WARRANT FOR THE 1978 ANNUAL TOWN MEETING

The State of New Hampshire

THE POLLS WILL BE OPEN FROM 8:30 A. M. to 7:00 P. M.

To the Inhabitants of the Town of HOPKINTON in the County of MERRI-MACK in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Hopkinton on Tuesday, the 14th day of March next at 8:30 o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

- I. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- II. To see what action the Town will take with respect to six proposed amendments of the Town Zoning Ordinance prepared by the Town Planning Board by voting by ballot upon the following questions:
 - 1. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 1 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town Zoning Ordinance as follows:

 Amend Section 10 of the Ordinance by adding a provision which would limit the number of new residential building permits which may be issued to seventy in the next two years to enable the Planning Board to develop a new master plan updating the Town's comprehensive plan for growth. The proposed text of the amendment, subject to editorial revisions and textual modifications, is as follows:

"The number of building permits for the construction of new residential buildings which may be issued from the adoption of this amendment until the 1980 annual town meeting shall be seventy, thirty of which may be issued between the adoption of this amendment and the 1979 annual town meeting, and forty of which may be issued thereafter. No more than one permit per record holder shall be issued during the year unless the total number of permits to be issued in the year have not been issued by July 15th, in which case a second permit (but in no event more than two) may be issued. Permits shall be issued in the order of original application to the Selectmen presented in person by the applicant or his agent at a regular Selectmen's meeting, "Record holder" shall mean the owner(s) of land in Hopkinton as recorded at Merrimack County Registry of Deeds on the date of the adoption of this amendment. A building permit may be transferred to the purchaser of a lot. Land owned in joint tenancy or as tenants in common shall not enable the owners thereof to more than the number of permits which would be available if the land were owned by one individual. No person, corporation, partnership or other entity shall directly or indirectly be a record holder of more than one parcel of land for purposes of issuing building permits.

Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 2 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town Zoning Ordinance as follows: Amend Table 3, *Dimensional and Density Regulations*, by changing the minimum lot frontage in an R-2 zone from two hundred feet to two hundred fifty feet and changing the minimum lot frontage in an R-3 zone from two hundred feet to three hundred feet.

3. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 3 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town Zoning Ordinance as follows: Amend Table 3, *Dimensional and Density Regulations*, by deleting the second sentence of footnote 1 and inserting the following sentence in its place:

"The frontage on a road at a cul de sac may be less than specified if the front yard setback line meets the minimum lot frontage requirements."

4. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 4 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town Zoning Ordinance as follows: Delete Section 10.06 of the Hopkinton Zoning Ordinance and insert the following provision in its place:

"10.06 — Permit Time Limits. Any work for which a permit has been issued by the Building Inspector for the construction of new residential buildings shall be actively prosecuted within four months. Any other work for which a permit has been issued by the Building Inspector shall be actively prosecuted within six months. Failure to actively prosecute work within these time limitations shall result in an automatic lapse of the permit. All work for which a permit has been issued by the Building Inspector must be completed within two years of the date of the issuance of the permit, provided that any permit issued for a project which is actively prosecuted for one year may be extended at the discretion of the Building Inspector."

VI.To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,640.18 for Town Road Aid (the State to contribute \$10,934.53).

VII.To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$15,000.00 to be placed in a Capital Reserve Fund for a Town Garage.

VIII. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$20,000.00 to be placed in a Capital Reserve Fund for Town Highway Equipment.

- XIII. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000.00 for an alarm system at the Contoocook Fire Station.
- XIV. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25,324.00 for Town Construction of Highways. (\$15,324.00 to be reimbursed by Additional Highway Subsidy).
- XV. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$741.00 for support of the Community Action Program. (Not recommended by Budget Committee.)
- XVI. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,300.00 for defense council of Chester L. Jordan during attempted dismissal actions in September 1977. (Submitted by petition) (Not recommended by Budget Committee).
- XVII. To see if the Town will vote to authorize withdrawal of \$12,000.00 from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act for use as a setoff against the following debt service:

1972 Fire Station \$10,000.00 Note and Interest \$2,000.00 Note and Interest

- XVIII. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Conservation Commission to retain the unexpended portion of its yearly appropriation, said funds to be placed in special conservation fund in accordance with RSA 36-A:5.
 - XIX. To see if the Town wishes to exclude from its Social Security plan services performed by election officials or election workers in which the remuneration paid for such services is less than \$100.00 per year.

- XX. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the Sewer Ordinance enacted pursuant to RSA 252 and adopted by the Selectmen pursuant to RSA 147.
- XXI. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of \$1,000,000.00 for the purpose of constructing sewerage and sewage treatment facilities which are requirements contained in the Federal Water Pollution Control Act, as amended (33 U.S.C. 1251 et seq.) and will qualify the Town for Federal funds, such sum to be raised by the issuance of Serial Bonds or Notes not to exceed \$1,000,000,00 under and in compliance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act (N. H. RSA 33.1 et seq., as amended) and to authorize the Selectmen to issue and negotiate such bonds or notes and to determine the rate of interest thereon, and to take such other actions as may be necessary to effect the issuance, negotiation, sale and delivery of such bonds or notes as shall be in the best interests of the Town of Hopkinton, and to allow the Selectmen to expend such monies as become available from the Federal Government under the Financial Assistance Program of the Construction Grants section of the Federal Water Pollution Control Act, as amended (33 U.S.C. 1251 et seq.) and pass any vote relating thereto.
- XXII. To see if the Town will vote to accept the following Cemetery Trust Funds, the income to be used as directed, subject to such provisions as may be applicable thereto:
 - 1. The sum of \$100.00 from George L. & Ella M. Fitts, plus the interest to date, for the perpetual care of Lot 77, Section B, plots 3 & 4 in the New Hopkinton Cemetery.
 - 2. The sum of \$100.00 from John B. & Martha M. Abbot, plus the interest to date, for the perpetual care of Lot 38, Section D, Plots 3 & 4 in the Old Hopkinton Cemetery.
 - 3. The sum of \$500.00 from A. G. Symonds, plus the interest to date, for the perpetual care of Plots 63R and 64R in Section D of the Contoocook Cemetery.
 - 4. The sum of \$100.00 from Leslie B. & Lilla M. Wright, plus the interest to date, for the perpetual care of Lot 230, Section E, Plots 2 & 3 in the Contoocook Cemetery.
 - 5. The sum of \$200.00 from Arnold A. and Anna J. Boyce, plus the interest to date, for the perpetual care of Lot 37, Section D, in the Contoocook Cemetery.
 - 6. The sum of \$200.00 from Bert G. & Edna F. Blanchard, plus the interest to date, for the perpetual care of a burial lot in the Contoocook Cemetery.
- XXIII. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$75.00 to be added to the principal of the Glenn M. Haselton Memorial Fund in 1977.
- XXIV. To see if the Town will vote to expend the income, during the current

year, from the G. Everett Kelly Fund one-half for the benefit of Hop-kinton Village Library and one-half for the benefit of Bates Library.

XXV. To see if the Town will vote to accept the following fund:

The sum of \$436.18, plus interest to date, from friends and relatives of Barry Regal, the income to be used for a Memorial Scholarship, available to Hopkinton High School graduates who are entering the field of Physical Education or a Math Related Career, subject to such provisions as the award committee may direct, Ms. Sharon Regal or her designee to be a member of the Committee making the award. Amount of Scholarship to be the interest earned by the Fund.

- XXVI. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of the 1978 tax levy.
- XXVII. To act on reports of Town Officers, Trustees and Committees for the year 1977.
- XXVIII. To hear and transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

SELECTMEN'S REPORT

The year 1977 has presented the Selectmen with a number of difficult decisions over and above the normal decisions Selectmen are called upon to make each year.

The most controversial decisions involved the decision to terminate, and thereafter to reinstate, the Police Chief. Both decisions were extremely difficult and the positions of both parties are reflected in the minutes of the Selectmen's meetings. It serves no useful purpose to recite them here. We remain hopeful that the events will increase the communication between the Police Chief and the Selectmen to prevent problems in the future.

Many less publicized but equally as difficult decisions were required of the Selectmen. It became apparent during the year that emergency repairs were required to the Tyler Bridge and a plan for its permanent replacement should be undertaken. The repairs were undertaken during the year and are 95% complete. As a result of the vote at the special town meeting to appropriate enough money for the Town's share of the replacement cost, the State of N. H. is in the process of designing a new bridge which we hope will be built in 1980 or 1981. While the weight limitations and speed limitations remain the same, every effort is being made to make the bridge as safe as possible.

The sewer project has involved and will continue to involve an enormous amount of time. The Selectmen participated with the Sewer Commission and members of the Planning Board, Zoning Board, Recreation Commission and Conservation Commission to finalize the site of the plant, the sewer ordinance and easements for the sewer pipe. There have been almost a dozen public hearings concerning the sewer project in the past year and you will be asked to approve the construction costs and the sewer ordinance at the Town meeting. The participation by many town citizens in this project has been valuable to the Selectmen.

Growth has become an item of major significance this year and a number of items will be before the Town at the Town meeting pertaining to growth, including a limitation on the number of building permits to be issued. The Selectmen have publicly requested that any limitation of building permits be based on specific objective criteria so as to prevent any possible claimed abuse in the issuance or not issuance of a building permit by the Selectmen.

The Selectmen were pleased with the fact that the municipal portion of the budget, the only portion under the direct control of the Selectmen, did not contribute at all to the increase in the tax rate for 1977. The entire increase was due to increased school and county expenditures. This is the third consecutive year where the municipal portion of the budget has had minimal or no effect on the tax rate. Credit should be given to all department heads and other responsible officials for submitting and abiding by realistic budgets.

The Selectmen are also pleased with the many favorable comments we have received as a result of converting the Road Agent's job from a part-time to a

full-time position.

We thank all Town employees who left the service of the Town during 1977 for their dedicated service to the Town. We welcome all new employees joining the Town during the year and look forward to working with you. We express our continuing appreciation to all Town employees who have illustrated again this year their dedication to the general health, safety and welfare of all the people of the Town.

Attended in service education meetings on Tuesday afternoons at Concord Regional Visiting Nurses Association.

Met with the town nurses from Hillsboro, Milford and Weare in Hillsboro on May 26, 1977 to discuss State Licensing. The State Public Health Nurse for this area was also present.

Gave two, one-half hour classes at Maple Street School on the role of a Community Health Nurse.

Gratefully acknowledging donations at Thanksgiving and Christmas from The Congregational Church, The Baptist Church, The Methodist Church, the students of Maple Street School and Harold Martin School, The I.O.O.F., The Hopkinton Police Department and the members of the Mini-Farmers Livestock and Dairy 4-H Club.

Appreciation and thanks to the Women of St. Andrews, Second Chance, The Hopkinton Police Dispatchers, and the Merrimack County Dispatchers.

The Hopkinton Public Health Nursing Association and the Concord Regional Visiting Nurses Association have, for the third year, signed a one-year agreement. At the end of this time, either party has the right not to renew this agreement.

This agreement enables the H. P. H. N. A. to receive reimbursement from Medicare for home nursing visits to qualified Medicare patients. Since the Concord V. N. A. must vouch for the quality of nursing care being given, it is necessary that supervisory visits be made by the C. R. V. N. A. Supervisor once or twice a year. It is also required that the Hopkinton Nurse attend in service education meetings on Tuesday afternoons at the Concord Visiting Nurses

Association. This arrangement seems to be working out well. Hopkinton benefits from this arrangement in the following ways:

1. Expanded Services:

The services of a physical therapist, occupational therapist, speech therapist, nutritionist, home health aides and homemakers are now available to Medicare patients. These people are all employed by the Concord V.N.A.

2. Preschool Clinic:

This clinic is held monthly in Concord and is staffed by a Pediatrician, Pediatric Nurse Practitioner, and a Nutritionist. Preschool children of low income families are eligible to attend this clinic. Arrangements can be made by contacting the Hopkinton Visiting Nurse.

- 3. Increased revenue for the town:
 - Medicare pays \$13. for each home visit to Medicare patients who are essentially homebound. Concord V. N. A. keeps \$3 of this payment and sends the remaining \$10 to the Town of Hopkinton. Since Hopkinton P. H. N. A. is not considered to be a certified home health agency by Medicare (an agency must provide at least two health services, such as nursing and physical therapy in order to be certified) Hopkinton must sign an agreement with a certified agency in order to be eligible for this reimbursement.
- 4. An ongoing, comprehensive in service education program for the visiting nurse.
- 5. A large, qualified staff of health care professionals is available for the Hopkinton Visiting Nurse to consult with, regarding nursing care problems.

POLICE DEPARTMENT REPORT 1977

The protection and education of our children is a major concern of all citizens of the community. Your Police Department has always made this concern part of its policy. To this end we have implemented some new programs as well as keeping some that are tried and true. In the area of protection we can point out the new signs with flashing lights at the Maple Street School. These signs are meant to alert motorists to the presence of school children ahead. The Department has several programs aimed at both protection and education. We conducted classes in Bicycle Safety this spring at both the Harold Martin and Maple Street Schools. This program showed children that they too are responsible for their own safety. They learned safe bicycle driving and what safety equipment was necessary. The Officer Bill Program was presented to the kindergarten. These children learned that a police officer was a friend and someone to count on. Halloween can pose several major problems in child safety. Your department instituted a Halloween Safety Program which we hope will help keep our kids unharmed. Our programs for the young adults of the community start with our visits to the Driver Education Classes to explain motor vehicle laws and the consequences of breaking these laws. The Hopkinton Police Explorer Post and the Summer Cadet Program are aimed at showing our youth how and why a police department functions in the community for the well being of its citizens.

The Police Department has gone ahead in its own educational pursuits. Officer Carruthers and I have attended St. Anselm's College. Officer William Regan graduated from the New Hampshire Police Standard and Training Council's Police Academy. Officers William Gay and Walter Dwinnells attended a ten week course conducted by the Police Standards and Training Council for special police officers. These officers went on their own time so as to be better able to serve you. All members of the Department have attended a number of seminars in different areas of law enforcement and safety. Also, all members of the Department are required to spend a minimum of eight hours on the firing range to qualify with their revolver and the Department's shotguns.

The protection of the property of our citizens is another "policy" of this Department. We wish to encourage all citizens to notify the Police Department whenever they will be away from home, even if only overnight. Knowing which homes are empty, allows us to increase our patrols in the area and to make sure the property is secure. We feel these property checks are a vital part of our crime prevention efforts and request your cooperation.

The Police Department has had several personnel changes in the past year. Besides Officer William Regan, who has been with the force for one year: we have Officer Bruce Price. Bruce has had ten years of law enforcement experience with the Arlington, Massachusetts Police Department. I am sure the town will find he, his wife and two sons welcome new members of our community as well as a fine addition to your police force. Our new Clerk/Dispatcher is Kath-

leen Schoch. Kathi's duties include answering both the Police telephone and radio and also answering the nurses phone. She is on duty in the Police Station from 8:30 A.M. to 5:00 P.M. every weekday.

During the hours that Kathi is not on duty, the Police telephone and radio are answered by Merrimack County Dispatch. This Dispatch System, which we joined in April 1977, has proven to be an excellent service and has increased our effectiveness, not to mention the added safety it has provided the officers on duty.

Service to the community is the aim of our Police Department. We wish to thank you, the citizens of Hopkinton, for your support in our efforts.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE HOPKINTON FIRE DEPARTMENT

The 1977 year was an active one for the Hopkinton Fire Department with 98 fire-related runs and 188 ambulance calls.

The Ambulance Service is a large part of the Fire Department's activities, growing from 45 calls in 1962 to 188 calls in 1977.

Early in 1977, four men of the Hopkinton Police Rescue Squad teamed up with the men of the Hopkinton Fire Ambulance Squad and set up what we call a duty roster. This means that they divided into three-men teams and serve for a week at a time on a rotating basis. This type of round-the-clock service is very demanding on the men and their families as they must be close to home and available at all times.

This year the men must take a 26-hour Emergency Medical Technician "EMT" refresher course, so they will remain fully qualified ambulance men.

In 1977, more pocket pagers were purchased with money voted at Town Meeting, donations from gracious people, and money from the Fire Department's Thanksgiving Raffle. These pagers are activated from radios in the fire station, or Chief's home, or the Deputy's home, and have greatly improved the response of the men. We hope in 1978, that every fire fighter will have a pager.

On November 1, 1977, the long-awaited new fire truck voted in the March 1976, Town Meeting arrived. This is a very good piece of fire fighting equipment. This truck is diesel powered with a 1000 gallon per minute pump, a 2500 foot capacity 4 inch hose reel, plus other small equipment.

The main use for this vehicle is for what we call a source pumper truck, which means it will lay main hose supply lines from the water source and pump the water to the attack fire truck at the fire scene, or to fill tanker trucks if the water is to be trucked over land to the fire scene.

We have needed a vehicle of this type for many years. This truck was put to use a short time after its arrival at a major house fire on Rollins Road.

Approximately one-third of the fire runs involved fires in the home. Many of the fires occurred during the sleeping hours. To wake up to the smell of smoke is a very frightening experience.

Approved smoke detectors in your home could be the most important piece of equipment you could buy for your life and safety. Please install one or more in your home today.

Fire Mutual Aid has been very beneficial to all towns. Hopkinton Fire Department has assisted our neighbors many times this year.

On April 16, 1977, at 2:05 P.M., we were called to Webster in the Red Barn Area for a brush fire. This fire quickly spread into Hopkinton and Concord. This was the largest fire to occur in this area in many years, burning approximately ninety acres of trees and brush.

Another brush fire on Broad Cove Road started shortly after the big fire started, and if that wasn't enough, a major house and barn fire a short distance away in Webster started. Concord at the same time was fighting many small fires.

Mutual Aid came from all nearby towns: from Hillsboro to the west, Franklin to the north, Epsom to the east, and Allenstown to the south, all to assist in fighting these fires.

One young fire fighter summed up the situation as the fire crowned and roared over his head in the ninety-feet high pine trees, "I thought this only happened in the movies."

At this time, I would like to thank, on behalf of the men of the Hopkinton Fire Department, the Police Department, the Police Rescue Squad, the Selectmen, the Highway Department, and the townspeople of Hopkinton for their fine co-operation.

REPORT OF DISTRICT FIRE CHIEF AND TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN

Forest fire control in New Hampshire is a joint state and town/city responsibility (RSA 224).

The Director, Division of Forests and Lands (State Forester) appoints a forest fire warden and several deputy forest fire wardens in each town/city upon the recommendation of local authorities.

The local forest fire warden is responsible for forest fire prevention and suppression activities in his town. He regulates the kindling of outside fires when the ground is not covered with snow by the issuance of written permits only when conditions are safe. He is responsible for suppression with the town/city and state sharing the cost. Suppression costs in excess of ¼ of 1% of the assessed valuation of the town are assumed by the State.

The state provides training for the local fire organization and helps coordinate activities between towns/cities. The state also supports local forces with backup personnel, equipment, and supplies for suppression and prevention.

This combination of state and local cooperation, started in 1893, works well, for New Hampshire has enjoyed one of the smallest acreage losses due to forest fires in the United States for the past 25 years.

PLANNING BOARD REPORT

During 1977, the Town Planning Board approved subdivisions creating about 45 new building lots; not all of these lots will necessarily be built upon. As 1978 begins, the Board has under consideration two relatively large subdivisions; one at the end of Spring Street and the other on Hatfield Road.

The Selectmen, Planning Board and others in town are concerned over the possibility of too rapid growth of Hopkinton. Thus, during 1977 a special committee on growth was formed to study various aspects of growth, distribute a questionnaire and publish the report. This Growth Committee made two important recommendations: First, that a Master Plan be prepared and Second, that during the two-year period while the Master Plan is being prepared, the Town adopt a limitation of issuance of building permits. Both of these recommendations are being implemented. Anyone interested in assisting in the preparation of a Master Plan for future development of the Town, please contact a member of the Planning Board.

HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT

There were several projects the Highway Department either finished or got underway in 1977. Not as much was completed as we had hoped for, as time seems to dictate so much in the four season climate of New Hampshire.

The winter of 1977 was the coldest on record and this only added to road deterioration.

There is a lot to be done and the expense of these projects rises each year with inflation.

A section of South Road was surfaced in 1977, and the Dustin Road (TRA Project) is 70% completed. This is a section of road in the Blackwater District of Contoocook, measuring 1.6 miles.

The department ditched many sections of roads, along with installing 17 needed culverts. Work was done on a section of Clement Hill Road, near the Warner town line, and approximately 400 yards of crushed gravel was spread, also many surface stones were removed making the snow plowing project easier.

Tyler Bridge repairs were completed in December, and a new bridge is on schedule with the State in three or four years.

In 1978 I want to do more ditching and culvert work, along with more resurfacing and maintenance.

The cooperation of other town departments, and our town officials, along with the cooperation of the citizens of Hopkinton has been appreciated. I will continue to do my best for you in 1978.

REPORT OF THE HOPKINTON-WEBSTER REFUSE DISPOSAL COMMITTEE

1977 was a good year at the dump. No major problems were encountered and several improvements have been made. Areas for the disposal of tires, scrap metal and miscellaneous materials were made at a location handy to push them over an embankment and be covered. A new method for sewage disposal has worked well in an area far from any surface water.

The Town of Warner is continuing to lease the use of our landfill facility on a yearly basis, with one year's notice required from either party to effect any change in the agreement. The money received from the lease agreement adequately covers the cost incurred in handling Warner's refuse. Space in the landfill does not seem to be used up too fast, so the Committee will extend Warner's lease for another year.

The landfill operation contract was put out for bid in late 1977 and as a result, we have a new Contractor for 1978 — Mr. Carroll A. Kimball of Hopkinton.

We hope that everyone will cooperate with the Committee by observing the rules and regulations for use of the landfill. Permit stickers are available free of charge for all residents at the Town Clerk's office. When depositing refuse at the landfill, please place each type of waste in the proper areas designated by signs, or if in doubt, the Contractor will assist you. The Contractor will not accept brush, logs, stumps, stones or fill from commercial land clearing operations, however, the homeowner will be allowed to bring in small quantities of these items as a part of the regular household and yard trash.

The Commission hopes to be able to continue to serve the needs of its member communities in future years and appreciates the past support of its activities by the Town of Hopkinton.

ZONING BOARD OF ADJUSTMENT

During the past year, the Hopkinton Zoning Board of Adjustment acted on 36 applications to the Board. The Board granted 15 special exceptions and 13 variances. One special exception and 5 variances were denied. Two applications were tabled.

The Board is concerned that a number of violations to the Ordinance have occurred and has recommended to the Selectmen that steps be taken to enforce the Ordinance. Most violations appear to be unintentional; however, in one or two cases the Board has recommended court action.

The Board strongly endorses the proposed amendments to the Zoning Ordinance and wishes to express its concern over the influx of population and the ability of the Town and its taxpayers to provide the required services.

REPORT OF THE TOWN CONSERVATION COMMISSION

The Commission met 12 times during the year including two meetings with the Selectmen and a joint meeting with the Town of Hillsborough Conservation Commission. In addition to these meetings, considerable time and effort was spent on base maps of the Town. These maps delineate the different areas such as agriculture, wet lands, and soil suitability for septic systems. Copies of the maps are in the Town Offices for use by interested people. The Central New Hampshire Regional Planning Commission assisted by furnishing mylars and map copies for our use and worked with us on the project.

The Commission established a conservation education fund to be used on school projects that will aid in increasing the students awareness of our natural resources and the need for conservation and protection of open space. We also plan to fund a student at the Youth Conservation Camp for one week. The camp has been a project of the Society for the Protection of New Hampshire Forests for many years. It offers a student a week of study and recreation under the guidance of outstanding teachers.

Members of the Commission have testified at Legislative hearings and written letters to members of Legislature in support of proposed legislation to protect wet lands. Needed legislation is slow in being enacted and will need added attention in the future.

The Commission became aware that the State of New Hampshire, Department of Public Works and Highways, had declared 17 acres of land on the southerly side of the "On-ramp" from Henniker to I-89, at Exit 5, as surplus to their needs. As no State Agency was interested in its acquisition, we had the opportunity, with Selectmen approval, to request the land be transferred to the Town. Our request was approved by the Department and the Governor and Council. We now have a deed to the land, for its use for conservation purposes, at no cost to the Town.

The Commission made application to the County of Merrimack, Department of Employment Training, for a person to work on a natural resources inventory of the Town. This project would have been 100% funded for 6 months by CETA Title VI Project Funding. By the time the project was approved, the qualified person was no longer available, and we will reactivate the project should a qualified person be found to do the inventory.

REPORT OF THE RECREATION COMMISSION

At the Annual Meeting of the Town last March, it was voted to create a Recreation Commission. The net effect of this action was to replace the Recreation Study Committee with a permanent Commission as a regular department of the Town. The basic tasks facing the Commission have remained the same.

As indicated in our last report we set two goals for the year. The first was to initiate a maintenance program to keep the Park in good repair. The second was to continue working towards the completion of the park improvement project.

The first goal is one that holds a high priority as far as the Commission is concerned. However, while we can accomplish the basics of rubbish removal, mowing and raking and minor repair, we are quite dependent upon the cooperation of all who use park facilities. We experienced some vandalism in the service building and the usual deposit of trash in areas other than that provided. Things like this divert funds and energy from more productive uses. We have good facilities and hope that through the cooperation of all they can remain that way.

Our second goal, that of completing the park improvement project, is gradually being achieved. During the year, toilets have been installed, the infield portion of the baseball diamond was completed (hopefully with a much firmer surface) and a hydrant installed for the purpose of flooding the skating rinks. Remaining to be completed are the service building and the installation of water fountains.

An item that will be brought up for consideration at the Annual Meeting concerns the future of George's Park. For sometime we have discussed what to do about the general playing surface of the park insofar as developing and maintaining a good surface. Presently, most of the park area is a combination of weeds, sandy loam and what have you. In our deliberations we asked Dick Brunel to give us some estimates of what it would take to landscape to park area. After considerable deliberation, we have decided to request funds to landscape a portion of the park. The proposal is to cover an area essentially to provide an entire baseball outfield with sufficient area to accommodate a soccer field. The project would consist essentially of replacing the present top soil with a mixture of loam, peat moss and fertilizer in order to get a substantial base to hold a good growth of grass. Over the years, we would hope to complete other park areas. The cost of this first phase would be approximately \$10,000. We plan to apply for federal funds to offset 50% of the cost.

Other activities of the Commission during the year included developing plans for the continued operation of the Kimball Pond swimming area with the shift of some of the operating responsibility to the Commission. Also, we met with members of the school staff to discuss ways in which we could cooperate in the development and use of School and Town recreation facilities. Our purpose is to develop a long-range plan to meet the recreational needs of the Town as it develops. We will continue our work in these areas during the coming year.

Each year sees the gradual improvement of our recreational facilities. This is

the result of the support and cooperation of many persons. It is such that makes the Commission feel its efforts are worthwhile.

With the purchase of six pagers, the squad is now fully equipped and can be summoned simultaneously instead of by the previous telephone fan out.

By working together, the Police Dept., Fire Dept., and the Rescue Squad provide a wide range of proficient personnel ready and able to cope with any emergency.

Again this year, we would like to thank those who have aided the Rescue Squad through donations and support of our annual auction. A major portion of our operating budget is obtained in this manner.

H. RSA 33.1 et. seq., as amended) and to authorize the Selectmen to issue and negotiate such bonds or notes and to determine the rate of

interest thereon, and to take such other actions as may be necessary to effect the issuance, negotiation, sale and delivery of such bonds or notes as shall be in the best interests of the Town of Hopkinton and to allow the Selectmen to expend such monies as become available from the Federal Government under the Financial Assistance Program of the Construction Grants section of the Federal Water Pollution Control Act, as amended (33 U.S.C. Notes to Financial Statements

HOPKINTON VILLAGE PRECINCT WATER DEPARTMENT

TREASURER'S REPORT

1977 STATEMENTS:

The accompanying financial statements show the financial condition of the Water Department as of December 31, 1977, and the results of its operations during the year which closed on that date.

The waterworks plant, which is recorded on the books at its cost less depreciation to date, had an aggregate book value of \$94,799. These assets consist largely of land and water supply structures and equipment (\$31,678) and distribution mains (\$57,238). Against these assets there were outstanding at the end of the year liabilities amounting to only \$39,630. At present repayment rates, the entire system will be debt-free in about eight years. The Precinct equity in the waterworks on December 31, 1977 was \$55,162.

It should be apparent to everyone that the Precinct water supply system has become a very valuable community asset.

During 1977 the Water Department revenues were \$11,318, which reflected some decrease from the preceding year as a result of the discontinuance in 1977 of the surcharge which had existed in 1975 and 1976. Rising expenses, notably for power but also for repairs and supplies, resulted in a decrease in 1977 net income to \$1,346 as compared with \$1,976 the year before.

SOME REFLECTIONS:

At the time this Report is being written, I have completed my term as Treasurer of the Water Department. It has been my privilege to serve in this office since the Department was created in 1962 when the Precinct took over the local water supply function from the old Hopkinton Village Aqueduct Association of which I had also been Treasurer. In submitting this final Report, there are a number of observations that seem worthwhile recording, as follows:

1. Separation of the Water Department from Other Precinct Functions. The Water Department was created under a very formal clearly defined community agreement that its operations would be kept separate from the other governmental operations of the Precinct, so that the voters of the Precinct at all times could know just what the Water Department was costing them. Many municipal water systems are financed, in whole or in part, through taxes, their funds are commingled with other municipal monies, and their expenses are buried in appropriations which are not clearly restricted to the waterworks function. Under such circumstances it is impossible to know what such a system costs nor, indeed, whether the taxpayers are being called upon to subsidize the water customers or the water customers are being burdened with the costs of other municipal functions. So long as the financial affairs of our Water Department are separately maintained, as they have been to the present time, we can be confident that the Water Department's costs, and no

more than these costs, are fairly assigned to the Department's customers. The Precinct should be scrupulous in the future to maintain this financial separation.

- 2. Level of Water Bills. Inasmuch as ours is a new system built during the inflationary period which followed World War II, and since it is relatively small, it was inevitable that at the outset our water bills would seem relatively high as compared with those of customers of established water systems built when costs were much lower. However, rates elsewhere have gone up much faster than ours, so that our relative situation is much more favorable today than only a short while ago. Thus, our January 1, 1978 increase is only the second since the Department was organized. Meanwhile, we are fortunate to enjoy an abundant supply of good water.
- 3. The Superintendent. From the time the Water Department was created until the spring of 1977, Raymond Proctor served as its superintendent. All of us owe a great debt to him for his skill and dedication in all kinds of weather and at all hours of day or night in responding to emergency situations to keep the water system operating, as well as to Mrs. Proctor for providing a dependable communications center in times of emergency. Mr. Proctor has now been succeeded by Erlon Salsbury as superintendent. I feel sure that Mr. Salsbury will also render excellent service to the Precinct.
- 4. The Future. At the time the waterworks was originally laid out and the initial stages built, a comprehensive engineering plan for a water system to serve the whole Precinct was developed. There are three essential elements of any adequate water system. These are (i) an adequate water source; (ii) mains to reach customers' premises; and (iii) an elevated storage reservoir from which water will continuously be available if pumping is interrupted from the water source, as by reason of a power failure. Perhaps no community our size can hope to provide these all at once, but we should be proud of what we have accomplished to date. It is interesting that representatives of the State Water Supply and Pollution Control Commission have congratulated us for the good planning that has gone into our system so far.

While it would be unrealistic to try to add the storage element to our system now, we must not lose sight of the need for it. As our system presently operates, in the event of an interruption of electric power supply we will normally begin to lose service to customers within a matter of minutes. Every one of us knows that from time to time service interruptions in our power supply are inevitable and, as we look to the future, it is a virtual certainty that at some time down the line we will have, as many other communities already have had, interruptions far more serious and extended than any we have ever had in the past. Such interruptions could occur in the winter or in the summer but whenever they happen, the entire community could be without water for four or five days, or a week. The damage to property and health could be real and substantial. Certainly, it is a contingency which merits careful planning to avoid.

When the new 10" main was laid up Old Putney Hill Road in 1976, this was done to make possible the final connection of the waterworks to an elevated storage reservoir to be installed up that hill. The Precinct should develop a long-range plan to accomplish this as soon as it is financially feasible to do so. Having in mind that all debt of the present system will be paid off in about eight years at present rates; that a storage reservoir would allow the Water Department to take advantage of off-peak power rates which will certainly be in existence in the near future and which will be well below daytime rates; that the Water Department has available a valuable tract of land which could be sold to realize a significant sum to assist in the project; and that in any event the existing hydropneumatic tank will have to be replaced at substantial expense in the not too distant future, it is apparent that within a few years the Department could very wisely commit a substantial amount of money to the elevated storage project without any undue adverse effect upon customers' rates. If we add into the situation the possibility of substantial Federal assistance for such a project, it becomes a very practical possibility in the foreseeable future.

5. Treasurer. The position of Treasurer of the Water Department has been assumed by Ray U. Mills, whose residence is on Old Putney Hill Road, as of January 1, 1978. We are all fortunate to have Mr. Mills available to take over this responsibility, and I know that you will find him cooperative and reliable in every respect.

CONTOOCOOK FIRE PRECINCT

In 1977, several occurrences were and will continue to be of interest as well as of concern to the Precinct.

First, as authorized at last year's meeting, an extended pumping test at the potential well site near the chlorinator building on Bound Tree Road was conducted in late October. The contractor's report indicates that the development of a ground-water source of supply in this area could produce as much as 500, 000 gallons per day—a quantity slightly less than the average daily consumption projected for the year 2000 by Anderson-Nichols and Company in a 1971 report on recommended water system improvements. Analysis of samples taken each day during the pumping test showed water quality to be excellent.

The ground-water exploration program was initiated four years ago following the adoption of a policy by the New Hampshire Water Supply and Pollution Control Commission (WSPCC) requiring eventual complete treatment of all surface water supplies. Because of a recent outbreak of an infectious waterborne disease in Berlin, N. H., (as well as other considerations associated with small surface water systems), the WSPCC has renewed its efforts to implement this policy. Initial WSPCC staff recommendations would place the Precinct in the lowest priority group allowing a period of ten years to provide water filtration facilities or replace the source of supply with wells. Although the WSPCC has made no final decision in this matter, we believe the Precinct should have the information needed to intelligently evaluate these alternatives in order to prepare for whatever future projects may become necessary. Accordingly, funds are included in the proposed 1978 budget for an engineering study to determine comparative costs for developing the groundwater supply versus construction and operation of a filtration plant.

Another area of concern to the Precinct is the planned construction of a new sewer system in Contoocook Village. Throughout the year, we have had discussions with the Town's consultants concerning possible effects of this work on the water system. While some disruption is likely to occur, it will also afford the Precinct an opportunity to replace some lengths of aging and insufficient water main (specifically, Cedar Street and Kearsarge Avenue from the river to the Spring Street intersection) at costs lower than would otherwise be possible. A bond issue for this purpose will be proposed in the 1978 warrant. In addition, information collected during the design phase of the proposed pollution control project may reduce the engineering costs associated with the reconstruction of the Penacook Road water main which was authorized at the 1976 Precinct Meeting.

Other items of interest include:

 A new altitude valve for the storage reservoir was ordered in May. Some components of the valve assembly have been received and it is hoped that the remainder will be delivered soon so that the long awaited replacement of this piece of equipment can be completed.

- 2. The last payment of long term notes issued for the 1958 improvements to the water system has been made, thus leaving the Precinct free of indebtedness.
- 3. Attempts are currently being made to collect approximately \$1,000 in past due water rents. Taking into consideration the reasonableness of the cost for this service in comparison with that charged by neighboring communities, it is astounding that some consumers are reluctant to pay their fair share.

Finally, the Precinct Commissioners must again remind all consumers of the necessity for conserving water and avoiding outside water use during the summer months in order that a sufficient quantity of water is available in the reservoir at all times to maintain adequate fire protection. Your continued support and understanding is appreciated.

REPORT OF THE SCHOOL BOARD - 1977

1977 has been a most eventful year for the Hopkinton School System and perhaps one of the busiest, most difficult yet rewarding for your School Board. Our educational challenges are many and there are no easy solutions. The School Board is optimistic and feels that real progress is being made in many areas.

Early in 1977, Mr. Neil Cross, Superintendent of Schools submitted his resignation effective July 1. At the time he resigned Mr. Cross had completed four years in office. He accomplished a great deal within the Hopkinton School System and the Board wishes him well in his new endeavor as Superintendent of Schools for Supervisory Union No. 74 in Damariscotta, Maine.

By early March the School Board was involved in a comprehensive search for a new Superintendent working with other School Boards of Supervisory Union No. 24. Over 200 inquiries and applications were received from all over the country. A screening committee of citizens in each town interviewed and reduced the applicants to a manageable number so that further interviews by each School Board may be undertaken. Finally, the Supervisory Union School Board and each district within our union offered the Superintendency to Mr. Thomas Watman. Mr. Watman was formerly the Assistant Superintendent of Supervisory Union No. 24 and previously had served for nine years as principal of Henniker High School. Mr. Watman has a reputation as an innovator and is committed to education. He recognizes that some students perform best within a more traditional educational structure while others require different alternatives.

Your School Board then was required to search for an individual to assume the Assistant Superintendent's Position of Supervisory Union No. 24. After an extensive search Mr. Laszlo F. Nagy was offered and accepted this position. Mr. Nagy, a resident of Hopkinton, comes to Supervisory Union No. 24 after many years experience as Assistant Principal and Director of Regional Planning Programs for the Mid-Hudson Valley in New York State. Mr. Nagy has a Masters Degree in Elementary Education as well as a certificate of Advanced Graduate Study in Public Administration. Your Board feels very fortunate to have Mr. Nagy's experience and dedication working on behalf of Hopkinton School System.

As was voted at the last Annual School Meeting the position of Assistant Principal was established for Hopkinton High School. Of the over 100 applicants for the position, your Board elected Miss Carol Santaniello. Miss Santaniello received her BA in Spanish from Barnard College and her MA in Latin American Studies from the Tulane University. She is currently completing her thesis for a Doctorate on Education at Temple University in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania. In addition, four new teachers, a library aide and a new superintendent of buildings and grounds were employed to make up for the full complement of individuals required to fully staff our system.

In the Spring of 1976 Hopkinton High School was evaluated by a team from the New England Association of Schools and Colleges. Hopkinton was voted continued accreditation for a period of five years. The evaluation had many good things to say about the High School but felt that more should be done to strengthen educational opportunity in some categories. Many of their suggestions have been implemented, some will be, and others, the Board felt did not have merit. Copies of the complete report are available in the schools and libraries.

Teacher negotiations were carried on through the Winter and Spring culminating in a new three year contract which takes effect on July 1, 1978. The teachers' salaries scale for 1978-79 will be adjusted by seven per cent; for 1979-80 by six and a half percent and for 1980-81 by six per cent. The School Board feels that the contract is a good one and will help recruit and retain first rate teaching personnel for the school system. Teachers have become more involved in school issues and the Board supports their continued interest.

As mentioned in Mr. Merrill's report the enrollment of the Hopkinton Elementary Schools have reached a point where beginning September 1, 1978 even the resource room at the Harold Martin School must be used as a regular classroom. Due to increased enrollment and program growth in the HIgh School every classroom and the cafeteria are in use six of the seven periods per day. During the seventh period all but two classrooms are in use.

Due to these facts your Board is requesting permission in a warrant acticle to establish a study committee of not less than five nor more than nine members to study space allocation and potential building needs. Any citizen willing to serve on this committee should contact a member of the School Board.

Your Board has currently undertaken a Planning and Assessment Accountability Project. This project will include discussion with community, parents, professional staff and students. Our overall purpose is to further define the goals of the school system, identify programs to implement these goals and define an evaluation system which will provide information to the community and the schools regarding the achievement of these goals.

The Board wishes to take this opportunity to thank the citizens of the town, the administration, the professional staff and the students for their co-operation during the past year.

SUPERINTENDENT'S ANNUAL MESSAGE

to the Citizens of the Hopkinton School District

This year the Superintendent and the Board established goals for both the Superintendent's office and the board to accomplish over the school year. The Superintendent's office has already taken steps to adjust its administrative procedures and capabilities to best facilitate the accomplishment of these goals and is planning to report its record of successes and failures in next year's message. It is expected that goal-setting will be a regular part of the Superintendent's annual plan in the years to come as will an annual report on the goals set.

This year's goals are as follows:

SUPERINTENDENT'S OFFICE

I. TOP PRIORITY GOALS

- 1. To ensure that all district's administrative priority goals are worked toward in a consistent and effective manner.
- 2. To ensure that a system of Principal evaluation is developed and implemented.
- 3. To develop an operational administrative manual and to see that its provisions are carried out.
- 4. To develop and implement an effective needs assessment for each district and the Union.
- 5. To develop and implement standardized budgetary procedures and to present each Board with a Superintendent budget proposal.
- 6. To ensure that each Board and all administrators receive complete up-todate and accurate financial reconciliations.
- 7. To investigate and report to the Boards on the feasibility of programmed budgeting procedures.
- 8. To provide each Board with complete agendas, including necessary supportative information.
- 9. To develop job descriptions for all SU No. 24 Office staff and to work toward the development of written procedures for all major staff tasks.
- 10. To ensure that a useable and complete filing system is developed in the SU No. 24 Office.
- 11. To promote a SU No. 24 effort at adult education and greater Community-School involvement.
- 12. To ensure that an increased effort is made at effective Public Relations.
- 13. To encourage cooperative projects between districts and cooperative communications.

HOPKINTON ELEMENTARY SCHOOLS

I. TOP PRIORITY GOALS:

1. The Principal will direct a study of the system of reporting to parents

- (report cards) that will result in standard reporting formats for Grade K-Grades 1-3 and for Grades 4-6. This study will result in decisions on forms to be used, time periods for reporting, role of parent conferences, etc.
- 2. The Principal shall increase the quantity of classroom visitation reports and shall provide differentiated appraisals that clearly identify both outstanding and inadequate teaching performance. Shall provide that inadequate teaching performance is followed up with sufficient assistance and direction to best insure improvement of performance. Shall introduce teachers whose performance needs improvement into specific staff development plans directed at improving their deficiencies. Shall refer those teachers whose performance is unacceptable to the attention of the Assistant Superintendent and Superintendent of Schools. Shall document, in writing, all steps of the above process.
- 3. The Principal shall work with teachers to determine the best method(s) of reporting the results of the Iowa tests of Basic Skills to students, staff, parents and Board; and of using the results to improve both the school's programs and teacher use of results to meet individual student needs.

IL SECONDARY GOALS:

- 1. The Principal shall actively promote, organize and provide activities and processes that increase the quantity and improve the quality of citizen/parent participation in the school; provide greater information about the school to the community, encourage where feasible, participation in community activities by staff members, and promote increased use of school resources by the community.
- 2. The Principal will direct teachers in establishing written goals (K-6) in each of the following curricula areas; language arts, mathematics, science and social studies.
- 3. The Principal will initiate a study of guidance needs in the Elementary schools and will report conclusions and recommendations to the Board.

HOPKINTON HIGH SCHOOL

I TOP PRIORITY GOALS:

- 1. The Principal is to see that each teacher is observed at least five times by the Department head, Assistant Principal and/or Principal. Shall provide that inadequate teaching performance is followed up with sufficient assistance and direction to best insure improvement of performance. Shall introduce teachers whose performance needs improvement into specific staff development plans directed at improving their deficiencies. Shall refer those teachers whose performance is unacceptable to the attention of the Assistant Superintendent and Superintendent of Schools. Shall document, in writing, all steps of the above process.
- 2. The Principal will see that the English Program in Grades 7-10 is revised

to include 3 to 5 week units of work in literature, writing, grammar and speaking. Each of these units to emphasize the basic skills of Communication.

3. The Principal will oversee the holding of periodic meetings of Teachers of students with special needs (i.e. EMR, discipline problems, etc.) for the purpose of providing a more organized comprehensive and coordinated program of studies for these students.

II. SECONDARY GOALS:

- 1. The Principal will initiate a study of possible programs for terminal students, in the area of mathematics and will report conclusions and recommendations to the Board.
- 2. The Principal shall actively promote, organize and provide activities and processes that increase the quantity and improve the quality of citizen/parent participation in the school; provide greater information about the school to the community, encourage where feasible, participation in community activities by staff members, and promote increased use of school resources by the community.
- 3. The Principal will organize a series of coordinated workshops for the purposes, of improving communication skills of administrators, department heads and teachers and to realize the goal of improved open communication.
- 4. The Principal shall develop a proposal for a standardized testing program, in each subject area, which will indicate the program's effectiveness. The proposal to include (1) definition of the process to be used to translate test results into affirmative actions aimed at improving each program and (2) reporting to the School Board and the public on the relative accomplishments.

The Superintendent's Office is currently making a major effort to get the community more involved and interested in school affairs. Two major aspects of this effort are a greater degree of reporting of school activities in local newspapers and the establishment of a Community Education Program. Procurement of CETA funds by the Superintendent's office has helped greatly in regard of both of these. Another part of this effort is a Needs Assessment Program, which is providing every citizen an opportunity to voice his or her opinion on what Hopkinton needs in regard to educational programs and facilities.

One thing the Superintendent would like every citizen to be aware of is the increasing need for more educational space. Hopkinton is growing and with it its population of school-age children. People should expect, therefore, that, in the not-to-distant future, they may be asked to consider alternative means of providing more educational space.

HOPKINTON ELEMENTARY SCHOOLS

Hopkinton Elementary Schools commenced the 1977-78 academic year with an enrollment of 461 pupils, an enrollment which does not yet reflect the anticipated growth of our pupil community. Pupil breakdown by grades and homeroom classes as of September 6, 1977, were as follows:

Kindergarten	50

Since September, the enrollment at the Harold Martin School has made it imperative that I request an additional staff teacher and an instructional aide for the 1978-79 school year. This will reduce the pupil/teacher ratio from the present 29 or 30 to 25 pupils per teacher — not ideal for primary grades perhaps, but certainly reasonable. These staff additions will make it possible for us to continue to provide excellent instruction to our primary aged pupils.

Our present elementary schools enrollment stands at 480 pupils, grades K-6. The stresses placed upon these children through problems of a twentieth century society are immense. Many children in our elementary system are not successfully coping with these stresses and need individual and/or group services from a trained and highly skilled counselor. While the Learning Abilities Specialist, the school nurse, classroom teachers — all of us — do much counseling, not one of us has the time nor the training to properly assist children through the maze of accumulated problems and decisions.

The conclusions drawn from a Hopkinton School Board authorized study of the District Guidance Program, grades K-12, supported a full time guidance counselor at the elementary school level for school year 1978-79. The Hopkinton School Board accepted the report and have given support to the concept. However, due to increasing costs of schools' operation, the Board could not include this position in its operating budget for the next school year.

While I support the Board's decision, I feel that the District needs to establish this service to Hopkinton children and should make recommendations for alternate funding to do so.

Maple Street School has never enjoyed the advantages of a public address system. In fact, year after year, I have resisted the imposition of such a system upon the children and teachers of our school. The ever increasing burden of work mandates increased efficiency or additional office personnel. We believe that a power sound system would serve many of the same purposes as a public

address system at far less cost. Secretarial hours presently wasted carrying messages up and down the corridor can be more judiciously spent in the office. Monies to purchase this system have been placed in the operational budget.

I extend thanks to an elementary staff committed to providing excellent education to Hopkinton children while making a concerted effort to hold down instructional costs. The minimal increase (\$600.00) in teacher requests over the present operating budget are testimony to their endeavors.

HOPKINTON HIGH SCHOOL PRINCIPAL'S REPORT 1977-78

Hopkinton Hlgh School opened in September, 1977 with additional students, some new staff and some new programs.

The incoming seventh grade is twelve students larger than the 1977 graduating class. The eighth grade is the largest in Hopkinton's history with ninety-five students. These additional numbers along with new students in other grades are filling the school to near capacity.

With these new students are the following new staff members: Ms. Carol Santaniello, Assistant Principal; Mr. James Scavone, Math Teacher and Department Head; Mr. Andy Dusseault, Social Studies Teacher; Ms. Cathy McGhee, Science Teacher; and Ms. Sandra Starkey, Library Aide.

Some of the educational programs have been revised or are in the process of revision. The revisions already completed are: the high school physical education program has been changed to emphasize lifetime sports; the Junior High Home Economics and Industrial Arts program has been changed to include both boys and girls. We have added programs in Personal Typing, Business English; Business Math and Environmental Science. Curriculum revisions in progress are in the areas of English and Mathematics and these are expected to be implemented during the 1978-79 school year.

The school has also been the setting for many activities both school and community oriented. Among these have been a financial aide workshop, careers night, community badminton and basketball, various dances and other special programs.

As we look ahead to the 1978-79 school year special education needs are a particularly large concern as federal and state legislation mandates that all students with special needs be provided appropriate programs to meet these needs. Another concern is space and what alternatives we have as the student population continues to grow.

REPORT OF ANNUAL SCHOOL MEETING HOPKINTON SCHOOL DISTRICT

March 9, 1977

The Meeting of the Town of Hopkinton School District was called to order at 8:25 A. M., March 8, 1977, by the Moderator, William H. Milne, at the Town Hall. An attested copy of the Warrant relating to the election of school district officers was read by the Moderator.

Upon completion of consideration of matters relating to the election of school district officers, the Meeting was recessed to reconvene at 7:00 P.M., March 9, 1977, at the Hopkinton High School Gymnasium to act upon Articles I through VI of the School Warrant.

At the above-appointed time and place, the Meeting was reopened by Moderator Milne.

The Moderator recognized Mr. Pertice Gaskill who moved, seconded by Mr. Leslie Townes, that any one person be limited to ten minutes discussion on each article considered by the Meeting.

The Motion, by a voice vote, was unanimously adopted.

The Moderator read the Warrant.

ARTICLE I

The Moderator recognized Dr. David Berliner who offered the following Motion, seconded by Mr. Townes:

I move to accept the Reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees and Officers Chosen and to record same.

The Motion was adopted by the Meeting.

ARTICLE II

The Moderator recognized Mr. Jack Porter who offered the following motion, seconded by Mr. Mark Wright:

I move that the District authorize the School Board to make application for, accept on behalf of the District, and expend any and all grants or other funds for educational purposes which may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the United States Government or from the State of New Hampshire for the school year 1977-78.

After a brief discussion, highlighted by Robert York, the Motion was adopted by the Meeting.

ARTICLE III

The Moderator recognized Mr. Wayne Woodard who offered the following Motion, seconded by Mrs. Lucille Gaskill:

I move that the School District vote to authorize the School Board, on the District's behalf, to enter into and bind the District to any requisite agreements with the District of Concord and the State Board of Education, so

that the District will be able to participate in the Regional Vocational Educational Center Program conducted in the Concord School District serving Region 11. This authorization shall be limited to the school year 1977-78.

Discussion ensued with Mr. Richard Brunel explaining the effect and desirability of the Motion.

The Motion was adopted by the Meeting.

ARTICLE IV

The Moderator recognized Mr. Charles George who offered the following Motion, seconded by Mr. Edward Leadbeater:

I move that the District raise and appropriate the sum of One Million Four Hundred Forty-Two Thousand One Hundred Ninety-Nine Dollars (\$1,442, 199.00) for the support of schools, for the payment of salaries for school district officers and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the District.

School Board members Philip Bell and George Langwasser spoke in favor of the motion, with Messrs. Dorn, Gourley, Wright and York and the Mrs. Hedden and Caouette further explaining or discussing the Motion.

The Moderator then recognized Mr. Donald P. Jones, Sr. who offered the following Motion, seconded by Mrs. Carolyn Jones:

I move that Article IV of the Hopkinton School District Warrant be amended as follows:

"By striking out the sum of \$1,442,199.00 and inserting therefore the sum of \$1,368,555.00."

Mr. Jones requested, with sufficient seconding signatures, a secret ballot on his Motion.

Mr. Jones was recognized and spoke in favor of his motion. A lively and even spirited discussion ensued, whereupon the question was moved, seconded and, upon vote of the Meeting, carried.

A secret ballot was taken on the proposed amendment. The amendment failed by a vote of 212 NO $-\,70$ YES.

The Meeting then proceeded to consideration of Article IV as previously moved by Mr. George and by a unanimous voice vote approved an appropriation of One Million Four Hundred Forty-Two Thousand One Hundred Ninety-Nine Dollars (\$1,442,199.00) for the purpose indicated above.

ARTICLE V

Next, a Motion was duly made and seconded that the District raise and appro-

priate the sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000.00) as a Contingency Fund to meet unforeseen expenses and emergencies for the 1977-1978 school year. The Motion was unanimously adopted by the Meeting.

Moderator Milne announced to the Meeting the results of the 1977 Election of School District Officers. Including 3 absentee ballots, a total of 1043 votes were cast.

Reasons for Change: 1. Reflect an increase of \$200.00 in the treasurer's salary and a reduction of \$150.00 in auditors' salaries. 2. Increase is due to \$102.00 census services and \$1,000.00 for independent auditors. 3. Other expenses show a net increase of \$125.00 for district officers expenses and supplies, association dues and a reduction in advertising costs.

Reasons for Change: 1. The increase in salaries reflects the terms of negotiations showing a 7% salary schedule input plus the addition of one new staff position (additional Second Grade Teacher Harold Martin School) and increases for principals, secretaries and aids. 2. The textbook account represents a maintenance budget with emphasis on the existing program. It will provide additional and/or new texts in English, Foreign Language, Home Economics, Industrial Arts and the Health Program. 3. The Library and Audio Visual requests are for needed bookcases and card files for the Elementary Schools and to provide the necessary resources and materials for research papers in the High School. These additions will help to bring the system up to standards of the New England Associations of Schools and Colleges. 4. The Teaching Supplies reflect an increase in costs for services of a computer company to assist in scheduling and grade reporting. General Supplies and the Language Arts Program make up the greatest section of this account. Most other increases reflect only price increases for materials. 5. The Contracted Services account increase is due entirely to the driver education program. This reflects a \$2,500.00 increase to \$6,000.00 from \$3,500.00. This increase is completely offset by increase in revenue of \$2,500.00. (See revenue section of report). All other accounts in this category show reduction in requests. 6. Other expenses represent an increase in the Life Insurance Program for employees of the district and professional dues for the school administrators. The inservice education account and travel account also show normal increases.

A maintenance agreement for the heating control is a new account item. 4. Heat. This represents a rise in electrical heat at Maple Street School. 5. Utilities. This represents an increase in the basic electric rate. 6. Other expenses is determined to be travel for custodians.

Contracted Services is decreased due to shift in some of these services to salaried employees, 4. Repairs to Buildings shows a large increase due to the inclusion of a \$15,000.00 roof repair job required at Harold Martin School, replacement of flooring (rugs) in three large rooms at the high school for \$4,852.00 and \$5,000.00 for new windows in the High School Office and Music Rooms. The other accounts in this category reflect a decrease in the current budget. 5. Other Expenses. Additional parking space lighting at Maple Street is included in this account as well as repair to fence on entrance route to Harold Martin School.
