To the Inhabitants of the Town of Chesterfield in the County of Cheshire in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affiairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Chesterfield on Tuesday, the ninth day of March, next at 6:30 o'clock in the evening to act upon the following subjects. (Polls will be open at 11:00 A. M.)

Article 1. To vote by Australian Ballot for all necessary Town Officers.

Article 2. To determine the method of collecting taxes for the ensuing year.

Article 3. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

Article 4. To hear the report of the Budget Committee and act thereon.

Article 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the following sums, as approved by the Budget Committee for:

- Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,300.00 for street lighting. (Approved by the Budget Committee.)
- Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$849.00 for the Monadnock Region Association to continue its efforts in areas of solid waste disposal, planning, pesticides, legislation, State Parks, youth work and by other means call attention to the protection of the natural resources of the Town, plus its other advantages, along with the other thirty-seven Towns in the Monadnock Region. (\$650.00 approved by the Budget Committee.)
- Article 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,002.00 in support of the Elliot Community Hospital for the year 1971. (Approved by the Budget Committee.)
- Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,557.93 for Town Road Aid, thereby receiving an additional \$10,386.20 from the State. (Approved by the Budget Committee.)
- Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$17,000.00 for winter maintenance of roads. (Approved by the Budget Committee.)
- Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$29,000.00 for summer maintenance of roads. (Approved by the Budget Committee.)
- Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,000.00 for the repair and upkeep of Highway Equipment. (Approved by the Budget Com.)
- Article 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000.00 for the continuation of Road Improvement of our Town Highways. The location of the work to be under the supervision of the Selectmen

in cooperation with the Road Committee. (Approved by

the Budget Committee.)

Article 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$27,500.00 for the purchase of a new Town Grader. The sum of \$3,500.00 to be by taxation this year. The balance to be on a longterm note of \$4,000.00 per year for 6 years. (Approved by the Budget Committee.) (Recommended by the Committee to use \$6,000.00 in the capital reserve fund to reduce this figure.)

- Article 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 as a contingency fund to be used for the purchase of land on the Open Space Program. (Approved by the Budget Committee.)
- Article 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$825.00, thereby receiving an additional \$2,448.00 of Federally sponsored aid under the Presidents Safe Streets Act and The Omnibus Crime Control Act. This money is to be used in the Chesterfield Police Department for new State wide radio communications changeover now being adopted by all local Town, County and State Police Agencies for a municipal four channel system, thereby phasing out all present separate frequency systems. (Approved by the Budget Committee.)
- Article 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 to remove stumps, grade, seed and build an approach road between Rte. 63 and the access road to the Morris Friedsam Cemetery. The location of this proposed work is on a portion of the land westerly of Rte. 63 near the top of "Wethebee Hill", and deeded to the Town in 1940. (Submitted by the Selectmen.) (\$500.00 approved by the Budget Committee.)
- Article 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$18,000.00 to purchase a new fire truck to replace the 1946 Ford truck in the center station. \$4,000.00 to be raised this year and the balance in long term notes of \$3,500.00 per year for 4 years. (Submitted without recommendation.)
- Article 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 to the Monadnock Region Humane Society, which services the community of Chesterfield in many ways and is supported almost entirely by donations. (Approved by the Budget Committee.)
- Article 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate an amount equal to 20 cents per capita to help

- support the work of the Monadnock Health & Welfare Council. (Not recommended by the Budget Committee.)
- Article 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$450.00 to buy street signs to be installed at street intersections where needed. The signs to be installed by the West Chesterfield Fire Department. (Not recommended by the Budget Committee.)
- Article 22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$84.00 to install street lights near the residence of Allen Grimes and the residence of Frederick Rawlings. (Not recommended by the Budget Com.)
- Article 23. To see if the Town will vote to accept Wildwood Road, off the North Shore Road, in Wildwood Acres of the George Joslin development as accepted by the Planning Board when required buildings are erected.
- Article 24. To see if the Town will vote to accept a deed from Spofford Associates, Inc., deeding an 800 foot gravel road leading from Rte. 9, presently known as Wellington Drive, and providing access to three residences.
- Article 25. To see if the Town will vote to accept the socalled Twin Brook Road from Rte. 9 to Rte. 63 opposite the residence of Imogene Chickering, as being Residential District No. 1.
- Article 26. To see if the Town will vote to transfer jurisdiction of the following roads to the Dept. of Resources & Economic Development. All of the Winchester to Chesterfield Road from the Town line north to the Horseshoe Road, and all of the Horseshoe Road lying inside of the properties acquired for the Pisgah Wilderness State Park. A total of 2.6 miles
- Article 27. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the following roads:
  - A. That portion of #105 from Winchester Town line northerly about 400 feet to that portion discontinued in 1945.
  - B. That portion of #107 at the Swanzey Town line to the junction of #80.
  - C. That portion of #83, one hundred feet easterly from the residence of Richard Wood to #80 or West Swanzey Road so-called.
  - D. That portion of #78 north easterly 100 feet beyond the residence of Fritz Richter to the junction of #122.
  - E. That portion of #111 at Hulsander's Camp north easterly to Westmoreland Town line.

- F. That portion of #61 from a pin in the road at the entrance of the sugar house, so-called, of Priscilla Wright to the Westmoreland Town line.
- Article 28. To see if the Town will vote to accept from the Chesterfield Cemetery Commission the following: The sum of \$50.00 to be known as the Russell W. Davis, Sr. Trust Fund; the sum of \$50.00 to be known as the Leo & Emma Short Trust Fund; the sum of \$100.00 to be known as the Burt Trust Fund and the sum of \$50.00 to be known as the B. C. Pierstorff Trust Fund. The income from said funds to be paid to Chesterfield Cemetery Commission for perpetual care in Spofford Village Cemetery Annex.
- Article 29. To see if the Town will vote to accept from the Chesterfield Cemetery Commission: The sum of \$25.00 from Marian Mitchner; the sum of \$200.00 from Carl & Margaret Johnson and the sum of \$200.00 from James & Dorothy O'Neil. The above funds to establish a single Trust Fund for the Morris Friedsam Cemetery. The income to be paid to Chesterfield Cemetery Commission and allocated to the Morris Friedsam Cemetery for care and upkeep.
- Article 30. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$100.00 from Archibald Hurford to be added to the Walter C. Hurford Trust Fund. Income from same to be for the perpetual care of the Walter C. Hurford lot in Spofford Village Cemetery.
- Article 31. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$150.00 from Winifred Cray. The income from same to be paid to the Chesterfield West Cemetery Association for the perpetual care of the Frank H. & Margaret B. Watts lot and to be known as the Frank H. & Margaret B. Watts Trust Fund.
- Article 32. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$200.00 from the Estate of Ethel A. Butler. Income from same to be paid to the C.W.C.A. for perpetual care of the George Butler lot 107-108 in Chesterfield West Cemetery.
- Article 33. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$200.00 from James G. Mead to be added to Trust Fund for care of Converse Mead Cemetery. Income to be used for care of said cemetery.
- Article 34. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$100.00 from Winston Cray to be added to the D.

Homer Cray & Winston Cray Trust Fund. Income to be paid to C.W.C.A. for care of said lot in Chesterfield West Cemetery.

Article 35. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$100.00 from Mrs. Matthew Littmann. The income from same to be paid to the Chesterfield West Cemetery Association for perpetual care of the Matthew Littmann lot #128 in Chesterfield West Cemetery and to be known as the Matthew Littmann Trust Fund.

Article 36. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$50.00 from Esther Carey. The income from same to be paid to the C.W.C.A. for perpetual care of the Emroy Carey lot #37 in Chesterfield West Cemetery and to be known as the Emroy and Esther Carey Trust Fund.

Article 37. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

# **TOWN MEETING 1970**

Proceedings of the Annual Meeting of the voters of the Town of Chesterfield, New Hampshire called at the Town Hall in said Town on Tuesday, March 10, 1970.

The meeting was called to order at 11:00 o'clock in the morning by the Moderator, James E. O'Neil, who read the Warrant through Article 1 and declared the Polls were open for voting by Ballot for all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.

Carl A. Johnson and Mildred Gauthier were appointed Assistant Moderator and Assistant Clerk and took their oath of office.

At 6:30 P.M. the meeting was called to order by the Moderator.

The flag was presented by the Girl Scouts under the leadership of Mrs. Betty Ashworth and the flag salute given by all, followed by all singing "The Star Spangled Banner" accompanied on the piano by Mrs. Oscar Ericson.

The Moderator called on Rev. Arthur Clifford who gave the Invocation.

Selectman George E. Joslin asked all to stand for one minute of Silent Prayer in Memory of William O'Neil who lost his life in Viet Nam.

The Articles of the Warrant were then disposed of as follows:

On motion made by Arvid Pearson and supported by Robert Callahan it was voted by voice vote to dispense with the reading of the Warrant. Vote carried in the affirmative.

Article 2. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Harry E. Winn and suppored by Robert Callahan to use the same method of collecting taxes for the ensuing year as in the past. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 3. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Arvid Pearson and supported by Robert Callahan to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 4. Gerald Knickerbocker, Chairman of the Budget Committee, was called upon to give a report for the

Budget Committee. He stated that the Public Meeting was held on February 4 and that they had four other meetings and that their report could be found on Pages 19 and 20 in the Annual Town Report. Voted by voice vote on motion made by George E. Joslin and supported by Arvid Pearson to accept the report as given. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 5. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Winston H. Cray and supported by Harry E. Winn to raise and appropriate the following sums, as approved by the Budget Committee for:

Article 6. Voted by voice vote on motion made by George E. Joslin and supported by Clifford E. Chickering to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,250.00 for street lighting. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 7. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Robert Callahan and supported by George E. Joslin to raise and appropriate the sum of \$650.00 (six cents per \$1,000.00 of the Town's 1966 equalized valuation) to the Monadnock Region Association, an agency to advertise, promote and preserve the natural advantages and resources of the Town in cooperation with the other 37 Towns of the Monadnock Region. Vote delcared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 8. Voted by voice vote on motion made by H. Claude Mowry and supported by Winston H. Cray to raise and appropriate the sum of \$954.00 in support of the Elliot Community Hospital for the year 1970. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 9. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Harry E. Winn and supported by Russell C. Johnson to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,569.96 for Town Road Aid, thereby receiving an additional \$10,466.38 from the State. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

10. Voted by voice vote on motion made by George E. Joslin and supported by Clifford E. Chickering to raise and appropriate the sum of \$17,000.00 for Winter Maintenance of roads. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 11. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Winston H. Cray and supported by George E. Joslin to raise and appropriate the sum of \$29,000.00 for summer maintenance of roads. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 12. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Harry E. Winn and supported by Arvid Pearson to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,000.00 for the repair and upkeep of Highway Equipment. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 13. Voted by voice vote on motion made by H. Claude Mowry and supported by Clifford E. Chickering to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000.00 for the continuation of Road Improvement of our Town Highways. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 14. Voted by voice vote on motion made by H. Claude Mowry and supported by Russell C. Johnson to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 each year for a new Town Truck, so that the Town can purchase

a new truck every four years. This Article was submitted by the Road Committee and was approved by the Budget Committee. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 15. Voted by voice vote on motion made by H. Claude Mowry and supported by Russell C. Johnson to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000.00 each year to build a fund for a new road grader (\$3,000.00) and a new loader (\$2,000.00) thereby the Town would be able to buy new equipment each 10 years, approximately. This Article was submitted by the Road Committee and was approved by the Budget Committee. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 16. Voted by voice vote on motion made by H. Claude Mowry and supported by Grace Kearney amend the Article and raise the sum of \$4,000.00 under this Article. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative. Voted by voice vote on motion made by H. Claude Mowry and supported by Clifford E. Chickering to adopt the Article as amended, namely, to buy a new dump truck to cost not over \$9,500.00 to be paid for by turning in the old dump truck for an allowance of \$3,500.00, and to raise the sum of \$4,000.00 from 1970 taxes toward the balance of the cost. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Voted by voice vote on motion made by Harry E. Winn and supported by Winston H. Cray that we reconsider Article 14. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 14. Voted by Voice Vote on motion made by George Marrow and supported by Harry E. Winn to amend this Article and that the \$2,000.00 to be raised this year be earmarked toward the purchase of the truck voted in Article 16. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Voted by voice vote on motion made by George Marrow and supported by Robert Mills to accept Article 14 as amended. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Voted by voice vote on motion made by Clifford Emery and supported by Robert Callahan to reconsider Article 12. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the negative and the reconsideration lost.

Article 17. Voted by voice vote on motion made by H. Claude Mowry and supported by Robert Mills to raise

the sum of \$2,500.00 to insulate the ceiling and build an addition on the Town barn, and install a heating system therein to heat the barn. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 18. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Clifford E. Chickering and supported by Arvid Pearson to raise the sum of \$800.00 to buy and erect an entrance gate, and fence where there are no existing walls, in the Morris Friedsam Cemetery. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 19. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Harry E. Winn and supported by Donald Emery to amend the Article and raise the sum of \$1,500.00 as approved by the Budget Committee instead of the \$3,000.00 asked for in the Article for this project. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the negative and the amendment lost.

Voted by voice vote on motion made by Arvid Pearson and supported by Clifford E. Chickering to adopt the Article as read, namely: Because of the serious problems encountered by the cottage owners around Spofford Lake to obtain pure drinking water, that the following be provided by the Town of Chesterfield. A deep well to be drilled on land given to the Town by Mrs. Morris Friedsam (or on another suitable piece of land) a submersible pump provided, a pit made and a 42 gallon tank installed in it; from this tank a pipe to a manifold on which there would be attached four faucets suitable to fill water jugs from; the area around the well to be graded and graveled sufficient to park several cars off the main highway. Total cost of this project not to exceed \$3,000.00. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 20. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Wayne Winn and supported by Robert Mills to raise and appropriate the sum of \$650.00 to install a dry hydrant at the pond next to the Doll Museum on Route 9. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 21. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Wayne Winn and supported by Arvid Pearson to raise and appropriate the sum of \$560.00 to purchase one mobile radio for use by the West Chesterfield Fire Chief. This was submitted by the Fire Wards. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 22. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Harry E. Winn and supported by Robert Callahan to authorize the Selectmen to sell the Model "A" fire truck and to allow the West Chesterfield Fire Department to use said

funds towards the purchase of a utility vehicle. The remaining funds needed for this unit to be furnished by the West Chesterfield Fire Department. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 23. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Peter Petschik and supported by Robert Mills to raise and appropriate the sum of \$440.00 to be used by the Chesterfield police department to buy three police monitors, for use by the Chesterfield police department to initiate a police alert system for Chesterfield on the Cheshire County police communications network. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 24. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Peter Petschik and supported by Robert Mills to raise and appropriate the sum of \$230.00 to be used by the Chesterfield police department, to buy one electronic siren for use by the Chesterfield Police department on the Spofford constable's vehicle in time of emergency. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 25. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Winston H. Cray and supported by George Marrow to amend the agreement with the State made under Article 25 of the Town Warrant of 1952 and exclude from Social Security coverage of its employees, submitted in accordance with New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated Chapter 101 section 5 service in any class or classes of positions of election officials or election workers for a calendar quarter in which the remuneration paid for such service is less than \$50.00. Vote declared by the Moderator to be in the affirmative.

Vote by voice vote on motion made by George E. Joslin and supported by Clifford E. Chickering to accept the Article 25 of the Town Warrant of 1952 as Amended to read: To adopt a plan for extending to employees of the Town the benefits of Title II of the Federal Security Act (Old-Age and Survivor's Insurance) as Authorized by Chapter 234 of the law of 1951, excluding from the plan for Social Security coverage of its employees, submitted in accordance with New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annoted Chapter 101 section 5, service in any class or classes of positions of election officials or election workers for a calendar quarter in which the remuneration paid for such service is less than \$50.00. Vote declared to be carried in the affirmative and the Article as Amended to be adopted.

Article 26. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Arvid Pearson and supported by Wayne Winn to rescind the action taken under Article 27 of the 1951 Town Warrant, and have the Selectmen appoint the Road Agent to serve each year after Town Meeting 1971, rather than that the position be filled by electing the Road Agent. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Voted by voice vote on motion made by George E. Joslin and supported by H. Claude Mowry to accept Articles 27, 28, 29, 30, 31, 32, 33, 34, 35, and 36. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative. These Articles are as follows:

Article 27. Voted to accept the sum of \$150.00 from the Chesterfield Cemetery Commission to be added to the Ernest Scharles Trust Fund.

Article 28. Voted to accept the sum of \$50.00 from the Chesterfield Cemetery Commission, to be known as the Halsey Flora Trust Fund, the income to be paid to said Commission for perpetual care in Spofford Village Cemetery Annex.

Article 29. Voted to accept the sum of \$50.00 from the Chesterfield Cemetery Commission, to be known as the Robert J. Bahr Trust Fund, the income to be paid to said Commission for perpetual care in Spofford Village Cemetery Annex.

Article 30. Voted to accept the sum of \$50.00 from the Chesterfield Cemetery Commission, to be known as the Hans Kienle Trust Fund, the income to be paid to said Commission for perpetual care in Spofford Village Cemetery Annex.

Article 31. Voted to accept the sum of \$100.00 from Chesterfield Cemetery Commission, to be known as the August Schiewe Trust Fund, the income to be paid to said Commission for perpetual care in Spofford Village Cemetery Annex.

Article 32. Voted to accept the sum of \$500.00 from Dr. N. H. Robertson, the income to be used for perpetual care of the T. N. Robertson Cemetery.

Article 33. Voted to accept the sum of \$200.00 from Mrs. Henry C. Chickering, Sr. and Clifford E. Chickering, the income to be paid to the C.W.C.A. for perpetual care of Henry C. Chickering, Sr. and Clifford E. Chickering lot in the Chesterfield West Cemetery, and to be known as the Henry C. Chickering, Sr. and Clifford E. Chickering Trust Fund.

Article 34. Voted to accept the sum of \$200.00 from Frank A. Hubner, the income from same to be paid to

C.W.C.A. for the perpetual care and upkeep of the Anna C. and Frank A. Hubner lot in the Chesterfield West Cemetery Annex and to be known as the Anna C. and Frank A. Hubner Trust Fund.

Article 35. Voted to eccept the sum of \$200.00 from Jane P. Nicholas and Sylvia P. Scranton, income from same to be paid to C.W.C.A. for perpetual care of the Henry I. Putnam lot No. 127 in Chesterfield West Cemetery Annex and to be known as the Henry I. Putnam Trust Fund.

Article 36. Voted to accept the sum of \$100.00 from Maverette R. Herrick and family, income from same to be paid to C.W.C.A. for perpetual care of the Fred R. Randall lot No. 139-140 in Chesterfield West Cemetery to be known as the Fred R. Randall Trust Fund.

Article 37. Voted by voice vote on motion made by H. Claude Mowry and supported by Wayne Winn to ask the Selectmen to enter an Article in next year's Warrant "To see if the Town will vote to have a professional group evaluate the property of the Town and vote to appropriate sufficient funds to pay for such evaluation." The Moderator declared the vote carried in the negative and therefore did not pass.

Clifford Emery asked if the Selectmen could mail copies of Town Reports to tax payers.

H. Claude Mowry, not satisfied with the voice vote on his motion for evaluation of property, asked for a show of hands. This resulted in 55 votes for "Yes" and 59 votes for "No". The Moderator declared the vote still carried in the negative and therefore did not pass.

George Marrow moved that the Board of Selectmen invite Winthrop Faulkner to work with them to review method of listing and make his recommendations. This did not pass as it was felt that in electing the Selectmen we had confidence in them.

Robert Woodman suggested that the Planning Board should bring in some ideas for Development.

For Fireward. Arvid W. Pearson had 238 votes, Kenneth Wiggin had 2 votes, Peter Petschik, David Hall and Wayne Winn each had 1 vote. Arvid W. Pearson was declared elected.

For Auditors. Ann M. Knickerbocker had 219 votes, Prudence S. Mitchell had 233 votes and were each declared elected.

For Budget Committee. Carl A. Johnson had 237 votes, Robert E. Woodman had 225 votes, Forest F. Hall had 15 votes, Glenn Chickering had 12 votes, William Mitchell had 8 votes, Warren Allen had 8 votes, Harry Winn had 5 votes, Gerald Knickerbocker had 5 votes, Arvid Pearson had 4 votes, R. W. Beebe had 3 votes, Harold Foster had 3 votes, and there were 35 scattered votes. Carl A. Johnson, Robert E. Woodman and Forest F. Hall were declared elected.

For Trustee of Trust Funds for Three Years. Agnes B. Chickering had 246 votes and was declared elected.

For Sexton. Raymond B. Chickering had 35 votes, Otto S. Schlichting had 7 votes, Alvin Davis had 3 votes and there were 26 scattered votes. Raymond B. Chickering was declared elected.

For Spofford Constable. Peter Petschik had 246 votes, George Aldrich, Kenneth Davis and John McKeon each had 1 vote. Peter Petschik was declared elected.

For Center Constable. Robert T. Mills, Jr. had 252 votes and was declared elected.

For West Chesterfield Constable. Lester M. Chickering had 237 votes, Thomas Dean had 5 votes, Bernard Chicker-

ing had 3 votes, and Charles Hills had 2 votes. Lester M. Chickering was declared elected.

### REPORT OF BUILDING INSPECTOR

In 1970 Chesterfield continued to show growth. Seventeen permits were issued for new homes as of thirteen in 1969. Five summer cottages compared with three in 1969. Two less trailers were located here than in the previous year; we had three. Your inspector looks for an increase in this department the coming year due to the restrictions put on them in the neighboring towns.

A study of Chesterfield's growth the past five years should be very interesting to all of us. Seventy-two new homes have been erected for permanent living; thirteen new trailers for this purpose. This makes eighty-five new families. To the school board—we salute you for managing the problem as well as you have. May the next five be prepared for as well.

We now look to our major industry—recreation. A sharp decline in the construction of summer cottages is noticeable; only twenty-four in the past five years. At present about forty-six percent of taxable property is now non-resident. It was over fifty percent. Here again I congratulate the school board—I had not mentioned nearly forty summer homes that have gone into the permanent resident class. Well over a hundred new families. You do have problems, don't you?

To all of you, growth, which we must accept with rising cost of living, are causing you trouble taxwise. Oh, where is our broad based tax?

In closing, I have only briefly touched on our problems, and I want to say to everyone—get into the picture and preserve some land for the ecology of our town, as well as well as for your grandchildren, before it is too late. A few years more may be too late. The present statistics give us the picture.

### SCHOOL DISTRICT MEETING

Chesterfield School District Meeting March 8, 1970

The Moderator called the meeting to order at 10:00 a.m. and the Clerk read the Warrant through Article I. The Moderator, Harry E. Winn, then declared the polls open for balloting for the necessary school district officers.

Prior to the meeting, Jean Hubner and Agnes B. Chickering were appointed Ballot Clerks by the School Board. They took the oath of office from the Moderator. A count of the ballots showed 494 ballots.

The Moderator appointed Merton Davis assistant Clerk and Gerald Knickerbocker assistant Moderator. They took the oath of office from the Moderator.

At 8:00 p.m. the Moderator again called the meeting to order, and the Clerk read the remainder of the Warrant.

The Articles were then disposed of as follows:

James E. O'Neil moved the adoption of the following resolution: Whereas; Anna Hubbard served this community faithfully and diligently as a school board member and ballot clerk of the school district: Be it resolved that the voters of the school district hereby gratefully acknowledge her long and faithful service to the children and citizens of Chesterfield by dedicating this meeting in her memory. Seconded by Wayne Winn. Motion carried in the affirmative; unamimously.

Article 2. Ann Knickerbocker moved that the reports of agents, auditors, and officers be adopted as printed in the Annual Report. Seconded by Carl Johnson. Motion carried in the affirmative.

Article 3. George Joslin moved that the district accept the provisions of Public Law 89-10 (Elementary and Secondary Education Act) and that the district appropriate such funds as may be made available to the district under said Federal Act for such particular projects as may be determined by the school board. Further that the school board be authorized to make application for such funds, and expend the same for such projects as it may designate. Seconded by Agnes B. Chickering. Vote on the motion declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 4. Winston Cray moved that the district authorize the school board to make application for and to accept and spend in the name of the district such advances, grants in aid or other funds for educational purposes as may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the United States Government, the State of New Hampshire, or any department or agency thereof, or any federal, state or private agency. Seconded by James E. O'Neil. Vote on the motion declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 5. James E. O'Neil moved that the district establish an Authorized Regional Enrollment Area (AREA) School Planning Committee in accordance with R.S.A. 195-A:3 as amended, said committee to consist of three qualified voters of whom at least one shall be a member of the school board. Further that the committee so established be appointed by the Moderator. Seconded by George Joslin. Vote on the motion declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

The Moderator appointed H. Claude Mowry, Gerald Knickerbocker and James E. O'Neil to this committee.

Article 6. Lillian B. Lane moved that the district authorize the employment of a Teacher Consultant for New Hampshire Supervisory Union No. 29 as provided in R.S.A. 186:11 XII and XXIV as amended. Seconded by Clara B. Wellington. Vote on the motion declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 7. James E. O'Neil moved that the district raise and appropriate the sum of \$319,643.00, for the support of schools, for the payment of salaries for school district officials and agents, and for payment of the statutory obligations of the district. Seconded by Arvid Pearson. Vote on the motion declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 8. No business was brought up under this Article to transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

Voting on all of the Articles having been concluded, the Moderator recessed the meeting at 8:20 p.m. There were 43 citizens at the meeting.

The checklist of voters was used. A count of the ballots resulted as follows:

Number of votes cast 69.

For Moderator for the ensuing year; Harry E. Winn had 63 votes; Carl A. Johnson had 1 vote and Norman

Amidon had 1 vote. The Clerk declared Harry E. Winn elected Moderator for the ensuing year. He took the oath of office from the Clerk.

For School Board Member for three years; James E. O'Neil had 66 votes; William Mitchell had 1 vote and Gerald Knickerbocker had 1 vote. The Moderator declared James E. O'Neil elected a member of the School Board for three years. He took the oath of office from the Moderator.

For Clerk for the ensuing year; H. Claude Mowry had 64 votes; and Jean Hubner had 1 vote. The Moderator declared H. Claude Mowry elected Clerk for the ensuing year He took the oath of office from the Moderator.

For Treasurer for the ensuing year: Ann Bevis had 21 votes; H. Claude Mowry had 8 votes; Carl Johnson had 2 votes; Paul Penning had 2 votes and there were several scattered votes. The Moderator declared Ann Bevis elected Treasurer for the ensuing year. She took the oath of office from the Moderator.

For Auditors (2) for the ensuing year: Prudence S. Mitchell had 59 votes and Ann M. Knickerbocker had 32 votes. The Moderator declared Prudence S. Mitchell and Ann M. Knickerbocker elected Auditors for the ensuing year.

Agnes B. Chickering moved that the meeting be adjourned. Seconded by Gerald Knickerbocker. Vote on the motion was declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affimative.

The meeting adjourned at 9:25 p.m.

### SCHOOL WARRANT

To the inhabitants of the School District of the Town of Chesterfield qualified to vote in District affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Chesterfield Central Elementary School in said District on the 6th day of March, 1971, at 3:00 o'clock in the afternoon to bring in your votes for the election of the school district officers. The polls will be open not later than 3:00 p.m., nor close earlier than 9:00 p.m.

Article 1. To choose all necessary school district officers:

A Moderator for the ensuing year.

A clerk for the ensuing year.

A member of the school board for the ensuing three years.

Auditors for the ensuing year.

A treasurer from July 1, 1971, for the ensuing year.

Article 2. To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees, or officers chosen and pass any votes relating thereto.

Article 3. To see if the District will vote to authorize the school board to make application for, and to accept and use in the name of the District such advances, grants-in-aid or other funds for educational purposes as may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the United States Government, the State of New Hampshire, or any department or agency thereof, or any federal, state, or private agency.

Article 4. To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$8,000.00 to provide for the services of a "resource teacher," and suitable instructional materials and to authorize the Board to effectuate the purposes of this article.

Note: This special instruction will assist several children who have learning disabilities, either of serious or minor nature. The teacher employed will have special training and skills. The anticipated income from state and federal funds is \$4,200.00, thus reducing the local tax cost to \$3,800.00.

Article 5. To see if the District will vote to establish a Building Committee composed of not more than seven members, four appointed by the moderator, and the three members of your school board.

Note: Increasing school enrollments necessitate the use of the cafeteria, all purpose room, for a classroom during 1971-1972. There are other school room needs which will become more necessary, or desirable as the new Minimum Standards for Elementary Schools become a requirement. Our A. R. E. A. Planning Committee is already working with similar committees of other districts. The special Building Committee proposed can work together to develop a complete report with recommendations and alternatives.

Article 6. To see what sum of money the District will vote to raise and appropriate for support of schools, for the payment of salaries for school district officials and agents, and for payment of statutory obligations of the District.

Article 7. To transact any other business which may legally come before this meeting.

### SCHOOL LUNCH PROGRAM

The Hot Lunch Program opened September 8, 1969 with Mrs. Sylvia Thompson as manager and Mrs. Marion Berry as her assistant.

The reimbursement rate from Federal Funds remained at four cents through February and then rose to five cents for each Type A lunch served to children. Surplus Commodities received from the Government made it possible to keep the price for children lunches thirty cents a day. Adults were charged forty cents a day.

Under the Special Milk Program we received four cents reimbursement for each half-pint served through February. From March to June the rate dropped to three cents so the price of milk had to go up one cent making the price five cents a day per child.

About 200 to 250 balanced lunches are served daily.

Menus of the School Lunch Program are made up in advance for the entire month and copies are given to each child and teacher. Menus are also poster in the School's Cafetorium.

Turkey dinners with all the trimmings were served for Thanksgiving Day and Christmas Day.

A new refrigerator was purchased for the kitchen through District Funds. The extra refrigerator was badly needed.

The Chesterfield P. T. A. very generously donated the sum of twenty-two dollars and eighty-five cents for the purchase of forks and spoons.

Your School Lunch Program supplies a great part of a student's daily nutritional requirements. The children were encouraged to try foods never eaten before. This helps them to know and learn to like different foods.

### PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

The 1970-71 school year opened on September 8 with 307 students enrolled. The enrollment has subsequently risen to 315.

Despite the large enrollment the number of students in each grade has allowed us to eliminate the mixed grade situation of last year. Some classes are somewhat excessive in size, however (grade 4-32; grade 7-37; and grade 8-35). The projected situation for next year is cause for alarm. In order to continue our current program, we will need thirteen classes; the school has only twelve classrooms. Some means will have to be found to deal with this problem.

Next to space, our most glaring need is for a special education capability. There are many children who need the kind of attention that the conventional classroom teacher is not trained to give. These range from the mentally retarded to children with some kind of learning disability. We have several in our building. My own recommendation is that we hire a full time special education resource teacher.

This year we have begun a revision of our reading program by purchasing new materials in grade 1. After making a study of the reading needs of all our children using standardized testing and other means, we hope to extend the revision through grade 8 within the next two years. We are also giving a good deal of attention to new methods and materials in the teaching of social studies with an eye to implementing much needed revisions soon.

We consider that Science, Math and Language are reasonably up to date for the moment.

We have four teachers new to the building this year; Mrs. Ruth Duigon, grade 2; Mrs. Janet Schlieder, grade 3; Mrs. Kathy Dubois, grade 4; and Miss Virginia Novak, grades 6, 7 & 8 science. Mrs. Joan Hurst has returned after a two year absence to teach junior high school English. I would like to say that we are very happy to have these people with us. The entire teaching staff and aides are doing a commendable job.

Also commendable is the immaculate work of the custodian, Merton Davis and of Sylvia Thompson and Marion Berry who are operating a highly efficient and inviting lunch program.

Title I remedial reading program is once again being ably conducted by Mrs. Doris Parker for needful students in grades 1-5.

Our library has continued to grow with acquisition of new reading books. Using our Title II allotment, we have requested greatly needed reference materials for the intermediate grades. (4, 5 & 6). Much appreciation has to go to the P. T. A. mothers who operate our library daily. As someone new to the school, I must say that I am quite impressed by their conscientiousness and efficiency.

We would also like to thank the P. T. A. membership for its donation of a controlled reader. It has been most helpful.

As you know this is my first year in Chesterfield. I would like to express my gratitude to the people of Chesterfield, the entire school staff, the school board, and the Supervisory Union #29 administrators for having made the administrative transition so smooth, the school year a success, and my efforts so rewarding.

### SCHOOL HEALTH SERVICE REPORT

Chesterfield School District March, 1970 – December 1970

The goal of the School Health services is to ensure each child good health during his learning years at school. The parents have a prime responsibility for this role, yet the School Health Services function to aid the parents.

Some of the services offered are as follows:

- 1. Vision screening tests to each student every year.
- 2. Hearing screening tests to students every two years.
- 3. Physical examinations by the school physician to first and seventh graders; and those participating in organized sports.
- 4. Free vaccines at scheduled immunization clinics.
  These include Triple Toxoid, Smallpox, Polio, Measles, and German Measles.
- Tuberculosis testing for first graders and School Personnel.
- 6. Health teaching whenever needed or desired. This includes an annual visit by one of the dental hygienists employed by the state of New Hampshire.

The following summary indicates how some of these services were implemented during the school year:

- (1) The number of vision tests done 455
- (2) The number of hearing tests 143
- (3) The number of physical examinations done by Dr. Houpis - 61 A urine test was done on each child receiving the physical exam.
- (4) Two immunization clinics were held in 1970. One was on April 24, 1970 to immunize 117 children with the German Measles vaccine. The second was May 26, 1970 where 22 children received immunizations. 5 children received Polio vaccine; 6 received the German Measles vaccine; 4 received the Triple Toxoid Vaccine; 4 received the Diptheria-Tetanus Vaccine; and 4 received Smallpox vaccinations.
- (5) A tuberculosis testing program using the Heaf test was conducted on November 9, 1970 with Miss Connie Martin in charge. Sixty-eight people were tested; 20 of these were School Personnel; 28 were first graders;

and 20 were children in Kindergarten. Only 3 people had a positive reaction to the test, but no active cases of tuberculosis were found.

- (6) On November 16, 1970, Miss Nancy Gardner, the State Dental Hygienist, came to talk to the children in grades Kindergarten through Grade 5 about dental health.
- (7) Orientation Day for incoming first-graders was held May 11, 1970. Twenty-nine children were registered and all were seen by Mrs. Grandin, Dental Hygienist. She gave each child a toothbrush and talked to the parents about each child's dental needs. Nine of these children had physical examinations by Dr. Houpis.

Plans for the future of the School Health Program includes more immunization clinics and an increased intensive health teaching program. These are preventive measures to hopefully decrease the amount of illness seen among the school children.

We want to thank all the parents for their cooperation and all the teachers and other school staff for their patience and assistance.

### ADMINISTRATIVE REPORT

We would like to begin our report this year by raising several questions of eductional theory:

- 1. Is it our job to provide equal educational opportunities for each child, or should we provide education for the needs of the individual child?
- 2. Is our accountability for the educational success of each child a measurement of his success against a set of achievement standards, or an evaluation of his own personal progress towards self-fulfillment and adjustment to his social environment?
  - 3. Does freedom mean permissiveness?
- 4. Can one learn self-discipline by living in an autocratic environment?
- 5. Do children learn best in the usual building boxes (classrooms), or in a variety of large and small groups?
- 6. Is it enough to teach the skills of reading, writing, and arithmetic, and convey a fund of knowledge achieved by the adult world?
- 7. Do our children really need library and guidance services, and opportunities in art, music, physical and health education as recommended by the new Elementary Minimum Standards?
- 8. Does the school have a task to perform separate from the home and community, or should we all be engaged in the joint task of education?
- 9. How can we prevent our children from using alcohol and drugs when it is the prevailing habit of many older people whose lives are everyday examples?
- 10. Does the school district have a responsibility for early childhood education, and for those children who start with many disadvantages?
- 11. Why should the school provide facilities and services for lunches?
- 12. Should a school system provide a strong college preparatory program and neglect vocational education?
- 13. Must we limit our educational opportunities for children because of the lack of dollars in a nation where T.V. and two-car families are the rule, and cosmetic and alcohol sales go higher and higher?
- 14. Should the responsibilty of the public school system be to pass on the skills and knowledge of past achievement, or does it have a real obligation to help society move into the future?

These are questions currently debated in colleges, by school faculties, and undoubtedly in the homes of our towns. Sooner or later, they will be removed from the realm of theoretical conversation. People in our communities are interested in the stake of our pupils, and are responsible for the quality of education offered. In the next decade, many of these issues will be settled. But, we must deal with practicalities of 1970, 1971 and 1972.

The new supervisory union organization is working well. An organization chart is included in the annual report. A large increase in the budget of the union is primarily to activate a new data processing system. Greater educational and administrative service is promised when we become skilled in translating its potential into reality.

We believe that we have a good faculty. Mr. Edward Donovan is our new principal. He has been successful in two other New Hampshire communities. He holds a bachelor's degree from the University of New Hampshire, a master's degree from Northeastern University, and is presently taking advanced courses at the University of Massachuetts. Mrs. Kathy Dubois is a 1966 graduate of Keene State College, and has had four years of experience in Westmoreland. Mrs. Janet Schleider graduated from Pennsylvania State University. After raising a family, and having a successful career in a business position, she took additional courses and is now teaching our grade three. We welcome Mrs. Ruth Duigon's return to the Chesterfield area. She has been teaching in Ohio schools, and in Portland, Maine. Mrs. Joan Hurst is again teaching English in our upper grades. She has six years of experience. Miss Novak has the major assignment of science in grades six, seven, and eight. She has taught in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, and Cornish, New Hampshire, and has a degree from the University of New Hampshire. We feel that it is of great importance to obtain a strong teaching staff.

Your school building is maintained in excellent condition. With the conscientious service of Merton Davis, it is immaculate. We have made several major repairs or improvements: a new furnace, a new roof, painting a portion of the exterior, and replacing the hard surface area by the side entrance.

Your administrators feel that Chesterfield needs specialized instruction for its children with learning disabilities which the regular classroom teacher is unable to provide. An article is included in the warrant to see if the district will provide a resource teacher. A few special education

pupils are sent to Keene on a tuition basis. That district has limited space. We have a great need for the service in our local school.

Again, we have run out of classroom space. The school board will seek the appointment of a special building committee. Next September, we will need to provide a classroom in the all purpose room. Your school population is increasing. The A.R.E.A. Planning Committee is working with committees of the other towns, primarily to see if we should extend the plan to grades seven and eight. Your participation in the solution of our space problems is urgent.

The new budget represents a large increase. Your board and administrators have worked many hours to eliminate all except the necessary appropriations. We will be fortunate if we manage to end the year 1970-1971 without a deficit. At this time the tuition payable exceeds the current appropriation by nearly \$5,000.00.

We feel that we must provide a cost-of-living increase to staff. The projected amount is the lowest in several years, just enough to cover the inflated costs of living and barely competitive for employment. We require one additional teacher. The largest increase is in tuition. There are more high school children. Though our tuition is based on the prior year's cost of Keene, the rate has sharply increased. The new budget does not provide for any of the additional staffing and services of the New Hampshire Minimum Standards for Elementay Schools.

We are pleased with our boys and girls, and the day to day operation of our schools. We feel that the citizens of Chesterfield want to provide a high level of education for their children. The new budget will make heavy demands. However, we are confident that you will support it. The values of a community can be best demonstrated by how much it cares for its children.



### REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND DISTRICT CHIEF

The 1970 forest fire season was a quiet one in this area, quiet in part because of your continued cooperation and favorable weather conditions.

Fires that did occur were, for the most part, caused by

debris burning, children and smokers.

The elimination of these three causes of forest fires would drastically change this picture—to bring about this change we make the following suggestions:

1. When the ground is not covered with snow a permit to burn must be obtained from the Forest Fire Warden. This permit covers waste burning, even if in an incinerator, grass burning, as well as garden trash and brush burning such burning is restricted by regulation prior to 9:00 A. M. and after 5:00 P. M. with the following exceptions:

Commercial or industrial burning is permissible at any time under normal conditions but only with the approval of the District Chief and a written permit

from the Forest Fire Warden.

2. Fires caused by children can be prevented only with the complete cooperation of parents in the supervision of their children, keep matches out of reach of children, this action will help to prevent fires and may save a life, the life of your child. Try to explain this to your child, won't you?

3. Forest fires caused by smokers can be reduced in number by the exercise of more care in the discarding of matches and smoking material whether from a vehicle or by a hiker. In all cases, make sure that the butt or match you discard is out, dead out. Smokey says, "Thanks for your help", and invites you to join with him in setting a good example for others in the prevention of fires and the protection of our environment.
