## RECORD OF ANNUAL TOWN MEETING

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Dunbarton, N. H. March 9, 1954

Meeting called to order and warrant read by the Moderator Louis D. Holcombe at ten o'clock in the forenoon. Check List posted and polls opened for balloting.

Motion by Wilfred H. Marshall that polls be closed not earlier than 7:30 P. M. was carried.

ARTICLE 1. The following named were elected in open meeting and one vote was cast for each by the Clerk at request of the Moderator.

*Fence Viewers*—Ralph C. Walker, Eli N. Noyes, L. Webster Burnham.

*Surveyors of Wood and Lumber*—Fred C. Blackman, Caleb A. Fuller Jr., Frank E. Woodbury Jr., William L. Merrill, Wilfred H. Marshall, Arthur Powell.

*Auditors*—Robert F. Baker, Earle H. Stone.

*Overseer of the Poor*—Louis D. Holcombe.

*Constables*—Wilfred H. Marshall, Arthur Powell.

*Town Forest Committee*—Charles A. Little.

*Sextons*—Center and North—Charles Weatherbee, East—Walter E. Warriner.

*Hog Reeve*—David C. Dugrenier

ARTICLE 2. Motion by Eli N. Noyes to raise and appropriate \$5220.00 for Town Charges was carried.

ARTICLE 3. Motion by Arthur Newell to raise and appropriate \$1500.00 for General Highway Expenses was carried.

ARTICLE 4. Motion by Eli N. Noyes to raise and appropriate \$5000.00 for Summer Maintenance, \$150.00 of which to be used in cutting off bank at corner on New Road, was carried.

Amendment by Earle Stone for an additional \$800.00 for his road was defeated.

Amendment to the amendment by William Merrill to take this money from the general fund was carried 26 to 3.

Motion by L. Webster Burnham to use \$800.00 of the original \$5000.00 on Stone's road was carried.

ARTICLE 5. Motion by Arthur Newell to raise and appropriate \$2500.00 for Winter Maintenance was carried.

ARTICLE 6. Motion by William L. Merrill to raise and appropriate \$671.03 to match a sum of \$4473.51 from the State, to be used to complete Twist Hill with the balance to be used at discretion of Selectmen and Div. No. 8 State Highway Dept. in all probability on the road from the Monument on the East Weare road to Barnard's Corner was carried.

ARTICLE 7. Motion by Eli N. Noyes to raise and appropriate \$1600.00,—\$600 for Town Poor, \$200 for Dependent Soldiers, and \$800 for Old Age Assistance,—was carried.

ARTICLE 8. Motion to pass over the article by Carroll Sarty was carried.



ARTICLE 9. Motion by Earl Hadley to pass over the article was carried.

ARTICLE 10. Motion by Lyman Nutt to pass over the article was carried.

ARTICLE 11. Motion by Eli N. Noyes that the sum of \$25 be raised and appropriated for Memorial Day, and that this sum be turned over to the American Legion was carried.

ARTICLE 12. Motion by Catherine Fuller that the sum of \$215 be raised and appropriated for the support of the Library was carried.

ARTICLE 13. Motion by Eli N. Noyes that the sum of \$400 be raised and appropriated for the care of Cemeteries, to be divided as follows:—\$200 for Center, \$75 for North, \$75 for East, and \$50 for incidental, was carried.

ARTICLE 14. Motion by William Zeller to raise and appropriate the sum of \$275 to match a like sum from the Federal Civil Defense for the purchase of a two-way (transmitter-receiver) radio, was carried.

ARTICLE 15. Motion by Earl Hadley to pass over the article was defeated. Motion by Joseph Dulude to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300 for rechecking the White Pine Blister Rust area was carried. Amendment by Weston P. Lord to use local help wherever possible was carried.

ARTICLE 16. Motion made by John Swindlehurst that the sum of \$6875.00 be appropriated for the purchase of a new fire truck,—\$1875.00 to be raised this year, \$2500.00 to be raised in 1955, and \$2500.00 to be raised in 1956,—and that \$5000.00 be borrowed to finance the purchase of same. That a committee of three, composed of the Chief

and two members of the Dunbarton Fire Department to be appointed by the Chair within two weeks of this date (Mar. 9, 1954), be empowered to make such purchases,—was carried and Arthur Powell and Sidney Flanders were named to the committee.

ARTICLE 17. Motion by D. B. Montgomery to place all moneys received from the sale of cemetery lots, at time of sale, in the General Cemetery Fund held by the Trustees of Trust Funds was carried.

ARTICLE 18. Motion made by D. B. Montgomery to raise and appropriate the sum of \$800.00 to be paid one individual as Sexton of the three cemeteries and Janitor of the Town Hall and Fire House was defeated.

ARTICLE 19. Motion by John G. Pride to pass over this article was carried.

ARTICLE 20. Motion by Lyman Nutt to pass over this article was carried by a standing vote, 30 to 13.

ARTICLE 21. Motion made by Arthur Newell to allow the Selectmen to dispose of real estate acquired by Tax Collector's deeds was carried.

ARTICLE 22. Motion by Eli Noyes to allow a discount of 1 1/4% on all property taxes paid within two weeks after the mailing of the bills was carried.

ARTICLE 23. Motion made by L. Webster Burnham to authorize the selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes was carried.

ARTICLE 24. Motion by Arthur Newell to pass over this article was carried.

ARTICLE 25. Motion made by L. Webster Burnham that the reports be accepted as printed in the Town Report was carried.

ARTICLE 26. Motion made by Norman Vigue that a small unlockekd gate be provided in the Town Dump Fence was carried.

## TOWN WARRANT

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### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

[L. S.]

*To the Inhabitants of the Town of Dunbarton in the County of Merrimack in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:*

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Dunbarton on Tuesday, the eighth day of March, next at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

(A) Shall all the provisions of Chapter 171-A of the Revised Laws relative to playing games of BEANO be adopted in this Town.

ARTICLE 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

ARTICLE 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

ARTICLE 3. To see what sums of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for General Highway Expenses.

ARTICLE 4. To see what sums of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for summer maintenance.

ARTICLE 5. To see if the town will raise and appropriate a fixed sum of money for winter maintenance.

ARTICLE 6. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$678.80 for Class V roads to match a sum of \$4525.34 contributed by the State.

ARTICLE 7. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the care of the town poor, dependent soldiers and Old age assistance.

ARTICLE 8. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not exceeding \$60 (less than 1/100 of one percent of the Town's assessed valuation) to the Merrimack Valley Region Association for the purpose of publicizing and promoting the natural advantages and resources of the town in cooperation with the other 37 Communities of this Region, or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 9. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money not exceeding \$337.00 as a subsidy to The Concord Hospital.

ARTICLE 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for water holes and fire hose.

ARTICLE 11. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Memorial Day.

ARTICLE 12. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for support of the Library.

ARTICLE 13. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the care of Cemeteries.

ARTICLE 14. To see if the town will vote to rescind a motion relative to automobile taxes made at the Annual Town Meeting of March 10, 1942 in order to make an

amendment to said motion to comply with a ruling by the Tax Commission.

ARTICLE 15. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for rechecking an area for white pine blister rust.

ARTICLE 16. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2575.00 as principal & interest to pay off \$2500 note on new fire truck.

ARTICLE 17. To see if the town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to prohibit Motor Vehicles of all kinds from crossing the Town Common anywhere except the designated areas for parking.

ARTICLE 18. To see the Town will vote that all action on the articles in the warrant be transacted in the evening instead of during the day.

ARTICLE 19. To see if the Town will vote to have a re-valuation made by a committee of three taxpayers of the town of Dunbarton chosen at this meeting; said committee to report their findings within a period of six months to the Selectmen, members of this committee to be paid one dollar each.

ARTICLE 20. To see if the town will vote to make the office of Tax Collector elective instead of appointive.

ARTICLE 21. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the town through Tax Collectors Deeds.

ARTICLE 22. To see if the town will vote to allow a discount on all taxes paid on or before the first of July.

ARTICLE 23. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

ARTICLE 24. To see if the town will vote to petition the State Tax Commission to have an audit made by the division of municipal accounting and make appropriation to cover the expense of such audit.

ARTICLE 25. To hear all reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees and other Officers heretofore chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.

ARTICLE 26. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

## SCHOOL WARRANT

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### STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

*To the Inhabitants of the School District in the Town of Dunbarton, in the County of Merrimack, State of New Hampshire, qualified to vote upon district affairs:*

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Dunbarton on the 5th day of March, 1955, at 3 o'clock in the afternoon, and to cast ballots from that hour until at least eight o'clock in the evening of said day for candidates for the following district officers:

1. Moderator (for the ensuing year)
2. Clerk (for the ensuing year).
3. Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
4. Treasurer (for the ensuing year).
5. Auditor (for the ensuing year).

You are also notified to meet at the same place at eight o'clock in the evening of the same day, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officer of the district.
2. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, and Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

3. To choose Agents and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.

4. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

5. To see if the district will authorize the School Board to sell the Burnham Hill School under such conditions as the district may determine.

6. To see what sum of money the district will vote to raise and appropriate as a deficiency appropriation for the school year 1954-55, such deficiency necessitated by unforeseen expenditures.

7. To see if the district will vote to construct and equip a new school building of one or two rooms.

8. To see if the district will vote to construct and equip an addition to the present Center School.

9. To see if the district will vote to renovate the so-called Page's Corner School, and to raise and appropriate funds for said purpose.

10. To see what sum of money the district will vote to raise and appropriate for the construction of and equipment for new classroom facilities, for the purchase of land, ar-



chitectural and engineering services, and other expenses incident to the project, and in order to furnish such funds, to authorize the issue of the sale of bonds or notes of the School District, therefore under and pursuant to the Municipal Finance Act of 1953 and any other authority thereto enabling.

11. To see if the district will vote to authorize the School Board to execute any and all contracts or agreements necessary, proper, and advisable in connection with new construction and/or renovations and additions to any existing school buildings.

12. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

## REPORT OF THE DUNBARTON SCHOOL HOUSING COMMITTEE

### I. THE PROBLEM

The two-room Center School does not provide enough rooms to house adequately the children now in grades one to eight. The following table shows the enrollment we may expect in the years 1955-1960. From these figures it will be seen that, for the next six years at least, either one room or the other will have forty or more pupils. Such a heavy teacher load means we have reached the point of diminishing returns of our investment of school money.

The census report of August 1954 of Center School children, corrected as changes have occurred to January 5, 1955, is the basis of the following table:

Not only does the above table indicate a gradual increase in the total number of children of school age, but when considered from a grade placement angle, the following figures on room-load are evident.

Two courses are open to us: one, arrange for the teaching of our pupils in the school houses of our neighboring towns; or, two, provide more schoolroom space in Dunbarton and employ a third teacher.

In working out a solution to our housing problem, it seems necessary to determine, if possible, whether the bulge in our school population is of temporary or permanent nature. If it is temporary, the problem might be solved by some fairly inexpensive plans such as the following:

- A. Send Grade 7 and/or 8 to a neighboring community for a few years.
- B. Employ a helping or part-time teacher.
- C. Make a classroom unit in the Town Hall.
- D. Reopen an unused school house, probably Page's Corner.

If, on the other hand, the increase in population seems to be permanent, then we must think in terms of a capital expenditure, not to be paid for in one year, but based on a bond issue amortized over a period of ten or more years.

It is the opinion of your committee that the increase in school population is of permanent nature. (School census

figures help us to predict for five years ahead—beyond that we look to economic principles.) Our reasons for this opinion follows. First, over the nation as a whole the birth rate increased during the war years. These children are already crowding the schools. Second, the years following the war were not depression years, but a time of continuing prosperity, and the high birth rate continued. These children are now first-grade, kindergarten and pre-school. Third, Dunbarton is feeling a modern trend of people to work at a job in the cities while maintaining a home and raising a family in a rural area.

## II. SOLUTIONS

Permanent solutions studied by your committee include the following:

- E. Consolidated or cooperative school with an adjacent district,
- F. Renovate Town Shed to provide a third room,
- G. Sending Grades 7 and 8 to a neighboring community on a permanent basis
- H. Erection of a one-room school on a new site,
- I. Addition of a third room to present building.

From the several plans studied, the committee submits in this report details on Plan G, Plan H, and Plan I.

## III. PLAN G

The estimated costs of tuition and transportation for one or both the seventh and eighth grades are shown in the table.

*Advantages of Plan G*—(Note—in listing the advantages and disadvantages of this and following plans, the Committee is not listing necessarily their opinions but may be including those of certain citizens with whom they have discussed the subject.)

- a. Not only will the sending of Grades 7 and/or 8 to another town relieve the overcrowding at the Center, but

- b. Broader opportunities could be available to the pupils, such as home economics, shop work, art and physical education.

Disadvantages of Plan G:

- a. Transportation to a neighboring town would subject the pupils to a long trip in cars or busses.
- b. The cost to the district (as indicated on the above chart) might be greater than the cost of new construction at the Center.
- c. Adjustment necessary when child goes from small school to a large one would come one year earlier.

IV. PLAN H

It is proposed that a tract of land, about two acres, be purchased for a new one-room school house. It is estimated that an adequate building could be erected on an available site with the cost as follows:

*Advantages of Plan H:*

- a. A building could be planned so that, although only one room is built now, another could be added if a fourth school room were ever needed.
- b. More playground space. Would relieve playground crowding of children remaining at Center School.

- c. Having another school room would make possible whatever grade combinations were best according to enrollment, whereas sending the eighth grade out of town might not help enough the crowding in other grades.

*Disadvantages of Plan H:*

- a. Difficulty would arise in serving school lunch.
- b. School children could not be assembled for special activities as conveniently as if all were in one building.
- c. Purchase of land and securing a water supply would add to cost of building.
- d. We already have some one-room school houses.

*V. PLAN I*

An addition could be built at the east end of the Center School. This room would be slightly longer and narrower than the present rooms, because the lot narrows at the east end. A heater and toilets could be installed at the east end to serve the new room. The present street in front of the school building might be closed to general traffic.

*Advantages of Plan I:*

- a. All children being housed in one building would provide better opportunity for the work of the school nurse, and music teacher.

- b. Arrangements for serving school lunch would be easier if children were all together.
- c. The expense of purchasing land (and providing a water supply) and certain other expenses of Plan H would be avoided.
- d. Children would be nearer home at all times than if Plan G were adopted.
- e. A greater transportation hazard might prevail than in Plan G.

*Disadvantages of Plan I:*

- a. Such a building might not be attractive architecturally as the present one.
- b. Playground space would be limited even if street were closed to general traffic.

*VII. EFFECT ON TAX RATE*

In determining the effect of the three most feasible plans (Tuition, New Unit, and Addition to Present School), one factor must be kept in mind. To the cost of a new unit, and to the cost of an addition as previously considered in this report, must be added certain annual costs not applicable to the Tuition Plan. The actual amounts of these several costs are debatable, but using the present average costs, we approximate the following yearly expenditures:

a. Salary of a third teacher	\$3,150

## REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

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To the Citizens of Dunbarton :

I herewith submit my annual report as superintendent of schools of Dunbarton.

The current school year opened with no changes in our teaching staff, — Mrs. Marion Hayes in the lower grade room, Mrs. Elizabeth Fottler in the upper grade room, Mrs. Katherine Bartlett, music instructor, and Mrs. Beatrice Bockus as school nurse. We are indeed fortunate to be able to retain such experienced and capable teachers in our school, particularly in times such as these when the supply of teachers is not sufficient to meet the growing demand.

### Enrollments

At the last annual meeting, the problem of increased enrollment was discussed. At that time, it was the hope of the School Board that we might be able to house locally the number of children entering school the following fall. But the results of the school census, together with other children known to have moved into town, made it apparent by late August that we could not hope to house all eight grades in the Center School, and plans had to be hastily formulated to provide for the eighth grade in schools of neighboring communities. Financially it did not seem feasible to provide transportation in more than one direction, and for that reason transportation for the eighth graders was provided to Goffstown. Such action allowed our fourth grade to be moved into the upper grade room, giving relief to the primary room. (In spite of the move, at the present time we have some 42 children in grades 1-3.)

At the last district meeting a committee was appointed to consider the school housing needs of the district, and to report at the March 1955 meeting. Such report is being prepared and will be available for all interested citizens.

From that report it is obvious that it will be necessary either to provide additional classroom facilities or to educate our seventh and/or eighth grade pupils in the schools of other communities.

### **The 1955-56 Budget**

The School Budget for the school year 1955-56 as prepared by the School Board, and contained elsewhere in this report, varies but little from the budget adopted at the March 1954 meeting for the expenses of the current school year. No provisions have been made for expenses which may arise as a result of the action which the District may take at the 1955 School District Meeting. In other words, the cost of additional classroom facilities, the costs of elementary tuition and transportation, or the costs of any other plan which might be proposed and adopted are not included in the budget as prepared by the Board.

### **School District Warrant**

The warrant for the 1955 meeting (also included elsewhere in these reports) has been set up with the hope that it will cover whatever action the District might see fit to approve.

The warrant also includes an article to raise approximately \$1,000 as a deficiency appropriation for the current school year. This over-expenditure was caused by the necessity of the sending out of our eighth grade, and the added costs of tuition and transportation. The total cost approximates \$2,000, \$1,000 of which has been met from available current funds.

## Legislation.

Numerous bills dealing with schools and school finance are now being considered by the General Court, including State Aid, Building Aid, Transportation Aid, and many others. At this writing it is impossible to harbor a guess as to what action the Legislature will take. It appears that the Legislature is sympathetic with the need for increased State Aid, but on the other hand there is strong sentiment against additional taxes on the state level.

Communities such as Dunbarton, in which the number of children is causing constantly increasing costs of education, and in which communities there is no perceptible increase in the value of taxable property, are certainly in need of a more adequate State Aid than now provided by the present act.

At the last session of the Legislature the compulsory school age was changed. The compulsory entrance age was lowered from 8 to 6 years, and the upper limit was raised from 14 to 16 years of age for pupils residing in communities having a public high school. Although Dunbarton was not affected by the 1953 legislation, it is probable that the present Legislature will make the 16-year clause applicable to all communities. There is merit to the regulation in its aim to provide further education for our youth, but it will mean an additional expense to the districts in providing tuition and transportation for young people in that age group. It is our hope that State Aid and/or Transportation Aid will be made available to meet the additional expense to the districts concerned.

I am submitting my third Annual Report of the Health Services given in the Dunbarton school for the period of 1953-1954.

At the beginning of the school year all children were examined, weighed, measured and given a vision and hearing test.

All children in Grades one, four, seven, and all new children were examined by Dr. Albert Snay of Goffstown.

Notices were sent to parents of those children who had any condition which deviated from the normal.

I feel very fortunate in having the services of Dr. Snay, as it has helped detect physical defects in those children that might not otherwise have been found.

30 children were given the Patch Test and all were Negative.

## Reported Communicable Diseases

### Mumps — 1

Glasses were obtained through A.D.C. for three children.

I transported one child to the Orthopedic Clinic on five occasions, three children to Dr. Dickerman's office three times, one child to Goffstown to see Dr. Snay and then to the hospital for X-rays, one child to the Pediatric Clinic, and one child to Dr. Perron's office in Concord.

One child was under treatment at the Shriner's Hospital, Springfield, Mass.

20 home visits were made during the year and 26 First Aids given.

In May 1954 we held Registration Day at the school. 15 of our incoming first graders were present and all were weighed and measured, and given a vision and hearing test. A Dental Hygienist was present to examine the children's teeth. After examinations the children were given ice cream and cookies, and had an opportunity to get acquainted with their teacher and classmates. This program has proven to be worthwhile, as it gives the parents an opportunity to have any defects corrected by their family physician or dentist during the summer.

I wish to express my thanks to the Superintendent, Teachers and School Board for their cooperation.

*Forest Fire Prevention is Everybody's Business*

Carelessness is responsible for 97 percent of all our forest fires. This is a serious indictment of our interest in our own welfare and that of our neighbors. In too many instances this carelessness results in the destruction, not of the careless one's own property but of someone not even known to him.

Thoughtlessly thrown lighted cigars, cigarettes and matches from moving vehicles by hikers, hunters and fishermen; the careless burning of debris during hazardous periods, high winds or in dangerous locations; improperly extinguished camp or cook fires—all add up to the CARELESSNESS that means serious loss of property, disruption of industry and farm work and unnecessary expenditure of town and state funds.

It points to the need of eliminating CARELESSNESS so far as it concerns fire from our daily life.. The rules are simple — your cooperation is earnestly solicited.

1. Be careful with fire in or near woodlands.

2. Be sure that all lighted material—cigars, cigarettes and matches — is completely out before discarding it. Use ash trays in autos.

3. Secure the required written permission to burn from your local forest fire warden when the ground is not completely covered with snow.

4. Insist that others be careful and comply with burning requirements.

5. Call the warden promptly when fire is detected and aid him to extinguish it.

Let's remember that FOREST FIRE PREVENTION is EVERYBODY'S BUSINESS and our MOST IMPORTANT undertaking!
