### WARRANT FOR TOWN MEETING

### (L.S.) State of New Hampshire

To the inhabitants of the town of Enfield qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet in the school auditorium in said Town of Enfield on the twelfth day of March next, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following subjects:

Article 1. To choose by ballot to serve for three years, one selectman, one trustee of Trust Funds, one library trustee and one fire ward; to serve for one year, one treasurer, one clerk, one tax collector, one highway agent, one overseer of poor, one police chief, one cemetery agent, two auditors and such other necessary town officers required by law to be chosen for the ensuing year.

Polls will be open at 9:30 a.m. and will not close before 6:00 p.m.

- **Article 2.** To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes, the sums so borrowed to be paid before the end of the fiscal year in which the debt was incurred.
- Article 3. To authorize the sale or lease of any or all of such parcels of real estate acquired by the town through tax collector's deeds for non-payment of taxes, or any other deeds, and to authorize the Board of Selectmen to execute and deliver, in the name of the town, suitable deeds or leases of such real estate, subject to such conditions or restrictions as may be voted by the meeting.
- Article 4. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$3,000.00 for State Aid Construction, to receive the sum of \$3,000.00 from the state, or act thereon.

- Article 5. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$844.08 for Town Road Aid and to receive the sum of \$5,627.17 from the state.
- Article 6. To see if the town will raise or appropriate the sum of \$100.00 as its contribution to the Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Region Association, or act thereon.
- Article 7. To see if the town will vote to adopt the Budget and raise or appropriate the various sums recommended and posted by the Budget committee, or act thereon.
- **Article 8.** To see if the town will vote to accept \$100.00 from Mabel G. Truell as a trust fund, the income therefrom to be used for the perpetual care of the Alfred H. Truell lot, so called, in the new plat of Mont Calm Cemetery.
- Article 9. To see if the town will vote to raise or appropriate the sum of \$500.00 to be placed in a Capital Reserve Fund to be used for the future erection of a Town Fire Station.
- Article 10. To see if the town will vote to change the place of future Town Meetings and other elections, from the school auditorium to Whitney Hall, to take effect at the date of the Town Meeting in 1958; or act thereon.
- Article 11. To see if the town will vote that, if the purposes or objects, hereinafter designated, for which appropriations for the year 1957 may have been made have not been fully accomplished during the fiscal year, then the funds so appropriated or unexpended on the unfinished portion of said object shall be placed in a Capital Reserve Fund dedicated to the purpose or object of its conception until such time as the Board of Selectmen, acting as agents for the town, shall have the opportunity or occasion for the fulfilling or completion of/or for the purposes or objects for which said appropriation was created.

The especially designated purposes for the fiscal year ending December 31, 1957, are as follows:

The net earnings of the town trucks and the shovel loader, derived from highway appropriations for replacement purposes, and also any unexpended highway funds.

Article 12. To hear the reports of agents, auditors, officers or committees heretofore chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 13. To take any vote or transact any further business that may legally come before said meeting.

Circulation of books again increased this year, some 400 over last year; the number of borrowers: Adults, 373; juvenile, 210. In the spring, Mr. Grover Cole did a very fine renovating job in the Library, providing greater work shelf space in the work room, two long display shelves at the back of the Library and new children's shelves under the windows in the front. The new card catalog has been received and installed and is much more convenient to use than the old one.

The Library has offered a good representative collection of magazines to its readers throughout the year. In its purchases, it has continued to build up a good selection of books in special fields such as craft books, hunting and fishing books, cookbooks, books on costume through the ages, as well as the outstanding books of fiction, travel and biography published this year. The Library can also provide a representative selection of books both from the Protestant and Catholic Church book lists. If the Library does not own or can not buy a book which a patron needs, it is nearly always possible to borrow it from our State Library and it is our State Library which also makes possible a great many more books for our patrons to read through its free Bookmobile service.

The historical collection has furnished material for articles several times during the past year. Mrs. Marguerite Melcher, the well known author of "Shaker Adventure," who lives in New York City but has for many years been a regular visitor to her childhood home in Enfield Center, very graciously presented the Library

with a copy of her new book, "Lost Pond," a story centering around earlier days in this town.

The Library has as usual been the recipient of many gifts of books during the year and wishes to take this opportunity to thank those who by their continued interest help to make our collection an outstanding one. The librarian also wishes to acknowledge special service given by Mrs. Gladys Ibey in providing books for patients in the Tripp Nursing Home.

To the inhabitants of the School District of Enfield qualified to vote in District affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Enfield Village School, Enfield, on the eleventh day of March, 1957, at seven-thirty o'clock in the evening, to act upon the following subjects:

- Article 1. To choose by ballot a moderator, a clerk and a treasurer, each to serve one year; and three members of the School Board, one to serve one year, one to serve for two years, and one to serve for three years.
- **Article 2.** To hear the reports of agents, auditors, officers or committees heretofore chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.
- Article 3. To choose agents, auditors or committees necessary for managing District affairs.
- Article 4. To see what sum of money the District will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of School District officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the District, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state Equalization Fund, together with other incomes; the School Board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.
- Article 5. To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate, in addition to the original appropriation for 1956-57, a sum of \$1,034.51 to be made available to the School District prior to July 1, 1957, in order to meet obligations due to unanticipated needs for additional classroom furniture and additional transportation.

- Article 6. To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate, in addition to the original appropriation for 1956-57, a sum of \$150.00 to meet obligations due to unanticipated added costs because of the school Milk Program, such sum to be made available to the School District prior to July 1, 1957.
- Article 7. To see if the District will vote to authorize the School Board to make application for and to accept, on behalf of the District, any or all grants or offers for educational purposes which may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the State of New Hampshire and/or the United States.
- Article 8. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

The polls will open at 7:30 p.m. and will not close before 9:00 p.m.

### REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Enfield:

I present herein my third annual report as superintendent of schools in Enfield. In preparing the report, I have used freely from material submitted by Mr. Jordan, principal, in his annual report to me.

### Amerotron Corporation Gift

One of the most pleasant events of the year and one that came as a surprise was the gift of \$4,540.45 from the Amerotron Corporation. This amount represented the Baltic Mill's portion of the Area A Employees Recreation Fund. I am sure that the citizens of Enfield and all of those who are connected with the school are deeply appreciative of this gift.

The following is a quotation from the corporation's letter conveying the gift to the Enfield School Board.

"The only stipulation that the company wishes to send with this check is that it be used for a special project such as the purchase of band uniforms, band instruments, gym equipment, gym bleachers, etc. It is not to be used in any way for new construction, current repairs, operating expenses or salaries."

The School Board and members of the school staff gave a great deal of thought and study as to the best way to use the money. The principle criterion in its thinking was that the money should be used in such a way as to benefit the greatest number of pupils and also be a benefit to the citizens of the community, but still be within the expressed desires of the company. It was finally decided to purchase the items listed below:

1. Bleachers for the gymnasium. Four units 18 feet long and five rows high, capable of seating at least 270. were purchased and at the time of the writing of this report they are being installed. The bleachers are of the folding, roll-away type, that is, when they are not in use, they may be folded by sections and rolled against the side walls where they will the least interfere with other activities in the auditorium-gymnasium-cafeteria.

Obviously, they will add greatly to the comfort and enjoyment of the pupils and citizens who come to view the activities in the gymnasium.

- 2. A Bausch and Lomb Ortho-Rater. This is an up to date and excellent piece of equipment for testing children's eyes. It is highly recommended by the director of School Health Services of the state Department of Education and also by the state Sight Conservation Department.
- 3. A Maico Audiometer. This is a modern and excellent piece of equipment for testing the children's hearing. It, too, is highly recommended by the State Department.

Obviously, the above two pieces of equipment will be of great benefit to all of the pupils. Previously, Enfield has not owned eye and ear testing equipment but has had to borrow it from Hanover.

4. Four additional sections of portable platform. Four sections are already owned. These were purchased with money raised by the pupils and citizens of the community. We will, therefore, have eight sections which, together, will make a good sized platform or stage. They will be of value for graduation, school assemblies, school plays and many activities of the community.

### Curriculum

In last year's report, I noted that the teachers were making a study of modern arithmetic books looking toward the improvement of materials and instruction for the pupils. As a result of this study, a new series of books was purchased for use in Grades 1 through 8. Both the teachers and the pupils are finding the new books a distinct improvement.

New and more modern music books were purchased for the lower grades.

The state Department of Education has published a revision of the social studies program for Grades 1

through 8. The teachers are at work on a study to determine the changes to be made in the Enfield program in order to bring it in line with the state program. They also are studying new textbooks to determine which one or ones will best meet the needs of the program and of the Enfield School. It is expected that the new textbooks will be purchased in time to be used in the school year 1957-1958.

The commercial program has been expanded to meet the increased number of pupils who wish to enroll in that program. In order to meet this expansion and to give the pupils experience on various types of typewriters, one electric typewriter and one regular typewriter were added to the commercial equipment for use during the current year.

The remedial reading program continues to be of real service to the pupils. Currently, about forty pupils are receiving this special attention.

In last year's report, I pointed out that it was necessary to enrich the shop program, add needed equipment and to enlarge the shop room. Mr. Nyhus, shop instructor, and the boys have done an excellent piece of work in enlarging the room and in building shelving and tables. The major pieces of equipment purchased were a metal turning lathe, a bending brake and shop stakes. All, of course, were for metal and sheet metal work. The enriched program has proved attractive to the pupils; in fact, so attractive that some of the best work that is being done is by girls who are enrolled in the course.

In order to get all of the equipment that is really needed for the shop and still not make any one year's expenditure too high, it is planned to buy the equipment over a period of several years. The above mentioned equipment was the first step. The 1957-58 budget makes provision for two more machines in use in sheet metal work.

As soon as possible, we must do something to materially improve the facilities for the home making course. Many girls are interested in this course and excel-

lent work is being done under difficult conditions. Very little can be done immediately. The 1957-58 budget does, however, provide for an added sewing machine to meet the increased needs.

Of help to many aspects of the school program will be the tape recorder purchased during the year by the Parent-Teacher Association and the Class of 1956. This will be of value in speech training, in reading, in language teaching and in many other ways.

### School Patrol

The School Patrol boys have been reorganized this year by Judge Vinciguerra and Chief of Police LaBounty, with the help of Mr. Shurtleff. Meetings are held each month for training purposes. Interest in the patrol and its effectiveness have been greatly increased. The staffs and banners used by the patrol were presented by Judge Vinciguerra and are greatly appreciated.

### School Building

The major work done in the school during the year is as follows:

- 1. Installation of showers for the boys. The showers are a very real and needed improvement. Eventually, lockers should be provided in the shower room. Provision is made in the 1957-58 budget for showers for the girls. To make a room for those showers, it will be necessary to build a partition that will encroach somewhat on the enlarged shop space. This, we do not like to do, but the showers for the girls are essential and the encroachment on the shop's space will not be sufficient to prove a serious handicap.
- 2. Four of the high school classrooms were painted, both walls and ceilings. There were, of course, many other minor repairs.

A big improvement was made in the school grounds in the hard surfacing on the northwest side of the building. This provides not only a much better play area but, also, materially lessens the amount of mud and dirt that used to be tracked into the school, and the mudholes that were obstacles to the school busses.

For 1957-58, the major items included in the budget are as follows:

- 1. Alterations in the basement to provide a women teachers' room. At present, there are 13 women teachers in the building; next year, that will have to be 14. There are no special toilet facilities for their use.
- 2. The installation of showers for the girls, as mentioned above.
- 3. Alterations to a basement storage room to provide for better storage facilities but even more important to provide a room for remedial reading. The shop boys under Mr. Nyhus have already completed the work necessary for the storage room. I will explain later in the report why the alterations are necessary to provide a remedial reading room.

Although not directly connected with the building, I think that I should mention that provision was made in the 1956-57 budget for 24 desk and chair units to replace obsolete and worn out furniture in one of the high school rooms. We hoped that this would take care of the situation for the current school year. When school opened, however, because of added pupils we found that we were without desks for approximately thirty of those pupils. It was necessary, therefore, to get emergency permission from the Budget Committee and the state Board of Education to exceed our school budget in order to purchase the needed desks and chairs.

### Over-Crowding

In last year's report, I discussed over-crowding and future building needs. The enrollment for the current school year and the anticipated enrollment for the next school year highlight the very real need for some action in the near future.

I mentioned above the need for alterations to a basement storage room to provide a remedial reading

room. The remedial reading is now taught in a classroom that will have to be used next year as a regular classroom. Only a small group is in the remedial reading room at one time. The basement room that will be provided will leave much to be desired but will have to do until something better can be provided.

It is generally agreed that classes should not exceed 25 for effective teaching. This is particularly true when there is more than one grade to a room, as is now the case in three of our elementary rooms. Yet all of our elementary classes exceed 30: Next year, the situation will be even worse. We should have two more elementary rooms for next year but that is impossible, for the rooms are just not available. It is essential, however, that we use the present remedial reading room as a regular classroom and have an added elementary teacher. Even then, the enrollment by rooms, if our estimates are correct, will be as indicated in the table below.

The enrollment for Grade 7 through 12, as estimated for next year, will be as follows:

Grades 7, 8 and 9 will, of course, be much too large. What will be the situation in 1958-59 and future years when the present large classes are all in the high school grades? We will have reached the end of the road; in fact, will do so next year as far as available rooms are concerned.

At the 1956 School District Meeting, it was voted to direct the School Board to appoint a study committee to investigate future need for high school expansion and the possibilities of consolidation with other districts within the area. The study was not to include sending the pupils to another community on a tuition basis. The committee was to be composed of members of the School Board, of the faculty and of citizens, and was to report at the 1957 School District Meeting. Mrs. Carr of the School Board, Mr. Jordan, principal of the school, and Mrs. Allen, one of the teachers, have been working on this study. I have worked with them as much as possible. Mrs. Carr, particularly, has attended quite a number of meetings with representatives of neighboring school districts looking toward the possibility of forming a Cooperative School District.

I sincerely hope that it will never be necessary for the Enfield School to go on a two session basis; that is, with one group of students attending school in the morning and the other group attending in the afternoon. Not only would this be serious from the point of view of good education but would be very costly.

### Teachers and Salaries

We had to hire four new teachers for September to replace teachers who had resigned either to accept better paying positions elsewhere or for other reasons. Although, relative to other years, four teachers were not many to have to replace, we had considerable difficulty in filling the positions. In spite of advertisements, articles in papers, radio announcements and a very great number of inquiries by mail, telephone and in person to colleges, teachers' agencies and to individuals, we had very few candidates for our positions. In fact, because we had been

unable to fill the science position, it was decided a few days before school was to open to eliminate high school science and to substitute some other subject field in which teachers are not quite so scarce. In this day and age, and particularly when several of our students wish to prepare for college, it would have been almost tragic to have not had the science. Fortunately, on the day school opened, we found a science teacher and a good one, in Mr. Robert McCoy.

Mr. McCoy is still a student at Plymouth Teacher's College. His work in the college was interrupted by war service. He will finish his work in January. During the first semester of the current year, he was to have done his practice teaching in another community; his sister told him about our advertisement and radio announcement in regard to a science teacher and he communicated with us. Through special dispensation from Plymouth Teacher's College and the state Department of Education, we were able to employ Mr. McCoy. Certainly just pure good luck played a large part in our being able to get him. We cannot always trust to luck.

The relatively low salary schedule in Enfield was the principal reason that we had difficulty in securing teachers. Enfield did increase salaries for the current year but not enough. A salary study was made during the year by members of the School Board, of the school staff and with occasional help from citizens of the community. They arrived at a salary schedule that was acceptable to the teachers and approved by the School Board. The schedule will be a marked improvement but still will not place us in too favorable a position. It will provide for a minimum salary of \$3,200.00 for beginning teachers and a maximum salary of \$4,200.00. I sincerely hope that the necessary funds to implement this schedule will be voted by the School District meeting.

### Bond Issue Money

In last year's report, I dwelt at some length on the Bond Issue account and how it was being expended. I pointed out that because of factors beyond its control, the School Board was having to spend School Building funds for deficiencies found in the building after it was seemingly complete. Very wisely, the board did not return the balance of the account to the School District last year, for it foresaw that further expenditures were still necessary to care for items that are definitely within the scope of the vote of the School District at the time that the bonds were voted. We now hope that further expenditures will not be necessary. It is now expected that the balance from the Bond Issue, namely, \$267.00, will be returned to the School District at the close of the current fiscal school year.

### Class of 1956

Out of the graduating class of 1956, two are attending the University of New Hampshire, two are attending Plymouth Teacher's College, one is enrolled in an apprenticeship program at the Portsmouth Navy Yard, and two boys are in the armed services.

### American Education Week

A different type of open house was observed during American Education Week in November. Each school class and department had an exhibit of work done, demonstrations were given by the science and commercial students, and refreshments were served by the home making students. The entire program was held in the auditorium. There was a record attendance of parents and friends, many of whom expressed pleasure at the type of observance.

### Conclusion

In concluding, I want to thank the members of the School Board, the members of the school staff and the people of Enfield for their support and cooperation.
