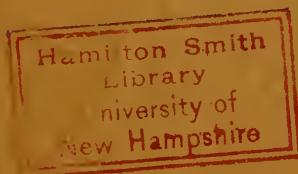

TOWN WARRANT

To the inhabitants of the Town of Harrisville in the County of Cheshire in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Eagle Hall in said Harrisville on Tuesday, the fourteenth day of March next, at nine-thirty of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation of the same.

3. To see if the town will vote to apply for State Aid for highways this year and appropriate money for the same.

4. To see if the town will vote to appropriate a sum not exceeding \$200.00 to continue the gravelling on the East View roads.

5. To see if the town will vote to take any part of the regular highway appropriation to oil the streets in the center of the town.

6. To see if the town will vote to appropriate a sum not to exceed \$300.00 to gravel the road from Upton's corner to Miss Jones' farm house.

7. To see if the town will vote to build a cement watering trough on the Nelson road.

8. To see if the town will vote to discontinue that part of the road leading to the old George W. Seaver house now owned by Wellington Wells, which part is west of the intersection of the road leading from Chesham station to Marienfeld Camp.

9. To see if the town will vote to observe Old Home Day, appropriate \$100.00, and choose officers for the same.

10. To hear the reports of agents, officers, and committees heretofore chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.

11. To see what action, if any, the town will take regarding the price to be paid labor and salaries paid town officers.

12. To see if the town will vote \$1,000 to be used in connection with \$4,000 of state funds on the Dublin and Hancock road, as proposed in House Resolution No. 12.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board of Harrisville :

I herein submit my tenth annual report as superintendent of schools.

The economic situation today compels us to weigh everything that we are doing to make sure that it is worth while, to evaluate it from an economic standpoint, to make sure it is being done in the best possible way and at the least cost commensurable with efficiency.

Your school officers have tried to eliminate unnecessary leaks, to take advantage of every reduction of costs in needed materials, to maintain standard qualities and not to cripple the efficiency of the teachers through lack of things necessary for successful work.

Taxes and tax burdens are today the topic of much discussion. There is no denying that public education faces a crisis. What shall we do? Shall we lose faith?

Due to the world-wide depression, a popular wave for the cutting of teachers' salaries swept over the country last year.

An error was made in placing the development of children on a level with mercantile and manufacturing business. For the business may recuperate its loss when times becomes favorable; but the loss to the developing child is loss forever.

Here, I wish to commend the action of the towns of my district, in the fact that five of the eight towns maintained the same salaries for their teachers, and the other three towns made only moderate cuts.

If I may judge from what I read in the papers today, the peak of cutting teachers' salaries is past. The wave is on its ebb.

A question which is sometimes asked is: "How far can a man go into the woods?" The answer, "Only half way." For after that he is on the way out. We trust that as far as the depression effects our public school system, New Hampshire and the rest of the country are on the way out.

However, let us be optimistic. Let us not take the props from under the bridge over which the country must travel to reach better times. But as citizens of the greatest republic in the world, let us be mindful of the following facts: (1) The school is the agent of the state in preserving itself; in creating its own future. (2) Education is not a charity but a part of the national defense. (3) Education is the author of national ideals, the moulder of the soul of America.

Therefore, let us resolve: Not until other means have been exhausted, should the necessary appropriation for education be touched. We have no right to punish the children for our lack of foresight, and they are the ones who will suffer under this procedure.

The above statements are made not for any emolument unto myself, but they are made in the interests of your children and for the prosperity of our state and nation.
