WARRANT

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Dalton on Tuesday, the 13th day of March next, at 12 o'clock noon to act upon the following subjects. The polls will be open at 12 o'clock and will close at 6 o'clock in the afternoon. The business meeting will be held at the Dalton Elementary School Gymnasium and will open at 7:30 o'clock in the evening.

1. To choose all necessary officers for the year.
2. To see if the Town will vote to give the Selectmen the right to issue temporary loans in anticipation of taxes.
3. To see if the Town will vote to accept the Budget for 1979 as prepared by the Selectmen and appropriate the amount therein or to make any changes.
4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of forty-four thousand dollars (\$44,000.00), for the purpose of preparing plans and specifications on sewerage and sewage treatment facilities which are requirements contained in the Federal Water Pollution Control Act, as amended (33 U.S.C. §1251 et seq.), and will qualify the Town for Federal funds, such sum to be transferred from the unexpended balances of Warrant Art. #6, 1975 Town Meeting and Warrant Art. #10, 1976 Town Meeting, totaling \$13,500 plus \$8,000, to be raised by the issuance of Serial Bonds or Notes under and in compliance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act (N.H.R.S.A. 33.1 et seq., as amended) and to authorize the Selectmen to issue and negotiate such bonds or notes and to determine the rate of interest thereon, and to take such other actions as may be necessary to effect the issuance, negotiation, sale and delivery of such bonds or notes as shall be in the best interests of the Town of Dalton, and to allow the Selectmen to expend such monies as become available from the Federal Government under the Financial Assistance Program of the Construction Grants section of the Federal Water Pollution Control Act, as amended (33 U.S.C. §1251) and pass any vote relating thereto.
5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money not to exceed five thousand dollars (\$5,000.00) to purchase a system of radios to better coordinate and dispatch town equipment.
6. To see if the Town will accept the decision of the Selectmen to change the town dump over to comply with the RSA laws relating to Solid Waste Disposal in Public Dumps. To appropriate a sum of money not to exceed four thousand five hundred dollars (\$4,500.00) for the purchase of six, eight yard steel canisters and to bulldoze the existing site, and a first year sum of four thousand six hundred eighty dollars (\$4,680.00) for the use of a landfill and transportation of solid waste.
7. To see if the Town will vote to accept the decision of the Supervisors of the Checklist to exempt the town of Dalton from RSA 55:9-a and RSA 55:9-b in accordance with RSA 55:9-c. In a town which is exempt from these provisions, the town clerk shall have none of the powers and duties provided in RSA 55:9-a and RSA 55:9-b.
8. To see if the Town will vote to give the Selectmen the right at the end of the year to take what monies that are left in the Fire Department Appropriations and put such monies into a Capital Reserve Fund and to raise and appropriate an additional one thousand dollars (\$1,000.00) to be added to same, for the purchase and replacement of fire equipment.

9. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to withdraw the sum of thirteen thousand dollars (\$13,000.00) from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 to make two years payments on the 1978 town truck.
10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of three hundred and thirty dollars (\$330.00) for the purpose of assisting Alpha House so-called, a place where remedial activities are carried on relative to the health of the bodies and minds of the persons who go there for treatment.
11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money not to exceed four thousand dollars (\$4,000.00) to do the necessary repairs to the town grader so it may last another ten or more years.
12. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to withdraw the sum of two thousand eight hundred eighty-nine dollars and seventy-five cents (\$2,889.75) from the Anti-Recession account for the purpose of purchasing materials to help fix up the town hall.
13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of five hundred dollars (\$500.00) for the Littleton Hospital. By request.
14. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to take whatever monies are left from the General Budget and put them in a Capital Reserve Fund for the purchase and replacement of town equipment.
15. To see if the Town will vote to establish a full time Police Department. This article will be contingent upon the availability of Federal funds.
16. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

1978 DALTON PLANNING BOARD REPORT

The Dalton Planning Board approved (6) subdivisions this year, which was a decline over the previous year. One special meeting was called by the selectmen to discuss a subdivision approved in 1977 at Burns Lake.

Attention was called by one of the land owners that the town had never been deeded the road to the lake and that to maintain that road was technically incorrect. It was resolved at the meeting that the town would continue to maintain the road for a nominal fee and the property owners would proceed quickly with the deed transferral. It should be noted here that any subdivisions must be approved by law by the Planning Board, while any roads or right-of-ways created by a subdivision should be taken up with the selectmen.

POLICE DEPARTMENT

As we enter 1979 the department is working for the betterment of itself and the town.

It is impossible for police to be everywhere. But, by enlisting the help of all residents we can do an even better job of reducing criminal activities. We ask that residents call us to report activities they believe could be crimes or events leading to a crime. Some of the things we would like people to call us about include strangers offering items for sale at very low prices or unknown people wandering in and around questionable places. The merchandise could be stolen property or the stranger could be a daytime burglar.

There are many other things we should consider suspicious: people wandering through parking lots or door yards peering into car or house windows or strange cars parked in the yard of a neighbor who is not at home. These are only a few examples.

I dwell on this longer because it is one of the most time consuming and costliest items we have to contend with followed closely by accidents and paper work involved.

No one has satisfactorily explained the gap between citizens and law enforcement agencies, but if we assume an ignorance of what should prompt a report rather than the "I don't want to get involved" syndrome then we are on the right track. One of the most effective crime prevention devices ever invented is the telephone. If you see anything suspicious call and inform us. We will check it out.

With your assistance, this unique cooperative effort can have a telling effect on the many crimes which take an inordinate amount of our time to investigate.

Figures for this year's budget are based on hours worked and mileage for 1978 plus a small increase in same. This we feel is necessary if we are to keep up with it. You will also note an article in the warrant calling for a vote to establish a full time department contingent on the availability of funds from another source. This was voted in the affirmative in 1973 but funding was denied. We are in the process of filing another application and this vote may be a requirement to receive funds if the application is approved. It is my understanding that funding would be 95% the first year

and 50% the second year. More information should be available in time for the annual meeting. At this time it would be up to the voters to decide if this should continue or go back to part time as we are now.

This year as in past years, we hope to be able to continue working with the area towns and other law enforcement agencies with whom we have worked in past years. We thank them for their assistance as in the past years without this cooperation we will surely never get ahead of the rising crime rate. Thanks also to the "Town Fathers" for their understanding and continued support.

NORTH COUNTRY COUNCIL, INC.

In Dalton, North Country Council provided general information to the town on solid waste disposal.

The North Country Council continued to make substantial progress in 1978 by providing services in the following areas:

Planning Services: Providing local technical assistance to member communities continued to consume a good amount of Council time. Areas of assistance include: master planning, subdivision regulations, zoning, reviewing development proposals, mobile homes, grantsmanship, etc. Through a grant from the Farmers Home Administration, NCC will have the services of a project planner and planning engineer to further assist communities in water supply, solid waste and review of development proposals.

Economic Development: NCC updated its Overall Economic Development Program, a requirement which entitles the North Country to EDA grants and loans. The Council also completed a Wood Energy Study and a Downtown Improvement Program for 1 town. Through the resources of the University of New Hampshire, a business counseling program is being developed. Federal and state agencies use the Council's work as a guide for future public investments.

Preparation of Regional Plans: In 1978, the Council adopted and published both the Land Use Element and the Housing Element. Both of these documents provide a broad framework for action in these two areas. In the area of solid waste, the Council has coordinated a number of meetings with the N.H. Air Pollution Control Commission, Division of Public Health and sponsored a meeting on solid waste disposal in January 1979. The Council has continued to make progress in the Public Transportation Program. NCC also coordinated with the N.H. Department of Public Works and Highways in the annual meeting to receive local input on needed highway improvements. Much of the Council's time is spent responding to requests from Selectmen on various planning matters. Fact sheets have been prepared on soils and community planning, wetlands, and master planning. Other educational documents will be prepared in 1979.

North Country Perspective: NCC continues to respond to opportunities to provide a North Country perspective to federal and state policies. NCC represented the area in a 3-day workshop as part of the Farmers Home Administration's national assessment of rural community facilities. Council members represent the North Country on the State's "208" Water Quality Program, solid waste program and other areas. The Council testified before the N.H. House subcommittee on Growth.

Education and Information: For the third consecutive year, the North Country Council co-sponsored the six municipal law lectures. A special workshop was held on the development of small hydro sites. NCC also sponsored a North Country meeting of bankers, real estate agents, local officials, and other development interests to inform them of the oppor-

tunities under the N.H. Housing Finance Agency's mortgage program. With the advent of **Planning Profiles**, the Council's monthly newsletter, NCC is making an effort to keep local officials and interested persons up-to-date on Council programs and other related planning activities. In a further effort to solicit local input on planning projects, the Council has been holding a series of subregional meetings around the North Country.

In 1979, the Council expects to provide more services to local officials to help them carry out the goals of their own towns. The newly-funded Area Development Assistance Program will provide greater assistance to communities. NCC will be working on an energy program to determine the practicality of developing indigenous energy resources. Requests for community planning services will increase.

Membership in the Council over the last five years has increased from five members in 1973 to forty active members in 1978. A good deal of service has been provided in that period and it is hoped that more can be provided in the years ahead. Ideas on how the Council can be of greater assistance to towns are welcomed. The Board of Directors and all the members of the North Country Council greatly appreciate the support received from the towns. This support has enabled the Council to provide its planning services for the region and local communities.

DALTON FIRE DEPARTMENT
Annual Report for the Year Ending December 31, 1978

During the year 1978 a considerable amount of new equipment was purchased, partly by the Town, Appropriations, Volunteer Firemen and the Ladies Auxiliary. Some of the new equipment included 600 feet of 1½” hose, new emergency lights for some of the Tank Trucks, a portable Water Tank, spare Air Tanks, plus a used 1971 International Truck to replace the 1963 White Tanker, with a price of \$2,500.00, that was paid for out of the Volunteer Firemens Fund. With all this equipment, we are one of the best Fire Dept.'s in Coos County.

In 1972 we had two trucks — a 1938-500 gallon pumper and a 1954-800 gallon tank truck. Today we have two large pumpers, 3 trucks, 1 van, 1 Forestry truck; a total of 7 trucks with a total water capacity of 6,650 gallons. A radio for the GMC pumper was purchased, and we hope to purchase radios for all our trucks in the next few years. This will enable communication between the Fire and Police Dept., not only in our own Town, but with surrounding towns as well.

In April we dropped out of Twin State Mutual Aid, but in September, Dalton, Lancaster, Whitefield, Groveton and Jefferson held a meeting in Lancaster and formed a Mutual Aid Agreement, known as the Lower Coos Fire Aid Pack. Since that time, Littleton, Bethlehem and Stratford Hollow have joined. Dalton also has a Mutual Aid Agreement with Gilman, Lunenburg and Concord, Vt.

In 1978 the Dalton Fire Dept. had a total of 20 calls.

REPORT OF DISTRICT FOREST FIRE CHIEF AND YOUR FOREST FIRE WARDEN

For more than 80 years, a cooperative effort between the State of New Hampshire and local forest fire authorities has created a forest fire prevention and suppression program that is recognized as superior throughout the United States.

Since the first forest fire laws were written in 1895, the state and local community governments have worked together to prevent and combat forest fires.

Today, 249 forest fire wardens and more than 1,800 deputy wardens are appointed every three years by the State Forester to work with the members of the State Forest Fire staff in this effort. State funds are used to pay one-half the cost of forest fire suppression costs incurred by local forest fire organizations, within pay rates established by the Governor and Council. State funds matched by local funds are used to purchase hand tools to suppress forest fires, to train local forest fire crews and in forest fire prevention work.

All outside burning, when the ground is not covered with snow, is permitted only after obtaining a written fire permit from your local Forest Fire Warden. Penalty for burning without a permit when one is required is a misdemeanor punishable by a fine up to \$1,000 or a jail term of up to one year or both.
