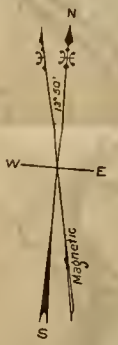

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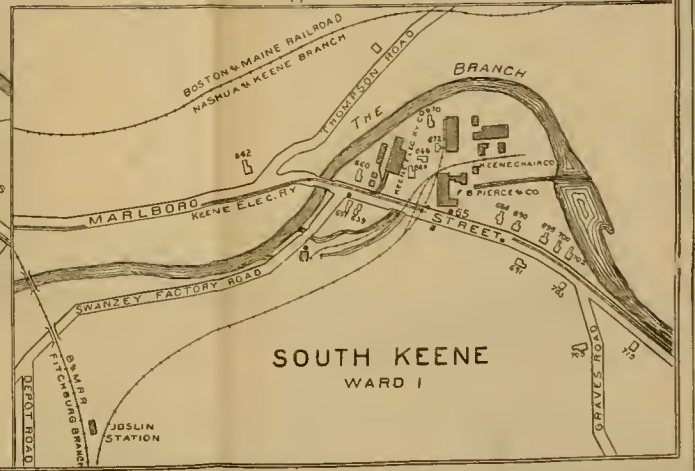
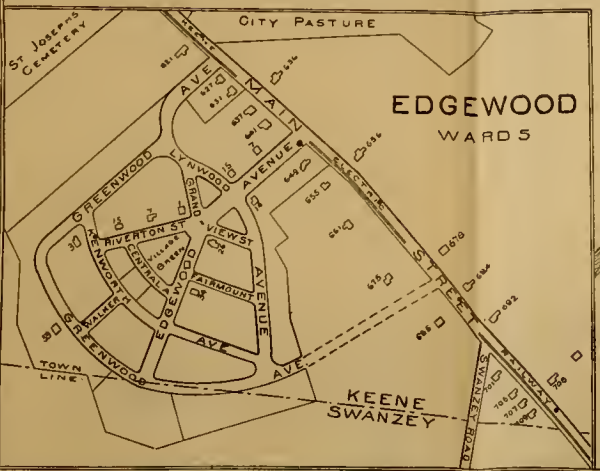
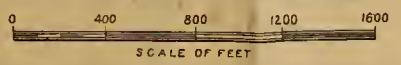

# CITY GOVERNMENT



## ORGANIZATION OF CITY GOVERNMENT

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Tuesday, January 4, 1927.

The members of the city government for the municipal year of 1927, having met for organization, agreeably to the provisions of the city charter, the convention was called to order by His Honor Mayor Jones at ten o'clock in the forenoon.

Hon. Philip H. Faulkner made the announcement that, Arthur R. Jones having been officially notified of his election to the office of mayor for the current municipal term, was present for the purpose of taking the oath of office. The oath of office was administered by Hon. Philip H. Faulkner, who introduced the Mayor to the aldermen and councilmen elect and to the citizens present.

After roll-call by the clerk, Mayor Jones administered the oath of office to the following named members of the board of aldermen and councilmen, to-wit:

And now, we thank Thee for the privileges of our citizenship here. Help us to make good use of our franchise at all times. Grant that we may be law abiding men and women, and that we may give our support to those in office.

Now bless those who this hour are to take the oath of office. Be with them as they feel the burden of their offices; offices to which the people have elected them because of the trust they put in them. Grant unto them wisdom, patience, and courage. Grant them health that they may bring strength to their trusts. And may they be led to regard duty above ambition; integrity above office; and the good of all above personal advancement. May they be able to discern between good and evil, right and wrong, the true and the false, to the end that our city may be exalted in righteousness; and that the spirit of truth, liberty, and sacrifice may abound.

And now unto thee be given glory and honor forever.

Amen.

After the prayer Mayor Jones delivered his inaugural address. Frank H. Whitcomb was elected city clerk and Charles S. Wright city messenger, and the councils then adjourned until 7.30 o'clock.

At 7.30 o'clock in the evening the common council organized by the choice of Charles R. Rodgers as president and Harry E. Gale as clerk.

## THE MAYOR'S ADDRESS

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Members of the City Councils and Fellow Citizens :

We are now to begin another year of the administration of our City Government.

It is not an easy task to do our whole duty. Each one of us engaged in his own business which constantly demands his attention, and finds it difficult and at times a sacrifice to give to the affairs the time and thought required ; yet I want to commend you and all the departments of the city for the diligence displayed in the discharge of official duties and the manifest readiness with which these duties have been assumed.

I want to call your attention to the up-to-date, efficient manner in which the city records are kept and business transacted.

The method of the election of the City Treasurer is an excellent one, that is, by alternating with the election of the treasurer of the various banks. These men are rendering a service which is invaluable to their city.

### FINANCE

During the past year the city has enjoyed a good, healthy growth : One hundred building permits for new homes were issued and in addition to this there has been a good number of smaller buildings erected for various purposes. We have had several substantial additions to our manufacturing plants.

This additional growth will increase the city valuation about one-half million dollars. With this new development, it does not seem as though it would be necessary for us to increase taxes for the coming year. We should be able to decrease either the valuations or the rate of taxes. However, we



should not decrease to such a point that we would be unable to continue making permanent improvements such as have been made in the past. We should continue to develop highways and lay water and sewer mains in the newly developed sections of the city.

Owing to the fire at the Fire Station, it was necessary to increase the city's bonded indebtedness by a bond issue of \$25,000. With our small bonded indebtedness, we are in a very excellent financial condition and should remain so.

If we are careful with our expenditures, we should be able to improve our city each year, and in the very near future continue building a certain amount of cement highway without increasing our taxes. It should not be necessary to issue bonds for this purpose.

I am convinced that with the amount of money the finance committee recommend raising, we can have our city compare very favorably with any city in the state, and make as fast progress as the tax payer desires.

During the past year we have increased our assets over liabilities about 15%. I urge you to continue this policy and if future city governments will continue this policy, it would be but a short time before we would not have to borrow money in anticipation of taxes and thereby save a large interest charge.

#### BUILDING INSPECTOR AND BUILDING CODE

There is manifest need of some re-adjustments in the ordinance relating to the duties of the building inspector and I think, some additional restriction.

His powers should be subject in cases of importance to the action of the City Councils. We cannot afford to take the necessary risk of fire and accident in having improper permits issued. The City Councils will not be free from just criticism when such permits are given and allowed to stand.

The ordinances relative to Fire Districts and Regulations

of Buildings should be taken up at once and carefully considered and such changes made as are found to be necessary in order to decrease the fire hazard and other dangers and so increase the protection to property and human life.

The ordinance should require among other things, that the building inspector should make three copies of his permit; one for the applicant, keeping one himself and leave one with the City Clerk for filing. The assessors need the information which these copies in the City Clerk's office would furnish in ascertaining what new buildings or substantial additions constructed are subject to appraisal each year for the purpose of taxation.

#### HEALTH DEPARTMENT

The health of the entire population of the city during the past year has been good. The people are learning from year to year how to improve sanitary conditions and prevent disease. This is a field in which your moral support, as well as that of all our people can be of great help and I urge your interest.

There is a public demand for garbage disposal, and a public comfort station. I urge you to give these serious thought.

#### POLICE DEPARTMENT

This department particularly should have the whole-hearted cooperation and support of every citizen in its effort to eliminate prevalent forms of crime among us.

We as citizens of Keene, have a greater responsibility than most cities as we have a State Normal School located here with more than five hundred young girls attending.

I especially urge, as a duty of every citizen of Keene, to assist in every reasonable way, our Police Department in their efforts to detect and punish the criminal and thereby make Keene freer from crime than any other city in the state.

#### ZONING

With the passing of the zoning ordinance, we have reached what might be called the third important step towards making

our city the most attractive city in New England. The outstanding periods in the development of our city were when your forefathers with the vision of a beautiful city in 1736 widened Main Street to eight rods wide and planned our principal streets, there laying the foundation for what we have today. Then about 100 years ago the people set out elm trees that have grown to help in making this city the distinctive city that it is.

The people of Keene, like those of most other cities, have not had the vision of the early settlers when laying out new streets, just letting them become a network of streets, very narrow and often leading nowhere in particular.

With zoning and city planning, we have an opportunity to guide the future growth of the city, carrying out the ideals of the early settlers, making Keene a most ideal city.

As a city government, we should see that a reasonable number of young elm trees are planted each year in the newer parts of the city. But better still, the various civic organizations in the city could plant elm trees in the undeveloped districts and thereby pass on to their grandchildren a memorial that they always will be proud of, such a memorial as your forefathers gave you.

### STREET DEPARTMENT

This department requires more thought and study than any other department in the city, as we expend about 60% of our income on the highways in one way or another.

We should continue the policy of the past year, that of improving the cross roads and side streets, particularly in the part of the city where there are so many new houses being built. I find that we have not been keeping pace with the growth of the city, having neglected to provide suitable walks and roads in these sections. We should adopt a policy of building highways and sidewalks as fast as these new sections of the city develop so as to encourage people to build and own their homes.

The services of an Engineer will be required in this department for the coming year as about 75% of the streets need surveying, bounds and grades established, so that the people in building will be able to grade their lawns and put walks at a grade that will be permanent. In the past we have neglected to do this and certain parts of our city have not developed as fast as they should. About 40% of the streets do not have established grades.

We have done considerable work the past year in the way of building new sidewalks and laying cement walks, having laid 3-4 mile of cement walks and used 50 carloads of trap rock dust for re-surfacing walks on more than 40 streets. There are five miles of walks needed on twenty different streets that do not have any walks at present. Also about six miles on thirty streets of present walks need a trap rock dust topping. We should plan to provide a portion of these this year. The finance committee have recommended a liberal sum for this purpose.

The Black Asphalt walks should be repaired by filling the depressions and re-surfacing.

I would not favor the construction of any further cement construction of highways until after we have improved the walks and side streets and cross roads.

The all the year use of the automobile, demands that we plow the snow from most of our highways.

We should continue with the oiling of our streets and extend this until we are oiling all of them.

#### FIRE DEPARTMENT

On March 14, 1926, we had the misfortune to have a fire at the Fire Station which damaged the building to such an extent that it was necessary to remodel the entire building. This has been done and a fireproof building is the result. It was possible, by utilizing waste space to make room for enough more pieces of apparatus to protect a city about double our population.

With this new station, our modern equipment and the very efficient force under the able direction of the Chief and his assistants, we have a Fire Department that we can be justifiably proud of as their record as fire fighters will bear out.

### WATER WORKS, DRAINS AND SEWER

This is one of the most important departments in the city as it has so much to do with the health and comfort of the entire population.

Our water system is one of the best. It should not be necessary to expend any large sums of money on improvements. The only development requiring a large amount of money will be laying water and sewer mains to Arlington in West Keene. I would recommend that this development extend over two or three years; then it can be paid from the income of this department and an issue of bonds thus be avoided. We should supply this section with water this year. This will take care of the sanitary condition. Then as soon as there are enough substantial houses built to warrant we should put in sewer mains.

During the past year this department laid 8,894 ft. of surface drains, mostly in sections of the city which have recently been built up. They also laid 7,904 ft. of sewer mains, a good part of this in sections of the city that have been neglected in the past. Sewers were laid in George and Sullivan Streets and 41 houses have been connected. The residents of these sections have been trying for the past 20 years to get sewers. This is a condition which the City Government should not allow to exist as it is in these congested and unsanitary parts of the city that epidemics start.

We should adopt a policy of extending water and sewer mains to sections of the city that are developing, that is, as soon as we are assured there will be building enough to warrant the expenditure.

## COMMITTEES

Looking to the future development and advancement of our city, I will recommend that committees be appointed to investigate and report at a joint meeting of the City Government on the advisability of adopting any or all of the following:

Revision of Building Ordinance  
Garbage Collection  
Comfort Station  
Remodeling City Hall  
License and Fees for Busses  
Aviation Field  
Lot for New Cemetery

## CONCLUSION

When we were elected to our various offices by the people of Keene, we were selected to look after their interests as a whole. In order to live up to our oath of office, our just duty is to serve all the people of the city; see that their money is spent in a way that they as a whole will derive the most benefit, forgetting our personal viewpoint, ever bearing in mind that we are servants of the people.

Our greatest satisfaction will not arise from any personal relation to the City Government, but in the consciousness that we have tried to serve all the inhabitants of our city with fidelity. Having done this, we can be measureably at peace with ourselves, and we trust with them.

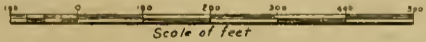

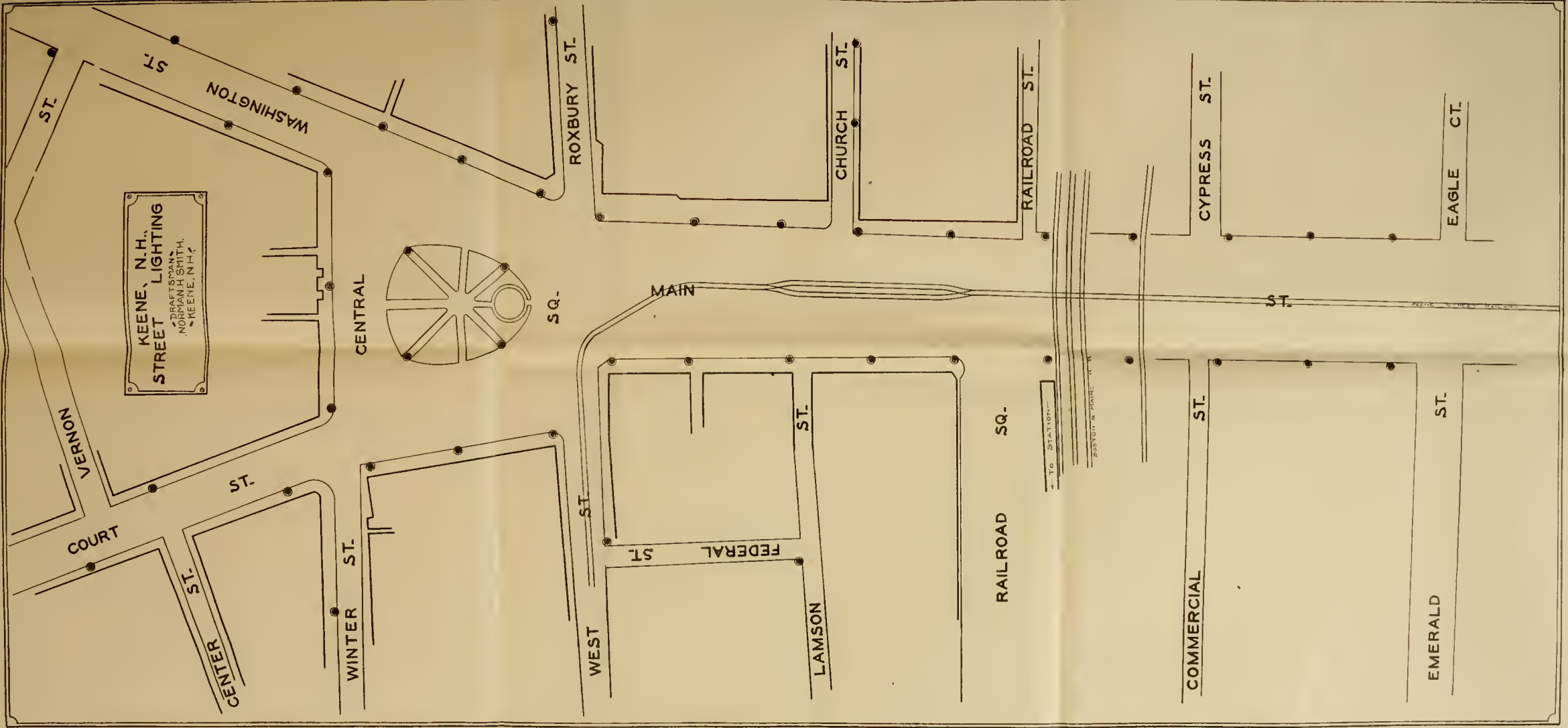

Sec. 1. The collection of garbage shall be under the direction of the Board of Health.

SEC. 2. EVERY HOUSE-HOLDER SERVED SHALL PROVIDE A METAL WATER-TIGHT COVERED CONTAINER FOR THE RECEPTION OF GARBAGE. This container shall be KEPT COVERED AT ALL TIMES EXCEPT WHEN GARBAGE IS BEING DEPOSITED OR REMOVED. It shall be kept on the ground floor and be convenient of access.

Sec. 3. No person shall deposit in the garbage to be removed by the authorized collector any tin cans, water, ashes, glass, sweepings, oyster or clam shells, sawdust, dead animals, lawn clippings, rags or any medicinal or poisonous substances. Any garbage containing foreign matter as mentioned above must be cared for at the owner's expense.

Sec. 4. No person shall go about, in or through the streets of the city collecting or removing swill, offal, butcher's waste, soap grease, or slaughter house refuse unless duly authorized by the Board of Health.

Sec. 5. All such refuse collected and carried through the streets, squares or highways shall be put and carried in a close covered vehicle, box, or other tight container from which no odors can escape and which shall at all times, when not necessarily open for the purpose of depositing the material collected therein, be kept securely covered. If any of the contents is spilled or falls upon the street, walk or premises it shall be the duty of the collector to remove the same immediately as also all traces thereof.

Sec. 6. Whoever violates any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be fined not more than twenty dollars.

Sec. 7. This ordinance shall take effect upon its passage.

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AN ORDINANCE amending Chapter 3, City Ordinances.

Be it ordained by the City Councils of the City of Keene, as follows:

Amend Chapter 3 of the City Ordinances of Keene as revised and passed November 20, 1924, by striking out all of Section 9 of said Chapter 3 and inserting in place thereof the following:

Sect. 9. The management of the incinerating plant for destruction of rubbish, garbage and other waste, shall be under the direction of the superintendant of highways.

All material brought to the incinerating plant for disposal shall be classified as follows:

A—Dead animals weighing 200 pounds, or less.

B—Ashes and like material.

C—Rubbish and garbage.

Dead animals, weighing 200 pounds, or less, can be easily cared for and will be accepted for destruction.

Ashes and like material that would smother the fire shall be kept separate from rubbish and garbage.

A place will be provided for their disposal at the plant.

Rubbish and garbage will include all waste material not covered by the first two classifications. Tin cans, glass bottles, broken crockery and like articles cannot be destroyed in the incinerator. These articles will be disposed of at the plant only if brought there in separate containers. All combustible materials must be kept clear of salt, water and other substances that prevent combustion.

Swill, offal, fish heads and other putrid, decaying and offensive matter, brought in receptacles other than metal, must be destroyed with the container.

No waste shall be brought to the plant before eight o'clock a. m. or after 4.30 p. m., without special arrangement with the attendant.

No person shall dump or cause to be dumped, any rubbish, garbage or other material on or about the premises of the incinerating plant, except under the supervision and direction of attendant.

All trucks or other vehicles used to convey materials to the plant shall be covered so as to prevent papers or other articles from blowing or falling from said trucks or vehicles. No materials brought from other towns shall be accepted at the plant.

Any violation of this section shall be subject to a fine not exceeding twenty dollars.

## CITY OF KEENE, N. H.

In the Year of Our Lord one thousand nine hundred and twenty-seven.

An ordinance relative to the construction, alteration, maintenance, and use of buildings in the City of Keene.

Be it ordained by the City Councils of the City of Keene as follows:

## FIRE DISTRICT

Section 1. Fire district referred to in this Ordinance is the one described in the Ordinance passed by the City Councils January 20, 1927.

## DEFINITIONS

Section 1. In this chapter the following terms shall have the meanings respectively assigned them.

“Alteration”—Any change in or addition to a building which materially affects its strength or increases the fire risk or changes its use.

“Basement”—That portion of a building, the floor of which is below the curb level at the center of the front of the building, and having one-half at least of the height of said portion, measuring from the floor to the ceiling, above the curb.

“Building”—All structures more than Eight Feet in length or breadth and Seven Feet in height.

“Building of the first class”—A building of fireproof construction throughout.

“Building of the second class”—Any building not of the first class, the outside structural walls of which are of brick, stone, iron, cement, concrete, or other equally substantial and non-combustible material.

“Building of the third class”—Any building not of the first or second class.

“Cellar”—The lowest portion of a building, the floor of which is below the curb level at the center of the front of the building, and having more than one-half of the height of said portion, measuring from the floor to the ceiling below the curb.

“External Wall”—Every outer wall or vertical enclosure of a building other than a party wall.

“First Story”—The next story above the basement or above the cellar if the building has no basement story.

“Foundation Wall”—That portion of a wall below the level of the street or curb; and when the wall is not on a street, that portion of the wall below the level of the highest ground next to the wall; but if under party or partition walls, may be construed by the inspector to mean that portion below the cellar floor.

“Height of a building”—The perpendicular distance of the highest point of the roof above the average grade of principal front.

“Height of a wall”—The height from the mean grade of the sidewalk or adjoining ground to the highest point of the wall.

“Inspector”—The inspector of buildings of the City of Keene.

“Lodging House”—A building in which persons are accommodated with sleeping apartments, including hotels and apartment houses where cooking is not done in the several apartments.

“Partition”—Any dividing wall other than a masonry wall.

“Partition Wall”—Any interior wall of masonry in a building.

“Party Wall”—Every wall used or built in order to be used as a separation of two or more buildings, irrespective of question of single or joint ownership or interest.

“Repairs”—The reconstruction or renewal of any existing part of a building or of its fixtures or appurtenances, by which the fire risk is not affected or modified, and not made in the opinion of the inspector, for the purpose of converting the building in whole or in part to a new one and not made to provide for a new use for the building.

“Rubble”—Stones of irregular size and shape.

“Tenement house” or “Apartment house”—A building which, or any portion of which, is occupied, or intended to be occupied as a dwelling by three or more families living independently of one another, or by more than two families above the second floor so living.

“Thickness of a wall”—The minimum thickness of such wall, not including air spaces built between courses.

### INSPECTOR OF BUILDINGS

Section 1. The Inspector of Buildings shall be appointed annually by the Mayor in the month of January subject to the advice and consent of the Board of Aldermen. The Inspector of Buildings shall hold said office for the term of one year from the first Monday of February next ensuing or until his successor is appointed and qualified. He shall receive such compensation as the City Councils may by ordinance determine.

Section 2. The Inspector of Buildings shall have supervision of the construction and inspection of all buildings and electrical installations. He shall be an experienced architect, builder, contractor, or civil engineer. The Inspector of Buildings shall not be engaged in or interested in any contract for building or for furnishing any materials for any building which he is to inspect under the provisions of this Ordinance.

Section 3. The Inspector of Buildings shall have general supervision of the construction of all buildings erected by the City, and all repairs upon all the City buildings, and see that the conditions of contracts and plans and specifications, if any, are faithfully carried out. The Inspector of Buildings shall be ex-officio clerk and agent of the Lands and Buildings Committee.

Section 4. It shall be the duty of said Inspector to keep a record of all permits issued, which shall be regularly numbered in the order of their issue, also a record showing the number and size of every new building erected in the City, of what material constructed, the number, kind, and cost of all buildings, and a record of all transactions of his office.

Section 5. It shall be the duty of the Inspector to sign all permits and notices required to be issued under this ordinance, and to institute proceedings for all violations thereof.

Section 6. The Inspector shall have full power to pass upon any questions arising under the provisions of this chapter relative to the manner of construction or materials to be used in the erection, alteration or repair of any building. The Inspector shall examine or cause to be examined all buildings upon which work is being done under the provisions of this chapter as often as practicable and make a record of all violations of the several provisions of this chapter, together with the street and number where such violations are found, the name of the owner, lessee, occupant, architect, and builder, and all other matters relative thereto. He shall examine all buildings under application to be moved, raised, enlarged, altered, restored, or built upon, and make a record of the same.

Section 7. The Inspector shall, so far as may be necessary for the performance of his duties, have the right to enter any building or premises, and to examine and inspect such building in process of construction, and to direct the suspension of any

such building operations as shall not conform to the requirements contained in this chapter.

Section 8. The Inspector shall have full power to revoke and cancel any permit or certificate or approval granted, in case the person to whom the same is issued fails to comply with the provisions of this chapter.

### GENERAL PROVISIONS

Section 1. No person shall construct, alter, restore, or repair, raise or move, any building or structure of any kind within the City of Keene, except in conformity with the provisions of this chapter, except buildings built or altered by the United States of America or the State of New Hampshire.

Section 2. The provisions of this ordinance shall apply to all structures of every sort or description which are more than eight feet in length or breadth and seven feet in height.

Section 3. Permits must be secured before the work is commenced and shall become void if work is not begun in six months from the date of the permit and substantially continued to completion.

Section 4. Before the repair, erection, construction or material alteration of any building in this city, the owner, architect, or builder thereof shall make to the Inspector a statement giving the intended location of such building, its dimensions, materials, manner of construction, and estimated cost. If such building is to be repaired, erected, or materially altered within the fire district of the city, or any building outside the fire district, costing \$5,000.00 or more, such owner, architect or builder shall, in addition to the statement aforesaid submit for examination full specifications and plans of the proposed repairs, buildings or alterations; the owner or duly authorized person shall also sign an agreement that the proposed work shall be done in accordance with the description set forth in such plans and specifications and statement, and all such matters and things connected with such work shall be done in strict



compliance with this chapter. If it appears from said statement, plans and specifications that the building to be erected, altered or repaired will conform to the provisions of this chapter, so far as applicable thereto and to other city laws, then the Inspector shall issue a permit as herein provided. No person shall repair, construct or alter any such building without such permit. If material changes in plans are contemplated, a permit shall be obtained for such changes.

Section 5. Any alterations in or additions to any building already erected or hereafter to be erected, except necessary repairs not affecting the construction of the external walls, roof, chimneys, or stairways shall to the extent of such work be subject to the regulations of this chapter. No building already erected or hereafter built shall be raised or built upon in such manner that were such building wholly built or constructed after the passage of this chapter, it would be in violation thereof. When, however, one or more stories shall be added to the height of good and substantial buildings, the Inspector, shall first carefully examine the same, and such deviation from this chapter may be allowed as in his judgment may be necessary, considering the strength and solidity of the walls already built, and in no case shall any deviation be allowed which will be likely to detract from the safety of such building when so added to.

Section 6. No person shall lath, plaster or otherwise cover or conceal the space between studs, joists or framework of any building or part thereof without first notifying the Inspector of Buildings that such part or parts are ready to cover or conceal, and the Inspector when so notified shall inspect such building or part thereof, and if upon inspection it is found that suitable firestops are in place and the building properly framed and braced, then, and not till then, shall he issue a supplementary permit allowing the work to proceed, and no person shall lath, plaster or otherwise cover or conceal the spaces above

enumerated until such supplementary permit has been duly granted.

Section 7. All buildings or parts of buildings hereafter erected and not hereinafter specifically described, shall be of sound material, abundantly strong for the purpose intended, and the sizes of material used therein shall be such as have been determined by the best authorities and demonstrated to be proper for structural purposes.

Section 8. No building, except of the first or second class, shall hereafter be erected within the fire district. Buildings seventy feet or more high in any part of the city shall be first class.

Section 9. No wooden addition or alteration to any building now existing within such fire district shall be made, except upon license therefor first obtained from the Mayor and Board of Aldermen upon recommendation of the Inspector of Buildings, who may prescribe such terms, conditions, limitations and restrictions as he deems wise. Before any such license is granted, a notice of the application therefor shall be published three days successively in some one daily newspaper printed in the City of Keene. Such wooden structure or addition shall be made in accordance with the requirements of this chapter.

Section 10. No wooden building shall be moved from one lot to another in the fire district, nor from without said district into the same and no wooden building shall be moved from place to place on the same lot within the fire district without a special license being first obtained therefor from the Mayor and Board of Aldermen upon the recommendation of the Inspector of Buildings.

Section 11. No third-class building within the fire district which shall hereafter sustain a fire loss or be damaged to the extent of 50% or more of its sound value at time of destruction shall be rebuilt except in accordance with the provisions of this act applying to said fire district.

Section 12. No building with a superstructure of more than three wood framed stories in height shall hereafter be erected, nor shall a wooden three-story building be occupied by more than six families, except where the substructure makes it possible to accommodate an additional family or families; but in no case shall the height of the entire building exceed forty-five feet as established in this chapter. Nor shall any wood framed building already erected be altered to more than three stories in height or the superstructures to be occupied by more than six families, or otherwise contrary to the foregoing.

Section 13. No timber shall be used to support a wall of masonry in any building.

Section 14. No wooden posts shall be used to support a wall of masonry or any masonry pier or chimney.

Section 15. No Bay Window or other structure shall be placed upon any building so as to project over any public way or square.

Section 16. No observation or reviewing stand shall be constructed or maintained unless same is built in accordance with plans approved by the Inspector of Buildings, or as directed by him as to strength and arrangement.

Section 17. All windows opening into light shafts shall have metal frames and sash and wire glass.

Section 18. The distance from the underside of the highest point of the beams of a flat roof having a ceiling under this flat roof shall be not more than four feet to the underside of such ceiling.

Section 19. Every compartment containing one or more water closets shall be provided with adequate ventilation to the outer air either by a window, or by suitable vent shaft, or by mechanical ventilation.

Section 20. All buildings except houses of less than 2,000 square feet area on the first floor shall have two sufficient egresses from the second and upper floors.

Section 21. All rooms used for living purposes, except toilets and bathrooms, shall have at least 10 square feet of direct light and air in all rooms hereafter built.

Section 22. In every apartment house two or more stories high, a proper light shall be kept burning by the owner in the public hall ways near each stair case, upon each floor, every night and sun set to sunrise throughout the year.

#### EXTERIOR, PARTY AND FIRE WALLS

Section 1. All exterior, and division or party walls over one story high, shall extend the full thickness of top story wall to at least two feet above the roof surfacing of a building as a parapet and be properly coped, excepting walls which face on a street and are finished with incombustible cornices, gutters or crown mouldings; excepting also the walls of detached dwellings with peaked or hipped roofs. The parapet walls of warehouses and all manufacturing or commercial buildings shall extend three feet above the roof.

Section 2. Fire walls shall be continuous from foundation to three feet above roof level and shall be coped.

#### EGRESSES FOR PUBLIC BUILDINGS, ETC.

Section 1. Every public building, office building, factory, which is designed to employ or accommodate more than ten employees and every building more than two stories high used above the second story as an office building, dormitory, hotel, apartment house, boarding or lodging house, tenement house, club house, hospital or asylum, having eight or more rooms above the first story, or in which ten or more persons are lodged or reside, shall have at least two properly located and built egresses from each story for use in escape from fire, one of which may be an exterior fire escape. The two egress stair

ways shall not lead from the same open hall way but shall be separated by swinging doors with springs to act as a smoke stop or in other ways be separated to accomplish the same result. Egress doors from such buildings shall open outward and shall be equipped with approved hardware so that they may be opened at all times from the inside.

Section 2. Every audience hall and each gallery of such building shall have at least two independent exits. Such exits shall have an aggregate width of at least twenty inches for every one hundred persons which such hall or gallery from which it leads is capable of seating. None of the exits from such hall or gallery shall be less than three feet wide.

Section 3. Every building or part of a building used as a public or private school, academy, seminary or college, affording instruction to more than ten pupils at one time shall have at least two independent stair cases from the second story and two exits from the first story which shall have doors opening out with suitable hardware which shall allow both parts of a double door to be opened from the inside by means of T handle lever bolts or some device equally good. Stair ways of such buildings shall have steps with rise not less than six nor more than seven and five-eighths inches and a run not less than ten inches, with not more than fifteen nor less than three rises between landings. Such stair ways shall be not less than four feet wide. No winding steps shall be used. No closets shall be placed under any stairs.

Section 4. Exits shall aggregate two feet for every 100 pupils the building will accommodate, including the audience hall, if the hall may be used during the time class rooms are occupied.

#### USE OF STREETS AND SIDEWALKS

Section 1. Special permits must be obtained from the Mayor and Board of Aldermen, where building operations will necessitate the use of sidewalk or highway.

## EXCAVATIONS

Section 1. All excavations shall be properly guarded and protected in such manner as may be approved by the Inspector, by the person causing the excavations to be made, so as to prevent the same from becoming dangerous to life or limb, or adjoining property.

Section 2. Every structure in process of construction, alteration, repair or removal, and every neighboring structure or portion thereof, affected by such process or by any excavation, shall be sufficiently supported and protected during such process so that the same shall not become dangerous to life, limb or adjoining property.

## REMOVAL OF OLD MATERIAL

Section 1. In demolishing any building, or part thereof, story after story shall be completely removed. No material shall be stored upon a floor of any building in the course of demolition, but old material shall be lowered to the ground immediately upon displacement. Chutes for debris, extending over sidewalk or public ways, shall be tightly closed.

## FOOTINGS

Section 1. Except for third class buildings which the Inspector shall so designate, all buildings shall have suitable concrete or stone footings under all masonry walls, piers and columns, placed not less than five feet below grade when exposed to frost.

## STRUCTURAL USE OF CONCRETE

Section 1. Concrete construction shall consist of a medium wet mixture of one part of Portland cement to not more than six parts of aggregate, fine and coarse, in such proportions as to produce the greatest density. The quality of the materials, the design, and the construction, shall be in accordance with the best engineering practice. Clean water is to be added to form a mixture which will just flow from a mixer and no

excessive water is to be used. Mixing shall be thoroughly done and in placing the concrete it is to be spaded to insure all voids being filled.

The cement shall be first class Portland cement of a brand that shall pass in all respects the standard specifications of the American Society for Testing Materials.

### FORMS

Section 1. Forms shall be thoroughly constructed, braced and tied together so that the pressure of concrete shall not move them as the concrete is poured. Forms shall be left in **place until the concrete has set sufficiently to resist accidental blows and permanent strains which may come upon it.**

### REINFORCED CONCRETE

Section 1. Reinforced concrete shall be of cement, sand and broken stone mixed in proportions according to the best practice and with reinforced steel designed and placed according to the best practice and specifications of the American Society for Testing Materials.

### FREEZING OF CONCRETE

Section 1. In freezing weather concrete shall be mixed with heated ingredients or have a compound added to prevent freezing and shall be properly protected from damage from frost. Forms shall not be removed until it is known that the concrete is properly set.

### FOUNDATIONS

Section 1. Every building, except buildings erected upon solid rock, shall have foundations of brick, stone, iron, steel or concrete, laid on the solid ground below frost or level surface of the rock, or upon piles or ranging timbers when solid earth or rock is not found. Foundation walls of rubble stone shall not be used in buildings over forty feet in height, except in third-class buildings outside of the fire limits. Where rubble

is used, one-third of the bulk of the wall shall be built of through stone thoroughly bonded. No round or boulder stones shall be used. If the foundation is on piles, the lower course shall be of block stone or first class concrete girders not under sixteen inches high.

Section 2. Foundations of first-class rubble shall be eight inches thicker than brick walls next above.

Section 3. Foundations of block granite shall be at least four inches thicker than the walls next above them.

Section 4. Foundations of brick shall be at least twelve inches thick and at least four inches thicker than the walls next above them to a depth of twelve feet below the street grade, and for every additional ten feet or part thereof deeper, they shall be increased in thickness, to resist any lateral pressure, and the Inspector may order all increase for that purpose.

Section 5. The footings shall be of stone or concrete or both, or of concrete and stepped-up brick-work of sufficient thickness to safely bear the weight to be imposed thereon, and to properly distribute such weight upon the surface on which it rests. If of stone, they shall be not less than twelve inches thick, and at least twelve inches wider than the bottom width of the foundation walls, and at least twelve inches wider on all sides than the bottom width of any pier, column or post resting upon them. All footing stone shall be well bedded and laid crosswise, edge to edge.

Section 6. All foundations of brick or stone shall be laid in cement mortar composed of not less than one part of cement to four parts of clean sharp sand.

Section 7. For Foundations of Concrete refer to Section 1 under Structural use of Concrete.



## BRICKWORK

Section 1. All brick work shall be of marketable, well-shaped brick, well laid and bedded with joints well filled with mortar, as required, hereinafter, and well flushed up at every course with mortar. Bricks, when laid, shall be wet, except in freezing weather, unless otherwise directed by the Inspector. All walls of brick or stone, or other similar material, shall be well built, properly bonded and tied, and laid in mortar, as hereinafter described. The inside four inches of any wall may be built of hard-burned hollow clay bricks of good quality and dimensions and thoroughly tied and bonded into the wall. Every sixth course, at least, of a brick wall shall be a header course, except where walls are faced with face brick, in which case bricks shall be bonded where possible to the backing by cutting the corners of the face brick and putting in diagonal headers behind the same, or an approved galvanized iron wall tie.

## TERRA COTTA BACKING BLOCKS

Section 1. In place of solid brickwork, brick walls may be made, with the exception of the outer four inch course, with terra cotta backing blocks. Blocks carrying floors shall be of the load bearing variety. Walls carrying girders or steel beams shall be built solid of brickwork extending each side of the bearing point to a sufficient width to properly carry the concentrated load.

Section 2. Stone walls may be backed in the same manner with terra cotta blocks.

Section 3. All terra cotta backing blocks shall be tied to brick or stone courses with at least one galvanized or tarred wall tie to each two square feet of wall.

## TERRA COTTA WALLS

Section 1. Walls may be made of terra cotta building blocks properly laid in mortar, such walls to be not over three stories high and of the same thickness required for brick walls.

### MORTAR FOR WALLS, ETC.

Section 1. All brick work and terra cotta shall be laid in cement mortar or cement and lime mortar. Stone ashlar and stone trimmings shall be laid in cement mortar.

### COMPOSITION OF MORTARS

Section 1. Cement mortar shall be composed of one part of fresh Portland cement to not more than four parts of clean sharp sand, mixed in small quantities and used at once before the initial set. In freezing weather the ingredients shall be warmed or some material added to prevent freezing.

Section 2. Cement and lime mortar shall be composed of one part of fresh Portland cement, one part of freshly burned thoroughly slaked lime to not more than six parts of clean sharp sand.

### RECESSES IN WALLS

Section 1. Recesses may be made in external walls, provided the thickness of the backs of such recesses be not less than eight inches. No recesses three feet or more wide shall be nearer to each other than eight feet, and no continuous vertical recess more than six inches in depth shall be made in any twelve inch wall, and no recess of any kind shall be made in any eight inch wall. No horizontal recess shall be made over eighteen inches long unless supported by steel lintel.

### ASHLAR

Section 1. Ashlar shall be at least four inches thick and properly held by metal clamps to the backing, or properly boned to same.

### IRON OR STEEL EXTERNAL WALLS

Section 1. External walls may be built of iron or steel, and when so built may be of less thickness than is required for external walls, provided such walls meet the requirements as to strength, and provided that all constructional parts are

wholly protected from heat by brick or terra cotta, or by plastering three-quarters of an inch thick, with iron furring and wiring.

### TRUSSES, COLUMNS AND GIRDERS

Section 1. First and second class buildings hereafter shall have floor bearing supports not over thirty feet apart. These supports may be brick walls, trusses, or columns and girders. Such brick walls may be four inches less in thickness than is required by this chapter for external and party walls of the same height, provided they comply with the provisions of this chapter as to strength of materials, but in no case less than eight inches thick. Where trusses and girders are used, the walls upon which they rest shall be at least four inches thicker than is otherwise required for every addition of twenty-five feet or part thereof to the length of the truss over thirty feet.

### CORNICES

Section 1. When a wall has a stone belt course or a stone cornice, the greatest weight of material of such belt or cornice shall be on the inside of the face of the wall. All cornices hereafter built or replaced on first or second class buildings shall be of brick or other incombustible material, and the walls shall be carried up to the boarding of the roof, and where the cornice projects above the roof, masonry shall be carried up to the top of the cornice and be covered with metal, concrete or tile as required for parapet walls. All metal cornices shall be supported on metal lookouts.

### THICKNESS OF BRICK, STONE AND CONCRETE WALLS

Section 1. Wooden houses not over three stories high shall have foundations at least ten inches thick without footings unless the soil requires footings in the opinion of the Inspector.

Section 2. Walls for buildings of the Warehouse Class shall be taken to mean and include all buildings except those in the dwelling house class mentioned below. The minimum

thickness for all outside, party, and division walls in this class shall not be less than the number of inches shown in the following table:

Section 4. Dwelling House Class includes the following buildings: Apartment Houses, Apartment Hotels, Asylums, Club Houses, Dormitories, Dwellings, Hospitals, Hotels, Lodging Houses, Parish Buildings, Studios, Tenements.

The minimum thickness for all outside division and party walls of this class shall be not less than the number of inches shown in the following table:

Section 5. Two story brick dwellings except in the fire district not exceeding twenty-five feet in height, may be built with eight inch walls in the first and second stories.

Section 6. The height of stories for all given thickness of walls shall not exceed

1st Story	.....	16 feet
2nd Story	.....	14 feet
3rd Story	.....	12 feet

and for any story exceeding the foregoing heights, the walls of any such story and all walls below that story shall be increased four inches in thickness.

The height of a story shall be the perpendicular distance from the top of the finished floor in one story to the top of the finished floor in the next story.

Section 7. All party or division walls of a less thickness than twelve inches shall be corbelled, not less than three inches on sides, to receive the floor joists.

Said corbelling shall not be done in a less height than six courses of brick, which shall be well bonded into the wall.

#### HOLLOW WALLS

Section 1. Hollow walls for dwellings may be built with the approval of the Inspector, and shall have a base of not less than twelve inches, and brick withes of eight inches in thickness against all door and window frames and for the support of all floor beams or trusses, and be properly tied to outside courses in the most approved manner. The remainder of the walls shall be tied to outer walls as often as once in every thirty-two inches with brick thoroughly bonded to outer and inner walls, or approved tie irons thoroughly coated with coal tar or other approved coating.

Section 2. Hollow walls for other buildings may be built, provided the same amount of masonry or brick is used as if the walls were solid, and provided they are properly tied and bonded, the outer to the inner wall.

#### PIERS AND WALLS

Section 1. Piers and walls shall have caps or plates, where needed, sufficient to properly distribute the load, and shall be built of good hard-burned brick of uniform size, laid in cement and sand mortar, and of sufficient size to carry safely the load for which they are intended; joints not to exceed five-eighths of an inch. One whole course over the surface of the pier shall be

laid and joints slushed full of mortar before the next shall be laid.

### CHIMNEYS

Section 1. All chimneys shall be built of brick or other non-combustible material. Walls of brick chimneys may be four inches thick and have terra-cotta flue linings full height of chimney, but if built of brick, without terra-cotta lining, shall be not less than eight inches thick, with struck joints on the inside. All boiler chimneys except in dwelling houses, shall have walls at least eight inches thick.

No smoke flue shall be built of a less area than eight inches by eight inches.

No woodwork is to be supported by any chimney.

No nails are to be driven into any chimney.

No woodwork is to be nearer than one inch to any chimney.

Section 2. All chimney thimbles shall be of non-combustible material and so constructed that no woodwork shall be allowed within six inches of the pipe hole. All shall be thoroughly built into the chimney.

### HEARTHES AND ARCHES

Section 1. All hearths shall be supported by trimmer arches of brick or other fireproof material. The brick jambs of every fireplace or range opening shall be at least eight inches wide each, and the backs of such openings at least eight inches thick. All hearth and trimmer arches shall be at least twelve inches longer on either side than the width of such finished openings, and at least eighteen inches wide in front of the facing. Brickwork over fireplace openings shall be supported by proper iron bars or brick arches.

## FLOORS

Section 1. Dead loads in all buildings shall consist of the actual weight of walls, floors, roofs, partitions, and all permanent construction.

Live loads shall consist of all loads other than dead loads.

Every floor shall be of sufficient strength to bear safely the weight to be imposed thereon in addition to the weight of the materials of which the floor is composed.

If to be used in a dwelling house, apartment house, apartment hotel, tenement house, hotel or lodging house, hospital, asylum, club house, dormitory, or parish buildings, each floor shall be of sufficient strength in all its parts to bear safely upon every square foot of its surface not less than fifty pounds, live load.

If to be used in a school or place of instruction, not less than one hundred pounds upon every square foot for assembly halls and eighty pounds in class rooms.

If to be used for garages, stables and carriage house purposes, not less than seventy-five pounds upon every square foot.

If to be used for stores, light manufacturing and light storage, not less than one hundred and twenty-five pounds upon every square foot.

If to be used in a place of public assembly, not less than one hundred pounds upon every square foot in rooms with movable seats and eighty pounds with fixed seats.

If to be used in a store where heavy materials are kept or stored, warehouse, factory, or for other manufacturing or commercial purpose, not less than two hundred pounds upon every square foot.

The strength of factory floors intended to carry running machinery shall be increased above the minimum given in this section as may be required by the Inspector of Buildings.

For sidewalks between the curb and building lines, the live load shall be taken at not less than three hundred pounds upon every square foot.

Cutting for piping or other purposes shall not be done so as to reduce the strength of the supporting parts below that required by the provisions of this ordinance. No part of any floor timber shall be within one and one-half inches of any chimney.

Section 2. Every column, post or other vertical support shall be of sufficient strength to bear safely the weight of the portion of each and every floor depending upon it for support, in addition to the weight required, as before stated, to be supported safely upon said portions of said floors.

Section 3. Every column shall rest on a base or plate sufficient to properly distribute the load. Columns set one above another shall have proper connections. All bearing parts of columns or plates shall be true surfaces. The Inspector may require columns to be drilled for inspection.

For the purpose of determining the carrying capacity of columns in dwellings, office buildings, stores, stables and public buildings, when over five stories in height a reduction of live loads shall be permissible as follows.

Section 4. For the roof and top floor, the full live loads shall be used. For each succeeding lower floor, it shall be permissible to reduce the live load by five per cent, until fifty per cent of the live loads fixed by this section is reached, when such reduced loads shall be used for all remaining floors.

## ROOFS

Section 1. All new or renewed roofs having a pitch of less than twenty degrees shall be proportioned to bear safely forty-five pounds upon every square foot of their surface, in addition to the weight of the materials composing the same. If



the pitch be more than twenty degrees, the live load shall be assumed at twenty-five pounds upon every square foot.

All thin glass skylights upon roofs shall be covered with wire netting.

Section 2. The roof of every second-class building hereinafter built shall be covered with tin, iron, slate, gravel, composition or like substantial roof material not readily inflammable. All buildings over forty-five feet high shall have suitable water tight, metallic leaders, and all buildings shall have leaders sufficient to carry all water to the street, gutter or sewer in such manner as not to flow upon the sidewalk or to cause dampness in any wall. All buildings over twenty feet high, except dwelling houses, shall have permanent means of access to the roof from the inside; the opening shall not be less than twenty by thirty inches.

Section 3. The roofs of third class buildings may be covered with wooden shingles.

### PROTECTION FOR SNOW-SLIDES

Section 1. It shall be the duty of the Building Inspector, and he is hereby empowered to cause to be erected a balustrade or other protection (for security against snow slides) upon the roofs of all buildings now standing, or which may be hereafter erected, on or near the line of any street or sidewalk in said city, when it shall be made to appear to him that the public safety requires such balustrade or protection upon the roof of any such building so standing or erected in accordance with the following sections.

Section 2. Whenever in the judgment of the Building Inspector the public safety requires that a balustrade or other protection (for security against snow slides) upon any building mentioned in the preceding section, be erected, he shall give notice thereof in writing, requiring the erection of such balustrade or protection, to the owners of such building or

buildings, or the authorized agent of such owner, if either reside in this city, and if not, then a copy of such notice shall be posted on the premises. Such notice shall contain a copy of Section 1 under Protection for Snow-Slides, requiring such protection to be made by the owner thereof, and specifying the time within which said protection must be completed. Said notice shall be served in the manner providing for serving civil process, returned, filed, and preserved in the Building Inspector's office.

Section 3. Whenever the owner of any building aforesaid is served with notice mentioned in Section 2 under Protection for Snow-Slides, as therein specified, he shall cause said balustrade or protection to be erected in the manner and within the time mentioned in said order and notice.

Section 4. If such order shall not be complied with to the acceptance of said Building Inspector within the time that shall be therein limited, he shall proceed immediately to cause such erection to be constructed and completed, and at the expense of said owner or owners.

Section 5. It shall be the duty of the Building Inspector to keep an accurate account of the expenses incurred in carrying into effect any of the provisions of Section 1 to 4 inclusive, under Protection for Snow-Slides, and report the same to the Tax Collector, which amount shall become a lien upon the property and collectable the same as other City Taxes and Assessments.

Section 6. Any person who shall offend against or fail to comply with the provisions of sections 1 to 5, Under Protection for Snow-Slides, shall be punished by a fine of not less than ten or more than twenty dollars.

#### FIRE DOORS

Section 1. Openings or doorways in party walls of first or second-class buildings shall not exceed two in number for each

floor, and the combined area of such openings on each floor shall not exceed one hundred twenty-eight square feet.

Section 2. Each opening must be provided with one set of metal covered doors, separated by the thickness of the wall, and provided with automatic closing device, approved by Fire Underwriters.

### FIRE STOPS

Section 1. Metal strips shall be laid and turned up against all chimneys hereafter built, so as to form an effectual fire-stop at each floor. No studding or furring shall be within one inch of any chimney.

Section 2. In all second class buildings and third class apartment houses hereafter erected, any stair halls may be inclosed with wooden stud partitions if such partitions are covered on both sides with metal lath and plaster, and provided that the space between the studs is filled in with brick and mortar or other incombustible material to the height of five inches above floor and five inches below floor timbers; otherwise they shall be of brick or fireproof construction. In such buildings the stairs may be of wood, provided that the soffits and underside of landings are covered with metal lath and plastered with two coats of mortar, and provided that such stairs are protected by two fire stops to each flight.

### HOT AIR AND SMOKE PIPES

Section 1. No smoke pipe shall project through any external wall or window. No smoke pipe shall pass through any wooden partition without a ring of some hard non-combustible material of the thickness of the partition, and extending four inches from the pipe, or a double metal collar of the thickness of the partition, with a ventilated air space of not less than four inches around the pipe, and shall not be placed within eight inches of any wood unless the same is protected with a metal shield two inches distant from the wood. The tops of all

heating furnaces set in brick shall be covered with brick supported by iron bars and so constructed as to be perfectly tight; said covering to be in addition to and not less than six inches from the ordinary covering of the hot-air chamber.

#### SETTING BOILERS, FURNACES, ETC.

Section 1. No boiler which is to be used for steam heat or motive power and no furnace or hot-water heater shall be placed on any floor above the cellar floor, unless the same is set on non-combustible beams and arches, and in no case without a permit from the Inspector.

Section 2. Every steam boiler in a building to be used for office, mercantile or manufacturing purposes, or in a building used or intended to be used as a lodging-house or hotel, with ten or more rooms above the second story, shall be enclosed in a fireproof room in brick, iron or other non-combustible material, with openings closed with metal-covered doors hung to metal covered or iron frames or to hinges in brick. This shall not apply to fireproof buildings.

Section 3. The tops of all heating furnaces not set in brick shall be at least eight inches below the nearest wooden beams or ceiling, with a shield of tin plate, galvanized iron or asbestos made tight suspended not less than two inches below such beams or ceiling, and extending one foot beyond the top of the furnace on all sides. All hot air register boxes hereafter placed in floors or partitions of buildings shall be set in soapstone or equally non-combustible boarders, not less than two inches in width, and shall be made of tin plate and have pipes and boxes properly fitted to borders. Hot-air pipes and register boxes shall be at least one inch from wood work, and register boxes fifteen inches by twenty-five inches, or larger, and their connecting pipes shall be two inches from any woodwork. The requirements of this section may be modified or dispensed with by the Inspector in first-class buildings. No woodwork shall

be placed within one inch of any metal pipe to be used to convey heated air or within one-half inch of any metal pipe to be used to convey steam.

### METAL WINDOWS

Section 1. In all first or second class mercantile or manufacturing buildings hereafter built over thirty feet in height, or increased above that height, outside openings in party walls or in any rear or side wall within twenty feet of an opposite wall or building, shall have metal frames and sashes and shall be glazed with wire glass or shall be protected by shutters. Such shutters shall be wood covered both sides with tin, or shall be made of other substantial, fire-proof material, and hung on the outside, either upon independent metal frame or upon metal hinges attached to the masonry, and shall be made to be handled from both inside and outside.

### FIRST-CLASS BUILDINGS

Section 1. A first-class building shall consist of non-inflamable material throughout, with floors and roof constructed of iron or steel or re-inforced concrete beams, filled in between with terra-cotta or other fireproof material, except that wood may be used for under and upper floors, windows, door frames, sashes, doors, standing finish, handrails for stairs, necessary sleepers bedded in concrete, and for isolated furring blocks bedded in mortar. There shall be no air-space between the top of any fireproof floor construction and the floor boarding and no air-spaces behind any woodwork. Every building hereafter erected over seventy feet high shall be a first-class building, and this provision shall apply to all buildings hereafter increased in height to over seventy feet.

Section 2. All partitions in first-class buildings shall be constructed of non-inflammable studding, brick, or hollow blocks of cement, plaster or terra-cotta. The plaster is to be applied direct to partitions or metal lath used.

Section 3. Buildings of steel or reinforced concrete shall be designed and built according to the Standard Specifications of the American Institute of Steel Construction for steel work and of the American Society for Testing Materials for concrete work. Masonry walls of such buildings supported by horizontal beams in each story need not follow the table of thickness of outside walls and such walls shall be not less than twelve inches thick of masonry, the twelve inches including the outside stone or other masonry facing.

Section 4. All structural steel is to be covered with approved fire proofing except that concrete filled columns and metal lumber and open form trussed joists may not be so covered.

#### SECOND-CLASS BUILDINGS

Section 1. A second-class building shall include any building not of the first-class whose external and party walls are constructed of brick, stone, iron, steel, reinforced concrete, concrete blocks or other equally substantial and fire-proof material.

Section 2. Every second-class building, except as hereinafter provided, shall have sufficient fire-stops at each floor. Every air duct, except those expressly sanctioned, shall be effectually fire stopped between the floor and the duct at each story.

Section 3. The spaces between and behind all studding or furring on walls shall be filled solid with bricks and mortar or other fire-proof material for a space of five (5) inches in height above the floor timbers. Spaces between the strap furring or brick walls shall be filled with mortar for five (5) inches below the bottom of the floor timbers. The spaces between the stringers of stairs and joints of landings, unless unceiled or of fire-proof construction, shall be stopped solid with wood two, (2) inches thick, brick or terra-cotta or other approved materials, as often as twice in each flight.

The spaces between floor timbers on bearing partitions shall be stopped in similar manner and all partitions must be fire-stopped in like manner, once in the height of the partition.

### FLOOR TIMBERS SECOND-CLASS BUILDINGS

Section 1. The ends of all wooden floor or roof beams in second-class buildings shall enter the wall to a depth of at least four inches, unless the wall is properly corbelled, so as to give a bearing of at least four inches, and the ends of all such beams shall be so shaped that in case of fire they may fall without injury to the wall.

Section 2. Each floor shall have its beams so tied to the walls with anchors fastened to joists or girders, with ends turned down in the wall, and tied to each other with wrought iron straps or anchors, at least three-eighths of an inch thick by one and one-half inches wide, so as to form continuous ties across the building not more than ten feet apart.

Section 3. Walls running parallel, or nearly parallel, with floor beams shall be properly tied once in ten feet to the floor beams by iron straps or anchors of the size above specified, fastened to the second joist from the wall. Every wooden header or trimmer more than four feet long, carrying a floor load of more than seventy pounds per square foot, shall at all connection with other beams be hung in stirrup iron securely spiked.

### CONCRETE BLOCK BUILDINGS

Section 1. Portland cement artificial stone may be used after proper tests have been made by the owner or manufacturer, if the inspector is satisfied that the use of such material will in no way affect the stability or durability of the wall in which it is used.

Section 2. Portland cement blocks not more than nine (9) inches high, nor less than eight (8) inch beds, with hollow spaces not exceeding one-third (1-3) the area of the block, and

having an annulus of uniform size, may be substituted for brick or stone in any building not more than three (3) stories or forty (40) feet high.

Whenever such blocks are used the thickness of the wall shall not be less than the required thickness for brick walls.

No hollow blocks shall be used in any party or fire wall.

All Portland building blocks, before being used in any building, must have attained the age of at least thirty (30) days.

Section 3. Whenever girders or beams rest upon hollow concrete block walls so that there is a concentrated load of over two (2) tons, the blocks must be made solid on each side and below such beams or girders, to the satisfaction of the building inspector.

Section 4. Whenever walls are decreased in thickness, the top course of the thicker wall shall be made solid.

Section 5. Concrete lintels spanning openings more than four (4) feet in width shall be reinforced with iron or steel satisfactory to the inspector, and shall rest on solid concrete blocks.

Section 6. No concrete blocks shall be used in the construction of any public building, or part thereof, within the City of Keene, until they have been inspected and average samples of the lot tested, approved and accepted by the Inspector of Buildings.

### THIRD-CLASS BUILDINGS

Section 1. A third-class building includes every building of any sort or description not included within the first or second-class heretofore described.

### FRAME BUILDINGS

Section 1. Outside the fire district, buildings of frames of wood may be erected, but no frame building to be occupied



or used as a workshop or manufactory shall be built more than two stories or thirty feet in height. No wooden tower or spire shall be built or rebuilt to a greater height than sixty feet without a license first obtained from the Mayor and Board of Aldermen; nor without a license from said Board shall any building to be used as a barn or stable be built or rebuilt more than two stories or thirty feet in height.

Section 2. No frame or wooden dwelling-house hereafter erected shall exceed three stories, or more than forty-five feet in height, nor shall any rooms be finished in attics or fourth floors of such three story dwelling-houses to be used as tenements or chambers.

Section 3. When three or more frame buildings intended for one family each are built contiguous, the party or division wall studding shall not be less than four inches thick, and shall be properly fire stopped twice in each floor and shall extend to the under side of the roof boards, and this party or division studding shall begin at the top of the first tier of joists.

Below and supporting the division studding shall be a continuous concrete or brick wall or walls, at least eight inches thick; and over the entire surface of both faces of such studded party or division walls shall be applied metal lath and suitable plaster or plaster board carried to the roof boards.

Section 4. All the provisions heretofore provided as to chimneys in second-class buildings shall apply to third-class buildings. The walls of light, vent, or dumb-waited shafts, whether exterior or interior in frame buildings may be constructed of frame provided same are properly fire-stopped at each floor and also provided same are covered with metal lath and plaster.

Section 5. Posts of hard wood and wood girders of sufficient size may be used instead of fore and aft partitions in

cellars of frame buildings, except as otherwise provided for in this section.

Section 6. Floor beams shall not be less than two inches in thickness. The covering of the roof may be of wood shingles.

Section 7. In all frame buildings which are to be lathed and plastered or otherwise sheathed on the inside, the spaces between such parts of the floor joists or beams that rest on partition heads shall be entirely blocked off to prevent air currents, with blockings not less than two inches thick the full height of floor joists. Directly on top of this blocking there shall be an additional blocking set flatwise, of the same dimensions as studs.

Section 8. Fire-stops for enclosing walls shall be as follows: In walls, at each tier of floor joists, above the first tier, to be two continuous rows of blocks of the same dimensions as the studding, cut in between the studding one row upon top of floor joists and one row below or back of ledger board. Wherever the ceiling joists are placed below the plate, fire blocking must be placed below or back of ledger board supporting them. When the floor joists are placed against the studding and parallel to the plane of the wall, one row of blocks will be accepted. Where ceiling joists do not rest upon the plate, one row of blocks must be put in. Fire blocking at first floor joists shall consist of wood blocking two inches thick, or four inches of brickwork extending from sill to underside of floor board, either against or between studding, and must extend entirely around the building.

Section 9. All basement walls of frame or wooden buildings shall not be less than ten inches thick if of concrete, and twelve inches thick of other masonry and need not have footings unless the nature of the earth requires them. When such wall is eight feet or more above the surface of the ground, it shall not be less than twelve inches thick.

## SIZES AND SPACES OF FLOOR JOISTS

Section 1. Buildings of the dwelling house class may have floors of the sizes and spacing as in the following table, provided the sizes are sufficient for the loads imposed on them according to the requirements in this chapter.

Section 2. Attic floors and ceiling joists 12 foot span, joists 2x6, 16 inches o. c., 15 foot span, 2x8 joists, 16 inches o. c.

Section 3. Other floors, 12 foot span, 2x8 joists, 16 inches o. c.

14 foot span, 2x8 joists, 16 inches o. c.

16 foot span, 2x10 joists, 16 inches o. c.

18 foot span, 2x12 joists, 16 inches o. c.

These sizes are based on the use of spruce or fir lumber. Larger spans would have joists properly computed. All floor joists shall be doubled under all partitions and spiked together.

## BRIDGING

Section 1. Floor joists shall have diagonal bridging of not less than 1x2 pieces cut to fit with two nails in each end of each piece. No bridging shall be more than 8 feet from the end of the joist with which it is used.

## STUD WALLS AND PARTITIONS

Section 1. The studding in outside walls of wooden buildings shall be at least 2x4 set not more than 16 inches o.c. Sills of wooden buildings shall be at least 4x6 either solid or made up of two 2x6 pieces spiked together, or the western method of framing may be employed by which two joists spiked together are used upright as a sill. Plates for outside walls shall be at least 4x4 or solid or made of two 2x4 spiked together. Joists shall be held on the outer walls by 1x6 ledger boards let into the studs, or plates not less than 4x4. Outside walls shall be sheathed with 7-8 inch sheathing securely nailed or with some other building material sufficiently strong in the opinion of the Inspector.

Section 2. Partitions shall be made of 2x4 studs not over 16 inches o.c. or of 2x6 where specially required, with 2x4 or 2x6 partition caps. These are to rest on 2x4 or 2x6 sole pieces or are to be carried through to the partition cap below. Partitions, not bearing, may be of 2x3 studs 16 inches o.c. or 2x4 flatwise, 16 inches o.c.

Double studs at all door and window openings.

All partitions shall have at least one row of bridging the full width of the studs.

Sizes of dimension lumber given in inches.

Section 3. All openings in outside wall and in bearing partitions shall be properly trussed.

### MILL CONSTRUCTION

Section 1. Floors and roofs may be constructed in the so-called mill construction using wooden girders, posts and tongued and grooved plank, the various parts being put together and of sufficient sizes according to the best recognized practice with regard to such construction.

### STAIRWAY, AIR, AND LIGHT SHAFTS

Section 1. Every second class building more than three stories high, and every first class building hereafter erected and used above the first story as a warehouse or store for the storage or sale of merchandise, shall have all shafts for stairways, air, or light, inclosed with fireproof construction, except that an independent, monumental stairway extending from basement to second story may be constructed without inclosures. Such inclosures shall be supported on footings, or fireproof supports and framing, and shall, if inclosing stairs, have approved self-closing or automatic fire doors, and all openings in said inclosures shall have metal frames and sashes, and be glazed with wire glass.

### ELEVATOR SHAFTS

Section 1. Elevators serving more than one story shall be inclosed. All shafts for elevators shall be inclosed with brick walls or with fireproof partitions which do not depend on wooden beams or floors for support. When an elevator shaft extends down into a basement, such portion of the shaft including the space occupied by the machinery shall be constructed of brick or concrete and be fitted with automatic fire doors not less than one and three quarter (1 3/4) inches thick. When such shafts are not placed next to an outside wall with window openings therein, and serve more than one story, they shall be carried at least three (3) feet above the roof of the building and be covered with a skylight.

Section 2. Doors opening into shafts must be solid sliding or hinged doors, of metal or covered with metal, and if glazed to have wire glass.

### DRY ROOMS

Section 1. No combustible material shall be permitted in the construction of any dry room hereafter erected, in which a temperature of 125 degrees Fahrenheit or over may exist. If a temperature under 125 degrees Fahrenheit is to be used, the dry room may be constructed of wood, but it shall be lined throughout with 1-8 inch asbestos covered with sheet metal.

Section 2. If windows are placed in wall or ceilings of dry rooms they shall be of wired glass set in fixed incombustible sash and frames.

### ELECTRICAL INSTALLATIONS

Section 1. No alterations or additions shall be made in the existing wiring of any building, nor shall any building be wired for the placing of any electric lights, motors, heating devices, or any apparatus requiring the use of electrical current, nor shall any alterations be made in the wiring in any building after inspection, without first notifying the Inspector

and securing a permit therefor, except minor repair work, such as repairing flush and snap switches, replacing fuses, changing lamp sockets and receptacles, taping bare joints and repairing drop cords. Application for such permit, describing such work, shall be made by the person, firm or corporation installing same and permit when issued shall be to such applicant.

Section 2. Upon the completion of the wiring of any building, it shall be the duty of the person, firm or corporation installing the same to notify the Inspector, who shall inspect the installation and if it is found to be fully in compliance with this ordinance, he shall issue to such person, firm or corporation for delivery to the owner, a certificate of inspection granting his approval for the connection to the electrical service. All wires which are to be hidden from view shall be inspected before concealment and any person, firm or corporation installing such wires shall notify the Inspector that such work is ready for inspection.

Section 3. The Inspector shall make periodically a thorough reinspection of the installation in buildings of all electric wiring, electric devices and electric material now installed or that may hereafter be installed, within the City of Keene, and when the installation of any such wiring, devices or material is found to be in a dangerous or unsafe condition the person, firm or corporation owning, using or operating the same shall be notified and shall make the necessary repairs or changes required to place such wiring, devices and material in a safe condition and have such work completed within fifteen days, or any longer period specified by the Inspector in said notice. The Inspector is hereby empowered to disconnect or order the discontinuance of electrical service to such wiring, devices or material so found to be defectively installed until the installation of such wiring, devices and material has been made safe as directed by the Inspector.

Section 4. All electrical installations shall be in accordance with the National Electrical Code, except the wiring methods described under article five (5), Sections 501 and 502, of the National Electrical Code shall not be permitted.

All electrical installations shall be made in rigid conduit, armored cable, or metal molding, approved by the Underwriter's Laboratories.

Section 5. The inspector shall keep a record of all electrical permits issued and inspections made.

### SAFETY OF DESIGN

Section 1. All parts of every building shall be designed to safely carry the loads to be imposed thereon, and shall in all other respects conform to good engineering practice.

### SIGN BOARDS

Section 1. No sign board or bill board for advertising purposes or purposes of display shall be erected without a permit from the Inspector of Buildings. If the petition prays for the erection of a sign board of greater size than 36 square feet, same shall be granted only after seven days' notice in writing has been given by the Inspector to the owners of dwelling houses located within 200 feet of the proposed site, provided that this section shall not apply to signs or other devices erected and maintained in conformity with the law and shall advertise or indicate either the person occupying the premises in question, or the business transacted thereon, or advertise the property itself or any part thereof for sale or to let, and shall contain no other advertising matter.

### NUMBERING OF BUILDINGS

Section 1. Every owner, occupant, or person having control of any dwelling house or other building within the City of Keene, except the sparsely settled portions thereof, shall, at his own expense, cause said building to be numbered with

figures at least two inches in height, and conspicuously placed according to the directions of the Inspector.

Section 2. Said numbers shall, in the business portions of the city, cover a frontage of ten feet more or less, and in the resident portions of the city, a frontage of twenty-five feet more or less, at the discretion of the Inspector and be measured continuously from end to end of the street lane, alley, or court. The odd numbers shall be on the right hand side of the street going from the principal street from which it leads, and the even numbers opposite the smaller odd numbers.

Section 3. The Inspector shall assign a new number wherever he finds that the number in use is incorrect, but he shall not have the authority to renumber a street unless so ordered by the Mayor and the Board of Aldermen.

Section 4. Any owner, occupant, or person, having control of any dwelling house or other building, who shall refuse or neglect to comply with the provisions of this ordinance within ten days after a notice in writing is delivered to such owner, occupant, or person, of the number or numbers assigned said building by the Inspector, shall for each and every offense forfeit and pay a penalty of not less than two (2) or more than twenty (20) dollars.

#### BOARD OF APPEAL

Section 1. If any party or person is aggrieved by the decision of the Inspector, he may take an appeal therefrom by filing a petition with the Mayor, stating his grounds for said appeal, and depositing at the same time the sum of five (5) dollars. The Mayor shall then appoint three disinterested parties to hear the questions at issue and to pass on the work or material in question, or render their finding on the question at issue. If the appeal is sustained, no charge shall be made therefor. But if the Inspector is sustained, the petitioner shall pay the cost of said appeal.



The members of said Board shall be paid fair compensation for each case referred to them by the Mayor, the minimum charge being one (1) dollar for each appeal.

#### PENALTY FOR VIOLATIONS

Section 1. Any and all persons who shall violate any of the provisions of this ordinance or fail to comply therewith, or who shall violate or fail to comply with any order or regulation made thereunder or who shall build in violation of any detailed statement of specifications or plans submitted and approved thereunder, or any certificate or permit issued thereunder, shall severally for each and every such violation and non-compliance respectively, forfeit and pay a penalty in the sum of twenty-five (25) dollars. The imposition of one penalty for any violation of this ordinance shall not excuse the violation, or permit to continue; and all such persons shall be required to correct or remedy such violations or defects within a reasonable length of time; and when not otherwise specified, each ten days that prohibited conditions are maintained shall constitute a separate offense.

Section 2. The application of the above penalty shall not be held to prevent the enforced removal of prohibited conditions.

#### CONFLICTING ORDINANCES REPEALED

Section 1. All ordinances and parts of ordinances inconsistent herewith are hereby repealed.

#### INVALIDITY

Section 1. The invalidity of any section of this ordinance shall not affect the validity of any other section or provisions of this ordinance.

#### DATE OF EFFECT

Section 1. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage, and legal publication.

Dear Sir:

At the request of your Board and in conference with its members, I have prepared the following plans and report relating to the future development of the City of Keene. During the course of this work, which has occupied nearly two years, I have studied the City and surrounding country in detail. I have conferred with officials of the City Departments, the Chamber of Commerce, Societies, and with individuals interested in the growth of the City to learn facts with regard to the problem of growth and to gather suggestions for guiding that growth. I am indebted to Samuel Wadsworth for maps and topographical data.

THE GOOD POINTS OF KEENE

The good points of Keene are many. With some of these points travelers are immediately impressed. Although to the residents of Keene many good points of the City are clearly seen also, these do not always include the things which impress the traveler. To see Keene at its full worth, one must be familiar with other cities of New England and with the small rapidly

growing cities of the West which are said to be "up to date" or "booming."

Familiarity with these towns and cities explains the interest and the wonder with which the long-distance tourist sees Keene. To him Keene is delightful because "it is different." He talks about Keene to his friends because this "difference" has made a lasting impression. Trade of the store-keepers of Keene and much of the general business of the City gain enormously by this genuine interest with which the stranger and the occasional visitor greet the sight of this "different" place. Keene does not need to be dolled-up or to be labeled with enticing signboards to attract the visitors or to urge them to return. To the short-distance tourist Keene is also "different." In seeing town after town of New England, Keene finally holds his attention. He becomes aware that he is seeing something new. He remembers Keene and describes it to others

#### WHY DWELL ON THIS POINT?

Why dwell upon this single point of "difference" in physical appearance? I dwell upon it because I have found that many citizens are unaware either of the fact that "the difference" of Keene is one of the most important assets in the prosperity of the City, or that this distinguishing difference is in danger of being lost. The risk which Keene runs in this respect as time makes inevitable changes in the structure of the City is not that the tourist or the occasional visitor may fail in appreciation. Appreciation of "different" cities is becoming greater year by year as the standardization of cities and the structures within them continue to make the world more monotonous. The real risk lies with the everyday resident, who through constant familiarity with Keene is in danger of losing sight of the relative values of the good points of the City, and may consequently fail to protect those things which are essential to this distinguishing "difference."

Growth and change are greatly to be desired. Towns become dead when change stops. Keene is growing and chang-

ing. Growth and change must be guided intelligently, however, to make the newer Keene structurally better and more attractive than the older. If Keene grows and changes without safeguarding all its good points and at the same time without preventing its present "difference" from sinking to the commonplace, there is no certainty either that the prestige of the City will hold its own or that the money invested in its private and public holdings will keep their security.

Of the good things which form "the difference" of Keene some are indestructible and will remain as long as the City stands, others are perishable and will be lost if they are not protected.

#### A LIST OF KEENE'S GOOD POINTS

- A. First on the list of Keene's good points is that "difference" which makes so great and so lasting an impression upon visitors who know New England well and who are familiar with the 'booming' cities and towns of the West. To define this impression in a word or in a sentence is impossible because many appearances of the City combine to make this one telling effect. From conversations with many travelers, and from an analysis of the effect which the sight of Keene always awakens in myself, I make the following list of thoughts which flash through the mind again and again and make indelible impressions.
1. Keene is sizable but it has not lost the charm of the best New England towns. The City has not spoiled the good things of the town.
  2. Keene's Main Street is as wide and as long as the chief thoroughfare of many a Western city but it does not look raw, bare, and monotonous. Its trees are old, very tall, well arched, and in good condition.

3. Keene's stores on the main street look busy and up to date but the buildings are either old or have been deliberately designed to look old and well established, like some of the most recent architecture of the great cities which frankly attempts to copy old shops and stores.
4. Keene Square is unusually large but it is more symmetrical in shape than most squares and has not been spoiled by ugly monuments, useless fountains and clumsy fences.
5. The skyline of the buildings of Keene Square is unusually interesting on account of the large sloping roofs, hardly ever seen nowadays except where efforts are made to reproduce the effect of old American or old European buildings in order to secure distinction or to attract trade.
6. The centrally placed tall white steeple and white front of the large church on the north side of the square flanked by buildings of brick makes a delightful architectural composition with the simple black iron fence, the not too large monument, the tall tree trunks, and the lofty foliage of the elms. This composition cannot be surpassed in charm and historic interest in New England and cannot be found anywhere in the West.
7. Individual old houses, stores, the City Hall, the old hotels, all modernized and well kept and forming a part of the active life of Keene, contribute unusual interest to the City by their interesting and quaint appearance.
8. Large elm trees over-arch many residence streets but they also make a notable effect in the heart of the shopping district.
9. The large well-equipped school houses are not too

ornate, not too plain, and they do not as a rule contrast unfavorably with the 'colonial' design of most of the old buildings of the City.

10. The attractive ancient dwellings of the outskirts of the City are kept in good repair and are surrounded by well-kept lawns and fine elm trees.
  11. Industrial plants are placed as a rule near the railroad or near water-power and are not scattered in the residence districts.
  12. Stores and shops are grouped at one end of Main Street and not scattered in a confused way through the residence areas.
  13. Large churches of not unpleasant designs are frequently seen with some examples of excellent architecture.
  14. Streets and sidewalks and street lights are as a rule in good condition.
  15. No very glaringly ugly buildings are conspicuously placed and no buildings of great height tending to draw undue attention to themselves on account of height have been erected.
  16. Fire engine houses, police stations, and other City buildings have not been placed on conspicuous sites and glaringly conspicuous designs have not been used.
  17. There are fine groves of unusually large pine trees in the parks. Fancy exotic trees and flowers, "ornamental" fountains and buildings, and unnecessary roads are not seen in the parks.
- B. Among other good points in Keene are the following which are found in well arranged towns and cities:
1. Attractive new dwellings in all quarters of the City, well placed and having pleasant lawns and planting.

2. An attractive railway station and neat looking adjacent sidewalks and road surfaces.
3. Building lines on Main Street and other wide streets well set back and showing few objectionable structures placed too near the street.
4. Few objectionable signboards, light poles, and telegraph poles.
5. Few streets of dangerous steepness or in bad state of repair .
6. Outlying farm lands, fields and woodlands in good condition.
7. Hospitals and Society buildings are well placed and well cared for.
8. The cemeteries are well kept.
9. As a rule the buildings of the industrial plants are substantially built, well maintained, and have yards and grounds in good order.
10. The City has a good water supply, good local sewers, good fire and police protection.
11. The City appears to be prosperous and forward looking and on the threshold of many changes.

#### THE BAD POINTS OF KEENE

If Keene were not a wide awake City or if it lacked unusual attractiveness, a critic might be tempted to speak only of its good points and to remain silent regarding its physical faults. Among New Hampshire Cities, Keene is in fact so thriving industrially and so attractive in general appearance that a frank discussion of its faults need not be feared. A spirited effort to eliminate some of the serious structural faults of the City and to prevent new faults from creeping in is already being made by the Mayor and the City Government, and is evidenced by the activities of the Planning Board backed by the Chamber of Commerce, the Women's Club, the churches, and



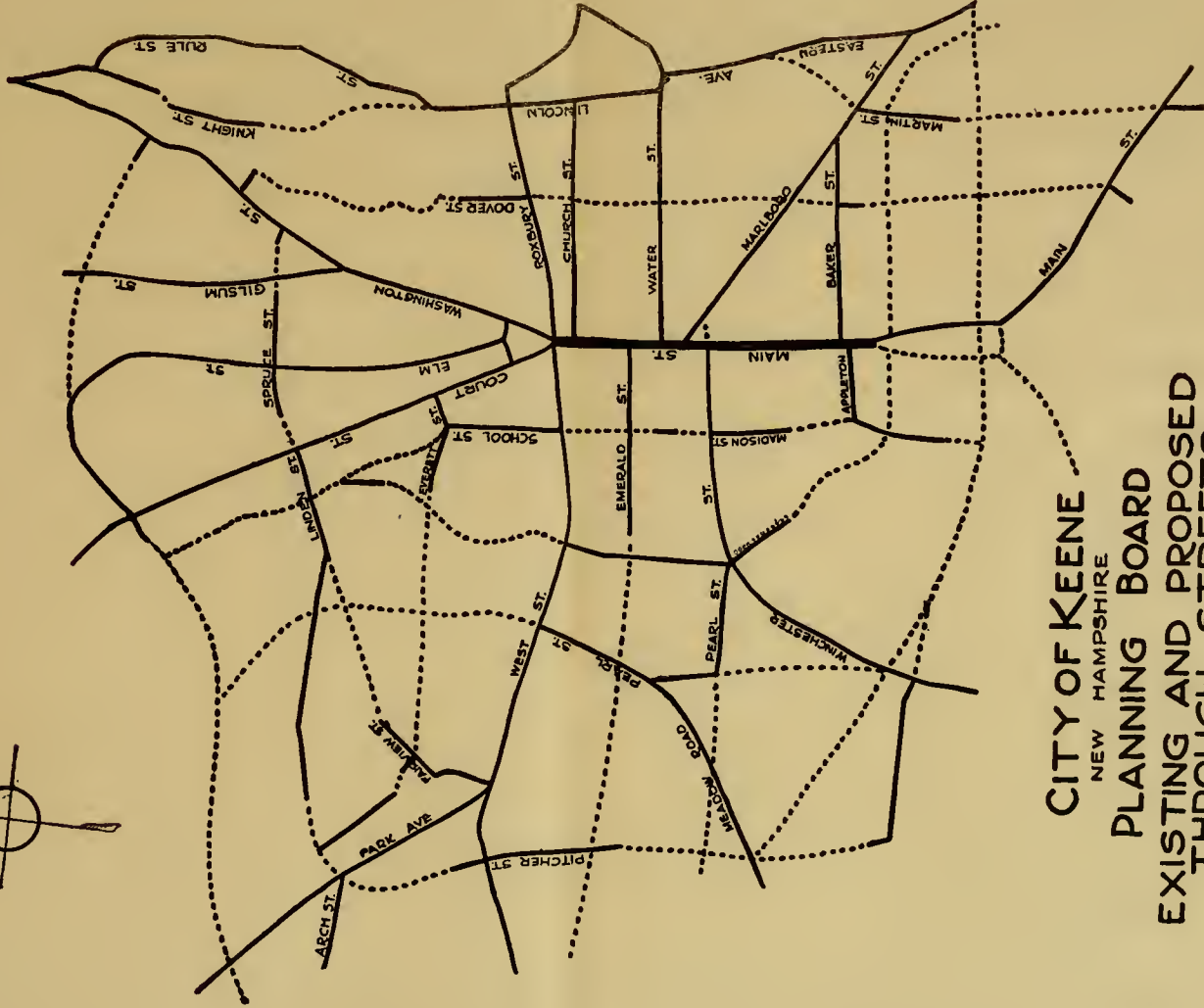
by many individuals and organizations. Keene is worth all the care and skill which its citizens are willing and able to devote to the wise guidance of its future growth. If wise guidance is applied to the natural expansion of the City, it cannot fail to hold its economic gains unless a general depression should overtake the country as a whole, a contingency which seems improbable. Similarly, Keene cannot fail to hold its high place in New England as a "Garden City," a "City of beautiful homes," the "City with the finest main street," the "City with the fewest ugly buildings," the "City which has been helped and not hurt in appearance by the growth of industrial plants," if wise guidance is applied to the changes which are bound to take place as new buildings and new streets are added to the structures and to the highways of past decades.

The "bad points" of Keene are sufficient in number to justify reasonable anxiety for the future of the City if the larger present faults are repeated or if the smaller and more glaring ones are not corrected. Anxiety of this constructive kind does not imply that money must be spent on a large scale for public improvements. It means that money must be saved on a large scale. That can be accomplished by looking ahead to see where possible losses of invested value may take place as a result of haphazard growth of streets and structures and to see where the expense of correcting future costly mistakes can be saved by avoiding such mistakes altogether.

The following list includes the most obvious physical faults of the City and some of those which are brought to light by study of the City plan both as it appears on the map and as it has been revealed upon careful study with the Planning Board with officials of the City, and with citizens who are interested.

1. The exceedingly dangerous shabby looking and unguarded railroad grade crossing at the southeast entrance to Keene on Eastern Avenue. (See page 337).
2. The local outcrop of temporary looking stores and garages on Main Street south of the railway tracks,

- being more or less makeshift alterations or extensions of former residences.
3. The unpleasant, if not unsanitary, appearance of dwellings and premises which back (rather than face) upon streams which flow through the City near Winchester Court, Island Street, Wood Street, Bridge Street, Harrison Street, and elsewhere. (See pages 328, 345 and 346).
  4. The discharge of sewage into the river at points too near the built-up area.
  5. The lack of a satisfactory street plan and of desirable building restrictions in the narrow streets and crowded houses south of Cross Street near Carroll Street, south of Coolidge Street, and elsewhere where private land has been cut into lots without consideration of the effect upon the City plan as a whole.
  6. The seemingly unnecessary bareness of some of the school grounds.
  7. The disagreeable-looking and somewhat dangerous, because narrow, underpass of Marlboro Street beneath the railroad tracks on the road to South Keene.
  8. The absence of marginal streets along portions of the larger cemeteries which consequently back in an unsatisfactory manner upon the rear premises of adjacent private land. (See page 350).
  9. The shapeless bend and the undesirable shrinkage of width of Main Street where it "runs up a tree" south of Appleton Street. (See page 334).
  10. The narrowness of the old Branch bridge on Main Street and the injury to the appearance of this attractive structure wrought by the former trolley bridge.
  11. The considerable height of the river, and consequently of the groundwater in relation to ground upon which houses are destined to be built in the neighborhood of Beaver Brook and in the vicinity of

12. The railroad grade crossing on Main Street. (See page 351).
13. The eclipsing of Keene Square by automobiles which "park" against the iron fence and hide agreeable views of the central parts of the Square.
14. The exceedingly ragged appearance of automobile parking on Main Street which results from the lack of a curb or other barrier against which motors can back to a definite line of stop. (See page 344).
15. The haphazard growth of streets in the large area bounded by The Branch, Congress Street, Baker Street and Main Street, where a series of well placed streets is needed to connect with the present and future streets north of Baker Street. See proposed plan opposite this page.
16. The lack of more north-south through streets in the large area of street fragments east and west of Main Street.
17. The lack of useful east-west through streets about on the line of Appleton-Baker Street, Marlborough-Winchester Street, Leverett-Union-Beaver Streets, Washington Avenue-Spruce Street-Linden Street to West Keene and other east-west streets needed to unite the fragments of existing east-west streets both to secure the best development of local property and to assist a satisfactory and economical growth of the City as a whole with regard to the installation of utilities as well as the accommodation of vehicles and pedestrians.
18. The lack of extensive public reservations of land in or near Tenant Swamp and along some of the borders of Beaver Brook, The Branch, and Ashuelot River to prevent the unsanitary and therefore wasteful and costly occupation of low wet grounds by dwellings.

19. The lack of a useful street plan to guide the future development of streets on the great fields southwest and west of Keene and West Keene along the best lines of which this unspoiled territory of great attractiveness is capable.

#### THE VALUATION OF KEENE AND THE COST OF OLD AND NEW MISTAKES

Not all of the treasure represented by the valuation of Keene would be at stake if the city should continue to grow without constant watchfulness to see that all the good points of the City are protected and that new good points are achieved as changes take place. This investment doubtless would make some return in dollars and in satisfaction even if the City as a structure were allowed to grow without adherence to a carefully thought-out plan because Keene has developed thus far without following a plan (except in regard to its noteworthy main street) and the results of haphazard growth have been in general satisfactory. During this haphazard growth however, much devoted attention has been given by city officers and others to construction details and to the installation and upkeep of public utilities, not to mention the vast amount of painstaking planning which has guided development of private properties and institutions. Keene's returns from its invested value will be more at stake in the coming years without a plan of growth than it has been in past years because the cost of correcting errors in the structure of the City is increasing enormously as temporary wooden buildings are replaced by permanent work of stone and concrete, as more buildings are erected upon given areas of ground, as the cost of utilities and their number both increase, and as the cost of street construction with modern equipments and capacities become a much heavier burden.

Most of the more serious mistakes which have been made in the physical plan of Keene during the past century for lack of adherence to a carefully thought-out plan of growth can be

corrected at moderate cost if they are taken in hand soon. Mistakes made now or during the next few decades, if such mistakes occur, may be too costly to remedy, first because of the greater size or permanent construction methods which modern work usually entails, and second because of the mere newness of the structures and the active service which they may be expected to perform in the community. Unsatisfactory old things can be changed in the process of modernizing, but new things which are unsatisfactory are hard to change until time makes them old.

### WHO BUILT AND PAID FOR KEENE?

The generations of men and women who have lived in Keene since about 1730 built the physical City as we see it today. They cleared the ground and made farms. They built the streets, the houses, the stores, churches, libraries, schools, City Departments and bridges. They planted street trees, provided water supply, and built sewers. They did not, it is true, build the railroad, the telegraph and telephone lines, or all the mills and factories, but without confidence that the people of Keene would ultimately pay their share for all these things, however, none of these improvements and industries would have come into existence.

### HOW MUCH IS KEENE WORTH IN DOLLARS TO-DAY?

The money invested in Keene and represented by homes, factories, stores, water supply, sewage disposal, lighting, fire depot, schools, parks, the cost of which has been paid for out of the pocketbooks of the citizens of this City or which represents the value which is tied up in these things as they stand on the books of the City, amounts to approximately nineteen million dollars, being the assessed value of land and buildings. Vastly more than this has been invested since the City was settled, but as things are reckoned, Keene is represented today by the sum of about nineteen million dollars.

### IS ANY PART OF THAT \$19,000,000 WASTE?

Yes, there is waste at Eastern Avenue at the grade crossing where lack of good planning places human life constantly in danger, consequently work must be done over again here. This doing-things-over-again means waste. There is waste at Main Street where Winchester and Marlborough Streets fail to connect and where a house of two must be torn down to afford convenient unification of these important thoroughfares. At both ends of Spruce Street waste is inevitable if houses are allowed to block the east and west extension of Spruce Street. There is waste south of Appleton Street of Main Street where this notable thoroughfare 'runs up a tree' and becomes a second-rate crooked street without distinction and where to correct this error one or more house lots must be purchased. Along parts of the Ashuelot River there is waste where houses have been allowed to injure the appearance of the Ashuelot River by being built too near the river bank, by **backing** upon the river instead of facing it, thus creating squalid-appearing conditions where great attractiveness was possible at less ultimate cost. On the banks of Beaver Brook and The Branch similar waste has occurred which can only be corrected by the expenditure of money for doing-things-over-again or for doing things less well than would have been possible if the best and cheapest method of developing the borders of these streams had been planned beforehand.

### IN THE BEGINNING DID KEENE FOLLOW A PLAN?

Yes, Main Street and Keene Square with its two branching streets, Washington Street and Court Street, were planned by the Town almost at the start.

### DID KEENE PROFIT BY FOLLOWING THIS FIRST PLAN?

Yes, the first road and building work was done without



confusion and led to the gradual creation of one of the most convenient and attractive main streets and squares in New England, if not in the East. Money was saved and the Town gained in prestige and in the satisfaction of daily use by following this predetermined plan until its final accomplishment became a fact.

### WHY WASN'T A PLAN MADE FOR KEENE'S SUBSEQUENT GROWTH?

The first plan was sufficient for a long time. Gradually it was outgrown, new streets were needed, and these were added as branches of the main streets. The Town was prosperous and the residents forgot the practical advantages of making plans for extensive and costly new public works and went ahead building streets without a well thought-out plan.

### ARE CITY OFFICIALS TO BLAME?

No, city officials of Keene are not to blame because to none of them has ever been delegated the work of creating or following a general plan for the future growth of the whole City and the not less important work of keeping such a plan constantly up-to-date as the City grows. For many years city officials and individuals have fully realized the need of a well considered plan, but not until recently have these hopes been realized by the appointment of a planning board charged with the duty of preparing such a plan to prevent the waste involved in haphazard growth.

### ARE THERE ANY ADVANTAGES IN THIS WASTE?

No, the disadvantages of this kind of waste have become so great all over the United States that Planning Boards are being created in the most enlightened communities to put a stop to it by careful systematic planning. Planning means thinking ahead to devise the best possible way to avoid future expense, waste, delay, danger, and loss of value.

### CAN ALL THIS WASTE BE RECKONED IN DOLLARS?

No, you cannot reckon the losses that would be brought about if the appearance of Keene were hurt and the present faults were not corrected during the future growth of the City. If Keene became ugly in part or whole, if it lost that "different appearance," if its present structural faults were not corrected and if similar faults should creep into the newer growing parts of the City, the loss would be very great. You could not estimate the loss in dollars in the beginning. At first you would hear fewer local praises of the attractiveness of Keene. You would learn of fewer tourists who had praised Keene in their distant home towns. Later you would hear complaints from some of the more "fussy" residents of Keene. In the long run this loss of the favorable comment would begin to show itself in a shrinkage of tourist trade, in a reduced demand for 'private places' for factory sites and for stores. Keene would then begin to feel the loss in dollars. Just how far that loss would go in thousands or in hundreds of thousands of dollars as the prestige of Keene and its convenience as a place for manufacturing and business might wane, no one can say. Certainly the loss would be great enough to justify the most careful forethought on the part of the City at the present day to prevent such an unfortunate possibility.

### WHO PAYS FOR WASTE OF THIS KIND?

The men and women of Keene pay for the waste. They pay for all construction work which is done by the City and they pay twice when that work is done over again for want of careful planning. They also pay for the inconvenience, danger, and the loss of income, which result when poorly planned things are not corrected. The men and women of Keene would pay for waste if the City should lose prestige through the creeping-in of ugliness and the loss of that "different appearance" which today gives Keene distinction.

## HOW CAN KEENE STOP THESE THREE KINDS OF WASTE?

Keene can stop the three kinds of waste of doing-things-over-again, doing things badly, and the waste incident to the loss of present attractiveness, by backing up the work of the Planning Board. The Planning Board was established for these purposes. By applying modern methods of planning to guide the general physical growth of cities and towns, many of the most enlightened communities of this country are stopping these three kinds of waste.

### HOW TOWN PLANNING SAVES COST

Planning Boards were established in New England and throughout the country to secure economy in the growth of towns and cities. Previously most communities had grown without sufficient guidance with the result that confusion of street arrangement was almost universal, unsanitary occupation of wet land was frequent, lack of playground space was common, and the deterioration of residence districts by the unwise location of factories and garages was taking place to an alarming extent. Planning Boards were created to study the present and probable future needs of such communities and to prepare plans to guide all these developments to secure order, convenience and economy. The following is a list of some of the activities of Planning Boards in cities like Keene and the kinds of costs which may be saved by planning.

1. The prevention of the formation of dead-end streets where through streets are needed. Such through streets save the cost of laying and maintaining dead-end water mains and dead-end sewers with expensive connections and detours. The costs of roundabout connections for street lighting service, and the cost of detours for street delivery, collection and cleaning service are saved. By increasing the effective operation radius of fire apparatus, police patrol, and other equipments, such through streets tend to reduce the number and the size of or-

ganizations or equipments of these kinds, and to that extent reduce cost.

2. The prevention of the formation of jogged or off-set street connections where straight connections are needed. Straight street connections simplify and therefore reduce the cost of all the utility installations and services mentioned above in paragraph No. 1.

3. The prevention of the construction of narrow streets where wide ones will be needed. The whole or a large part of the costs of future widenings of narrow streets are thus saved.

4. The prevention of the construction of wide streets where narrow ones will be satisfactory. The waste of land and the cost of construction of streets unnecessarily wide are saved.

5. The prevention of excessively steep gradients on important through streets through faulty location. The cost of special road surfacing, special gutters, special crossings and catch basins, the cost of special policing or fire protection, and the subsequent costs for regrading and for the entailed costs of grade damages are saved by finding locations for such streets on ground of gentle slope.

6. The prevention of the wasteful and costly delays imposed upon all forms of street traffic by the presence of jogged, narrow, or excessively steep streets.

7. The prevention of railroad grade-crossing separation problems of great magnitude and cost. Often the occurrence of such problems can be prevented and the costs saved in whole or in part by placing the location of future crossings on ground whose contour will assist the solution of such problems.

8. The prevention of the following:—location of important street junctions at points of dangerous steepness; the bringing together of many streets at a single junction point of probable congestion; the creation of street junctions at dangerous angles or curves. The cost of the whole or a large part of

special traffic policing at such junctions can be saved if these requirements are met. The large sources of accidents arising from these faults are eliminated.

9. The prevention of too long postponement of playground and park takings in residential districts where such recreation grounds will be needed. The extra cost of purchasing land at a late date when land values are high and when the removal of buildings becomes necessary, is saved.

10. The prevention of unnecessary playground and park acquisitions in regions, as for example in business or in manufacturing districts, where the need for such open spaces will not justify the cost of land and the withdrawal of taxable property from assessment.

11. The prevention of the use of land (including height and area of structures which may be built on it) for purposes or in a manner at variance with the most desirable development of a community. The costs of property depreciation and loss of development costs are saved by applying in time adequate protective zoning restrictions.

12. The prevention of the unsanitary occupation of stream or pond borders by buildings where proper sewer connections and ground water outfalls cannot be secured. The cost of the subsequent acquisition by the City of developed property to abate sanitary nuisances of the kind which almost inevitably follow the above conditions may be saved or the alternate expense of installing costly sewers and drains is saved.

13. The prevention of scattered arrangements or confused groupings of public and semi-public buildings, where compact or symmetrically arranged groups of such buildings would be:—more convenient of access by the public, more economical to administer and to police, more easily provided with public utilities, more readily assured good light and air, more readily protected in case of fire, and more attractive in appearance.

14. The prevention of monotonous arrangements of streets which would repeat the same block patterns, the same street alignments, cross sections and street junctions over large areas at the cost of unnecessary dreariness and lack of variety both in the general plan of the town and in the appearance of buildings which in spite of architectural variations would be handicapped by an initial sameness of site, exposure, and approach.

15. The prevention of the following through publicity and by cooperation with art commissions or with other responsible public or private organizations:—

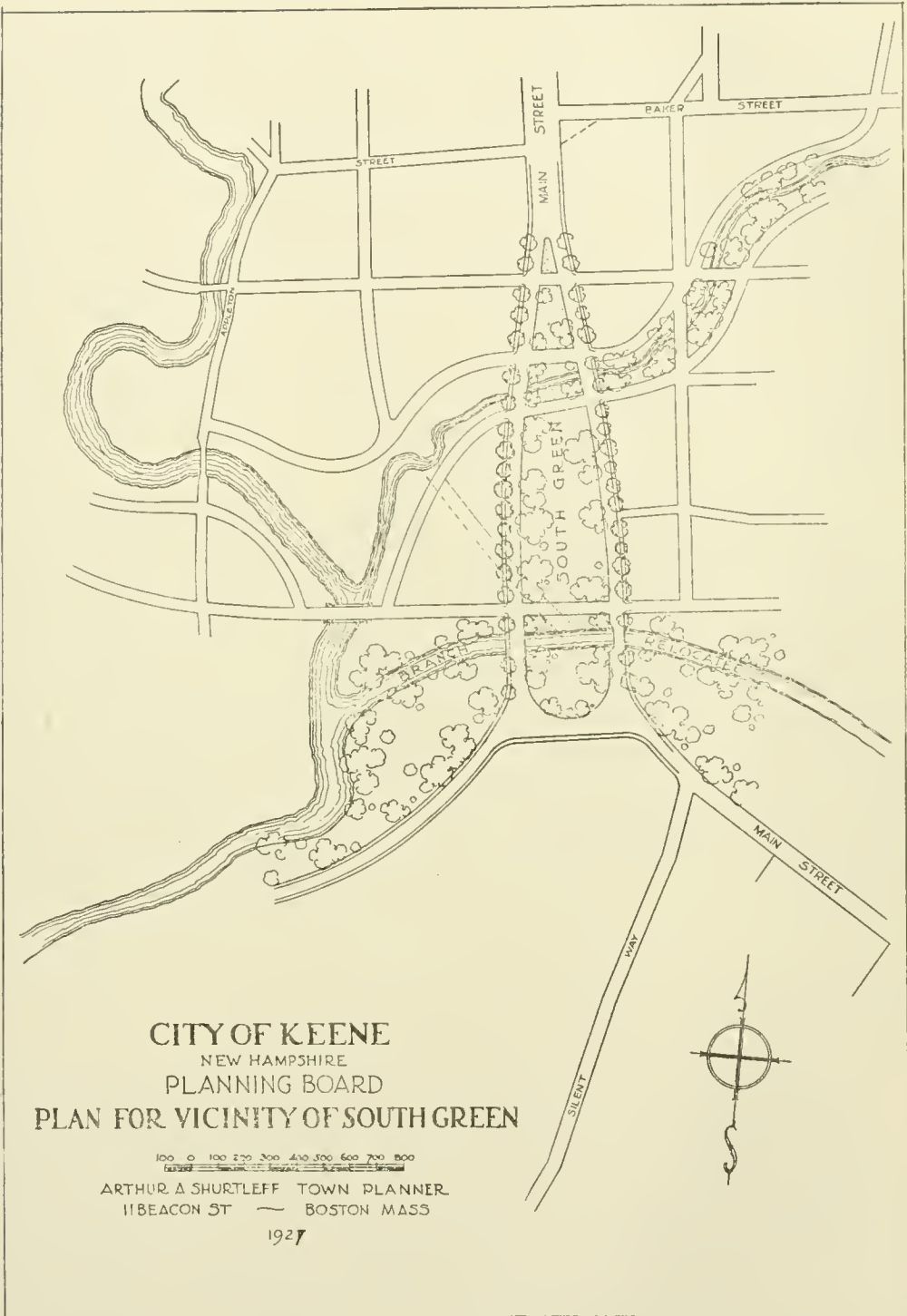
A. The erection of ugly buildings, monuments, or other structures which would injure the appearance of the city.

B. A loss of attractiveness to the city by the unnecessary removal of distinguished structures or monuments or by a change from old and excellent types of architecture where adhere to such old types would preserve desirable unity and interest.

### SOUTH GREEN

By South Green is meant the proposed shapely area of open ground at the southerly end of Main Street beginning about 500 feet south of Baker Street and extending across The Branch. The existence of the shapely Central Square in the heart of Keene, and the noteworthy straight section of Main Street south of this Square, require the development of an equally attractive center or terminal point at the southerly end of Main Street where, at the present time, there is much low, wet ground, and where the development of unsatisfactory housing conditions and a confused system of local streets seems imminent.

Briefly the scheme for South Green is to retain as an easterly boundary road the present narrow section of Main Street and to arrange west of it in a symmetrical way, a new street which would form the westerly margin of South Green and



involve the straightening of The Branch and the construction of a new bridge, as indicated. This new bridge should form an exceedingly attractive feature of the park, and would obviate the necessity and the cost of replacing the present bridge. The proposed South Green should also serve to give distinction to the development of the neighboring property between Manchester Street and Baker Street, and should form an attractive and convenient approach to the whole territory west of Silent Way, where the construction of dwellings is probably to take place on a large scale during the next fifty to seventy-five years when available high ground lying to the east has been developed.

The relation of South Green to the proposed parkways along Beaver Brook and Ashuelot River is shown also on the plan of South Green, page 335, and the general street plan page 325. Briefly, the immediate shores of these streams should be reserved against building operations and provided with roadways upon which abutting private lots will face in an orderly way. The streams will be protected against defacement and will become the central features of attractive parkways with double roadways and tree planting spaces. A development of this kind although directed primarily to prevent the creation of unsanitary and ugly conditions along these streams like those near Wood Street and Island Street, would create a pleasure way of unusual attractiveness.

### BRIDGE OVER THE BRANCH

This old stone bridge is an asset to Keene because it is an interesting and historic structure. It should be preserved after the elimination of the temporary iron trolley trestle on its westerly side. To widen the bridge would be out of the question, but by using it as one of two bridges as shown on the plan, page 335, it is sufficiently wide for one-way traffic. See general description of South Park.



## KEENE A ONE STREET CITY

An examination of the plan of Keene shows the existence of only one north-south thoroughfare,—Main Street. It is unthinkable that the City during the next century or more can thrive with only one link between the north and south other than the improvements already mentioned for Eastern Avenue and the development elsewhere described of School Street and Island on the west. Certainly in the half mile space between Eastern Avenue and Main street at least one additional north-south thoroughfare should be provided for local use. At the moment such a thoroughfare can be created, as shown on the plan, by the utilization of Dover Street, the nearly vacant land south of Dover Street, and the brook valley lying between Water Street and Marlboro Street. In a northerly direction Dover Street can also be extended as shown, following the brook valley to Knight Street, and on the south it can be connected with Belmont Avenue and thence to Main Street at a point east of St. Joseph's Cemetery. Not to arrange for a useful modern thoroughfare through this section of the City means to throw away much of the future value of property in this entire section and to place a premium upon the continued development of a confused and illogical development of narrow, crooked and dead-end streets where a fine arterial line is both necessary and thoroughly feasible.

## EASTERN AVENUE

If Keene had deliberately attempted to create an exceedingly dangerous and badly connected north-south main thoroughfare on the easterly side of the City, it could hardly have exceeded the present faults of Eastern Avenue. At its southerly end this important artery runs the gauntlet of a railway grade crossing which is probably one of the most hazardous in New England and bears a record of serious accidents and fatalities. At its northerly end Eastern Avenue connects with a dangerous and inconvenient jog with South Lincoln Street.

The correction of both faults should be undertaken by the City at the earliest moment.

The correction of the dangerous grade crossing can be brought about by a separation of grades under both railway branches by the method shown on the plan, which would provide good headroom and a minimum of cost for an under-pass with satisfactory gradients. A right of way for this improvement should be secured over the intervening vacant land before this property is occupied with structures, and before an extension with Martin Street is not rendered impossible by the erection of houses opposite the corner of Marlborough and Martin Streets, as shown on the plan.

A satisfactory connection between the easterly section of Keene and the rapidly growing southeasterly section requires a proper development of Eastern Avenue and an extension of it toward the south by way of Martin Street, with a branch connection with Baker Street—Appleton Street as shown on the plan.

#### WEST STREET—ROXBURY STREET

These two streets form the great east-west cross street and might be appropriately described as the Forty-Second Street of Keene. As time goes on these streets will gain vastly in importance, and to permit them to remain narrow would be a serious error of judgment. Unless Keene's development lags, these streets will need width sufficient to accommodate four lines of vehicles with wide sidewalks. The methods by which this can be accomplished without destruction of present buildings or without injury to trees and private dooryards is discussed at length on page 342.

The street trees of these two streets are at the present time a great asset to Keene, and no construction work should be

carried on which will endanger them, until a time has arrived when the requirements of traffic may require a substantial increase in width of traveled way.

The present construction of Roxbury Street near Main Street is the beginning of the kind of undesirable strangulation of thoroughfares which one sees in many of the growing cities of New England and which, in the long run, entails heavy expense for widening. Now is the time to arrange for future widenings before buildings of a permanent kind have made future widenings impracticable. Consideration of the large sums of money invested in the properties along Roxbury Street and West Street, and consideration of the future probable greatly increased valuation of these properties, necessitates provision for future street widths. If street widenings are not arranged for, so they can be carried out economically during the next fifty years or earlier, much depreciation of property values on both streets may be anticipated and a transfer of potential development to other streets of greater capacity.

#### NORTH STREET—WASHINGTON AVENUE— PERHAM STREET

As shown on the diagram, page 325, these fragmentary streets if united would form a useful east-west line across the City. Not to arrange now for connection of these streets means to throw away the substantial promise to be expected from the future development of all the land in the neighborhood of these streets. If connection between these streets is not arranged for, each little street fragment is destined to become the center of a cluster of cramped lots and ill-developed property not yielding the returns which are expectable from proper development.

#### APPLETON STREET—BAKER STREET

Here again at Main Street occurs a jog almost equal in its drawbacks to that at Winchester Street—Marlboro Street. Steps should be taken to eliminate this interruption to the best

uses of the property on the east and west sides of Main Street and to the best development of Keene as a whole.

#### WINCHESTER STREET—MARLBORO STREET

The future relations between the southwesterly portion of Keene, including West Keene itself, and the southeasterly portions of the City will be embarrassed if the present jogged connection between these important thoroughfares at Main Street is not removed. This rudimentary jog was satisfactory in the village days of Keene for the use of chaises, and even for coaches and other larger vehicles. To force modern vehicular traffic around this jog and to entail the unnecessary cost of maintaining public utilities on a zigzag course like this, is wholly out of keeping with the future development of Keene. At the moment only two dwellings interfere with the elimination of the jog. This primitive disturbance in the development of an exceedingly valuable east-west thoroughfare should be corrected.

#### CITY IMPROVEMENTS IN KEENE WITHOUT COST

In parts of Keene where vacant lots or large areas of vacant land exist in the path of growth, streets and structures will inevitably be built upon and under such ground and much money will be spent for them whether a wise plan is followed or not. A wise plan means one which is more convenient, more frugal of ground and opportunity than a program which proceeds haphazard without thought of all alternatives, all uses and all future practical needs. A wise plan should therefore cost less to execute than a guess-work program. On the other hand, a wise plan requires painstaking forethought, consultation with all the City Department and with all interested parties, and consideration of the long-time interest of all owners. Such a plan also requires patient pursuit over long terms of years. Its economies, its obstacles, and its ultimate use must be kept always before the public and constantly in the minds of the local owners of property. A good plan of this kind con-

sequently requires a degree of energy and persistency for its inception and its progress which is wholly absent in the case of a care-free course of city growth whose haphazard start requires no forethought, no patient conferences, and affords no anxiety until its mistakes and costly blunders become apparent.

When I say city improvement in Keene can be accomplished without cost, I mean without cost for the correction of the mistakes which have resulted already in Keene for want of planning and without cost greater than that which would be required in any case to build the streets and structures which are involved.

In the case of desirable street extensions in open land free from structures, these extensions should be worked out in conference with all the owners whose properties are involved and in consultation with the City Departments whose relations with such extensions will become intimate in years to come. If necessary, public hearings should be held. If this co-operative planning is carefully done it should result ultimately in increased value to all the land over and above the value which it would possess without such combined study. If an owner has a real grievance that grievance will be made apparent by the conferences and such an owner may have recourse if necessary to law, but grievances of this kind are less in the long run in case of a plan made by co-operation than in case of a project carried through single-handed without regard to neighboring interests or the interests of the whole City.

In the case of desirable street extensions in districts already occupied with structures, consultation regarding the most satisfactory solution of such a problem carried forward by the planning board in conference with the property owners and if necessary made a matter of public hearing should result in finding the least costly and most desirable solution of the project. If the work is to be done at once land could immediately be taken for the purpose without uncertainty regarding the relation of the changes to the development of the whole

City. If the work is to be done ultimately after a long term of years the project is shown on plans which can be referred to by the owners of adjacent property to aid the development of land and to take fullest advantage of the improvement when it is carried out. If unprincipled persons wish to take advantage of a needed public improvement by building in the bed of such a project in the hope of securing eventual damages, their chances of success under existing laws are perhaps greater than would be the case if no rational plan for the future were prepared and made public. But this opportunity for gain is small in comparison with the legitimate gains which accrue to the City as a whole and to private property when a rational plan is prepared and followed in a businesslike way.

In the case of street widening operations, co-operative planning work is needed through the planning board with the street department, the assessors, the city engineer, property owners, and all others interested. Such work usually becomes the subject of public hearings. Preparation of careful plans indicate the costs which are involved, the damages if any may be involved, the betterments which may be expected, whether a levy for such betterments is made or not. No chance can exist for wasteful expense.

The fact must be borne in mind that works of the kind described are for city improvement,—they assist communication, they reduce the cost of installing public utilities, they tend to reduce taxes, and they enhance the value of land. It is with an eye to improvement and to the enhancement of values that improvements of this kind are considered and executed. Under these circumstances if carefully considered plans are carried out, the chance of working an injustice to property owners is reduced to the lowest possible terms and at the same time the opportunities for redress of a reasonable kind to owners really aggrieved is increased.

## KEENE SQUARE

Central Square as it exists to-day, combined with Main Street, is one of the finest Civic Centers in the land. The task is to preserve it from injury and to mend its few scars.

To protect the Square:—

1. No buildings should be erected farther forward than the fronts of the present buildings.

2. The height of buildings should not exceed the present general heights.

3. The Elm trees should be preserved and when a tree dies it should be replaced promptly with a sizable new tree of the same kind.

4. No additional monuments, fountains, statues, flag poles or other structures should be erected. No public toilets, even if installed below ground, should be placed here.

5. New buildings erected on the Square should conform to the present rather plain old style architecture of the Square. When old buildings are remodelled within, the present fronts might be retained in order to preserve to that extent the distinction of the Square and consequently to attract trade. Citizens of Keene should be kept informed by photographs and by description of the extraordinary extent to which old fashioned-looking stores, offices, banks and hotels are being built in our largest cities to attract favorable notice and to foster trade and business.

6. Special permits for the construction of exceptionally tall buildings or towers in the Square should not be granted.

7. The use, height, and area restrictions of the Zoning Ordinance should be maintained to safeguard the present value, the future earning power, and the distinguished appearance of the Square.

8. The materials of sidewalks, paths, curb stones, fences, and the design of lights, poles and other street fixtures should harmonize as far as practicable with the old fashioned style of buildings of the Square.

9. The appointments of all buildings should be thoroughly up to date as regards accessibility, good natural and artificial light, ventilation, cleanliness, fire safety, convenience for occupants and for patrons, and attractiveness. To the merchants, hotel keepers and real estate men of Keene who are already abreast of the times, this need hardly be said, but on the other hand there is a lack of appreciation of the fact that a preservation for business reasons of the old fashioned architecture of the Square is also a modern requirement and a real and important financial asset.

To mend the few scars of the Square the following things should be done:—

A. Motor vehicles should not be allowed to park against the fence of the Square, thus hiding the attractive central portion of the Square and interfering with good general views of the nearby buildings to those making a circuit of the Square in vehicles or on foot.

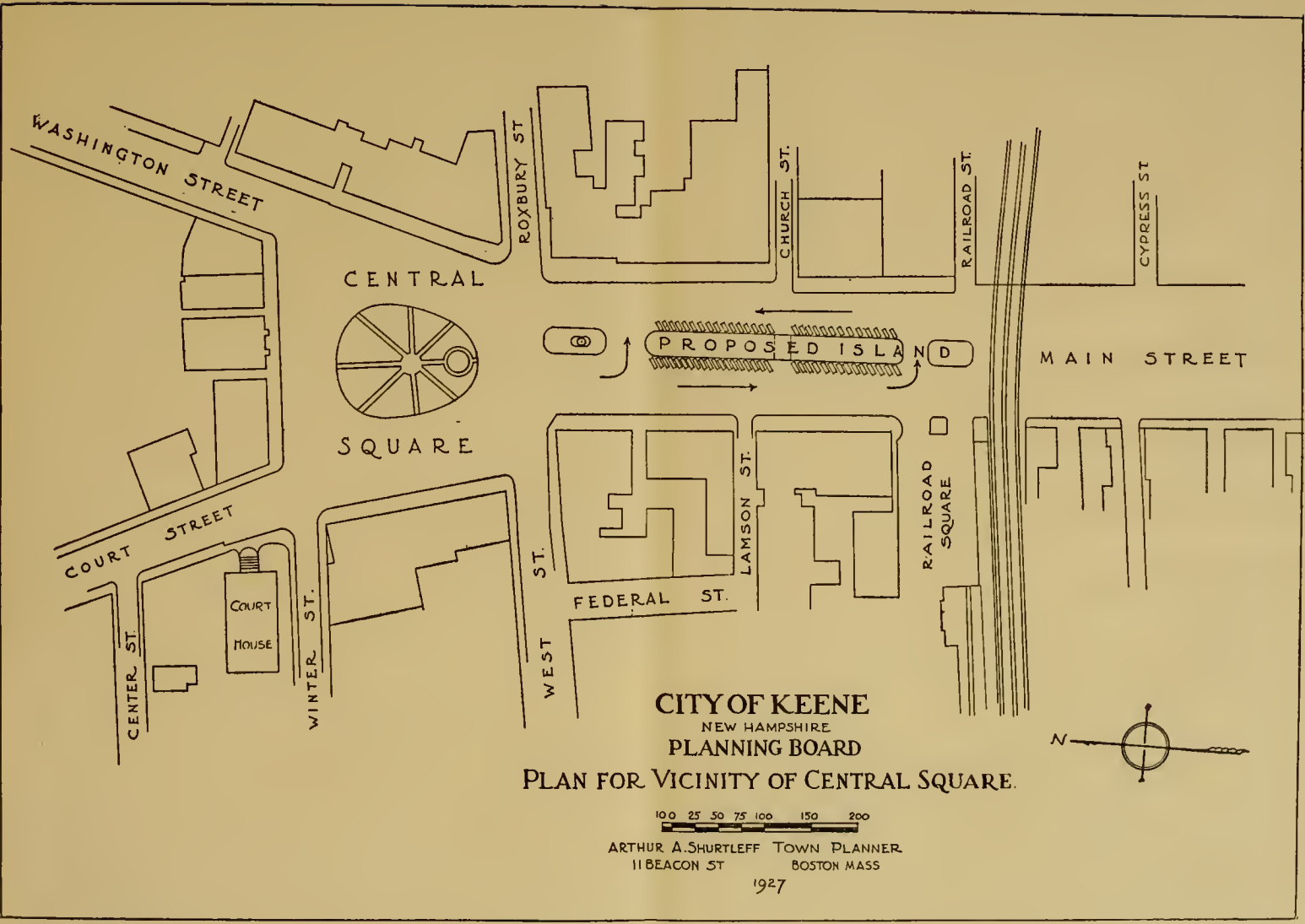
B. The broken or bent portions of the present attractive and appropriate fence should be replaced or repaired.

C. An enlargement should be made in the granolithic platform on which the memorial flagstaff stands in order to include the crossing used by pedestrians. See plan opposite this page.

D. Definite parking line curbs for vehicles should be arranged in the center of Main Street between the Square and the Boston & Maine crossing. Such curbs should be set about 20 feet apart to leave an uninterrupted central vista to the Square even when vehicles are parked in great numbers, and to give a raised walk space for pedestrians. This space should be paved preferably with brick and provided with lights on its edges (not along the center). The design of light standards chosen should harmonize with the colonial architecture of the Square.

E. An island of safety should be installed at the throat of the Boston & Maine Railroad parking space to provide a con-







venient and safe crossing for pedestrians and to make possible a right and left routing for vehicles using this parking space.

#### AREA OF LEVEL UPLAND OF KEENE

Because there is a limited amount of high and dry and at the same time comparatively level land in Keene, care should be taken to see that the streets laid out upon it are well placed. This is the land which will be utilized first as the City expands. If the streets upon this ground are not placed with good judgment they will hamper the future development of the City. They should be placed to protect the borders of the river, streams and swamps against unsanitary and unsightly use. They should be placed with consideration of satisfactory approach to the valleys and ridges of the adjacent hills upon which the City will be doubtless forced to climb in distant time when the available level and dry ground area is exhausted.

#### THE LOW RIVER BANKS AND SWAMPS OF KEENE

Streams and swamps are an asset to a city if they are protected against unsanitary and unsightly use. In Boston, to quote a near example, the system of useful and attractive City and Metropolitan parkways is based almost wholly upon the protection of such water and swamp areas. In most American cities the parkway and park systems depend upon the presence of waterways, swamps and marshes which required protection. Keene must take steps soon to realize her assets in Tenant Swamp, Ashuelot River, Beaver Brook and the Branch, or else pay the penalty of costly remedial measures at a later day. The steps which should be taken are these:—

1. Plan a system of useful streets for gradual future construction when needed on the upland between the banks and the growing parts of the City.

2. Adopt this plan through the Planning Board powers and then protect it from violation by a Board of Survey.

3. This plan should permit no future streets to dead-end at the river. It should provide future marginal roadways on

the banks at a level which will ensure the accommodation of suitable sewers which may be needed for dwellings or industrial plants built on the upland side of such future roadways. It should ensure good lot frontages upon such marginal roadways and these roadways should receive the ends of all streets leading toward the low ground.

4. Acquire for park purposes, for sanitary reasons, for reasons of policing, all the narrow (or wide) strips of bank between the edge of the marginal roadway and the water. Under no circumstances should use be made of these banks for dwellings. Encourage the growth of native trees and wild shrubbery on the acquired park-like land.

5. If possible lower the normal level of the stream or pond, thus lowering the ground water adjacent to the landward side of the marginal roadways to render the ground drier for cellars and for the best operation of sewers.

6. Determine the probable future location of bridges on ground most favorable for construction and at points where connections will be needed with the street systems of both sides of the stream.

Programs like the above are being inaugurated and carried out all over the civilized world where streams, rivers and swamps exist near cities and towns. There is nothing singular in the application of such measures to Keene. If such measures are adopted, land near these banks will become much more valuable, land more distant from the banks will gain in value, useful and pleasant roadways will be created gradually, and finally the dangers and the costs incident to unsanitary and unsightly stream border conditions will be extinguished.

#### SET-BACK LINES FOR STREETS OF KEENE

A set-back line along a street represents an agreement on the part of the owners of property and of the city that the fu-

ture light and air conditions of the street shall not be jeopardized by the act of any abutter who may wish to erect a building nearer the sidewalk than the buildings of his neighbors. Such a set-back line if properly placed, guarantees adequate roadway and sidewalk width in the future for all abutting property.

Property on too-narrow streets gains enormously by the application of set-back lines unless the lot depth are too shallow to accommodate buildings after the restrictions have been put in force.

Set-back lines are most easily applied and most eagerly sought by owners when dwellings or other structures have been set back already with yard or lawn spaces in front, for example Roxbury Street, West Street, and indeed most of the residential streets of Keene. In such cases the advantages to be secured by the restrictions are so great that no difficulty is experienced in securing permanent set-back agreements unless very shallow lots are encountered. In these unusual instances the owners may rightfully ask for damages. In Winchester, Massachusetts, over thirteen miles of highway have been provided with set-back lines without a single instance in which recourse to law has become necessary.

## PARKS

Keene's parks and all other public lands are shown on the map of the city. In general the park areas are well distributed. They will eventually become indispensable to the City for recreative use. At present the small size of the City and the presence near the heart of the City of large areas of vacant land which serve in many respects for public recreation, reduces the intensive and general use which the public parks will supply eventually when the built-up areas are consolidated. Now, however, is the time to secure parks of adequate size while ample unoccupied land of good contour and excellent ground-cover is available for a choice.

I recommend the acquisition for park purposes of a larger acreage of land adjacent to Wheelock and The Ladies Park. These notable forests require more ample ground around them both as a buffer space to separate the pine forests from adjacent private land which is being rapidly developed for residence purposes and also to provide opportunity for kinds of recreation which cannot be enjoyed in the woodlands without destruction of the trees, and without intrusion upon the sylvan quiet. Space for baseball and football fields and ample ground for all other outdoor sports should be secured both to protect the woodlands and to supply a want which will become greater as the districts which surround these parks are built up. These parks should be surrounded on all sides by marginal streets which will encourage adjacent private land to develop with houses facing rather than backing upon the park.

Substantial acquisition of land should be made in Tenant Swamp and along the borders of the Ashuelot River, Beaver Brook and the Branch for the strategic reasons given at length on page 345 and 347 and for park and parkway use. The presence of these extensive swamps and water course areas really forces Keene either to become possessed of a system of exceedingly picturesque and useful water parkways and parks, or to pay the heavy toll of cost in dollars and ugliness which a failure to meet these topographical conditions rightly will entail in coming years. In brief the streams and swamps which surround Keene can be regarded both as an unusual civic opportunity and an equally unusual menace to the prosperity of the City. The outcome will be determined by the promptness and by the workmanlike manner with which these low grounds are taken in hand by the City.

I recommended the acquisition of the swamp and stream borders for the above reasons and to provide a notable addition to the attractiveness of Keene as a place of residence, a place of work, and a resort for tourists.

## LAYOUT OF PARKS

General plans for the internal layout of the larger parks of the City ought to be determined in the near future. This is true of Wheelock Park where a simple system of through roads would be useful and would display the attractiveness of these woodlands to visitors. The present winding roads with their sharp curvatures need modification as they were laid out to accommodate horse-drawn vehicles. When the lines of future roads have been established, the planting of additional trees in this Park and in the other large parks can be arranged without chance of interference from future roadways. I have spoken at length elsewhere in the report about the importance of marginal roads for all these parks, the purpose of such public ways being to cause adjacent private property to be developed in an orderly way with buildings which face upon the park, thus avoiding the drawbacks incident to rear premises exposed to public land of this kind.

## TREE PLANTING

Much of the attractiveness of Keene depends upon its large fine trees. Most of the central portion of the City is well planted with street trees but here and there there are notable exceptions. For example, on the south side of West Street from the Colony property westward, no trees have been planted inside the fence lines. If trees were planted here they would increase the pleasantness of the street and the value of adjacent property. An examination of other streets of the City shows the need of similar attention both on the edges of the street and within the margins of private property.

## SCHOOLS

In general the locations of the schools in Keene are well planned in distribution, but the adjacent playgrounds are usually too small for the use of the great number

of pupils during school hours. After-school-hour-use of these playgrounds will increase as neighboring land is built up more closely with houses. Moreover as time goes on more land will be required for extension of the school buildings. For both reasons the area of these playgrounds should be increased while unoccupied adjacent land still remains available for acquisition. These extensions should be generous if they are to be in keeping with the general modern tendency in this country toward exceeding ample open spaces surrounding schools.

### CEMETERIES

If excellence of upkeep, pleasantness of site and attractiveness of embellishment were the only elements which constitute the excellence of cemeteries, Keene would possess the best. Unfortunately the side and rear boundary lines of the cemeteries of Keene are not satisfactory. In general these boundaries back upon the back premises of dwellings or upon land which is destined to become the rear of private house lots. This relationship is unfortunate for the cemeteries. The incongruity of the proximity of consecrated ground to the most commonplace and private aspect of domestic life is manifest. Moreover under these mutually embarrassing relations the marginal lots of the cemetery are forced to back upon the adjacent private land. Petty trespass is also encouraged.

For these reasons a cemetery, like a park, requires marginal roads for all its boundaries. Such roads automatically lead the dwellings of adjacent lots to face rather than to back upon the consecrated ground. Similarly, the marginal lots of a cemetery under these mutually accommodated relations, present their most attractive aspects towards the adjacent private land. Petty trespass is also restrained and can be met by the customary policing of the City streets.



### LOT SIZES

A glance at the map of Keene shows an extraordinary variety of lot sizes for the accommodation of dwellings. Very small lots, probably too small, may be seen in the vicinity of Dover Street, and very large deep lots between Carroll Street and Howard Street and elsewhere. As time goes on, unless a useful system of subdividing streets is arranged for the large areas between thoroughfares, the intervening land cannot be utilized for dwelling purposes without running the risk of developing lots in the rears of lots. Lots in the rears of lots are one of the evils which all growing cities are obliged to combat. The evil can be met by an adequate system of subdividing streets.

When a general plan of main thoroughfares has been adopted by the City, the owners of large plots of ground (too small for single lots) should be encouraged to submit plans showing proposed land subdivision. This will enable the City and private owners to cooperate both with regard to the installation of public utilities and to see that every opportunity is given private land to develop its very best opportunities. In the course of time a plan showing all subdividing streets in the central portion of the City should be provided by cooperation between the Planning Board and the Board of Survey and made a matter of record so that no mutilation of a wisely arranged scheme of streets can take place.

### RAILROAD GRADE CROSSINGS

Obviously in the layout of future streets consideration should be given to the abolishment of grade crossings, either at once or as a gradual program. The planning of local subdividing streets should be arranged to accommodate itself to

the main thoroughfare crossings so that an unnecessary number of costly grade separations will not become necessary. Sites for grade separation should be chosen where the tracks are higher or lower than adjacent land to reduce the cost of bridges or underpasses.

## ITEMS OF INTEREST

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The Keene Water Works were established and have been extended from time to time by authority of a charter from the legislature of New Hampshire, granted July 3, 1861, and amendments thereto dated June 24, 1868.

The first contract was made with the Patent Water and Gas Pipe Co., of New Jersey, September 3, 1868.

Water was let into the system November, 1869.

1872.

Beech Hill reservoir was built and connected with the system.

1882.

The Waring system of sewers was adopted and turned over to the city in 1883.

1886.

The Roxbury supply was brought into the city via Beech Hill.

1890.

The first meters were installed.

1891.

Ten and one-half miles of cement lined pipe were replaced with cast iron. There remains in service (1916) 7,047 feet in Court Street, 400 in Roxbury Street, and 186 in West Street.

1902.

Additional water from Roxbury was brought into the city via South Keene.

1908.

The Board of Water Commissioners was abolished by the City Councils.

1910.

The dam at Echo Lake was rebuilt, raising the water in the lake six feet.

1914.

The meter system was adopted and all services ordered metered.

1917.

Guards maintained at Echo Lake for three months.

1924.

By vote of the City Councils two filters and a storage reservoir were authorized. One filter and reservoir on Beech Hill and one filter at the stone dam.

1925.

The Beech Hill filter and reservoir was completed and water turned into City October 7, increasing the pressure about twenty-five pounds.

An Altitude Valve was placed in the Court Street main thereby eliminating all waste and reducing the pressure in the old cement lined pipe.

The stone dam filter was completed and water turned on December 9th.

1927.

The 12 inch main pipe from the Stone dam to Eastern Avenue was cleaned, about 14,500 ft. and 3,000 ft. of 8 inch, increasing the capacity 700,000 to 800,000 gals. daily.

The filters continue to give good results, the late heavy rain with its attendant wash made no difference with the water in the city.

Pipe has been laid in Arlington.

A few streets have had sewers extended.

The drains have been extended in several streets. New catch basins built and several cat-heads changed to catch basins.

The 12" main from the Stone dam to Eastern Avenue was cleaned by the National Water Main Cleaning Co., with good results which increased the carrying capacity 700,000 to 800,000 gals. per 24 hours.

**RECOMMENDATIONS**

## REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF HIGHWAYS

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To His Honor the Mayor and Gentlemen of the City Councils:

I beg leave to submit my report for the year 1927.

The policy of last year has been continued in the construction of as many streets as possible with a permanent stone base, gravel top, and a surfacing of oil or tar.

Carpenter St. subjected to heavy traffic and in very bad condition, has been improved in this manner at a cost of \$1,341.92 for the roadway, and \$116.81 for grading up the entire length of the East sidewalk. Aside from above expense, suitable drains have been provided.

In connection with this improvement the West end of Kingsbury St. was repaired in the same manner at a cost of \$303.46.

Upper Elm St., the construction of which was begun last year is being continued and about \$500 expended up to the end of this fiscal year.

Eastern Ave., the direct route between the Eastern part of the City and Marlboro St., sustains an increasing traffic each year and its surfacing with gravel, begun last year, has been completed. This year's expense being \$744.31.

The improvement of Kelleher St. was begun early this season and on the Southern end a stone base was laid. This part of the street has usually been closed in the early Spring as it has been impassible on account of the mud, the entire length of the street being resurfaced with gravel and good drainage provided, cost of the work on this street \$853.23.

Pine Ave., one of the newer streets in West Keene, never having been graded, needed a considerable amount of work. Its whole length being surfaced with gravel, graded and rolled at

an expense of \$1,559.44 including grading of sidewalks. The application of stone dust on walks cost \$164.33.

There being no drains previously, a suitable drainage was established the cost not included in above figures.

All the above streets received a treatment of oil and tar at an expense additional to that given.

The hard rains and high water the first week in November caused more or less damage by washing, to nearly all of the roads and streets cared for by the City. \$2,000 would be an approximate estimate of these repairs.

### STATE AID

A portion of the Concord road extending Southerly three fourths of a mile from Keene Roxbury line has been completed, with a stone base, under supervision of the State Highway Dept. An extension of drains with concrete headers and an extension of a concrete culvert was necessary to obtain sufficient width of roadway.

### SNOW REMOVAL

Under present day travel the removal of snow is a considerable expense, formerly with team travel no difficulty was experienced if snow was levelled and worn smooth by teams, now however, automobiles with chains on wheels dig ruts so deep that turning out of them is impossible.

This condition necessitates the absolute removal of all snow down to within a few inches of the pavement.

## SIDEWALKS

The cement concrete walks constructed this year include the entire length of Leverett St. on the South side, west side of Court St., from Linden St., south to the north line of No. 248, east side of Court St., between Vernon and High Streets, Winchester St., north side from Main St. to No. 91, both sides of Dunbar St. on East end, north side of Central Sq. from Washington St. to the Church, the westerly 227 feet of Bruder St. on the north side, the westerly 350 feet of the easterly side of Gurnsey St., and the southerly side of Beaver St. between Washington and Franklin Sts., making a total of 4,550 sq. yds. and a length of 1.2 miles.

The new cement mixer purchased for this work helped to reduce costs somewhat, although more curbing than usual were built at street intersections and more than the average amount of grading and loaming was necessary. The average cost of the walks including curbing and grading with loam being \$2.35 per sq. yd.

Plans have been prepared and accepted for the construction of cement walks on the following streets:

Middle St., west side, Summer to Winter St.

High St., south side, Court to Carroll St.

Wilson St., west side, Emerald to Winchester St.

Church St., north side, Beaver Brook Bridge westerly to Duffy block.

Court St., east side, High to Forest St.

Winchester St., on north side from No. 91 to Ralston St.

Gurnsey St., entire length on west side.

Barker St., entire length on east side.

The approximate cost of these walks will be \$6,600, and as the abutting property owners will return one third of the cost to the City or \$2,200, the sum of \$4,400 will be the City's share for this work.

## GRAVEL WALKS

The building of gravel walks has been continued this year, some streets have received attention for the first time including Wilber St., lower Main St., Pine Ave., Blake St., Gurnsey and Marlboro streets.

Lower Main St. and Wilber St. especially receiving a large amount of work, about three fourths of a mile on the westerly side of lower Main St. between Beaver Brook and Edgewood being brought up to a permanent grade with gravel and finished with trap rock dust.

Wilber St. on the westerly side between No. 53 and Water St. has been suitably graded and rock dust applied, a large quantity of filling was required at this place as the hill slopes very steeply.

The walks on many other streets have been lined up and given a good application of trap rock dust which makes a good wearing surface.

At the Beaver Brook Bridge on Main St., wing walls of concrete were constructed to hold sidewalks in place and a suitable railing erected.

The steel bridge on Main St. over the Branch, formerly used by the electric railroad has been acquired by the City and remodeled into a foot bridge, adequate railing provided across bridge and also on both ends where necessary to connect with the new Main Street gravel walk.

## SOUTH KEENE BRIDGE

Early this spring the **woodwork of the steel bridge crossing** the Branch was entirely removed, including the supports for the electric railroad track, and the rails of same.

Several steel stringers under the railroad track were replaced by others cut to fit from material on hand.

After a thorough cleaning of the steelwork it was given a coat of red lead and oil and a new floor of chestnut lumber was laid.

## CARE OF TREES

Last Spring we discovered the egg clusters of the Brown Tail Moth on the elms in certain parts of the city, on recommendation of the State Entomologist as to the eradication of this pest, the trees of the entire city were examined and a great number of these egg clusters were destroyed by the use of creosote.

No general program of trimming has been attempted this year, but several dead trees have been removed and others that had started to split, through the effect of recent wind storms have been chained or bolted together. Others that were a menace to the public through age or location were taken down. One large elm standing in Marlboro Street near the home of Frank Cole, and another in the High School yard have been removed by the regular employees of this Department.

This year a considerable number of young elms taken from City land have been set out in order to beautify some of the newer streets, and also to replace some of those that were blown down during last years severe storm.

## CLEAN UP WEEK

Last spring the usual program of rubbish collection was followed, and also an extra collection was made during Fire Prevention Week by this department.

## OIL AND TAR TREATMENT

## REPORT OF PARK COMMISSIONER

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To the Honorable Mayor and City Councils:

During the year a considerable amount of preliminary work has been done at Fuller Park in ploughing filling, grading and seeding the lower portion. It has also been surveyed, a large scale plan made and a prominent landscape architect is now at work on a suggested plan for the future development of this attractive lot for its largest possible use by the people of the city. It is hoped that this plan may soon be presented to your Honorable Board and it is earnestly recommended that an increased or special appropriation will be available in order that a start may be made during the coming year.

As is customary, Wheelock Park has received a considerable portion of the expenditures and with an increased use as the supervised playground during the summer, in addition to a large number of other gatherings, it is felt that the needed trimming, cleaning and supervision is accomplished at a low cost.

Last winter a considerable area in the Drummer pasture was cleared of birch to permit the growth of young pine and at present this work is being continued on a smaller scale. Clearing and cutting of dead wood has also been done in Robin Hood Forest adjacent to North Lincoln Street and it is hoped, in connection with the Highway Department, to make further improvements along this street.

In the Dinsmore and Faulkner tracts adjoining the Five Mile Drive work has been necessarily confined to clearing brush and fallen trees.

It is felt that a largely increased number of people are enjoying the parks and woods each year, and it is hoped that



during the coming year improvements may be made upon roads and paths in the Beech Hill Parks.

## REPORT OF HEALTH OFFICER

To the Board of Health:

It is with a great deal of pleasure that I herewith submit the condition of health, together with the activities of the health department in the City of Keene for the year ending December 1, 1927.

The health record of the City for the year 1927 is one that the citizens of Keene can well be proud of, there has not been a death in the City during the year from any contagious or infectious disease, other than from pneumonia and tuberculosis, there has been only one case of diphtheria during the year and that in Dec. 1926, there were about the average cases of scarlet fever in the first half of the year, but there has not been a case reported since June 20, 1927, there has not been a single case of infantile paralysis reported during the year, although this disease has been quiet prevalent in other sections in the State. There have been only sixty cases of reportable diseases reported in 1927, as against one hundred and fifty-seven in 1926.

Keene with its neat and clean appearance, its excellent water supply, its perfect sewerage system, its garbage collection, together with its efficient school physician, school nurse, three district nurses and a tuberculosis nurse, all of which are of the utmost importance to the health of the City, I can not help but believe that people living in Keene should feel that they are living in one of the best Cities in the State, judging from the health standpoint.

## SANITARY INSPECTIONS

This important work of the department is increasing from year to year: with the ninety odd stores, located in all parts of the City selling food products, and varying in size from the kitchen grocer to the department store, requires no little attention, while the stores that are kept neat and clean, and display their stock in a sanitary way, are the stores that get the business, there are others that think if they have a store, and keep a stock of goods that it makes no difference how they handle or display their goods in regard to sanitary protection, these are the places that cause the department the most trouble, in trying to protect the health of those who are not as well informed on sanitary requirements.

On Aug. 8, the City councils passed an ordinance relating to the collection of garbage by the City, under the direction of the Board of Health. The contract was let to W. L. Christopherson who started collecting on Sept. 12.

For various reasons it took some time to divide the City into sections so that people would know just what days he was coming, but now I think we have conditions quiet well worked out, and the collector is giving the people very good service and by the time warm weather comes again he will be in a position to take care of all garbage in a sanitary manner, and at a low cost to the City.

I wish on behalf of the collector and myself to thank the people in the City for their very liberal cooperation in getting this new asset to the City started.

### MILK SUPPLY

During the year I have issued one hundred and thirteen licenses to dealers and producers, and fifty-one to stores, refused four and revoked two. The City is now consuming about 8,655 quarts of milk a day, or a little over a pint a day for each man, woman and child in the City, which is a very good consumption of milk.

It is very unfortunate that we can not have milk analyzed here. On account of the way the trains run it is impossible to get milk to Concord for analysis before it is from twenty-four to thirty-six hours old, unless it is taken there by automobile, which is very expensive, however during the year I have taken to Concord in my own car thirty samples on four different times, of these only two were below standard in butter fat, and a few were higher in bacteria count than they should be. The source of trouble from these samples was located, the premises inspected, suggestions made and complied with, which at once reduced the bacteria count. In one case a sample taken on May ninth showed a bacteria count of over 300,000 the premises were at once inspected and the trouble was found to be in the condition of the milking machine and the method of handling the milk, these conditions were remedied, and a sample taken on June 7, which showed a bacteria count of only 11,000. This goes to show how important it is to keep premises, cows, and

utensils clean and the milk taken care of in a sanitary manner, and where there are one hundred or more producing milk in small quantities and selling it to a few dealers who mix it all together before it is delivered, it is no easy matter to locate trouble, but if anyone is continually getting unsatisfactory milk I would appreciate it very much if they would report it to this office.

## REPORT OF TRUSTEES OF KEENE PUBLIC LIBRARY

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To the Honorable Mayor and City Councils :

The Trustees of the Keene Public Library submit the following report :

The year just past shows the largest circulation in the annals of the library. The trustees feel that this does not mean an advance in numbers merely but in the real worth and purpose of the work and that this is due to the enthusiasm and ability of the librarian and her assistants. Their work can not be estimated in terms of dollars and cents but its value is known to an ever increasing circle of readers and students. The increased work has been done by the regular staff with extra service during the vacation period and a limited number of hours at other times. Details of the library activities will be found in the Librarian's report and from them an idea of the aims and interests of the Library can be better understood than from any general comments.

There has been one change in the library staff. In July Mrs. Theresa Proctor Greene resigned her position as children's librarian and Mrs. Carolyn H. Wellman was elected in her place. Mrs. Wellman is a graduate of Wheaton College and has had some experience in the Lynn Public Library. She has taken charge of the Children's Room since August first and has shown ability and tact in this most important post.

The picture collection is so much used especially by teachers that educational pictures are constantly collected from all available sources and a new filing cabinet has been bought for them. Some interior painting and cleaning has been done and repairs made upon the roof, further repairs are contemplated



if the increase in the appropriation for expenses permits. More books also are needed to meet the larger demands and the increase in the book appropriation is greatly appreciated.

Mrs. Frank C. Huntress was this year elected by the City Government as a trustee.

The librarian's report with statistics of interest to all patrons of the library is hereby appended.

## REPORT OF LIBRARIAN

---

To the Board of Trustees of the Keene Public Library :

The report of the librarian for the year 1926-1927 is herewith presented.

It is a satisfaction to report another year of progress. It has been one of quiet growth with no particular emphasis on publicity methods. The daily use of the reading and reference rooms links us with all the schools and many other organizations of the city. There is an increase, among the young people, of appreciation of the library privileges and a gain in ability to use the resources at their disposal, although there has been very little regular instruction to school classes, only three having visited the library for that purpose, but almost hourly through the afternoon and evening instruction and aid is being given.

The increase in circulation for the year has been 7,715 and the number of new borrowers is 828. The per capita circulation is a fraction over seven.

Several events mark the year as different from former ones. First the presence in the city for two weeks of librarians from various parts of the State in attendance at the Library Summer School held, under the auspices of the N. H. Library Commission, at the Keene Normal School. These student-librarians were freely in and out of the library, being given the privileges of regular borrowers for the brief period. The lectures on reference work by Mr. W. P. Lewis of the University library at Durham were given in our reference room with our books as examples. Two lectures on children's books by Mrs. Root, another instructor, were held in the children's room with exhibits, covering various topics of her course, arranged from our books. Books for the class in cataloging were

also borrowed from our shelves. These circumstances brought us into a pleasurable contact with workers and teachers of experience and proved an advantage to us of the Keene library. Due to unusual pressure of work during the winter, we had one part-time assistant and a page. The latter was with us helping, in many capacities, through the vacation season. One change in the staff has occurred. Theresa Proctor Greene, who came as assistant in June, 1926, finished her work the last of July and Carolyn Heath Wellman took up the work the first of August. The third innovation was in connection with the Vacation Reading for the children. Before the close of schools, booklets were distributed to young people who filled out the blanks with their comments on the books read. At the gathering, in the fall, when certificates were awarded, Miss Ann Mitchell, teacher of the recently established Montessori School, gave great pleasure to the group by her happily chosen stories. The latest new feature of our work was a little play given in Library Hall on Saturday morning of the last day of Children's Book Week in which the parts of characters from books beloved by young people were taken by children who wished to play these parts. This was conducted as an educational project by Mrs. Wellman and from the greater interest taken by Children in the library, we feel that it accomplished, at least, a part of its purpose.

The library is assisting in the University Extension Course given this winter for the teachers, not only by the purchase of books needed for the supplementary reading but also by acting as deposit station for books sent from University headquarters.

The most notable addition of books to any one department has been that of *The Chronicles of America* to the history section. This is a set of fifty volumes published by the Yale University Press. The volumes are popular in style and may well be read with pleasure by others than students. The new edition of the *World Book*, a useful encyclopedia for young people, has recently been purchased, also some especially good books

on advertising, salesmanship and business management. Fiction presents the greatest problem in book buying at the present time and is, perhaps, the field in which we receive the most criticism. An earnest attempt however, is being made to supply notable and good fiction for all classes of readers. The Reading with a Purpose Series published by the A. L. A. has now reached 32 volumes and represents an outline and suggestive list of books on many important subjects. The popularity of this course has not been so great here as in many places, apparently, but it has, nevertheless, proved of value, we feel, and may increase in use as it becomes better known.

The librarian gave a talk on the library and its use at the Tilden School one morning of Book Week. She attended the annual meeting of the N. H. L. A. at New London, at which also one Trustee was present, and that of the A. L. A. at Toronto from both of which great inspiration and practical help were derived.

As always, the librarian is grateful to the Trustees for cooperation and encouragement, to the staff for faithful work and enthusiastic interest in all undertakings and to the Sentinel Printing Company for generous space in its columns.

## REPORT OF CITY SOLICITOR

---

To His Honor the Mayor, and members of the City Councils :

I beg to submit herewith my report as City Solicitor.

I have prosecuted in our Municipal Court violations of the City Ordinances, and such criminal matters as are within my jurisdiction. These have all been disposed of in this court with the exception of two, which by appeal are now pending in the Superior Court. These are offenses against the New Hampshire liquor laws, and are as follows :

1. State vs. Mary Navish.
2. State vs. George Potwine.

Both of these cases should be disposed of by plea or by trial at the present term of the Superior court.

The Zoning Ordinance became effective in this City on January 3, 1927. The application of the principles of this Ordinance to conditions here existing has raised many interesting and difficult questions. I have endeavored to give written opinions upon the most important of these; and without laying down principles too general in their nature have endeavored to apply the Ordinance to each concrete case as it arose. Zoning enactments are relatively new, and the future success of the zoning principle here, as elsewhere, depends upon the equitable application of it. The main purpose of the Zoning Law should be kept clearly in mind, but its application should be as liberal as that purpose will allow. Zoning acts are an admitted interference with the use of one's property, but the principle of these acts has been upheld by the United States Supreme Court in *Euclid v. Ambler* 71 U. S. (L. Ed.) 171. It has also been upheld in most state courts.

Two petitions for abatement of taxes assessed upon the Keene Country Club were pending on January 1, 1927. These

eases were heard before Hon. George A. Wagner, of Manchester, as Master appointed by the Superior Court. Arthur Olson, Esquire, the former City Solicitor, assisted me in trying these cases in behalf of the City. Philip H. Faulkner, Esquire and Chester B. Jordan, Esquire, both of Keene, appeared in behalf of the Keene Country Club, which objected to an assessment upon this property for the years 1925 and 1926 of Fifty Thousand Dollars. Written arguments have been furnished by the attorneys engaged in the case and an early decision is expected. These cases are on the Superior Court Docket as follows:

Equity No. 869—Keene Country Club v. City of Keene

Equity No. 1038—Keene Country Club v. City of Keene.

A petition for abatement for the year 1927 (Equity No. 1162) has also been filed. The disposition of this case will depend upon the result of the cases already tried.

Two other petitions for tax abatement for the year 1926 are pending against the City. These are:

Equity No. 1048—Demetrius Latchis v. City of Keene.

Equity No. 1126—Demetrius Latchis v. City of Keene.

These cases have not yet been tried. In the first, the petitioner seeks an abatement from a valuation of \$304,100 placed by the Assessors upon his property in Keene. In the second, he appeals from an additional assessment of \$20,000, placed upon a part of his property alleged to have escaped taxation on April 1, 1926.

There is also pending in the Superior Court an action brought by Harry F. Mason against the Portland Construction Company, in which the City of Keene and the Maryland Casualty Company are named as defendants. This suit is brought by the plaintiff to recover for labor and materials furnished the Portland Construction Company in 1922, when that company by contract with the City, did some cement work upon its streets. This claim is for \$1,545.51, with interest from 1922. The Maryland Casualty Company furnished a bond to



protect the City in the completion of the contract. This case should be disposed of before January 1, 1928. It is:

**Portland Construction Company**  
Equity No. 1106—Harry F. Mason vs. Portland Construction Company, City of Keene and Maryland Casualty Company.  
There are no civil actions pending against the City.

The regular routine work has progressed in the customary manner.

Last Spring all the fences were painted and a new fence was built on Lincoln St.

A new road roller has been purchased which is a great aid in keeping the roads in condition.

All roads in West Keene Cemetery have been graveled and considerable forestry work has been done.

This Fall the truck has been overhauled and four new tires purchased, the first since the truck was bought. The old tires were used for 12,000 miles. Besides using the truck for hauling purposes it is used to scrape, roll and plow the roads, pull stumps and snake logs.

During the year thirty-five new lots have been developed. One thirty-two grave lot was deeded Gordon-Bissell Post American Legion.

There have been one hundred and twenty-nine burials, one reburial and one removal.

## REPORT OF DIRECTOR OF PUBLIC PLAYGROUNDS

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### PLAYGROUND REPORT FOR THE SUMMER OF 1927

For this season the policy of locating playgrounds upon public school grounds was dropped, and Wheelock Park and the Wade Across were used for public play purposes. Both Wheelock Park and the Wade Across were open all day from nine until four every day except Saturday and Sunday, from July 5th to Aug. 27th. weather conditions permitting.

The playgrounds were actually opened thirty-seven full days, or seventy-four sessions, with a total attendance of sixty-four hundred averaging about one hundred and seventy-five per day, of which approximately one hundred and fifteen were at Wheelock Park and sixty at the Wade Across.

Wheelock Park again proved its great value to the city as a play center, being ideally equipped for the purpose for which it is used. The Wade Across, the city's swimming pool for the children, was very popular, particularly during the hot weather of July, when capacity crowds were a daily occurrence. Approximately twenty children learned to swim and passed the beginners test. As many more passed the advanced Swimmer's test and ten passed the Junior or Senior Red Cross examinations, William Connor, in charge of the Wade Across and swimming activities, successfully passed the test of the Red Cross for examiner in lifesaving.

The old bath house at the Wade Across was destroyed during the winter, and a new one with sections for both boys and girls was installed. The playground season closed August 27th with a big field day at Wheelock Park. Races for all ages were run off, a dodge ball tournament was held and a girls' contest and a boys' contest held in horse shoe pitching.

The horse shoe tournaments were exceptionally interesting and were the feature of the day, there being much spirited competition for the prizes. Refreshments were served to the children at noon.

The playgrounds were again in charge of Mr. Drew, assisted at Wheelock Park by Mrs. Drew, and at the Wade Across, by William Connor and Robert Greene.

I hereby submit my annual report for the year ending November 30, 1927. The following alarms were answered by the Department:

16 bell alarms; 228 still alarms; 9 out-of-Town calls, making a total of 253 alarms.

### APPARATUS AND FORCE

The apparatus and force of the department under a Chief and three Assistant Chiefs, located on Vernon Street is as follows:

Keene Steam Fire Engine and Hose Company—John A. Denison Captain, and 24 men.

Washington Hook and Ladder Company—Frank W. Streeter Captain, and 19 men.

Deluge Hose Company—Elwin H. Applin Captain, and 19 men.

Kissel Combination chemical and hose.

Mack Ladder Truck and Chemical.

Reo Combination Chemical and Hose.

Ahrens Fox 750 gallon pumping engine hose and booster.

Amoskeag Steamer, tractor drawn.

Deluge Combination, horse drawn.

Relief Ladder Truck, horse drawn.

The department has on hand 9,400 feet of serviceable hose, 1,500 feet of linen hose at South Keene, 150 feet of unserviceable hose.

About 600 feet discarded during the year.

The old hose has been turned over to Water Department.

The fire hose thread of the department has been standardized by cutting it to  $7\frac{1}{2}$  threads to the inch which is now the National Standard thread.

As the life of fire hose is about ten years, a thousand feet should be purchased the coming year to offset the amount discarded each year.

During the year a new Chiefs car has been purchased, an Oldsmobile Six Coupe to replace the Overland which has been in service about four years.

The motor apparatus and its equipment, including tools are in very good condition.

The Fire Alarm System and its equipment is also in very good condition. There has been quite a lot of work done on the system during the year. Some of this work is changing over on joint-line construction also where new poles are set, also we had a cross with the Electric Light Co. high voltage circuit which caused damage to the underground wires and the Fire Alarm Repeater.

Box 47 has been placed on a pole near Keene Glue Co's Office, this box was down on the side of the office, its present location is more convenient for the public.

During the year as Building Inspector I have issued:—

57 permits for new houses.

70 permits for new garages.

45 permits for other buildings, (sheds, hen houses, etc.)

41 permits for additions.

31 permits for alterations and remodeling.  
8 permits for moving and dismanteling.

### RECOMMENDATIONS

The board of Engineers recommend the purchase of 1,000 feet of fire hose.

Also a Fire Alarm Box Pedestal for the corner of Main and Railroad sts., and the removal of the pole where Box 8 is now located.

The replacement of the old flush hydrants by post hydrants on lower Winchester Street and Roxbury Street.

In the near future a Foam Generator should be purchased as this is the only equipment to subdue large gasoline and oil fires, as the City has a large amount of gasoline in storage and quite a number of oil burners.

To His Honor the Mayor and Members of the Joint Standing Committee on Fire Department, Members of the Board of Engineers, Officers and members of the department, and to the public, I extend my sincere thanks and appreciation for the aid and support rendered me during the year.

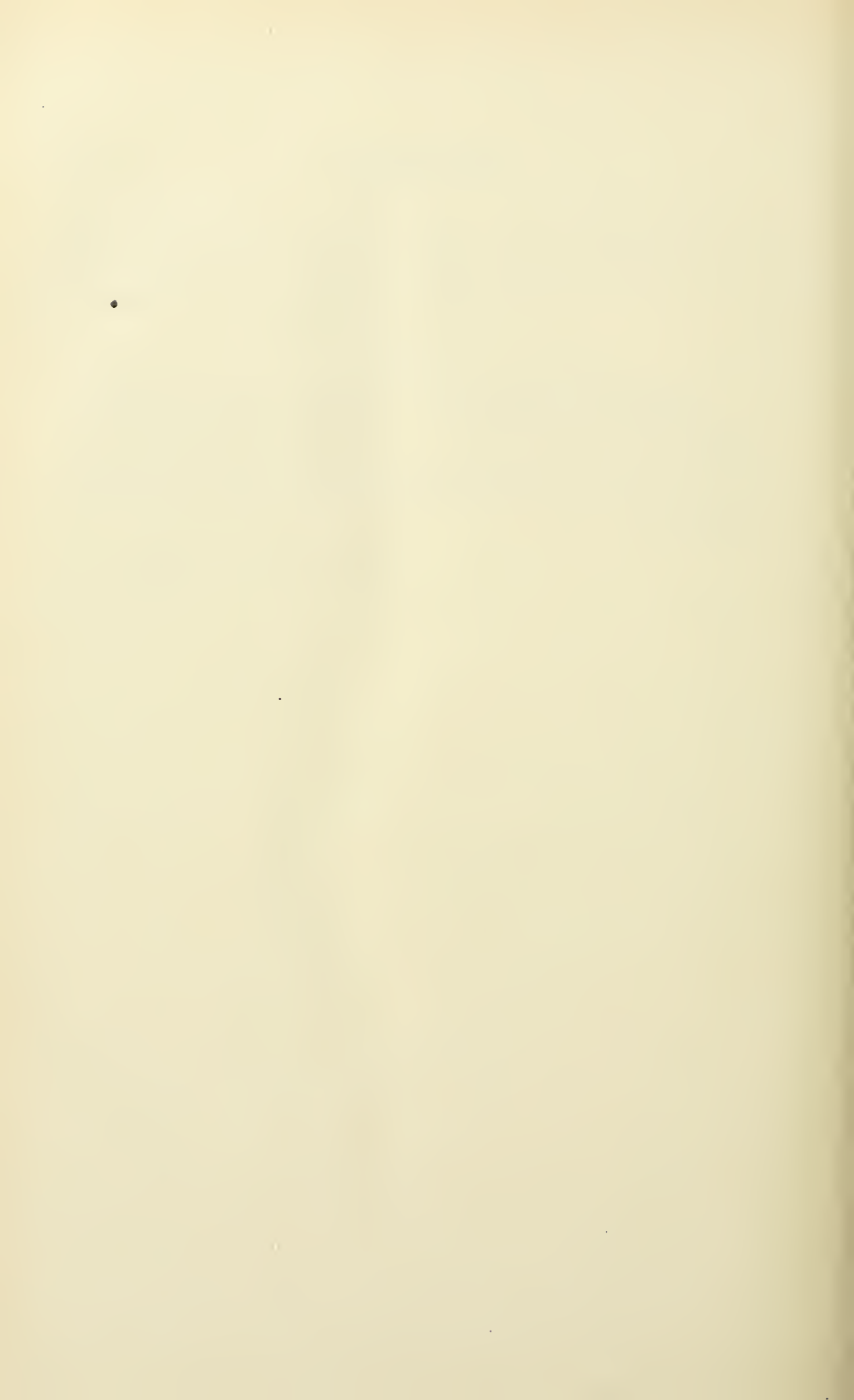

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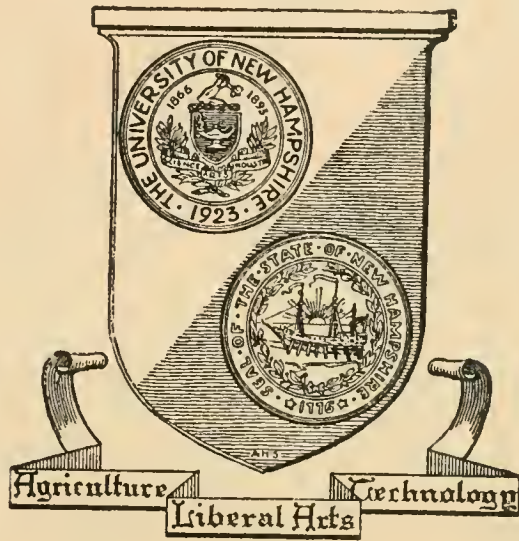








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
