2.

An anlysis of change in current financial condition of the Town during the year is made in Exhibit A-2. The factors which caused the change were as follows:

Comparative Statements of Appropriations and Expenditures - Estimated and Actual Revenues: (Exhibits A-3 and A-4)

Comparative statements of general fund appropriations and expenditures, estimated and actual revenues for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1974, are presented in Exhibits A-3 and A-4. As indicated by the Budget Summary (Exhibit A-4), a revenue surplus of \$9,781, less a net overdraft of appropriations of \$231, resulted in a net budget surplus of \$9,550.

Long Term Indebtedness:

Comparative Balance Sheets: (Exhibit A-5)

Comparative Balance Sheets, which disclose the long term indebtedness of the Town as of December 31, 1973 and December 31, 1974, are presented in Exhibit A-5. As indicated therein, the long term debt decreased by \$4,500 during 1974. Outstanding long term notes as of December 31, 1974, totaled \$4,600.

Statement of Long Term Indebtedness: (Exhibit A-6)

A statement of long term indebtedness showing annual payments of principal and interest is disclosed in Exhibit A-6.

TREASURER

Classified Statement of Receipts and Expenditures: (Exhibit B-1)

A summary statement of receipts and expenditures for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1974, made up in accordance with the uniform classification of accounts, is included in Exhibit B-1.

Revenue Sharing Funds: (Exhibit G)

A statement of Revenue Sharing Fund receipts, expenditures, encumbrances and fund balance is contained in Exhibit G. As stated therein, there is an unappropriated fund balance of \$2,873 as of December 31, 1974.

AUDIT PROCEDURE

The accounts and records of all town officials charged with the custody, receipt and disbursement of public funds were examined and audited in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards, and accordingly included such tests of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as were considered necessary in the circumstances.

Verification of uncollected and unredeemed taxes was made by mailing notices to delinquent taxpayers as indicated by the Tax Collector's records. Consequently, the amounts of uncollected and unredeemed taxes as indicated in this report are subject to any changes which may be necessitated by the return of verification notices.

Conclusion:

The provisions of Chapter 71-a, Section 21, require that the auditors' summary of findings and recommendations (letter of transmittal) shall be published in the next annual report of the Town. Publication of the Exhibits contained in this audit report is optional at the discretion of the Board of Selectmen. This letter, however, must be published in its entirety.

We extend our thanks to the officials of the Town of Alstead for their assistance during the course of the Audit.

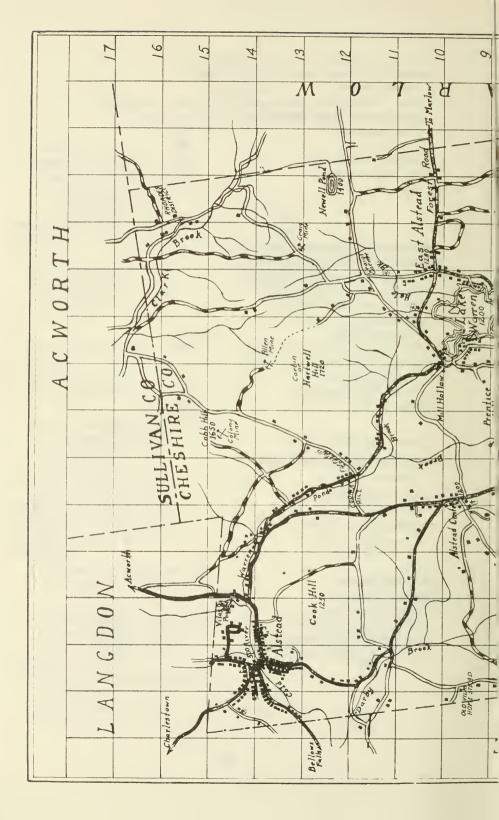

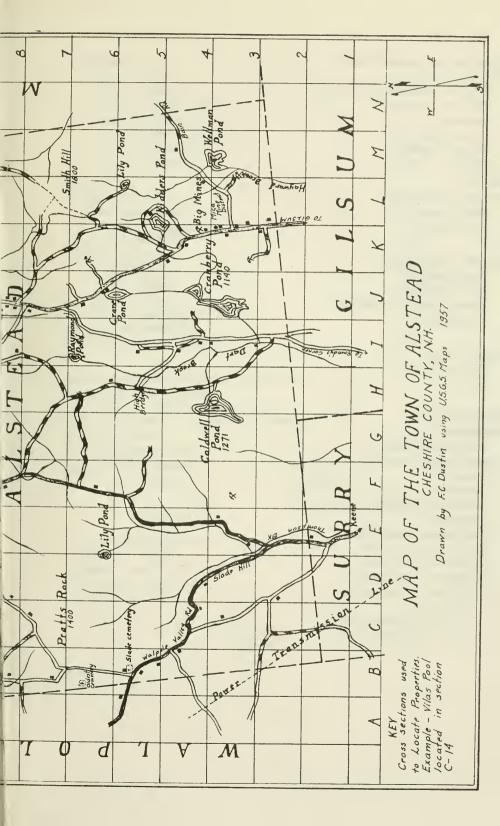

SHEDD PORTER MEMORIAL LIBRARY Alstead, N.H.

January 7, 1975

As your Librarian, I hereby submit my report for 1874.

Due to the energy crisis the hours of the library were changed in January from Mon., Wed., Fri. and Sat. to Mon. and Tues. - 1 to 6 P.M. and Wed. - to 4 and 6 to 8 P.M., until further notice. Keeping open 15 hours a week with 4 hours after 5 to meet with the State Library requirements. So far it has worked out very satisfactorily.

Your librarian supplied National Library Week posters to Vilas Jr. High and Alstead Elementary Schools.

Two book meetings and one Trustee meeting was attended by your librarian where many books were displayed and some reviewed.

Exhibits from Alstead Elementary school during March, Youth Art month, were held in the library. During the summer the 2nd grade had very colorful displays of art, called "Symphony of Summer" and this fall the same grade displayed "Sponge Print Trees", very colorful and added much in decoration for the Library. Many patrons enjoyed all exhibits.

The 2nd grade, also, with their teacher, Miss Rose Knight, visited the Library in May and the use of the library along with the file cabinet was explained and each student borrowed books.

Our summer reading program for 2nd, 3rd, and 4th grades during July was called "Happy Raindrops" requiring each student to read 12 or more books. 22 entered and 18 completed, each awarded certificates and their pictures in the weekly News Review. 638 Jr. books were read during the program.

This fall the bus pupils resumed their trips to the library accompanied by 2 adults - thus having a chance to become familiar with the library and to borrow books.

The State Library Bookmobile from Keene District Office visited the library 3 times and over 1100 books were borrowed.

124 books were borrowed, by request, from N.H. State Library.

Number of books purchased - 124; gifts - 136; magazines on loan - 26; daily paper - 1; weekly paper - 1.

1974 POLICE REPORT

It is difficult to itemize the activities and give details of complaints handled during the course of a year, so very briefly it can only be summarized like this:

There were sixteen accidents investigated, six D.W.I. cases taken to court, two drug incidents, the usual domestic problems and emergency messages that were delivered.

There were reports of missing pigs, horses, heifers, dogs and children. A number of gardens were invaded and the vegetables produced from hours of toil were stolen.

Deer jacking, broken windows from BB shots, a possible airplane down in Alstead, snowmobile complaints, two serious fires that severely burned one individual and one that was fatal to a child, plus numerous other miscellaneous complaints were investigated.

The police cruiser was delivered the first of April and now l can understand how my Dodge accumulated so much mileage!

I attended a narcotic and drug seminar at the Claremont Vo-Tech and have recently enrolled in a week's training program on criminal investigation.

The most aggravating and discouraging problem is the number of breaks that have been reported. There were twenty four breaks in Alstead alone. Over \$2,000.00 worth of household and personal items were stolen from one home. Three chain saws have been stolen, a snowmobile, guns, a boat, cordwood and a pickup truck which was recovered.

It has been proven that many breaks have actually taken place during the daylight hours. Due to this fact and the fact that there have been so many breaks in Alstead and the surrounding communities, I urge everyone to report any suspicious incident or vehicle to me at once. Do not hesitate to call me at any time of night and if I can not be reached, the same can be reported to Mutual Aid by calling 352-1100. A police officer will be contacted by them to investigate the matter.

It is important to obtain as much information as possible, especially accurate registration numbers and a description of vehicle.

The co-operation and prompt reporting of such information could lead to the apprehension of individuals responsible for these breaks. Anything suspicious is definitely worth reporting and I, as well as other police officers, will appreciate your help.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank the police chiefs in surrounding towns and the State Police in the area who have so willingly given me their assistance when needed.

- 2. We have 2 people to maintain our office and records, each working forty hours a week (1973, 1 part-time person).
- 3. We provide services of an occupational therapist.
- 4. We have made 1,391 visits (1973, 789 visits an increase of 76%).
- 5. We have an active Board of Directors of 15 people representing the towns.

TOWN OF ALSTEAD NEW HAMPSHIRE

Ordinance Relating to Building Within the Special Flood Hazard Area

Section 1 - Purpose and Intent

In the interest of public health, welfare, and safety, the town's voters hereby deem it necessary to regulate and control the construction or substantial improvement of buildings within special flood hazard areas as allowed under State of New Hampshire law RSA 31:39.

Section 2 - Definitions

- A. Flooding: A general and temporary condition of partial or complete inundation of normally dry land areas from the overflow of streams, rivers, or other inland waters.
- B. Special Flood Hazard Area: The area designated by the Federal Insurance Administrator, which, on the average, is likely to be flooded once every 100 years (i.e., that has a one (1%) percent chance of being flooded each year.) Said flood hazard area is shown on a map prepared by the Federal Insurance Administration and dated July 26, 1974. Said map is on file with the Selectmen and may be officially amended by the Federal Insurance Administration as they deem necessary.
- C. Substantial Improvement: Substantial improvement means any repair, reconstruction, or improvement of a structure, the cost of which equals or exceeds fifty percent (50%) of the actual cash value of the structure either (a) before the improvement is started, or (b) if the structure has been damaged and is being restored, before the damage occurred. Substantial improvement is deemed to have started when the first alteration of any structural part of the building commences.

Section 3 - Permits

- A. When Required: A permit shall be required when it is proposed to erect, place or substantially improve a building within the special flood hazard area.
- B. Duty: The Board of Selectmen are hereby given power and authority to administer the provisions of this ordinance. The Selectmen may appoint an agent to administer (accept and issue permits and inspect) but not enforce this ordinance.

- C. Application Requirements: Written application for a permit shall be filed with the Board of Selectmen or their agent. The application shall include a complete description of the location and nature of the proposed construction or substantial improvement, together with a detailed plan of the same drawn to scale showing the boundaries of the lot and location of the building on the lot. The location of proposed or existing water supply and sewage disposal facilities shall be shown. When a new or replacement water supply or sewage system is proposed, appropriate approval from the State of New Hampshire Water Supply and Pollution Control Commission shall be shown. In addition, the plan shall include the general contour of the individual lot and abutting land, proposed access to the lot and other pertinent details.
- **D.** Application Review: The Board of Selectmen or their agent shall review the application for new construction or substantial improvement to determine whether the proposed building site will be reasonably safe from flooding. If the proposed building site is in a location that has a flood hazard, any proposed new construction or substantial improvement (including prefabricated and mobile homes) must:
 - 1. Be designed (or modified) and anchored to prevent floatation, collapse, or lateral movement of the structure
 - 2. Use construction materials and utility equipment that are resistant to flood damage,
 - 3. Use construction methods and practices that will minimize flood damage.
- E. Action: The granting or denial of the permit shall take place not later than 30 days from the date of filing the application unless the applicant and the Board of Selectmen or their agent shall jointly agree to a reasonable extension.
- F. Permit Fees: A fee of two dollars (\$2.00) shall be charged for issuance of a permit.
- G. Revocation of Permit: Any permit may be revoked by the Board of Selectmen at any time for just cause.

Section 4 - Existing Non-Conforming Uses

All buildings which are in existence at the time of passage of this ordinance may continue to exist in their present location without need for making application to the Board of Selectmen, however, a permit must be obtained if such buildings are to be substantially improved, as required by Section 3 above.

Section 5 - Board of Appeals

- A. Creation: A Board of Appeals is hereby created and its members shall be appointed by the Selectmen in accordance with, and shall have the same terms and powers hereby conferred upon a Board of Adjustment by the provisions of Chapter 31, N.H. Revised Statutes Annotated, 1955, and as may be amended. Said flood hazard area is shown on a map prepared by the Federal Insurance Administration and dated July 26, 1974. Said map is on file with the Selectmen and may be officially amended by the Federal Insurance Administration as they deem necessary.
- **B.** Adoption of Rules: The Board of Appeal shall adopt rules to govern its proceedings in accordance with the provisions of this ordinance, and the provisions of Chapter 31, N.H. Revised Statutes Annotated, 1955, and as may be amended.
- C. Interpretation: The Board of Appeal may hear and decide a case where it is alleged there is error in any order, requirement, decision, or determination made by the Selectmen or their agent in the enforcement of this ordinance.
- **D.** Appeals: Appeals to the Board of Appeal may be taken by any person aggrieved or by any officer, department, board, or bureau of the municipality affected by any decision within a reasonable time, as provided by the rules of the Board, by filing with the officer from whom the appeal is taken and with the Board a notice of appeal specifying the grounds thereof. The Board of Adjustment shall fix a reasonable time for the hearing of the appeal, give public notice thereof, as well as notice to the parties in interest, and decide the same within a reasonable time. Upon the hearing any party may appear in person or by agent or attorney.

Section 7 - Penalty

Any person found guilty of violating any provisions of this ordinance shall be fined not more than \$100 per day for each day such violation shall continue after written notice is given to the person by the Board of Selectmen.

Section 8 - Saving Clause

If any article, section, sub-section, sentence, clause or phrase of these regulations is for any reason held to be unconstitutional or invalid, such decision shall not affect the remaining portions of these regulations.

Section 9 - Effective Date

This ordinance shall take effect immediately upon its adoption.

WHEREAS, certain areas of (COMMUNITY) are subject to periodic flooding from (STREAMS, RIVERS, LAKES, OCEANS, ETC.) causing serious damages to properties within these areas; and

WHEREAS, relief is available in the form of Federally subsidized flood insurance as authorized by the National Flood Insurance Act of 1968; and

WHEREAS, it is the intent of this Town Meeting to require the recognition and evaluation of flood and/or mudslide hazards in all official actions relating to land use in the flood plain areas having special flood (and/or mudslide) hazards; and

WHEREAS, this body has the legal authority to adopt land use and control measures to reduce future flood losses pursuant to N.H. RSA Chapter 31, 36, 156, 156A,

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that this Town Meeting hereby:

1. Assures the Federal Insurance Administration that it intends to enact and maintain in force for those areas having defined flood hazards, adequate land use and control measures with effective enforcement provisions consistent with the Criteria set forth in Section 1910 of the National Flood Insurance Program Regulations: and

2. Vests (The Planning Board or Town Manager or other duly authorized Municipal Officer) with the responsibility, authority, and means to:

(a) Delineate or assist the Administrator, at his request, in delineating the limits of the areas having special flood hazards on available local maps of sufficient scale to identify the location of building sites.

(b) Provide such information as the Administrator may request concerning present uses and occupancy of the flood plain.

(c) Cooperate with Federal, State, and local agencies and private firms which undertake to study, survey, map, and identify flood plain or mudslide areas, and cooperate with neighboring communities with respect to management of adjoining flood plain in order to prevent aggravation of existing hazards.

(d) Submit on the anniversary date of the community's initial eligibility an annual report to the Administrator on the progress made during the past year within the community in the development and implementation of flood plain management measures.

3. Appoints the Building Inspector to maintain for public inspection and to furnish upon request a record of elevations (in relation to mean sea level) of the lowest floor (including basement) of all new or substantially improved structures located in the special flood hazard areas. If the lowest floor is below grade on one or more sides, the elevation of the floor immediately above must also be recorded.

4. Intends to take such other official action within its powers as may be reasonably necessary to carry out the objectives of the program.

Resolution B-I CONFIRMING ADOPTION OF BUILDING PERMIT ORDINANCE WHICH THE COMMUNITY HAS ADOPTED AND THE REVIEW PROCEDURE FOR THE SYSTEM

WHEREAS, the Town of Alstead has adopted and is enforcing (SUBDIVISION REGULATIONS), and Building Ordinance within the Special Flood Hazard Area.

WHEREAS, Section(s) 3A of the aforesaid prohibits any person, firm or corporation from erecting, constructing, enlarging, altering, repairing, improving, moving or demolishing any building or structure without first obtaining a separate building permit for each building or structure from the Building Inspector, and/or Selectmen.

WHEREAS, the Building Inspector or Selectmen must examine all plans and specifications for the proposed construction when application is made to him for a building permit.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ENACTED by the Town Meeting of Alstead, as follows:

1. The Town Meeting recommends that the Planning board amend their regulations pertaining to the flood hazard area to assure that (i) all proposals are consistent with the need to minimize flood damage, (ii) all public utilities and facilities, such as sewer, gas, electrical, and water systems are located, elevated, and constructed to minimize or eliminate flood damage, and (iii) adequate drainage is provided so as to reduce exposure to flood hazards; and

2. The Town Meeting recommends that the Planning Board amend their regulations pertaining to the flood hazard area to require new or replacement water supply systems and/or sanitary sewage systems to be designed to minimize or eliminate infiltration of flood waters into the systems and discharges from the systems into flood waters, and require on-site waste disposal systems to be located so as to avoid impairment of them or contamination from them during flooding, pursuant to N.H. RSA 36:21.

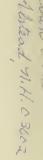
