ORGANIZATION

OF THE CITY GOVERNMENT

Tuesday, March 22, 1927.

At ten o'clock in the forenoon of the above date, members-elect of the city council for the municipal year of 1926 and the members from the previous council met for organization at the city council room agreeably to the provisions of the city charter.

The oath of office was administered to the Mayor-elect, Hon. Charles J. Hayford by ex-Mayor, Hon. William F. Knight, Mayor Hayford then assumed the duties of his office, and administered the oath of office to the following councilmen-elect, viz:

INAUGURAL ADDRESS

OF

HON. CHARLES J. HAYFORD

March 22, 1927

Gentlemen of the City Council:

In assuming the office of Mayor of the City of Laconia I deeply appreciate the honor the people have bestowed upon me. Of the responsibility it involves I am keenly aware, but with your co-operation and help we may hope for and confidently expect efficient and economical government during the coming year.

Much could be said of the year just closed. Mayor Stevens gave his best, and Laconia profited by his efforts; a goal any man should be proud to attain.

I could say much as to the needs of our City and many recommendations which might be made occur to me. I feel free to make recommendations on the less important matters, but on those involving the vital interests of our city, it is my wish that through consultation with you around the table, the recommendations may come from seven minds rather than from one, since it is my desire that co-operation shall guide us in all our actions.

WARDS

Following this thought permit me to say a word in regard to wards and ward lines. You each have been elected to represent your respective wards, but also to represent your City. It is well that you bring to this body the needs of your ward, but having done this let us pool the

needs of all, be honest with our city and spend the peoples money where greatest good shall accrue to the greatest number of people regardless of ward lines. Experience has demonstrated that in failure to follow this line of conduct lies real danger.

DEPARTMENTS

Our several departments have made a statement and in most cases recommendations in the city report. I will not attempt to go into the details of each department report at this time with you, but recommend, if you have not already done so, that you study these reports carefully, in order that when we are called upon to make department appropriations you will be fully acquainted with the needs of each and with their financial demands. However, there are a few recommendations that I wish at this time to bring to your attention. *First*: The bridge situation which is dealt with in the report of the Board of Public Works on page 162, and also the City Engineer's more complete report on pages 167 and 168. The bridges referred to are those on Church, Mill and Fair Streets. The replacement of the two bridges last named is imperative. Kindly study this condition carefully. *Second*: The report of the Trustees of our Public Library on page 155. This building must be repaired in the near future and the funds in the hands of the trustees are inadequate to provide for the major repairs. I refer this recommendation to the standing committee on land and buildings. *Third*: Kindly study carefully the report of the Board of Health on page 122. Last year the City Council passed a milk ordinance, and if this ordinance is to be enforced the Board of Health must receive the support of this Council, as well as that of future Councils. There has been raised by taxes \$1500 to repair the Isolation Hospital, attention to which has been neglected. I ask the standing committee on land and buildings to investigate this condition and report its findings at an early meeting. Our Police and Fire Departments are

in good condition, and with the possible exception of buying some new hose for the Fire Department, these two departments, in my opinion, can get along with general maintenance appropriations. Our schools are in very good condition. We are in need of more room in at least two of the graded schools, but I would ask the School Board to endeavor to get along this year at least as they are now, since I believe the financial condition of our city does not warrant any new and additional expenditure which is not a pressing necessity. This statement applies not alone to the School Department, but to all departments as well. I would ask each, in making its requests for appropriations, to eliminate everything except that which is actually necessary to maintain the present standard of the department. And while I am speaking of appropriations, let me call your attention to the fact that I shall expect all appropriations requested by the departments to come to the Mayor and Council itemized. Since the Mayor and Council carry the responsibility for spending the public money, it is only just and a matter of good business conduct that they know where every dollar is to be spent before an appropriation is made. Itemize your accounts as you would desire and insist that your private bills be itemized before payment.

TAXATION

This subject is not a pleasant one with which to deal. It is, however, a subject that is vitally important to every citizen. I would not dare say how many times I have been asked recently,—“Are you going to reduce our taxes?” I now want to ask those inquirers and all other citizens,—“Are you going to co-operate with the Council in our effort to reduce our taxes?” For after all each tax payer must bear in mind that it is the applications for new work, of one kind or another, which added to those charges of government already fixed and which must be met that control your tax rate. A word or two on the fixed charges may throw a little light on the embarrassing position which confronts

the Mayor and Council in an effort to reduce the tax rate. I have computed the fixed charges for the last fiscal year, and find that Mayor Stevens was faced with such charges to the amount of \$446,017.96 before any new work or any additional expenditures could be undertaken. The tax rate on this amount of fixed charges alone would be \$24.28 per thousand as compared with an actual tax rate for the last fiscal year of \$27.00 or substantially 90 per cent of the total tax rate. The total appropriation last year was \$509,412.96, or \$63,395, more than the fixed charges. This year the fixed charges will be more than last year. An increase has already been made in the county tax by an increased appropriation of the county delegation to the extent of about \$21,000, and as the City of Laconia pays a little more than one half of the county tax, it is evident that this item alone will be \$10,000 or \$11,000 more than last year. The state tax in all probability will be larger than last year. Furthermore, the State of New Hampshire has already been promised by the City the purchase of a suitable site for an armory, if the state should appropriate money for its construction, which will without a doubt be done. I mention these items to show how much money has to be appropriated by the Council over which it has practically no control. And so, citizens of Laconia, in fairness to yourselves and to us, and to the tax rate for 1927, consider well any petitions calling for extra outlays before you present them to your Councilman with your demand that he put it through for you. We are your servants and, if you demand, we are here to carry those demands out as near as it is possible to do so with reason, and with due regard to the rights of all other citizens. If you have petitions to come before the Council, see that they are with your Councilman, or in the hands of the City Clerk, on or before the last Monday in May, as it is my intention to have our appropriations made up and in the hands of the Assessors by the first of June. If petitions come in after our appropriations are made, either we will have to ask

you to withdraw, or it will be necessary for us to recommend such petitions to the incoming Council of 1928. Once our budget is made up, our money is pledged, and it would be an act of bad faith on our part to permit any one to hope or believe we could do more. Work with your Council that they may work with you. It is my wish that the assessors may be able to get their figures together by the first of June so that the Tax Collector can render her tax bills at an early date. By such means the City would benefit by the earlier receipt of taxes from those of our citizens who always pay when the bill is presented. The chairman of the Board has informed me that he thought this could be so arranged, and I hope for co-operation.

RECOMMENDATIONS

I recommend that an ordinance be passed creating a budget committee of three members, to be appointed by the Mayor and approved by the Council, and to be composed of citizens not connected with any city office or department, to serve without compensation and the majority of the committee to be of the same political faith as the majority party in the Council. This committee should function effectively between the departments of the city and the City Council on appropriations. The departments would make up their budgets which would receive the careful investigation and scrutiny of the budget committee who will report their recommendations to the Mayor and Council. In this way, though the Mayor and Council would still be charged with the final responsibility of making the expenditures, they would have the benefit of investigation and advice from a capable, disinterested third party, which I believe could not fail to prove useful, and of distinct financial advantage to the city. In effect, this is a budget system now employed by our federal government and by many state, county and municipal governments throughout the country.

I also recommend that the Council appropriate such sum of money as may be found necessary to provide for the authorized appointment by the Mayor of a certified accountant to audit the books of the City, and to make recommendations as to improvements in the methods of bookkeeping we now employ. In the history of the city our books and bookkeeping system have never been subjected to a thorough examination. To me this is an extremely important matter. The city has grown and will continue to grow. We are handling large sums of money and above all things we should not be negligent in its proper accounting.

It has been well said that "A public office is a public trust." As public servants the people of Lacona have a right to demand of us the best that we are able to give of trust-worthiness, energy, and ability in the performance of our duties. The public welfare should be our supreme consideration. Our city is greater than any political party. The whole is greater than any of its parts. Let us see to it that every honest and intelligent endeavor may be made to promote the varied, financial, commercial, educational and social well-being of our splendid community. To a large extent the comfort, happiness and prosperity of its citizens has been committed to our charge. Let us meet the challenge with every resource we possess, individually and collectively. No man can do more.

MUNICIPAL REGULATIONS

FOR PAYMENT OF BILLS AGAINST THE CITY

All bills against the city must be approved by the persons authorizing the charge; unless this is done, no action can be had upon the bill by the committee on accounts and claims, and no order will be given for its payment.

When bills are certified to as above, and left with the City Clerk not later than Thursday at 12 o'clock M., preceding the last Monday of each month, they will be audited by the committee on accounts and claims, and if approved by them and allowed by the Council, will be ready for payment on the following Wednesday, at the office of the City Treasurer.

Meetings of the committee on accounts and claims are held on Friday preceding the last Monday of each month at 7:30 p. m., at the City Clerk's office.

RESOLUTIONS, ORDINANCES AND LEASE

In the Year of our Lord one thousand nine hundred and twenty-seven.

A RESOLUTION authorizing temporary loans to an amount not exceeding Two Hundred Twenty Thousand Dollars in anticipation of the taxes of the present municipal year.

Resolved by the City Council of the City of Laconia, as follows:

That for the purpose of meeting current expenses of the city, the City Treasurer be and hereby is authorized and empowered to make temporary loans from time to time for the use of said City of sums not exceeding the aggregate amount of \$220,000.00, said loans being in the anticipation of the taxes of the present municipal year and hereby expressly made payable therefrom, and to give for such loans subject to the written approval of the Committee on Finance, notes of the City, each note to become due and payable within one year from its date and no such note shall be valid unless authenticated by the certificate of the National Shawmut Bank of Boston, Massachusetts. Said notes shall be signed by the Mayor and City Treasurer and countersigned by the City Clerk, shall be registered in the books kept for that purpose in the offices of the City Treasurer and City Clerk respectively.

This resolution shall take effect upon its passage.

LEASE

This Indenture, made this first day of July, A. D. 1927, by and between Pearl S. Bond, of Winchester in the commonwealth of Massachusetts, and the City of Laconia in the state of New Hampshire, witnesseth:

That in consideration of the rents and agreements to be paid and performed on the part of the said City, the said Pearl S. Bond does hereby lease to said City the Perley Pasture, so called, owned by her and lying on Lake Winnisquam northerly of the Dennis O'Shea property, to be used during said term for the public purposes of said City. Said City may erect bathhouses, refreshment stands, and other buildings it may need for or in connection with the use of said land as a place of recreation, and remove the same during the term hereof, doing no unnecessary damage; may make one or more roads across said land from Pleasant Street; may cut brush and small trees that may be necessary for such purposes or to cut a space for a ball ground; but is not to cut timber trees. The Lessor may cut and remove wood from said land during the term hereof and is to have any wood cut by said City for the purposes above specified as allowable.

To have and to hold the same to the Lessee for the term of two years from the date hereof, and for a further term of three years (making five years in all) if said lessee so notifies the Lessor during the first term of two years or promptly at the expiration thereof, and the Lessor agrees in writing to the extension of the lease for such further term, the Lessee yielding and paying therefor the annual rent of one hundred and fifty dollars during the said first term of two years and the annual rent of two hundred

dollars during the second term of three years if the term is extended as aforesaid; and it is further understood that, in case the taxes of the Lessor's said property shall be more than one hundred and thirty dollars as assessed on the first day of April of any year during said term or the extension thereof, said Lessee is to pay, as additional rent, the amount of said taxes in excess of said one hundred and thirty dollars.

The Lessor covenants with the said Lessee that it may occupy the premises during term aforesaid of two or five years as the case may be, peaceable and free from all lawful claim of any other person.

The Lessee covenants with the Lessor to pay the rent as aforesaid, the same to be paid annually on the first day of September of each year; not to cause or suffer any unnecessary damage to said premises; and peaceably to quit and deliver up the premises to the Lessor at the termination of this lease.

The spirit of co-operation that you show at all times is very pleasing to all who work under your direction, and I take this opportunity to express in behalf of teachers and other employees of the school system our gratitude to you for the interest that you always have in matters, however trivial, pertaining to the welfare of the boys and girls of our city.

Some comparisons for the year ending June, 1927, with the year ending June, 1923, the last year in which our schools were organized under the 8-4 system and the last year in which the high school was housed in the building on Academy Street, may prove of interest to you and to the citizens of Laconia.

The aggregate of these amounts, the principal items in the cost of the elementary and secondary schools, divided by the average membership gives the cost per pupil in the elementary schools for the year 1922-1923, \$51.40, and 1926-1927, \$53.60. The aggregate for the same items of the high school divided by the average membership gives the cost per pupil for the year 1922-1923 \$101.00, for the year 1926-1927, \$145.00.

Of course, there are other items that have to be added in order to get the total cost per pupil.

In 1922-1923 the average membership in the elementary schools was 961; while last year it was 1116, an increase of 155. The average membership in the high school in 1922-1923 was 309; while last year it was 315. While the aggregate amount for both the grades and the high school has increased, the number of pupils in the grades has increased to such an extent that the per capita cost is practically the same as it was five years ago.

From statistics furnished by the State Department of Education on the current cost per \$1,000 equalized valuation in expenditures for education throughout the state for the year 1926-1927, Laconia's expenditure of \$6.62 per \$1,000 was 36th among the 249 school districts of the state. The expenditures for the cities of the state per \$1,000 of equalized valuation were as follows:

Although the per capita cost for the pupils in our senior high school, grades I to IX inclusive, has increased

and is larger than in most city high schools of the state, yet we believe that there is no one familiar with the conditions that existed five years ago that would be willing to return to those conditions even though a saving of a few dollars could be made.

We believe that the people of Laconia appreciate the advantages that the boys and girls of our high school have at their disposal and we trust that parents and other citizens will use their influence with the boys and girls in trying to keep them in school. The greatest weakness, as we see it, in our high school is the high mortality; that is, the excessive number of failures in work and the large number of pupils who leave school for trifling reasons. Not only is this injurious to the boy or girl who fails or who leaves school but it has a bad influence upon the pupils, and besides it greatly increases the annual per capita cost.

While no statistics are available at the present time, it would seem that the large number enrolled in the junior class would indicate the success of the six-year plan in keeping the pupils in school. This class was the first to enter the seventh grade in the 6-6 plan. Definite statistics and results can be obtained after the completion of the full course by one or two classes.

The average salaries of teachers may be a bit misleading without this explanation: In 1922-1923 there was only one teacher without experience, while last year there were four in the high school and four in the elementary schools. No change has been made in the salary schedule during the last five years.

The membership in the schools on January 13, 1928, was 1468, with 1129 in the elementary, and 339 in the high school. This was 19 larger than the enrollment one year ago.

ELEMENTARY SCHOOLS

At the Academy Street school Miss Marjorie Chase has returned to her former position as teacher of the fourth grade and principal of the building. At this building it is necessary again this year to give part of two classes to two different teachers. At the present time Miss Dodge has sixteen in the first grade and twelve in the second, and Miss Ramsey has twelve in the third grade and thirteen in the fourth grade.

The physical condition of this building is good and no great expenditure of money for repairs will be necessary for some time. The enrollment at this building is 190.

At the Batchelder Street school Miss Young has thirty pupils in the fifth grade; Miss Weymouth, six in the fifth grade; and Miss McLaughlin, thirty-three in the sixth grade, a total of only 83.

This enrollment is much smaller than it has been for several years but will be considerably larger next year as a large class will come up from the Academy Street school. These school rooms are pretty dingy and should be repainted before another year. I would also repeat my recommendation of last year; that is, that the extra lot owned by the District be cleared and levelled to provide a decent playground for the boys and girls at this school.

At the Gilford Avenue building there are the same teachers as last year, although the work has been changed a little. Mrs. Day has twenty-one pupils in the first grade and eight in the second. Miss Varney has fourteen in the second and fifteen in the third. Miss Phillips has eight in the third and twenty-one in the fourth, Mrs. Wadley has fifteen in the fifth and nineteen in the sixth. This building is in very good repair and will not need any large amount expended for several years. A decided change in the deportment of the boys and girls at this building in the last few years is noticeable. It used to be a common complaint that the pupils of this school were causing a disturbance or were doing mischief of one sort or another while on their way to and from school. The boys and girls of this building seem to have a new sense of civic pride because their actions have called forth no criticism for several months.

At the Harvard Street building there are five teachers this year with an enrollment at the present time of 156 pupils. Miss Annis has a combination room with twenty-four in the third grade and nine in the fourth; and Miss Ramsdell has fifteen in the fourth and fifteen in the fifth

grade. During the summer vacation the interior of this building was remodelled and an addition containing two class rooms was built, so at the present time there is one unused room. It will be almost necessary for any one who was familiar with the very large and poorly lighted rooms in this building to inspect the building at the present time in order to appreciate the changes that have been made.

The old school rooms were cut down to reasonable-size, are lighted on one side, and are heated and ventilated by an entirely new and modern method. Between the two rooms in the old part of the building on the second floor is a folding partition, which makes it possible to throw all of the space into one room for gatherings of different kinds. During the coming summer new walks should be laid and the lawn should be remade.

Here is a good illustration of how it is possible by careful planning to remodel an old type building into a practical, well lighted, well heated and ventilated, and sanitary building of modern type.

At the Mechanic Street building alterations similar to those at Washington were made during the summer vacation. At the present time there is at this building one unused room also, although it serves many useful purposes, such as lunch room, room for plays and games, folk dances, etc. At the present time Miss Garey has twenty-eight in the first grade; Miss Gotin, twenty-nine in the second grade; Miss Oswell thirty-one in the fourth; Miss MacIntyre, ten in the fifth and twenty-two in the third; Miss Snyder eleven in the fifth grade and twenty-one in the sixth grade. Of course a combination of the third and fifth grades is not desirable, yet it seemed necessary this year to divide the fifth grade as this was the smallest grade in the building.

The alterations at the Harvard Street school, Washington Street and Mechanic Street buildings have been very favorably commented upon by the State Department of Education.

There are 138 pupils at the Washington Street school, with the first, second and sixth grades in separate classes. The third grade of seventeen and fourteen of the fourth grade are together; while the remaining thirteen of the fourth grade and sixteen of the fifth grade form another class. Because of the extensive repairs that were made a year ago at this building it will be some time before repairs will have to be made.

Mrs. George is teaching her twenty-third consecutive year at The Weirs school. Sixteen of the twenty-three pupils enrolled are in attendance.

We believe that a good foundation for an education is laid in our elementary schools. Standard tests have shown that our pupils rank well in the fundamentals with other boys and girls throughout the state.

A greater interest in the schools on the part of the parents is desired. Citizens are urged not to put off their visits until some special program is arranged to which they are invited, but to visit the schools for the purpose of finding out what the physical conditions are, to become acquainted with the teachers, and to familiarize themselves with the work that is being done. Only upon such first-hand information can any one gain an intelligent and correct idea of what is taking place in the schools.

Of the new teachers, Mr. Simpson is a graduate of the University of New Hampshire. He came to the position made vacant by the resignation of Mr. Freedman. Miss Bartlett is a graduate of Boston University, Miss Grover and Miss Burnham are graduates of the University of New Hampshire, Miss Dolloff and Miss Johnson of Plymouth Normal School, and Miss Dana of the Keene Normal School. Miss Gladys P. Chase, a former teacher in the High School, returned to the history department.

The records made by the graduates of the High School in colleges and other post-secondary institutions are proof of the high standard of work that is maintained in the High School.

Doctor Clifton D. Gray, President of Bates College, presented to the high school for one year's possession, a cup in recognition of the fact that the average of three graduates from the Laconia High School who were freshmen at Bates College last year was the highest of any group from one high school at the college. The average rank for the first semester of the three graduates of this high school, Muriel and Mildred Beckman, and Morris Bean, was 87.4, almost 2 points higher than the average of the next highest group which was comprised of graduates from Portland High School.

In athletics our teams last year had a wonderful record in the number of games won. Owing to the loss of some of the best players through graduation and low marks the material this year has been largely inexperienced. However, the spirit shown by our boys in football and basketball has been splendid and has deserved and received very favorable commendation and support.

The work of the debating teams has been of a high order and has won favorable recognition throughout the state. At the interscholastic contest at the State University our debating team won second place, and in the prize speaking contest the representative of the high school won third place.

The operetta last spring by the Glee Club and the concert during the fall term were of a high order, as well as has been the work done by the High School Orchestra on occasions of its public appearance.

The LAKONIAN, the school paper, has had another successful year, and the pupils deserve much credit for the work done on this paper.

In the fall the daily schedule of the High School was changed so that although there are eight periods in the day as formerly those pupils who have met all requirements in work and deportment are excused at the end of the seventh period. In this way the eighth period gives an

opportunity for club meetings and for conferences between teachers and pupils. The plan would be still more successful if it were possible to so arrange the schedule that it would not be necessary to have any recitations the eighth period.

The school building is in use much of the time during the school year. It is filling a long-felt want, not only for the school but for community gatherings.

During the past summer, work progressed rapidly on the athletic field, so that in August the part of the field to be used for football was completed and should be ready for use next fall.

Parents are urged to familiarize themselves with the curricula offered in the High School and to consult with the teachers regarding the different courses so that they may advise their children regarding the work that they should take.

The Academic course offers the best possible preparation. The Scientific course gives the best preparation for the B. S. degree in college for engineering courses. The Commerce course prepares pupils for efficient business life and for the occupation of bookkeepers, and stenographers, clerical or mercantile workers. The Home Economics course is especially designed for girls who are looking forward to the intelligent administration of the duties of the home, to become nurses, dressmakers, milliners, dietitians, or are planning to teach the subjects by preparing for certain institutions. The Social Science course is designed for those who wish a general education rather than specializations. It offers opportunity for choice from a wide range of subjects and is an arrangement of studies adapted to individual abilities and tastes. The Mechanic Arts course gives a good general education, together with practical work in wood and metal trades, mechanical drawing, elemental wiring, and printing.

REPORT OF THE CHIEF ENGINEER

Laconia, N. H. January, 1928

To his Honor the Mayor and City Council I have the honor to submit for your consideration the report of the Fire Department for the year 1927.

During the past year the firemen with apparatus responded to fifty-one box alarms, and one hundred twenty-three calls on telephone.

The fire loss during the past year has been very low, our fire alarm system has been tuned into shape. New fire boxes added, new wire on lines, one new fire box at the Belknap County farm. Three new fire boxes at the New Hampshire State school.

During the year a Pierce Arrow has been purchased and made over into a fire truck by the men of the Central Fire Station. Messrs. Cutting, Perry and Judino performing this labor during their spare time. Added fire protection has been extended to The Weirs with a hose wagon and chemical mounted on a Packard chassis, this very efficient machine was made over by the boys at the Central Station. Mr. Cutting deserves a good deal of credit for his untiring efforts in this work. Our equipment is in excellent condition and except for a few minor repairs we will not need any apparatus for a few years.

Miss Lillian G. Williams, Superintendent gave a detailed report of great interest. This report shows that the work is increasing from year to year. During the past year, the hospital having cared for over one hundred more patients than the previous year. Miss Williams' report with that of N. Joy Harriman, Treasurer, has been published in the local papers in detail, so that the citizens of our City and those of the adjoining towns, especially those who have contributed to this worthy cause, can see just what disposition has been made of the funds.

The increase in the work and additional cost of maintenance calls for a larger income; only \$3,600 having been contributed, during the past year, to the general endowment fund. It is hoped that all those interested in this noble work will, when the opportunity presents itself, contribute toward the necessary amount required to maintain the high standard of service already established.

GENERAL REPORT

For the Year Ending December 31st, 1927

The statistics given show in a brief way some of the work accomplished during the year 1927, and could I share with you the words of appreciation spoken, and the letters received I am sure you would have reason to feel that the Laconia Hospital is filling a real need in the community, having had an average of one hundred patients a month or one hundred and three more than last year.

All of these were not restored to health but to the five patients over eighty, and nine over seventy-three years of age, whose illness proved to be their last, the hospital equally fulfilled its mission in making them as comfortable as human aid could do.

Recent evidences of appreciation was the various remembrances sent the nurses at Xmas time. The interest shown by the Summer camps in gifts of money amounting to \$249.00, is most gratifying, also from Camp Kuwiyau of the complete outfit for Name Necklaces as a means of identification to the new born. From the much talked of newspaper accounts of mixing babies I am sure this is proving a relief to the apprehensive mother.

During the past year there have been several changes in the Personnel of the hospital. At the present time the supervisors of each floor, of Operating Room, and night supervisor, are all graduates of this school.

On January 26, the Training School held its graduation exercises at the High School Auditorium, when seven students received their diplomas.

October 1st, a class of eight students entered training and began their class work at once, with our resident instructor, who is a graduate of Sibley Memorial Hospital, Washington, D. C. On January 1st, having completed their

three months probation period they donned the full nurse's uniform, bringing our present enrollment to twenty student nurses.

This Fall the Instructor in Household Economics of the High School brought her class to the hospital to have practical demonstrations in bathing of babies, bed making and changing of linen with patient in bed.

The Red Cross classes have also availed themselves of the use of our class room for demonstrations.

In June the New Hampshire Graduate Nurses Association held their meetings at the Pemaco building after which they visited the hospital and were served refreshments by Hospital Alumnae members.

We are justly proud of our Nurses Home which has been thoroughly renovated. The third floor was finished off, giving us a bathroom on this floor and three additional sleeping rooms, making it possible for each nurse to room alone. All the walls in the home were painted and floors dressed. The Ladies of the Hospital Aid bought all the furnishings for these three rooms, also new rugs for living room and had the furniture re-upholstered.

The various bands of this organization have very generously supplied our heavy demands for the many hospital supplies, and the Curtain Band in addition to supplying us with the required curtains, have paid for having awnings for five windows in the Ward for Mothers. The Laconia Woman's Club have also provided awnings to match these for the windows of the "Club Room."

Our much used X-Ray required a new motor and a transformer for Fluoroscope which with labor for installing same was \$185.00.

Other repairs have been painting walls and ceiling in small operating room, calcimining ceiling of large operating room, and putting steel ceiling in sterilizing room, also painting this room. A much needed concrete walk was laid from the Nurse's Home to the Hospital and repairing of concrete around the front of the Hospital.

In the death of Dr. Walter H. True, the Laconia Hospital lost one of the oldest members of its surgical staff, a kind hearted physician beloved by his patients.

The meetings of the Hospital staff have been held at the Hospital the second Tuesday of each month. The Doctors have co-operated well in fulfilling the College of Surgeons requirements, of writing up records of each patient and very willingly rendered free service whenever requested to do so, also giving of their valuable time to deliver courses of lectures to Student Nurses.

To the Trustees, Hospital Staff, Training School Committee, and my corps of helpers here at the hospital, who have assisted me the past year, I wish to express my sincere appreciation.

REPORT OF CITY MILK INSPECTOR

The purpose of the milk ordinance is to insure the inhabitants of Laconia a safe milk supply. It is interesting to note that although to many producers the carrying out of this ordinance seemed almost impossible, many of the barns passed on first inspection and at least 80 per cent of the milk complied with the bacterial standards on the first count.

Although it was impossible to accomplish all in a single summer and get the entire milk supply up to standard, licenses were issued to 79 dealers, 78 stores and restaurants and 89 barns were inspected.

The greatest difficulties were experienced with small producers and outside creameries. The small producers who were handicapped by lack of equipment which in most instances made proper cooling and storing impossible, had difficulty in keeping their milk below the maximum bacterial count.

Because of the great increase in population during the summer months it is necessary for many of the stores and a few of the dealers to buy milk from outside creameries. Although this milk was all pasteurized, in many cases it was not T. B. tested and as all milk sold in Laconia must be T. B. tested whether pasteurized or not, it was difficult for the board of health to make these creameries ship in T. B. tested milk.

The milk producers should be complimented in the way they accepted the ordinance as it cost each one of them no little time and money. It is only through their co-operation that such an ordinance can be a success.

The function of the Board of Health is to insure within the limits of its power and assets the highest possible degree of community health. Its field of endeavor includes some activities of major importance and many of minor importance directed toward the attainment of this end. Community health, not only a commodity but a dividend paying investment, is purchaseable at the cost of money, talent and time. The amount gained however, is not always proportionate to the cost. Health work, half done, many times might as well be not done, for example, in the control of communicable diseases, a great deal of energy might be expended in stopping most of the avenues of communication but if one or two are left open nothing has been accomplished and the money, time and tools might better have been spared. Unless it can be repaired, a tire with a nail hole in it is just as useless as one with a blowout.

We feel that the past year has been a year of some accomplishment. It has heralded, within the limits of our assets, the enforcement of the City Milk Ordinance enacted in 1926, with the result that on the average Laconia's milk supply is as good as any city's in the state.

It has seen the enforcement of the compulsory Vaccination law which through the valuable aid of the City School department has, so far as the campaign has been carried, been a complete success.

There have been no widespread outbreaks of controllable, contagious disease and there have been no cases of typhoid fever within our jurisdiction, facts which attest the present safety of our milk and water supplies.

The sewerage situation at The Weirs has made some progress toward correcting itself but where credit is due for this it should be given to the city engineering department and to public opinion for with the present chemical treatment of The Weirs drinking water there is no serious disease menace. There are certainly esthetic reasons why people should not wish to drink their own diluted filth, ster-

ilized though it be. But our attention this year has been occupied with matters more directly pertaining to the control and prevention of disease.

Our appropriation for the past year has been overdrawn. This, in itself, would not be remarkable considering the expense attendant to the operation of the milk ordinance and had our other expenses averaged up to previous years, the overdrawal would have been considerably greater. One cause of the overdrawal was that this year's appropriation was taxed with about \$192 of last year's bills. Last year's surplus was more than enough to care for this but the balance was transferred to the general account previous to their settlement.

This department likewise turned into the general account \$184 in milk license fees, sufficient to offset the overdrawal if it were credited to our account rather than to the general account.

We believe that it has been recognized and is obvious that the personnel of the health board at the present time is inadequately compensated for the service they are called upon to render and we take this opportunity to request an increase in this compensation to the extent that the yearly salary of Laconia's representatives be \$725 per annum, Lakeport's \$425 per annum and The Weirs \$50 per annum. This is not an arbitrary nor unreasonable request but is based upon the computation of a just wage and mileage allowance for actual time and mileage covered in that part of the past year from April 1st to January 1st. While we feel that this has been a period of less than average activity yet we have no other basis upon which to found our request and so we rest upon it until such time as compensation again appears inadequate.

In order that the city milk ordinance be made effective it became necessary to employ an accredited milk inspector, have certain application blanks, score cards and so forth printed and employ a part time filing clerk and stenographer.

We feel that the whole field should be covered at least twice a year to keep any sort of check on conditions and while the cost of its introduction was approximately \$400 offset by \$184 milk license returns we believe that an additional appropriation of \$500 would care for this bi-yearly inspection which less the approximate \$200 expected license returns would make the expense to the city only \$300 a year.

REPORT OF TREE WARDEN

To his Honor the Mayor and City Council:

I herewith submit my report as Tree Warden, for the City of Laconia, for the year ending 1927.

The city's shade trees on our several streets, especially the maples, are decaying very rapidly, and a large number must be removed, in the near future, as they will be a danger to public safety.

Several dead branches were removed last year, and a lot more must be removed this year. Owing to macadam surfacing of sidewalks and streets; and no space being left for moisture to get to the roots of trees, it is a waste of time to plant young trees on the edge of sidewalks. On Academy Street, there is sufficient space left between the sidewalk and curbing. Also part of North Main Street, part of Pleasant Street and Elm Street has sufficient space. Other streets are too narrow, and shade trees will not thrive surrounded by tarvia and macadam.

Overhead wires are also a menace to shade trees, but these conditions exist, so the shade trees have no chance, except in parks and commons.

REPORT of PARK COMMISSION

Laconia, N. H., February 1, 1928.

To the Mayor and Council of the City of Laconia:

Gentlemen:

The Park Commission is pleased to submit for your consideration its thirteenth annual report.

The playground season for the summer of 1927 opened at Opechee Park, Tuesday, July 5, with Mr. Charles Lord, as director and Miss Carolyn Wright as assistant. More interest than usual was shown in playground activities, and your commission consider it a very successful season.

Previous to the opening, the grand stand was repaired, a new raft was constructed and the old one rebuilt for the smaller children. One tennis court was resurfaced so that both are now in excellent condition. The grading was carried forward as far as the appropriation would permit and many minor repairs were made to the grounds and base ball diamond.

Many times the matter of having someone legally appointed as caretaker for Opechee Park has been before the board.

This year the Police Commission co-operated with the board and Mr. Walter Cotton was appointed, with powers of special police to look after the park: judging from the small number of complaints entered to the board and the condition of the grounds and apparatus this arrangement has been very satisfactory.

The average attendance at the park was 110 in the morning and 225 in the afternoon and during the season

of 9 weeks the park was not closed a single day on account of rain.

A pageant under the direction of Miss Wright brought the many pleasant festivities to a close.

The Commission wish to unite with directors and the children in expressing their thanks to Rotary and Kiwanis Clubs for their many acts of kindness in connection with the playground activities.

Miss Doris Wright had charge of the south end playground and the season was very successful. The number of small children present each day proved the wisdom of this experiment.

During the season a slide and volley ball equipment were installed and a flag pole and flag provided.

More swings should be erected this year.

The season at the Leavitt Park playground was very successful under the direction of Chas. W. Peterson, assisted by Thelma Clow.

The attendance increased so that it was necessary to have the assistant director work all day instead of afternoons as has been done in the past.

New equipment has been added, the tennis court resurfaced, the baseball outfield leveled off and the basement of the house cemented. New windows and electric lights added so that now it is a light and sanitary place for the children to work or play in rainy weather. Mr. Peterson introduced several new features among which the wood-craft proved to be the most fascinating. Three or four baseball games were played each week and were well attended, new bleachers were also built to provide seats for the crowd.

The usual hikes and picnics were carried through successfully.

During the winter months the skating rink has been kept in excellent condition and proved as great an attraction as usual. It was made larger this year and a hockey rink has been added.

Your commission appreciates the interest of the Mayor and Council and the co-operation of our citizens in the playground and recreation work of our city.

We would suggest that the appropriation be made the same as last year, which will enable us to carry on the work and provide for the replacement and repair of our equipment and the purchase of some new.

We would ask that an appropriation be made along the lines suggested last year for the completion of the grading at Opchee Park.

Once more we wish to thank all who have contributed to make the season of 1927 a success.

LIBRARY REPORT

REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES

To the Honorable Mayor and City Council:

The undersigned, Trustees of the Laconia Public Library, herewith transmit to you the annual report of Arthur W. Dinsmoor, Treasurer, showing the financial condition of the Library for the year ending February 15th, 1928, together with a table prepared by Miss Hazel J. Clark, Librarian, giving the circulation and registration during the same period.

The combined circulation of the Laconia Public Library and the Goss Reading Room for the year was 64,104, an increase over the prior year of 5,331. During the year there were 470 new registrations, and the largest circulation at the Laconia Public Library in any one month was in March, viz; 5 489, of which 4,497 was fiction.

The trustees have caused to be erected on the Library lawn near the walk leading to the entrance of the building a granite pedestal supporting a bronze tablet bearing the words, "Gale Memorial Library." Until the placing of this tablet there has been nothing upon or about the exterior of the building to indicate its character and often strangers have asked to be directed to the Public Library.

TWENTY-SEVENTH ANNUAL REPORT
OF THE
BOARD OF PUBLIC WORKS

To the Honorable Mayor and City Council:

We would respectfully submit for your consideration the twenty-seventh annual report of the Department of Public Works, accompanied by copies of the detailed reports and recommendations of the City Engineer, Street Commissioner and Superintendent of Sewers.

The Board is pleased to acknowledge valued advice and co-operation extended to us by your honorable body during the year and to report that substantially all work authorized and provided for by your appropriations, has been executed.

The outstanding, or special work of the past season may be summarized as; the Fair Street bridge, the continuation of State Highway Construction on the Rocky Pond Road and North Main Street, the extension of the Elm Street macadam and widening and reducing the sharp curve at the Bayside Cemetery corner on the Daniel Webster Road. These improvements have been real and substantial, and apparently meet with the approval of the citizens.

In the matter of recommendations for special work for the coming year, we would ask your careful study of the recommendations of the City Engineer in his report, which is appended hereto: these have been considered thoroughly by our Board and they have met with our approval. We would stress especially the need of a new bridge on Church Street, the completion of the State Road Construction to the Belmont Town Line on the Rocky Pond Road, a special

appropriation for the improvement of sections of the Meredith Center Road, the Parade Road, the White Oaks Road and the Hilliard Road near The Weirs; the continuation of bituminous macadam construction on city streets, and a suitable appropriation to extend the sanitary and surface sewer system, and if possible some provision should be made for a building that can be used as a workshop and garage.

The present winter with its frequently alternating periods of freezing and thawing has been a peculiarly severe one for roads; while the sub-structures are weakened by this condition, they are constantly subjected to heavy traffic in ever increasing volume and the problem of maintaining a smooth surface on our principal thoroughfares to satisfy public demand, has become a very difficult one.

The Mill Street bridge over the Winnepesaukee River was rebuilt with timber treated with wood preservative. Owing to the conditions now availing at this bridge it was thought not advisable to build a so-called permanent structure here at the present time.

The Fair Street bridge was replaced by a modern steel structure with re-inforced concrete roadway and sidewalk.

The old split stone approach walls and abutments were

relaid and pointed and new bridge seats constructed. A pier was built in the center of the river and two one hundred foot spans were placed.

The steel work was furnished and erected by the Berlin Construction Co., Inc., in accord with plans and specifications of the city and the abutments, pier and re-inforced concrete deck were built by the street department forces.

The total cost was \$30,419.79, which was \$259.79 in excess of the City Engineer's estimate, due mostly to delays in erection of steel work.

This is an excellent structure of superior workmanship throughout and will require no maintenance outside of painting about once in five years.

The Church Street bridge is inadequate for the traffic it has to withstand and I recommend that it be replaced in 1928 with re-inforced concrete structure.

The steel bridge over the Winnepesaukee River at The Weirs is too light for the traffic, and although in good repair should be replaced soon.

DRAINS

Some progress was made in the construction of surface water drains but there are several localities where drains should be built this season.

I recommend especially the following. Drain on Baldwin and Avery Street from Union Avenue to the top of the hill on Avery Street. On Union Avenue and Laurel Street from the Mt. Belknap Hotel to the low area on Laurel Street.

On Franklin, School, Washington and Bell Streets near Leavitt Park at Lakeport and a continuation of the drain on Endicott Street at The Weirs to prevent the accumulation of wash material in The Weirs Channel which is an inconvenience to boat navigation at low water stages.

The surface drainage system is in good condition and generally working satisfactorily.

In addition much patching of pavement cuts for Public Service Companies was made.

The cost of maintaining 188,692 sq. yds. of bituminous macadam laid previous to 1927 was \$4,020.32 or \$0.0213 per sq. yd. which is less than the yearly average.

I renew my recommendation of previous years to construct bituminous macadam pavements on Pine Street from Main to Baldwin; on Messer Street from the bridge to Union Avenue on Elm Street and on Union Avenue where the rails of the car track were removed, from Casino Square to Messer Street and from Webster Square at Lakeport to the pumping station, also recommend a section of Lakeside Avenue at The Weirs and a section on Garfield Street from Main Street to Lincoln Street.

IMPROVEMENT OF COUNTRY ROADS

No special appropriation for the improvement of outside roads was made but the department was enabled to do some widening and surfacing with gravel under the appropriation for general repairs and maintenace. There is much need for a continuation of these improvements as the traffic is constantly increasing on many of these roads and it is

impossible to maintain them in good condition without a more substantial surface than they now have.

I think it would be wise to make an appropriation of \$10,000 for the season of 1928 to widen, regrade, and gravel surface, section of Meredith Center Road, the Parade Road, so called, the White Oaks Road, and to widen, straighten and improve the Hilliard Road from the Daniel Webster Road near The Weirs schoolhouse.

PURCHASE OF EQUIPMENT

The \$7,000 provided for the purchase of equipment was expended for the replacement of three wornout motor trucks by three modern trucks of 1½ and 2½ ton capacity.

A similar amount should be furnished for purchase of new asphalt heating kettles, exchange of road roller and some motor equipment.

I would recommend in addition the replacement of one of our tractor snowplows with a more up to date snowplow and the purchase of a motor sidewalk plow, at a cost not to exceed \$4,000.

SANITARY SEWERS

The following sanitary sewers were built during 1927.

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I renew my recommendation for the construction of sewers in Sheridan Street, Gilford Avenue and Morrill Street and Walker Street near Union Avenue. In addition would call attention to the need of a sanitary sewer on Fairview Street.

The present system was maintained in good working condition and no serious difficulties were encountered.

SIDEWALKS

Sidewalks were appropriated for and constructed on fourteen different streets as enumerated in the table of expenditures of the department.

Two thousand four hundred and twenty eight square yards of new asphalt sidewalk were laid and 3,487 sq. yds. of old sidewalk were repaired and recovered.

SPRINKLING AND OILING

The appropriation of \$6,000 for sprinkling and oiling streets was not enough to cover the demand for such work and it probably should be increased for the season of 1928 as the greatly increased use of motor vehicles makes the need of dust laying on and protecting road surfaces more and more each year.

STATE ROADS

A joint appropriation by the State and the City enabled us to continue the bituminous macadam pavement on North Main Street to the junction of the roads at the Laconia State School.

The Rocky Pond Road, so called, was extended toward the Belmont Line 1,554 feet.

There remains within the limits of Laconia 1910 feet which should be constructed during 1928 to complete our portion of the Rocky Pond Road.

The estimated cost of this extension is \$9,000, or \$4,500 for this city.

Under the head of Trunk Line Maintenance \$10,571.57 was expended in general repair and renewals of the Daniel Webster road from the Belmont Line to West Street and from Stark Street to the Meredith Line. That portion of the water bound macadam from The Weirs bridge to the Meredith Line was given a coating of hot asphalt, crushed stone chips, and gravel to tide it over until such time as funds are available for its reconstruction.

It is recommended that \$10,000 be appropriated for Trunk Line Maintenance this year. Five thousand dollars by the City to meet a like sum from the State. This fund to take care of the repairs that must be made early in the spring and to widen and bank the curve opposite the entrance to Bayside cemetery and make other necessary alterations.

SNOW REMOVAL

By the use of such equipment as we have we were enabled to open for motor travel practically all of our streets and outside roads within 24 hours after the ending of storms.

There are a few roads which cannot be opened by truck or tractor plows until they are widened and regraded in places.

We have purchased and erected another mile of snow fence so that we have a total of three miles now in use. Snow fence eliminates much of the drifting of snow into roads and speeds up the movement of snow plows.

As before stated we need some additional snow removal equipment.

PLUMBING

This department issued permits for and inspected 247 plumbing jobs during the year.

ENGINEERING

Plans were made for the Fair Street bridge and surveys and estimates were made for the many jobs proposed and undertaken during the year. Line and grades given for construction work and plans and records filed for future use.

GENERAL

All work provided for by appropriations was completed in good season.

The departments under your direction are generally well equipped for the work assigned them with the exception of a suitable building for a garage and work shop.

As pointed out in my last report, we are handicapped in this particular and operate at a disadvantage and at increased cost by reason of this deficiency.

It is hoped that this matter will be given serious attention and if found possible that steps will be taken to provide a suitable building.

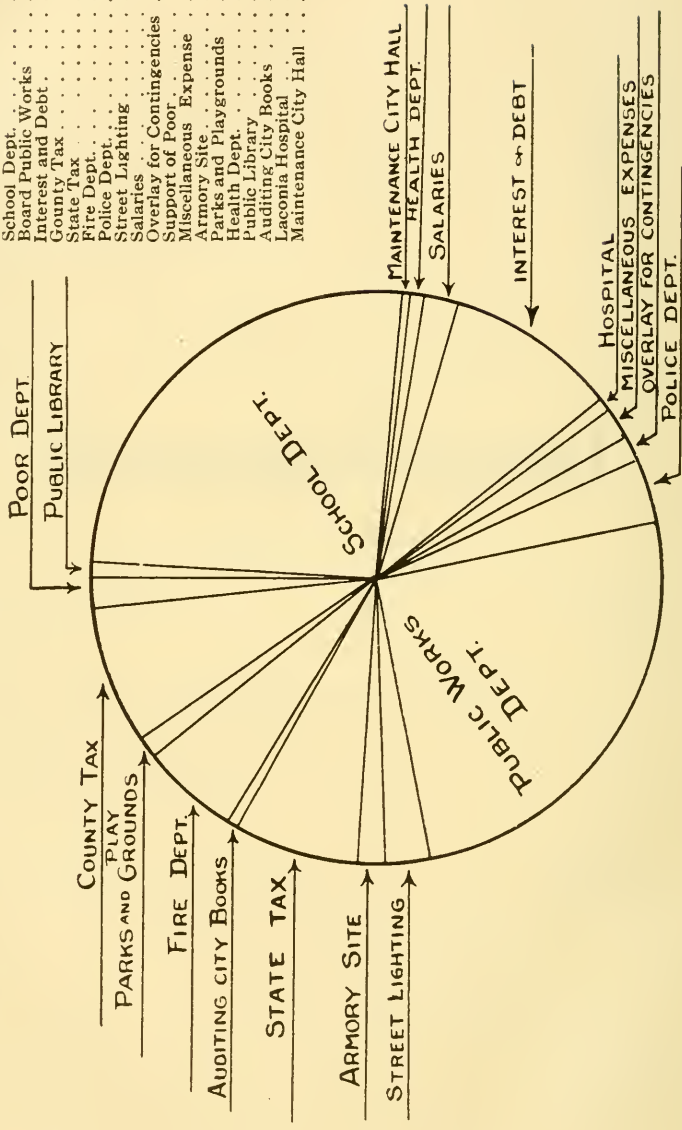

Auditor's Report

June 30, 1927

To the Honorable Charles J. Hayford, Mayor,
and the City Council,
Laconia, New Hampshire.

Gentlemen:

In accordance with your instructions we have audited the books and accounts of the City of Laconia for the year ended February 15, 1927, and respectfully submit the following report thereon.

The financial transactions of the city, as recorded on the books of the several departments receiving or disbursing money for the city or committing bills for collection, were examined and verified by a comparison with the books and records in the offices of the Treasurer and the City Clerk.

City Clerk's Office: The books and the accounts in the City Clerk's office were examined and checked in detail. The recorded receipts of funds were compared with the Treasurer's Cash Book and with the books and records of the several departments collecting money for the city or responsible for the committing of bills to the Collector; and the disbursements of cash, as recorded on the City Clerk's books, were checked and compared with the treasury drafts authorizing such payments, and with the Treasurer's books.

The taxes and special fees were verified by a comparison with the records in the departments in which the assessments and other charges originated and with the Collector's books.

The appropriations, and loans authorized were checked with the City Clerk's records of council orders, and were found to have been correctly entered in the City Clerk's Ledger.

The cash on hand in the City Clerk's office was physically counted and reconciled on April 11, 1927.

The records of funds collected and paid out for the Municipal Court were verified with the City Clerk's Ledger and compared with the Treasurer's Cash Book.

The record of motor vehicle fees collected was checked with the City Clerk's Ledger and the Treasurer's Cash Book, and in addition a further verification to January 1, 1927 was made with the office of the New Hampshire Tax Commission at Concord, New Hampshire.

The records of miscellaneous income from the Leavitt Fund and other sundry receipts, and the miscellaneous expenditures were checked and verified with the Treasurer's Cash Book and other available sources.

An exhibit showing a summary of the receipts and payments for the year under review is appended to this report.

The records of licenses granted and issued during the year were examined and verified by a comparison with the City Clerk's Ledger and the Treasurer's Cash Book.

The City Clerk's Cash Books were footed and checked and the records of payment to the Treasurer and others were evidenced by a comparison with the Treasurer's Cash Book, and by receipts on file.

The item of \$786.37 shown on the balance sheet appended to this report was analyzed back to 1895. The greater part of the balance represents awards to citizens for damages on account of street widenings, etc.; the remaining balance represents outstanding coupons on bonds.

The transfers which were authorized by the Board of Public Works were checked with the City Clerk's Ledger and with the Treasurer's Cash Book, and were found to have been correctly entered.

The General Ledger accounts and the Appropriation accounts were analyzed, a trial balance was taken, and a balance sheet, which is appended to this report, was pre-

pared showing the financial condition of the city on February 15, 1927.

Treasurer's Department: The books and accounts of this department were examined and checked in detail, the recorded receipts being compared with the records of the several departments collecting money for the city and the other sources from which money was paid into the city treasury. The payments were checked with the warrants authorizing the Treasurer to disburse city funds, and also with the City Clerk's books.

The Cash Book was footed, the various bank balances were proved with certified statements received from the various banks that had city funds on deposit. No undeposited cash was found in the hands of the Treasurer on the date the audit was started.

The payments on account of maturing debt and interest were proved with the cancelled coupons and securities on file with the Treasurer and the City Clerk.

An exhibit showing a reconciliation of the Treasurer's bank account is appended to this report.

Collector's Department: The books, records and accounts in the Collector's office were examined and checked. The commitment of taxes were examined, being verified by a comparison with the warrants issued for collection. The collections recorded in the Cash Receipts Book were balanced with the City Clerk's Ledger and the Treasurer's Cash Book, and a small balance in the Collector's bank account, which was properly verified and shown by an appended exhibit in this report.

In most instances where there were added taxes, i. e. taxes in addition to the original commitments for which the Collector received warrants from the Assessors, no warrants were found bearing the approvals of the Assessors. These omissions on the part of the Assessors are serious as they destroy the system of internal check which is desirable in the conduct of financial affairs.

The abatement of taxes were checked and verified by a comparison with the records of abatements granted by the Assessors. The outstanding accounts as shown on the commitment books were listed and the total was found to be in agreement with the unpaid total as shown by the controlling account in the City Clerk's Ledger. The method of handling tax abatements was found to be very loose and we devoted considerable attention to remedying the defects which we shall refer to under the caption of new system.

A further verification of the outstanding accounts was made by mailing notices to about one hundred persons whose names appeared on the books as owing taxes to the city. These notices were sent to those owing considerable amounts only, the purpose being to make a fair test of the accuracy of Collector's records of outstanding accounts.

From the replies received, we are satisfied that the accounts as shown are correct.

An exhibit showing a summary of the current year's taxes assessed, collected, abated and outstanding and changes in previous years' tax accounts is appended to this report.

Fire Department: The financial records of this department were somewhat crude. They were examined, however, and found to contain memoranda of miscellaneous items collected for services rendered for various aids to citizens and outside towns. As near as we can ascertain all funds collected were turned over to the Treasurer and recorded by that officer in his cash book. The receipts were also checked to the City Clerk's Ledger. Payments which were authorized by the Mayor and City Council were also verified and checked with the Treasurer's Cash Book and the City Clerk's Ledger.

Board of Public Works: The financial records of the Board of Public Works were examined and verified by a

comparison with the City Clerk's Ledger and the Treasurer's Cash Book.

Cash on hand April 11th was counted and reconciled with the department's records. The City Engineer's bank account was examined but did not reconcile with a certified statement from the bank within \$25.93. The cancelled checks for the months in which the differences were alleged to have occurred were burned and in our opinion the amount of money involved did not warrant expenditure of our time in order to locate this shortage by use of the bank's records.

An exhibit showing the bank account as found and a summary of cash collected and undeposited is appended to this report.

... *School Department*: The financial records of this department were analyzed and checked with the City Clerk's Ledger and the Treasurer's Cash Book. In analyzing the records kept by the Superintendent a comparison was made with the various warrants for general expenditures and payrolls.

A variance of \$6,933.41 was found to exist between this department's records and the City Clerk's Ledger. This variance consisted of a deficit in the accounts which, owing to certain errors of omission and errors of commission, caused the School Department's records to present a fictitious condition of available funds.

The cash on hand April 11, 1927, was counted and reconciled with the records of collection. The entire amount of funds collected as shown by the department's records was checked and compared with the Treasurer's Cash Book and the City Clerk's Ledger.

The bank balance as shown by the school's records did not reconcile with a certified statement received from the bank, there being a discrepancy of \$21.80 which the Superintendent is endeavoring to locate by means of an analysis of paid checks from the bank's records.

An exhibit of the items making up the deficit in the department's available funds as referred to above, is appended to this report.

Library Trust Funds: The books of the Treasurer were examined and checked in detail. The income from the various funds was properly recorded and accounted for. The expenditures were recorded in detail and were found to be in agreement with the Treasurer's Report for the year ended February 15, 1927.

The bank balance was reconciled to April 18, 1927, and an exhibit of same is appended to this report.

Exhibits of the condition of the funds at February 15, 1927, and the receipts and disbursements for the year ended February 15, 1927, are appended to this report.

Cemetery Trust Funds: The funds in the hands of the Trustees were examined, checked and compared with the records of deeds of trust. Verification was made by check with the Treasurer's Cash Book and the City Clerk's Ledger.

Income and expenditures of the various funds were verified. The balance of funds on hand was found to be \$2.02 less than the amount of principal and income balance shown by the Trustee's records. This difference is alleged to extend back over a period of several years. We verified the fact that it did not accrue during the period under audit.

An exhibit showing the changes in the trust funds during the year ended February 15, 1927, and the list of bank balances and securities comprising the funds at February 15, 1927, is appended to this report.

Police Department: No cash or bank accounts were found in this department. The Chief of Police stated that his department did not collect cash except in rare cases when the office of the City Clerk was closed and in such instances, the cash was immediately turned over to the City Clerk to be accounted for.

Insurance Carried: Insurance policies on file with the City Clerk, the City Engineer and the Superintendent of Schools were examined and listed. The amount of insurance carried appears to be sufficient with the exception of the amount carried on the City Hall and on the High School building and equipment. These policies do not carry the so-called co-insurance clause, or, in other words, in case of property loss by fire the loss would be entirely borne by the Insurance Companies up to the amount of the face value of insurance carried. In case the loss should be greater than the face value of the respective policies, the city would have to bear the amount of loss in excess of the face value.

The City Hall is a wooden frame structure and might easily become a total loss in case of fire. If the structure is worth only \$20,000., which is the amount of the coverage, then the present insurance is sufficient.

The High School building is a brick building and is at least a semi-fireproof structure. Although the amount of coverage, \$125,000., does not nearly represent the cost of the structure the probabilities of a loss in excess of the amount of insurance are seemingly remote.

We suggest that the authorities responsible for the amount of insurance carried or to be carried review the exhibit appended to this report, which shows in detail the insurance policies as they were submitted to us for examination.

Surety Bonds: We called for the surety bonds of the several city officials, and found only those of the Tax Collector and City Treasurer on file. The City Clerk arranged to get copies of the missing policies to be placed on file in his office.

New Accounting System: In accordance with the authorization given to us by the Mayor and City Council we have constructed and installed a modern system of accounts to supplant the single entry system heretofore in use.

In our opinion the new system will be no more difficult to operate than the old system, but rather we believe that its operation will be a matter of simple routine once the bookkeepers and clerks become familiar with its functions.

In our endeavor to give the City of Laconia the most practical system of accounting possible, we have aimed to provide a system that will not be so complicated or involved that it will require highly specialized accounting knowledge on the part of those charged with the duties of its operation.

In connection with the selection of this system, we have consulted the Secretary of the New Hampshire Tax Commission from whom we received valuable suggestions, and, in addition, we consulted the officials of the Division of Accounts attached to the Department of Corporations and Taxation of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, for general information, and the officials of other cities in connection with the solution of specific municipal financial problems.

From all of this information, suggestions and study we have eliminated some things, added and reconstructed others. Some very valuable features could not be used on account of some slight conflict with New Hampshire laws. We have tried to build a system that will properly reflect the City's financial transactions, and at the same time make its operation as simple as possible without destroying its value.

It is always difficult to introduce a new idea and we have no doubt that the operation of the new system will seem burdensome and difficult at first. However, we feel sure that after those charged with the duties of keeping the records and accounts, become familiar with the functions, the system's efficient operation will be assured. The system is elastic and provides for such adjustment or modification as may be required from time to time.

Brief of the System: The following will briefly describe the accounting features of the new system.

Assessors' Office: Separate forms have been provided for the records of poll taxes, real estate and personal property taxes. These records will be written up by the Assessors and handed to the Collector with warrants for the collection of the taxes listed thereon.

No additional effort will be required on the part of the Assessors inasmuch as these new forms supplant a set of books yearly in which the information has been furnished heretofore. In fact, the new procedure may involve less work by the Assessors, and will produce more efficient records for the use of the Collector.

The old books included a consolidation of poll, real estate and personal property taxes. However, the poll taxes are collectible long before the other taxes become due, and the Collector in past years has been obliged to collect poll taxes at least three months before these books were available for her records of collections.

The new poll tax list may be furnished to the Collector early in April and thereby provide her with facility for recording the collections currently. The separate poll tax list is also in accordance with the state statutes.

A form has been provided for the use of the Assessors in reporting abatements to the City Collector so that she may credit the tax-payers with these items. These forms will be numbered consecutively, referenced to the tax list and systematically filed.

Up to the present, abatements have been reported on the tax bills, which make an unsatisfactory record.

Tax Collector's Office: The new loose leaf cash receipts sheets will supplant the cash sheets and receipts book which have been used in the Collector's Department. This form, in addition to its cash receipts recording feature is designed to provide for recording in a systematic and permanent manner, the abatements of taxes which are at the present time carried on memorandum sheets. The principal feature of this cash receipts system is that it segregates the poll

taxes from the real estate and personal property taxes, thus enabling the Tax Collector to proceed with the work of collecting the poll taxes and completing her poll tax records without waiting for the property tax lists which in the past have been submitted to the Collector in the month of July. The segregation of the poll tax receipts permits the Collector to balance and prove the lists of unpaid tax assessments quickly and efficiently.

City Clerk's Office: A combination desk day sheet and cash book has been installed for the use of the City Clerk in recording the daily cash receipts and payments, such as Municipal Court collections and payments, motor vehicles' fees and various other classes of receipts.

This form is to be permanently filed in a loose-leaf binder at the close of each business day.

The ledger provided for the use of the City Clerk is of the loose-leaf type. When the several sheets are properly arranged and placed in the binder provided for the purpose, they form the general ledger, in which is recorded, in controlling accounts, all of the financial transactions of the city. The accounts in the ledger are separated and grouped in sections of assets and liabilities, appropriation accounts and serial debt. From the ledger information relative to the condition of the several appropriations may be obtained readily and the administrative officers may keep constantly informed of the amounts expended, also of the amounts available for the balance of the year. This information is very necessary in view of the city ordinance which expressly forbids the incurring of liabilities in excess of the appropriations made for the use of the several departments. Unless the work is well planned it will be found that the appropriations will be exhausted before the end of the year with much needed work still to be done.

The City Clerk's Journal is a bound book of the ordinary two-column stock type. It forms, together with the Cash Book, the medium from which all entries in the

General Ledger are posted, as it is of vital importance that no entry shall be originated in the General Ledger. The Journal is to be used for keeping a record of the debiting and crediting of items in the Ledger, such as opening entries, budget appropriation entries, the entering of the tax commitments, the abatement of taxes, and all entries which are not strictly cash book transactions. It is important that all journal entries be stated clearly, that the ledger accounts be properly indicated, and the purpose of the entries be stated in terms easily understandable by persons not familiar with the original transactions.

The detail draft book which has been written up in the City Clerk's office may be discontinued in the future. The reason that this record was kept was due to the fact that the vendors' invoices were sent to the Treasurer who in turn forwarded them to the respective vendors, together with the checks in payment of same. The vendors were requested to receipt and return the bills. This procedure left the City Clerk without any detailed record of the invoices unless he wrote up a duplicate record as referred to above.

To overcome the foregoing condition we have recommended that the city insist on duplicate bills from the vendors and pay the bills by a voucher check, retaining one copy of the bill in the department which contracted the debt, and the other copy to accompany the draft or warrant which is to be presented to the "Accounts and Claims Committee" for approval.

The bills will be entered on the treasury warrant by the City Clerk and presented by him to the "Accounts and Claims Committee", which committee need not approve the individual bills but may check them to the warrant, which is constructed to provide for the approvals in blanket form.

Department of Public Works: We were advised at the time we started our audit that it was highly desirable to provide the Department of Public Works with facilities

to ascertain and report the costs of the functions for which funds are appropriated by the City Council. Upon investigation we found that the Department analyzed each payroll and distributed each invoice received to the various activities of the Department. Records of materials requisitioned from inventory and the use of the Department's equipment are reported periodically by the foreman. In order to consolidate this information we devised a cost record which in our opinion is comparatively simple to keep and gives the desired information relative to costs. The record is cumulative and self-proving. Each month the elements entering into the costs balance with the expenditures for that month as they appear on the records of the City Clerk and the cumulative costs at any date must agree with the City Clerk's records of expenditures to that date. A report of the costs of the information for city officials is merely a copy of the balances appearing on the record at any date.

Fire Department: A record has been provided for use in this department that will show the amount of appropriation and the expenditures against the appropriation from month to month.

Another section of the same record book shows the miscellaneous collections made for services rendered, etc. The operation of this record will be simple and at the same time complete as to details.

Police Department: A record has been provided for use by the Police Department to classify and record the expenditures for the maintenance of the Department.

Cemetery Trust Funds: A special book for the record of the receipts and payments on account of income of the various cemetery trust funds has been provided for the use of the trustees.

The book is of the columnar type which provides for the recording of the changes in the income accounts for a period of five years without rewriting the names of the funds. The accounts are self-proving and the book is

arranged in such a manner that the annual reports to the city and state can be prepared therefrom with a minimum of effort.

City Treasurer: The City Treasurer has been furnished with a looseleaf cash book, which on account of its looseleaf feature may be posted by use of a typewriter; this practice being in favor with the Treasurer.

The Treasurer is having voucher checks printed which will be used in paying the city's bills. The bills being paid will be listed on the check, and the antiquated system of submitting bills to the vendors for receipt will be discontinued.

The Treasurer has ordered window envelopes which will relieve him of the burdensome task of addressing thousands of envelopes in the course of a year.

Condition of Appropriations: A form has been provided for the purpose of furnishing the Mayor and the City Council with the condition of the various appropriations each month. This form contains the following columns: Department, Balance and Appropriations, Receipts and Transfers, Total Credits, Expended to (first of month) . . . , Amount of Current Drafts, Total Expended to Date, and Unexpended Balances.

The form will be prepared by the various departments and by the City Clerk and submitted to the Mayor and City Council at such periods as they may elect. Its major object is to provide a condensed record that will show the Mayor and City Council the financial condition of the appropriations, without their having to refer to the various books and department records.

In order for the statement to become operative it will be necessary for all departments to keep their books and record posted currently, otherwise the information cannot be obtained.

School Department: The record of receipts, appropriations and expenditures which is being kept by the Superin-

tendent of Schools, is one that the state prescribes and in our opinion it contains all information that the Mayor or City Council may desire. Therefore, we have made no change in the School Department's accounting forms. The Superintendent should furnish each month a statement of the condition of the Department's appropriations on a form to be supplied by the City Clerk's office.

In our opinion more care should be exercised in keeping the School Department's record of accounts. Periodical comparisons should be made with the City Clerk's books. If this is done we feel that the school accounting will prove to be satisfactory.

The practice of filing checks in consecutive order with checks of prior months, before the bank balance is properly reconciled, should be discontinued; otherwise, it will become extremely difficult to locate any differences between the bank statements and the School Department's records.

General Comments and Recommendations: It has been the practice of the Board of Public Works to perform services and furnish supplies from outside persons, such as making sewer connections, selling gasoline and crushed stone, doing patching, building surface drains, removal of snow, etc.

We will not attempt to advise whether this service should or should not be rendered. However, it is difficult to understand how such service can be legally rendered. We shall attempt to briefly outline the effect that such procedure has on the city's accounts.

The city does not make appropriations for the rendering of services and supplies to individual citizens or others. The city does make specific appropriations for the maintenance of highway and bridges, sewer construction and maintenance, and such other work as may be considered proper and necessary.

During the year the Board of Public Works uses its labor and material for the purpose of accommodating various

individuals and towns; however, when they put through their payroll warrant and bills payable warrant they must charge such amounts to some authorized appropriation. There being no authorized appropriation for these charges, they fictitiously charge the items to some one of the authorized appropriations such as "Highways and Bridges". In turn the persons for whom the services are rendered reimburse the city for the work done and the money as it is received actually in effect offsets the charges against the appropriations, so we may summarize the situation as follows:

The department must keep many extra detail accounts which necessarily complicates the department's accounting.

It appears that the department must supply additional labor in order to perform the outside work, and must also buy additional supplies to furnish the accommodations to individuals.

The department asks for and is allowed appropriations for city work and then uses a part of said appropriations for purposes other than those specified. The powers given to the Board of Public Works may be construed to legally cover this situation, both from the standpoint of expenditures and the collection of the funds for the services and materials.

We have set forth the facts and regardless of the bothersome situation that is created, the transactions may be warranted and proper.

We recommend that this matter be referred to the City Solicitor for his ruling on the legality of the procedure.

We recommend that the amount of damages due individual citizens on account of street widening, etc., be paid and thereby eliminated from the city's liabilities.

We recommend that an amount for overlay be included in arriving at the tax rate each year and that such amount shall be set up on the city's books in an account known as "Overlay Account". This account will be used to cover

abtements that may be made of taxes assessed for the year. When the taxes for any one year are collected or otherwise accounted for, any balance remaining in the Overlay Account for the corresponding year may be transferred to the Excess and Deficiency Account.

We desire to express our appreciation of the uniform courtesies extended to us during the course of our examination by the various city officials and employees.

Comments on the Deficiency Account: The deficiency account represents the excess of the city's current liabilities over its current assets. This condition has been brought about by the expenditure of funds in excess of the revenue received and revenue to be received for the years prior

to February 15, 1927. These excess expenditures have been made since 1918 in which year the city issued 4½% serial Funding Bonds par value \$69,000.—to liquidate demand notes outstanding as authorized by the Laws of 1917, Chapter 129. The liquidation of these notes had the effect of reducing the current liabilities at June 1, 1918 to the extent of \$69,000.00, an amount sufficient to approximately balance the current assets and liabilities at that date.

In our opinion the funds used for these expenditures were obtained from the following sources:
