To the Inhabitants of the Town of Bethlehem in the County of Grafton in the said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Building in said Bethlehem on Tuesday, the seventh day of March, next at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

- 3. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Highway purposes the following sums.

- 4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$985.53 for Town Road Aid.
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for the Littleton Hospital.
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$786.84 for the White Mountain Region Association and the sum of \$200.00 for the White Mountains 93 Association's "Ski 93."
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,000.00 for Advertising and/or Related purposes.
- 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,200.00 to maintain an Information Booth during the Summer Season of 1972.
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,142.00 for the benefit of the White Mountain Community Services, Inc.
- 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for hydrant repairs and moves and to cover any cost of repairs to town-owned water lines.
- 11. To see what sum the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to help defray the operating expenses of Whitefield Regional Airport.
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to expend the sum of Fifteen Hundred Dollars (\$1,500.00), (being a portion of the rent to be paid by Cornelius T. Chase, IV) for capital improvements on the Bethlehem Country Club Golf Course during the calendar year 1972. These improvements shall be made by the Town of Bethlehem under the direction of the Selectmen.
- 13. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,087.00 to join the North Country Home Health Agency of Littleton for the ensuing year.
- 14. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to borrow monies from time to time, to pay current maintenance and operation expenses for the ensuing year, in anticipation of taxes.

- 15. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to sell property acquired by Deed of the Tax Collector.
- 16. To vote on the Question "Shall the provisions of Chapter 287 of the Revised Statutes Annotated relative to playing games of beano be adopted in this town?"
- 17. To see if the Town will authorize such expenditures as may be necessary to qualify for continued operation of the ambulance under the Statute HR151 effective September 1, 1972 and appropriate funds not to exceed \$1,500.00 that may be required for this purpose.
- 18. To see if the Town will vote to instruct its Selectmen to appoint an expert highway agent, who, under the direction of the Selectmen, shall have the same power and perform the same duties as a highway agent elected by the town.
- 19. To see if the Town will vote to establish a committee to explore and consider appropriate observance of the Town's Bi-Centennial in 1974 and appropriate a sum of money necessary for any expenses involved.
- 20. "To see if the Town will petition the Tax Commission for an audit of the accounts of the Town Government pursuant to R.S.A. 71:26, and reimburse said Commission for such reasonable expenses in conjunction therewith as provided in R.S.A. 71:28." (inserted by petition of voters)
- 21. To see if the Town will vote in favor of an order requiring the Selectmen to report to the Town in detail at the Annual Town Meeting and prior to the voting on the Town Budget concerning:
  - A realistic appraisal of the cost of operating the Town, including all aspects of the Precinct, in an efficient and progressive manner, year by year for the following three years.
  - A realistic appraisal of the cost of operating the school system in an effective and satisfactory manner year by year for the following three years.
  - A statement as to what the County demands for funds on the Town are likely to be year by year for the following three years. (inserted by petition of voters)

22. To see if the Town will vote to become a member of the regional planning commission, to be organized and named the Northern Regional Planning Commission. This Commission will have membership of at least two municipalities and will have jurisdiction over the planning region delineated by the Office of State Planning. The objective of the Commission will be to plan for and encourage regional planning analysis, provide consensus on major problems of regional concern and to assist in the effectuation of projects within, and which extend beyond, the boundaries of a particular town. The Commission will have only the authority conferred on it by Chapter 36:45-53, Revised Statutes Annotated, 1955, and will be an advisory commission to local governments in the region. Members of the Commission shall be appointed by the Selectmen in accordance with State Law. Two representatives will be appointed from Bethlehem.

To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

#### SELECTMEN'S REPORT

There is now a statute commonly known as the "Right to Know Law" which makes it mandatory to inform the public of the activities of their elected representatives. In addition, though 1971 may have appeared to be a quiet, normal period on the surface, much was accomplished that we feel you should know.

The year 1971 marked the first step in acknowledging the problems which always seem to follow that elusive but in many ways desirable aim known as "Progress". New Zoning Regulations were adopted followed by Subdivision Regulations, both of which are as flexible as possible while offering a means of exercising some measure of control in the development of Bethlehem. The Zoning Board of Adjustment and Planning Board have both performed magnificently and though there are still many "rough spots" to overcome, it can truly be said that the situation has been generally resolved.

A completed Survey Map of the Town was received and has already proven its value in many ways. Unfortunately it is not completely acceptable, but Ainsworth Associates has agreed to make the necessary revisions which, while considerable in number, are minor in nature. With their consent final payment has therefore been deferred pending receipt of the revised copy promised for the near future.

Re-evaluation of all taxable property also became a reality resulting in a total valuation of slightly over \$14,000,000 with a reduction in tax rate for the year to \$2.55. It was encouraging to note that of almost 1800 parcels appraised, the exceptions registered were only about 40 in number or an average of just over 2%. Few of the exceptions still remain to be resolved and several may end up in litigation, but the Tax Commission has and still is cooperating by exerting every effort to bring the project to a complete conclusion.

With the relocating of Route 116 to Whitefield by the State, an opportunity was available to materially improve the access and part of Wing Road. Upon discussion with State Highway officials, plans were developed and the work included in the relocation contract. Construction has almost been completed at a cost to Bethlehem of about \$19,000, provided by TRA funds. The balance of TRA funds was used on Beech Hill Road.

Litigation in connection with the trailer on Agassiz Street finally came to an end with the Selectmen's position upheld in every respect. While we regret the necessity of the prolonged proceedings, it is gratifying to note that there was never a single unfavorable official comment about our part in this affair. On advice of counsel the matter of the Stevens Inn property was settled out of court with the Town recovering all of the taxes, interest, and costs in this connection. Still pending are the negligence suit of a woman who fell down the Country Club stairs which is completely covered by insurance and

a similar suit by the estate of the individual allegedly killed by a falling tree at the swimming pool during a storm which unfortunately may not be fully covered by the amount of insurance in effect at that time.

A minor crisis developed during the latter part of the year with the resignation of the Overseer of the Poor and the inability to immediately find a replacement. The Surplus Food Program representing the major current function of this department was transferred to the Town Building and operations carried on by the Selectmen temporarily. A new Overseer of the Poor was appointed effective February 1, 1972, with the Town Office and Town Building to remain the headquarters from which the services will be administered.

New street signs were purchased and installed along Main Street from the town lines in either direction causing many favorable and appreciative comments. Next to receive the same treatment will be the main north-south routes, eventually branching off into the side streets. After much effort during which an order to raze the building was about to be served, the former Altamonte Hotel property on Main Street was cleaned up, painted and restored to a reasonable appearing state. This was indeed an accomplishment after having been a prominent eyesore for so many years.

There is no doubt that very little of the above would have been possible without the support, confidence and cooperation of the people of Bethlehem. We offer thanks and sincere appreciation to each and every one of you as your participation in community affairs is and will be of utmost importance.

#### March 9, 1971

Record of the Annual Town Meeting held in the Town Building on Tuesday the Ninth day of March, 1971.

The Meeting was called to order by the Moderator, Peter W. Smith, at 9:00 A.M. It was voted to proceed to vote by ballot on Articles 1, 19 and 24 and to delay the reading and action on the other Articles in the Warrant until the evening session. At 6:00 P.M. the Moderator declared the polls closed and the ballots were counted. The results of the ballot vote on the above Articles were as follows:

#### **EVENING SESSION**

Before opening the meeting, the Moderator, Peter W. Smith paid tribute to the retiring Town Clerk, George T. Noyes, who received a standing ovation. Mr. Noyes then introduced the people to the new Town Clerk, Myrtle A. Ledoux. The meeting was called to order at 7:40 P.M.

The Moderator read the results of the ballot vote on Article 1, and declared Myrtle A. Ledoux, Town Clerk, John C. Keller, Selectman, John M. A. Rolli, Trustee of the Trust Funds, Carol B. Boucher, Muriel J. Brown and Sandra Briggs Reinhold, Library Trustees.

It was moved by George T. Noyes, seconded by John C. Keller and duly voted that the Warrant be read Article by Article, as it is acted upon. The Moderator then read the results of the ballot.

Article 1: Acted upon by ballot vote.

Article 2: (\$93,995.00 Raised) It was moved by Anthony Pepitone, seconded by Malcolm Stevenson and voted, without discussion, to raise and appropriate the sum of \$93,995.00 to defray town charges for the ensuing year, as follows:

Article 4: (\$1,129.81 Raised) The motion was made by John C. Keller, seconded by Alistair D. MacBain and duly voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,129.81 for Town Road Aid.

Article 5: (\$1,000 Raised) The motion was made by Anthony Pepitone, seconded by William L. Mohr and duly voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000 for the Littleton Hospital.

Article 6: (\$897.50 Raised) The motion was made by Alistair D. MacBain seconded by Orville K. Bassett and duly voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$697.50 for the White Mountain Region Association and the sum of \$200.00 for the White Mountains 93 Association's "Ski 93".

Article 7: (\$4,000 Raised) The motion was made by John C. Keller, seconded by Gerald P. Sheahan and duly voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,000 for Advertising and/or Related Purposes.

Article 8: (\$1,200 Raised) The motion was made by Anthony Pepitone, seconded by Gerald P. Sheahan and after some discussion voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,200 to maintain an Information Booth during the Summer Season of 1971.

Article 9: (\$1,142 Raised) The motion was made by Alistair D. MacBain, seconded by Gerald P. Sheahan and voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,142 for the benefit of the White Mountain Community Services, Inc.

Article 10: (\$1,500.00 Raised) The motion was made by John C. Keller, seconded by Charles H. Whittier and duly voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,500 for hydrant repairs and moves and to cover any cost of repairs to town-owned water lines.

Article 11: (\$400 Raised) Motion was made by George T. Noyes, seconded by Cornelius T. Chase and duly voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400 to help defray the operating expenses of Whitefield Regional Airport.

Article 12: (\$1,500.00 Raised) Motion was made by Alistair D. MacBain, seconded by Betty McCullock after considerable discussion voted to expend the sum of \$1,500 (being a portion of the rent to be paid by Cornelius T. Chase, IV) for capital improvements on the Bethlehem Country Club Golf Course during the calendar year 1971. These improvements shall be made by the Town of Bethlehem under the direction of the Selectmen.

Article 13: (\$500 Raised) The motion was made by John C. Keller seconded by Muriel J. Brown and duly voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500 to join the Littleton Community Nurse Association Inc. for the ensuing year.

Article 14: (\$10,000 Authorized) The motion was made by Anthony Pepitone, seconded by Howard N. Keach, was duly voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,000.00 for the purchase of a new truck and plows for the Highway Department.

Article 15: The motion was made by Anthony Pepitone, seconded by George T. Noyes and after some discussion voted to authorize the Board of Selectmen to borrow on the credit of the Town the sum of \$10,000.00 and for the purpose of purchasing a truck and plow as voted in Article 14 and for this purpose authorize the issue of serial notes or bonds of the Town under and in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act or any other enabling authority, delegating to the Board of Selectmen the discretion of fixing the date, maturities, denominations, the interest rate, or discount rate in case of notes, the place of payment, the

form and other details of said bonds or notes, and providing for the sale thereof.

Article 16: The motion was made by George T. Noyes, seconded by F. Gordon Miller to authorize the Board of Selectmen to borrow monies from time to time, to pay current maintenance and operation expenses for the ensuing year, in anticipation of taxes. Malcolm J. Stevenson made a motion seconded by John M. A. Rolli to have the article amended to read "At most favorable interest rates possible." This amendment was passed by voice vote. The original motion was then passed.

RESULT: The Board of Selectmen were authorized to borrow monies from time to time to pay current maintenance and operation expenses for the ensuing year in anticipation of taxes at most favorable interest rates possible.

Article 17: The motion was made by John C. Keller. seconded by Alistair D. MacBain and duly voted to authorize and empower the Planning Board to approve or disapprove in its discretion new subdivisions and plats thereof showing streets or the widening thereof, or parks, and upon the adoption of this article, it shall be the duty of the Town Clerk to file with the Registry of Deeds of the County of Grafton a certificate or note showing that the said Planning Board has been so authorized giving the date of authorization, as provided in Section 19, and Sections 19-29 inclusive. Chapter 36. as amended, of the New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated, 1955. If the article is adopted, it shall further be the duty of the Town Clerk to issue all certificates of failure when the Planning Board shall fail to take action as provided in Chapter 36: Section 19, 20-29 inclusive.

Article 18: It was moved by Alistair D. MacBain and seconded by George T. Noyes to authorize the Board of Selectmen to sell property acquired by Deed of the Tax Collector. An Amendment was offered by Leonard Malenowski that the Selectmen sell property acquired by Deed of the Tax Collector "By sealed bid or at public auction." The amendment was voted and passed.

RESULT: The Board of Selectmen were authorized to sell property acquired by Deed of the Tax Collector by sealed bid or at public auction.

Article 19: Acted upon by ballot.

Article 20: Motion was made by John C. Keller, seconded by Winifred Jordan that the town accept a gift of land and take over a road now owned by Edward C. Garneau and Vera E. Garneau and known as Garneau Road, subject to the approval of the Board of Selectmen. Said road to be forty (40') feet in width. After some discussion the Article passed.

Article 21: Motion was made by Anthony Pepitone, seconded by Bela Sveda to accept a four hundred foot (400') extension of Turner Street, and a street to be known as James Street, being sixteen hundred feet (1600') long and forty feet (40') wide. Subject to being completed and meeting the approval of the Selectmen. This Article was passed.

Article 22: Motion was made by George T. Noyes, seconded by Charles Whittier to accept a gift of land and take over a road forty feet (40') in width now owned by F. Gordon and Frances S. Miller and known as Lower Brook Road Extension, subject to the approval of the Board of Selectmen. After some discussion this Article was passed.

Article 23: Motion was made by Alistair D. MacBain and seconded by Betty McCullock and duly voted to convey a parcel of land formerly known as Jellison Avenue, said parcel running between Congress Street and Fairview Avenue. The aforementioned parcel to be equally divided among the abutting property owners.

Article 24: Voted upon by ballot.

Under any other business that may legally come before this meeting a Resolution was made by Orville K. Bassett and seconded by Leonard Malenowski that this town meeting go on record as being opposed to any State Sales or Income Taxes and that any future action regarding same be the subject of a Special State referendum held not later than 15 March, 1972. After some discussion this was carried with 97 for and 8 against.

Winifred Jordan made a motion to resume the mailing of the Bethlehem Town Reports and to publish the Warrant in the newspaper two weeks prior to Town Meeting. The motion was seconded by Marilyn Lavoie. This motion did not carry. George T. Noyes advised that since the new Town Clerk's Office would be open from 9 to 5 P.M. that it should be easier for all to pick up the town report without too much difficulty.

The Moderator then entertained a motion for adjournment which was quickly made and seconded and the meeting adjourned at 10:00 P.M.

## Summary Program of the White Mountains Region Association

#### 1971 (34th Year)

Pioneered an engineering project at the University of New Hampshire in researching problems of snow erosion at ski areas. This project is well underway now and it appears that some practical solutions have been arrived at.

Maintained an active legislative program through the formation of a joint committee of the four regional promotional groups in the White Mountains.

Helped defeat an increase in the rooms and meals tax and gave strong support regarding the 16-mile extension of the Spaulding Turnpike.

Continued to promote new outdoor sports compatible to the region namely, whitewater canoeing, ski touring and bicycling.

Posted the annual 500 miles of fall foliage tour leaves.

Participated in a citizens' review committee on the controversial 4 million dollar federal Connecticut Basin study and were successful in altering some of the recommendations of this study.

Continued to develop the concept of promoting the off-season for tourists as against the high season.

Gave awards to 4-H groups in Grafton and Coos Counties.

Received 6,593 inquiries for the season which were answered with kits of folders.

Wrote 49 news releases. Wrote 259 personal letters.

Wrote four magazine articles and had twenty-five photographs appear in magazines and newspapers.

Printed and distributed 275,000 folders.

Appeared on four radio programs and attended two travel shows. Total income for 1971, \$33,833.

Presently we are working to make the state regional planning effort coincide with the six existing region associations.

Presently we are working with the Neighborhood Youth Corps to develop a course in hotel management for high school drop-outs, etc.

As Superintendent of Schools, it is with pleasure that I submit my sixth annual report to you.

During the past year (1970-71) there were 222 pupils enrolled at the Bethlehem Elementary School. This school year there are 219 pupils attending school in Bethlehem. There is a total of 73 tuition pupils registered in schools outside the District. Of this number, 71 are enrolled at Littleton High School and two at the White Mountains Regional High School. Tuition rates this year at Littleton are \$1,292.00 for junior high and \$1,102.00 for the high school. The tuition rate at White Mountains Regional High School is \$1,025.00.

As you know your Board of Education and your Supervisory Union Administration have done much to supply Principal May with as many as possible of the newer materials so important to education today. Your Board of Education has expended the funds with a great deal of vision and yet, as always, have remained conscious of cost in the areas of textbooks, library materials, teaching supplies and equipment as related to the teaching of your children. These expenditures, plus the increases noted for 1972-73, are present because of the belief that the young people in our charge need the materials, as well as a consciousness of the minimum standards set forth by the State of New Hampshire.

May I, as your Superintendent, encourage you to consult with your Board of Education and meet these responsibilities affirmatively.

The Bethlehem Elementary School has, as you all know, been advancing under the leadership of Principal May. This progress is noted as we realize the educational philosophy of the community and the school is developing and the formulation of such will include the community as a whole. This past year your Board of Education has implemented physical education. You may recall that this was a direction requested at a school district meeting. The program is half time in that the instructor is shared with the Lafayette Regional School District and each child receives two full classes per week. In addition to physical education; soccer, gymnastics, track and field activities have also been implemented at the Bethlehem Elementary School. This program of using community resources has continued, and as you will all note, has grown considerably during the past year. Mr. May has been continuing his research and study and next year he will continue his study in the field of elementary education. It is only because of this desire on the part of your staff to improve themselves that we are continually able to update your curriculum and the overall program of the Bethlehem Elementary School. It would be well for each of us to read Principal May's report as it covers the specifics in more detail.

As Superintendent, I feel it would be beneficial for the people of Bethlehem to fully understand the services provided by your Central Office, as it serves all of the towns located in Supervisory Union #35. All of the services provided by the staff of White Mts. Supervisory Union #35 relate most definitely to all the children located within the boundaries of Supervisory Union #35

Our Assistant Superintendent, Mr. Joseph Joseph is in charge of personnel, recruitment, teacher training, etc. Our Business Administrator, Mr. Bruce Moore is in charge of all phases of purchasing, state and federal financial reports, audits, insurance, transportation and all of the legal facets of the Supervisory Union. Mrs. Rita Besaw as Teacher Consultant for Elementary Curriculum co-ordinates all of the elementary programs in the Supervisory Union in a most up-to-date method. Because of the efficiency she exudes in her field, we have found that the elementary programs throughout the Union are progressing toward a point which will make the implementation of minimum standards very effective.

Mr. Daniel Worcester is in charge of Pupil Personnel and deals with those children that have special problems. We are all conscious, because of the increased knowledge present today, that there are many handicaps that have been revealed to educators that they were not familiar with in past years such as: speech and hearing, retardation and perceptual, as well as physical handicaps. Mr. Worcester helps us to maintain the continuity of our educational programs while at the same time helping our special children to obtain the most possible from our educational programs.

Mr. Clifford Boivin is our Director for Vocational Education and although he is not directly involved with elementary programs, he provides continuity and special help to those students coming from the elementary levels to the junior and senior high levels. It appears that in future years, a good deal more emphasis will be placed on vocational training and the sooner this vocational training can be handled by our schools, the sooner our children will be prepared for the job world and I do believe this will tend to improve the economy and wealth of our area of the state.

The Central Office wishes to extend to the citizens of Bethlehem an invitation to visit us and become more aware of the services provided by our staff and the benefits which are derived by all the towns served by our Supervisory Union.

In closing, I wish to thank the members of the Bethlehem Board of Education for their efforts in the betterment of the education of your school district. We also wish to express our gratitude to Mr. May and his staff for their concern for the needs of the Bethlehem children and their interest in the plan of education that our Supervisory Union is developing.

### REPORT OF THE PRINCIPAL

### TO: Superintendent Grass

Bethlehem School's student population has increased by 38 students in one year. Grade 7 has 25 students, Grade 8 has 31 students. A reminder is in order here. Bethlehem School's population with Grades 1-12, in 1965 was 160 students. Bethlehem's School Enrollment now stands at 228 students in grades Kindergarten through Grade 8.

Classroom enrollment in some grades far exceeds the minimum considered for good equality of attention.

Junior High students are suffering the most from this kind of overcrowding and from the lack of time a Junior High School programs. The programs that exist are good, but because of space, funds and faculty size, the students are deprived of proper programs for their age and development. Many makeshift, emergency kinds of projects have been invented, but they are not funded, not continuous, and are in essence, just marking time, or treading water.

The increased student population of the school appears in number earlier in this report. What does not appear in the report is the fact that these students are not all natives of their community.

A great number of these students have come from other towns, other cities, and from other parts of their country. They, as well as their parents, have brought new ideas, and new demands upon the educational systems.

A great impact upon the school and its programs comes from the children who have spent their entire lives at Bethlehem. They come to school with greater experiences, greater potentials, and with much more uncertainty to face than any other generation showing up at school each morning. This has demanded that each faculty member retain and update materials as well as techniques. This has been done, and is an ongoing process with the faculty.

The leading educators in the country are challenging with research all aspects of traditional education and its impact on modern youth in modern times.

It is up to school administrators and teachers to meet the needs of our youth and the growing number of youth that come to our schools.

### NEIGHBORHOOD YOUTH CORP

- —Speech Therapy through the efforts of the North Country Education Service. Nine students from Bethlehem received developmental speech therapy.
- —Media Center of the N.C.E.S. has made more films, slides, hardware items available to the Bethlehem School in a fast, efficient and inexpensive manner.

This service, the amazing variety of subjects has helped considerably in enriching our program, and most important has made it possible to cut down on purchases of such material for our school.

Bethlehem School has been very fortunate in the fact that 100 percent of the supporting staff and faculty returned to their positions this year.

The school's students were courteously and efficiently served by the following staff members. Not enough can be said for the care and planning that was done by these people for our students.

Each of our supporting staff has had to increase their time and efforts this year, as the increased enrollment has added extra burdens to their responsibilities.

This year we were aided greatly by the White Mountain Community Services.

There has been an increase in the number of referrals made to WMCS as our school population has increased.

The students themselves received more help this year. The school had more time involved with the service.

W.M.C.S., along with the school nurse and psychologist, planned and implemented a good sound drug program.

The faculty and administration of the Bethlehem School would like to thank the members of the Supervisory Union Office personnel for the manner in which they gave advice and support to the Bethlehem School.
