TOWN WARRANT

The State of New Hampshire

To the Inhabitants of the Town of FRANCESTOWN in the County of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in Francestown on the eighth day of March, next at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year coming.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations for the same.
- 3. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow a sufficient sum of money to pay current expenses in anticipation of taxes, or take any other action relating thereto.
- 4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow a sum not to exceed Forty-Five Thousand Dollars (\$45,000.00) to pay the Town's one-half share of the cost of reconstructing the Poor Farm Bridge over the South Branch of the Piscataquog River, and to authorize the Selectmen to determine the date and place of payment of such bonds or notes and to determine the rate of interest thereon and to take such other steps as may be desirable to negotiate such bonds or notes as they shall believe to be in the best interests of the Town, or to take any other action relating thereto.

- 5. To see if the Town will vote to apply not more than \$14,000.00 received and expected to be received from Revenue Sharing to the making of improvements to the Second New Hampshire Turnpike from Cemetery No. 3 to the Town Common (and to the publication of required notices) and also to appropriate a sum not exceeding \$22,000.00 for the purpose of making said improvements to the Second New Hampshire Turnpike, such sum to be raised through the issuance of bonds or notes under and in compliance with the provisions of Ch. 241, N.H. Revised Statutes Annotated, as amended, and to authorize the Selectmen to determine the date and place of payment of such bonds or notes and to determine the rate of interest thereon, and to take such other steps as may be necessary to negotiate such bonds or notes as shall be to the best interests of the Town of Francestown, or to take any other action relating thereto.
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$20,000.00 to employ the Department of Revenue Administration of the State of New Hampshire to reappraise the real property in the Town.
- 7. To see if the Town will instruct the Selectmen to reappraise all the land and buildings of the Town over a period of the next three years using criteria recommended and approved by the State of New Hampshire, or take any other action related thereto.
- 8. To see if the Town will vote (a) to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 to pay dues to join the New Hampshire Municipal Association for the exclusive purpose of enabling group medical insurance to become available to Town employees, and (b) to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,494.12 for the purchase of a Blue Cross-Blue Shield Health Care Plan with Major Medical included for the three full-time Road Department employees and their wives and children, or to take any other action related thereto.

- 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,040.00 to support the services of the Monadnock Community Visiting Nurse Association, Inc., or to take any other action relating thereto.
- 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$365.00 to support the services of the Monadnock Family Health Services, or to take any other action related thereto.
- 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$4,500.00 for the rental and transportation of refuse containers, or take any other action relating thereto.
- 12. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate \$1,200.00 to defray the cost of exterminating rodents and pests and to provide suitable cover at the present dump site, or to take any other action relating thereto.
- 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$3,500.00 for the erection of such recycling facilities as the Selectmen, in their discretion, may deem necessary, and, in addition, to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$3,500.00 to cover the salary of a recycling supervisor, or to take any other action relating thereto.
- 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 to be placed in the Capital Reserve Fund to add to a Trust Fund for the purchase of land for a future library building and/or construction of a new library building, or an extension to the present George Holmes Bixby Memorial Library, or take any other action relating thereto.
- 15. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$750.00 to make repairs to the sidewalk on Main Street, or take any other action relating thereto.

- 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 to be placed in the Capital Reserve Fund for future replacement of the Police Department cruiser, or take any other action relating thereto.
- 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 to be placed in the Capital Reserve Fund for future replacement of fire trucks, or take any other action relating thereto.
- 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$403.00 to defray the Town's share of the cost of a two-frequency police and fire radio, the other share to be federally-funded through the Governor's Commission on Crime and Delinquency, or take any other action related thereto.
- 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 to be placed in the Capital Reserve Fund for future replacement of Fire Department radio equipment, or take any other action relating thereto.
- 20. To see if the Town will vote to allow the Cemetery Commission to use \$475.00, representing accrued interest from Trust Funds (new cemetery sales), for the care and maintenance of Cemetery No. 3, or take any other action relating thereto.
- 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$400.00 to paint or stain the exterior of the Town Garage Building, or take any other action relating thereto.
- 22. To see if the Town will vote to accept the following individual trust fund: For perpetual care of the cemetery lot containing the remains of Grace Ellsworth the sum of \$200.00.

- 23. To see if the Town will vote to accept a certain parcel of land in Francestown on Todd Road, bounded by the Town Dump, Bog Brook, the property now or formerly of Charles W. Durgin, and Todd Road, consisting of five acres more or less, or take any other action related thereto.
- 24. To see if the Town will vote to accept a certain parcel of land in Francestown located at the junction of Route No. 47 and Abbott Lane (so called) consisting of 1500 square feet more or less, as shown on a map of property of Pearl Abbott Heirs, dated November 1970, or take any other action related thereto.
- 25. To see if the Town will vote to require that salt, when used on town roads, shall always be mixed reasonably uniformly with sand, and that the ratio of salt not exceed 25 parts of salt to 75 parts of sand, or take any other action relating thereto.
- 26. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for the support of the Monadnock Region Committee on the Arts, or take any other action relating thereto.

Articles to be Voted by Ballot

Are you in favor of the adoption of the following amendments to the Francestown Zoning Ordinance?

27. Amendment 1.

Article #3. Lot Measurements and Setbacks

- b) Setbacks
 - (3) Change to read "A building shall not be erected or placed closer than fifty feet to its lot's boundaries."

28. Amendment 2.

Article #4.

g) Add new paragraph — "No new structure, for which a building permit has been initially issued, may be occupied without first obtaining an Occupancy Permit from the Board of Selectmen to ensure that the structure has been constructed in essential conformity with the original building permit application or, if construction has not been completed, is habitable by reasonable standards and proper sewage disposal and water supply facilities have been constructed, where applicable."

29. Amendment 3.

Article #5A. ZONING DISTRICT REGULATIONS.

- I. Village Zone.
 - (a) Permitted uses.
 - 6. Line 9; omit all after "... of the immediate family" so that the remaining paragraph shall read "Home occupations where such use is clearly secondary to the use of the dwelling for dwelling purposes and does not change the character thereof and in connection with which there is no outside display or storage of merchandise or equipment nor emission of dust, fumes, noise, vibration or smoke beyond the lot line. Such home occupation shall not employ more than three persons who are not members of the immediate family."

30. Amendment 4.

Article #5A. ZONING DISTRICT REGULATIONS.

- II. Rural Zone.
 - (a) Permitted uses.
 - 1. Change to read "All uses permitted in the Village Zone with the exception of retail stores as defined in Art. 5A, para. I, (a), 7."
 - (b) Special exceptions.
 - 10. Add new paragraph "Stores for the sale of goods at retail, sold first hand, provided there is no outside storage or display of merchandise or equipment."
- 31. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

Article 3. Voted to authorize the Selectmen to borrow a sufficient sum of money to pay current expenses in anticipation of taxes.

Article 4. Voted to apply \$8,210.00 from Revenue Sharing to repair the Woodward Hill Bridge and to raise and appropriate the additional sum of \$2,090.00 for the same purpose.

Article 5. Voted to authorize the withdrawal of \$5,167.18 plus accrued interest from the Town Hall Capital

Reserve Fund for repairs to the Town Hall roof.

Article 6. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,854.00 as the balance due on repairs to the Town Hall roof.

Article 7. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00) to be placed in the Capital Reserve Fund for future replacement of fire trucks.

Article 8. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00) to be placed in the Capital Reserve Fund for future replacement of Fire Department

radio equipment.

Article 9. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00) to be placed in the Capital Reserve Fund to establish a Trust Fund for the purchase of land for a future library building or for construction of a new library building or for the construction of an extension to the present Town Library building.

Article 10. Moved to indefinitely postpone this article. Article 11. Voted to direct the Selectmen to obtain estimates from several agencies on the cost and scheduling of reappraisal of the Town and report to the next annual meeting with proper motions for action on the subject.

Article 12. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of

\$937.00 to support the services of the Monadnock Commun-

ity Visiting Nurse Association, Inc.

Article 13. Voted to approve improvements to the facade of the Fire House, all costs to be borne by the Francestown Improvement Society and the Francestown Bicentennial Committee.

Article 14. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$365.00 to support the services of the Monadnock Family Mental Health Services.

Article 15. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 to make repairs to the sidewalk on Main Street.

Article 16. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 to be placed in the Capital Reserve Fund for future replacement of the Police Department Cruiser.

Article 17. Moved to indefinitely postpone this article.

Article 18. Voted to sell the surplus benches and old school desks in the Town Hall, with offering of the units to be made to Town Residents on a one unit per family basis, before opening the sale to outsiders, the sum received to be placed in a Capital Reserve Fund to purchase furniture and furnishings for the Town Hall.

Article 19. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,700.00 for dust control on dirt roads in the summer.

Article 20. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum not to exceed Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000.00) to install a drainage system in the annex of Cemetery No. 3 to alleviate the water problem.

Article 21. Resolution:

Whereas: Constance Dodge has served as Trustee of the George Holmes Bixby Memorial Library from 1969 through 1976, and

Whereas: Mrs. Dodge has faithfully and enthusiastically served the community in this capacity.

Therefore be it Resolved that:

The Town of Francestown hereby expresses its grateful appreciation to Mrs. Dodge for her faithful service and be it further resolved that, a copy of this Resolution be forwarded to Mrs. Dodge and recorded in the records of the Town of Francestown.

Article 22. Amendment to Zoning Ordinance adopted March, 1951.

Add new sub-paragraph No. 10 to Article 5A, Chapter

II, Paragraph B Special Exemptions.

10. Before commercial mining, excavation, or removal of soil, rock, sand, gravel, loam or similar earth materials, in excess of 500 cubic yards per calendar year, a Special Exception must be received from the Board of Adjustment subject to the usual fee permit. Removal and processing operations shall not be conducted closer than two hundred (200') feet to the centerline of a State Road, a Town Road, a road right of way, or a road right of way in an approved subdivision or to any property line or lot line.

Delineation of the proposed removal area(s) and other pertinent information shall be noted on a site plan filed with the Board of Adjustment and the Selectmen at the time of application. If required by the Board of Adjustment as a condition of the issuance of a Special Exception, sufficient grading, covering with top soil, seeding with suitable cover crop (except when ledge rock is exposed) will be performed when removal of material is completed. The Board of Adjustment may require the posting of a bond with the Town

Treasurer to insure compliance.

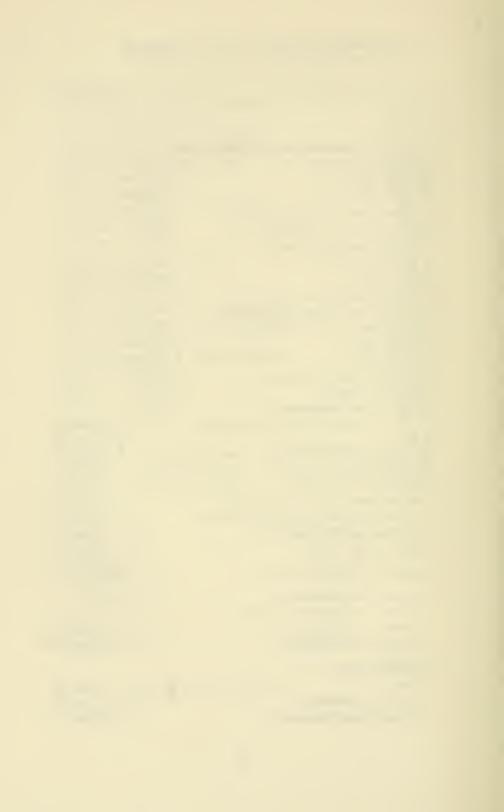

SUMMARY OF FINDINGS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

Board of Selectmen Town Office Francestown, New Hampshire 03043

Gentlemen:

Submitted herewith is the report of an examination and audit of the accounts of the Town of Francestown for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1976, which was made by this Division in accordance with the vote of the Town. Exhibits as hereafter listed are included as part of the report.

One of the enclosed audit reports must be given to the Town Clerk to be retained as part of the permanent town records.

SCOPE OF AUDIT

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the Board of Selectmen, Mr. Donald Marsden, Treasurer for the period March 3, 1976 to December 31, 1976, Tax Collector, Town Clerk, Library Treasurer, Cemetery Treasurer, Fire Department, Conservation Commission and Trustees of Trust Funds. The accounts of Herman C. Miller, Treasurer for the period January 1, 1976 to March 2, 1976 were examined earlier and a report submitted to your Board under date of April 7, 1976.

FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

General Fund:

Comparative Balance Sheets - December 31, 1975 and December 31, 1976: (Exhibit A-1)

Comparative balance sheets - general fund - as of December 31, 1975 and December 31, 1976, are presented in Exhibit A-1. As indicated

therein, the current surplus of the Town increased by \$16,902, from \$11,316 to \$28,218, during the fiscal year ended December 31, 1976.

Analysis of Change in Current Financial Condition: (Exhibit A-2)

An analysis of the change in current financial condition of the Town during the year is made in Exhibit A-2, with the factors which caused the change indicated therein. These were as follows:

Comparative Statements of Appropriations and Expenditures - Estimated and Actual Revenues: (Exhibits A-3 and A-4)

Comparative statements of general fund appropriations and expenditures, estimated and actual revenues for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1976, are presented in Exhibits A-3 and A-4. As indicated by the Budget Summary (Exhibit A-4) a net unexpended balance of appropriations of \$6,097, plus a revenue surplus of \$10,731, resulted in a net budget surplus of \$16,828.

Long-Term Indebtedness:

Comparative Balance Sheets - December 31, 1975 and December 31, 1976: (Exhibit A-5)

Comparative balance sheets of the outstanding long-term indebtedness of the Town as of December 31, 1975 and December 31, 1976, are contained in Exhibit A-5. As indicated therein, matured long-term notes of \$6,000 were paid during the year. Long-term notes outstanding at the close of the year amounted to \$15,000.

Statement of Debt Service Requirements: (Exhibit A-6)

A statement showing annual debt service requirements of principal and interest as of December 31, 1976 is presented in Exhibit A-6.

TREASURER

General Fund:

Classified Statement of Receipts and Expenditures: (Exhibit B-1)

A summary of general fund receipts and expenditures for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1976, made up in accordance with the uniform classification of accounts, is included in Exhibit B-1.

Revenue Sharing Funds: (Exhibit B-2)

A statement of Revenue Sharing Fund receipts, expenditures, encumbrances and fund balance is contained in Exhibit B-2. As stated therein, there is an unappropriated fund balance of \$4,892 as of December 31, 1976.

AUDIT PROCEDURE

The accounts and records of all town officials charged with the custody, receipt and disbursement of public funds were examined and audited in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards and accordingly included such tests of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as were considered necessary in the circumstances.

Verification of uncollected and unredeemed taxes was made by mailing notices to delinquent taxpayers as indicated by the Tax Collector's records. Consequently, the amounts of uncollected and unredeemed taxes as indicated in this report are subject to any changes which may be necessitated by the return of verification notices.

GENERAL COMMENTS

Classification of Expenditures:

Our examination of the Selectmen's cash payments book revealed a number of instances wherein expenditures were incorrectly classified. This was more prevalent particularly in connection with capital outlay disbursements and special appropriations. It is recommended that greater care be exercised in posting of such expenditures in the cash payments book.

Fire Department:

It was noted during the course of the audit that money appropriated for the Fire Department was paid in total to the Francestown Volunteer Fire Department and all invoices and payrolls for the Department were paid by a fire department check. We call your attention to the provisions of RSA 41-29 of the Revised Statutes Annotated which states in part:

"The town treasurer shall have custody of all monies belonging to the town, and shall pay out the same only upon orders of the selectmen."

In view of this statute it is recommended that the balance of cash in the Fire Department checking account be turned over to the Town Treasurer and all payments for the operation of the Department be paid by Town checks in accordance with the above statute.

CONCLUSION

The provisions of Chapter 71-a, Section 21, require that the auditors' summary of findings and recommendations (letter of transmittal)

shall be published in the next annual report of the Town. Publication of the Exhibits contained in this audit report is optional at the discretion of the Board of Selectmen. This letter, however, must be published in its entirety.

We extend our thanks to the officials of the Town of Francestown for their assistance during the course of the audit.

FRANCESTOWN FIRE DEPARTMENT

At the annual meeting of the Volunteer Fire Department the following officers were elected for the year, 1976: Chief, Clifton F. Foote; 1st Deputy Chief, Lawrence R. Kullgren; 2nd Deputy Chief, Robert Cutter, Sr.; Captains, Richard Leavitt and Donald Marsden; Secretary, Charles Brien; Treasurer, O. Alan Thulander; Standing Committee, Richard Leavitt, Donald Hoyt and Louis Wiederhold. Due to the pressures of his business, Charles Brien was unable to attend meetings regularly, and Alvin Van Cleave was appointed Recording Secretary, pro-tem, a job he capably filled for the entire year. I appointed Retired Fire Chief Norman Stewart as Fire Prevention and Training Officer, and John Coakley continues his appointment as Fire Police Officer for the Department.

As in the past, the money raised from the Labor Day Supper continues to go into the fund for the purchase of new equipment. The members wish at this time to thank all who donated and supported this event. The money raised by the men at their annual Thanksgiving Raffle was used to buy 3 more fire monitors. In September, 18 firemen and officers attended the Fire Training School held at Meadowwood in Fitzwilliam. Also this fall, several officers and men took the C.P.R. Course offered at the Peterboro Hospital.

The Rescue Squad continues its functions and aided at five automobile accidents and made three calls with the resuscitator. Thanks go out from the Francestown Fire Department to Mr. Sumner Brown, owner of Noone's Mill in Peterboro, who recently donated 10 new blankets for the Rescue Squad, and to all others who made donations for the

Squad.

This year, the Mt. Crotched Hand Tub Team was formed with the young firemen entering the Department's antique Hand Tub in many parades and winning several trophies and ribbons, which are on display in the Bradbury Room at the station. The team all wear red shirts with Mt. Crotched, Francestown, N. H. lettered in black on each shirt. These were the gift of Department member, Mel Garbitt, and the lettering was done by Joan and Becky Kullgren and Linda Abbott. The Tub Team has become an integral part of the

V.F.D. and occasions much interest in all the parades in which its team enters it.

Through the efforts of the Board of Selectmen and Robert Foote, Town Road Agent, several pieces of Surplus Government Equipment have been acquired for use by the Fire Department and Rescue Squad. In this past year, the Fire Department has answered 12 calls for chimney fires, 2 calls for house fires, 3 calls for fires at the dump, 1 brush fire, and assisted Public Service 3 times with electrical fires. There were three false alarms. The Department also answered 3 calls from Mutual Aid for assistance. At this time, I would like to mention the valuable, and always available assistance the Francestown Department continues to receive from the Southwestern Mutual Aid System and express our gratitude for the many kinds of help received through this system.

The fire station has received a new facade of clapboards and paint as a gift of the Village Improvement and Historical Society and the V.F.D. wishes to thank the Society for the attractive improvement. As usual, the Women's Auxiliary stands in readiness to aid or assist the Department in any way, whenever it is needed. The members hold a fundraising event each year, and the proceeds are given to the fire department for needs of its own. This year, the Auxiliary donated \$100.00, which the firemen used to buy protective equipment. As always, the ladies have our grateful thanks. They hold two social events a year for firemen and their wives, and they also assist in the Fire Protection Week Program which the Department puts on each year for the school children.

Remember, the slogan of the Francestown Fire Department is: "Don't Gamble With Fire, The Odds Are Against You." The Volunteer Fire Department is always ready and willing and most important of all, prepared to put out your fire.

Report of District Fire Chief and Town Forest Fire Warden

Since its beginning in 1893, the State Forestry Department has recognized the fact that forest fire prevention and suppression is a joint state and town or city responsibility. Local authorities recommend names of persons to the State Forester, who appoints one person as town or city fire warden and several other persons as town or city deputy fire wardens to a three year term.

The local forest fire warden controls the kindling of all outside fires, when the ground is not covered with snow, by issuing a written permit for kindling a fire. Permits are only issued at such times and in such places as the fire warden deems as safe.

The State Forest Fire Service trains the local forest fire organization in modern forest fire prevention and suppression tactics. The State also provides backup personnel and equipment for suppression and prevention activities.

The combination of State and local forces has resulted in one of the smallest acreage loss due to forest fires in the United States for the past 20 years.

TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN'S STATEMENT

I would like to thank all who are involved in keeping our town green. But, as a kindly reminder to all, please follow the following rules:

- 1. Always obtain a written permit before burning even for fireplaces and barbeques.
- 2. Obey the law; burn only when the law permits, between 5 p.m. and 9 a.m., but with a written permit.
- 3. After obtaining a permit please be sure to protect fire from escaping.

A kindly reminder also that a permit is null and void:

- 1. If fire kindled at unspecified time or place.
- 2. If weather is unfavorable or proclamation closing woodland is in force.
 - 3. If help and equipment is inadequate to control fire.
- 4. If permittee does not sign permit indicating understanding of law and regulations.

Here is an additional help to us: If burning without a permit during snow-cover time, please call 547-2959 to inform; it might save the problem of sending a truck to investigate a smoke call.

POLICE DEPARTMENT

In 1976, the Francestown Police Department answered on the average of 12 calls a week. Of these calls approximately 50 of all calls were dog calls; the rest pertained to

police matters.

The Department investigated 9 cases of breaking and entering with the help of the State Police. Of these breaks, 2 were solved with the arrest of 2 suspects. We investigated 23 automobile accidents, 2 of which were fatalities. Five of the others had personal injury.

We also arrested 3 people for the possession of a con-

trolled drug, 1 for manufacturing a controlled drug.

We answered 26 calls of theft of skis at Crotched Mountain.

In the way of traffic control, we arrested 196 for speeding, 43 for stop sign, 9 yellow line, 5 for uninspected, 2 for unregistered, 3 for leaving the scene of a property damage accident, 3 for D.W.I., 2 for driving without a license, and 2 for reckless operation of a motor vehicle.

All of the arrests the department made this year were

found guilty in Goffstown District Court.

GEORGE HOLMES BIXBY MEMORIAL LIBRARY

LIBRARY TRUSTEES

The Library was awarded in February, for the second consecutive time, the Outstanding Library Achievement Award. Ingebord Anderson, Librarian, and Betsy Wiederhold, Trustee, attended the ceremonies in Concord, N. H.

Workshops and business meetings were held monthly at the Peterborough Town Library for all libraries involved in the Nubanusit Library Co-op. A representative of the board and/or staff participated, and on several occasions a

volunteer of the Library attended.

Susan Palmatier, State Library District Consultant, spent two days with the Librarian and the Trustees helping to weed books in the Reference and Non-fiction categories. It was recommended that the Board establish a five-year book budget plan for this area, as it is the most costly and

vital part of the Library.

The population growth throughout the state brought about a marked increase in paper work and S.W. District Advisory Council meetings. The Trustees and staff made every effort to comply with the demands in order to benefit from the many services offered under the Affiliated Libraries Program of the state. This task would have been most difficult without the dedicated work of our librarian, Ingebord Anderson, and our assistant librarian, Connie Varnum. Their interest and extra effort was a great support.

Throughout the year, various groups and organizations used the Library facilities for their meetings. They were: the Francestown Water Co., the Francestown Improvement Society, the Conservation Commission, Greenfield Women's Club, and Arts & Crafts classes conducted by Mrs. Poore

and Mrs. Benedict.

The grade school participated in another year of movie programs at the Library. These films are loaned to us by the

State Library.

Mrs. Anderson and Mrs. Spielberger conducted another summer of reading, films, and crafts for the children. Many people offered their time and services to help make these activities a great success.

Pam Barry and Susan Katzenberg began a pre-school reading program in September. They met each Monday morning

and their program was attended with much enthusiasm. They intend to continue until the end of the school year.

National Library Week was celebrated in early April as Francestown Library Hospitality Week with a series of special events featuring Francestown talents. The scene was set by an exhibit of the work of Francestown artists and book displays featuring town authors. Entertainments included an evening of Elizabethan harpsichord music performed by Jocelyn Bolle as Edith Milton read poetry of the period. Jack Coakley displayed and discussed his fine collection of antique horse brasses another evening, and the week closed with a performance of folk music by Allan Block and Nancy MacDowell. Another visitor was Elizabeth Orton Jones who delighted the school children one morning with a film and talk, then stayed to lunch at the Library with Mrs. Anderson, the Trustees, former Trustees, and Carrie Lord. We very much appreciate the generosity of those who contributed their time and talent, and we were delighted by the large attendance and warm response from the Town.

At the suggestion and through the efforts of a group of young Francestowners, the Library revived the Smorgasbord. Robert Ames and Vivien Wharton, capably advised by Pat Standish, and assisted enthusiastically by a host of friends and relatives, labored mightily for the wonderful party on Memorial Day weekend. It seemed half the ladies of Francestown generously contributed exotic dishes; then they and the rest of the town came to sample and enjoy the feast. The spirit of generous enthusiasm of the young committee and all who contributed was most gratifying, as was the reward of \$693.50 to the Special Account. Many new books were purchased and necessary projects pursued thanks to that memorable evening.

In August, the Annual Library Bridge Tea and Silent Auction was held at the Inn at Crotched Mountain through the kindness and with the support of Rose and John Perry, Innkeepers. Connie Dodge again directed the Silent Auction, and Doris Basset and Lois MacAdam were responsible for the Tea and Bridge. We thank the many friends of the Library for their generous support of this event. The Special Fund received \$452.55 from the Bridge Tea. In the coming year, we anticipate expending these monies toward the

necessary repairs and redecoration of the rooms on the first floor.

The Library had an Open House and exhibit of pictures taken by Isabella Hill. Her talent was enjoyed by many and we hope that she will offer this opportunity to everyone

again in the coming year.

A Library Development Committee was formed by citizens of Francestown at the request of the Trustees to study the future of our Library and to aid in the formulation of development guidelines and goals. Bob Duncan, Diane Schott, Eleanor Kiblin, Betty Hamel, and Bill Roberts contributed many hours, much research, and great effort to the preparation of a thoughtful and thorough Development Committee Report which has been, and will be, of great value in the long-range development of the Library facility. This Report may be read at the Library.

The Trustees are very happy to report that the lengthy town project of repairs to the building, construction of the fire escape, and attendant fire precaution work, has been satisfactorily completed.

Further repairs by the Trustees this year included structural corrections to the septic system, and the removal of dead trees and brush behind the Library which impeded

this system.

Files are now in full use for all materials and information concerning the business of the Town, District, and State Libraries. Vertical files are also being arranged to accommodate the many clippings, pictures, etc., being used in the Library.

An extension telephone was installed on the ground floor, as was an inter-com system, received as a gift. A typewriter table was purchased for use in the children's area, and a handsome and needed card file was paid for by contributions given in memory of Murray Boyle. A gift was also received in memory of Cliff Lougee.

Our thanks to Bob Behrsing who generously donated his time and materials in printing the tickets for the Library Smorgasbord and for the Bridge Tea, as well as other ma-

terials for Library use.

The Library was pleased to receive \$182.75 from the Francestown Improvement Society Labor Day Raffle money. Our volunteer chairman, Pat Cloutier, has done an excel-

lent job of scheduling volunteers for work at the Library. It has been a major task, and we are deeply indebted to Pat and all of her helpers for the many hours they have given us.

We wish here to express again our sincere thanks to all the citizens of Francestown whose voluntary services and generosity augment to so great a degree the Library's efforts on behalf of the community.

Lastly, all of us at the Library wish to take this opportunity to express our respect and gratitude to Betsy Wiederhold, retiring Trustee, for her six years of tireless and devoted service to the Library.

CONSERVATION COMMISSION

A series of square dances, with Dudley Laufman, was held to continue fund-raising for future projects. During the next year we plan to have another short series of dances. We particularly thank Sibby Kunhardt for managing these dances even after she no longer was a member of the Commission. We also thank her faithful assistants, Carol Prest, Zoe Richardson and Avery Richardson. In addition we are grateful to all who contributed refreshments. During the April dance, a documentary movie was shown which had in part been filmed in Francestown the previous year.

The Commission sponsored and the Town voted in the affirmative Solar Energy Systems Tax Exemption of \$50 per

taxpayer.

Information was supplied by the Commission about the

Current Land Use Tax Law.

Repeated complaints were received during the year stating that Collins Brook seemed to be polluted by sewage from one of the abuttors. The water was, therefore, tested by the Water Supply and Pollution Control Commission both by dye experiment and by bacterial count and was found to be uncontaminated.

The Commission received, checked and approved two

Dredge and Fill applications.

The annual roadside cleanup took place on May 1st. A large number of volunteers helped to pick up an amazing amount of rubbish consisting mainly of empty bottles and beer cans. We thank all these good citizens for their assistance on a hot and uncomfortable day.

The soil survey of the whole town was completed during 1975. During 1976 the soil survey maps and explanatory booklets were received. Everything was paid for entirely out of money raised by the Commission through the square

dances and the sale of the Town Directory.

Additional copies of the survey maps and the booklet have been requested by the Planning Board and the Selectmen, and will be provided by the Commission.

One of our next projects will be the preparation of a wetlands map of the town. This project is being undertaken

at the request of the Selectmen.

A good deal of attention was devoted to the preservation

of the elm trees in town. A treatment known as Lignasan injection has been advocated by the Elm Research Institute of Harrisville. This process has been in use for only two years, and no definite evidence of its ultimate effectiveness, as yet, according to the State Tree Pathologist at UNH. Information received from the University of Maine where the actual studies are going on, as well as from a practicing tree warden, confirmed this statement. It was also emphasized that in order to save any significant number of trees, Lignasan injection should be combined with pruning, elm beetle control, root severing and general sanitation. If, in light of this information, anyone would like to treat his elm trees, the Commission will make arrangements for the equipment and necessary chemicals. The Commission is trying to save the library elm. It was injected last August and will be pruned and sprayed this spring.

Last year Sibby Kunhardt's term on the Commission expired, and she preferred not to return. However, she graciously consented to continue to act as treasurer. The Commission greatly regrets her retirement and misses her contribution. Sibby originated and substantially advanced many

of the Commission's projects.

Last spring Dave Buber and Dave Jonas were welcomed as new members of the Commission.

BOARD OF ADJUSTMENT

The five-member Board of Adjustment is appointed by the Selectmen, and acts under the provisions of Chapter 31:60-89, N.H. Statutes Annotated 1955 and amended thereto, as well as the Town of Francestown Zoning Ordinance

as amended through March 1974.

During 1976 the Board had seven (7) hearings for variances relating to setback regulations, four (4) of which were granted. One (1) hearing resulted in a "no-decision-required," since incorrect measurements were discovered and therefore a variance was not needed. There was one (1) hearing for a Special Exception in regard to a non-conforming use which was granted. One (1) hearing was held for an appeal to an Administrative Decision. This appeal was denied.

In every case the site in question was visited by the Board in order to obtain as much information as possible in conjunction with the evidence as presented at the public hearings before arriving at a decision. In certain cases, conditions were attached to the decisions as granted.

Twenty (20) meetings including seven (7) public hearings were held in connection with the Board's responsibilities.

ADVISORY COMMITTEE

It is the feeling of the Advisory Committee that work on the Master Plan should continue at a reasonable pace using presently available resources.

There were several reasons why this was felt to be neces-

sary. They are:

- 1. Increasing involvement of Federal Government through Regional Planning Groups.
- 2. Possibly explosive growth in next 5-10 years of our area due to influx of new companies into general area. Francestown becomes within practical commuting distance of Merrimack/Manchester area, especially for middle and upper management people who are concerned with the "quality of life."
- 3. While the thought of increased governmental involvement is not welcomed, it is felt that we must develop our own plan or have one imposed on us at some future point in time.

One suggestion made was to have a meeting(s) to try and establish, at our own town level, the "direction" we would choose for ourselves on a ten and twenty year ahead basis. It would seem to be important to give all our residents the opportunity to help generate the input that could provide guidance for our Master Plan.

WASTE DISPOSAL STUDY COMMITTEE

The Town will be required to transport all refuse to the

Bennington landfill starting in mid-1977.

Due to the escalation in the cost of Town business, we recommend that the Town initiate an extensive recycling program. Recycling of refuse would reduce the cost of operating the disposal system by returning all money received from the sale of the materials to the Town treasury.

We have received two proposals for the transportation of refuse to the landfill; one from Ken's Sanitation Service of Dublin, New Hampshire and the other from Community Sanitation Service of Peterborough, New Hampshire.

The proposal from Ken's Sanitation Service recommends the use of three 10-yard containers, with side doors, picked up twice a week with an annual charge of \$4,290.00. These containers would be dumped into a packer truck at the collection site, washed out and set back on the ground.

The proposal from Community Sanitation Service recommends the use of one 30-yard container, with access through the top, picked up twice a week with an annual charge of \$4,680.00. This container would be loaded on a truck, transported to the landfill to be emptied and then returned to the collection site.

We recommend the three 10-yard container proposal because: (1) the lower annual cost, (2) the container would be at the collection site all the time and (3) the side doors allow easy access for Townspeople disposing of their refuse.

The drawbacks to the single 30-yard container would be: (1) the need for easy access to the open top via a ramp or dock and (2) the unavailability of a container during the time it is being dumped. Both of these problems could cause extra expense to the Town in maintenance of the collection site.

RECYCLING BOARD

January 1976 saw such an increase in the participation of our recycle program that with the facility and arrangements available it became impossible to keep up with the volume, and so the program at the dump was curtailed. For those citizens who wished to continue recycling, the Bicknell's collection center was available. However, so few people participated in transporting their recyclables that a survey questionnaire was sent to 265 families in July 1976.

Preliminarily, the Recycling Board reports that of 265 Recycling Questionnaires sent out, answers were received from 175 citizens, and of those 172 approved the principle of recycling. Two-thirds (112 people) expressed a desire for a supervised central collection center provided by the town. One-third (60 people) preferred to have home pick-up serv-

ice and were not adverse to paying for the service.

There are two methods of accomplishing the desired result, each of which would require the services of a Supervisor to assist those recycling as well as maintaining the facility. It is estimated that the required compensation for an appropriate Supervisor would be \$3500 annually.

The two methods are as follows:

- 1. A waste contractor will deposit receptacles for recyclable material, removing them without cost or income to the town. This method obviously does not require any new structures.
- 2. The Town erects appropriate structures for the collection and storage of different types of material. It is estimated that the total cost of required structure (material and labor) would be \$3500. Further it is believed that half of the sum could be raised by private donations and volunteer labor. Arrangements would then be made with contractors, and/or truckers to sell recycled material. Collected volume is necessary.

It must also be noted that recycled material sold would reduce the volume going to the Bennington-Antrim landfill and would to some extent reduce the cost to the town of participating in that landfill. In any event it appears to be reasonable to expect that Method Two would generate more than sufficient funds to cover the salary of the required supervisor and amortize the cost of the recycle structure, PROVIDED THAT AT LEAST HALF THE TOWNS-PEOPLE WILL COOPERATE AND PARTICIPATE.

In conclusion, it is recommended that Method Two be implemented and that funds be authorized to that end. To be conservative, it is recommended that an initial one-time expense for structure, not to exceed \$3500, and an annual salary for supervisor, not to exceed \$3500, be authorized. To that end an article has been inserted in this year's Warrant.

CONSTANCE I. BICKNELL THOMAS BOURNIVAL ROBERT B. PARKER

REPORT OF THE TOWN HISTORIAN

In January Mr. Peter Flood was appointed Acting Police Chief for a period of six months to fill the vacancy created by the resignation, for personal reasons, of Police Chief John Thomas. In July Mr. Flood was sworn in as Francestown Police Chief. Also appointed to the force was Mr. Charles

Burrage, Jr., as special police officer.

On the 1976 Town ballot were two proposals — namely Article No. 22 in the Warrant: A special exception must be received from the Board of Adjustment for the removal of soil, rock, sand, gravel, loam or smilar earth materials in excess of 500 cubic yards per calendar year. It was voted to adopt the entire ordinance controlling such extraction as named in the article.

And Article No. 23: To adopt the provisions of RSA 72:62 for a property tax exemption on real property equipped with a solar heating energy or cooling system. The voters approved the \$50 deduction from tax bills for those who installed solar heat.

At the close of the 1976 Town meeting, the townspeople voted a resolution of appreciation to Mrs. Walter C. Dodge for her many years of service as a Trustee of the George

Holmes Bixby Memorial Library.

The Selectmen announced the following appointments in March: Advisory Board — F. Russell Abbott, Charles Onasch, Joseph Ludwig, Jr., William Edwards, Ernest Poor. Cemetery Commissioner — Richard Chapman. Planning Board — Robert Caskie, O. Alan Thulander, ex-officio. Board of Adjustment — Robert Duncan, Robert Abbott. Board of Highway Safety — Peter Flood. Police Matron — Marion Stewart. Conservation Commission — David Jonas, David Buber. Recycling Commission — Robert Parker, Thomas Bournival. Historian — Constance Dodge.

Maintenance work completed during 1976 in accordance

with articles passed at the last town meeting was:

Necessary repairs to the Woodward Hill Bridge using revenue sharing funds towards the cost.

Providing a drainage system in the annex of Cemetery No.

3 on the Second New Hampshire Turnpike.

The completion of re-roofing of the Town Hall.

Repairs to the exterior roof drainage along the main entrance to the George Holmes Bixby Memorial Library.

Completion of necessary work on window and door exits in connection with the installation of an exterior fire escape on the George Holmes Bixby Memorial Library. As the Historical Rooms are located on the second floor of this building, hopefully the rooms will again be open to the public this summer.

The Francestown Academy Corporation has a financial aid program to help young people of college age. Town students must have completed one year of college and enrolled for their second college year or for any school of higher education to be eligible. Four students were awarded

grants this year.

The Recycling Commission reports that ten tons of glass have been recycled, two truckloads, each with five tons of cans, were carted away, and ten tons of paper. The committee also took all "left-overs" from Labor Day to the Salvation Army in Manchester. One of their projects was the preparation and distribution of 265 survey letters. Their reason was to ascertain the interest in continuing the recycling program. A majority of those responding were in

favor of continuing the program.

The theme of 1976's Labor Day celebration under the auspices of the Francestown Improvement and Historical Society was the "Fifty Nifty United States." The events began on Sunday evening with the traditional evening Vesper Service in the Old Meeting House. Monday's activities included booths offering white elephants, books, plants, arts and crafts, and many more, and games on the Town Common. A two o'clock parade with many attractive floats, followed by a band concert, the Firemen's Supper, and the traditional square dance at 8:30 p.m. in the Town Hall completed the festivities. Proceeds from this affair are for the benefit of the Town. As a result the Society was able to:

Continue sponsoring tennis lessons and square dances for

town children and maintaining Scobie Beach.

Also the resealing of the tennis courts and providing of additional lighting for night use.

And improving the facade of the Town Fire Station by using white clapboards and trim to conform with the architectural beauty of the surrounding buildings. The Town

gave its approval for this work at the Town Meeting, and the Society underwrote the expense, with the town obtaining \$1,000 from the New Hampshire American Bicentennial Commission.

The Society also arranged in June for "The Little Red Wagon" sponsored by Project T.R.Y. to entertain the children of the town on the Town Common.

Francestown was the recipient of a tulip tree given to the Society by the Arnold Arboretum of Boston. The Beautification Committee arranged for securing this tree and for its planting at the Soldiers Monument at the Old Meeting House. They also planted two maple trees on the Second New Hampshire Turnpike near the entrance to Route #136.

The appointment of Leonard J. Gauthier as Postmaster of the Francestown Office was announced by the Northeast Regional Postmaster General, Frank M. Sommerkamp, in

October of this year.

Mrs. Donald Hoyt reported a very active 4-H group of boys and girls — age 9 to 18 — meeting at her home for classes in sewing, cooking, gardening, etc., and that Mrs. Lucille Paige has been working with a group interested in horses.

Many might be interested to know that there is an active "Little League" under the supervision of Edward Farhm and Joseph Ludwig, Jr., and that even the "Pee-Wees" have a team managed by James Wharton.

During the year 34 building permits were issued for

additions and new residences.

The State Department of Resources and Economic Development reports the 1976 estimated population of Francestown as 770 legal residents.

The voters check list as of December 31, 1976 showed 533

qualified voters.
