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TOWN WARRANT

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Hampton Falls in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Hampton Falls on Tuesday, the eleventh day of March, next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

3. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$269.15 for Town Road Aid. The State to contribute \$1,794.35.

4. To raise and appropriate, for economic advancement of the Town through publicity and promotional services of the Seacoast Regional Development Association, in co-operation with other communities, a sum not exceeding one-hundredth of one percent of assessed valuation, the sum of \$160.00

5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 to install and maintain a street light at the junction of Route 88 (Exeter Road) and the entrance to the school yard and Lincoln Avenue.

6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum necessary to install and maintain a proper street light at the junction of Exeter Road and Fountain Hill Road (known as Sanborn Corners). Signed by: Ralph Sanborn, Ethel P. Sanborn, Albert

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J. Webster, S. G. Creighton, Marion W. Creighton, Ida Young, Harold E. Tanner, Doris C. Tanner, Clarence S. Hart and Beatrice Hart.

7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,410.09 in payment for services to the Town by the Hampton Falls Volunteer Fire Department. Signed by: Russell P. Merrill, Jr., Robert Weaver, Donald Janvrin, Louis B. Janvrin, Alfred Baillargeon, George E. Avins, Everett L. Nelson, Eugene A. Heal, Richard Perkins, William Cannon, David T. Powell, Richard O. Bohm, Richard W. Coombs, George F. Merrill and George W. Pond.

8. To see if the Town will vote to rescind the Ordinance as passed by the Selectmen in regards to the use of horses in the Town, with the exception of the restrictions placed on Town commons and school grounds. Also that riding horses be permitted on Town roads after Sunset if properly lighted. Signed by: A. J. Lemire, Russell P. Merrill, Olin V. Cote, James H. Thurlow, Russell P. Merrill, Jr., David T. Batchelder, Eugene B. Whittemore, Gwendolyn Kent, Jean A. Wagner, William L. Wagner, Everett Nelson, Edna Nelson and John J. Shillaber.

9. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to issue a key to the Dump to a recognized rubbish collector of the Town. Signed by: M. C. Merrill, Robert E. Weaver, Donald Janvrin, R. P. Merrill, Jr., Eugene A. Heal, Alfred Baillargeron, Richard O. Bohm, Alphonse J. Lemire, George F. Merrill, Edward G. Pevear, Cedric Losier, Richard W. Coombs, Richard Perkins, Russell P. Merrill, William B. Cannon, Louis B. Janvrin and Allegra Lemire.

10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 to paint the Library.

11. To see if the Town wishes to continue or rescind the Social Security Plan as adopted in 1956 Town Meeting.

12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$300.00 toward the control of infected trees.

13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 for Brush removal.

14. To see if the Town will vote to make the following changes in the building regulations, Section 3, as recommended by the Planning Board:

"Delete the last sentence of Sect. 3 of building regulations:"

"A fee of two dollars shall be paid for all permits." In its place substitute the following: A minimum fee of two dollars shall be charged for all permits issued with an additional fee of one dollar for each one thousand dollars of estimated construction cost.

15. To see if the Town will vote to amend Section 3 of building regulations by adding the following: "No building permit will be valid after one year from date of issue unless construction has started.

16. To see of the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum sufficient to cover the cost of printing a pamphlet containing the Zoning Ordinance, Building Regulations and Sub-division Regulations.

17. To see if the Town will vote to give the Selectmen authority to sell any property acquired by tax sale.

18. To see if the Town will vote the Selectmen power to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

19. To see if the Town will vote to transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

NEW HAMPSHIRE SEACOAST REGIONAL DEVELOPMENT ASSOCIATION

Report of the President and Executive Secretary Year ending September 15, 1957

This twenty-third annual report will briefly touch upon some of the more important events of the Association's activities.

The distribution of our ever popular information and guide book "The Seacoast Region of New Hampshire Awaits Your Pleasure" has been significant in that a record number have been mailed directly to individuals definitely interested in the Region and the State.

More than forty percent of the 25,000 published have been sent to these individuals upon personal request and through selections from authentic lists of inquiries for the information the book contains. The remaining sixty percent were effectively used through the various valuable information services in the United States and Canada.

The six regional associations joined in an exhibit at the Boston Herald Travelcade in November 1956 and will participate again in October 1957.

The \$1,171,000.00 Federal Project removing hazards to navigation in Portsmouth Harbor and the Piscataqua River is now completed. A resolution for authorization of further surveys in the upper part of the River has been presented by Congressman Chester E. Merrow to the Public Works Committee of the U. S. House of Representatives.

Sponsored by the (State) Harbor Advisory Committee of which the Executive Secretary is Chairman, legislation creating a New Hampshire Port Authority has been enacted.

Full surveys of Rye and Hampton Harbors by the U.S. Army Engineers have been completed and favorable reports are expected soon. Determined efforts have been exerted for reconstruction of the State Pier at Hampton Harbor.

Funds have been allotted for a study by Army Engineers on extension downstream of the Cocheco River Flood Control Project.

Legislation recreating the N. H. Shore Fisheries Advisory Committee has been enacted.

Sponsored by our Mosquito Control Committee, legislation enabling establishment of insect and pest control districts in the State has been enacted.

The Association services through the Executive Secretary and Prof. C. F. Jackson of our Fisheries Committee, cooperating with the Portsmouth Rotary Club, the Portsmouth Y.M.C.A., Camp Gundalow and the Town of Greenland, were instrumental in securing the Winnicut River Dam.

Extensive data on the Region for a directory of Historic Lore in New Hampshire was compiled by Mrs. F. W. Randall for our Historic Sites Committee.

Legislation for the study of the pollution problem in Great Bay and the Rivers has been enacted.

Through action of our Agricultural Committee in addition to 4-H Clubs merit awards, the club leaders now receive the National 4-H News Magazine.

Some of these objectives were initiated or sponsored by the Association and in others every possible assistance has been extended. Special consideration should be given to the good services of our legislators. In these and other endeavors our associations with other groups and agencies, Local, State and Federal have been harmonious and productive.

Also the cooperative work of the Six Neighborly Regions of New Hampshire has brought forth many expressions of commendation. Our greatest need is more interest and support in our constructive purposes.

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TOWNS URGED TO SUPPORT THEIR REGIONAL ASSOCIATIONS

Concord, Jan. 16 — Governor Dwinell today reminded town officials that their regional associations are going to need support at coming town meetings, if they are to continue to promote the economic welfare of their respective areas.

This regional effort is very important, the Governor declared. In addition to their promotional work, the six regions form a logical link between individual towns and the State Planning and Development Commission.

"Many people overlook the fact that the work of the regional associations serves several different needs of the regional economy," the Governor said. "In some cases, the main effort may be for industrial development; in others, for adequate planning and zoning, or to develop some particular natural resources. Each regional association also promotes vacation travel and issues literature to supplement the state and local effort. In all of this work, the regional secretaries work closely with state agencies as well as with town organizations.

"Each regional association has officers and a board of directors chosen from the towns within the region. These people help to set up and supervise the development programs and guide the activity of the executive secretary.

"Money to support regional development is appropriated by the towns within each region, traditionally on the basis of one one-hundredth of one percent of the assessed evaluation of the town. Since this financial support is voluntary, the appropriations must be included in the town warrants, so they can be voted on each year at town meeting. "It is necessary that the economic support of the Regions come from pooling the funds of the communities which directly benefit from their activity. I believe that state tax money should be held intact to promote the state as a whole.

"Thus we achieve a promotion team each with its own functions and its own economic support. This is the team which is organized to bring vacation travel dollars into New Hampshire.

"Whether the total of \$210,000,000 reached last year is increased or not in a large measure depends on the support given by individuals and communities to their own Chambers of Commerce, Boards of Trade and to the Six Regions of New Hampshire."

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the School District in the Town of Hampton Falls, in the County of Rockingham, State of New Hampshire, qualified to vote upon District Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Hampton Falls, on the Seventh day of March, 1958, at Four p.m. in the afternoon, and to cast ballots for candidates for the following District officers:

1. Moderator for the ensuing year.

2. Clerk for the ensuing year.

3. Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.

4. Treasurer for the ensuing year.

You are also notified to meet at the same place at Eight o'clock in the evening of the same day to act upon the following subjects:

1. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer and fix the compensation of any other Officers of the District.

2. To hear the reports of agents, auditors and committees, or officers chosen and pass any vote in relation thereto.

3. To choose agents, auditors and committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.

4. To see what sum of money the District will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school District officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the District, and to authorize the application against said

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appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization fund together with other income, the School Board to certify to the Selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation which balance is to be raised by the Town.

5. To see if the District will vote to authorize the School Board to make application for and to accept, on behalf of the District, any or all grants or offers for educational purposes which may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the State of New Hampshire and or United States.

6. To see if the School District will adopt as its School Checklist the Town Checklist, as provided in RSA 197:12a, as inserted by Laws of 1957, chapter 57; this provision to be effective for the 1959 and subsequent annual district meetings.

7. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Committee and Citizens of the Hampton Falls School District:

It is a pleasure to submit my second annual report as Superintendent of Schools. The past year has been an active one; the rapid growth of this Seacoast region has compelled us all to extraordinary efforts to meet the needs of our growing school population. Furthermore, we have tried not only to provide for the minimum necessities, but also to make improvements in the quality of our staff and in our educational programs.

The Seacoast area presently exhibits one predominent characteristic — growth. It has grown in population and in wealth. Present indications are that this trend will continue. Concomitant with growth in communities one expects to find increased needs for public services and, inevitably, increasing costs for such services.

The School Districts of this Supervisory Union have, in the main, been forced to construct new schools to house their growing enrollments. For the moment, we are over the hump as regards this problem. We can be proud of our excellent new buildings which represent distinct improvements in community investment. Unless present trends towards growth are reversed, however, we shall have only a brief breathing space. Within two to three years additional facilities will again be needed in many of the districts.

Federal Aid for school construction under Public Law 815 has been of material assistance to most of our districts. Federal Aid for the operation of schools under Public Law 874 is also a major factor in defraying costs and in holding down the amounts of money to be raised by local taxation. In the Union as a whole our estimated income from Public Law 874 amounts approximately to \$100,000.00 for the coming school year.

There was a serious effort made in the last session of Congress to eliminate both of these Bills. Should a similar effort succeed during the present session, we would suffer a major blow in nearly every school district. We have estimated full receipts under the existing statute but this expires June 30, 1958. If by March we know that this legislation has been extended it will be necessary to ask for an appropriation larger than that now presented in our budget. It behooves every citizen to make known to our representatives in the Congress that we need to have maintained the system of payment by the Federal Government for pupils coming into our community as a direct result of Federal activities.

The New Hampshire Legislature in the last session enacted legislation which helps in meeting the cost of debt service. Single school districts formerly received state funds to the amount of 20% of the principal of debt incurred for capital investments. The state's share has now been increased to 30% for such districts and to 50% for those districts which join to form twelveyear cooperative school districts. State Aid for the operation of schools was also increased but only two of the Districts in this Union have valuations low enough to qualify for this form of assistance.

To staff our schools for the year beginning in September 1957 it was necessary to engage 52 new teachers, a larger number than any Supervisory Union in the state, including the cities, had to hire. To start with, we needed 20 additional teachers; next. we found it necessary to discontinue the services of 10 faculty members, the balance represented turnover because of personal circumstances. 10 of these teachers were lost because we could not offer adequate salaries; they accepted other positions at an average increase of approximately \$600.00.

We began the school year in September 1956 with an instructional staff of 101 full-time persons. In September 1957 this had risen to 119. In September 1958 we will need at least 139 faculty members. Except for a few of our New Hampshire cities this will make our Union the largest educational organization in the state.

The growth of our Union has created a growing problem in handling the administrative and supervisory duties of the Superintendency. Despite our overall growth in school personnel the Superintendent's staff has been increased only by the addition of a halftime clerk. The following tabulation shows the staff that has been provided:

The provision of three full-time persons on the secretarial and clerical staff has solved our problems at that level. The Helping Teacher and the Superintendent, however, cannot reasonably meet the needs in supervision and in administration under the present load. With the addition of the Cooperative secondary

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School District to the Union there are now eight school committees with twenty-six members.

The Supervisory Union School Committee is cognizant of the problem and is studying ways of alleviating it. Either the provision of an assistant superintendent or reorganization of the Union administrative structure is needed. No solution has been found at this time which will permit any change in conditions for the coming year beginning July 1, 1958.

We shall again need to hire a large number of teachers. There will be at least 18 additional teachers needed. Some turnover is inevitable. Conservatively estimated, our minimum needs will fall between 30 and 40 new teachers. In order to attract suitable teachers we must offer salaries as good or better than those which will be offered in northern New England.

Last year our minimum salaries of \$3000.00 in all of our districts but Seabrook and Rye made it nearly impossible to hire beginning teachers. We could hire none from Plymouth Teacher's College because the students flatly refused to consider any salary below \$3200.00. In some of our districts we had an advantage in hiring experienced teachers because our salary schedules offered a greater range than that found in some other New Hampshire communities.

This year is a critical one with regard to salaries. The School Committees have recognized this by raising minimum salaries. The new minimums range from \$3,200.00 to \$3,400.00 in the elementary districts. In raising a minimum it is only equitable to increase the salaries of older teachers by the amount of increase. This is not only equitable but is a matter of necessity this year because other communities in New Hampshire are doing so. We would lose our advantage in hiring experienced teachers if we did not give our teachers now on the staff the benefit of the increase in the minimum.

It must be recognized that a \$3400.00 minimum will, at best, put us on a basis equal to, but not ahead of many New Hampshire communities and those in bordering states with which we have to compete for teachers. Minimums of \$3400.00 will be common, some are already set at \$3500.00 and \$3600.00. An explanation of this problem should help you as voters of the District to realize the reasons which compelled your School Committee to ask for larger budgets in order to raise salaries.

The situation with regard to teacher's salaries will not change in succeeding years. The problem is one of simple economics. Teaching, which has always been an under paid profession, does not look attractive to young men and women when they know of earnings in other occupations. No adequate plans for forestalling the obvious shortage of teachers were undertaken at state and national levels following World War II. As our school populations have grown teachers have remained in short supply. Salaries, therefore, have risen and will continue to rise until the supply of teachers is markedly increased.

Many statistics are published to prove the relatively low earning power of teachers. One statistic is enough to cite, as far as I am concerned. The state wage rate for building laborers, who need no education or experience, is \$2.50 per hour at present, or \$100.00 per week without overtime. Much is often made of the fact that the teacher's work year is only 10 months. This is not a significant argument; those teachers who are able and willing to work in the summer can earn, on the average, only \$500.00 to \$600.00 for the season. To do so, in many instances, they must work at jobs which contribute nothing to their improvements as teachers.

I have devoted space to the foregoing considerations because of their critical importance at the present time. These matters are of common interest to the citizens of all of the School Districts of the Union. They apply with equal force in every District. The efficient functioning of our schools and the effective conduct of education in our classrooms is the matter at issue.

Before turning to matters concerning individual districts there is one educational program which again concerns all. This is the class for intellectually retarded pupils established last fall at the North Hampton Elementary School. We were fortunate in securing the services of an experienced teacher. The class has proved to be successful not only in our opinion, but in that of many impartial observers who have visited the class. We are indebted to the State Committee on Social Education and to the Trustees of the Spaulding Fund for technical advice and financial assistance in the preliminary work done during the past year which enabled us to make a sound selection of pupils.

As was indicated in my report last year there is a clear need for two such classes in our Union. With a second class in operation, it seems probable that we can provide for pupils who have special instruction without adding a third class for some time. North Hampton can furnish a classroom for another year; Hampton can provide the second classroom in what was its High School building. At the annual budget meeting in December 1957 the Union School Committee voted to recommend to all Districts that sufficient funds be included in their budgets to provide for two classes. The school program in Hampton Falls has operated efficiently this year. The chief problem in the coming year will be to maintain an adequate teaching staff. This will be possible if the School Committee's budget is accepted by the School District. Because of a larger increase in Federal Aid than was estimated, a slight increase in State Aid for next year, and because of prrudent financial practice during the current year it will be possible to increase the budget and yet decrease the amount to be raised by taxation. Few school districts are in this position.

There were several changes in the teaching staff this year. Principal William Donahue, Mrs. Mary Sweeney, and Miss Louise Ludgate all left for higher salaried positions. Mr. Nicholas Kontinos, an experienced intermediate grade teacher, replaced Mr. Donahue as Principal and teacher of grades 5 & 6. He has given very satisfactory service this year.

Mrs. Marian Jacobsen of Exeter replaced Mrs. Sweeney in grade 3 and has rendered superior service. Mrs. Shirley Barnes, although a beginner, has done admirable work in the fourth grade. Miss Jean Worth and Miss Helen Johnston continued on the staff from last year as the capable teachers of grades 1 and 2.

Enrollments are such that the combination of grades 5 and 6 can no longer be continued. The new first grade will be so small, however, that it will be necessary to combine grades one and two next year. This arrangement will permit us to continue with a staff of five teachers using the rooms now available without an addition to the building.

The community should recognize that an addition to the building may be needed within a few years. If any great number of new residents should appear the problem will become immediate. It would, of course, be desirable to have an additional classroom now so that the multi-purpose room could be used as was intended when it was built.

An improvement in nursing service has resulted from having the new School Nurse, Mrs. Nancy Chase, available for more time than was the case in the preceding year. The Art and Music programs have continued to provide adequate instruction; improvements are planned for next year.

The participation of Hampton Falls in the Cooperative Secondary School District will provide increasingly better educational services for high school students. The costs of transportation for elementary and junior high school pupils are covered in the Hampton Falls budget; transportation of high school pupils is covered in the Cooperative District budget. Hampton Falls can pay its share of the Cooperative School Budget and still raise less money for schools from taxes than in the previous year.

I have been fortunate during the year to have intelligent assistance and loyal support from many of my colleagues and fellow-workers. My obligations to teachers and other staff members are too numerous to list them here. For their help I am deeply appreciative.

May I also express my appreciation to the members of the School Committee and to other citizens of the District for their understanding of school problems and their readiness to work on behalf of our school children.

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REPORT OF THE SCHOOL NURSE

Dr. Edward C. Manning Superintendent of Schools:

It gives me great pleasure to write my first report on the school health program in Hampton Falls.

The success of any school health program is dependent upon many people: the parents, the school board, the superintendent, the principal, the teachers, the school doctor, the janitor, and the school nurse-teacher. They are all working together so that the children will be happy and healthy. The various aspects of the program are: health education, health appraisal, dental health, vision and hearing tests, nutrition, communicable disease control, accident prevention, and sanitation in the school.

Contact and understanding with the parents is essential if the aims of the school health program are to be realized. Thanks to the cooperation of all concerned, the program has been able to progress as planned, with the exception of the flu epidemic which forced school to close November 5-8. By December 20, all the school children had a short health conference with the school nurse-teacher.

Dr. Bailey, the school doctor, has done physical examinations on the 1st grade, 3rd grade, and one half of the 6th grade. The rest of the 6th grade will be examined as soon as time allows. All the children have been weighed and measured and over 80% have had their eyes and ears tested. The remaining 20% will be tested in January.

A polio clinic was held December 12th, and the majority of the pupils now have had their third polio

immunization. There will be continued follow-up on all those children who have poor vision, poor hearing, cavities, and other defects which hinder growth and development, and all the children will be weighed and measured again in the spring.

Since the community is so receptive to the aims of a comprehensive school health program, there is every indication that we will continue to have happy and healthy children in school.
