*To the Inhabitants of the Town of Jefferson in the County of Coos in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:*

You are hereby notified to meet at Jefferson Town Hall in said Jefferson on Tuesday, the 12th day of March, next at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing by nonpartisan ballot.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
3. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$359.56 and receive the sum of \$2,397.07 from the State for Town Road Aid.
4. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$258.36 for the White Mountains Regional Association.
5. To see if the Town will vote to raise a sum of money up to \$500.00 for a donation to the Beatrice D. Weeks Memorial Hospital. (Requested by the Trustees of Beatrice D. Weeks Memorial Hospital.)
6. To see if the Town will vote to change the time of Town Meeting from 10 a.m. to 7:30 p.m. (On petition of fifteen voters.)
7. To see if the Town will vote to raise a sum of money not to exceed \$600.00 for Mental Health Clinic serving this area. (Requested by White Mountain Community Services.)
8. To see if the Town will vote to have a complete reappraisal of all the property in Jefferson to be made by the State Tax Commission.
9. To see if the Town will vote to allow the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired through Tax Collector's deeds.

10. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

11. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

# Report of Police Patrol

January 18, 1968

To: Board of Supervisors, Town of Jefferson, N. H.

From: Lt. Curtis L. Bader, Ret.

Subj: Report of Police Patrol for 1967.

1. In the course of police patrol of the Town of Jefferson from July 2, 1967 to September 4, 1967, inclusive, and additional holiday and foliage patrol on September 12th and 30th; and October 1st, 7th, 8th, 12th and 14th—the following statistics were logged and observations noted.

Patrol of the outer areas was continued, as in the past, but a marked lack of 'Trespass parking' and other types of parking was noted. Very few 'out-of-the-area' cars were seen to be checked out. Routes 115, 116, the North Road, Ingerson, Phelps, and other side roads were again patrolled about once every four days. Traffic, in general, was increased and the volume of incidents requiring investigation increased; thus the patrol time total became divided into about 35% foot patrol of the Village area, Waumbec area; Santa's Village and Six Gun Village areas. The remainder was motor patrol of these same areas and all parts of the Town accessible of car.

Four Church Crossings were covered Sundays; three in a.m.—St. Agnes (Catholic), St. John's (Methodist) and Holy Trinity Chapel (Episcopal). On some Sundays in pm., the Highland Chapel Services were covered. A total of 844 cars were handled at these crossings. An additional 294 cars were handled for traffic at 6 public gatherings which included two community suppers, a parade, an Art exhibit, a Wedding and other functions.

In 1965, the Statewide Library Development program went into effect. The Trustees and the Librarian feel that this program has helped our library tremendously, and we hope that we may continue in it. This may mean slightly rising costs to meet the qualifications adopted by the State Library Commission.

By 1972, all libraries in towns with over 500 population should be open 12 hours weekly. A closed library is no use to anyone, and statistics show that the more hours a library is open, the more it will be used. This has proved true in our experiment in keeping open Wednesday nights, which we started in 1966. Our circulation figures are as follows: 1965—1,783; 1966—2,964; 1967—3,193.

In meeting the requirements of the Commission, we are also required to maintain a book budget of \$248.50, which is little enough if we are to keep abreast of the times, and replace worn-out books.

The State Legislature voted approval of the Statewide program, which stated that the State should match these funds, but as yet, they have never raised the money to do so. However, each year we have received \$100.00 for reference books.

The Trustees and the Librarian hope that we may continue in this program, in which almost all the libraries in New Hampshire have joined.

A new State law makes it compulsory that meetings of the trustees be open to the public. These meetings will be announced in the Democrat, and we hope that anyone interested will attend.

The Friends of the Library group was reorganized this year with Mary Guest and Caroline Conway as co-Chairmen, and Kaye Noyes as Secretary-Treasurer. A special meeting was held with Mr. Ralph Riley, District Consultant, as speaker. The Friends held a combination book and food sale on the same day that the children's reading group had their party; it was a busy day. It is expected that the Friends will be active again this spring and summer. Anyone interested is invited to join.

*To the Citizens of the Town of Jefferson:*

During the year 1967, 247 visits were made in the community, and they are classified as follows:

Administration and Promotion	13	Health Supervision	192

Four children have attended the Crippled Children's Clinics in Berlin, and four children have attended the Pediatric-Cardiology Clinics in Lancaster. Heart testing was done on 68 individuals in the school, and 77 Immunizations were administered to school and pre-school children.

Health services become a matter for community concern when an individual cannot cope without them, and yet they are beyond his reach. Health care services are primarily directed toward keeping individuals functional as long as possible. To achieve this, the goal for each community must be: "The right service, for the right patient, in the right place, at the right time, and at the right cost." Hence, the community must move into action when the services and facilities for its citizens are inadequate or unavailable.

The way to get started is—to START. Four initial steps will be useful:

1. Assess your needs and resources.
2. Seek the support of, and involve local professional persons, particularly the physicians in your planning.
3. Develop a tentative plan for action which is the right size for your community—one which provides short and long-term goals and priorities.
4. Put plan into action, involving local citizens.

I urge you, as a community, to move into action, so that all of your citizens will have within their reach, facilities to enable them to recapture, retain or improve degrees of usefulness—to themselves, to their family and to their community.

I extend my gratitude to the Citizens of Jefferson for their cooperation during the past year.

## Report of Starr King Grange

*To the People of Jefferson:*

A report from Starr King Grange on the Christmas Packages for Servicemen shows that nine men from this town were serving in foreign fields at Christmas time.

Collection boxes were set up at the three stores in town: Rines Market, The Old Corner Store and Raymond Ingerson's Store. Collections were very gratifying and two boxes for each boy (a total of 18 packages) were packed by members of the Grange and shipped out. The total weight was nearly 90 pounds (the packages were sent SAM mail and had to be kept under five pounds, thus the reason for sending two to each person).

The Grange wishes to express appreciation to the Selectmen for assisting with cost of postage and insurance for the packages. The PTA also donated money for the project, total cost of which was \$25.90.

It might be interesting to note here that the Town of Jefferson has 21 young men and one young woman in the Service, serving in Vietnam, Thailand, South America, Germany, on shipboard in the Pacific, as well as in the United States.

With a population of 665, the Town of Jefferson is represented by about 3% of its population in the Armed Forces.

This past summer we originated and sponsored an information booth at Ayer's Cliff, Quebec, to sell people leaving Expo '67 to the White Mountains region and New Hampshire.

We have prepared a 100-page application for a federal grant for research of snow erosion problems at ski areas.

Introduced for the first time whitewater racing to the region in our Androscoggin Weekend which was held in September and continued to boom the fall foliage promotion.

Supported the 4-H programs with awards; studied and promoted various east-west highway routes in the north country; researched and supported the need for bus connection from Littleton to Colebrook; received and answered 9,000 inquiries from outsiders who wanted to spend their money in the White Mountains region.

The development of recreation has and will continue to be a major factor in the economy of our towns. In addition to being an active industry by itself, it encourages the location of industry in our region.

We hope your town will support the White Mountains Region's appropriation request for 1968 which is \$258.36. This amount is derived from a standard formula for all towns of seven cents per thousand dollars of the towns' equalized valuation which for 1966 is \$3,690,920. These activities which we are engaged in are limited to the amount of money we are able to raise.
